Grandfather Pictou, April 19th 1846

My Dear George

I was very glad to receive another letter from you it gives me great pleasure to hear from you and to hear that you are improving so much in your reading Grandpa & I are always very much pleased to hear from you You must try not to forget your Grandpa he has very few to care for now but however far away he may seem to be from you he loves you very much yet I was very sorry for him one day lately He had gone over to the Garden to see what he could do this spring when he came back he seemed very sad and said he did not know how

to work there it made him feel so lonely
when he looked around, so many things
reminded him of you he did not know
how much he would miss you with you
were far away from him I suppose
you will have a very pleasant time now
as the warm Spring sun shines on your
little heads preparing the ground for the
seed. You know if you do not sow
neither can you reap and after you have
got all ^{the work} done what pleasure it will give
you to watch their coming to Perfection
Now as the Summer has come you
will be taken to the City sometimes it

will be a very pleasant walk for you
I should think. When you can write longer
letters it will be very pleasant to hear
of some of the Wonderful things that
you may see perhaps your taste and mine
might be different about some thing
but no doubt we will agree in others
For instance you and I if we were walking
on some of the streets in Montreal and
came up to some Dashing Confectionery
Window. we would both agree when we
saw the tempting display ^{at} our mouth
would water. Altho' how nice and Sweet
they must be in the same way with
all the new things you are constantly seeing.

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you have the advantage of me in this respect
for you know all about ~~your~~ our Churches
and ~~God~~ works and our New houses but you
have ~~not~~ not seen ~~one~~ New Building
or buildings I should say For Mr Davis
has put up an Iron Foundery down by
Primrose Mills and is working away
inside making Iron Castings but if you
come here in Spring you will see all
for yourself we would be very much pleased
to see you but you must do as your Papa
and Mamma think right and hope it may
be all for the best I must now close my
short letter with best wishes for you all

to send him something sweet for his mouth
