body. Things are dragging
along here pretty much as
usual and the work at
the college buildings is
going on very rapidly now.
I was speaking to Sam about
the steps to-day and noticed

that he had³ a bandage on
his hand so asked him
what had happened and
he showed me, well it
seems that he tried to stop
a dog fight and one of the
dogs bit his hand pretty
badly and it was rather
swollen and did not look
very clean so I told him
that he should show it
to a doctor at once but
I do not know if he has
taken my advice or not.
He has painted the floor
of the gallery and it

looks much better but - it -
looked up a lot of paint.

Is it not too bad about Prof.
Chandler he certainly will
be a great loss to the college
