Instruction.

The instruction afforded is practically that laid down by the Government of the Province. There is, however, no ABSOLUTE adherence to the official curriculum. Each boy's special needs are studied, and every effort is made to bring out his individual characteristics.

It should be borne in mind—and it is impossible to lay too much stress upon this—that true education does not consist in the mere attainment of a certain amount of knowledge, not in filling the mind with dry facts, soon to be forgotten, but in the OPENING UP OF THE MIND, in teaching boys to think logically, in inculcating good habits, and in the development of CHARACTER. This is the guiding principle of the education afforded at King's School.

Special attention is given to the French language.

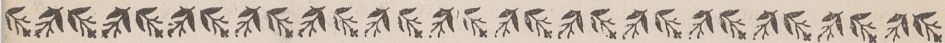


General.

The year is divided into four terms, beginning respectively on Sept. 5th, Nov. 14th, January 30th, Ap. 10th. It ends June 20th.

New pupils received at any time during the year, and charged from date of entrance.

The location of the school is without question one of the finest in the Province. The situation is high, and exceptionally free from damp. The house is large, airy and fitted up with all modern improvements. The buildings stand on



their own grounds of about 23 acres, fronting on the river, and there is every facility for safe bathing. St. Jerome is only 33 miles from Montreal, and enjoys a very convenient train service.

The domestic arrangements are presided over by Mrs. Liebich, whose long experience enables her to make each individual boy feel at home in every sense of the word.

The diet is provided on a most liberal scale.
