Dearest Mother,

I have just come
in from driving with
Mrs. Molson, & was so glad
to see your letter, for
we thought Dr. Lafleur
must have been out, as
he returned a ticket.

Well, it is not very en-
couraging news, & leaves
things pretty much where
they were - until Dr. Lafleur

decides. I really do not feel
that I have any definite
idea myself, for it is so
long since I have been
with Father, but I feel
that you ought to have
some change soon you
yourself. I do not see
how exactly unless I
should go out & you
come here. But I do
feel that G.D. really wants
me at present. I seem
to be the only person that
she makes no effort for - She
was sat up yesterday

in the arm chair for about
20 minutes - Dr Bell insisted
on this as he thinks the
tube drains better that
way, but poor T. D. was
very, very, tired after it
& they will only try
every 2nd day now.

The last letter I wrote
you Conrad had in his
pocket for a day & a
night - so there must have
been quite a gap when
you did not hear, &
it was the letter asking

for money which we
need badly - I could not
give Minnie her wages -
Pruth + Minnie got off
this morning, + Elizabeth
is now looking after
Conrad + myself - Uwer
for lunch still of course -
I doubt if G. D. will be
back in a week - She
still protests against Oratio,
+ against Aunt Ernie appear-
ing + Wale. R. I wrote
asking Wale R. not to
hurry, you know I do

not think he is at all
well again, from what
he wrote me, & from
what G. M. told me he
had said in her last
letters. Then I had a
line from Aunt G. to To-
day - saying that Uncle
R. was not at all well
& that they were just
leaving for two weeks
in Norway - where she
hoped he would pick
up, before coming out
here - Well, we just

really have to live day
by day meanwhile -

Minnie has left every-
thing beautifully tidy, &
I love the quiet of
the house to do what
I have to do leisurely -
It is cool today &
everything very beautiful
on the mountain -

I had to give Ruth
\$10.00 out of G. M.'s
money to go on with
at Metis - There I

borrowed the \$20.00 I
gave R. from G. 2 -
She has spent most
of it but not all on
her private clothes &
I told her she must
give me some sort
of an account, as to
what went for household
things & what for her,
it is the most difficult
thing in the world
to get her to keep
track of anything like
