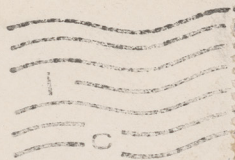
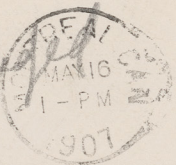

My dearest Mother,

He arrived here at 10.30 Sunday night after a comfortable journey - not too crowded or too hot. Instead of having to throw stones up at the windows we were greeted by the family plus Svegn. Svegn is looking really very well. We went down to the express office this morning a propos of the tea-cup & I think things might be all right now without troubling Mr Wilder any further. He wrote

as you can thank him. Do
you remember the handkerchief
with the embroidered "L" that I
left on top of your bureau & asked
you to return to "Pegpipes." He brought
it in thinking he might have
got me of his by mistake. So he
must have it back of course.

forgot to return & I think I put
it & Father's papers in your
box - if I did not they must
have been left in mine. It was
like coming into midsummer
getting back here! The little

parcel Mrs Kemp sent me to put in my trunk was contained two sides of a cushion — two of the light, dainty ones, & with such a sweet message. Please accept this from an old friend in your very own cozy corner from an old grandma whose heart you won long since. I do think it was just dear of her. I wonder if she knew that my "very own cozy corner" would be in my own house. You might tell her. The world is certainly very full of kind people.
