



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## SOURCES AND SYMBOLS

**SOURCES.**—Statistics are derived mainly from government bureaus and offices through direct communications with the entities concerned and from published statistical reports and bulletins.

Data on money and banking are derived from the reports of the former Bureau of Banking, Combined Statement of Resources and Liabilities of Other Banks (commercial banks and savings banks) and other information supplied by other departments of the Central Bank.

**UNITS.**—The word "thousand" is used to mean 10 hundred units; "million", 1,000 thousand units; and "billion", 1,000 million units.

In conformity with the recommendations of the Statistical Office of the United Nations, index numbers are recomputed about every five years on an up-to-date base.

Gregorian calendar years and months are used. Data for fiscal years ending June 30 are properly noted whenever used. Owing to the rounding of numbers, totals do not always tally with their component parts.

**DEFINITIONS.**—The series used are defined in general terms in the "Notes on the Series Used" section. Footnotes are used for further description or clarification and for drawing attention to specific differences between the data presented and the general terms used in the "Notes on the Series Used" section.

## NOTES ON THE SERIES USED

### I. MONEY AND BANKING

BANKING SYSTEM.—Banking system consists of the Central Bank, commercial banks and savings banks.

OTHER BANKS.—Other Banks consist of commercial banks and savings banks other than the Postal Savings Bank.

INTERNATIONAL RESERVE.—The international reserve is composed of the dollar reserves of the Central Bank plus the net foreign exchange holdings of Other Banks. The dollar reserves of the Central Bank consist of gold, due from U.S. depositories, U.S. Government securities having maturities of not more than five years, and U.S. dollar notes and coins. Prior to the organization of the Central Bank on January 3, 1949, international reserve refers to the gold holdings and dollar balances of the National Treasury which were taken over by the Central Bank of the Philippines, except the Sinking Fund. The international reserve is exclusive of the dollar balances in the Sinking Fund but inclusive of the gold bullion on deposit with the United States Mint, San Francisco which was revalued from \$805,410.00 to \$1,360,621.08 at \$35 per fine troy ounce. The General Fund was transferred in March, 1949. Beginning July, 1950, adjustments were made to include balances from the Philippines-Japan Open Account. Beginning December, 1955, loans from U.S. banks repayment of which is covered by export bills maturing within one year are included in the international reserve of the Central Bank.

The net foreign exchange holdings of Other Banks is the difference between the foreign exchange assets and the foreign exchange liabilities. Foreign exchange assets consist of balances abroad, foreign bonds and securities, foreign currency in vaults, unmatured export bills, and other claims against non-residents. Foreign exchange liabilities consist of amounts due to banks abroad, U.S. Government dollar deposits and other obligations to non-residents, drafts issued outstanding and travellers' letters of credit paid in cash.

MONEY SUPPLY.—Money supply is the sum of the notes and coins in circulation and the peso deposits subject to check. Notes and coins in circulation are obtained by deducting from the currency issue of the Central Bank the cash in the National Treasury vaults and cash in the vaults of Other Banks. The peso deposits subject to check exclude the National

Government and inter-bank deposits but include unused overdraft lines, and managers', cashiers' and certified checks outstanding. The money supply should equal the sum of the international reserve and domestic credit minus the non-money supply deposits plus or minus the net balance of the miscellaneous accounts depending on whether it is a debit or credit balance. Any discrepancy is due primarily to recording lag in the inter-bank transactions.

**DOMESTIC CREDITS.**—Domestic credits of the Central Bank and Other Banks are composed of domestic securities, and loans and advances to residents. Domestic credits of the Central Bank include P.I. Treasury Bills and Notes, R & D bonds, RFC bonds, and advances except those to Other Banks. Domestic credits of Other Banks are composed of loans and discounts, overdrafts, customers' liability acceptances under L/C and T/R, and other forms of domestic investments except inter-bank credits.

**NON-MONEY SUPPLY DEPOSITS.**—Non-money supply deposits are the summation of the National Government balances and savings and time deposits of residents which are not considered in the calculation of money supply. National Government balances include cash in the National Treasury vaults, and the general and special funds held in deposit with the Central Bank and the Philippine National Bank.

**MISCELLANEOUS ACCOUNTS.**—Miscellaneous accounts are those accounts of the Central Bank and Other Banks which were not classified elsewhere. The net balance of these accounts represents the difference between miscellaneous assets on the one hand and miscellaneous liabilities and capital accounts on the other. Net debit balances are indicated by parenthesis.

**RESERVE REQUIREMENTS.**—The reserve requirements established by the Monetary Board for all banks in the Philippines are as follows: 18 per cent of the total peso demand deposits, 5 per cent of the total peso savings and time deposits, and 10 per cent of the total deposit liabilities in foreign currency.

**AVAILABLE RESERVE.**—Available reserve consists of deposit of banks with the Central Bank, eligible Philippine bonds and securities guaranteed by the Republic of the Philippines, eligible foreign balances and eligible foreign securities.

The amount of Philippine bonds and securities should not exceed the required reserve on total savings and time deposits plus  $5/18$  of the required reserve on peso demand deposits. Eligible foreign balances and foreign securities should not exceed the required reserve on deposit liabilities in foreign currency.

All securities and other foreign balances in excess of the required reserve and cash in bank vaults are considered potential reserves only.

## II. CREDIT AND INVESTMENT

**SELECTED FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS.**—Selected financial institutions consist of the Rehabilitation Finance Corporation (RFC), the Agricultural Credit and Cooperative Financing Administration (ACCFA), the Government Service Insurance System (GSIS), rural banks, and pawnshops operating in the City of Manila and suburbs.

**AGRICULTURAL LOANS.**—Agricultural loans are loans granted to farmers and farm landowners and/or operators, to finance operation of farms from planting to harvesting, to purchase farm equipment or farm land, and to meet other essential farm needs. Credits granted to farmers to finance business other than farming do not fall under this category. However, loans granted to those engaged in forestry, fishing, livestock, and dairy business are considered agricultural loans.

**INDUSTRIAL LOANS.**—Industrial loans are credits granted to those engaged in mining and manufacturing industries either to finance operations to meet operating expenses, or to purchase raw materials, plant and equipment, etc.

**COMMERCIAL LOANS.**—These are loans allowed to finance the distribution and/or marketing of goods, merchandise and commodities; i.e., credits granted to merchants and businessmen engaged in buying and selling, or otherwise dealing in goods, merchandise, and commodities, but not engaged in actual production thereof.

**PUBLIC UTILITY LOANS.**—Public utility loans include all credits extended to enterprises performing public services.

**REAL ESTATE LOANS.**—Real estate loans are credits allowed to finance purchases, construction, reconstruction, and improvement of realty, and those granted to real estate brokers.

**CONSUMPTION LOANS.**—These are loans which are non-productive and are used for personal purposes.

**GOVERNMENT LOANS.**—These are loans granted to municipal, provincial, and city governments for the development of self-liquidating projects.

**OTHER LOANS.**—Other loans are credits which are unspecified and could not be classified otherwise.

**CROP LOANS.**—These are production loans intended to meet the credit requirements of the farmer to finance his farm activities, the maturity being 270 days at 7 per cent interest per annum.

**FARM IMPROVEMENT LOANS.**—These are loans granted to aid farmers in the procurement of work animals, farm tools and implements,

and other farm items for the further improvement of his farm. The maturity period of this type is from one year to three years depending upon the extent of the improvement. The rate of interest applied here is the same as for the crop loan.

**COMMODITY LOANS.**—These loans are granted on crops deposited in warehouses of Farmers' Cooperative Marketing Associations (FACOMAS) by farmer-member-borrowers having 120 days as their maturity period at 6 per cent interest, renewable at the option of the ACCFA.

**FACILITY LOANS.**—These are loans granted to FACOMAS for the acquisition of essential facilities such as warehouses and rice mills including transportation to enable these associations to handle storage, processing and marketing of the members' produce. These loans are payable in 10 equal annual installments at 8 per cent interest per annum.

**PAWNSHOP.**—A pawnshop is a credit establishment which is organized for the purpose of making loans on deposit or pledge of personal property within a limited period of time. Rates of interests and prices are governed by existing laws.

**INSURANCE.**—Data cover transactions within the Philippines of all types of private insurance companies.

**DOMESTIC COMPANIES.**—These consist of companies formed, organized or existing under the laws of the Philippines.

**FOREIGN COMPANIES.**—These consist of companies formed, organized, or existing under laws of their respective countries and whose business activities are subject to Philippine insurance laws.

**SUBSCRIBED CAPITAL.**—This is that portion of the authorized capital which has been underwritten by the stockholders.

**PAID-IN CAPITAL.**—Paid-in capital refers to the actual capital paid-in by shareholders or owners to the corporation, partnership, and cooperative association at registration which may be in cash or in property.

**WITHDRAWN OR DISSOLVED CAPITAL.**—Dissolved capital refers to registered paid-in capital of new and old corporations, partnerships, and cooperative associations which have gone out of business.

### **III. FOREIGN EXCHANGE TRANSACTIONS**

Data on foreign exchange receipts and disbursements represent actual foreign exchange transactions passing through the banking system, that is, commercial banks and the Central Bank. These figures are compiled from the daily reports of foreign exchange acquisition and dispositions

submitted by commercial banks. Sources of foreign exchange receipts are classified into four main groups, namely:

Merchandise Exports (c.i.f.)

Gold

United States Government Expenditures

Miscellaneous Invisible Items

Similarly, foreign exchange disbursements are divided into three main groups:

Merchandise Imports (c.i.f.)

Philippine Government Expenditures

Miscellaneous Invisible Items

**MERCHANDISE ACCOUNTS.**—Exports represent actual foreign exchange received from merchandise shipped to foreign countries, while Imports are actual foreign exchange disbursed for merchandise brought into the Philippines from foreign countries. These accounts cover not only the regular exports and imports which are sold and bought for dollars, but also the export and import bills negotiated covering shipments to and from Japan under the Trade Financial Agreements between the Philippines and Japan.

Figures differ from the value of merchandise shipped out of and into the country per customs manifests due to time lag.

**GOLD**—represents the value of refined gold purchased by the Central Bank from domestic gold mining companies.

**U.S. GOVERNMENT EXPENDITURES.**—consist of dollar checks disbursed by U.S. Government agencies located in the Philippines which were cashed thru commercial banks. These include peso purchases of U.S. notes, peso payment of U.S. Treasury Warrants for War Veterans and sales of dollars to the NCBNY-Clark Field.

**PHILIPPINE GOVERNMENT EXPENDITURES.**—include amortization of Philippine government loans, diplomatic and consular expenditures and official travel. These accounts are exclusive of government imports.

**INVISIBLES.**—other sources and payments of foreign exchange arising out of non-trade transactions. These include Services, Tourism and Travel, Education and Subsistence Expenditures, Inward and Outward Investment Remittances, Donations and Contributions, Other Foreign Government Expenditures in the Philippines (except U.S. Government) and Miscellaneous Sources and Purposes.

#### IV. INTERNATIONAL TRADE

**MERCHANDISE EXPORTS AND IMPORTS.**—Unless otherwise indicated, our foreign trade is defined as a "general trade" existing between

the Philippines and all parts of the world and comprising all merchandise transactions.

"General trade" consists of: (1) exports and re-exports, and (2) imports which include all arrivals other than direct transit and transshipment trade.

The term "merchandise" has been defined as essentially all physical items moving in international trade, except gold, embroidery, the raw materials of which are imported on consignment basis, and arrivals coursed thru the Bureau of Posts; personal effects, returned goods and special transactions which are treated separately. The gold content of manufactured articles is considered as merchandise.

**DOMESTIC EXPORTS.**—When re-exports are excluded from exports, the data are designated as domestic exports.

**CLASSIFICATION OF IMPORTS.**—Prior to August 1956, a modified commodity classification patterned after the Standard International Trade Classification has been used to suit local needs. However, to eliminate undue inconsistencies in trade classification arising from such modifications, the Standard International Trade Classification with some necessary adjustment has been adopted on August 1956.

**TRADE INDICES.**—The series of trade indices has been revised with 1955 as the base period on account of the change in the pattern of trade, particularly imports, and in order to increase the coverage of items included in the calculation of the index. For the years prior to 1955, the old series has been spliced with the new one. The commodities used directly in the computation represented by the value in the base period (1955) are 96.2 per cent for imports and 99.6 per cent for exports.

The commodities included in the new series, unlike the old one, are based on the Standard International Trade Classification. To increase coverage in the calculation, appropriate wholesale price indices for imported items were used as deflators for commodities without quantities in the trade list.

The quantum index is a weighted aggregative type in which the weight of the quantity of each item is the unit value in the base year (Laspeyres' formula).

The unit value index is also of the same type of index but is currently weighted (Paasche's formula).

The net terms of trade measure the changes in the prices received for exports in relation to prices paid for imports.

The ratio between the quantum index of imports and the quantum index of exports is the gross barter terms of trade. It measures the physical quantity of imports actually received for a given quantity of exports.

**SOURCE OF DATA.**—Export and import figures were furnished by the Bureau of the Census and Statistics prior to 1950. Thereafter, the Central Bank has been compiling its data based, solely, on customs entries, which are all on f.o.b. basis.

## V. PUBLIC FINANCE

Figures on the aggregate monthly receipts and disbursements of the government being unavailable, data on public finance are confined only to the status of the public debt and the collections of the Bureau of Customs and the Bureau of Internal Revenue. The results of the yearly fiscal operations of the National Government are, however, shown in the annual report of this bank.

For the purpose of this publication, the public debt is classified into the following categories: (a) as to source (foreign and domestic); (b) as to periods of maturity (short-term, middle-term, and long-term); (c) as to purpose for which the debt was incurred (budgetary and developmental); (d) as to instrument evidencing the debt (bonded and non-bonded); and (e) as to levels of government incurring the obligation (national and local, and government corporations).

## VI. PRODUCTION, CONSTRUCTION, AND PUBLIC UTILITIES

**PRODUCTION INDICES.**—The indices of physical volume of production (1955=100) measure the changes over time in the volume of commodities produced in agriculture, mining, and manufacturing. The method of computation used in the index for agriculture and mining is the base-weighted arithmetic average of quantity relatives. The index of physical volume of manufacturing is derived by the use of the base-weighted aggregate of quantities produced.

The coverage for agriculture includes all major food and export products. The most important food crops are palay, corn, beans and vegetables, coffee and cacao, fruits and nuts, unshelled peanuts, root crops, fish and livestock and poultry. Major export crops consist of copra, abaca, tobacco, sugar cane and timber. Metallic minerals included under mining are gold, chromite, manganese, copper and iron ore.

Manufacturing production covers a wide variety of durable and non-durable items turned out by major firms. The commodities are classified

in accordance with the International Standard Industrial Classification of Economic Activities. Non-durable manufactures include manufactured food products, beverages, tobacco products, textiles, footwear and wearing apparel, paper, leather, rubber and chemical products. Under durable manufactures are wood and cork manufactures, furniture and fixtures, stone clay, cement and glass products, metal products, except machinery, and electrical appliances.

**PERMIT VALUATION OF BUILDING CONSTRUCTION.**—Permit valuation comprises the permit value of all buildings to be constructed in the City of Manila including residential, non-residential as well as additions, alterations and repairs.

“Residential” buildings include those buildings utilized for living quarters such as apartments, accessoriyas, bungalows, cottages and residences. “Non-residentials” include those for commercial purposes or those not used for living quarters like office buildings, public buildings, factories, sheds, warehouses and plants; also, recreational, social, educational, charitable, religious, hospitals and other similar institutional structures. “Additions, alterations and repairs” include reconstructed buildings with partial or complete renovation. The number appearing under “Additions, alterations and repairs” does not affect the total number of buildings actually constructed in Manila. This number reflects only the number of permits granted or approved by the City Engineer’s Office for such purpose.

**PUBLIC UTILITIES.**—Railroad, airline and shipping statistics are presented in these series. These include operations of the Manila Railroad Company, Philippine Air Lines, Inc., and foreign incoming and outgoing cargo movement in the Port of Manila. Electricity output of the Manila Electric Company is also shown.

## VII. GROSS SALES

**GROSS SALES.**—These consist of total charges to customers for merchandise sold, whether on cash or on credit, and total sales on installment basis.

**GROSS RECEIPTS.**—These consist of total charges to customers in exchange for services rendered.

**GROSS SALES INDEX.**—The gross sales and/or receipts index is a simple arithmetic average of value relatives with 1955 as the base period. The value index was adjusted for price changes by the use of an appropriate price index in order to obtain the volume index.

The data on gross sales and/or receipts are compiled from 1,172 cooperating establishments in the Philippines, covering seven major in-

dustry divisions, viz., mining and quarrying, manufacturing, construction, electricity-gas-heat-water and sanitary services, commerce, transport-storage and communication, and services.

### VIII. PRICES

CONSUMER PRICES.—The consumer price index measures average changes in the retail prices of a fixed basket of goods and services purchased by an average household in Manila and suburbs. Prices used in the index are for Manila only due to the unavailability of price data for the suburban areas prior to 1954. However, the study of retail price behavior in the suburbs from 1954-1956 shows that the rates of change in prices in Manila and in suburban markets are the same. The index is a base-weighted arithmetical average of price relatives. The weights are based on the percent distribution of the average expenditure per household in Manila and suburbs as obtained in the sample surveys conducted by the Central Bank in November 1953 and September-November 1954. The weights used in the calculation of the index are as follows:

The average size of a household is 5.97 and the average cash intake is ₱219.00 a month.

**WHOLESALE PRICES.**—The wholesale price index is intended to provide a general measure of monthly changes in the wholesale prices of domestic and imported commodities in Manila. The index covers commodities for the home market and for export. Based on the Standard International Trade Classification, it includes 226 items individually weighted by the relative values of production and retained importation in 1955. In form, the index is a base-weighted arithmetic average of price relatives (Laspeyres' formula). The number of items in each major group and the corresponding percentage weights are:

RETAIL PRICES.—The retail price index is assumed to measure the changes in the prices at which retailers in Manila and suburbs dispose of their goods to consumers or households. The index is a base-weighted arithmetic average of the price relatives. The weights used reflect the volume of sales in the retail market to households in Manila and suburbs. Prices used in the index are for Manila only due to the unavailability of price data for the suburban areas prior to 1954. However, the study of retail price behavior in the suburbs from 1954 to 1956 shows that the rates of change in prices in Manila and in the suburban markets are the same.

STOCK PRICES.—Fifty-three stocks of fifty companies (2 banks, 4 insurances companies, 14 commercial and industrial companies, 6 sugar centrals and 24 mining companies) listed with the Manila Stock Exchange are included in the index. The index is a weighted arithmetic average of price relatives with 1955 as the base period. The relative values of shares traded in the base year were used as weighting factors.

## IX. EMPLOYMENT AND WAGES

### EMPLOYMENT

The Central Bank employment index is a revised series (1955 = 100) compiled from data furnished by 1,289 cooperating establishments in the Philippines, covering nine major industry divisions: Mining and Quarrying; Manufacturing; Construction; Electricity, Gas and Heat, Water and Sanitary Services; Commerce; Transport and Communication; Recreation

Services; Personal Services; and Government. It covers all full and part-time employees who were on the payroll, i.e., who worked during, or received pay for the month.

For years prior to 1955, the old series (1949=100) has been spliced with the new one. The operation of splicing does not change the basic characteristics of either index.

WAGE RATES.—The rates of pay of laborers in industrial establishments in Manila and suburbs are derived from monthly payrolls of automobile dealers, brokerage, lumber yards, furniture manufacturers, printing and publishing, transportation and construction firms, cigar and cigarette factories, painting contractors and machine shops. These rates represent the weighted daily average rates of all classes of workers in each group.

When money wage rate is expressed in terms of goods and services it can purchase, the term "real wage rate" is used. The real wage rate index is obtained by deflating money wage rate index by the consumer price index (1955=100) for a wage earner's family in Manila.

EARNINGS.—This series is a monthly sample survey conducted through the joint cooperation of the Bureau of the Census and Statistics and the Department of Economic Research of the Central Bank, covering some 787 leading business establishments in the Philippines employing

around 160,000 wage earners and salaried employees. The average monthly earnings information reflects not only changes in the basic daily wage or monthly salary rates, but also such variable factors as bonuses and premium pay for overtime, part-time work, stoppages for varying causes, labor turnover and absenteeism. Earnings should not be confused with wage rates because while wage rates represent the rates stipulated for a given unit of work or time, earnings refer to the actual return to the worker for a stated period of time.

**WAGE EARNERS.**—These are the skilled and unskilled workers and working foremen in production and non-production departments, whether pay is reckoned by piece, or by day or by month.

**SALARIED EMPLOYEES.**—These are salaried and white collar employees such as clerks, stenographers, bookkeepers, and other monthly salaried office workers in the establishment. Outside salesmen and other persons exclusively on commission are not included.

**SKILLED LABORERS.**—These are engaged in craft and manual occupations that require predominantly a thorough and comprehensive knowledge of processes involved in the work, the exercise of considerable independent judgment, usually a high degree of manual dexterity and, in some instances, extensive responsibility for valuable product or equipment. Workers in these occupations usually become qualified only after having served apprenticeships of extensive training periods. As used in the tables, skilled laborers in industrial establishments in Manila and suburbs include blacksmiths, boilermen, carpenters, cigar and cigarette makers, compositors, drivers, electricians, foremen, lathemen, linotypists, masons, mechanics, painters, plumbers and tinsmiths.

**UNSKILLED LABORERS.**—These are engaged in manual occupations that involve the performance of simple duties that may be learned within a short period of time and that require the exercise of little or no independent judgment in the performance of their work. The occupations in which the unskilled laborers are engaged do not require previous experience, although a familiarity with the occupational environment may be necessary or very desirable. The occupations in the group vary from those involving a minimum of physical exertion to those characterized by heavy physical work. As used in the tables, unskilled laborers refer to common workers.
