Dear George,

Received yesterday  
copy of a document from Packard  
addressed to Earl Dufferin and  
asking him to appoint you  
a commissioner on Locusts,

for use of the Prairie provinces.

Ottawa I shall write to  
you. It also encloses a  
printed form like yours  
which I send with this.  
I have written to Packard  
stating where you are  
and what doing.

We have received your postal  
from Oregon, I forget the name  
of the place — where you were  
to stop over Sunday, and  
hope you have long ago safely  
reached Victoria.

Port of Callaghan is all  
of typhoid — very dangerous. —  
William was well when he heard  
from you; but the Fleet seem to  
be getting up a new revolution  
and I do not know of the  
cess stay in Vancouver beyond  
the end of his service.

The buses to Seattle  
since two days and I have  
sent Paul Lader, we all  
right — Spirituous things  
and all have gone

All are well here  
Weather very warm quite  
like July & everything growing  
with great rapidity.
