My dear Anna,

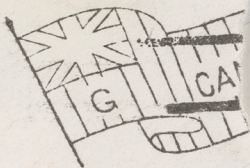
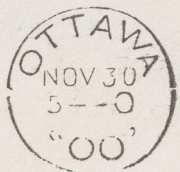
your kind letter
