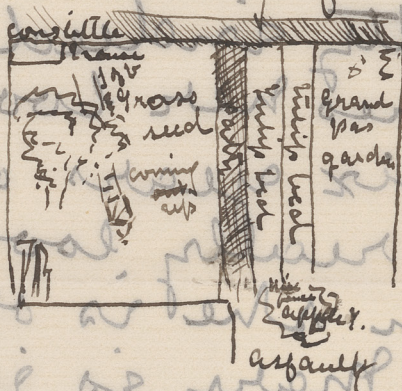
May 28<sup>th</sup> 1894.
