Dear George,

Your letters
 of Apl. 14th have arrived
 and we are glad to
 hear of your safe
 arrival, and hope
 you have sustained
 no injury from the
 exposure & fatigue
 of the journey, which
 seems to have been
 something terrible.

Your neck tetter were
 placed in Lovell's
 bands, and I am
 bringing him as

much as I can to
get through with the
work. He says the
printer was for
pages without mar-
ginal headings, which
shewed cost 25c per
page extra; but I do
not think they are
worth the expense.
I shall see the proof
read.
