My Dear Mrs. Harrington,

At a meeting of the Museum Committee, held
yesterday, the following Resolution was passed:

"The Committee of the Peter Redpath Museum desires to place on record its sense of the great loss it has experienced through the recent death of Dr. B. J. Harrington, and its deep appreciation of the valuable services rendered by him for many years.

From the foundation of the Museum in 1882, Dr. Harrington acted as its Senior Curator. His broad sympathies and his enthusiastic efforts in behalf of the special work represented by the Museum Collections made his administration peculiarly successful. 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
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
