The only non-psychotic epileptic case will come into our office. He is one and three-quarter years post resection of the medial surface of the temporal lobes including the uncus, amygdalum and hippocampal gyrus, and according to his mother, over the phone, "his memory is absolutely no good; cannot even be sent to the store alone for purchases. " There are some two or three schizophrenic patients still in state hospitals which she can visit and, in addition, she may choose to see some of the twenty-four other cases of bilateral resection of the amygdalum and uncus; bilateral resection of the anterior 5 cm. of the medial temporal lobe; and four cases in which unilateral inferior temporal lobectomy was done with resection of the hippocampal gyrus, uncus and amygdalum for decerebrate rigidity because of incisural herniation. One of these cases showed profound memory loss which was only temporary, subsiding in three to four months. These cases are all available for study but, of course, are complicated by other damage. Carl Pribrum has just phoned me to say he also would like to study these cases which, of course, is quite all right with me. I shall welcome Dr. Milner whenever convenient for her and would appreciate as much advance notification as possible so that the state hospitals can get their cases lined up.
