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TN Harvey Cushing's Life of Sir William Osler some forty libraries are listed by name in the index. Perhaps half a dozen of these are casual references, but many point to long and cherished associations, and a few, such as the entries for the Boston Medical Library, the College of Physicians Library in Philadelphia, or the Medical and Chirurgical Faculty of Maryland Library, indicate special personal commitments. All this leaves out of account the libraries of McGill, the University of Pennsylvania, Johns Hopkins, and Oxford. Nor is it certain that even the longer list is complete. The private libraries of Johnson and Bovell helped to satisfy Osler's curiosity and to form his taste at early stages in his career, and thereafter, wherever he went-Montreal, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Oxford—he not only sought out and used the libraries, he became in almost every case an active and generous friend. Medical libraries received needed books and journals, journals more especially, and some were even introduced thereby to the new journals which spoke for the new disciplines. But the older medical literature, speaking for the older ideas, had its place as well. Old ideas, formulated by the men of old, and good ideas which at some time sparkled with novelty, belonged on the shelves of a good library. Certainly they belonged in Osler's library.

Bibliotheca Osleriana is subtitled A Catalogue of Books Illustrating the History of Medicine and Science. Newton's *Principia* is here in the first issue (it cost £18 18s and Osler muses sadly, 'I missed a copy at 16s'); this and the *Opticks* are two of the many books presented in the Catalogue with notes by W. O.

Copernicus, Gilbert, Galileo, Descartes, Boyle, Cavendish, Joule, and Darwin (one of the first 1250 copies of the Origin) are also here, in Bibliotheca Prima. So that, along with Vesalius, Harvey, Pasteur, and Virchow, great names in the history of science which are not obviously medical are by no means neglected. Nevertheless, they are greatly outnumbered, even in the Bibliotheca Prima and by a very great margin elsewhere, and Osler of course writes of Harvey and Haller with a good deal less reliance on the D. N. B. and other such works of reference than when he has to deal with Newton. His comments are interesting and are often valuable, and some of them have entered into the literature of medical history. What he has to say of the clinicians is naturally of particular interest. Even in what is usually thought of as predominantly medical territory, however, Osler sometimes chose to strike another chord. Writing of Boerhaave and his work in organic chemistry, Osler found it 'not a little surprising that our medical historians pass over the very work on which his reputation in science rests, and which brings him into my Bibliotheca prima'.

Along with Vesalius, Sydenham, Richard Bright, Walter Reed, and hundreds of figures of the first and second orders, Osler included some men, and some books, of a different kind, for different reasons. Even a few of his student textbooks are here. Certain books are present, Osler tells us in his Introduction, for the sake of auld lang syne. This is by no means the complete story. The whole matter, much wider than this, is summed up in three short sentences: 'A library represents the mind of its collector, his fancies and foibles, his strength and weakness, his prejudices and preferences. Particularly is this the case if to the character of a collector he adds-or tries to add-the qualities of a student who wishes to know the books and the lives of the men who wrote them. The friendships of his life, the phases of his growth, the vagaries of his mind, all are represented.' A large part of the work was bio-bibliographical. He speaks of some of the pioneer American physicians he most admired: 'To know and to make known to students the lives and works of these men was a labour of love.' He also wanted to reveal, and to share, his pleasure in book collecting. The Bibliotheca Bibliographica includes, along with famous bibliographies (not omitting Ferguson's remarkable Bibliotheca Chemica, a catalogue of the library of James Young) some ephemera which meant much to Osler, such as important sale catalogues, like that of the great Van Antwerp sale of 1907 (no. 7373 and A Record Day at Sotheby's).

Of Ferguson's Bibliotheca Chemica (no. 7040) Osler wrote: 'The most useful special bibliography in my library . . . The merit that appeals to one is a combination of biography and bibliography—beside the book is a picture of the man sketched by a sympathetic hand. Would that in other subjects students as accurate and as learned could be induced to follow this example!' Accurate and learned students of medicine and science, the editors of the Bibliotheca Osleriana, did in fact take Ferguson to be their mentor. Not one but three sympathetic artists in bio-bibliography set to work soon after Osler's death.

Merits beyond learning and accuracy were to be displayed. It is not very often that one can find examples of humour in a work of reference, and there are few examples in *Bibliotheca Osleriana*. If, however, the catalogue is consulted on the date of the death of Francesco Redi, this is what the enquirer will learn: 'Death is almost a habit with Redi—in the books of reference. He died, perhaps for the first time, in 1676 . . . again in 1694 . . . and then more frequently. Autopsied in 1696, he was found dead in March 1697 and made his will the following December. . . . His final dissolution occurred in 1698 . . . and the Crusca Academy held a memorial meeting in 1699.'

It is perfectly true, as W. R. LeFanu has observed, that the catalogue 'has its personal idiosyncrasies—Osler was not made in everyman's little mould'. The 'idiosyncrasy' just quoted, however, must not be attributed to Osler. It is the work, by no means uncharacteristic, of Dr. W. W. Francis, whose death in 1959

robbed the world of medicine of one who made no contribution to medical science, no more than a brief contribution to the practice of paediatrics, a whole-hearted but limited contribution to the hospital medicine of World War I, but who earned deep respect as a scholar, not to speak of the occasional premium of amusement he gave, through his work on Bibliotheca Osleriana, and who was also respected as a medical journalist and librarian, while winning gratitude and affection as teacher and friend. His part in the preparation of this superlative guide to Osler's rich collection was immense. Osler once wrote, in recommending Dr. Francis for editorial work, 'His meticulosity exceeds anything you ever met with.' The mixture of meticulosity with a touch of humour went far toward making the catalogue unique; his labour, however, was augmented—if constructing several walls of a building can be called 'augmentation'—by the scholarship of his distinguished colleagues, R. H. Hill and Archibald Malloch.

A slender volume in gold-stamped red cloth, published in Montreal in 1956 in an edition limited to 500 copies, bears the title W. W. Francis: Tributes from his friends on the occasion of the thirty-fifth anniversary of the Osler Society of McGill University. It was published by the Society and is composed of some thirty-seven tributes to the Librarian of the Osler Library, varying in length from a few lines to a dozen pages, introduced by Spyros C. Gonticas, then a medical student in McGill's senior year and President of the Osler Society. Three of the thirtyseven pieces are devoted to Bibliotheca Osleriana, 'if by its Latin title we may distinguish the Catalogue from the Library'—these words opening a capsule review, after twenty-six years, contributed by Mr. LeFanu. In addition there is the very brief 'Story of the Osler Catalogue, 1922-1929, By A Somewhat Prejudiced Observer', the late Professor John F. Fulton of Yale, and a rather longer piece, 'W. W. Francis and Oxford, 1919-1929', by R. H. Hill, Librarian of the National Central Library, London. Dr. Francis was occupied from 1922 to 1929, with Hill, Malloch, and also with Leonard Mackall, in the compilation of Bibliotheca Osleriana, the late Dr. Malloch being memorably associated, in later years, with the library of the New York Academy of Medicine. Those who were chiefly responsible, after Osler himself, for the famous catalogue of a famous library were subsequently to be found, then, in Montreal, in New York and in London. This may be regarded as a sort of bibliographical postscript to that story of three countries which was the story of Osler's career.

It was in 1912, according to Harvey Cushing's Life of Sir William Osler, that Osler gave to Casey Wood the first hint of what he planned to do with his library: 'I am adding treasures to my collection every few months, and it will finally be housed in Montreal. I am collecting on two lines—books that are of historical importance in the evolution of medicine, and books that have interest through the character or work of their authors.' Works by Robert Koch might be

nineteenth-century examples of the first type, those of Oliver Wendell Holmes of the second. Crawfurd said of Osler at this time, referring to the part played by the Regius Professor in setting up the Section of History of Medicine at the Royal Society of Medicine, 'his own contributions were few and mainly biographical, and I do not think anyone could have discovered from them how fully he possessed the true historical sense'. Both things-Osler's historical sense and his interest in the lives and opinions of doctors-may be deduced from Bibliotheca Osleriana. If he could have found a book of great historical importance, the work of an author whose character, philosophy and prose appealed to him particularly, then he would have found something prime in a very special sense. If Sir Thomas Browne had discovered the circulation of the blood, let us say, De Motu Cordis would have been Religio Medici indeed! As it was, Osler was content to own both books, and thousands of others which belonged, in some degree, to one category or the other, along with a smaller number which had a certain claim to both kinds of distinction. With Harvey, it is worth noticing, he did not link the name of Browne, but rather the names of Linacre and Sydenham-to make up that glorious triumvirate of scholarship, science and practice. In any case, what was the criterion of historical importance in the evolution of medicine? Pierre Louis ranked as a figure of true historical significance because of what he did to bring statistics into the service of medicine, but did he not furthermore prove himself the chief attraction of Paris for a very large number of Americans studying abroad? Louis was one of the heroes of Boston, and partly for this reason he was one of Osler's heroes. Which was the more important factor to Osler? It is difficult to imagine that what really moved him, what caused him to convene an international meeting of doctors at the Paris tomb of Louis, was enthusiasm for statistics. Yet if a certain kind of sentiment entered into Osler's choice of books, this in no way restricted the works of the first, the historically important, group. And who is to say that the influence of Louis on early nineteenth-century American medicine is not historically important also?

There are more important books in the Osler Library than any by Louis, and there are many others, a great many others, which are much less important and which owe their places to different, less austere considerations. That Osler at last restricted himself to two kinds, broadly speaking, was for the obvious reason, mentioned to Casey Wood. 'In that way I limit the field, which is large enough!'

In this large field, Bibliotheca Osleriana remains a useful, reliable and delightful guide. It is something other and more, however, than a guidebook to history. It has a distinctive character, a diathesis all its own, which sets it off from the catalogues of the Wellcome Library or the National Library of Medicine, which are in any case vast collections of different character. Hans Sallander's admirable

Bibliotheca Walleriana is the catalogue of a much larger library, too, but one which nevertheless closely resembles the Osler Library in several respects. The Books Illustrating the History of Medicine and Science Collected by Erik Waller and Bequeathed to the Library of the Royal University of Uppsala-so the subtitle reads. Waller in place of Osler, Uppsala for McGill, and a statement from the Uppsala Librarian that Osler and Cushing collected some 8,000 items each whereas Waller's total rose as high as 21,000—this will at least demonstrate that Osler's inspiration has been widespread and lasting! A fine photograph of Dr. Waller is the frontispiece of the first volume of Bibliotheca Walleriana. The two volumes do not, however, contain, and perhaps were not meant to contain, any such portrait of the collector, or any such gallery of portraits, as may be found in Bibliotheca Osleriana. The accuracy and usefulness of the volumes from Stockholm are beyond question and the library they record is magnificent. Its catalogue is a cool and precise and altogether admirable reference work. Bibliotheca Osleriana is also wonderfully exact but at the same time relatively discursive, which the smaller size of the library permits, and often much more elaborate bibliographically. Not only when compared with Sallander's volumes but when placed beside almost any other catalogue of its kind, Bibliotheca Osleriana is a book to pore over and ponder, even to read! In a variety of ways it is richly informative. There is, in fact, no other with which to compare it. When one says 'other catalogues of its kind' a pause ensues. What other catalogue can be suggested? Very superior records of great collections come to mind. One thinks of collections more or less directly connected with Osler's, such as Cushing's, which was united with the books of Fulton and Klebs in New Haven, the three being joined in one very rich library as the three collectors were joined in friendship. These and other collections have been catalogued, in whole or in part, in useful ways. But the books brought together by Osler, and the great catalogue assembled by Osler, Francis, Hill, and Malloch, remain not only at the beginning of a sequence but in certain respects at the top of it. Not in excellence of library and certainly not in size—in these things the Osler Library has been matched or far surpassed. But the library is nevertheless superb, and as set forth in Bibliotheca Osleriana it is unique in character and in the character of its catalogue. This catalogue has long been in demand—has never ceased to be in demand—and is now available once more. 'Not in Osler' was never a useful notation. The catalogue number from Osler, on the contrary, has been for forty years, and remains today, a very worth-while reference.

The Osler Library of McGill has grown far beyond the limitations of the collection described in this remarkable volume of 1929, particularly since receiving a generous, long-term grant for the purpose from the Wellcome Trust. Its growth has included some of the books, and many more books of the same

kind, that Osler sought. It has not been confined, however, to this pattern, for it would have been nearly impossible to add to the portraits of Osler, each of them sketched by a sympathetic hand, and to the self-portrait which Bibliotheca Osleriana, amid all its other riches, undeniably contains. The new library is a library of the history of medicine which encompasses and at the same time supplements his personal collection. This catalogue describes his personal collection only. It is a rich collection, illustrating the history of medicine and science, collected, arranged, and annotated by Osler himself, and completed in the decade following his death, according to the pattern he had left imperfect, by the skill, learning, and devotion of Dr. Francis, Mr. Hill, Dr. Malloch, Mr. Mackall, and a number of others, sustained by the dedicated purpose of Lady Osler.

Not long before Bibliotheca Osleriana was published, A. W. Pollard wrote that Osler had dreamed of an ideal bibliography and that 'he really saw the projected catalogue of his library as a kind of pageant'. Forty years after it first appeared, the pageant is as bright as ever. Fifty years after his death, Osler may be looked upon as one of the rearguard of the glorious company that began with Hippocrates or as one who earned a place in the van, particularly in his role in medical education, of another pageant, marching forever onward toward the last quarter of the twentieth century and the larger future beyond. He himself thought a good bibliography one of the best tickets to immortality. If he was right, he and his editors produced a most impressive ticket and established a remarkable claim. In 1969 the ticket is still bright and new and the claim still seems valid.

THE Library here catalogued consists of literature illustrating the history of medicine and science, collected with a definite educational purpose by the late Sir William Osler, and bequeathed by him to the Medical Faculty of McGill University, Montreal. The books are now installed there in a room which has been specially equipped by the University in a manner attesting a warm appreciation of the gift. Besides this, his Bibliotheca Osleriana, comprising about 7,600 bound volumes and representing the more important part of his private library, he had also collected—or sorted out from his accumulations—two other groups. One of these, a collection of works, chiefly modern, on the heart, arteries, blood, and tuberculosis, he left to the Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore; the other, a collection of important editions in English literature, is now in the Tudor and Stuart Club, founded at Johns Hopkins University in memory of Edward Revere Osler, the book-loving son who was to have inherited it.

In the Introduction which follows this preface, and in the Life by Dr. Cushing, may be traced the course of Osler's love of the literature of science, from his youthful enthusiasm for the text-books which he found on his inspiring teachers' shelves, to those last years at Oxford, half a century later, when the collecting of important volumes for his Bibliotheca Prima and the planning of a catalogue raisonné occupied his few leisure moments and helped in some measure to assuage the anxiety and sorrow which the War brought him. The scheme of classification which characterizes this catalogue was determined on as early as 1911, the eight sections into which the library was subsequently to be divided being all mentioned in a deed of gift drafted in that year. At the time of his death, at the end of 1919, the outline of the catalogue had been sketched and the form and general contents of the Bibliotheca Prima decided. The catalogue cards, formerly in one alphabetical series, were in process of rearrangement, but it had not been settled into which of the eight sections many of the works were to go. A great many of the books had been collated and described by an experienced bibliographer, Miss J. F. Willcock, whose painstaking work and whose knowledge of Sir William's plans have been of the greatest assistance to her successors.

In memoranda written during his last illness he desired that his catalogue might be finished, if possible before the books went to Montreal: 'It would be a great disappointment to me not to see the catalogue prepared in the sections in which I have divided the Library, but it is a big job and much remains. There is no reason why this Library should not be kept in sections . . . I should dearly love to see my Bibliotheca Prima idea carried out . . . It was a great scheme and

I had good fun over it.' The authorities of McGill University were content to wait patiently for the books, and it became the duty and privilege of the present editors, whom Sir William had specifically named, to carry out his wishes. This was made possible by Lady Osler, who whole-heartedly devoted the rest of her life to the task—a task which, alas! she was destined not to see quite completed.

It had been Sir William's intention to prepare special introductions for the eight sections. These, unfortunately, were not written. It is necessary, therefore, to supplement the brief description of the classification, which he has given in the list of sections at the end of his general Introduction.

The idea of the Bibliotheca Prima, which is the chief feature of the Library and of this catalogue, was outlined in May 1919 in a little leaflet presented to the members of the Classical Association, when Sir William invited them to view his treasures at Oxford and arranged a special exhibit of first editions of twenty of the great contributors to knowledge: 'Faced with a bewildering variety and ever-increasing literature, how is the hard-pressed student to learn, first, the evolution of knowledge in any subject, and secondly, the life and work of the men who made the original contributions? So far as concerns Science and Medicine, an attempt is made to answer the question by the collection of a Bibliotheca Prima . . . The idea is to have in a comparatively small number of works the essential literature grouped about the men of the first rank, arranged in chronological order . . . The fundamental contribution may be represented by a great Aldine edition, e.g. Aristotle, by the brief communication such as that of Darwin and Wallace in the Proceedings of the Linnean Society, 1858, or by a three-page pamphlet of Roentgen.'

So much for the aim. The source of the idea may perhaps be traced in the motto (p. xxxvi) which he chose from his 'life-long mentor', Sir Thomas Browne; while the plan and scope of this Bibliotheca Prima may readily be realized by turning to the Table of Arrangement which precedes the catalogue proper. The literature of the Beginnings and Early Civilizations, largely anthropology, archaeology, and primitive science, is for the most part impersonal. Sir William had only just begun to collect for and arrange this part of the catalogue. The Greek period is very comprehensive, and many authors, either in groups or as individuals, have been placed in a subsidiary position which was clearly indicated on his catalogue cards. But a few names stand out from the rest, and it is here that the essential feature of the scheme becomes apparent. It will be seen that the table displays the names of 67 contributors of the first rank to the advancement of science, beginning with Hippocrates and ending with Röntgen. In one case the heading chosen is that of the subject rather than that of the contributor, possibly because, in the case of Anaesthesia, the gift was so infinitely greater than the unhappy

giver—to whom, however, full credit is otherwise accorded. No two competent judges would perhaps agree to endorse the whole list; a few of the names must surprise them. Let us hope, however, that no one but an advocatus Diaboli will cavil at the reasons given at the end of entry no. 623 for the inclusion of Conrad Gesner. For these outstanding authors we thought we had coined the convenient term 'primarians'; nor have we been entirely discouraged by finding that the New English Dictionary applies it to school-children of elementary grade! The list represents Sir William's own choice, but not without expert advice, and is complete in the sense that it includes the names of all whom he considered contributors of the first rank to science, whether or not he had succeeded in acquiring their original works. Faraday, for instance, is represented in the catalogue only by biographies, and many gaps in other sub-sections of Prima remain to be filled.

The chronological position of an author, in the modern centuries, is determined by the original date of issue of his chief contribution. That particular work (if in the collection) and those directly bearing upon it are placed first, then his other works, followed by commentaries, biographies, and bibliographies. Manuscripts and incunabula relating to Prima authors are catalogued here and not in their own sections. Sir William Osler's own arrangement of the books is well illustrated under Harvey and under Anaesthesia, the two sub-sections to which he had devoted most time and had most nearly completed.

Bibliotheca Secunda, the largest section, contains medical and scientific works of authors not of the first importance. The arrangement of this and the following sections is the usual one, alphabetical under authors with secondary authorheadings in smaller type.

Bibliotheca Litteraria, another notable section, reflects its collector's individuality and his keen interest in the literary avocations and hobbies of physicians and in the relations of medicine and science with the world of letters. Besides literary works of physicians, it contains medical and philosophical poems, what (after Holmes) he called 'medicated novels' and the doctor in fiction, and medical works by laymen. It includes some important aggregations, notably the almost complete collection of the works of Sir Thomas Browne all of which have been kept together. Robert Burton and Ulrich von Hutten are well represented, also the literature on Rabelais. Scattered through this and other parts of the catalogue are many books and pamphlets on longevity, death, immortality, spiritualism, and witchcraft. On the shelves at Oxford these were grouped together in a section familiarly known as Death, Heaven and Hell.

The next three divisions call for very little explanation. Works which would normally belong to them but which have reference to authors in the previous sections are catalogued in those sections. In the Bibliotheca Biographica individual lives are entered under their subjects. The Bibliotheca Historica, besides strictly

historical and retrospective works, contains any literature on medical institutions, arranged either under authors or under geographical names. The contents of the Bibliotheca Bibliographica testify to Osler's interest in the subject generally, apart from its bearings on medicine and science.

The Incunabula section contains 106 books printed before 1501, with cross-references to 30 others which are catalogued in Prima. These were not considered sufficiently numerous to warrant a chronological or topographical arrangement. The method of description is based largely on that of the invaluable 'Catalogue of Books printed in the 15th century now in the British Museum' (referred to in the notes as 'B.M. Inc.'). References are given to Hain's 'Repertorium' and its supplements, to Proctor's 'Index', and to Mr. Scholderer's list in Osler's 'Incunabula Medica'.

For the cataloguing of the Manuscripts the Bodleian 'Summary Catalogue of Western MSS.' has been taken as a model. MSS. of Sir William's own writings, appended as 'Osleriana' to this section, have been more briefly described.

A supplementary section of Addenda contains the items classified or received too late to be placed in their appropriate sections. The great majority of these were donations, including some most important books, the two *desideratissima* of the Browne collection, the first edition of Harvey in English, and the original edition of Servetus's first work on the Trinity. A valuable donation of 181 Oriental books, which are briefly listed under nos. 7784-7, occupies the last four entries of the catalogue.

The mode of cataloguing follows in the main the Bodleian 'Rules for the cataloguing of Printed Books published before 1920'; and the method of sizing is throughout that of the Bodleian. But many modifications have been adopted in view of the special arrangement and of the index. A classification such as this makes a good index indispensable; and its preparation has absorbed no small proportion of the editors' labours. Many authors are to be found in unexpected places. Harvey would be more astonished than we to see his name at the head of a page on which Calvin burns a heretic; but who would think of looking for Servetus in a 17th-century division! Virgil does not naturally belong to this collection, but a copy autographed by a philosopher brings him under Locke. Similarly, an edition of Seneca is entered under Lodge, the physician-translator. One of the rules laid down by Sir William Osler was that cross-references, except in the index, should be reduced to a minimum. When his scheme was criticized, and manifest objections were raised, such as the impossibility in many cases of deciding logically into which section a book should be put, science, literature, or history, when it might belong to all or none; or the disadvantage of dividing up the works of the same author between several

sections, he had a ready if hyperbolic answer—'We'll print in large letters at the top of each page, CONSULT THE INDEX FIRST'.

Sir William Osler was in the habit of writing his bio-bibliographical notes either in the books themselves or on the catalogue cards. In the printed catalogue care has been taken to distinguish his notes by retaining his signature or initials, if signed, or appending '[W. O.]' in brackets to those written in his hand but not signed. Under his name in the index is given a long list of references to the more original of his notes-original in the sense of expressing his own judgements on book or author and of not being taken from the usual sources. A good example of one of his annotated cards (Mead, no. 3369) has been reproduced in facsimile by Dr. Cushing (no. 7746, vol. ii, p. 560) in the biography for which all friends of Osler have much reason to be grateful. Of the unsigned notes many were originally prepared by Miss Willcock; others have been added by the editors. The sources of information have usually been indicated-often in abbreviated form. The initiated will not need to be told that 'B. M.' and 'Bodl.' represent the British Museum and the Bodleian libraries; 'S. G. L.' the great Index-Catalogue of the Surgeon-General's Library; or a ubiquitous 'D. N. B.' the Dictionary of National Biography. Other favourite mines of biobibliographical lore are referred to as 'Haller' (his Bibliotheca, no. 1163), 'Ferguson' (the model 'Bibliotheca Chemica', no. 7040); and useful dictionaries as 'Bayle' (no. 6590), Eloy (no. 6649), 'Hirsch' (no. 6600), and 'Jourdan' (or 'Panckoucke', no. 6641). Other abbreviations are largely those allowed by the Bodleian rules; but an attempt has been made, in giving the sources of journal articles, to distinguish between the ambiguous senses of the term 'reprinted' by using the abbreviation 'repr.' for the ordinary separate copy, and the full word for a new printing with type reset. Donations are acknowledged in the notes, except in the case of journal articles by contemporary authors, who, in most cases, may be assumed to be the donors.

Working at Oxford, the compilers have had the inestimable advantage of ready and expert help from the Bodleian Library and the University Press. Individual obligations, some of which we have been able to acknowledge in the annotations, are too many to be recorded here. But special acknowledgements are due to Dr. Cowley for descriptions of many of the Oriental MSS., and to Dr. Craster, who catalogued all the Western MSS. written before 1600; to Mr. T. R. Gambier-Parry for help with the Indian books; to Mr. F. Madan and Mr. S. Gibson for advice on various points; to Dr. J. Johnson, Printer to the University, and his predecessor, the late F. J. Hall; and, farther afield, to Mr. Victor Scholderer and Dr. A. C. Klebs, both frequently consulted about the incunabula. Sir William's life-long friend, Professor Ramsay Wright, whose interest in the work has been

a constant encouragement, has given freely of his time and his wide knowledge. Another old friend, Mr. L. L. Mackall, of Savannah, one of the four of us to whom, with Lady Osler, the completion of the catalogue was entrusted, has read and criticized the proofs. His name appears throughout the book as a donor, often of the rarest items; as an adviser he has deserved much more frequent mention. Finally, we have also to thank our collaborator, Mr. R. R. Trotman, of the Bodleian, whose industry and efficiency, combined with inexhaustible patience and Oslerian equanimity, have earned him an undue share of the more tedious of our tasks.

Professor A. W. Pollard, doyen of bibliographers, in a recent letter to the Osler Club (London), has written thus of his much loved friend: 'He was a fine bookman, and had a dream of an ideal bibliography of epoch-making books which was almost religious in its enthusiasm. I think he really saw the projected catalogue of his library as a kind of pageant, which it will be hard to realize in print.'

With more hope than self-assurance we have tried to interpret the dream and to stage the pageant.

THE COLLECTING OF A LIBRARY

A COUNTRY parson's house in Canada in the 'fifties or 'sixties had rarely a literary atmosphere. My father's library, of about 1,500 volumes, was chiefly theological—the usual commentaries, Scott, Henry, and others, with Bingham, Pearson, and the common run of the English divines. There were a few old books, a Breeches Bible, and an early Stow's Chronicle. Having been at sea, he was fond of books of travel, of Layard, of Rawlinson, of Livingstone. Sunday reading is remembered as a trial. Even now to see a person with a novel on Sunday gives a reflex shock—a reminiscence of early training! George Borrow was a delight. As a missionary his books could not be hurtful, even on Sunday, and 'The Bible in Spain', 'Gipsies in Spain', and even 'Lavengro' were not taboo.

No little pride was taken in the books of my father's eldest brother, Edward, a surgeon in Truro, whose 'Life of Exmouth', 'Church and King', and volume of poems seemed to confer a literary flavour on the family; and at church what a pleasure to see his name opposite certain well-known hymns! Later, to know that monographs by him had appeared in the Transactions of the Royal Society was an additional source of pride.

At Weston, with the Warden and Founder of Trinity College School, the Rev. W. A. Johnson, came the first opportunity to see scientific books—elementary manuals of geology, botany, and microscopy. Griffith's Micrographic Dictionary, Ehrenberg's Infusoria, Smith on Diatoms, Ralfs on Desmids, Carpenter and Beale on the Microscope, introduced us to a book world very different from Arnold and Anthon and Todhunter. Mr. Johnson was a Canadian White of Selborne, and knew the ways and works of nature. A good field botanist, a practical palaeontologist, an ardent microscopist, he had a rare gift for imparting knowledge and inspiring enthusiasm. One of his books is kept, Beale's 'How to work with the Microscope' (no. 1969), in grateful memory of happy school days.

The year at Trinity College, Toronto (1867-8), put me on the right track. To Weston Dr. Bovell of Toronto had been a frequent visitor, as his friend the Warden had an enviable technique with the microscope. He would arrive on Saturday with materials for section, or with small animals for injection. To be interested was enough to have one's help enlisted, if only in clearing up the shocking mess, stained with carmine, that was left on the study table. Arthur J. Johnson, the Warden's son, had already begun the study of medicine, and it became our custom to spend our Saturdays with Dr. Bovell, cutting sections

with Valentine's knife, grinding bones or teeth for microscopic slides, or keeping the aquaria stocked with pond material likely to contain good specimens of algae, amoebae, &c. In the late afternoon Dr. Bovell would often take me to his lecture at the Toronto School of Medicine. In this congenial atmosphere what wonder that Euripides, Aeschylus, Livy, and Horace were dull; conic sections and trigonometry became an abomination, and Pearson and Hooker a delusion. In October 1868 I entered the Toronto School of Medicine.

It has been remarked that for a young man the privilege of browsing in a large and varied library is the best introduction to a general education. My opportunity came in the winter of 1869-70. Having sent his family to the West Indies, Dr. Bovell took consulting rooms in Spadina Avenue, not far away from his daughter, Mrs. Barwick, with whom he lived. He gave me a bedroom in his house, and my duties were to help him keep appointments—an impossible job! and to cut sections and prepare specimens. Having catholic and extravagant tastes, he had filled the rooms with a choice and varied selection of books. After a review of the work of the day came the long evening for browsing, and that winter gave me a good first-hand acquaintance with the original works of many of the great masters. After fifty years the position in those rooms of special books is fixed in my mind: Morton's 'Crania Americana', Annesley's 'Diseases of India' with the fine plates, the three volumes of Bright, the big folios of Dana, the monographs of Agassiz. Dr. Bovell had a passion for the great physiciannaturalists, and it was difficult for him to give a lecture without a reference to John Hunter. The diet was too rich and varied, and contributed possibly to the development of my somewhat 'splintery' and illogical mind; but the experience was valuable and aroused an enduring interest in books. In such a decade of mental tumult as the 'sixties really devout students, of whom Dr. Bovell was one, were sore let and hindered, not to say bewildered, in attempts to reconcile Genesis and Geology. It seems hardly credible, but I heard a long debate on Philip Henry Gosse's (of, to me, blessed memory) 'Omphalos, an Attempt to untie the Geological Knot'. A dear old parson, Canon Reade, stoutly maintained the possibility of the truth of Gosse's view that the strata and the fossils had been created by the Almighty to test our faith! A few years ago, reading Edmund Gosse's 'Father and Son', which appeared anonymously, the mention of this extraordinary 'Omphalos' work revealed the identity, and, alas! to my intense regret, the personality of the father as Philip Henry Gosse.

Of this mental struggle the students reaped the benefit, for Dr. Bovell was much more likely to lecture on what was in his mind than on the schedule, and a new monograph on Darwin or a recent controversial pamphlet would occupy the allotted hour. One corner of the library was avoided. With an extraordinary affection for mental and moral philosophy, he had collected the works of Locke

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and Berkeley, Kant and Hegel, Spinoza and Descartes, as well as those of the moderns. He would joke upon the impossibility of getting me to read any of the works of these men, but at Trinity, in 1867–8, I attended the lectures on natural theology, and he really did get us interested in Cousin and Jouffroy and others of the French school. Three years of association with Dr. Bovell were most helpful. Books and the Man! The best the human mind has afforded was on his shelves, and in him all that one could desire in a teacher, a clear head and a loving heart. Infected with the Aesculapian spirit, he made me realize the truth of those memorable words in the Hippocratic oath, 'I will honour as my father the man who teaches me the Art'.

The first book bought was the Globe Shakespeare, the second the 1862 edition, Boston, of the 'Religio Medici' [no. 4446], both of which were close companions of my student days. The Shakespeare was stolen, and the curses of Bishop Ernulphus have often been invoked on the son of Belial who took it; the Browne, bought in 1867, is the father of my Browne collection. In it is a touching association, as in this volume only, in this section of the library, is found the bookplate of my boy, his own design and etching. He claimed it for his lifetime, promising that it should join the collection at his death. With the Brownes is 'Varia: Readings from Rare Books' by Friswell (given me by my eldest brother), the article in which introduced me, I think, to the 'Religio'.

In 1870 my kind preceptor joined his family in the West Indies, and urged me to go to Montreal for better clinical opportunities. He sent word to Arthur Johnson and me to take a selection of books from his library, but it was sold before we had the opportunity. A few of his books, which he had lent me, have been carefully kept. The Niemeyer (English translation), Simon's Pathology, Chambers's 'Renewal of Life', can still be read with pleasure.

The long vacations were periods of profitable study, with a borrowed microscope, and books from Mr. Johnson and Dr. Bovell. Lyell's 'Principles of Geology', Darwin's 'Voyage' and the 'Origin' were read, and in collecting diatoms, desmids, algae, and fresh-water polyzoa the available literature on these subjects was studied. My first appearance in print was in connexion with the finding of diatoms, &c., in a frozen spring on the road between Dundas and Hamilton; and it is amusing to note, even at the very start of my ink-pot career, a fondness for tags of quotations, this one from Horace, in those days a familiar friend (see no. 3535).

The summer of 1871, spent at Montreal, brought me into almost filial relations with Dr. Palmer Howard, whose library was at my disposal. Wilks's 'Pathological Anatomy' was my handbook, and the post-mortems were worked out from its pages. The old system prevailed of writing a thesis for the degree, a most perfunctory and evil habit as then carried out, but it served me in good stead.

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Mine was a report, with the specimens, on fifty post-mortems. So profuse in his praises was Dr. Fraser, the Professor of the Institutes of Medicine, who had read the thesis, that the Faculty voted me a special prize of books, all of which remain in the library for the sake of auld lang syne. One of them, Klein and Sanderson's 'Handbook for the Physiological Laboratory', became a stand-by; and towards the end of 1873, in the chemical laboratory of the Pathologisches Institut, Berlin, the patient soul of the good Salkowski was sorely tried in helping me to work through Lauder Brunton's section on physiological chemistry. Taking with me to London an order for the books on S. and J. Nock, for years, indeed from the foundation of the school, the Faculty's agents, I proceeded to Hart Street, Bloomsbury. The shop was an indescribable clutter of books, and the brothers Nock, far advanced in years, were weird and desiccated specimens of humanity. They had a keen interest in the Faculty, and remembered Howard, Wright, and MacCallum when they were students in London in 1849. During the winter session [1872-3] I lived with the much-loved Arthur Browne, a fellow student, afterwards Professor of Obstetrics at McGill, a keen lover of English literature, to whom I owe my introduction to Coleridge and Lamb.

Many books were used but few bought in the two years spent in Europe. The students' library at University College was very good, and for the special work in the physiological laboratory Professor Burdon Sanderson or Mr. (now Sir Edward) Schafer got the monographs and works of reference. Luther Holden introduced me to the College of Surgeons' library, and Arthur Durham to the library of the Medico-Chirurgical Society. One book (no. 2429) is an interesting souvenir of this period and of a notable man. Professor Sharpey had resigned the previous year but was much about the laboratory, and often came to my desk in a friendly way to see the progress of my blood studies. One evening he asked me to dinner; Kölliker, Allen Thomson and Dohrn were there. When saying good-bye he gave me Davy's 'Researches' with an autograph inscription. There were cobwebs in my pockets in Berlin and Vienna, and only the most necessary text-books were bought. On leaving Vienna I could not resist Billroth's 'Coccobacteria septica' (no. 2039), an expensive volume with beautiful plates, a curious pre-Kochian attempt to associate bacteria with disease, and now of value only as illustrating the futility of brains without technique.

On my return to Canada in July 1874 a berth was waiting, the lectureship on the Institutes of Medicine, which necessitated an immediate course of predatory reading in preparation for the delivery of 100 lectures!

The McGill library, founded by Dr. Holmes, the first dean, had many old books, and a pretty complete file of the English journals, with a few French, such as the Archives générales de Médecine, but no recent German periodicals. A Book

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and Journal Club, started about 1876, lasted for a few years and helped with new books and foreign journals. Palmer Howard was the only free buyer in Montreal, and from him one could always get the French monographs and journals. Complete sets of Virchow's Archiv, the Deutsches Archiv für klinische Medicin, the Centralblatt für die medicinischen Wissenschaften, Wagner's Archiv, and Max Schultze's Archiv were collected, and a good many valuable books on medicine and natural history. Canadian journals on science and medicine were bought, and a nearly complete set obtained. All that remains in the present collection is the Canada Medical and Surgical Journal, which is kept for the sake of my early contributions.¹

Except my student text-books (e.g. nos. 2820, 3600, 3833, and 4245), a few of Dr. Bovell's books, and some special treasures like Virchow's 'Gesammelte Abhandlungen', nothing remains of my Montreal library. A few books on general literature were bought. Connected with one is a good story. Before leaving Berlin in December 1873, while ordering Virchow's Archiv at Reimer's, I saw on the desk the prospectus of Schmidt's 'Shakespeare-Lexicon', which I asked to have sent to me as soon as published. In October 1875 I moved from Victoria Square up Beaver Hall Hill to rooms with Mr. King, an Englishman employed in the Custom House, who had but one thought in life—Shakespeare. He had an excellent library in which I often spent a pleasant hour. He was a dear old man, much esteemed, and always ready to spend more than he could afford on his hobby. One afternoon at the College, just before my lecture, the postman left on the table a parcel from Reimer's, and to my delight it was Schmidt's concordance, which had really been forgotten. My first thought was, how happy Mr. King will be to see it. I looked at it hurriedly but with much anticipatory pleasure. On my return to the house Mr. King, who had just come in, was sitting by the fire and greeted me in his cheery way with, 'What's that you've got?' 'Something that will rejoice your heart', I said, and deposited the work in his lap. The shock of the realization of a life-long dream, a complete concordance of Shakespeare, seemed to daze the old man. He had no further interest in me and not a word did he say. I never got it back! For months he avoided me, but helping him one day on the stairs, my manner showed that Schmidt was forgotten, and he never referred to it again. The work went to McGill College with his Shakespeare collection. When in the Library in 1910, I asked for the first edition of Schmidt and was glad to see my book again after thirty-five years. This story is written on the flyleaf [cf. no. 5451] as a warning to bibliomaniacs!

For an association book of this period there remains a deep affection. In

Vienna, Brücke, to whom I had a letter of introduction, asked me to attend his lectures on physiology, but the clinical courses made it impossible except occasionally. The 'Vorlesungen', advertised to appear before I left Vienna, was ordered, and in the summer of 1874 anxiously awaited. To prepare four lectures on physiology and one on pathology each week was a heavy task. Dr. Drake, my predecessor, very kindly offered me his set, but I struggled through until Christmas, working often until 2 a.m. To my delight Brücke's 'Vorlesungen' arrived in the vacation. The problem of the lectures for the next term became a simple business of translation!

When I left Montreal in 1884 my collection of Canadian scientific and medical journals, which was fairly complete, went to the McGill Medical Library, where they escaped the fire and are still housed. If I remember aright, they were well bound, and the collection cost me not a little time and money. It was a useful job which put me into touch with the scientific side of Canadian life, especially in geology, the study of which had fascinated me at school.

The five years spent in Philadelphia, 1884-9, were fruitful in two directions. I became associated with a first-class medical library. The College of Physicians, founded in 1787, had for one of its special objects the establishment of a library. In the discourse delivered 6 February, 1787, by Benjamin Rush on the objects of the institution, he states that 'the library has already been established, and now consists of a number of valuable books'. In 1886 I joined the library committee of the College, and had as my colleagues, among others, Weir Mitchell, Minis Hayes, and F. P. Henry.

A library is usually the result of the enthusiasm of one or two men. Billings made the great library in Washington; the Boston Medical Library grew up about Chadwick. The Philadelphia College Library had not prospered very greatly in the middle of the century, but in 1840 Dr. Samuel Lewis, a West Indian and an Edinburgh graduate, came to Philadelphia and for years devoted time and money to extending its scope. He was an old man in 1884 but still active mentally, and it was his habit to go to the Library every morning to look over the catalogues and see the new books that had come in. An important section of the Library is rightly called after his name. It was about this time, too, that Dr. Weir Mitchell became interested in the Library, and to him more than anyone else is due the extraordinary growth of the collections and the ever-increasing devotion of the profession of Philadelphia to the College. In Charles Perry Fisher the College found an ideal librarian, intelligent, civil, and helpful. The honorary librarian, Frederick P. Henry, was a man of keen judgement in the matter of books, and a scholarly student of the best literature. It has been a pleasure to keep in touch with the College and its interests, and now

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and then I have been able to get a special treasure for its Library. I induced them to buy the Huth copy of the editio princeps of Celsus, 1478, a superb copy, the best I have ever seen except the famous Grolier copy in the British Museum. Quaritch asked a shocking price for it as the binding was of special value; at the Huth sale he only paid £36 for it. One of the most interesting books I procured for the College was Rösslin's famous 'Rosegarten', the first book published on obstetrics. Lang of Rome sent on approval what he took to be an unknown '1508' edition, bound up with a group of early sixteenth-century pamphlets. It proved to be the 1513 Strasburg edition; curiously enough, he had mistaken the old-fashioned ten (**) for a five. On account of the binding and the included pamphlets, he asked a very high price (£80) which we reduced considerably. An extensive set of plates and pamphlets relating to the Siamese Twins, which I bought at the Dunn sale in 1915, was an item of peculiar interest to the College, as the 'specimen' from the Twins is in the College museum. I sent the collection on condition that it should be made as complete as possible.

The atmosphere at Philadelphia was literary; in College circles every one wrote, and my pen and brain got a good deal of practice. I worked for Lea Bros. on the Medical News with Minis Hays, the editor, Sam Gross, and Parvin; and I devilled for Pepper for his System of Medicine, writing in addition to my own sections those of Janeway on certain of the diseases of the heart.

The other direction in which my stay in Philadelphia was fruitful was in general education. My practice was to read for an hour at the Rittenhouse Club after dinner. The library was good, and many standard works were read for the first time, particularly American authors, Emerson, Lowell, and Franklin. My commonplace-book dates from 1882, but the entries did not become numerous until after 1884. My library grew rapidly, and important German and French sets were completed. At this time my interest in the American masters of medicine began, and some of the special treasures, like Jones (no. 3097) and Morgan (no. 3454), were picked up in Philadelphia. On leaving in the spring of 1889, nearly 1,000 volumes, chiefly journals which I knew were in Baltimore, were distributed to various libraries.

To the date of my transfer to Baltimore, with a comparatively small income (but quite sufficient for my needs) only the more important books and journals could be bought. A library represents the mind of its collector, his fancies and foibles, his strength and weakness, his prejudices and preferences. Particularly is this the case if to the character of a collector he adds—or tries to add—the qualities of a student who wishes to know the books and the lives of the men who wrote them. The friendships of his life, the phases of his growth, the vagaries of his mind, all are represented. With a bigger salary and increasing income I

began to buy, first, the early books and pamphlets relating to the profession in America; secondly, the original editions of the great writers in science and in medicine; and thirdly, the works of such general authors as Sir Thos. Browne, Milton, Shelley, Keats, and others. Catalogues—German, French, and English appeared at the breakfast table, and were always in my bag for railway reading. Summer trips to England and the Continent, often of three months' duration, gave time for reading, and my interest got deeper and deeper in the history of medicine and in the lives of the great men of the profession. The association with Billings and Welch was a stimulus, and the Historical Club of the Johns Hopkins Hospital awakened no little enthusiasm. In the classroom more and more attention was paid to the historical side of questions, and at my Saturday evening meetings, after the difficulties of the week had been discussed, we usually had before us the editions of some classic. Altogether, the foundation was laid for a successful avocation, without the addition of which to his vocation no man should be called successful (so President Gilman used to say). Buying freely English and foreign books and subscribing to more than forty journals, I soon had the house overrun, but with special exceptions they were passed on to my friends or to libraries.

My colleagues in the old Medical and Chirurgical Faculty of the State of Maryland very soon found that I was really fonder of books than of anything else, and to help its library escape from the dingy quarters in St. Paul Street, first to the bright house in Hamilton Place and then to the present handsome building, was one of the great pleasures of my life. That my name is associated with the Hall of the Faculty, as that of Oliver Wendell Holmes with the Boston Medical Library, as David Hosack's with the Academy of Medicine in New York, and as Weir Mitchell's with the College of Physicians in Philadelphia, is a touching tribute of affection from men who knew me and whom I loved. We owed much to Miss Marcia Noyes, our first whole-time librarian, and to the devoted Dr. Eugene Cordell, the historian of the Faculty.

In no. 2278 is a catalogue and a note of interest about a collection given to that library. In the catalogue, received one Sunday morning from George P. Johnston, Edinburgh, was a list of the theses of American students at Edinburgh from 1760 to 1813, mostly presentation copies to the Professors Hope. The list, well worth looking over, is arranged according to States, and contains the theses of some of the most famous of the early American physicians. A cable was sent at once, and the collection which came in due time was presented to the Faculty library. The next summer in Edinburgh Mr. Johnston showed me a group of cables, all of which had come on the same day, but after mine. The thesis containing the note did not belong to that set, but was given me by Dr. Mitchell Bruce.

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The libraries of the Johns Hopkins Hospital and Medical School grew rapidly, and were working collections of journals and monographs. The Surgeon-General's Library was so near that it did not seem worth while to spend much on old books. In 1906 the library of the Warrington Dispensary was offered, and I bought it on behalf of Mr. W. A. Marburg for the School. The collection is interesting as a memorial of a remarkable group who lived at Warrington in the last quarter of the 18th century: Priestley, Percival, Aikin and others. One library, that of the late Dr. J. F. Payne, was lost for the School in an aggravating way. It was sold at Sotheby's in 1911 (no. 6350) and first offered *en bloc*. Our kind friend Mr. Marburg authorized me to go as high as £2,000. The bidding rose rapidly and crossed this limit, to be knocked down very precipitately at £2,300. We could easily have sold duplicates up to £500 or raised the extra money. There were many good items in the collection, and I am glad for the sake of Dr. Payne's memory that it has been kept together and will be well housed in the Wellcome Historical Museum.

When I left Baltimore in 1905, sets of journals, monographs, and many works on general literature were distributed among friends and the libraries. A good beginning had been made in an attempt to get the original editions of the great authors in medicine. The Sir Thomas Browne collection was nearly complete. For some years Dr. Harvey Cushing and I had bought everything of Vesalius that was offered. One evening we had six copies of the first edition (1543) on exhibition. With the cash in pocket the book is impossible to resist, and I have distributed six copies to libraries. Forgetting what I had done, I took out a copy in 1907 to McGill, and showed it with pride to Dr. Shepherd, the librarian, who pointed out in one of the show-cases a very much better example presented by me some years before! Thinking it would be a very acceptable present to the Boston Library Association (in which I had a personal interest through Dr. James Chadwick and Dr. E. H. Brigham), I took the volume to Dr. Farlow, who looked a bit puzzled and amused. 'Come upstairs', he said; and there in a case in the Holmes room, spread open at the splendid title-page, was the 1543 edition and, on a card beneath it, 'The gift of Dr. Osler'. I had better luck at New York, where the volume found a resting-place in the Library of the Academy of Medicine.

An association book of rare interest (no. 5551) is connected with my departure from Baltimore. My messmates in The Ship of Fools, a social club, gave a dinner, and presented me with Voltaire's 'Henriade' bound by Padeloup and with autograph verses by Voltaire to his physician, Silva.

The years spent in the United States, 1884-1905, brought 'troops of friends' whose affection is part of my life; they brought me, too, into sympathetic touch with another company, those friends of the spirit, the great and good men of

the past who, through much tribulation, handed on the torch to our generation. It was the height of my ambition as a teacher to live up to the ideals of Morgan and Rush, of Hosack and Gerhard, of Bartlett and Drake, of Jackson and Bigelow. To know and to make known to students the lives and works of these men was a labour of love. Their works were collected and, what is more, read, and a regret remains that lack of time prevented the completion of many projected bio-bibliographical sketches.

Oxford brought two things-leisure and opportunity. Not that more time necessarily means more work. My literary output from 1905 to 1915 is not to be compared with that between 1895 and 1905, but there were heavy arrears to make up in general and special reading, without which this catalogue (still far from completion) could never have been attempted. The opportunity was great. A Curator of the Bodleian (as ex officio I am) and Delegate of the Press is forced into the most bookish circles of the University. Very soon there was a feeling that a day had not been well spent if altogether away from Bodley. I envied the men who could be there all day and every day. There are greater libraries, there are more convenient libraries, but for solid comfort and 'atmosphere' give me a seat in Duke Humphrey or a table in the Selden End! In his autobiography (no. 7254), perhaps the best ever written—all the essentials in 16 pages!—Bodley gives the four qualifications which encouraged him to set up his Staffe at the Library doore in Oxford: leisure, knowledge, friends, and purse-ability. His letters between 1598 and 1613 show how successful he was in laying the foundation of one of the great libraries of the world. And the blessing of the liberal soul has followed his endeavours.

Gradually, as my collection grew, plans for its disposition had to be considered. Already at the outbreak of the war my son, Edward Revere, aged 18, who had just 'come up' to Christ Church, had shown unmistakably the direction of his tastes, and it was agreed that he should take the works in general literature while the medical and scientific books should go to McGill. During the first three years of the war, while he was with the McGill unit and the Royal Artillery, his interest in English literature developed rapidly. I sent on the catalogues and he began to buy on his own account. It was a diversion to send bids to the sales and to pick up bargains out of the second-hand catalogues. I bought for him several nice collections, such as the originals of Ruskin and some Whitman items from the Dowden sale. At the Harris sale in Oxford, when on leave a few weeks before he was killed, he was so happy over the purchase of the Holland Plutarch, an Overbury MS., and a number of special books in which he was interested. What he had collected, together with my original editions of Milton, Fuller, Donne, Shelley, Keats, makes the nucleus of a good library of English

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literature, and this section his mother and I have decided to dedicate as a memorial to him. [See no. 7241.]

Though a wanderer, living away from Montreal for more than half my life, the early associations I have never forgotten. The formative years were there with the strong ties of head and heart. As a young, untried man, McGill College offered me an opportunity to teach and to work; but what is more, the members of the Medical Faculty adopted me, bore with vagaries and aggressiveness, and often gave practical expressions of sympathy with schemes which were costly and of doubtful utility. That they believed in me helped to a belief in myself, an important asset for a young man, but better had by nurture than by nature. Alma Mater, too, counts for much, and as a graduate of McGill I am proud of her record. Had I not seen the day of small things? Did I not graduate in the days of the Coté-Street school? I may quote Fuller's sentiment: 'He [the good Bishop] conceiv'd himself to heare his Mother-Colledge alwayes speaking to him in the language of Joseph to Pharaoh's butler, But think on me, I pray thee, when it shall be well with thee' [no. 4833, p. 283]. Then there is the natural feeling of loyalty to the country of one's birth and breeding. These are the considerations which decided me to leave the special collection to my old school at Montreal. With some of Bodley's qualifications it seemed possible gradually to gather a modest collection of books not likely to be either in the general library of the University or in the special library of the Faculty, or indeed in the country. There will, of course, be duplicates, but for special reasons.

To get shelf room the new books have had to be given away. The monographs and reprints on diseases of the heart, arteries, blood, and the tuberculosis items go to the Library of the Johns Hopkins Hospital. There is left over a motley collection of miscellaneous works which may remain in the house to help fill the shelves.

Gradually, as the books increased, the hope matured into a scheme for a library which would have (a) a definite educational value, (b) a literary, and (c) an historical interest. To break a collection into sections is hazardous, but I considered that, after all, this would form a special part of the Medical Faculty library just as the latter is a section of the University library. So I decided to follow my own plan and group the books in the following divisions:

- I. Prima, which gives in chronological order a bio-bibliographical account of the evolution of science, including medicine.
- II. Secunda, the works of men who have made notable contributions, or whose works have some special interest, but scarcely up to the mark of those in Prima.
- III. Litteraria, the literary works written by medical men, and books dealing in a general way with doctors and the profession.

Described in further detail in the Preface.

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- IV. Historica, with the stories of institutions, &c.
- V. Biographica.
- VI. Bibliographica.
- VII. Incunabula, and
- VIII. Manuscripts.

Then came the ambitious desire to prepare for printing a catalogue raisonné somewhat on the lines of Ferguson's 'Bibliotheca Chemica' (no. 7040), with biographical and bibliographical notes. The introductions to the individual sections will explain to students how they are to be used. The task is perhaps too heavy for one man to undertake; but I am assured by experts that there is no inherent difficulty in such a catalogue, provided there is a good index. Should I die before its completion, which is not at all unlikely, the catalogue could be finished and printed; and Lady Osler, with my good friends L. L. Mackall, W. W. Francis, and T. A. Malloch, would see that my wishes were carried out.

The library is for the use of students of the history of science and of medicine, without any other qualifications, and I particularly wish that it may be used by my French Canadian colleagues, who will find it rich in the best of French literature. I hope to make provision for its extension and upkeep.

The books have come from three sources: sales, catalogues, and second-hand bookshops.

EDITORS' NOTE. The Introduction proper ends at this point unfinished. Among the notes for its continuation was found the account of the Van Antwerp sale, written several years earlier. The intention, no doubt, was to use it to illustrate the first of the three sources mentioned. It is, therefore, printed here as Appendix I, followed by a note on a Paris auction in the following year. Other isolated paragraphs, mostly notes for the intended special introduction to Bibliotheca Litteraria, have been printed under the relevant entries in the catalogue (e. g. at nos. 4770, 4950, 5242, 5526, &c.). See also no. 7656, which contains drafts of all the introductory material.

APPENDIX I

A RECORD DAY AT SOTHEBY'S

THE following notes may be of interest as a record of how a sale is conducted. The library, collected by Wm. C. Van Antwerp, of New York, was sold at Sotheby's, 22 and

23 March, 1907. The sale began at 1 p.m. sharp.1

One was impressed by the extremely decorous character of the proceedings, without the slightest noise or bluster such as one is accustomed to think of in connexion with sales. The auctioneer, Mr. Tom Hodge, presided at a raised desk at the end of an oblong table about which were seated some twenty buyers, the principals or the representatives of the leading English booksellers. Around the room were twenty-five or thirty onlookers, mostly seated, a few standing about. Bids were offered only by the dealers and by a man who held a catalogue marked with the bids sent directly to the firm. The auctioneer, with a soft voice and a good-natured manner, called out the numbers and, as a rule, offered no comments upon the books; in fact, he did not often have to ask for a bid, which was started spontaneously. Occasionally, of course, he could not resist a remark or two. Sometimes he would suggest a bid. It was astonishing with what rapidity the different items were sold. Evidently the dealers knew just what they wanted and what they were willing to pay, and in many cases one could easily see that they had been given a limit by those who had sent the orders.

The first work of special interest sold was the 1817 edition of poems of Keats, a presentation copy, with an inscription by the author. Starting at f_{20} it rose quickly to f_{70} and f_{80} and in less than a minute was knocked down to Quaritch at £90. I say knocked down, but the process was altogether too dignified for such an expression, and no final rap was ever given. The catalogue of the Rowfant Library brought £7. Two books of Richard Pynson's press brought high figures. It was remarkable, also, to see a ragged, rough-looking, unbound, but uncut play of Philip Massinger knocked down to Stevens at £48. Bidding upon the copy of 'Comus', one of the rarest of Milton's works, was started by Quaritch at £50 and ran up pound by pound with the greatest rapidity to £100, and finally to £162. Nothing was heard but the monotonous repetition of the figures by the auctioneer, who simply watched the nodding heads of Mr. Quaritch and his rival, Ellis of Bond Street. The 'Paradise Regained', an uncut copy and a great rarity in this state—so much so that the auctioneer remarked, 'Uncut, and need I say more? All you can ask!'-was secured at £94 by Maggs. Three beautiful first editions of some of Pope's works did not bring very high prices, though the 'Windsor Forest', in sheets loosely stitched together, entirely uncut, brought £48. One of the finest sets of the collection was 'Purchas his Pilgrimes, in five Books'. As the auctioneer remarked, 'It is one of the finest copies ever sold and Mr. Van Antwerp had had a most detailed and complete collation made'. The volumes were in the original vellum, absolutely perfect. Starting at £50, the fifth bid reached £100, and the set was knocked down to Maggs at £170 against Quaritch—one of the few instances in which Mr. Quaritch gave up. There was a splendid collection of Scott, the quarto volumes of the poems and first editions of the Waverley novels. Though the novels were in one lot, a complete set, in the original boards, uncut, and all from the Rowfant Library, option was given

whether they should be sold separately or together. The latter was preferred, and, starting at £100, the bids quickly rose to £200, to £260, and the set was finally secured by Tregaskis at £300.

Then, after the sale of lot 189, came the remarkable set of original Shakespeare folios. Just as a foil, it seemed, and to show the contrast between the new and the old, Sidney Lee's facsimile reprint of the first folio, issued by the Clarendon Press in 1902, was put up (f2 12s.). When lot 191 was called out, there was a stir among the auditors, not such as you could hear, but it could be felt, as the famous first folio of 'Mr. William Shakespeares Comedies, Histories, and Tragedies' was offered. It was in a superb red morocco binding by Bedford and enclosed in a new crushed red morocco slip case by Bradstreet. In 'My Confidences', 1896, p. 203, Locker-Lampson tells the story of this volume: 'Some years ago I was offered a splendid example of this folio Shakespeare (1623); it was one of the tallest, largest and cleanest copies in existence, but it lacked the verses [i.e. the leaf with Ben Jonson's verses]. The owner guaranteed that if I would buy it he would before very long get me the missing leaf, and it was upon this assurance that I closed with him.' Then follows a most amusing account of a journey to the West of England to try to secure the leaf from an 'illiterate booby'. He spent two unhappy days with the 'grimy Gibeonite', who would not give up the leaf though the volume was much mutilated. Finally he found an example of the missing leaf pasted in a scrap-book, but he had to pay £100 for it.

'Language fails me, Sirs,' the auctioneer said, 'I can only ask you to look at the book and give your bids.' Special interest existed as to whether the record price of £3,000, paid by the Bodleian, would be exceeded, but the circumstances were then exceptional, as that copy had originally been in the Bodleian (see no. 5443 for its story). Previously as much as £1,720 had been paid for the first folio, and £3,000 was thought to be a fabulously extravagant price. I may remark that the folio would never have returned to the Bodleian had it not been for the extreme generosity of Lord Strathcona, who contributed £500. It cheered the book-lover's heart to hear Quaritch lead off with a bid of £1,000, followed immediately by the representative of Stevens with £1,500, and then the figures ran £1,800, £1,900, £2,000, £2,400, £2,800, and at the £3,000 there was a pause. Stevens, thereupon, said 'Fifty' and the previous record price was passed, then £3,200. At £3,500 Stevens stopped, and a record—long, let us hope, to remain such—was made when Quaritch secured it at £3,600.¹ Every one in the room applauded his victory.

The second folio brought only £210 (Stevens). The third folio brought £650, and the fourth £75. The quarto copies of the individual plays did not bring such very high prices as were realized the previous year. Sidney's 'Arcadia' brought £315. When Swift's 'Gulliver's Travels' was offered it was stated that the signature of Oliver Goldsmith, 1766, was on the Lilliput title. Leighton spoke up and said that Goldsmith's name was not written in this copy when he had it, and he asked why it should be mentioned in the catalogue; to which the auctioneer replied, 'In order to make a proper copy of it'. It came from the Rowfant Library, and Leighton added 'I should know, as I sold it to Mr. Locker-Lampson'. There was much fun over this incident, but it did not diminish the liveliness of the bidding, which was started at £50, and the treasure was secured at £132 by Stevens.

When lot 235 was called, a man inside the arena held up a small octavo in its original sheep jacket—as Locker-Lampson says, a most commonplace, ordinary little book, but one of the great treasures of English literature and one that brings the highest price known

in the auction room with the exception of the Shakespeare folio-'WALTON (IZAAK) THE COMPLEAT ANGLER, or the CONTEMPLATIVE MAN'S RECREATION; being a Discourse of Fish and Fishing, not unworthy the perusal of most Anglers. Simon Peter said, I go a fishing; and they said, We also will go with thee (John xxi, 3), FIRST EDITION. Sm. 8vo. Printed by T. Maxey for Rich. Marriot in S. Dunstan's Church-yard, Fleetstreet, 1653 . . . This copy has always been spoken of as one of the finest, if not the finest copy known. It is quite perfect and in the original state as issued. The late owner, Frederick Locker, has written a note or two in the fly-leaves.' The auctioneer remarked, 'It is impossible to overestimate this copy, an absolutely unique and perfect specimen in the original binding. Not a copy like this has been in the sale room for many years.' Amid suppressed excitement the bidding began. Quaritch started at £200, and it ran to 500, 600, 700, 750, and £800. Then began a most interesting duel between Quaritch and the representative of Pickering and Chatto, and after a little while nothing was heard but the counting, which ran up the bids (I took them down verbatim) as follows: 30, 50, 60, 70, 80, 90, £900; 20, 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80, 90, £1,000; 10, 20, 30, 50, 60, 70, 80, 90, £1,100; 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80, 90, £1,200. Here there was a halt, but Mr. Massey started bravely and 10, 20, 30 was reached, whereupon, to the auctioneer's sorrow, all stopped, and he said, 'Dear me! Dear me, Mr. Massey!', which encouraged him to go on—40, 50, 60, 70, 80. When £1,290 was reached by Mr. Quaritch, the auctioneer said interrogatively, 'Come, Mr. Massey, £1,290?', and again, '£1,290?'; and when there was no reply, he simply said '£1,290, Mr. Quaritch', adding in a quiet voice, 'This is one of the numerous records we are making every day'. It was a remarkable increase over the £415 paid in 1896, which had hitherto held the record.

Supplementary Note

No other book-auction is so interesting as Sotheby's. A sale at the Hôtel des Commissaires-Priseurs (Hôtel Drouot), Paris, has not nearly the same fascination. It is quietly conducted by an auctioneer with three clerks by his side and one below, who in a low tone repeats the bids, and the buyers, as in London, are chiefly dealers. On 22 October, 1908, I spent an hour at the sale of the fifth section of the library of the late Count A. W. The collection related chiefly to the history of France, and it was astonishing the very low prices which handsomely bound 17th- and 18th-century books fetched. A few hundred dollars would have furnished a fair-sized library with good bindings at any rate. It is strange what waifs books are; the most respectable volume may wander from its near relations and turn up in most questionable company. Three books in which I am interested were stranded between tomes of military art and moral philosophy: (1) Gesner's Fish book, the fine Zurich edition with 700 figures, 1585. Among all the dealers I was too shy to bid, but my regret was tempered by the thought of my fine 'Historia Animalium' in 3 volumes, picked up some time ago for 25 francs. (2) A fine copy of Cardan's 'Metoposcopie', 1685, the manuscript of which was found by Gabriel Naudé and published nearly one hundred years after the author's death. In the 800 figures of the human face the prognostic significance of every line is given, and you can predict the end of your friends and patients by the position of the warts and moles. It is what might be called a show book, useful to interest a group of students, and it illustrates an art which has possibilities much superior to palmistry. (3) Indagine's 'Introductiones', which I also possess, is chiefly valuable for the splendid portrait of the author. It is one of the early works on physiognomy and contains also the canons of judicial astrology.

The Theodore de Mayerne case-book [no. 7589], which will rejoice the President, Sir Norman Moore's, heart.

These are really the only important items in my library which should not go out of the country.

To the Faculté de Médecine de Paris-

Paré's Anatomie Universelle, 1561, of which no copy exists in their library or in the British Museum and only two or three other copies are known [no. 657].

To the Royal Society of Medicine-

Withering's letters, papers and diploma, 1764-99; and I hope some member of the Historical Section will edit them carefully [no. 7637].

To the University of Leyden-

Boerhaave's quadrant, presented to him with the tables of latitude and longitude when he moved into his country house, Oud-Poelgeest; with a gentle reminder that perhaps they scarcely deserve to have back the treasure, which I bought for [blank] gulden at Leyden [no. 1126].

To the Biblioteca Lancisiana, Rome-

The MS. letter-book of Baglivi, the distinguished Roman clinician, with letters from his scientific friends, among them Malpighi and Redi, and with drafts of his replies [no. 7516]. No hurry about the return of this, which I bought in Rome at auction for 500 lire. Before it returns some one should work up the letters.2

Details of dates &c. have been corrected and the numbers of the entries added. The list, as Sir Find Details of dates &c. have been corrected and the numbers of the entries added. The list, as Sir William Osler wrote it (from memory, during his last illness), is printed in the Life, no. 7746, ii, p. 682. Besides these twelve special books, three items designated by him, and having local associations, have been presented to the appropriate libraries, namely, his annotated copy of Macray's Annals, no. 7265, to Bodley; the Randolph copy of Sibthorp's Flora Oxoniensis, no. 3973, to the Botanic Garden, Oxford; and an uncommon medical diploma, no. 7538, to Cambridge University. The duplicate, no. 4635, of Burton's Philosophaster has been transferred to E. R. Osler's library. With these sixteen exceptions, all the books in this catalogue are now at Montreal. [Editors.]

ASSYRIAN MEDICAL TABLET.

Acquired through Prof. S. H. Langdon from Prof. Vincent Scheil of the Académie des Inscriptions by whose brother, Père Sébastien Scheil, it was found in 1918 in the possession of Arabs near Mosul.

Prof. Langdon has kindly supplied the following

description and translation:

The tablet belongs to the school of Assur, the ancient capital of Assyria, modern Kalāt-Shergaat, on the right bank of the Tigris about 35 miles south of ancient Nineveh. This is the first medical treatise which has been found at Assur. The library note at the end of the reverse states that it is the 32nd extract from a large treatise on medicine, a scientific work which probably ran into 100 tablets or more. The Osler fragment is the 32nd tablet of the treatise. The whole series is a copy from an older Babylonian work. According to the librarian's note the tablet belonged to 'Kişir-Assur the student, son of Nabu-tuklat-su, son of Nabu-katsun, the magician of the temple of Assur, son of Bau-sum-ibni, the libation priest of the temple Ešarra'

The young medical student who possessed this huge work belonged, therefore, to an ancient family who had been priests in the famous temple of Assur, viz. Esarra (House of the Universe), for at least four generations and possibly from the period of its foundation some twelve centuries before. From the script we may assign the date of the writing of this tablet to the reign of Sargon king of Assyria, 721-706 B.C., or perhaps to the reign of Senecherib, 705-681, the Assyrian conqueror who captured Jerusalem and its king Hezekiah in 701 B.C. In any case the text is earlier than the more famous library of Ašurbanipal.

The beginning of the obverse is lost, and thus we do not know the nature of the disease treated. From the preserved lines we know that a disease which affects the eyes is the subject of the various prescriptions. The text of the obverse really contains a list of prescriptions all for the same symptom. In other words, the physician tries one after the other. The beginning of each line has KIMIN, that is, 'ditto', referring to the lost diagnosis. From the prescription beginning on line 12 it would seem that some sexual disease was the original cause of the eye trouble.

When the latter's MSS. were acquired by Catherine de Médicis for France, this one remained in Florence. At the suggestion of Ridolfi, Guido Guidi (Vidus Vidius) undertook the translation and by the liberality of François 1er, to whom it is dedicated, he was able to produce this splendid edition. They are modified copies, or interpretations, of the original Greek drawings, with which it is interesting to compare them. A passage in the papyrus of 'Anonymus Londinensis' (see no. 252) shows that Menon, and presumably his master Aristotle, believed Hippocrates to be the author of this work. The fantastic doctrines it contains are, however, incompatible with the other Hippocratic writings and with the traditional reputation of Hippocrates as a scientific physician. Diels, who edited the papyrus in 1893, preferred to believe with the appropriate secondphysician. Diels, who edited the papyrus in 1093, preferred to believe, with the anonymous second-century author, that Menon was mistaken. This would imply that "in the generation between Hippocrates and Aristotle the criterion of the genuineness of Hippocrates' writings was already lost" (Payne; for a discussion see his MS. Lectures, no. 7610, leaves 168–78, and also Spaet, no. 209).

His successors of the ancient age one and all returned to the standpoint of most of his predecessors, the rhizotomes or authors of herb-books. Even the most important among them, a Crateuas (first century B. C.), a Sextius Niger and Dioscorides (first century A.D.), cultivated botany merely as a branch of pharmacology; they gave verbal descriptions, or merely pictorial representations, of medical plants, and ranked them according to their healing powers. The achievement of Theophrastus was regarded as final; it was perpetually used, but not carried forward... The 'Plant-Lore', especially its geographical position has even at the present hour not geographical portion, has even at the present hour not ceased to possess a more than historical interest. Aretaeus lived probably in the second half of the 1st century, but possibly towards the end of the 2nd or the beginning of the 3rd. He was a highly educated author, equally well acquainted with classical literature, history, poetry, and medicine. Of all medical writers of antiquity whose works have come down to us, the solidity and clearness of Aretaeus bring him nearest to Hippocrates, whom he also resembles in his modesty, love of his profession, and reverence for all that is good and beautiful. Above all, his descriptions of diseases are patterns of fidelity to nature and of literary finish, though not unfrequently there is a deliberate straining after brilliant phraseology. The former estimates of his standing and of his probable date (which is still very uncertain) have been modified by the critical researches of Wellmann and others. Reviewing these, Sir Clifford Allbutt concludes as follows: "It seems more than probable that, whether through Philumenus or not, Archigenes was the main source of Aretaeus; and that Philumenus, who reproduced Archigenes, was in his turn the main source of Aetius, and no inconsiderable source of Oribasius. In any case Aretaeus is a second-hand writer." (No. 5626, p. 279.) Archigenes of Apamea is known to have flourished at Rome about A.D. 100 in the time of Trajan; Philumenus is now assigned to the 3rd rather than the 1st century.

'Liber Abuali Abincine.' This is the Liber de anima of Avicenna, an anonymous Latin trl. of the lost Arabic original, made probably in Spain: see Berthelot, 'La Chimie au moyen âge' (Paris, 1893), i, p. 294. It is a work on alchemy in dialogue form and is not to be confused with Avi-cenna's philosophical treatise De anima which ranks as Liber sextus Naturalium (cf. no. 493). It consists of (a) a prologue giving the title (fol. v: beginning 'Dixit Abulay Ebemincine. Explanabo tibi fili mi'); (b) a list of the ten dictiones into which the work is divided and of the chapters in each (fol. v); (c) further introductory matter (entitled on fol. vii 'Uerba rerum proficientium huic libro decem dictionum' and on fol 2° 'Porta elementorum', beginning 'Dixit Abualy. Incipio et dico in nomine Domini') which may perhaps be ranked as a separate treatise; and (d) professedly ten dictiones, each preceded by a synopsis of chapters. The body of the work consequently begins on fol. 14: 'Dixit Abualy. Qui sunt philosophy dicunt quod sex sunt res'; but it appears to be unfinished, for of Dictio ix there is but a fragment, and, as is pointed out on fol. 224^v, Dictio x (de ponderibus) is not here. At fol. 225 is an important chronological note, not found in other MSS. of this work, giving A. D. 1012 as the date of the original composition and 1235 as that of the Latin translation ('ccxxiij anni sunt transacti ex quo Abincenus perfecit hoc opus et iam erant transacti MCC et XXXV anni '). To the translator may be ascribed a share in the list of famous alchemists on fol. 33^v, in which are included several late 12th-cent. writers, as has been pointed out by Berthelot (op. cit., p. 303). Considering the extraordinary vogue of Averroes it is remarkable how few copies there are of the original Padua edition (1472-4) of the Great Commentary of Aristotle and of this editio princeps of the Colliget.

At the Dunn sale 1917 the B. M. withdrew their bid which enabled me to get this copy. I hesitated a long time whether or not to put Averroes in Bibliotheca Prima; I have done so less on medical than on general grounds—I. Because the history of the profession offers no parallel to the influence he exercised for more than 400 years on human thought. 2. He was the great heretic. 3. He was the 'great commentator' on Aristotle and to his writings scholars still turn for the interpretation of dark passages (Told me 3. i. 18 by the Professor of Moral Philosophy, Oxford—J. A. Smith).

4. He blazed a trail seemingly back to

Aristotle, but actually leading forwards to Nature. Renan's 'Averroès' (no. 498) depicts the struggles of the medieval mind, and its relation to Arabian thought. It is surprising to read that 'Albert [Albertus Magnus] It is surprising to read that 'Albert [Albertus Magnus] doit tout à Avicenne; saint Thomas, comme philosophe, doit presque tout à Averroès' (p. 236). Of Renan's book Gauthier (no. 497, p. 3) says, 'Après plus d'un demi-siècle, ce bel ouvrage n'a pas cessé de faire autorité'. From the introduction in Gauthier's book the student will obtain an idea of the difficulty of getting really at the heart of the Arabians.

This original edition has become rare. I missed the only copy sold in London (at auction) in the past twelve years (£22). This came from Heffer (Cambridge), £18. It was formerly in Marischal College, and there is no duplicate mark; but I have resisted the prickings of conscience which the process of the library of the libr suggest asking how it got out of the library! For the benefit of the ordinary student I have had the preface and introduction translated.

brilliant investigators of the Alexandrian school; but in the long interval, lapped in oriental lethargy man had been content to acknowledge that the heavens declare the glory of God and that the firmament sheweth his handiwork. There had been great astronomers before Copernicus. the fifteenth century Nicolas of Cusa and Regiomontanus had hinted at the heliocentric theory; but 1543 marks an epoch in the history of science, since for all time Copernicus put the problem in a way that compelled acquiescence... We can imagine the touching scene in the little town when his friend Osiander brought the first copy of the precious volume hot from the press, a well

enough printed book. Already on his death-bed, enough printed book. Already on his death-bod, stricken with a long illness, the old man must have had doubts (expressed in the preface) how his work would be received, though years before Pope Clement VII had sent him encouraging words. Fortunately death saved him from the 'rending' which is the portion of so many innovators and discoverers . . . The church was too much involved in the Ptolemaic system to accept any change and it was not until 1822 that the works of Copernicus were removed from the Index. (Cf. no. 6259, pp. 144-5.) Line up the great medical folios which preceded this, beginning with the huge 'Speculum naturale', 1478, of Vincent of Beauvais—crambe repetita is the distinctive feature of all. Here and there are original observations and keen comments, but all are the works of transmutors or transmitters. The 'Fabrica' of 1543 is the first modern work of a creator. Not that Vesalius created the science of human anatomy—that was done by the Alexandrians—but he remade it. To appre-ciate what he did, compare the beggarly treatises of his predecessors in the 16th cent., Achillinus, Berengar, Guinterius, Massa, and others, with the royal volume of the 'Fabrica'. We enter a new

world. To have completed before his 29th year a task of this magnitude, at such a period when dissections were difficult to make and authority difficult to resist, is a feat to which the literary history of the profession offers no parallel.

The story of his life is in all the biographies, and Roth (no. 609) is now the common tap from which all draw. A good Life in English should be written. In no. 584 are found many interesting auto-biographical details. For his tragic end see Edith Wharton's poem (no. 616). A translation of his letter to Oporinus about the book and the illustrations is in Stirling-Maxwell's edition of the 'Tabulae sex' (no. 581). Of the original blocks 159 are in the University Library, Munich. Roth tells the story of their wanderings in 'Vesaliana' (no. 610). The story of Oporinus, whom Vesalius and the interface of the original barriers and in Health calls amicus charissimus, may be read in Heckethorn's 'Printers of Basel', Lond. 1897. The edition must have been large. Copies are

numerous and very often appear in sale catalogues at prices ranging from £10 to £20 varying with the condition. The best copies are about 42 × 27 cm., and bound in contemporary boards and pigskin. I know of no presentation copy from the author. The quality of paper varies, in some thicker than in others. The six copies which have passed through my hands have been given to the following libraries: Boston Medical Library Association. Medical Faculty, McGill College (where this copy joins it—pass on the duplicate to...), the Academy of Medicine, New York, the Medical and Chirurgical Faculty, Baltimore, the Medical Department, University of Missouri (sent to my old student and friend Calvert, at that time Professor of Anatomy), and the private library of Llewelys Barker, at the time Professor of Anatomy, University of Chicago, to whom I gave it as a wedding present.

cordis' of Harvey is to be compared. The one revolutionized anatomy, the other created modern physiology. This work of Vesalius is the first modern treatise on anatomy based upon dissections of the human body. To appreciate the extraordinary character of the descriptions and of the plates they must be compared with contemporary works. Vesalius really described the body as we know it, for the first time fully, and for the first time accurately. It is difficult to say whether in text or figure the departure from the anatomy of the day is the more striking. There anatomy of the day is the more striking. There are grave mistakes of omission and of commission, but they appear insignificant in a volume full of such important contributions. To the middle of the sixteenth century anatomy was taught from the writings of Galen, not from what was seen in the occasional public dissections. From what the great Master had written there was no appeal, and the veneration with which his works were regarded was as for a gospel, like the feeling men have towards the sacred Scriptures. Imagine the surprise and consternation of the easy-going old professors who held the chairs of anatomy to have a huge volume thrust into their hands filled from cover to cover with descriptions and figures with which they were unfamiliar. And written by a young man of 28! Headed by his old teacher by a young man of 28! Headed by his old teacher Sylvius a storm of opposition soon raged, and a vindication of Galen was attempted, but it was soon found that the old anatomy, correct enough in places, was largely that of swine, dogs and monkeys, while the 'Fabrica' contained descriptions and figures from human dissections. descriptions and figures from human dissections. To understand the phenomenon, almost unique in the history of science, of a revolution of this character effected by so young a man, we must remember that from boyhood Vesalius had had a perfect passion for dissecting. After devoting his energies to the anatomy of the domestic animals, he robbed graveyards and the gallows for human skeletons, while as early as 1534–36, as prosector to Sylvius and Guinterius in Paris, he had opportunities to dissect the human body. he had opportunities to dissect the human body. His reputation must have been remarkable, as at the age of 23 he was appointed Professor at Padua, one of the leading schools of Europe. The 'Fabrica' remains a monument of human effort, one of the greatest in the history of our

profession.

Brunet says of Gesner: The first, and one of
the most learned of German bibliographers, a man
of whom Ebert exclaims in admiration: O bibliographorum quicquid est, assurgite huic tam colendo nomini! Gesner was hardly 25 when he began to collect the materials for his 'Bibliotheca', and in three years he had finished this enormous volume which he published in 1545. He divided his work into three parts. The first was this 'Bibliotheca', the second the 'Pandectarum... XXI', the third was to have given in alphabetical order the contents which are arranged according to their subjects in the second, but the author gave up the plan. It is astonishing that one man, with little help, could have completed so extensive a work, requiring great research. in less than graphorum quicquid est, assurgite huic tam colendo a work, requiring great research, in less than eight years; a work which, in spite of unavoidable mistakes, contains much detailed, and as a rule correct, information. The usefulness of the Bibliotheca was immediately recognized on all sides. Abbreviators took possession of it, and the abridgments interfered with the re-printing of the larger work. The first of these was by Lycosthenes, the 'Elenchus' (no. 627). This, though much inferior, had so rapid a sale that Simler was encouraged to publish his 'Epitome' (no. 628), with a preface by Gesner himself. These two abridgments contained a number of new articles, which were brought together and subsequently published in one volume, the 'Appendix' (no. 625) which completed the great Bibliotheca.

"Conrad Gesner, who kept open house . . . for all learned men who came into his neighbourhood was not only the best naturalist among the scholars of his day, but of all men of that century he was the pattern man of letters. He was faultless in private life, assiduous in study, diligent in maintaining correspondence and good-will with learned men in all countries, hospitable —though his means were small—to every scholar that came into Zurich. Prompt to serve all, he was an editor of other men's volumes, a writer of prefaces for friends, a suggester to young of prefaces for friends, a suggester to young writers of books on which they might engage themselves, and a great helper to them in the progress of their work. But still, while finding time for services to other men, he could produce as much out of his own study as though he had no part in the life beyond its walls." (H. Morley, no. 2244, ii, p. 152.) [W. "We are told that Gesner had brought together no fewer than 1500 figures, many of them drawn by his own skilful hand, while nearly 400 had been engraved on wood. The drawings and wood-blocks were handed down after his death from one botanist or publisher to another. one botanist or publisher to another. Some were used to illustrate Mattioli's *Epitome* (1586). At last the collection, sadly diminished, was bought by Christopher Jacob Trew, an eminent physician of Nuremberg, who valued good books of natural history. Trew entrusted the 1000 figures which came into his hands to the careful editorship of C. C. Schmiedel. Many of Gesner's drawings were now engraved on copper and coloured after were now engraved on copper and coloured after the originals; some of the woodcuts were printed off, while others, which had suffered injury, were re-engraved on copper. Pasted in this copy is a report from a well-known London bookseller— Excessively rare, practically unknown' &c.; but this is not the case as copies are in Bodley and R. C. P., and I know of several others. It has not appeared in the London sale catalogues since not appeared in the London sale catalogues since 1903. I paid £6 for this. The dealer asked £25 for the copy above mentioned. In these two letters Harvey breaks silence after twenty-one years. They are reprinted in the collected works and are translated in Willis, no. 702. It appeared in English in 1653 and 1673, nos. 708-9, with the English version of the 'De motu cordis' and the 'Discourse' of James de Back.

From the last lines of Martin Lluelyn's poem in the volume—' Great Generation's selfe is now thy Heire'—Fuller may have got his quaint conceit ('Worthies', 1662, Kent, p. 79) that Harvey though a bachelor left three hopeful sons to posterity, his books—"De circulatione sanguinis, which I may call his Son and Heir; the Doctor living to see it at full age, and generally received. De generatione, as yet in its minority; but I assure you growing up apace into public credit. De Ovo, as yet in the nonage thereof; but infants may be men in due time." Lluelyn, author of 'Men-Miracles', had only joined the profession this year (see notes to no. 5083). This seems to be his only medical poem. Comparing him with Drake and Cavendish he calls Harvey 'Fam'd Circulator of the Lesser World'.

These sections are of great interest in connexion with Descartes' views on the circulation. He was the first foreigner of distinction (though

was the first foreigner of distinction (though really at the time he was not known as an author) to accept Harvey's views. He may be studied:

I. In part v of the 'Discours de la Méthode' (no. 928), p. 51, where he explains the views of "an English physician, to whom the credit of having broken the ice in this matter must be ascribed, as also of being the first to teach that there are many little tubes at the extremities of there are many little tubes at the extremities of the arteries whereby the blood that they receive from the heart enters the little branches of the veins, whence it returns once more to the heart;

in this way its course is just a perpetual circulation" (no. 930, i, p. 112).

2. In his 'De Homine' (no. 931), "a popular exposition of the features of the earthly machine in illustration of its relation to the rational soul. The work thus stands out as the first Text-Book of Physiology... He admitted Harvey's great and new conclusion, the greater circulation, the passage of blood from the arteries to the veins, but he would not admit... the propulsion of the blood by the systole, by the contraction of the heart" (Foster, no. 5877, p. 58). Descartes' plates in this work are the best figures of the heart up to his time and are among the earliest examples of 'dissected plates', with flaps which lift, to show the inside of the heart and the valves.

Van Bever-3. In these letters of Beverovicius. wyck was an enterprising young physician of Dordrecht who sent questions to various dis-tinguished people, and then published his letters and the answers. On p. 118 is a brief letter asking Descartes if it is true that he has clearly established the circulation of the blood leaving established the circulation of the blood leaving no one any room for doubt. Descartes' reply is a full acceptance of Harvey's views except as regards the motion of the heart. Following this are two letters from a 'certain physician of Louvain' to Descartes and his replies. The discussion is so full of interest, as the first of importance in literature following the 'De motuimportance in literature following the 'De motu cordis' of 1628, that I have had the letters translated (no. 723).

Harveian Orations

As Russell Reynolds remarked in 1884, "There is one thing more... that this College has done for many years, and that is, by this annual Oration, to hand down to coming generations the memory of him from whom we have learned so much." With few exceptions this has been the function of the ceremony. The College library possesses a nearly complete set. Looking over any large number, the Orations fall into three groups. In the first, fulfilling Harvey's injunction, the benefactors are commemorated. Sir William Browne's, 1751, is a good example, and typographically the best I have seen. In the second, the Orator, after a few preliminary words of praise, discourses upon the work in which he is most interested. Mead, 1723, for example, has only a word about Harvey in a learned address on Coins. The third constitutes a real contribution to the literature of the physiology of the circulation. Few give evidence of historical research; among these may be mentioned the orations of Ogle, 1880, and Payne, 1896. The last published Latin oration was by Sutherland, 1863; that for 1864 by Robt. Lee was also in Latin, but it remains in MS. in the College. Acland's, 1865, was the first in English. Sutherland appears to have suggested the change in his oration—"Non hic est locus disputare utrum necne auditoribus esset commodius, et oratori facilius orationem hanc anglice, quam latine conficere." [W. O.]

Since 1865 they have borne the title 'The Harveian Oration' which, in more recent years, has generally been preceded or followed by a subject title. In the following list of the Orations in this collection only these distinctive subject titles are given. They are arranged in the order of the year of delivery, which is preceded (between brackets) by the year and place of publication, if the former differs or the latter is other than London. Those orations which, on account of their subject or because they are accompanied by other works of the orator, have been entered in other sections of the catalogue, are also included, with a cross reference, in this list. Osler has added: 'This reprint has now become very rare and difficult to obtain.' It was made (probably by Rau) for C. G. von Murr from the Vienna copy (see Mackall, no. 896, p. 774). A third copy of the original is in Edinburgh; see notes to nos. 867 and 891.

An attempt, wrongly credited to Mead, was made to reprint the book in London in 1723, but the sheets were seized (not publicly burned, as usually stated) on May 27th, after 252 pp., ending with 'semper praedica-|uit' (original, p. 293) had been printed off. L. L. Mackall (loc. cit.) discovered in the Public Record Office original documents signed by Samuel Palmer and by Isaac Dalton showing that Palmer had printed the first 5 sheets and Dalton the rest; that they did the work for a Dutchman, Gysbert Dummer, who supplied the copy; and that the sheets were corrected by a schoolmaster named Patrick (doubtless Samuel P., 1684-1748) who drew the attention of the authorities to the heretical nature of the book. A great figure in the history of Italian medicine, Andrea Cesalpino was successively director of the botanic garden at Bologna, professor at Pisa and at the Sapienza, Rome, and physician to Pope Clement VIII. He died in his 84th year. In three departments of knowledge his acute, observant mind has left its impores:

vant mind has left its impress :

I. He was a typical peripatetic philosopher of the 16th century, and in the last group to engage in the struggle which lasted three centuries and is so well described by Renan in his 'Averroès et is so well described by Renan in his 'Averroès et l'Averroïsme' (no. 498). If in certain points he approached the doctrines of the great Arabian commentator, he had nothing of the ordinary Paduan Averroism, and was a robust supporter of Aristotle, "whose opinions and methods he advocated with an almost 'religious zeal'" (Dalton). It is impossible to understand his position in philosophy without a full study of the great controversy which is so admirably pictured by Renan. As Bayle says, "Do not imagine that he invented different Principles from those of Aristotle, for, on the contrary, he ought to pass for an Innovator only because he addicted himself to Aristotle's true Opinions. He penetrated into the bottom of the Peripatetic System, and maintained it according to the true sense of the Founder, tained it according to the true sense of the Founder, and not as the Schoolmen did, who, under the profession of Aristotle's Disciple, taught [anything but] his Tenets" (no. 6883). He was suspected of heresy but his famous book, the 'Peripatetic Questions', was never put on the Index.

II. At the end of an era in philosophy Cesalpino in one department of science was a beginner and innovator. His is the first name in Botany between Dioscorides and Linnæus. The chief merit of the 'De Plantis' is that it contains a new and logical classification based on the organs of fructification. Miall (no. 6209) has a good criticism

and analysis of the work.

III. Probably a pupil of Colombo, and a student at places where and at a time when he could have heard Vesalius, Cesalpino is not in the group of great 16th-century North Italians who left such memorable works on Anatomy. He was a physician-naturalist and not a member of the new company who revolutionized the subject in

the 16th century

Apart from his botanic studies our interest to-day centres in the claims which have been made that he described the greater circulation. Here he is in good company—Plato, Hippocrates, Galen, and Sarpi, to say nothing of such lesser lights as Ruini, Rudius, and others. It is not my intention here to enter upon a controversy which may be studied in the works of Dalton, Flourens, Ceradini, and in the very full analysis of the writings of Cesalpino by the pastor Tollin. An excellent case can be made out and, with scattered sentences from the writings skilfully put together, a very clear picture may be given of the general circulation.

His opinions may be gathered from the following passages in addition to those referred to above: the 'Quaest. Perip.' (this ed.), leaves 102 F, 103 A and E, 104 F; the 'De Plantis', p. 3; the 'Quaestiones Medicae' (published 1593 with the second Venice ed. of the 'Quaest. Perip.'), L. ii, Qu. xvii, p. 234; the 'Speculum artis medicae' (no. 904), L. vi, cap. xix, pp. 472-3, and L. vii, cap. i, p. 488. Most of these and of the other relevant pressures are quested and translated by relevant passages are quoted and translated by Dalton (no. 765), pp. 142-7, or Flourens (no. 751), pp. 31-5.

The volume was bought in 1817 among the 2,047 MSS. collected by Matteo Luigi Canonici, a Venetian Jesuit who died in 1805 or 1806. The collection, which contains a number of medical and scientific MSS., and which came largely from North Italian monasteries, was the largest single purchase ever made by the Library. A warm-hearted, generous, sympathetic man, great teacher, an indefatigable worker, a great a great teacher, an indefatigable worker, a great editor and commentator on the classics of Medicine. Few physicians have ever occupied so distinguished a position, and Haller justly calls him Communis Europæ Præceptor. His reputation, as Garrison says, "has evaporated very considerably of recent years", but most unjustly. It is not a little surprising that our medical historians pass over the very work on which his reputation in science rests, and which brings him into my Bibliotheca prima. Boerhaave was the into my Bibliotheca prima. Boerhaave was the founder of organic chemistry, of the chemistry of the carbon compounds. The 'Elementa Chemiae' was, to use Thomson's words, the most learned and luminous treatise that the world had seen on the subject. "The real information which it communicates is prodigious, and when

we compare it with any other system of chemistry that preceded it, the superiority of Boerhaave's information will appear" (no. 6491, i, p. 212). The volumes are full of elaborate experiments, and he had the keenest Baconian appreciation of the importance of research in chemistry.

In the hands of Galvani, and at first even in Volta's, electric currents were phenomena capable of exerting only the feeblest forces, and could not be detected except by the most delicate apparatus. Had they been neglected on the ground that the investigation of them promised no immediate results, we should now be ignorant of the most important and most interesting of the limits between the various forces of nature." The meetings lasted from I to 4 p.m. when they had a dinner "at three shillings and sixpence per head exclusive of liquors... the ordinary to be paid by all the members, whether present or absent". Regulation xiii is interesting "That as a principal part of the view of this Society is the mutual communication of knowledge without fear, reserve, or any other authority than that of Truth, no new members shall be admitted for these seven years to come whose age exceeds 40 years".

At the meeting on July 29, 1789, Jenner read a paper "On a disease of the Heart following acute Rheumatism, illustrated by Dissections". Malthus was a Warrington Academy boy, entered Jesus Coll., Camb., was 9th wrangler in 1788, and Fellow in 1793. He took orders, studied at home, and wrote this 'Essay', on pp. 13 and 14 of which the principle is laid down 'That the power of population is infinitely greater than power of population is infinitely greater than the power in the earth to produce subsistence... Population, when unchecked, increases in a geometrical ratio. Subsistence increases only in an arithmetical ratio". He settled at Haileybury College in 1805. Malthus is the founder of modern eugenics, and the 'Essay' is a great book, full eugenics, and the 'Essay' is a great book, full of good things. Did ever any one suffer so cruelly and so unjustly in reputation! At the back of this copy is inserted a letter of Maria Edgeworth (25 Jan., 1822) given me by D. Cockerell, in which she says, "We have spent two days with Mr. and Mrs. Malthus. He is a truly amiable man with an excellent, slow-and-sure understanding. How very much surprised those people would be who think of him as of a monster of inhumanity or as an ogre desiring to devour children, if they saw an ogre desiring to devour children, if they saw what a kind creature he is, beloved by all who surround him." He was called the best-abused man of his age.

The moral restraint is something quite different, and while he does not think it prevents much at present among the think it prevents much at present among the male part of society, he holds that a much larger proportion of women "exercise this virtue than in past times". I cannot see anywhere the adin past times". I cannot see anywhere the advocacy of prudential checks—other than this moral restraint and late prudent marriage. "Hippocrates does not use the noun, but he has the adjective (ἀναίσθητος) and adverb (-ως) to denote loss of consciousness or sensation (pathological). The earliest example of ἀναισθησία seems to be Plato, Timaeus, 74 [no. 216, 2nd pag., p. 171, line 8, and no. 217, iii, p. 497]; where he says that the hard and compressed parts of the body acquire a certain anaesthesia. The he says that the hard and compressed parts of the body acquire a certain anaesthesia. The first extant medical use is, I think, Dioscorides, Mat. Med., 5, 140 (Wellmann), 157 (old style) [no. 338, iii, p. 100]: the Memphitic stone applied to a part to be cut or cauterized 'is reported to induce a safe local anaesthesia'. Galen [no. 352] omits this, probably not believing the report, but he frequently uses the word in singular and plural to denote 'lesions of the sensory activities' (vii. p. 56) or total unconsciousness (due to to denote 'lesions of the sensory activities' (vii, p. 56) or total unconsciousness (due to apoplexy) (x, p. 929), &c. This word is also used by Dioscorides for general surgical anaesthesia, s. v. μανδραγόρας, 4, 75 (Wellmann) [no. 338, ii, p. 235], 'One cyathus (1½ oz.) of the wine is given to those to be cut or cauterized in whom they wish to produce anaesthesia (ἐφ' δυ βούλονται ἀναισθησίαν...ποιῆσαι)'. But Galen omits this too; he was very shy of narcotics: 'I abhor more than anybody carotic drugs (καρωτικά φάρμακα)' (x. than anybody carotic drugs (καρωτικά φάρμακα) ' (x, p. 817).

"The Hippocratic and Galenic words for partial anaesthesia, induced by cold affusions or drugs (mandragora), seem to be νάρκη—ναρκόω—

A preparation of hemp ('Ma-yo') is said to have been used as a surgical anaesthetic in China

in the 2nd century by a physician called Hoa-tho. Snow (p. 4) quotes the passage from an article by S. Julien in Compt. rend. de l'Acad. des Sc., 1849, vol. 28, p. 195.

d. The Spongia somnifera is recommended as a surgical anaesthetic by mediaeval writers. The paragraph on it in the 'Antidotarium' of Nicolaus Salernitanus, no. 7467, may be translated thus: Take of opium of Thebes one ounce, juice of hyoscyamus, juice of unripe blackberries, juice of hemlock, poppy capsules, juice of mandragora, juice of wood-ivy, of each one ounce. Put all these into a vessel together with a new sponge tnese into a vessel together with a new sponge which is just as it came from the sea and has not been in contact with fresh water. Place the vessel in the sun during the dog-days until all [the ingredients] are consumed. When the sponge is needed, moisten it with a little hot water and apply it to the patient's nostrils, and he will quickly fall asleep. When you wish to rouse him, apply the juice of fennel-root, and he will soon wake.

This same Spongia compilers are according to the

This same Spongia somnifera, prepared in the same way, was suggested in 1847 as a substitute for ether! A Dr. Dauriol, of Toulouse, "records five cases in which he has successfully employed

five cases in which he has successfully employed this means of bringing about insensibility during operations" (Lancet, 22 May, 1847, and see abstr. in no. 1394, p. 448). The date of these operations is given as 1832 in no. 1408, p. 5.

e. Well known through the middle ages, references to anaesthesia are common in medical and general literature, and are well given by Gurlt. One or two of the more famous may be referred to: In Boccaccio, Novel X, of the 4th day (no. 4381, i, p. 322), is the story of the leech of Salerno, Master Mazzeo della Montagna, who, preparatory to amputating a leg for necrosis of the bone, distilled 'a certain water of his own concoction whereby the patient, drinking it, might be ensured sleep such time as he deemed the operation... would occupy'. The wife's lover accidentally drank the concoction and, like Juliet in the play, drank the concoction and, like Juliet in the play, was believed to be dead. Upon this contretemps the story turns. In the 16th century Dodonaeus, Porta, Bullein, Bodin (no. 2065, p. 186) and Turner (no. 4134, pt. 2, leaf 46) describe the practice (quotations in Gurlt). Sylvester's Du Bartas, 6th day of the 1st week (no. 4824, p. 57), has a good verse on the subject:

Even as a Surgeon, minding off-to-cut Som cure-less limb; before in use he put His violent Engins on the vicious member, Bringeth his Patient in a sense-less slumber, And grief-less then (guided by Use and Art)
To save the whole, sawes off th'infested part.

The sleeping potion and the inhalation of The sleeping potion and the inharation of narcotic vapours were gradually abandoned, partly because they were thought to be dangerous (De Vigo, Fabricius, and others) and partly from the introduction, in cases of amputation, of the tight ligature and the tourniquet in 1674 (Gurlt), [W. O.]

f. Amputation in the narcosis of drunkenness is not infrequently referred to. Galton in his 'Memories' (no. 160r, p. 34) relates that at the Birmingham General Hospital, when he was house surgeon, a drayman was brought in dead drunk and underwent amputation of both legs without any signs of pain, which set him wondering whether patients might not with advantage be made drunk before operations. This was in the 'thirties. It is worth noting that in Jan. 1847 after the introduction of anæsthesia, a patient was brought into the Massachusetts General Hospital intoxicated and with a badly crushed leg, which was amputated without 'his being at all aware of it'. Morton, no. 1354, p. 37. [W.O.]

g. Compression of the vessels of the neck is mentioned by Valverde, bk. vi, ch. 11 (no. 576, leaf 128"), as a spectacular trick, without reference to its use in surgery: "The carotids, or soporales, that is, sleep-producing, because when they are pressed upon or closed in any way, we soon go to sleep. This experiment I saw performed by Realdo Colombo in 1544 in Pisa on a young man before a number of gentlemen, with no less fear on their part than amusement on ours, we giving them to understand that it was done by sorcery strl.). Aristotle, as usual, knew this effect: "Occasionally, if these [jugulars] are pressed externally, men, though not actually choked, become insensible (µer' ἀναισθησίας), shut their eyes and fall flat on the ground." Hist. An., iii, 3 (no. 231, iv. 51.2 line 6) iv, 514 a, line 6).

Watt devised an apparatus for the generation of the 'airs' and in 1796 published a pamphlet of extreme interest, with illustrations, a pamphiet or extreme interest, with illustrations, prices, and directions for use. Two principal gases were to be produced, the one oxygen and the other 'hydro-carbonate', a mixture of hydrogen, carbonic acid and some carbonic oxide. The horrible compound was not supposed to do its work properly unless it induced vertigo. D. N. B.

"We discovered that very mild solutions and even water would produce anaesthesia if properly

even water would produce anaesthesia if properly injected—so as to produce distension and anaemia of the tissues. We also injected all the accessible nerves in the body...It interests me to recall a visit to Vienna in 1885, when I showed Wölfler (Billroth's assistant) how to use cocaine. He had declared that it was useless in surgery. But before I left Vienna he published an enthusiastic article, in one of the daily papers, on the subject. It did not, however, occur to him to mention my name... Thomas, the famous American dentist of Vienna... requested me to inject the inferior dental nerves of two assistants whose teeth he whose teeth in filled while they were insensitive. Corning... was a student of mine and followed my work with cocaine closely. One of my papers was entitled 'A Report of about 2,000 operations with Cocaine' (approximate title). The list included some major operations... We discovered the effect of anaemia and approximate title in the first of the senset between in prolonging almost indefinitely the anaesthetic action of cocaine . . [Three] assistants of mine acquired the cocaine habit in the course of our experiments on ourselves—injecting nerves... When the J. H. Hospital opened we were employing cocaine anaesthesia much as we do to-day.

or 19th century, contributions to science made in the 19th century, contributions which have revolutionized modern thought.

The memorial meeting in 1908 was intensely interesting, particularly to see and to hear such veterans as Hooker and Wallace. It was a memorable occasion. I remember how Sir John Lubbock (Lord Avebury) recalled "the astonishment and indignation with which the principles ment and indignation with which the principles promulgated in the Joint Memoir and in the 'Origin of Species' by which it was succeeded, were received" (no. 1578, p. 58).

I only saw Darwin once. During the winter of 1872-3 his son Francis worked at the table next

to me in Burdon Sanderson's laboratory at University College. Several times in the spring he talked of taking me to Down for the week-end, but his father was ailing. It was, I think, the next spring, I mean in '74, that I saw him at the Royal Society reception (?). Almenar was the first Spaniard who wrote on syphilis. Born near Venice, Alpino's ambition was to be a soldier, but he determined to distinguish himself in the profession which his father, a well-known physician, obliged him to choose. He spent 3 years in Egypt with the Venetian consul, and the first fruit of his researches there was the 'De balsamo'. Returning to Italy in 1584, he was appointed physician to the prince of Melfi, and afterwards

professor of botany at Padua, where he continued until his death. Some of his works have not been printed, and one, a treatise on deafness, was left printed, and one, a treatise on dealness, was left unfinished. Himself afflicted by deafness, he had in his later years made a special study of its causes and cure. Eloy says of 'De præsagienda' that Alpino had read Hippocrates and Galen to such good purpose that a study of that work might almost serve instead of turning to their writings on prognostics. [W. Thanks to these illuminating researches of Diepgen, and to those of Fincke ('Acta Aragonensia, Berlin, 1908), the heretofore somewhat shadowy personality of Arnold of Villanova now stands out in relief as one of the strongest characters in a decadent age and one of the most notable figures in our history. While alive few physicians have been so honoured, few when dead have been so traduced. The friend, counsellor and ambassator of kings, the physician and intimate of passators of kings. dor of kings, the physician and intimate of popes, a great teacher at the greatest medical school of the period (Montpellier), a prolific writer, he appeals to us rather, now that the full story of his life is known, as a vir ardentis ingenii, whose passion was to reform the Church and society. Fearless to indiscretion, he was a preacher of righteousness to a perverse generation, and a denouncer of judgement to come. A scene on the 26th October, 1309, fires the imagination, when the now ageing physician before a conclave of Clement V and his cardinals at Avignon denounced the abuses of the Church, and appealed for a restoration of evangelical Christianity. It recalls restoration of evangencial Christianity. It recalls a yet more famous occasion fifty years earlier before another Avignon Pope when the great clerk of Lincoln, Robert Grosseteste, made a passionate appeal for personal holiness in the clergy, and for political honesty in the Curia. Truly, in all ages, of such as Grosseteste and Villanova has been the Kingdom of Heaven. Zeal for reform and devotion to mystic theology. for reform and devotion to mystic theology brought no peace to Arnold, and the sleuth-hounds of the Inquisition were only held in leash by his powerful friends. Once dead they wreaked vengeance on his writings, and sent his memory down the ages tainted with accusations of heresy and magic

and magic. Arnold is among those defended by Naudé in his 'Apologie', no. 5213.

Other daughters of Fincke married Olaus Worm and J. Fuiren and their descendants through several generations were prominent Danish physicians. Of the seven became professors in the university, namely. became professors in the university, namely, Bertel, latinized Bartolus (d. 1690), Thomas (1616–80) the most famous of the family, Erasmus (1625–98), and two others; and a daughter (1625–98), and two others; and a daughter became the mother of three medical professors surnamed Jacobæus. The best known of Caspar's grandsons were the two sons of the famous Thomas Bartholin (1616–80), namely, Caspar the younger (1655–1738) and Thomas the younger (1659–90). Bertel B. in comparison with his more distinguished relatives has been called 'the rather insignificant professor of philology'. Burnet was Head of Clare Hall, Cambridge, and later of the Charterhouse. He was a master of eloquence, but his science was crude even for his time. He maintained that the earth resembled a gigantic egg; the shell was crushed at the

deluge, the internal waters burst out, while the fragments of the shell formed the mountains. his 'Archæologiæ philosophicæ', published in 1692, he professes to reconcile this theory with Genesis. In the 'De statu' he argues against the endlessness of punishment. Probably to avoid further imputations of heresy, he had only a few copies printed for intimate friends. After Burnet's death Dr. Mead reprinted a few more copies in death Dr. Mead reprinted a few more copies in a handsome quarto (1720) with the monitum prefixed desiring all into whose hands it might come to keep it for the select. The authoritative ed., published by Wilkinson, Burnet's executor, in 1727, contains an appendix, 'De futura Judaeorum restauratione'. (D. N. B.)

a series of 2,000 water-colour drawings of diseased structures, which is still preserved at the College, where he was appointed professor of anatomy. The plates for his great work on pathological anatomy were furnished from his own drawings and put upon the stone by himself. These illustrations have for article months of the foldier. tions have, for artistic merit and for fidelity, never been surpassed, while the matter represents the highest point which the science of morbid anatomy had reached before the introduction of the microscope. Owing to feeble health, he resigned his professorship, and being appointed physician to the King of the Belgians, held that post until his death. (D. N. B.)

Champerius; Champegius; Campegius; Campegues, &c., are various forms of Champier's name. A man of large and liberal culture, of a truly noble nature, an admirer of learning and a patron of the learned; possessed moreover of that rest-less vanity which made him feel it as much a matter of necessity to live in the eye of the world as to breathe; the effect of which was that he exerted the widest and most beneficent influence among his fellow men. Indefatigable in his proper calling, there was yet nothing which interested the citizens of Lyons that did not interest him. Charleton took his M.D. at Oxford when only 22, and was appointed in the same year physician to King Charles I, who was then at Oxford, probably as an act of favour to a promising member of the loyal university, for Harvey was the physician in actual attendance. Through the Commonwealth he continued true to the royal cause, only suppressing the word 'King' on the title-page of his 'Physiologia'. He was one of the first elected fellows of the Royal Society in 1662. The 'Chorea Gigantum' will always be bent in memory by the fine exists which Deviden kept in memory by the fine epistle which Dryden wrote in its praise, the noblest poem in which English science has been celebrated by an English poet. Charleton delivered the Harveian Oration in 1680, 1702 and 1706. He valued all the discoveries of his time, but in setting them forth he could not free himself from the scholastic forms in which he had been bred. He was an exact scholar and a man of wide reading both in madicine and and a man of wide reading both in medicine and classical literature. (D. N. B.)

William Clowes, the elder, learned surgery as an apprentice of George Keble, served in the army and navy, and practised in London. In 1575 he was on the staff of St. Bartholomew's Hospital, and after the defeat of the Armada he was appointed surgeon to the Queen. His books are the best surgical writings of his time in English. He had read a great deal, but trusted much to his own observation, and his modern spirit of enquiry makes his pages different from the compilations of his friends Baker and Banister. He always speaks with generosity of his professional conspeaks with generosity of his professional con-temporaries, and his books are full of pictures of daily life in the reign of Elizabeth. His son William (1582-1648) was surgeon to Charles I. (D. N. B.)

Charles de L'Escluse, a Fleming, made it one of the occupations of his long and busy life to translate and publish the narratives of travellers and collectors in distant lands. He studied at several universities, searched the wilder parts of western and central Europe for rare plants, lived at Montpellier in the house of Rondelet, directed the imperial botanic garden at Vienna, was inti-mate with L'Obel and Dodoens, a correspondent of Busbecq, Gesner, and others. During the latter half of his life he was the great centre of botanical information. His troubles, among others an extra-ordinary tendency to fracture and dislocation of the limbs, did not spoil his power of work. These two books (nos. 2326-7) contain the most impor-tant results of his labours. In them are the accounts given by early Spanish and Portuguese travellers of animals, flowers, and drugs. His diligence was often rewarded by unexpected and highly curious facts. Miall, no. 6209, p. 72.

Cogan graduated B.A. (Oriel College) 1562-3, was made Fellow in 1563 and M.B. in 1574. In this latter year he became head-master of the Manchester Grammar School and practised medicine. He was "an able Physician and Latinist, a good neighbour and an honest Man". In 1595 he sent to Oriel College library Galen's Opera omnia (1561) "quinque voluminibus, novissime compactis umbilicatis, et catenis appendentibus", Geminus' Anatomia (1545) and Mattioli's Dioscorides (1565) "novis pariter integumentis et umbonibus communita et catenis alligata". (Wood, 'Ath. Oxon.') These books are still in the College library; the chains have gone but the bindings library; the chains have gone but the bindings remain, only the Galen now having the bosses. All three have Cogan's name in a frame on the

upper lid.

This is the original ed. of the 'Haven of Health'; other eds. appeared in 1586, 1589, 1596, 1605, 1612, and 1636. I gave a copy of the last ed. to Oriel library. It is a book of good sense. Many local notes of value about diet and times of meals at the University are to be found in chs. 211-12. By the use of "one dish onely at one meale, and drinking thereto but small drinke" he became slender. On p. 281 is an account of the fever at 100 ford in text which backs out at the project of Oxford in 1577 which broke out at the assizes and between July 1st and Aug. 12th carried off 510 persons, "all men and no women". It does not read like a first-hand account. His 'Well of wisdome, containing chiefe and chosen sayinges . . . gathered out of the five bookes of the Olde Testament', 1577, is an excellent little manual in which the subjects are arranged alphabetically. Cohausen is mentioned in the preface. In a copy in the library at Cwrt-yr-Ala, Wales, this is stated to have been written by Dr. Campbell in ridicule of the Hermetic Philosophy. The book had a rapid sale and induced many people to adopt the notion of prolonging life by inhaling the breath of young persons. A physician took lodgings in a boarding-school after having read the essay

the essay.

"In 1743 [1744?] appeared anonymously his [John Campbell's] English version, with copious annotations, of the Latin work of Cohausen...

Dr. Johnson (Boswell, Life, p. 142) pronounced the volume 'very entertaining as an account of the hermetic philosophy and as furnishing a curious history of the extravagancies of the human mind'; history of the extravagancies of the human mind '; adding, 'if it were merely imaginary it would be

adding, 'if it were merely imaginary it would be nothing at all.' It reached a third edition in 1771." (D. N. B., viii, p. 374).

Beauvois (no. 2341, p. 89) calls Campbell's version an 'imitation' of the original. Consequently, for him, La Place's French trl. (no. 2340) is Campbell, not Cohausen. The Scottish historian with his wide learning and his familiarity with medieval lore was able to improve on the German medieval lore was able to improve on the German doctor's strange tales and to add much to the original. In the B.M. Catalogue the book is entered as by Cohausen, translated by Campbell.

An extraordinarily popular writer, his works are among the most common to-day in second-hand catalogues.

A very pleasant (and probably a true) picture

A very pleasant (and probably a true) picture is given of him by Rudyard Kipling in 'Rewards and Fairies' (no. 5028, 'A Doctor of Medicine'). In a letter to me, dated 10 May, 1914, and inserted in that book, Mr. Kipling says, "Nicholas, who could write even if he couldn't cure for nuts—says at the beginning of his Herbal, 'I knew well enough the whole world and everything in it was enough the whole world and everything in it was formed of a composition of contrary elements, and in such a harmony as must needs show the wisdom and power of a great God'." The paragraph from which the quotation is taken (no. graph from which the quotation is taken (no. 2403, p. iv), gives an admirable description of his astrological philosophy. The Herbal, which he first issued in 1653 with the title, 'The English physician enlarged', was a most popular work. The last edition (no. 2403) is a fine quarto with well executed coloured plates of herbs. From the 'Semeiotica uranica' (no. 2402) may be had an excellent idea of the beliefs and practices of honest astrologers in the 12th century. Even honest astrologers in the 17th century. Even learned men and hospital physicians, like F. Bernard of St. Bartholomew's, cast horoscopes see his MS. vols., no 7522.

Culpeper was a thorn in the side of the College,

and this unauthorized translation, in 1649, of their Pharmacopæia was deeply resented. He also translated and edited Galen's 'Ars parva' (no. 397), Glisson's work on Rickets (no. 2758) and other works, a list of which is in the Index Catalogue, S. G. L.

He died of consumption at the age of 38. On his death-bed he said to his wife, "I did by all persons as I would they should do by me. I never gave a patient two medicines when one would serve. Farewell, dearest! I am spent."

Alexandre Diodati was born at Geneva in 1598, practised there, and for 40 years, until his death in 1676, was medical officer of the Chambre de la Santé. Early in his career he had served as physician in the French army, but his high-sound-ing title of Councillor and Physician to the King, from which some biographers inferred that he was a Frenchman, must have been purely honorary. (Gautier, no. 5908, p. 250.) His autograph is in no. 3640.

This seems to be his only work. The 'Promptu-arium medicum', Leyden, 1668, is a re-issue of the same sheets with new title and preliminary

matter (B. M. catal.).

An interesting detail is the account (1824 ed., p. 206) of the young Bonaparte "alors lieutenant-colonel d'artillerie"; he speaks of his bravery and indefatigable lerie"; he speaks of his bravery and indefatigable activity, "il ne quittait jamais les batteries". Doppet conducted the siege of Lyons in 1793, but in his 'Rapport', printed in 'Mélanges, &c., de la Ville de Lyon' (Lyons, 1847), there is no special mention of the attack on the Hôtel-Dieu. Petit, in no. 3648, p. 140, gives an account of this siege and of the bombardment of the Hôtel-Dieu-600 bombs were thrown into the hospital, which was set on fire 42 times.

When I was a student with Bovell at Toronto, 1868–9, Griffith Evans, who was stationed there as veterinary surgeon to the Artillery, was much interested in the microscope, and frequently came to Bovell's rooms to help in the preparation of specimens. He had previously been stationed at Montreal, where he graduated in medicine from McGill in 1864. When serving in India he made the discovery of the parasites in the blood in Surra—the first trypanosome disease to be described.

Fioravanti was born at Bologna early in the 16th cent. He studied medicine and practised in Eclerone but returned to Bologna without her page 18th cent. Palermo, but returned to Bologna where he was made doctor. He published a number of works on medicine, which along with their author have been severely handled by some modern critics, but it is futile to treat them otherwise than historically. Fioravanti was a chemist and pharmacist, and in his practice put unbounded faith in his specifics. The balsam which goes by his name and which was in use until a comparatively name, and which was in use until a comparatively recent period, is a very complex mixture. (Ferguson.)

In 1608, when appointed professor of physics at Marburg, he delivered this discourse on the weapon-salve which, in its present extended form, was published in 1609. It gave extended form, was published in 1609. It gave rise to the controversy, into which Helmont (no. 2934) was later drawn, with the learned Belgian jesuit, Jean Roberti. This Tractate of Goclenius and his 'Synarthrosis magnetica' together with Roberti's answers ('Brevis anatome' and 'Goclenius heautontimorumencos') are reminted in no. 4004 pp. 176-176. Goclenius wyste printed in no. 4094, pp. 176-456. Goclenius wrote also on augury, chiromancy and astrology, as well as on alchemy and medicine. (Ferguson.)

Greatrakes—the name is variously spelled Greatarick, Gratrick, Gertrux, &c.—was born in Ireland, of an English family, and served in the Cromwellian army. In 1662 he was seized by the idea that he had the power of curing scrofula, which he afterwards exercised with varying success, and not only in scrofula but in other diseases. Many were benefited by his treatment. He deprecated the description of his cures as miraculous, but believed he had an "extraordinary gift of God". Except in the case of Anne, Lady Conway, whom he failed to relieve, his treatment was gratuitous. (D. N. B.)

He owed his success entirely to his medical worth, for he had no social polish, and though a kindly man, he was acrimonious in though a kindly man, he was acrimonious in controversy. Influenced by Van Swieten, he rejected inoculation and, like his contemporaries, showed no interest in his younger colleague's invention of percussion.

He never belonged to the English College of Physicians, with which, though at one time on friendly terms, he got into bad odour for some rather discreditable publications on venereal diseases, and for 'The family physician' which revealed secrets of the apothecaries' trade. In 'The conclave of physicians' he published a scurrilous attack on the College. Charles II, to whom Harvey had been appointed physician, seems to have countenanced him, though he is believed to have interfered in order to soften an attack on the illustrious Willis. In the first year of William and Mary he was made 'Their Majesties' physician of the Tower', a lucrative sinecure, which he enjoyed until his death, and in which he was succeeded by his son Gideon. After graduating at Leyden, Helvetius was twice sent to Paris by his father, J. F. H. (see note to no. 2937), with a stock of secret remedies. He obtained there a supply of 'Brazil root' (ipecac) which, after testing its properties, he advertised as a cure for dysentery. It was used with success in the case of the Dauphin, whereupon Louis XIV gave Helvetius 20,000 francs to publish his secret. After this he acquired a large practice, and died rich. His son Jean Claude Adrien (1685-1755) was also a celebrated physician in Paris, and father of the philosopher, Claude Adrien Helvétius (1715-71).

He was a versatile, unscrupulous man, with considerable abilities, great perseverance, and unlimited influence. Most of his books (84 are listed in the D. N. B.) are trashy compilations, but some of his botanical works did good service, and the first Linnean flora of Britain was due to him.

William Hunter did three things—he gave John his chance; he made contributions of the first rank to anatomy and pathology; and he left collections which, taken as a whole, are unrivalled by those of any other physician. He was a cultivated gentleman; John was—well, to say the least, a rough diamond, but with a mind of much wider vision than his brother's. Numerous and valuable as are John's specimens in the Lincoln's Inn-Fields Museum and as a unit more important. Inn-Fields Museum, and as a unit more important, they have neither the variety nor extent of the great collections left to Glasgow by William. At last we know what they are, through the catalogues which have been printed within the catalogues which have been printed within the past few years [nos. 5921-4 and 7068-9].

HUNTER (WILLIAM) contd.

Glasgow has been slow in doing justice to the memory of her most distinguished medical graduate. There remains a plain duty—to house these splendid collections together in a suitable building. At one time I hoped that Mr. Carnegie would in this way honour the memory of a brother Scot. The Hunterian alone remains of the important 18th-century libraries collected by physicians. Before deciding that a book not in the B. M. or Bodley is not in Gt. Britain it is always well to consult its catalogue.

Knox had made important researches in ethnology and other subjects while serving as an army surgeon at the Cape, 1817-20. He had

studied anatomy at Edinburgh under John Barclay, after whose death, in 1826, he took the first rank as anatomical lecturer, and was the best customer of the 'resurrectionists'. He became involved in the obloquy of the murderers Burke and Hare, and was savagely attacked in the literature of the day, but an influential committee believed him innocent of anything worse than indiscretion. Later his popularity declined, partly owing to his sarcastic habits of speech; and he ended as pathologist to a London hospital. He may be ranked among the greatest anatomical teachers, though, owing to his disappointments and eccentricities, he failed to produce works of permanent value. (D. N. B.)

A Calvinist, he had gone to England, but returned to Erance disappointed and graduated in returned to France disappointed, and graduated in medicine in 1683. Gui Patin says, "Fortunius Licetus is 64 years of age. He is married and is to-day the leading Peripatetic of Italy and perhaps of the world. He is the hardest worker I know, has written many books not one of which has been printed without having been rewritten by him four or five without having been rewritten by him four or five times. He taught first at Pisa, then 24 years at Padua and Cremona. He now teaches at Bologna with a salary of 1500 livres" (Patiniana, p. 24,

in no. 5231).

Liceti received the name Fortunio from having survived a very premature birth—it was believed before the seventh month. His father, who was a physician, brought him up with great care and gave him an excellent education. The authorship of his first book, Gonopsis Chantropologia, was disputed, much to his chagrin, until he re-issued it under the above title. His book on monstrosities shares all the credulity and superstitions of the ancients. Among his antiquarian works is one on 'sepulchral lamps'. These he believed to be so contrived as to burn perpetually if the tombs remained closed. The puzzling phenomenon was proved by Octavio Ferrari in 1685 to be due to phosphorescence. Liceti was recalled to Padua in (Bayle.) [W. O.] 1645 and remained there till his death.

Ramon Lul or Lull, Raymondo Lulio, Lullus, Lullius, Lulle or Lully, was born at Palma in Majorca, between 1232 and 1242. During his youth he followed the court, until, being shown by a lady whom he admired that she was suffering from malignant disease, he changed his life, became extremely religious, and devoted himself to converting the Saracens to Christianity. He travelled and preached to the unbelievers, not without many perils, and finally was all but stoned to death at Bugia in Africa. Some Genoese sailors rescued him, but he died in sight of his native country. He was canonized as a saint. The story of his coming to England to make gold for Edward III seems to be without foundation. He was a volu-minous writer on divinity, the liberal arts, philosophy, physics, law, medicine, mathematics, metaphysics, logic and his own subject, alchemy. Some put the number of his works at 400, others at nearly 4,000, but some are credited to a Raimundo de Tarraga, who was living in 1370, or to a Raymundus Lullius Neophytus 60 years later. The author of these papers [see also no. 3589, vol. ix] was one of the most brilliant young men it has ever been my lot to teach. The second son of Dr. MacCallum of Dunnville, Ont., and the brother of W. G. MacCallum (assoc. prof. of Pathology at the Johns Hopkins Univ.), he had a most distinguished career at our medical school, and while an undergraduate wrote several papers of unusual merit. He joined the anatomical dept. under Dr. Mall, and at once began a series of most interesting researches, many of which have been published in the J. H. Reports and Bulletin and in the Anatomische Anzeiger. He went to Leipzig to study with His, and while there (as in the case of my good friend Jack Hewetson) the first symptoms of tuberculosis appeared. For a time he improved, and went to Berkeley, Cal., with Professor Loeb who soon appreciated his remarkable skill as an investigator; but, alas! he succumbed suddenly, to the irreparable loss of science in America. He had a mind of singular acuteness, a clear judgment, and he had caught from Mall some measure of that investigating spirit which has made the anatomical school of the J. H. University so famous. When the news of his death reached me, one morning as I sat at breakfast, I broke down in an irresistible paroxysm of regret, and had to leave the table. Wm. Osler, 1906.

Rabelais issued an edition in 1532 (Gryphius, Lyons), and speaks of him as "among those who in our time strove with real earnestness to restore the ancient and true art of Medicine to its former splendour". The letters illustrate in an interesting way—and this is their value—the transition from Arabian to Greek dominion. The opinions of Avicenna, Hippocrates and Galen are quoted on every page. At the end of ep. ii, lib. vii (p. 145), is a very good account of syphilis by a man who must have seen the disease from the beginning of the great outbreak, and was a pupil of one of the earliest writers on the subject. In the same epistle is a full discussion of the names, Greek, Latin, and Arabic, of the more common diseases; in no. 3317 this has been translated into French and issued separately.

Manardus is often referred to in illustration of the not uncommon folly of the old man who marries a young girl. Pierre Bayle (no. 6883) discusses this, to him congenial, subject and gives extracts from the jests of the poets. He is said to have died on the night of his marriage. An astrologer had predicted his death in a ditch, from which, to shun the prediction, Manardus kept away, but, as is given in the distich of Latomus, the fovea—" conjugis illa fuit".

The occasion of the work was the appearance in Paris of a white negro boy, undoubtedly an albino. Voltaire also wrote about him in 1744. Maupertuis's theory of generation is creditable in that it rests on enigenesis but he imagine a resistant it rests on epigenesis, but he imagines a reciprocal attraction of similar particles and has recourse to Newton's theory of gravitation to explain the formation of the foetus. Mayow, Mayouwe or Mayo, a Cornishman, of Wadham College and a Fellow of All Souls, was a pupil of Willis and friend of Lower. He practised a pupil of Willis and friend of Lower. I can see no personal notes in the volume. The number of diseases for which tobacco was used is remarkable. On p. 47 is an account of a post-mortem on a young man "cuius cerebrum plane obsitum erat atris fuliginibus", due to addiction to tobacco; he had had no illnesses previously. [W. O.]

Niphus (or Nifo), who taught philosophy in Padua and several other Italian universities, is remembered now only in connection with the great Paduan controversy over Averroes. For an account of the part he played see Renan, no. 498, pp. 367-72 (cf. notes to no. 3707). About 1495-7 he edited the 'Destructiones' (no. 496) and other

works of Averroes.

He was a great favourite of Leo X, who made him Count Palatine, with the privilege of using the name and arms of the Medici family, and with power to create masters and bachelors of arts and licentiates and doctors in theology and law, to legitimize bastards, and to ennoble three persons!

The 'De pulchro' is an extraordinary work,

unlike any other, and in nothing more remarkable than in the description (cap. v) of the physical beauties of the famous Joan of Aragon to whom the work is dedicated. For amusing details of Niphus and his relation to this lady, and others, see Pierre Bayle, no. 6883, i, p. 399 and iv, p. 377. It is strange that Burton does not quote the 'De pulchro' in his 'Anatomy'; but in pt. 3, sec. 2, mem. 3 (no. 4630, p. 577) he copies the story of Niphus doting on a young maid though "an old man and a public professor, father of many children".

This copy—2nd printing—was received April 16th, 1892. For samples of a good and a bad page of the MS. see at the end of this [1st] volume.

THE WRITING OF A TEXT-BOOK.

On several occasions, in Philadelphia, I was asked by Lea Bros. to prepare a work on Diagnosis and had half promised one; indeed I had prepared a couple of chapters, but continually procrastinated on the plea that up to the 40th year a man was fit for better things than text-books. Time went on and as I crossed this date I began to feel that the energy and persistence necessary for the task were lacking. In Sept. 1890 I returned from a four-months trip in Europe, shook myself, and towards the end of the month began a work on Practice. I had nearly finished the chapter on Typhoid Fever when Dr. Granger, Messrs. Appleton's agent, came from N.Y. to ask me to prepare a Text-book on Medicine. We haggled for a few weeks about terms and finally, selling my brains to the Devil, I signed the contract. My intention had been to publish the work myself and have Lippincott or Blakiston (both of whom offered) handle the book, but the bait of a guaranteed circulation of 10,000 copies in two years and fifteen hundred dollars on the date of publication was too glittering, and I was hooked.

October, November, and December were not very satisfactory months and Jan. 1st, 1891, saw the infectious diseases scarcely completed. I then got well into harness. Three mornings of each

OSLER (Sir W.) contd.

week I stayed at home and dictated from 8 a.m. till I p.m. On the alternate days I dictated after the morning hospital visit, beginning about II.30. The spare hours of the afternoons were devoted to correction and reference work. Early in May I gave up the house, 209 Monument St., and went to my rooms at the Hospital. The routine there was: 8 a.m. to I p.m. dictation, 2 p.m. visit to the private patients and special cases in the wards, after which revision, &c. After 5 p.m. I saw any outside cases; dined at the Club about 6.30, loafed until 9.30, bed at IO, up at 7 a.m. I had arranged to send MS. by July 1st, and on that date I forwarded five sections, but the publishers did not begin to print until the middle of August.

The first two weeks of August I spent in Toronto, and then with the same routine I practically finished the MS. by about October 15th. During the summer the entire MS. was carefully revised for the press by Mr. Powell of the English Department of the University. The last three months of '91 were devoted to proof reading. In January I made out the index, and in the entire work nothing so wearied me as the verifying of every reference. Without the help of Lafleur and Thayer who took the wards off my hands I never could have finished in so short a time; my other assistants also rendered much aid in looking up references and special points.

During the writing of the work I lost only one afternoon through transient indisposition and never a night's rest. Between September 1890 and January 1892 I gained nearly 8 lbs. in weight.

His most celebrated work 'De immortalitate' (no. 3708), published in 1516, aroused the opposition alike of the orthodox party and the Averroists. He defended himself in his 'Apologia', 1518, and 'Defensorium', 1519, in the latter against Nifo (cf. no. 3503).

If Porta, as is said, wrote the Natural Magic before he was 15, it is probably the most remarkable book ever written by a youth. The date of his birth, however, is variously given, even as

late as 1545 (which might account for the statement), and 1536 is the most likely year.

Haller (no. 1163, ii, p. 125) describes Porta as "Neapolitanus, vir acuti ingenii, mathematicus, ingenii præcocis, peregrinator". He is remembered for his pioneer work on optics and vision, for his treatise on staganography or secret writing. for his treatise on steganography or secret writing

for his treatise on steganography or secret writing (no. 3721), for his early work on physiognomy, and for his fanciful 'Phytognomonica'.

He had a curious, fanciful mind, and sought analogies where none existed. Sir Thos. Browne in Vulgar Errors, bk. I, ch. viii (no. 4488, p. 34) remarks that in Porta's works are many excellent things, "yet are there many also receptary [i. e. generally or popularly admitted] and such as will not endure the test." As to the Natural Magic, he complains in a characteristic way that Magic, he complains in a characteristic way that readers "sit downe in his authority, and thereby omit not onely the certainty of truth, but the pleasure of its experiment". In the Life of Peiresc (no. 6765, p. 36) is a good account of a visit to Porta in 1601. For biographical references see Ferguson, and for a bibliography Jourdan (op. cit.).

Porta was also a successful playwright. Opposite the title-page of the Bodleian copy of 'La Fantesca', 1596, is a [MS.] list of 13 plays, chiefly Roman-Italian comedies in the Plautus-Ariosto style. Original editions are rare. One of his plays has an interesting connection with English literature, being the basis of Ruggle's 'Ignoramus' (see nos. 5410 and 5522).

Scribonius Largus in A. D. 43 accompanied the Emperor Claudius to Britain. His 'Compositiones', written in barbarous Latin, is 'a not unimportant book of receipts, referred to by Galen. He was the first to describe accurately

the preparation of true opium. Haeser, i, p. 299.

"It is but fitting that a great medicus like you, said Nello, adjusting the cloth, should be shaved by the same razor that has shaved the illustrious Antonio Benivieni, the greatest master of the chirurgic art" (Geo. Eliot, 'Romola', chap. xvi).

Benivieni, a shrewd and accurate observer, had formed the good habit of making brief notes of his important cases, and after his death these were found by his brother Jerome and published at

Florence in 1507. The special interest of the work is that here, for the first time in modern literature, we have reports of post-mortem examinations made specifically with a view to finding out the exact cause of death.

A Genevese, related to Charles Bonnet, Trembley wrote this work while tutor to the sons of William Bentinck, the English Resident at the Hague. The beautiful plates were drawn by Pierre Lyonet, a keen and skilful naturalist, and eight of them were also engraved by him and were his first attempts. The vignettes show Bentinck's country house at Sorgvliet and the artificial lakes with Trembley and the boys collecting the polyps. In the 4th vignette the experimenter is seen "occupé à faire l'opération la plus difficile", viz. turning the polypinside out ! the polyp inside out!

The 4th Mémoire is one of the most remarkable

The 4th Mémoire is one of the most remarkable produced in the 18th century, and Trembley may be regarded as one of the founders of experimental biology; for "by cutting and re-uniting he produced extraordinary monsters, seven-headed hydras, double hydras, in which one body enclosed another, &c." (Miall, no. 6209, p. 282).

Another edition was published at Paris, the same year, in 2 vols., 8°, with the plates redrawn and without the vignettes. An abstract, in English, is in Geo. Adams, 'Micrographia illustrata', London, 1746, pp. 138-65.

Doctor's son not to be the works of his father, but a gross imposition on the public" (Lowndes); "Most of the pieces . . . are obviously not Arbuthnot's, but some are undoubtedly his" (Aitken,

no. 4328, p. viii).

Arbuthnot was born at Arbuthnott in Kincardineshire. His father, a parson, refused to conform after the Revolution and was deprived of his living. John, after studying at Marischal College, Aberdeen, 1681-5, went to London where he earned a living by teaching mathematics. In 1692 he published 'The laws of chance', a rare book; the Bodley copy is the only one I have seen. Translated from Huygens' 'De ratiocinis in ludo aleae' (published in Schooten's 'Exercitationes mathematicae', Leyden, 1657), it is reprinted here as 'The hazards of game' (vol. ii, Suppl., p. 28), and to mathematicians must be interesting.

In 1694 he entered University College, Oxford, and two years later took his M.D. at St. Andrews

where he is said to have acquitted himself extraordinarily well. [Cf. no. 7669 A.]

He was responsible for a series of anonymous
pamphlets (i-iii in no. 4329) published in 1712
with the object of convincing the public of the
desirability of bringing to a close the war with

desirability of bringing to a close the war with France. Later these pieces were re-arranged and printed in Pope and Swift's 'Miscellanies' of 1727 as The History of John Bull.

Arbuthnot's principal medical works are 'The nature of aliments', 1731, and 'The effect of air', 1733 (cf. nos. 1828-9). In the first of these books, both of which may be read with interest by laymen, he argued that all that is done by medicine might be done equally well by diet. B. W. Richardson, who calls the second work "One of the most remarkable books in the history of medicine". most remarkable books in the history of medicine"

Johnson said of him, "I think Dr. Arbuthnot the first man among them. He was the most universal genius, being an excellent physician, a man of deep learning and a man of much humour"; and Swift wrote, "If the world had but a dozen Arbuthnots I would burn my Travels (Aitken, in no. 5738, ix, pp. 129-38). See also a fine tribute by the Earl of Orrery, quoted in Ogle's Harveian Oration, no. 760, p. 172.

It is not so much a translation as a different essay, in English, on the same theorems and—in the light of the MS., no. 4589—

All reasonable people must deplore the increase of suicide in our modern civilization, so often a selfish and cowardly act; but the fate of Count Nogi gives pause to the wholesale condemnation, and raises the question under what circumstances, and raises the question under what circumstances, if any, a man in his right senses may rightly disregard the canon 'gainst self-slaughter. Animated by a spirit not easy for the Western mind to enter, Count Nogi did it as an act of sacrifice; and so, too, it may be to the Western man. It has been my lot to see the end of scores of the sachly investigates. rashly importunate, weary of breath, and to see but few that roused any feelings other than pity for the folly (or the *folie*!), or anger at an undutiful mutiny. But among those few there were some that I could not condemn, others that I could not but admire and even, maybe, approve.

It is not surprising in this Lucretian age when to many death is the "be all and the end all", that we find men who, when beaten to the pit (Jul. Caes., v, 5, 23), deem it more worthy to leap in than tarry to be pushed.

Ask the opinion of a dozen medical men upon the novel in which the doctor is best described, and a majority will say 'Middlemarch'. Lydgate is at once an example and a warning. He illustrates an attempt to break tradition and custom in a provincial town by doing general practice and yet not

" This was offensive both to the dispensing drugs. physicians whose exclusive distinction seemed in-fringed on, and to the surgeon-apothecaries with whom he ranged himself "(ch. 45). He was well born, well bred and well trained, and "about his ordinary bearing there was a certain fling, a fearless expectation of success, a confidence in his own powers and integrity much fortified by contempt for petty obstacles or seductions, of which he had no experience "(ch. 13). Chapter 15 is a fine description of a man of the highest type, whose scientific interest took the form of professional enthusiasm, and who had a burning conviction that the medical profession was the finest in the world. Then, too, he had "a flesh-and-blood sense of fellowship" and "cared not only for 'cases' but

of fellowship and cared not only for cases but for John and Elizabeth, especially Elizabeth."

The warning in his case is plain—not to marry a fool with a pretty face! We follow his wrecked career with pathetic interest. An unmitigated calamity, his marriage ruined his intellectual life in a soul-wasting struggle with worldly annoyances.
"He once called her his basil plant; and when she asked for an explanation, said that basil was a plant which had flourished wonderfully on a murdered man's brains." Would that the Lydgates existed only in fiction!

George Eliot was happy in her relations with the profession, and we owe her a deep debt for this early Victorian sketch of it in a provincial town.

It is often said that my brother Regius of Cambridge, Sir Clifford Allbutt, was the original of Lydgate. Nothing in their careers is in common save the training and the high aspirations in a provincial town. There is a basis for the statement. When Dr. Bastian lived at Hanwell, one Sunday afternoon he had just returned from a visit to George Eliot, and the conversation turned on 'Middlemarch' which had appeared recently. He said that the matter had been discussed at her house that afternoon, and she confessed that Dr. Allbutt's early career at Leeds had given her suggestions.

It has only two, the same as those in the B. M.

E. 95'), closely resembles this, line for line; the colophon, probably Powell's and certainly later than 1554, reads 'Jmprinted at London in Fletestrete, in the house late Berthelettes...'. The title differs only in having a comma after 'knight', and in the word 'lorde'. The Proheme begins 'Galen' (here 'Galene'). The other, a quarto ed. of 104 leaves (Ab B–Z ab), lacks the title and has an undated Berthelet colophon on leaf '94' (the B. M. copy, 7644—with 'ff. 94'—in the Short-Title Catal., has the same collation).

The work is thought to have appeared in 1534, but no copy of an ed. earlier than 1539 seems to be known (D. N. B.). There are 7 eds. in the Bodleian.

The Proheme, added in 1541, is Elyot's answer to his professional critics, who had objected to a medical book by a layman and in the vulgar tongue. The 'woorshipful physicion' with whom he read Galen in his youth was probably Linacre.

Howe as Querpo, Edward Tyson as Carus, Wm. Gould as Umbra, and Sir R. Blackmore as the Stentor, on the physicians' side, is Charles Goodall. These names are in Christopher Codrington's copy of the 3rd ed. in the library of the College of Physicians. 'A compleat key' was published in 1734, and the poem reached a 10th ed. in 1741.

In 1700 he obtained permission for the body of Dryden to lie in state at the College of Physicians, and made a Latin oration in praise of the poet. Disclaiming any medical knowledge, the author names Sydenham and the Pharmacopoeia as his sources. In the dedication he credits Mead with having saved him his eyesight.

A prospectus, printed on 4 large quarto leaves and dated London, Oct. 3, 1720, is MS. Rawlinson Letters 7 (137) in Bodley: 'Proposals for Printing by Subscription, a Book entitled Materia Medica Botanica, in which the Symptoms of several Diseases are given, and the Herbs proper for them . . . are set down . . . The whole Work consists of about 8000 Latin Hexameters.' The price unbound was a guinea, half to be paid on subscription; subscribers to six copies were to have a seventh; no more to be printed than subscribed for. On the margins of the last page Knowles has written a letter to Thomas Hearne inviting his

written a letter to Inomas Hearne inviting his subscription. The prospectus contains the Procemium, the Pestis section (cf. p. 178), and also an Epilogus (which is omitted in the book).

Very little is known of Knowles; the D. N. B. gives no biographical details. The book is not in the S. G. L., or in Bodley [it has recently been acquired]. It seems scarce. I have not seen it in the catalogues before and I have been on the look. the catalogues before, and I have been on the look-

out for several years.

In ch. 4 of 'Obregon' Sagredo wishes to bleed his wife on account of a fall, lest a "perfluvium sanguinis should ensue"; and in ch. 10, when the Squire is ill at Salamanca and Dr. Medina had ordered him only barley water and bleeding, he drinks the cold water from the bath tub and is cured, proving the truth of the proverb, "For everything breathing water is medicine."

The father of medical humanists, Linacre was one of the early teachers of Greek in England; tutor of Prince Arthur, the Princess Mary, and of More and Erasmus; physician to Henry VIII; founder of the Royal College of Physicians; commentator and translator of Galen.

He wrote three works on Latin grammar.

He wrote three works on Latin grammar:

(i) 'Progymnasmata grammatices vulgaria', no date. A unique copy is in the B. M. It is probably

based on an earlier one.

(ii) 'Rudimenta grammatices' (a revision of i), Lond., no date. Translated into Latin by George Buchanan, Paris, 1533, there were ten editions in 30 years [cf. nos. 5062-3]. It was long a popular Latin grammar in France.

At home and abroad he was more than once imprisoned as a suspected Protestant, and after his return to Scotland about 1562, he joined the reforming party, became principal of St. Andrews, wrote against Queen Mary, and was tutor to the young King James. One of the glories of our profession, though he was not a titular doctor! Littré "passa par tous les degrés de l'externat et de l'internat dans les divers hôpitaux", but never took his degree. "Il est membre de l'Académie de Médecine, et il n'est pas docteur!" Financial difficulties!

Littré became one of the great scholars of Europe and the famous author of the 'Dictionnaire de la langue française', "cette œuvre gigantesque d'érudition et de critique littéraire". We owe him an immense debt for his Hippocrates (no. 147), the only complete edition of the Father of Medicine in any modern language. His 'Dictionnaire de médecine' (no. 7167) remains the standard work in French.

His life is an inspiration. In the touching devo-

tion to his father—see the beautiful dedication in vol. i of the Hippocrates—he reminds one of Pasteur. A noble man, and a true disciple of Hippocrates. "Bien qu'il n'ait pas prononcé le fameux Serment qui lie au sacerdoce médical, il le porte écrit dans son cœur."

as before he had to poetry" (Wood). At the Restoration he was made physician to Charles II and Principal of St. Mary Hall. He retired to High Wycombe in 1664, where he practised until his death. A monument to him is in the parish church.

A son of Gui Patin, Charles graduated in medicine at Paris in 1656. In the Letters of his father may be traced the stages of his successful career and its tragic termination, so far as Paris was concerned, by his expulsion from Prance in 1668 this incident see Bayle [no. 6883, iv, p. 505, who quotes the passage from Patin's autobiography, no. 6297, p. 91; also Pic, no. 5280, p. li].

He travelled for a time and then settled at Padua where he was made a professor of Medicina

Padua where he was made a professor of Medicine in 1677. He became widely known as an antiquarian, and is one of the most distinguished numismatists in the history of our profession. The books listed here give a good idea of the nature and extent of his studies. In Brucker's 'Miscellanea' (no. 6614, p. 508) is a letter from Patin's daughter, Charlotte Catherine, dated 23 Oct., 1693, giving particulars of his death (Oct. 10) after an illness of five months. His books are not common. Desgenettes (in no. 6641) and Eloy give the best bibliographies.

C. Patin's wife and their two daughters (cf. no. 5276) were learned women and members of the Accademia de' Ricovrati of Padua.

Gui Patin is unique in our annals. There is no ee for comparison. Scores of doctors have one for comparison. written letters; none save his remain as a permanent contribution to literature. Flourens (no. 751, p. 220) tells us why: "Gui Patin n'a réellement écrit que ses Lettres; et ces Lettres, malgré une hardiesse de pensée souvent excessive, malgré un langage souvent trop bas, malgré tant d'erreurs sur les choses, malgré tant de préventions sur les hommes, ces Lettres, expression brillante d'un esprit supérieur et d'une âme fière, le feront vivre; car il y a mis ce qui ne meurt point: le style."

Successor of Riolan (fils) in the chair of Medicine. and Dean of the Faculty in 1650 and '51, he contributed little or nothing to the literature of the profession. He was a brilliant lecturer, and all Paris flocked "à ses Thèses comme à une comédie". He is said to have resembled Cicero in visage and Rabelais in spirit. Devoted to Hippocrates and the ancients, he opposed all progress, and detested antimony and the chemists as much as the Jesuits and their bark. He was a devoted book-lover and collected a library of ten thousand volumes (see Letter of 30 Dec., 1650). He was the founder of the famous library of the École de Médecine, over the big reading room of which his picture presides.

The letters were written to intimate friends, Belin (père and fils) of Troyes and Falconet and Spon of Lyons, extending from 1630 to 1672. The MSS. which I have examined are in the Biblio-

thèque Nationale and the library of the École de Médecine. The former, MS. 9358, contains chiefly letters to the Belins; the latter, MS. 237, is a larger collection of about 460 letters, from 1652 to 1669. Many letters are from his contemporaries, and included are several of his consultations. There is an interesting note of the presentation of the volume to the library of the École de Santé, 1797, and an account by Pierre Sue of its reception. On p. 440 is the 'Billet de faire part de l'enterre-ment de Gui Patin à St. Germain-l'Auxerrois', I April, 1672—a long folio sheet headed with three skulls and cross-bones.

The letters were first published (196 of them) in 1683, at Frankfort; and there have been some fifteen editions (see Triaire, no. 5279, p. xv). They have never been critically edited; curious fatalities have followed the attempts of Formey and others (*ibid.*, p. vii), and Triaire himself, after issuing one volume of what promised to be a definitive edition, was cut off, leaving the work unfinished. It is the obvious duty of the Paris

Faculty to see that it is completed.

The letters are his life—a journal intime, from which one learns to forgive the bitter hater and the obstructionist, and to love the man for his spirit, his books and his friends.

No writings of the same rank have claimed a set curative purpose-and, one may add, no writings have the same therapeutic value! Rabelais begins the Prologue to Gargantua with "Drinkers very illustrious, and you very precious pockified Patients—for to you and no others are dedicated my Writings". To avoid a chill after a hard and profitless day hunters re-read the inestimable deeds of Gargantua—even applied locally they will cure a toothache! (Prologue to Pantagruel.) Poor pocky, gouty patients with rattling teeth and raucous throats find consolation in listening to some pages of the said book—no book with such "Virtues, Properties and Prerogatives... It is peerless, incomparable and without Paragon... More of it have been sold in two months than will be bought of bibles in nine years." (Ibid.) "Not less useful than delectable," says the Privilege of Francis I to the Third Book.

For the sick, the gouty and the unfortunate in their sore discomfort Rabelais had composed the Books, as he could not possibly take under his personal care all who needed his services. Contemplating the qualities of his physician, whether sour, morose and depressed, or serene, pleasant and smiling, so the patient is influenced by a transfusion of the spirits; and the author in making public these joyous Books gives joyous pastime to many sick and languishing of whom he cannot possibly take charge. The careful physician has but one end in view—not to depress his patient in any way whatever.

In his Introduction to this catalogue Sir W. Osler has told the story of his long-lost copy of the first ed., 1874. On finding it in the Redpath Library, McGill University, in 1910 he inscribed the following note:

"In 1875 I had a room with Mr. King, Beaver Hall Hill. When in Berlin in 187[3] I had ordered Schmidt's Lexicon. Knowing Mr. King's interest in everything Shakespearian I took it to him, and was delighted to see the eagerness and the joy with which he handled the book. I never saw it again until this morning. The old man avoided me for months. One day when he was ill I went up stairs to see him, and on another occasion I made what he called a 'magnificent cure of his giddiness' by removing a bit of wax which was in contact with the drum of his ear: but he was in contact with the drum of his ear; but he was never happy in my presence. He never spoke of the book, and I had not the heart to ask him for it. In the early years of the nineteenth century the threefold division—to which the three licensing bodies still bear witness-was well marked. Like the father of Arthur Pendennis, the apothecary kept a humble little shop with a gilt pestle and mortar over the door,* and "not only attended gentlemen in their sick-rooms, and ladies at the most interesting periods of their lives, but would

condescend to sell a brown paper plaster to a farmer's wife across the counter,—or to vend toothbrushes, hair-powder and London perfumery". As is told in this famous novel, he might evolve from the lowly stage into a general practice while still dispensing his own medicines, and, as in the case of Mr. Pendennis, the secret ambition to be a gentleman might finally be gratified. The apothecaries were the fair game of all the wits and wags. Their social position was well defined—with the upper servants. As Lady Chettam says in 'Middlemarch' (no. 4769), "I like a medical man more on a footing with the servants; they are often all the cleverer."

I love Dr. Thorne for his theory as to the happiness of children—"he argued that the principal duty which a parent owed to a child was to make him happy". Wise man!

The following similar cases are referred to in MS. notes by W. O.: A murderer hanged in 1583 was alive when the coffin was opened at Chirurgions' Hall (quoted by Wadd, no. 6513, p. 7, from Stow's Chronicle). In the 'Reminiscences of Glasgow' by Peter Mackenzie, 1865, vol. iv, there are some very interesting reminiscences of Pattison; "a bold, clever youth of Glasgow", he is called. In 1813 he is said to have been at the head of a band of students. A "secret bond of brotherhood" was entered into. They had a suite of rooms, an anatomy den, to which each had a key. The author gives a very interesting account of their resurrection work. The bodies were imported from Ireland, consigned to a rag merchant. On one occasion there was a great row, as the bodies were discovered there was a great row, as the bodies were discovered by the terrible smell.

Mackenzie gives a full account of the famous Mackenzie gives a full account of the famous Mearns case, in which they took the body in a gig, sitting up between them. The whole district appears to have been terrorized at the body-snatching. In the case of a Mrs. McAlister, the bones in the macerating vat were recognized as Mrs. M.'s by the dentist. Pattison was arrested, and, with Russell, his lecturer on surgery, and two students, was sent for trial at Edinburgh. The

body was sworn to as that of a virgin's, and they got off. Mackenzie relates a remarkable instance occurring in 1818 when the body of Clydesdale, the murderer, was handed over to Prof. Jeffray. A graphic account is given of how the body was placed in a sitting posture in a chair, a galvanic battery applied, and artificial respiration performed. The corpse opened his eyes, the tongue and the lips moved, and he stood up. There was Dr. Jeffray "pulled out his unerring lancet and plunged it into the jugular vein of the culprit, who instantly fell down upon the floor like a slaughtered ox on the blow of the butcher". He reports this instance as if an eye-witness.

Atkinson's letter, on editions of Apuleius, contains the following references to his Bibliography:

"In regard to my A: B: you may consider it amongst herds, as a sort of Lusus Naturæ, in Bibliography; not always to be defended... You mention C. D.—a burnt child dreads the fire, such an Enterprise occupied far too much time, and takes too much out of a man. Thus much I must own; that the numerous acknowledgements, from the only sources of Comfort, the real rubbers out of Bibliography, have much under recompensed me, for the dusty Books & those weary hours, which I spent, over my monomaniac, friends A. B."

Sir W. Osler's notes were evidently prepared for a projected paper; they include the following

fragment:

If we can imagine a conclave of bibliographers in the Elysian Fields presided over by Rabelais, one of the most welcome members would be a man who had done but little to make a great name, but who had, like the chairman, done more to enliven a dry subject than any other member of the assembly. The name of James Atkinson is probably unknown to a majority of my readers. He was quite unknown to me until I accidentally picked up a volume a few years ago, 'Medical Bibliography. A. and B.' The dedication which I here reproduce ['To all idle Medical Students in Great Britain sit—', with a picture of the sacrum] had a smack of the Curé of Meudon about it that promised much—and then that a man should publish a two-letter bibliography was in itself a stimulus... A preface by Kloss, prepared with a view to this Catalogue, was not printed. He connected only three of the items with Melanchthon; the rest was an obsession of the compiler, Samuel Leigh Sotheby (1805–61), whose *Melanchthomanie* Kloss repudiated with scorn in the Serapeum, Leipsic, 1841, vol. 2, pp. 369–77. In 1839 Sotheby issued a huge quarto with 34 plates, in which the penmanship of the reformer is represented as even more versatile than in these facsimiles! more versatile than in these facsimiles!

The Kloss library was the most important collection of early printed books ever made by a medical man. Kloss writes, in a letter quoted at p. xxii, "My Library has been collected in the course of eighteen years throughout the whole of Germany, and no single old library of importance has been its foundation"; he then mentions the most important collections which in whole or in most important collections which, in whole or in most important collections which, in whole of in part, were embodied. Two of the items are in this collection (nos. 238 and 4970). At the sale in 1835 the Bodleian got a great many important books at very low prices. A supplementary sale, with the library of Daniel Rich, was held on 17 Nov., 1835, and another on 18 June, 1841.

Born at Frankfort, the son of an army surgeon, Kloss early showed a fondness for collecting. Graduating from Göttingen in 1800 he was made.

Graduating from Göttingen in 1809, he was made extra-ordinary professor in the medico-chirurgical Lehranstalt, Frankfort, in 1812. In the Deutsche Klinik, 1850, he wrote of his service in the special hospital for syphilis and smallpox, of which he The remarkable collection of early was physician. was physician. The remarkable contection of early printed books was made by him for a revision of Panzer's 'Annalen', the materials for which are in the city library. An ardent freemason, he collected the literature and published a bibliography of freemasonry in 1844, a work on its origin and nature in 1846, and later one on freemasonry in England.

Watt was a native of Ayrshire. After a varied early career he took up medicine, becoming a licentiate of the Glasgow Faculty in 1799 and an M.D. of Aberdeen in 1810. He practised in Paisley and later in Glasgow, where he lectured on medicine. His 'Catalogue of Medical Books for the use of Students attending I catured and for the use of Students attending Lectures on the Principles and Practice of Medicine', Glasgow, 1812, now a very rare book, includes over 1,000 entries and is the catalogue of his own working library as well as the starting point of the 'Bibliotheca'. In 1808 he published a work on Diabetes (no. 4197), in 1813 'A Treatise on... Chincough', and in 1814 his anonymous 'Rules of Life' in 1,001 aphorisms. He was one of the founders of the Glasgow Medical Society and in 1814 became president of the Faculty.

His health impaired by work on the 'Bibliotheca', he withdrew from practice in 1817 and directed the compilation from his sick bed; but he died when only a few sheets had been printed the Principles and Practice of Medicine', Glasgow,

he died when only a few sheets had been printed off. The work, issued in parts between 1819 and 1824, "brought nothing but evil fortune to the off. The work, issued in 1824, "brought nothing but evil fortune to the Watt family. The author and his two sons were killed by it" and the Constables failed before they paid the widow the £2,000 agreed for it. in Scotland, England or Ireland, is unknown. commonly accepted date, 1274, probably should be abandoned for an earlier year. It is known that he was a Franciscan, and that the greater part of his life ... was passed at Oxford. In a letter of commendation, written by the General of his Order in 1304, he is already termed subtilissimus. He was then leaving for Paris, where, two or three years later, in 1307, he was made a Doctor. The following year he was sent

to Cologne, and there he died an enigmatical death on Nov. 8, 1308. Report has it that he was buried alive while in a trance. Probably there was little to tell of the life of Duns Scotus. His personality, as well as his career, seems completely included and exhausted in his works. Yet back of them, besides a most acutely reasoning mind, lay an indomitable will. The man never faltered in his labour any more than his reasoning wavered in its labyrinthic course to its con-clusions. His learning was complete: he knew the Bible and the Fathers; he was master of theology, of philosophy, of astronomy, and mathematics... No man ever drove either constructive logic or the subtil-ties of critical distinctions closer to the limits of human comprehension or human patience than Duns Scotus. The endless ramification and refinement of his dialectic, his devious processes of conclusion, make his work a reductio ad absurdum of scholastic ways of reasoning . . . Would you run a course with this master of syllogism? If you enter his lists, you are lost. The right way to attack him, is to stand without, and laugh. Niklas Khrypis or Krebs, de Cusa or Cusanus, son of a fisherman, was born at Cues on the Mosel, cated at Deventer and at Padua, and after filling minor ecclesiastical positions in Germany, and serving with great distinction at the Basel Council, was sent by Pope Eugene IV on a special mission to Constanti-nople. In 1448 he was made cardinal. A good Greek scholar, he brought back from the East many important MSS., chiefly mathematical, the translation of which into Latin he supervised. At Padua Toscanelli influenced the direction of his studies. He was the most distinguished modern predecessor of Copernicus, "Terra non potest esse fixa, sed movetur ut aliae stellae" (quoted by Heller, no. 5963, i, p. 216, from the Basel, 1565, ed.; cf. De docta ignorantia, bk. 2, ch. 11, in no. 7466). On his work in connection with the reform of the calendar (the 3rd tractate in this vol.) see Heller, ibid., p. 218. He was one of the pioneers in modern mathematical physics, and his studies on measure-ments and specific gravity are of the first importance; see the dialogue De staticis experimentis at the end of no. 7466. In this he records the famous experiment, antedating Hales 200 years, of weighing earth and seeds, then the resulting plants, their ashes, and the

earth in which they had grown.

Spiritually a man of wide vision, Nicholas was haunted by a dream of the possible union not alone of Latin and Greek Christians but of Mahometans, Jews and Gentiles. "Beneath all diversity of religious forms and ceremonies he descried one spirit, and in him is to be found the original of the saying, whose authorship has been so much disputed, 'Una est igitur religio et cultus omnium intellectu vigentium' [De pace fidei, leaf d 1]"; and he even suggested a Parliament of Religions for the establishment of religious concord (J. A. Smith, unpublished address; cf. also Webb,

no. 6526, p. 349).

There is an extensive literature on De Cusa; see the list in no. 3500, p. 10, and several works noted on a flyleaf at the end of this incunabulum.

For two reproductions of 16th-century pictures of supposed scenes in De Cusa's life see S. Reinach, Répertoire de peintures du moyen âge et de la renaissance, t. ii, 1907, p. 637. One is in the Church of Neustift, the other in the Augustinian Convent at Brixen, De Cusa's diocese.

"Johann Prüss was born in Württemberg in 1447. He is almost certainly the printer of some anonymous books, editions of the Leben der heiligen Altväter and of the Antichristus, with rude but striking wood-cuts, probably published in 1481 and 1482, but his signed and dated work begins with the Formulare of 1483. He used a few woodcuts in his later works, but did not make a speciality of book-illustration as Grüninger did after 1494. Vincent of Beauvais was a prodigious devourer of books, and for a sufficient pabulum St. Louis set before him his collection of twelve hundred volumes from him his collection of twelve hundred volumes, from which he compiled the most famous of mediaeval encyclopedias, employing in that labour enormous diligence and a number of assistants. The whole work, which he called Speculum majus, or Imago mundi, "containing in brief whatever, from unnumbered books, I have been able to gather, worthy of consideration, admiration, or imitation as to things which have been made or done or said in the visible or invisible world from the beginning until the end, and even of things to come" consisted of the Speculum naturale, doctrinale, and historiale; and a fourth, the Speculum morale, was added by a later hand (Taylor, no. 6481, ii, pp.

315 et seqq.).

The work was written at the Abbey of Royaumont, for an interesting description and history of which see no. 6416. Navarro, the author, who gives an account of the Scottish Women's Hospital, stationed in the Abbey during the Great War, says (p. 42), "It is not clear at what date Vincent de Beauvais became known to the French monarch, but it is a matter of record that from the year 1254 the eminent scholar and St. Louis were constantly in each other's company at Royaumont, then 'a seat of learning and study

In the Strasburg edition of Mentelin this colossal work, "one of the most prodigious tours de force in the realm of literature", forms six huge volumes, probably the largest of incunables. Separate volumes of the Corpus Christi Coll. (Oxon.) copy presented by the founder, Bishop Fox, the finest set of the Speculum I have seen, weigh from 26 to 29 lbs. each!

[ASPLIN (Jonas) 1771-]

7512. In English, on paper: written 1819-24 by J. Asplin: 8½×5½ in., xviii +496, viii +480, and xiv +418 pages.

Diary of an unnamed English physician practising in Paris and Versailles, from 1 Jan., 1819, to 31 Dec., 1824, with pr. insertions (newspaper clippings-in one of which, at p. 218 of vol. iii, he is referred to as Dr. Asplin—and a list of members of an English 'Medical Book Society 'in Paris, iii, p. 291b). There are a few brief notes on Paris clinics, and some descriptions of fêtes, fights, funerals, and executions (e.g. vol. i, p. 461, with sketch), but it is mainly a record of professional and social visits and of the weather.

References to his contemporaries at Edinburgh University identify the writer, a native of Wakering in Essex, with the Jonas Asplin who graduated in 1797 with thesis 'De ictero' ('List', no. 5843). Among his friends in Paris were the well-known physician Franz Xaver Swediaur (or Schwediauer, 1748–1824), whose autopsy he reports (iii, p. 320); Caesar Colclough (c. 1753–1822), formerly chief justice of Prince Edward Island; and Sir Howard

Douglas (1776–1861), governor of New Brunswick.

ASTROLOGY.

7513. In Latin, on paper: written in the 15th cent., perhaps in Spain: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6$ in., ii + 158 leaves: with coloured capitals.

'Summa judicialis astronomie': a Latin introduction to astrology, compiled from early Arabic writers, in three 'doctrinae' (foll. 3°, 6°, 30°), with prologue giving the title of the work (beg. 'In nomine Domini . . . incipit quaedam summa judicialis astro-nomie'): text beg. 'Cum fueris rogatus de aliqua re judicare'. Doctrina iii contains 145 chapters but ends imperfect 'in angulis impeditus, tunc dic quod prius', and chs. 65-67 and parts of chs. 64 and 68 are wanting

through the loss of a gathering after fol. 80. The writer, who appears to have been a converted Jew ('Habraham patriarcha pater noster', fol. 3), lived not earlier than the 14th cent. (see the references to Alphonso X, king of Castile, 1252-84, fol. 5, and to Guido Bonatus, fol. 2v); and the numerous marginal additions suggest that this MS. may be the author's autograph. At fol. 150 'secuntur aliqua amphorisma' [sc. aphorismi]: beg. 'Omnis questio in qua fuerit luna fortis'. There is a diagram of planetary houses on fol. 36v, and horoscopes on 63v

'Liber D. Grimani, cardinalis S. Marci' (1460-1523). Inserted: transcript of parts of foll. 2, 83,

87 and 98.
This MS. had come back from Maltby with the old binding repaired. I left it with another in the dining-room, and both were badly scorched in the fire, Nov. 1915 — the only two books of value damaged. The old parchment covers were curled and baked. W.O.

Several later notes, one (on the back of a playing card) dated 1759, are written on smaller, inserted leaves, and are by the same hand which inscribed in both vols.: 'Ex Libris Antonii Hervæi Desruaulx Doct. Med.'

BAGLIVI (Giorgio) 1668-1707.

Malpighi's name in the title and a list (foll. 323-4) have been added in later hands. The title-page of Baglivi's 'De Fibra motrice, et morbosa',

There are 9 letters from Malpighi and 12 from Redi, some of the latter's written between attacks of renal colic; also a draft of Baglivi's letter to the

Royal Society, 1698, on his election.

BASSET (GILLES).

The plates have a Paris and engraved. imprint, and include title-borders, diagrams, and portraits of saints, philosophers &c. These, and a printed table, appear to have been specially prepared for this course.

The lecturer was probably the Gilles Basset Des Rosiers who is credited with two anon. essays on comets, 1742 and (posthumous, by 'M. D. R.')
1747, in the Bibl. Nationale. The Collège d'Harcourt, now Lycée Saint-Louis, was founded in Paris in 1280.

BAVE (SAMUEL) 1588-1668.

7519. In Latin, on paper: written by Samuel Bave about 1629-37: 6×41 in., vii+320 and vii+280 leaves. In vellum binding.

The handwriting is that of Bave's commentary on Hippocrates, no. 174. More than half of vol. 2 is blank.

In 1632 Bave sent his daughter, aged 2, to London to be touched by the King for scrofula, with good results (i, foll. 163, 183v).

apothecary to St. Bartholomew's Hospital since 1661, and was awarded £25 in the plague year for his care of the patients in the absence of the physicians. In 1678 (the date of these vols.) he obtained his M.D. and was appointed assistant physician. His brother Charles (1650–1711) became surgeon to the Hospital in 1686. Both were learned men and collected notable libraries. See Moore, no. 6134, ii.

BERNARDUS de Gordonio, fl. 1285-1307.

Prefixed to this medical treatise is a 15th-cent. subject-index to the same, in Latin, from which A-D are now wanting, beginning at fol. iiiv.

BRIGHAM (AMARIAH) 1798-1849.

7526. In English, on paper: written by Amariah Brigham in 1829: 8\(\frac{3}{4}\times 6\)7 in., 91 and 113 leaves.

Journal of Amariah Brigham from Feb. to Aug. 1829, while on tour in Europe; 2 vols. (probably the 4th and 5th) descriptive of Italy and the voyage home; with a few rough sketches &c., and an 'Account of Yellow fever at Gibraltar 1828' (ii, foll. 104-7).

Brigham, a well-known alienist, was the first superintendent (1842) of the State Asylum, Utica, N.Y. He had previously practised at Greenfield, Mass., and (from 1831) at Hartford, Conn. His biographer, E. K. Hunt (in Gross's Lives, no. 6667, p. 525) describes this journal as consisting of 5 vols. beginning 16 July, 1828, and including his travels in England, Ireland, Scotland, France, Italy, &c.

It is extensively quoted by Hunt in the original biography, no. 2127, pp. 10-55.

The date of this 'Epistola' (art. i), if Perugia). really that of the original, is good evidence that he was in Paris in 1472. It opens with a touching lament for his daughter, 'laqual sola era a consolatione alegreza et substentamento della mia futura vechieza'—she had taken the veil—and there is a graphic account of a vision in which St. Francis appeared to him and reconciled him to the will of God. The letter from his pupil, Ogniben, gives no biographical information, or any confirma-tion of its date, 1478. Ortholanus, whom Christo-phorus quotes, was author of a 'Practica vera alkimica' which dates itself 1358.

originals but transcripts made for use of the Crown. The origin of the office is not settled. Brief allusions are found to 1194 and to the existence of the function in Magna Carta. Possibly the office goes back to the Anglo-Saxon period. In the 13th and 14th centuries there were four coroners in each county, elected by the commons. They were usually knights and served without reward, but certain privileges attached to the office such as exemption from jury duty &c. The office, such as exemption from jury duty &c. The tenure was for life. The function was not confined to investigating sudden and violent deaths, but the coroner was in a way the guardian of the peace. The mode of election to the office shaped, as it were,

that for the election to Parliament.

"Crowner's quest law" has not undergone many striking changes in modern times (p. xxxv). The Act of 50-51 Vic. repealed many old statutes; but many of the medieval features remain, e.g. the jurisdiction over treasure trove; and the wording of the jury's verdict has a medieval flavour.

Cruvel was born and educated at Montauban, spent a year in Geneva, and was appointed pro-fessor of philosophy in the Protestant Academy of Montauban in 1645. A year after his death there occurred a trifling quarrel between Protestant and Jesuit students which resulted in the destruction of the fortifications of Montauban, the removal of the University to Puylaurens, and the transference of the buildings to the Jesuits.

FRANCE. Military hospitals.

7559. In French, on paper: written in 1789-91 by various hands: 13 × 9 in., 99 leaves.

'Hopital Militaire de Bareges.' lection of documents and correspondence relating to the Hospital, 1789-91.

The records may be summarized as follows: Papers on the taking over of the Hospital at Barèges (in the Pyrenees), where patients— officiers, sous-officiers, soldats and matelots—went for the baths.

Lists of names of patients, regiments, dates of admission and discharge.

Letters from the Ministère de la Guerre about the buildings, expenses &c. Salaries are given. There was accommodation for 24 beds in one building, 17 in another, and more in billets.

7560. In French, on paper: written in the year 1793: 12½×8 in., 6 leaves.

FREIND (JOHN) 1675-1728.

7561. In English, on paper: written by John Freind (?) about 1727: 84×64 in., xviii+114 pages: in contemporary red morocco binding with gilt edges.

'Cicero's Lælius: or a Discourse upon Friendship. humbly inscrib'd to the Honored Mrs Clayton. ', with dedicatory epistle signed by the translator, John Freind. The title is in red and black, and the pages are ruled in red. A few pages at the beginning, and pp. 101-12 are blank.

Formerly in the possession of James T. Gibson Craig and (?) of Mrs. Ainslie, Parkside, Dorking. Bt. from J. and J. Leighton, 24 Oct., 1912 (lot 66 in their catalogue issued about that time). The same catalogue contains (lot 65) a transcript of a translation by Freind of 'Cicero's Cato Major', also inscribed to Mrs. Clayton, dated 1730 (i.e. two years after Freind's death), in similar style to the above. These two works, together with another volume, seem to have been lot 1264 in Sotheby's sale of the 2nd portion of the Gibson Craig library in 1888. They were then sold to Wm. Ridler

Freind was appointed physician to Queen Caroline in 1727. Charlotte Clayton, afterwards Lady Sundon, was bedchamber woman to Queen Caroline and had considerable influence at court -influence which, according to Freind's dedication,

had been exerted in his favour.

FRIEDREICH ([Nikolaus]) 1825-82.

7562. In German, on paper: written by N. Friedreich in 1857: 143×93 in., 22 leaves.

Notes by Prof. Friedreich, of Heidelberg, on the pathology of endocarditis (foll. 6-9) with sketches in pen and pencil and one coloured drawing, which is dated 1857 (fol. 4). Fol. 3 is a letter dated 18 Feb., 1897, from Dr. Augustus Charles Bernays, of St. Louis, to Dr. Osler, requesting him to edit the material. The rest of the volume is blank.

Notes by Bernays explain that Friedreich, his former teacher, gave him the MS. in 1876, suggesting that he publish it.

GLASGOW.

GORRICHEM (HENRICUS DE) -c. 1460.

7564. In Latin, on paper: written in the first half of the 16th cent. in the Netherlands: $8\frac{2}{5} \times 6$ in., ii +67 leaves: with coloured capitals.

'Incipit ordo exorcismorum contra morbum animalium vel hominum vel pecorum. Et contra omnia phitonizata': beg. Primo dicat sacerdos ymnum. Veni creator spiritus'. The author's name is given in the colophon (fol. 49) 'Explicit opus magistri Henrici Ghorisam', i.e. Gorrichem or Gorckum. At fol. 53 is a modern translation of specimen conjurations and exorcisms, and similar pieces, followed by lists of books on the subject.

Bought in 1915 from P. M. Barnard, Tunbridge

Wells (catal. 104, lot 123). Henricus Gorcomius or de Gorrichem (i.e. of Gorkum), a Dutch theologian, obtained his master's degree at Paris in 1418, and the next year went to Cologne, where he became Pro-cancellarius of the University. A list of his works and a brief note on his life are in Hartzheim, 'Bibliotheca Coloniensis', 1747, p. 119. [W. O.]

GREGORY (JAMES) 1753-1821.

7565. In English, on paper: written in 1787: 81×5 in., iv +76 pages.

'Notes taken from the clinical lectures of Dr James Gregory of Edinburgh in 1787.

Presented by Dr. G. A. Blumer, of Providence, in 1900.

7566. In English and Latin, on paper: written by J. Ramsey, Edinburgh, in 1798: 81× 51 in., x +372 pages.

'Cases in the Clinical Wards of the Royal Infirmary: Edinburgh under Dr Gregory. Vol: 1', under the writer's name 'James Ramsey, Edinburgh, Nov' 1, 1798' on fol. iii. Some cases are incomplete, the continuations being in a 2nd vol. which is not With index on pp. v-vii, 370-1.

This is a good picture of hospital practice in Edinburgh at the end of the 18th century. They are the notes of the house physician or possibly a clinical clerk. This MS. differs from the other Edinburgh Infirmary MSS., Rutherford's (no. 7621) and John Gregory's (no. 7568), which are notes of the clinical lectures. [W. O.] 7567. GREGORY (JOHN) 1724-73.

7568. In English, on paper: written in the last half of the 18th cent.: 81×61 in., ii +366 pages.

'Clinical Lectures By Dr. Gregory, Edinr. An. Dom. 1771. 2.' Notes of 22 lectures, numbered consecutively but dated irregularly; six are dated between 3 May and 19 June, 1773, i.e. after Gregory's death (see below), and in two others the year has been altered (pp. 103, 176). One or two lectures are incomplete. At p. 359, index of cases.

John Gregory died suddenly on 9 Feb., 1773, and these quasi-postmortem lectures, being in the nature of clinics on 'cases admitted since our last meeting', can scarcely be those which James, then a student, delivered from his father's notes during the remainder of the session! One '1773' lecture is on a case admitted in 1771 (p. 141), and in the last (p. 356) the lecturer says, 'I have now resigned... the Clinical Ward to my... colleague Dr. Cullen who is to continue the lectures'. This, in spite of the date, must be John Gregory, who gave the clinical course alternately with Cullen from 1768. It was taken over by Andrew Duncan, sr., in 1774 and by James Gregory about two years letter. later

Given me by Dr. Harvey Littlejohn, of Edinburgh, from his father's library.

John Gregory is remembered now chiefly for his 'Duties' (nos. 2830–1) and as the father of James. It is interesting to compare these with Rutherford's MS. lectures (no. 7621). [W. O.]

HAIGHTON (JOHN) 1755-1823.

7570. In English, on paper (watermarked 1811): written in 1815: 9\(\frac{3}{2}\times 7\(\frac{3}{2}\) in., ii +266 pages.

'Lectures on Physiology delivered in the Theatre at Guy's Hospital by John Haighton, M.D.', '1815' (added later); MS. completed at Ardwick, 11 Mar., 1815 (see p. 257).

Owned by P. H. Pye-Smith, 1879, who has written biographical notes inside the cover.

Haighton was a pupil of John Hunter. For his physiological experiments, which were certainly ruthless and numerous, he was called by his opponents 'the merciless Doctor' (see T. J. Mathias, 'Pursuits of Literature', 12th ed., 1803, pp. 419-20). A list of his papers is in the D. N. B. Evidently an able man, and a capable physiologist. [W. O.]

HALY ABBAS ['Ali ibn al-'Abbās al-Majūsī] -982.

7571. In Arabic, on paper: written in the 3rd quarter of the 17th cent.: 11½×8 in., ii +234+ii+233 leaves.

The Kāmil sinā'at al-tibb (complete art of medicine) or al-Malikī (the Royal Book); copied by 'Abdu'l-Laṭīf ibn Muḥammad. 2 parts in 1 vol. Finished (pt. ii) in A.H. 1067, i.e. A.D. 1656, but pt. i is stated to have been finished in A.H. 1078, i.e. A.D. 1668.

Bought from the copyist by Muhammad ibn Mahummad al-Wafāi ' for himself and for whom God will after him '.

See no. 2887; and Browne, no. 448, pp. 109, 123.

HARPHIUS [DE HERP or ERP] (HENRICUS) -1478.

7572. In Latin and English, on paper: written about 1915 at Oxford: 13×8 in., i+8+15 leaves.

A modern transcript by Miss E. G. Parker (from a copy made by Andrew Boorde in the London Charterhouse about 1520 and now MS. Douce 262 in the Bodleian Library) of the 'Directorium quoddam breuissimum mentis in Deum ad consequendam vite perfectionem, fratris Henrici Herpe ordinis minorum de obseruantia', or, as it is termed in the colophon, 'Exercitium amoris vnitiui', a religious mystical treatise in 7 chapters; followed in a second hand by a translation of the same into English. The suggestion made by the Rev. H. O. Coxe and Mr. F. Madan 'Directorium brevissimum' is a that this translation made from the Dutch by Petrus a Blomenenna (rectius Blomevenna) is due to its confusion with another of Herp's works, the much longer ' Directorium aureum contemplationum '

In the Douce MS. 'The dyvyne Cloude of Unknowyng', a devotional treatise in English, occupies the first 132 folios. Then follow three

little treatises copied by Andrew Boorde; (1) on fol. 132°, a treatise on repentance, beginning 'When a soll begynyth to fele grace'; (2) on fol. 134, the 'Directorium' (here copied); (3) on fol. 139°, 'The Pystell of privat councell' beginning 'Gostly frende in gode'. On fol. 1 of the MS. is 'Liber domus Salutacionis Matris Dei prope Londinium Ordinis Carthusie'—the Charterhouse; the cataloguer adds 'about A.D. 1500' and says the Boorde MSS. were added about 1520, which would be while he was still in the monastery.

Brother Henry Herp was a Flemish mystic whose works were very popular. The 1474 'Speculum aureum' [printed by Peter Schöffer at Mainz] is a noble volume of sermons. In the 'Theologica mistica D. Hen. Harphii', 1601, p. 567, is a chapter which begins like this little treatise, but it is not

the same throughout.

Boorde's restless spirit was "nott able to byd the rugorosyte off your relygyon", as he wrote to the Prior—see his letter in the Life by Furnivall in no. 2084, p. 47; but these three tractates testify to a longing for a mystical union which the burden of the flesh did not permit him to enjoy. Any one wishing an insight into what Sir Thomas Browne calls Christian annihilation should read chapter vi of the 'Directorium', leaf 7 of the translation in this MS. Perhaps in the Fleet prison the broken spirit of the weary and worn traveller found comfort and consolation in the words of Brother Herp—I like to think so!

Lot 44 in Sotheby's catal., 17 June, 1915, where it is described as the original MS. It appears to be an early MS. copy of the first 1644 printed ed. (no. 4933), the title-page of which is imitated line for line.

HOOPER (ROBERT) 1773-1835.

7574. In English, on paper &c.: prepared by R. Hooper in the earlier part of the 19th cent.: 6 portfolios, 16×123 in.

Collection of original coloured and other drawings of pathological specimens formed by Robert Hooper.

HOOPER contd.

Contents:—i, The Uterus: 21 plates with printed explanations, pp. 39–67, published in 1832, proof plates and original drawings; also 12 drawings apparently not published. ii, The Brain: proofs (and most of the original drawings) of 15 plates published in 1826; also 10 other drawings. iii, Alimentary System: 123 pp. of MS. text, 51 drawings and 1 plate. iv, Respiratory System: 21 pp. of MS. text and 18 drawings. v, Heart: 36 pp. of MS. text and 25 drawings arranged to make 17 plates. vi, Urinary System and Miscellaneous: 28 pp. of MS. text and 22 drawings.

Hooper entered Pembroke College, Oxford, in 1796 and graduated M.B. in 1804. He was the author of a number of text-books (see list in the D. N. B.). He lectured on medicine for many

D. N. B.). He lectured on medicine for many years, and formed a large collection of specimens. In 1826 he published 'The Morbid Anatomy of the Human Brain', and in 1832 'The Morbid Anatomy of the Human Uterus'.

This collection of original drawings, formed with a view to the continuation of the series, was given to me by my friend Professor Greenfield of Edinburgh, who bought them at auction some years ago. There are engravings and drawings of the sections published in 1826 and 1832, and numerous coloured drawings, often with descriptive MS., for the proposed sections on the Alimentary, Respiratory, Circulatory, and Urinary Systems.

At any time a selection of the best of the coloured drawings could be framed and put in the appro-

priate sections of the Museum.

HOPE (THOMAS CHARLES) 1766-1844.

7575. In English, on paper: written between 1801 and 1848: 83×5½ in., x+780 and

ix +769 pages. Lectures on Chemistry by Thomas Charles Hope, University of Edinburgh, 1801, with a few figures. In 2 vols. Probably transcribed at a much later date by R. H. Brabant, whose name occurs at the beginning of each vol., and who graduated M.D. in 1821 (no. 5843, p. 64); presented to 'Mr. Solly' by the transcriber in 1848. Written on one side of the paper.

Bought in Jan. 1917.

T. C. Hope, professor of chemistry at Edinburgh from 1795 to 1842, was the son of the professor of botany, John Hope (1725–86). Both were good friends to American and colonial students. The collection of theses by American students in Edinburgh, which I bought in 1902, came from the Hope family, and many of them are specially bound presentation copies (see note to no. 2278). Hope was a student of Lavoisier and joint pro-

fessor of chemistry with Black from 1795 to 1799. He was a very popular teacher. He published very little, but MS. copies of his lectures are not un-

common.

Mr. Solly, the former owner, was probably Samuel (1805-71), the well-known St. Thomas's Hospital surgeon, whose son Edward Solly (a good friend of mine) practised for many years at Colorado Springs and did good work in tuberculosis.

HUTTEN (ULRICH VON) 1488-1523.

7577. In English, on parchment: written about 1539: 12½×8½ in., v+65 leaves: with coloured capitals, &c.

' Of the wood called Guaiacum that healeth the Frenche pockes... compiled by Vlryche Hutten knyghte'; with 'the preface of Thomas Paynell, chanon of Marten abbey, translatour of this boke', dated 'at Marten abbey, 1533', and a table of chapters; the whole copied from Thomas Berthelet's printed ed. of 1539; imperfect through the loss of a gathering after fol. 55 (representing fol. 61, line 3, to fol. 67, line 11, of the 1533 ed.) as well as of the three last leaves: ends 'But loo here cometh an nother to' (1533 ed., fol. 77, l. 2). On fol. iiiv another hand has written 34 lines from the Regimen Salernitanum (beg. 'Anglorum regi scripsit schola tota Salerni'); fol. iiir bears an English poem of 22 lines (beg. 'Three score & ten the age and life of mon') ' written & ten, the age and life of man') 'written the 3° of Nouembr. 1638'.

'Peeter Shearde' has written his name in several parts of the volume, and on fol. iv is 'John Sharde', both 16th cent. Bought from Pickering and Chatto, catal. 144, lot 4201.

7578. In English (with Latin certificate), on parchment: written in 1700: 16 ft. 3½ in. × 51 in., a roll, cased.

Inventory of the contents of an unnamed surgeon's house and surgery, valued at £106. 8. 0, with records of other assets, including 'a mortgage of some houses in Horsley Downe'; dated 30 Sept., 1700, and signed Tho: Welham Regus Deptus; imperfect at beginning. On 7 strips of vellum fastened together in a roll; each section is stamped with two sixpenny stamps.

JOHANNES JACOBI, -1384.

7579. In Latin, on paper: written early in the 15th cent. in the South of France: 111 x 8½ in., iv +210 leaves, in double columns: with coloured capitals and one small miniature (see below).

'Tractatus varii de rebus medicis' (18th-

cent. title) :-

i (fol. 1). 'Incipit liber medicalis qui dicitur Copiosa, ex libris antiquorum collectus', consisting of a prologue (beg. 'Cum animaduerterem quod quamplures medici cirurgici') and the 4 summae of pars prima; text beg. 'Sublimis creator Deus ex iiijor elementis corpus humanum condidit '. anonymous author, who probably belonged to the school of Montpellier (see foll. 13^v, 19), dedicates his work 'ad laudem et honorem regis Karoli secundi', i.e. Charles the Bad (1332-87), king of Navarre and lord of Montpellier. The treatise is unfinished: six parts are promised in the prologue, viz. on Membra (1) consimilia, (2) animata, (3) spiritualia, (4) nutritiva, (5) generativa et expulsiva, and (6) on simple and compound medicines; but only part 1, dealing with skin lesions and surgery, is here, and even that is incomplete, lacking part of tractatus ii, and tractatus iii and iv of summa IV (but see art. iii below). The hand changes at fol. 9 and again at fol. An 'index capitulorum' has been added in a slightly later hand at fol. 184. The miniature, 3 ×4 cm., depicts a surgeon trephining with the formidable trepan of Guy de Chauliac which is illustrated in Gurlt (no. 5942), vol. ii, pl. VI, fig. 22; and there are several pictures of surgical instru-

ments in the text.

ii (fol. 195). 'Incipit tractatus contra beg. 'Ad honorem et indiuidue trinitatis . . . volo aliqua de pestilencia scribere'. The author's name is given in the colophon—'Et hec dicta per me Johannem Jacobi sufficiant causa breuitatis, anno domini M°CCC°LXXIJ, die iij° Februarii, in preclaro studio Montis Pessulani Then follow prescriptions for pills (fol. 196v), notes on children's ailments (fol. 197), and

an account of dentifrices (fol. 199).

iii (fol. 200). An anonymous tractate on poisons: beg. 'Qui timet quod in potu sumat uenenum'; this is perhaps tractatus iv summae IV of art. i. On fol. 208v are some added 'versus duodecim signorum'.

The watermarks of the paper are 11,677 (Lyons, 1392) and 11,859 (Montpellier, 1402, &c.) in Briquet, no. 6931. Foll. i-iii, 188-94,

198, 209-10 are blank.

'Ex museo Marchionis de Sterlich', 18th cent. Bought from L. Lubrano, Naples, 1913. No mention has been found of this 'Copiosa', art. i; though Vigo may have borrowed its title, if nothing else, for part I of his Chirurgia (see no. 4173). The unknown author in his prologue

naïvely confesses that he has suppressed his name so as not to prejudice readers against his book! Its casual occurrence here in the same MS. with the plague tract of Johannes Jacobi, and the probability that the latter was unpopular at Montpellier, having been appointed chancellor by the bishop in 1364 over the head of the duly elected candidate, are of course insufficient reasons for a second tractions have been appointed to the course of the duly elected candidate, are of course insufficient reasons for a second traction. associating him with the 'Copiosa'. Art. ii is Johannes Jacobi's 'De pestilentia' in the early version, of which a critical text is given by Sudhoff in his 'Pestschriften nach der Epidemie des Schwarzen Todes 1348', Arch. f. Gesch. d. Med., 1925, vol. 17, pp. 16-32. Other dated MSS. give a later year of composition, 1373 or 1376. An augmented version, the one frequently printed, was wrongly ascribed in the 15th cent. to Knutsson (see no. 3084; also Mrs. Singer, no. 6448, pp. 21-6).

LACY (JOHN) 1664-c. 1737.

7580. In English, on paper: written by several hands in the first quarter of the 18th cent .: 6 × 4 in., 176 leaves: in contemporary leather binding.

Record and letter book by the followers of John Lacy, the pseudo-prophet, dealing with spiritualistic matters and containing extracts from letters of 'Brother Timothy &c., addresses &c. of Lacy, and references to Elias Marion, Calamy and others. At fol. 167, 'A full and True Relation of ye strang & wonderfull Apparition[s] which were seen in ye Clouds . . . ye 6th and 7th of March, 1715-16... To which is added, Dr fflamstead's Opinion concerning every individual point '.

'Robert Scott, His Book. 1732.' (fol. 174"). Bought from Maggs Bros., Oct. 1915 (catal. 340,

lot 1992).
"The Camisards, who escaped from France early in the 18th century and took refuge in England, where they were known as the French Prophets, where they were known as the French Fronners, prophetised and worked miracles, preached communism, and heralded the advent of a Messiah" (W. D. Wallis, 'Messiahs: Christian and pagan', Boston, 1918, p. 163). John Lacy, born at Saffron Walden, fell under the influence of these French prophets. "Calamy and others who witnessed the prophetic terrific to his physical existation in 'qualecstasies testify to his physical agitation in 'quaking', and describe his utterances as preceded by much hiccoughing, gasping, sighing and groaning, and, though perfectly articulate, broken and unnatural' (D. The 'Consilium' on fol. 17 is an imitation of the famous 'Regimen Salernitanum' (no. 3874), and begins 'Jeiuna, vigila, caleas dape, tuque labora'. Marbeck (or Merbeck) was student of Christ Church in 1552, M.A. 1558, first public orator 1564, canon of Christ Church, and provost of Oriel 1565. An unfortunate marriage forced him to resign all his offices. In 1573 he became B.M. and on the following day D.M. of Oxford—apparently the only instance on record. (My own D.M. was even more rapid; I matriculated, paid the fee, and half an hour later the D.M. by decree was conferred—cf. no. 3585, note 2.) Marbeck was the first resistant of the College of Daysies and which cf. no. 3585, note 2.) Marbeck was the first registrar of the College of Physicians, and chief physician to the Queen. His account of the expedition of Lord Howard against Cadiz is printed, without his name, in Hakluyt's Voyages, 1599, i, 607. 'A Defence of Tobacco, with a friendly answer to a late printed Booke called Worke for Chimny Sweepers', 1602, is assigned to Marbeck Chimny Sweepers', 1602, is assigned to Marbeck because his name appears in an acrostic forming the dedication. In the letter to Harvey the use of the term motus & circuitus', which Mayerne applies to the peccant humours, is perhaps a sly compliment. Letters of some personal interest are two to his nephew (Sir) John Colladon, whom he advises, in 1636, never to treat plague patients except from a good distance to windward, lest he lose favour with the noblesse, and not to divulge the secret remedy he has sent him (p. 148).

The style of writing suggests an earlier date than that of Monro tertius, and at the beginning of lecture ii there is reference to a change in the arrangements ' from some years ago'. Monro secundus was also much interested

in comparative anatomy.

MS. lecture note-books of the late 18th and early 19th centuries are common, particularly those of the Edinburgh teachers and of the Hunters in The professors repeated year by year London. the same lectures, often without change, and a good set would be copied and passed on from one student to another, a custom which prevailed when I was a student at McGill, 1870-2. A set of 'Mickie's' (MacCallum's) was in use that had been taken 8 or 10 years before.

Surgeons' indentures are rare. There are none

in Bodley.

Edward Osler was my father's eldest brother. After serving his apprenticeship he went to the United Hospitals of Guy's and St. Thomas's and took the M.R.C.S. A number of his letters are in vol. 5 of the family papers at Toronto [cf. no. 3593]. One letter, written while he was a dresser, and describing the famous case of ligature of the abdominal aorta [cf. no. 7604], I had framed and sent to the Wills Library at Guy's Hospital. For seven years he was house surgeon of the Swansea Infirmary and afterwards practised at Truro.

A table of contents is at p. 3; two prescriptions by 'Doctor Maccullo' have been added on p. 190 in the same hand as the treatise; and there are later entries on pp. 9, 190.

'Alexander Hendersone with my hand', 16th cent. Owned also by David Laing (d. 1878) and Sir_J. Y. Simpson.

The second book is taken from the English translation of the commentary on the 'Regimen' of Salerno (compare p. 22 of the MS. with leaves 2^v–4^v of no. 3875), and much of the third book resembles Phaer's 'Regiment of Lyfe' (no. 3668), which is derived—ultimately—from the same source.

Sinhalese MSS. are written on tough, papyruslike strips, prepared from the immature, unopened fronds of the talipot and palmyra palms. Each strip, or leaf, is engraved on both sides with a sharp stylus, then inked over and wiped off, leaving the pigment only in the scratched lines. The olas, or books, under 3 in. in height, but varying in breadth from a few inches to 3 ft., consist of a bundle of oblong leaves between two covers, and are held together by a cord which is secured at one end to a button or medallion, is passed through perforations in the covers and leaves, and is then wound round the book. The covers are usually of wood, plain, carved or painted, rarely of silver or ivory, and the button of horn (as here), ivory, metal, crystal or wood.
