This "corner" is at "the bottom of a narrow marshy cul-de-sac 8½ m. deep at the northern part of the Bay we are crossing across whose mouth we are crossing passing. It is in N. Lat. 49.23.55 & W. Long. 95.14.38. It is 3' south of the parallel of the Postage des Bois and 32' on its west -

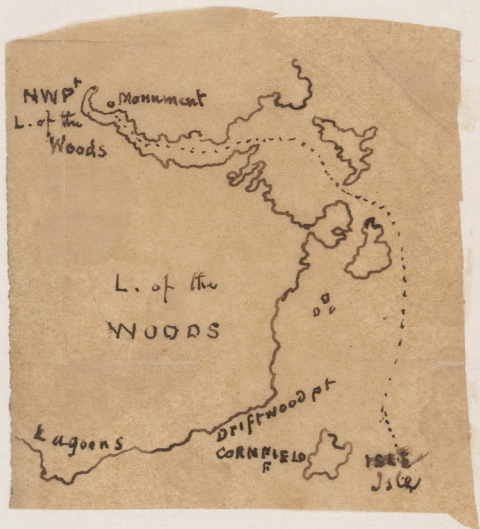
