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
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
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ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Percy Erskine Nobbs and his Associates: A Guide to the Archive is the first in a series of guides to the Canadian Architecture Collection (CAC), a repository of over 50 000 drawings, as well as photographs, business and personal records, which document the history of Canadian architecture.

The origins of the Collection can be traced to the measured drawings and photographs of Quebec buildings made by Ramsay Traquair during his tenure as the Macdonald Professor of Architecture at McGill University (1913-39). Together with a selection of British architectural drawings once used as teaching aids in the School of Architecture, student sketches, illustrated reports on local buildings and an assortment of professional drawings of architects formerly active in Montreal, the Traquair bequest provided an impetus to seek other architectural archives, particularly those connected with Montreal and Quebec. In the post-war years, two collections of great significance to the history of Canadian architecture were integrated into the Canadian Architecture Collection: in 1954, the professional archives of Edward and W.S. Maxwell and in 1970, the archives of Percy Nobbs and his associates. The Nobbs material was given to the Library by Francis J. Nobbs at the time the contents of his father's house, 38 Belvedere Road, were dispersed. It consists of the work of Percy Erskine Nobbs (1897-1910); George Taylor Hyde (1907-10); Nobbs and Hyde (1910-44); Nobbs and Valentine (1945-50); and Nobbs and Nobbs (1950-60). Five hundred and twenty-six projects are documented in the Nobbs Archive. Since 1969 the Canadian Architecture Collection has been housed in Nobbs's extension to the Redpath Library Building, under the administration of the Blackader-Lauterman Library of Architecture and Art. To the Honorary Curator of the collection, Professor Emeritus John Bland, belongs the credit for uniting and preserving this important legacy. Director of the School of Architecture from 1941 to 1972, Professor Bland devoted part of his distinguished career to collecting Canadian architectural records. His dedication in helping to make the CAC accessible to scholars, researchers and students of Canadian architecture cannot be overemphasized. Professor Bland's erudition and determination were instrumental at every stage of the project. The vision was primarily his.

Both the Library and the University Administration have greatly contributed to the success of our efforts. Miss Marianne Scott, National Librarian and a former Director of McGill Libraries, arranged for the preliminary survey of the Collection and also collaborated with us on the first successful application for grant funding. Dr. Hans Möller, the present Director and a co-director of the project, has provided tremendous support as well as the necessary funding for the publication and dissemination of the Nobbs inventory. Professor Derek Drummond, Director of the School of Architecture from 1976 to 1984, made possible the preliminary sorting of drawings, while Sam Kingdon, Director of Physical Resources, supported the CAC by giving us the much-needed archival shelving.

The joint commitment and recognition, within the University, of the considerable importance of the CAC as a research resource made it possible to apply for and obtain two major grants through the Canadian Studies Research Tools Program of the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRCC) in order to organize and describe the entire Collection and to make it physically and intellectually accessible. We deeply appreciate the major contribution made by SSHRCC to the implementation of this project.

Over the past three years, a number of contributors and editors have shared their knowledge, enthusiasm and talents to produce our first inventory. These were: architect Isaac Lerner (co-ordination of the archival arrangement and description of drawings); architecture student Kiriaki Athanassiadis

(arrangement and description of drawings); architect Maureen McAuley (writing and co-editing of the inventory) and librarian Jane Devine (bibliography and computer co-ordination). Their dedication and excellent team work are deeply appreciated.

Technical assistance, throughout the different stages of the project, has been provided by Systems Analyst Anna Perlin and librarian Elaine Waddington, as well by library staff members, Wes Cross and Anastasia Khouri-St.Pierre.

On the Advisory Board, Susan Wagg, art historian and author of the monograph Percy Erskine Nobbs: Architect, Artist, Craftsman, shared both her outstanding knowledge of the architect and her editorial skills with the contributors. Of great help was Dr. Faith Wallis, History of Medicine Librarian, who conducted the preliminary survey of holdings and later provided archival supervision over the project.

I am particularly grateful to Carol Marley, Map Curator of the Department of Rare Books and Special Collections who, during my sabbatical year, took on the challenge of heading both the Blackader-Lauterman Library and the CAC project and who was instrumental in formulating our second successful application for grant funding.

Dr. Marcel Caya, the University Archivist, provided valuable advice throughout the project and was particularly helpful in the initial planning stages. Julia Parker and later Dr. Raymonde Gauthier, shared with us their professional expertise on behalf of the Centre canadien d'architecture / Canadian Centre for Architecture (CCA). REMERCIEMENTS

Percy Erskine Nobbs et ses associés: guide du fonds est le premier d'une série de guides de la Collection d'architecture canadienne (CAC), mine de plus de 50 000 dessins, photographies, archives commerciales et personnelles qui illustrent l'histoire de l'architecture canadienne.

Les origines de cette collection remontent aux relevés et aux photographies d'immeubles du Québec réalisés par Ramsay Traquair alors qu'il était titulaire de la chaire Macdonald d'architecture à l'université McGill (1913-39).

Allié à une sélection de dessins architecturaux britanniques qui servirent jadis de matériel didactique à l'École d'architecture, à des esquisses d'étudiants, à des rapports illustrés sur des immeubles locaux et à tout un assortiment de dessins d'architectes qui ont fait carrière à Montréal, le legs Traquair nous a incité à rechercher d'autres archives architecturales, liées notamment à Mon réal et à Québec. Dans les années de l'après-guerre, deux collections revêtant une grande importance pour l'histoire de l'architecture canadienne sont entrées dans la Collection d'architecture canadienne: en 1954, les archives professionnelles d'Edward et W.S. Maxwell et en 1970, les archives de Percy Nobbs et ses associés. La collection Nobbs a été offerte à la bibliothèque par Francis J. Nobbs à l'époque où l'on a dispersé le contenu de la maison de son père, située 38 chemin du Belvédère. Cette collection regroupe des dessins de Percy Erskine Nobbs (1897-1910); de George Taylor Hyde (1907-10); de Nobbs et Hyde (1910-44); de Nobbs et Valentine (1945-50); et de Nobbs et Nobbs (1950-60). Cinq cent vingt-six projets sont illustrés dans les archives Nobbs.

Depuis 1969, la Collection d'architecture canadienne est située dans l'annexe Nobbs de l'édifice de la bibliothèque Redpath et est placée sous l'administration de la bibliothèque Blackader-Lauterman d'architecture et d'art. C'est au conservateur honoraire de la collection, le professeur émérite John Bland, que revient le crédit d'avoir su regrouper et préserver ce legs important. Directeur de l'école d'architecture de 1941 à 1972, M. Bland a passé une partie de son éminente carrière à collectionner des archives architecturales canadiennes. On ne saurait trop insister sur sa volonté de rendre accessible la CAC aux érudits, aux chercheurs et aux étudiants s'intéressant à l'architecture canadienne. L'érudition et la détermination du professeur Bland ont été d'un apport inestimable tout au long du projet. C'est à lui qu'appartient avant tout la vision de ce projet.

Et la bibliothèque et l'administration de l'université ont considérablement contribué au succès de nos efforts. PERCY ERSKINE NOBBS: BIOGRAPHY

Percy Erskine Nobbs was born 11 August 1875 in his mother's family home at Haddington, Scotland. He spent his childhood in Russia, one of the third generation of an English family resident in St. Petersburg since shortly after Waterloo and highly respected there. In this way he received his first artistic instruction at the School of Design, St. Petersburg. At twelve he was enrolled in the Edinburgh Collegiate School and from there, in 1893, proceeded to Edinburgh University where, under the direction of Professor Gerald Baldwin Brown, he obtained the MA in 1896. Desiring to be trained as an architect, he became a pupil of Robert Lorimer, the gifted Scottish architect who by nature and training was a leader in the Arts and Crafts movement. Lorimer had been a pupil of Rowand Anderson in Edinburgh, but before beginning his practice he spent eighteen months in London with George Frederick Bodley, where he was in close touch with William Morris and Philip Webb. Lorimer was Nobbs's ideal as can be seen in both architects' delight in the right use of materials, in traditional forms, in heraldry, and in other meaningful ornament, but above all in their appreciation for the art of craftsmen who contribute so greatly to the quality of buildings.

While Nobbs was at school and at university in Edinburgh, he attended classes in drawing and technical subjects at Heriot Watt College and the School of Applied Art.⁴ There are items in the CAC that pertain to this time - measured drawings of ancient buildings, decorative iron work, and sketches of objects in the Edinburgh Museum of Science and Art.⁵ In addition there is a photograph in the Nobbs Archive of an heraldic lion carved in stone from the gateway to Balcarres, a Lorimer house built when Nobbs was in the office, bearing the initials PEN.

Nobbs passed the Royal Institute of British Architects' examinations in 1900 and in the same year won the Tite Prize for the design of an isolated clock tower, a traditional composition in which no detail of construction was omitted.⁶ The Tite Prize was spent in Italy sketching, measuring, and drawing. The expedition is recorded in an essay entitled "Why go we to Italy" published with fifteen illustrations in the Builders Journal and Architectural Record in 1901.⁷ Six items from this experience are in the CAC, while other drawings and sketches from the trip appeared in several journals in the following years.⁸

In 1901 Nobbs was employed in the Fire Brigade Branch of the London County Council, where he had the opportunity of seeing a social dimension of architecture - the mass accommodation problems of a great city. This concern remained with him throughout his professional life, evidenced by reports and outline schemes for public housing and planning and particularly by the neat, economical school buildings he designed in Montreal before the First World War. In 1901 Nobbs submitted designs for the Soane Medallion and the Owen Jones Studentship, obtaining second prize in the latter. In the following year he tried for both again and this time won the Owen Jones Studentship for the design of a richly ornamented Romanesque church. However, the Soane Medallion once again eluded him. The Soane competition in 1902 was for the design of a city church, and although only one of Nobbs's drawings for it is in the CAC, others were published in the *British Architect*, so that this proposal, too, can be fully examined.9

Nobbs's exceptional ability to draw, which so evidently contributed to his success in winning prizes and having his drawings published, made him a desirable assistant in offices dependent upon winning competitions. In this way he became busy devilling night and day, and it seems that the idioms of the competition judges his employers sought to please joined those of his earlier masters in his architectural vocabulary. This tendency, evident in his second Soane submission, was likely seen by Lorimer, who made him promise to stop

hacking for architects in London and to work only for himself. ¹⁰ Perhaps feeling the same way, another old friend and teacher from Edinburgh, Gerald Baldwin Brown, found an occasion to get him out of London by recommending him to William Peterson, who was seeking a replacement for Stewart Henbest Capper to head the School of Architecture at McGill.

In 1903 Nobbs came to McGill to teach as Capper had done, 11 but very soon he felt it necessary to practise to demonstrate what architecture is, being doubtful that it could be explained well enough by words and pictures. some hesitation McGill agreed that he might do so, but only in association with a practising architect. These first years of practice were marked by great activity. The McGill University Union (now the McCord Museum), undertaken in association with Hutchison and Wood, was his first Canadian work. The sketches, presentation and working drawings, details, and furniture drawings in the CAC document the development and scope of Nobbs's design. In every respect, the building remains a demonstration of compositional elegance and constructional good sense, consistently carried out, and a joy to experience. His second work, in association with David R. Brown, was a house for Dr. C.W. Colby. This wifollowed by a house for Dr. J.B. Porter, in association with Cecil Burgess. Both houses have vanished along with the life they were intended to serve, but drawings and photographs show that each had individual charm, well fitted to its particular setting and looking handsome to passers-by. During this time Nobbs assessed competitions for the Halifax Cathedral, the Alexandra Hospital, the Nurses Home of the Royal Victoria Hospital, and the new Medical Building at McGill.¹² Then in 1907, after a destructive fire in April, the Macdonald Engineering Building had to be rebuilt immediately. Nobbs redesigned the structure and supervised its construction, working daily with Sir William Macdonald, the donor and a Governor of McGill. In the following year the architect helped with the final revisions for the Parliament Building in Edmonton. He prepared a program for a similar building in Regina and, in a different vein, amazed his colleagues by winning a silver medal in a foils display at the Olympic Games in London. He was a swift and well co-ordinated athlete with a zest for competition, qualities likely related to his exceptional ability to see accurately and to draw with sureness.

In 1909 Nobbs was elected an Associate of the Royal Canadian Academy, married Mary Cecilia Shepherd, and became well established in the life of Montreal. His professional involvement and completed works fully demonstrated his ability as an architect and the wisdom of extending his practice and reducing his teaching activities. At the end of 1909 he tendered his resignation as director of the School of Architecture. In the following year he was elected a Fellow of the Royal Institute of British Architects and formed a partnership with George Taylor Hyde, commencing the practice that is almost entirely documented in this collection and which continued until Hyde's death in 1944. During all but the last four years of this period, Nobbs combined his practice with a less demanding appointment as Professor of Design at McGill.

In the early years of Nobbs's practice with Hyde, prior to the onset of World War I, the firm designed many houses for individual clients, including several groups of houses for T.P. Howard and Thomas Lamb and a delightful country house, garden, and outbuildings for Dr. J.L. Todd. While all of these showed Nobbs's mastery in architectural composition, a splendid building for the University Club of Montreal gave him special opportunities to work with a variety of materials and to exploit the applied arts. An heraldically ornamented plaster ceiling, stained glass windows, a graceful elliptical stair, and several decorated fireplaces are but some of the masterpieces of design and craftsmanshop in the club. Moreover, furniture and fittings, either designed or selected by the architect, make the interiors exceptionally harmonious.

Three schools, Edward VII, Strathearn, and Peace Centennial, designed for the

Protestant Board of School Commissioners of Montreal, were practical and comely buildings that combined ideal space and natural light standards required for children with some spirited patriotic symbols and an exploratin of the language of form and ornament that so fascinated Nobbs. Two works for Henry Birks and Sons, a combined silver factory and office building in Montreal and a remodelled store and offices in Winnipeg, and the Canadian head office of the Liverpool and London and Globe Insurance Company revealed the firm's skill in handling impressive commercial architecture with style and telling ornament.

A breathtaking proposal for student residences, stadium, and gymnasium and drill hall at McGill and a comprehensive plan for the new University of Alberta showed hitherto unexplored dimensions in grouping buildings in Canada. Only the McGill stadium and the Arts Building and two laboratories at the University of Alberta were completed before war broke out. In 1913 Nobbs built a house for himself on a challenging site on Montreal's Mount Royal with an ideal exposure and magnificent views, to all of which he made a characteristic response in brick and slate, massing his composition about a central chimney and arranging the simply treated windows to capture the right light for the right purpose throughout the day.

Furniture and fittings for Liverpool and London and Globe and for the remodelled St. James Church at Three Rivers were among Nobbs and Hyde's work at the time the First World War interrupted their practice. During the war, 1914-19, Nobbs served in both Canada and at the Front, attaining the rank of Major. For this period the CAC includes a tiny sketch of the tower at Rouen dated 4 August 1918 and an amusing plaster figure of a soldier cheerfully carrying an array of equipment based upon an equally tiny reproduction of an undated sketch that accompanies it.

In 1919, following Nobbs's return, a revised master plan for the University of Alberta and the design of the university's Medical Building were undertaken by the firm. Due to a need for specially shaped rooms and exacting lighting requirements, it became a more complex work than the Arts Building. Nobbs welcomed such problems, finding them stimulating to resolve as he discovered the form of a building.

The need for war memorials at this time aroused in Nobbs a profound response as artist and craftsman. In numerous distinctive and appropriate ways, he designed memorials in bronze, marble, and stained glass for churches, schools, offices, clubs, and city parks. As architectural advisor to the Canadian Battlefields Memorials Commission he was responsible for much of its most satisfactory work. The firm entered several competitions for the design of major memorials both at home and abroad, submitting the winning scheme for a war memorial museum at Regina. This might well have been a masterpiece, but it had called for an expenditure on a scale that proved beyond the capabilities of post-war Saskatchewan.

At this time the firm's established reputation for the design of pleasant houses brought many commissions, notably from H.R. Trenholme, Mrs. William Stewart, J.H. Magor, and Mrs. George Hyde, their most frequent domestic client, as well as from A.F. Byers and the Birks family for groups of houses. These were mainly built of brick, and all demonstrated Nobbs's characteristic skill in planning and particularly in the arrangement of windows to obtain the most desirable exposure. Nobbs called this consideration in the design of a house its "prospect," which is never obvious to outsiders, architectural photographers, or most critics, but is as important as its "aspect," which is obvious and mostly over-emphasized. There were also some exceptional residential works at this time, including a formal garden and extension to a massive stone house for Dr. W.L. McDougald, which included splendid ornamental gates and iron railings, and a charming suburban house for A.H. Scott that was clearly inspired by the old

houses of Quebec so long admired by Nobbs. He was convinced that regionalism in architecture was inevitable and was therefore a sensible source of inspiration for designers. The firm's domestic work also included the restoration of two old houses at Three Rivers, Quebec, the most notable one for C.R. Whitehead. At Almonte, Ontario, Nobbs and Hyde restored an old house for J. MacIntosh Bell and converted an 1830 gristmill to serve as a summer home and studio for R. Tait McKenzie, the distinguished surgeon-sculptor and physical educator. Stone houses for G.W. Grier and R. Reid Dobell in the late twenties were the last of the firm's important residential designs.

In the decade 1920-30 Nobbs and Hyde produced a considerable body of important work for McGill. First came a proposal for a monumental war memorial convocation hall inspired by enthusiasm for the university's remarkable wartime contributions. While the design went through several stages of simplification, it was eventually set aside. Later, a handsome addition was made to the Redpath Library providing a needed extension to the stack and rooms for special collections, one of which was the Blackader Library of Architecture and Art, itself a war memorial.¹³ In 1920 Sir William Osler's library of historic medical books was bequeathed to McGill, and Nobbs created an exquisite room in the Strathcona Medical Building to receive it. The next work was a new Pathology Building in the design of which the natural grouping of functional elements provided a potentially delightful irregular form that suited the site and neighbouring buildings and was handled in the manner of Nobbs's old master Robert Lorimer. In 1925 the firm commenced the design of a new building for the Pulp and Paper Research Institute, intended as one of a group which would complete the southeast corner of the campus. The building had two main elements, one comprising offices and laboratories and the other an industrial-type space that housed a model paper mill. Both elements were appropriately handled in stone with generous windows. Unfortunately, an end bay of the section fronting on University Street was never constructed -- a sorry scar -- but not as great as the total elimination of the handsome accompanying building that was to occupy the corner at Sherbrooke Street. This was to have been the Douglas residence and gymnasium. At the final moment before construction it was decided to reserve this site for other purposes. Finally, the last building Nobbs and Hyde designed for McGill was an extension to the Royal Victoria College -- a bedroom wing with reception rooms and living quarters for the matron. The extension was designed to relate pleasantly to the sober facades which lined University Street, yet when it turned the corner at Sherbrooke Street, it was made to flower into a composition of roofs and gables which responded to Bruce Price's original building for the college.

The last major commercial work of Nobbs and Hyde was the Drummond Medical Building. It was thoughtfully designed for clinical and surgical offices and was unusual at the time in that it contained a parking garage for its users. The garage was organized in an exemplary manner, accessible to the entrance lobby and arranged to have easy ramps between half floors. Its pattern had been explored earlier for the same client, Henry Birks and Sons, in the Royal Garage, a total garage structure that stood on Cathcart Street (demolished to make room for the Place Ville Marie).

The firm's last notable religious works were the war memorial chapel in Christ Church Cathedral and the remodelling of the interior of the Erskine and American United Church. The first involved refurnishing the nominal south transept of the Cathedral with a splendid new altar and reredos; chancel furniture, including candlesticks and rail; a screen dividing the chapel from the Cathedral's south aisle; and a new vestibule. This work provided an opportunity for exquisite joinery and carving in a medieval manner, yet it was designed with Nobbs's characteristic wit and appropriateness. The two figures atop the screen, reminiscent of Christ's mourners Mary and St. John, are a military nurse and stretcher-bearer. Carefully chosen colour and fresh stencil work related

the walls and ceiling of the old transept to the new work. Rebuilding the interior of the Erskine and American United Church was more extensive. It was not only an opportunity for some splendid non-figurative ornament and handsome new furniture and fittings, but it gave the architects a chance to normalize the axis of the interior with the basic structure of the church. Previously it had been contrived upon a diagonal of a square space, resulting in a chaotic arrangement of the windows. The reconstruction gave the church great dignity and must be ranked as the firm's most successful large-scale interior space. While the financial depression of the thirties left few clients in Canada with the resources to build well, the Second World War brought the kind of work Nobbs and Hyde enjoyed to an end.

Between the two world wars Nobbs received many commendations. In 1920 he was elected an Academician of the Royal Canadian Academy, in 1924 he became President of the Province of Quebec Association of Architects, in 1928 the President of the Town Planning Institute of Canada, in 1929 he was elected to the Royal Society of Arts and became the President of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada. During the thirties when work was slow he published his three books. Design: A Treatise on the Discovery of Form is a summary of his architectural philosophy, many of its chapters having been given as lectures. Salmon Tactics and Fencing Tactics record the great pleasure that fishing and fencing gave him. Just as Nobbs was delighted by buildings, he loved the outdoors.

In 1939 he retired from teaching, but in 1941 served as McGill's delegate on the Montreal City Council, where he played an active role in the new city planning department. In 1942 he became the acting President of the Royal Canadian Academy. In 1948 he founded the Atlantic Salmon Association and in 1952 received the Outdoor Life Conservation Award. In 1957 he was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters by McGill. Nobbs died 5 November 1964.

The most complete appreciation of Nobbs and his achievements is the monograph *Percy Erskine Nobbs: Architect, Artist, Craftsman* by Susan Wagg. ¹⁵ It is an essential introduction to the man, his objectives, and his most notable work.

An introductory account of Nobbs's role in early Canadian planning and his effort to obtain improvements in Montreal is given in an unpublished paper by Professor Jeanne Wolfe and her student Judi Bouman at the McGill School of Urban Planning entitled "Percy Nobbs & City Improvement." In addition, Sir Andrew MacPhail's careful review of Nobbs's book Design provides a brief yet insightful account of Nobbs and his work that needs to be read by anyone seeking a sketch of the man and his philosophy. 17

PERCY ERSKINE NOBBS: BIOGRAPHIE

Percy Erskine Nobbs naît le 11 août 1875 dans la maison familiale de sa mère à Haddington en Écosse. Il passe toute son enfance en Russie, troisième génération d'une famille anglaise tenue en très haute estime qui habite Saint-Pétersbourg depuis peu après Waterloo.¹ C'est ainsi qu'il suit ses premiers cours d'art à l'École de design de Saint-Pétersbourg. A douze ans, il entre au Collegiate School d'Édimbourg et de là, soit en 1893, il s'inscrit à l'université d'Édimbourg où, sous la direction du professeur Gerald Baldwin Brown, il obtient sa maîtrise ès arts en 1896.² Voulant faire des études d'architecte, il devient l'élève de Robert Lorimer, le célèbre architecte écossais qui, par goût et par formation, est l'un des chefs de file du mouvement Arts and Crafts. Lorimer a lui-même été l'élève de Rowand Anderson à Édimbourg, mais avant de commencer sa carrière, il a passé dix-huit mois avec George Frederick Bodley à Londres où il a côtoyé de près William Morris et Philip Webb.³ Nobbs idéalisait Lorimer, comme l'atteste le goût des deux architectes pour l'emploi judicieux des matériaux, les formes traditionnelles, l'art héraldique et d'autres ornements expressifs, mais surtout leur goût pour l'art des artisans qui contribue tant à la qualité d'un édifice.

Pendant ses études scolaires et universitaires à Édimbourg, Nobbs suit des cours de dessin et de sujets techniques à l'Heriot Watt College et à la School of Applied Art. Certains objets du CAC ont trait à cette époque, comme les dessins d'anciens édifices, les objets en fer forgé décoratif et les esquisses d'objets qui se trouvent dans la Musée des sciences et des arts d'Édimbourg. En outre, on peut voir dans les archives Nobbs une photographie d'un lion héraldique sculpté dans la pierre provenant de la porte cochère de Balcarres, demeure créé par Lorimer et construite alors que Nobbs faisait partie de l'agence, et qui porte les initiales PEN.

Nobbs est reçu aux examens du Royal Institute of British Architects en 1900 et la même année, il remporte le prix Tite pour son projet de clocher isolé, composition classique qui n'omet aucun détail de construction.⁶ Il dépense le montant de ce prix en Italie à dessiner, à mesurer et à croquer. Son voyage est consigné dans un essai intitulé "Why go we to Italy" publié avec quinze illustrations dans le Builders Journal and Architectural Record en 1901.⁷ On retrouve six esquisses de ce séjour dans le CAC alors que d'autres apparaissent dans plusieurs revues les années suivantes.⁸

En 1901, Nobbs travaille à la Fire Brigade Branch du London County Council où, pour la première fois, il fait l'expérience d'un élément social de l'architecture, à savoir les grands problèmes de construction dans une vaste métropole. Cette préoccupation ne le quittera plus de toute sa carrière, comme en témoignent les rapports et plans généraux de logements sociaux et surtout, les beaux édifices scolaires économiques dont il élabora les plans à Montréal avant la Première guerre mondiale. En 1901, Nobbs présente des projets dans le cadre de la Soane Medallion et de l'Owen Jones Studentship, et il obtient le second prix à ce deuxième concours. L'année suivante, il tente à nouveau sa chance à ces deux concours et cette fois, il remporte le Owen Jones Studentship pour le projet d'une église romane richement ornementée. Toutefois, la médaille Soane lui échappe à nouveau. Le concours Soane de 1902 avait trait à une église de ville, et même si l'on ne trouve dans le CAC qu'un seul des dessins de Nobbs pour cette église, d'autres ont été publiés dans le British Architect, de sorte qu'il est possible d'examiner ce projet au grand complet.9

Les talents de dessinateur de Nobbs qui lui ont valu tant de prix et grâce auxquels il a fait publier tant de dessins, en font un adjoint très recherché dans les agences dont la survie dépend des concours. C'est ainsi que Nobbs devient un véritable bourreau de travail et il semble que les idiomes qu'employaient les jurys des concours auxquels ses employeurs cherchaient à

plaire soient venus s'allier à ceux de ses anciens maîtres pour forger son vocabulaire architectural. Cette tendance qui est manifeste dans le deuxième projet présenté au concours Soane, est sans doute constatée par Lorimer qui lui fait promettre de cesser d'être l'esclave des architectes de Londres et de ne travailler que pour lui-même. Sans doute animé du même souci, un autre vieil ami et professeur d'Édimbourg, Gerald Baldwin Brown, trouve l'occasion de lui faire quitter Londres en le recommandant chaleureusement à William Peterson qui cherchait précisément à remplacer Stewart Henbest Capper à la tête de l'École d'architecture de McGill.

En 1903, Nobbs arrive à McGill pour y faire de l'enseignement à l'instar de Capper, 11 mais très vite il constate qu'il lui faut exercer son métier pour pouvoir enseigner l'architecture, peu convaincu de la seule valeur des mots et images pour ce faire. Après quelques hésitations, McGill accède à sa demande, mais à la condition qu'il le fasse avec un architecte de métier. Les premières années de sa carrière sont marquées par une activité débordante. L'University Union de McGill (l'actuel Musée McCord), entrepris en collaboration avec Hutchison et Wood, est sa première oeuvre canadienne. Les esquisses, plans de présentation, dessins d'exécution, détails et croquis de mobilier que l'on trouve dans le CAC témoignent de l'évolution et de l'étendue de style de A tous égards, l'édifice demeure un étalage de composition élégante et de construction intelligente, harmonieusement exécuté et devant lequel on ne Sa seconde oeuvre réalisée en association avec peut ressentir que de la joie. David R. Brown, est une maison destinée au docteur C.W. Colby. Celle-ci est suivie d'une autre maison pour le docteur J.B. Porter, en association avec Cecil Les deux maisons ont disparu avec ceux qui en étaient les maîtres, mais les dessins et les photographies qui en restent prouvent que chacune avait un charme qui lui était propre, s'harmonisait admirablement avec son environnement et imposait sa beauté aux promeneurs. Durant cette époque, Nobbs est membre du jury des concours pour la cathédrale d'Halifax, l'Hôpital
Alexandra, le foyer des infirmières de l'Hôpital Royal Victoria et la nouvelle
faculté de médicine de McGill. Puis en avril 1907, après sa destruction par
le feu, il faut reconstruire immédiatement le pavillon Macdonald de génie.
Nobbs élabore à nouveau les plans de l'édifice dont il surveille la construction,
travaillant tous les jours avec Sir William Macdonald, donateur de l'édifice et un des gouverneurs de McGill. L'année suivante, il contribue aux révisions finales de l'Hôtel du Parlement d'Edmonton. Il prépare les plans d'un édifice similaire à Regina et, pour faire un coq-à-l'âne, il étonne ses collègues en remportant la médaille d'argent au fleuret aux Jeux olympiques de Londres. C'est un athlète leste et accompli qui a le goût de la compétition, qualités sans doute liées à son talent exceptionnel de tout voir avec justesse et de dessiner avec assurance.

En 1909, Nobbs est élu membre associé de l'Académie royale canadienne, il épouse Mary Cecilia Shepherd et s'installe confortablement dans la vie montréalaise. Sa vie professionnelle et ses oeuvres attestent ses talents d'architecte et témoignent de la sagesse dont il a su faire preuve en s'adonnant davantage à son métier et en réduisant sa charge d'enseignement. À la fin 1909, il demande à résigner ses fonctions de directeur de l'École d'architecture. L'année suivante, il est élu membre du Royal Institute of British Architects et s'associe avec George Taylor Hyde, donnant le jour à l'agence qui fait pratiquement tout l'objet de cette collection et qui subsistera jusqu'au décès de Hyde en 1944. Pendant toute cette période à l'exception des quatre dernières années, Nobbs mènera de front sa carrière d'architecte et un poste moins exigeant de professeur de design à McGill.

Au début de son association avec Hyde et avant le commencement de la Première guerre mondiale, l'agence de Nobbs crée de nombreuses maisons pour des clients particuliers, dont plusieurs groupes de maisons pour T.P. Howard et Thomas Lamb ainsi qu'une charmante maison de campagne agrémentée d'un jardin et de

dépendances pour le docteur J.L. Todd. Alors que toutes ces maisons témoignent de la maîtrise que Nobbs avait de la composition architecturale, le merveilleux édifice de l'University Club de Montréal lui donne l'occasion de travailler avec toute sorte de matériaux et de tirer parti des arts appliqués. Un plafond en plâtre à l'ornementation héraldique, des vitraux, un escalier ellipsoïde majestueux, et plusieurs foyers ornementés ne sont que quelques-uns des chefs d'oeuvre de design et d'artisanat que l'on trouve dans le Club. Par ailleurs, le mobilier et les installations, qui ont été soit conçus soit sélectionnés par l'architecte, contribuent de manière exceptionnelle à l'harmonie de l'intérieur de l'édifice.

Trois écoles, Édouard VII, Strathearn et Peace Centennial créées pour la Commission des écoles protestantes de Montréal, sont de beaux édifices pratiques qui allient des normes d'espace et d'éclairage naturel idéales pour les enfants avec certains symboles patriotiques pleins de verve, ainsi qu'une étude du langage de la forme et de l'ornement qui fascinait tant Nobbs. Deux édifices réalisés pour Henry Birks and Sons, à savoir une orfèvrerie combinée à un immeuble commercial à Montréal et un magasin et des bureaux remis à neuf à Winnipeg, de même que le siège social canadien de la compagnie d'assurance Liverpool and London and Globe sont indicatifs du brio avec lequel l'agence de Nobbs faisait aussi de l'architecture commerciale.

Le stupéfiant projet de résidences universitaires combinées à un stade, un gymnase et des salles d'exercice à McGill et les plans complets de l'université d'Alberta constituent des tentatives d'ensembles architecturaux inédites jusqu'ici au Canada. Seul le stade de McGill ainsi que le pavillon des arts et deux laboratoires à l'université d'Alberta seront achevés avant la guerre. En 1913, Nobbs se fait battir sa propre maison sur un site exaltant au sommet du Mont-Royal à Montréal, maison dont l'exposition est idéale et les vues magnifiques, en regard de quoi il utilise la brique et l'ardoise, massant sa composition autour d'une cheminée centrale et disposant les fenêtres de facture simple de manière à ce qu'elles captent la bonne lumière au bon moment tout au long de la journée.

Nobbs et Hyde travaillent au mobilier et aux installations de l'immeuble de la Liverpool and London and Globe et de l'église St-Jacques remise à neuf de Trois-Rivières au moment où la première guerre mondiale interrompt leur carrière. Pendant la guerre, soit de 1914 à 1919, Nobbs sert à la fois au Canada et sur le front et il est élevé au rang de commandant. À propos de cette période, le CAC comporte une minuscule esquisse de la tour de Rouen datée du 4 août 1918 et une amusante figure en plâtre d'un soldat portant gaiement ses effets, basée sur une reproduction toute aussi minuscule d'une esquisse sans date qui l'accompagne.

En 1919, au retour de Nobbs, son agence réalise un plan directeur révisé pour l'université d'Alberta et élabore les plans de la faculté de médecine de cette université. Compte tenu de la forme particulière des salles et des besoins particuliers de l'éclairage, ce projet exige des travaux beaucoup plus complexes que celui du pavillon des arts. Nobbs ne recule jamais devant ce genre de problème, y trouvant même une grande stimulation qui l'aide à découvrir la forme d'un édifice.

Le besoin d'élever des monuments aux morts à cette époque suscite en Nobbs la réponse d'un artiste en même temps que d'un artisan. Il élabore donc les plans de monuments en bronze et en marbre et des vitraux pour des églises, des écoles, certains bureaux, clubs et parcs municipaux. En sa qualité d'architecte-conseil auprès de la Commission canadienne des monuments de champs de bataille, c'est à lui que l'on doit beaucoup des plus belles oeuvres de cette commission. Son agence s'inscrit à plusieurs concours pour la conception d'importants monuments aux morts, à la fois au Canada et à l'étranger, et c'est elle qui présente le projet gagnant d'un musée à la mémoire de la guerre à Regina. Ce musée aurait

sans doute été un chef d'oeuvre, mais les dépenses qu'il aurait entraînées s'avérèrent bien trop élevées pour les moyens de la Saskatchewan de l'après-guerre.

À cette époque, le renom de l'agence au chapitre des résidences particulières lui vaut de nombreuses commandes, notamment de la part de H.R. Trenholme, de Mme William Stewart, de J.H. Magor et de Mme George Hyde, son plus fréquent client canadien, ainsi que de A.F.G. Byers et de la famille Birks pour des groupes de La plupart sont en brique et toutes attestent les talents de planificateur de Nobbs, surtout au niveau de la disposition des fenêtres pour obtenir le meilleur éclairage possible. Nobbs donnait le nom de perspective à cet élément de la construction d'une maison, lequel est rarement manifeste aux gens de l'extérieur, aux photographes architecturaux ou à la plupart des critiques, alors qu'il revêt autant d'importance que son aspect, lequel est évident et très souvent surestimé. On compte également à cette époque plusieurs résidences exceptionnelles, dont un extraordinaire jardin et l'aile d'une demeure en pierre massive pour le docteur W.L. McDougald, qui comportait une splendide grille ornementale et des clôtures de fer forgé, ainsi qu'une charmante maison de banlieue pour A.H. Scott qui s'inspirait manifestement des anciennes maisons québécoises auxquelles Nobbs vouait une vive admiration. Il était convaincu que le régionalisme architectural était inévitable et qu'il constituait une source d'inspiration essentielle pour les architectes. Les créations locales de l'agence englobèrent également la restauration de deux vieilles maisons à Trois-Rivières au Québec, dont la plus remarquable pour le compte de C.R. Whitehead. À Almonte en Ontario, Nobbs et Hyde s'occupèrent de restaurer une vieille maison pour J. MacIntosh Bell et de convertir un vieux moulin de 1830 en maison d'été et en studio pour R. Tait McKenzie, cet éminent sculpteur chirurgien et spécialiste d'éducation physique. Les maisons de pierre réalisées pour le compte de G.W. Grier et R. Reid Dobell à la fin des années vingt furent parmi les dernières des commandes résidentielles importantes de l'agence.

Entre 1920 et 1930, Nobbs et Hyde réalisent un grand nombre de commandes pour McGill. En premier lieu, il faut citer le projet de salle de réunion monumentale à la mémoire des morts de la guerre, suscité par l'enthousiasme de Nobbs pour les remarquables contributions de l'université pendant la guerre. Alors que les plans de cette salle passent par plusieurs phases de simplification, sa construction est finalement abandonnée. Plus tard, une très jolie annexe est ajoutée à la bibliothèque Redpath à l'intention du rayonnage et des collections spéciales dont l'une d'entre elle est la bibliothèque Blackader d'architecture et d'art, elle-même un monument aux morts. 13 En 1920, la collection d'histoire de la médecine de Sir William Osler est léguée à McGill et Nobbs conçoit à son intention une ravissante salle dans le pavillon Strathcona de médecine. Vient ensuite un nouveau pavillon de pathologie auquel le groupement naturel des éléments fonctionnels donne une forme irrégulière tout à fait charmante qui s'harmonise fort bien avec le site et les immeubles voisins et qui est traitée dans le style de l'ancien maître de Nobbs, Robert Lorimer. En 1925, l'agence entreprend les plans d'un nouvel édifice pour l'Institut de recherche sur les pâtes et papiers, qui fait partie d'un complexe à l'angle sudest du campus. Ce pavillon comprend deux grands éléments, l'un fait de bureaux et de laboratoires et l'autre de locaux de type industriel qui abritent une usine de papier modèle. Les deux parties sont fort judicieusement construites en pierre avec de grandes fenêtres généreuses. Malheureusement, l'extrémité de la section donnant sur la rue University ne sera jamais achevée, ce qui demeure encore aujourd'hui une douloureuse cicatrice, pas aussi douloureuse toutefois que l'élimination totale du bel immeuble qui aurait dû se dresser à l'angle de la rue Sherbrooke. C'est dans cet immeuble qu'on aurait dû trouver la résidence Douglas et le gymnase. Au tout dernier moment, on décide de réserver cet emplacement à d'autres fins. Enfin, le dernier immeuble que McGill commande à Nobbs et Hyde est une annexe du collège Royal Victoria, qui abrite les chambres

à coucher, les salles de réception et le logement de l'intendante. Cette annexe est conçue dans le style sobre des façades qui bordent la rue University, tandis qu'à l'angle de la rue Sherbrooke, elle s'harmonise à une composition de toits et de pignons plus conforme à l'édifice original créé par Bruce Price pour le collège.

La dernière grande commande commerciale de Nobbs et Hyde est l'édifice médical Drummond. Intelligemment conçu pour abriter des bureaux cliniques et des salles d'opération, il se distingue des édifices de l'époque par un garage à l'intention de ses occupants. Ce garage agencé de manière exemplaire, est accessible depuis le vestibule d'entrée et possède des rampes d'accès facile entre chaque demi-étage. Ce modèle a été envisagé au préalable pour le même client, Henry Birks and Sons, dans le Royal Garage, édifice de stationnement à part entière qui se dressait rue Cathcart (et qui fut démoli pour faire place à la Place Ville-Marie).

Les dernières oeuvres religieuses les plus remarquables de l'agence sont la chapelle de la Cathédrale Christ Church à la mémoire des morts de la guerre et le remaniement de l'intérieur de la Erskine and American United Church. Dans le premier cas, on installe dans le transept sud de la cathédrale un nouvel autel et retable splendides, on crée un nouveau mobilier pour le jubé, notamment des chandeliers et un balustre; et l'on installe un paravent séparant la chapelle de la nef latérale sud de la cathédrale, sans parler d'un nouveau vestibule. cela donne lieu à des travaux de menuiserie et de sculpture réalisés dans un goût exquis à la manière médiévale, sans pour autant que l'esprit et le sens de l'à-propos de Nobbs en soient absents. Les deux figurines surplombant le paravent qui rappellent Marie et St-Jean pleurant le Christ représentent en fait une infirmière militaire et un brancardier. Le choix judicieux des couleurs et les travaux au stencil permettent de faire la jonction entre les murs et le plafond de l'ancien transept et les rénovations. La réfection de l'intérieur de la Erskine and American United Church est plus considérable. Elle ne donne pas seulement lieu à des ornements non figuratifs splendides et à un nouveau mobilier et des installations de toute beauté, mais elle permet aux architectes de normaliser l'axe de l'intérieur selon l'orientation de base de l'église. Jusque là, cet axe était agencé sur la diagonale d'un espace carré, ce qui avait entraîné un agencement désordonné des fenêtres. La reconstruction donne à l'église un air de profonde dignité et elle constitute le projet le plus réussi d'espace intérieur à grande échelle de l'agence. Alors que la grande crise financière des années trente a considérablement réduit au Canada le nombre de clients disposant des ressources pour se faire bâtir de belles demeures, la Deuxième guerre mondiale amène le genre de travaux que Nobbs et Hyde aiment après dessus tout.

Entre les deux guerres mondiales, Nobbs reçoit de nombreuses distinctions. En 1920, il est élu académicien de l'Académie royale canadienne, en 1924, il devient président de l'Association des architectes de la Province de Québec, en 1928 président du Town Planning Institute of Canada, en 1929 il est élu à la Société royale des arts et devient président du Royal Architectural Institute of Canada. Durant les années trente, en pleine période de rècession, il publie ses trois ouvrages. Design: A Treatise on the Discovery of Form est un résumé de sa philosophie architecturale dont bien des chapitres ont fait l'objet de conférences. Salmon Tactics et Fencing Tactics relatent l'immense plaisir qu'il éprouve à pêcher et à faire de l'escrime. Outre l'architecture, Nobbs adore le plein air.

En 1939, il cesse d'enseigner, mais en 1941, il devient le délégué de McGill au Conseil municipal de Montréal oû il joue un rôle dynamique au sein du nouveau département d'urbanisme. En 1942, il devient président par interim de l'Académie royale canadienne. En 1948, il fonde la Atlantic Salmon Association et en 1952, il reçoit le prix de l'Outdoor Life Conservation. En 1957, McGill

lui décerne le grade honorifique de docteur ès lettres. Nobbs meurt le 5 novembre 1964.

La biogrpahie la plus complète de Nobbs et de ses réalisations est la monographie intitulée *Percy Erskine Nobbs: architecte, artiste, artisan* de Susan Wagg. Cet ouvrage nous fait découvrir l'homme, ses objectifs et ses oeuvres les plus remarquables.

Un récit liminaire du rôle joué par Nobbs aux débuts de la planification canadienne et de ses tentatives d'améliorer l'aspect de Montréal nous est livré dans un exposé inédit du professeur Jeanne Wolfe et de son étudiante Judi Bouman de l'École d'urbanisme de McGill qui porte le nom de "Percy Nobbs & City Improvement." En outre, l'analyse minutieuse qu'Andrew MacPhail a faite de l'ouvrage de Nobbs Design permet de mieux comprendre l'homme et son oeuvre et saura intéresser quiconque cherche à se faire une meilleure idée de l'homme et de sa philosophie. 17

THE WRITINGS OF PERCY ERSKINE NOBBS

The essays Nobbs wrote at the time he came to McGill show his interest in aesthetics and his long-held opinion that barring actual experience, drawing is the way to understand buildings and the only way to describe them. The early essays appear to forecast his vision that just as the Arts and Crafts movement, with all that it implied, had grown from the turmoil of the Gothic Revival, architecture anywhere could be based upon an imaginative understanding of common building materials and trades, shared traditions, the lessons to be learned from existing buildings, and the desire to make something appealing. His opening lecture at McGill was entitled "Building Trades" to avoid conveying a notion of amateurism that he sensed had become associated with the word crafts, yet crafts were what he intended to discuss. He explained that in designing a teaspoon or a town hall, while knowledge of how the object was to be used was primary, what could be used to make it, what had been past experience good and bad, and how well it could be done were the questions.¹

In 1903 Nobbs gave the Canadian Architect and Builder (CAB) three short papers that had been written as an introduction to the study of architecture. These concerned drawing as the means of describing buildings; distinguishing between styles and style, the various manners of architecture at different times and places, and the manner or skill of architects; and the nature of materials and appropriate ways of using them.² In 1904 CAB published two illustrated papers Nobbs had prepared as lectures: the first on the design of ornamental plaster, the second on the drawing of architecture.³ The latter had been presented to the annual meeting of the Ontario Association of Architects the previous year. In 1905 the same journal published a paper that had been presented to the Sketching Club of the Province of Quebec Association of Architects which included an appeal to respect vernacular architecture and to learn from old examples of unpretentious work.⁴

"Art in its Lowest Terms" was the title of Nobbs's university lecture in 1906.5 He considered it an important event and noted on the cover of his manuscript that the Principal, the classicist William Peterson, was complimentary but the Department of Philosophy was hostile. The lecture was unpublished but in 1906, 1907, and 1910 Nobbs presented papers to annual meetings of the Ontario Association of Architects that were published and together form a sequence The first dealt with European official architecture, exposing his philosophy. tracing its origin, development, strengths, weaknesses, and particularly its In concluding he referred briefly to the special position of Britain in this matter, though limited time prevented his expanding on this point. In the following year he was given the opportunity to elaborate and explained how the rediscovery of the importance of material in the Gothic Revival had stimulated all forms of British architecture including the classical and set it far apart from European academic concerns.⁷ This unacademic stance surfaced in an address to the American Institute of Architects in Chicago in 1907, when he drew a parallel between the rarified classical work, then dominating America, with the work of Smirke, Tite, and Elms in England just before the high tide of the Gothic Revival, which when it ebbed away left a rejuvenated 'astylar' free classic with Gothic directness and elasticity. While seeming paradoxical, he ventured to suggest that a Gothic Revival in America then would lead to a broader view of classic architecture -- and emancipation; yet he added that he hoped the day was coming when there would be neither Gothic nor classic, but modern buildings infused with all the delicacy of the Greek, the force of the Roman, and the verve of the Renaissance. And he stressed the need to consider the great periods of architecture as sources of spirit rather than motif.8

His unacademic position must have disturbed some people and perhaps given the impression that he had little regard for abstract rules of performance and saw no role for the state in architecture, since his next published paper was a

vigorous and explicit outline of a role for the state. Nobbs saw the need for government aid for travelling scholarships and the establishment of teaching museums for the purpose of developing an architecture based upon distinctive national traditions. And in the next opportunity he had to address the Ontario Association of Architects, he prefaced the presentation of his own scheme for teaching the principles of architecture (the McGill curriculum) by pointing out its compatibility with his unacademic stand. In the same year, 1910, he made Canadian architecture the subject of his address to the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada, wherein he presented the idea of art as a simple natural human activity and not an inexplicable, quintessential mystery. Nobbs believed that in the ordinary choices architects make, they inevitably express their feeling for a work in hand and thereby convey messages to other men for as long as a building stands. At the very least the messages need to be pleasant and appropriate, but there are no bounds to feeling and the ability of architects to be expressive.

After the war of 1914-18, Nobbs's essays follow six themes, nearly all of which fall within the scope of Canadian experience: architecture in Canada, community planning and housing, design and crafts, professional development, his own work, and expressions of appreciation for certain of his most admired contemporaries.

On the occasion of the British Empire Exhibition in London in 1924, Nobbs presented a paper on Canadian architecture to the Royal Institute of British Architects which received a great deal of attention in architectural journals. 12 It was followed by another specifically upon the English tradition in Canada for the prestigious Architectural Review. 13 The theme was pursued in the Journal of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada (JRAIC) in 1930 and in the Studio in 1932. 14 Four years later he reported again upon architecture in Canada, and his last essay on the topic appeared in 1956. 15

Nobbs's interest in community planning and housing in Montreal grew from his concern for the proper siting of buildings and his frustration with the layout of streets without regard to orientation or view and often without regard to the gradient of the land on which they were built. He was offended as well by the general disregard for the reservation of space for public buildings, which, if well composed on prominent sites, could punctuate the urban pattern and give a lively identity to places in an otherwise dreary scene. Thus his first essays on this theme dealt with minimum needs for sunlight, the advantages of group planning, and standards of layout of land for residential purposes. 16 Two of his essays were reports upon planning activities in Montreal in 1926. 17 In the following year he was joint editor of a special planning number of La Revue Municipale, which included his essays "The Syndication of Land" and "A Provincial Town Planning and Zoning Enabling Act." In 1928, the year he was President of the Town Planning Institute, an account of the objectives of town planning in Montreal was written for the McGill News; and a consideration for the need to control the height and use of buildings was written for the Journal of the Town Planning Institute of Canada in which he pointed out that are of the Town Planning Institute of Canada in which he pointed out that as to the control of architecture, the less the better. 19 For Nobbs, architecture concerned the impression a building gave and was inconceivably a matter for municipal regulations. In the early thirties Nobbs co-chaired the joint committee of the City Improvement League and the Montreal Board of Trade, set up to consider problems of housing and slum clearance. The committee made the first thorough examination of such conditions in Montreal and prepared a specific program for three-level government action.²⁰ A perceptive report entitled "A Metropolitan System of Waterside Parks for Montreal" was written in 1934, possibly for the City Improvement League, but nothing came of it and it remained unpublished.²¹ An explanatory article outlining a housing program to meet Canada's needs was published in a construction trade journal in 1936 and may have been a good deal more effective than his appeals to public authorities had been; since housing, years later, came into being as a means of assisting the building industry to employ men.22

Four pleasant essays concerning architecture and design apperared in U.S. architectural journals in 1923, the same year that ten handsome photographs of the work of Nobbs and Hyde were shown in *The American Architect - The Architectural Review.*²³ In 1935 Nobbs appears to have been asked to write a paper on architectural economics by *JRAIC*. In complying he made his familiar distinction between design and architecture. Design, he wrote, being concerned with the solution of problems, the discovery of form in terms of practical purpose, material, and technique is entirely tied up with economics; whereas architecture is primarily concerned with impressions. In many cases the discovered form is the subject of artistic commentary, but in monumental architecture, where purpose is not necessarily practical, spiritual content may have little or nothing to do with a solution of a problem and can have only a flimsy relationship with economics.²⁴ For Nobbs architecture was not a synonym for building. It had to do with the artistry of men in doing their best to make buildings effective. Architecture was his word for such a conception, and he was unhappy with the idea that architecture was merely what people calling themselves architects did. In 1940 Nobbs wrote a paper on the question of a Canadian flag, in which he fairly well outlined the design that was adopted twenty-five years later.²⁵ Heraldry fascinated him -- possibly as a microcosm of his ideas on design and architecture. Involving purpose, material, tradition, rights and wrongs, the rules of heraldry set positive limits yet allow ample scope for wit and expression in execution. Nobbs's last essay on design and material dealt with ornamental iron, which much of his own work shows him to have been a master of.²⁶

A concern for the development of the profession of architecture in Canada can be seen in many of Nobbs's essays, but one dealing specifically with the relations of architects and clients was published in the Journal of the American Institute of Architects in 1921.²⁷ A re-examination of the role of university education in architecture to meet current needs appeared in 1925.²⁸ In 1927 he wrote a three-part account of the Royal Institute of British Architects to explain to his fellow Canadian architects its organization and control, its educational activities, and its library and journal.²⁹ The need for reform in the rules for architectural competitions engaged him, and a constructive paper on the topic was published in 1935.³⁰ An extensive paper on the remuneration of architects was prepared for the 15th International Congress of Architects that was to have been held in Washington in September 1939 but was cancelled due to war in Europe.³¹ Much of it appeared later in two articles in JRAIC -- the first under the original title, the second as "The Sliding Scale of Remuneration."³²

Nobbs described his own work in six essays. The first dealt with work at McGill in 1920.³³ "The Canadian Battlefields Memorial Competition" described the work he did for the Imperial War Graves Commission of which he was a member.³⁴ Work at the University of Alberta was reported in two stages, the first in 1921 -- the initial layout and the Arts Building; then in 1925 -- a further developed scheme and the Medical Building.³⁵ "Bibliotheca Osleriana" in 1930 and "McGill Decorations for the Royal Visit in 1939" described two works for McGill in which Nobbs sought excellence through his talent for effective display.³⁶

Lastly, five of the essays were appreciations of men with whom he had worked and whom he greatly admired: Sir William Macdonald, one of McGill's great benefactors; his teacher Sir Robert Lorimer; the town planner Noulan Cauchon; Ramsay Traquair, his successor as Macdonald Professor of Architecture at McGill; and Frank Darling, dean of Canadian architects.³⁷ Having designed two buildings for Macdonald, Nobbs knew him to be wise and affectionate and regretted that as time passed, his spiritural attributes were being hidden by mere accounts of his wealth. Lorimer, the artist and craftsman, following a generation of archaeological barbarians, had uncovered the spirit of old Scottish buildings

that had been ignored. He was the last of the great romantics with a name to set beside those of architects Philip Webb and Richard Norman Shaw. Cauchon, in Nobbs's view, embodied the patience, strength, and courage of his French, Irish, and Scottish forbears. He was a passionate and tireless improver in the forlorn cause of housing and city planning in Canada. Traquair's near perfect background in science and art and his fascination with how things were put together made him a gifted professor of architecture whom everyone enjoyed. Traquair, too, had learned from Lorimer to appreciate the charm of old buildings and thus began his celebrated work of exploring and recording the old architecture of Quebec. Darling's greatness was impossible to overlook: he deserved the Gold Medal of the Royal Institute of British Architects awarded him in 1915 and takes his place among those who had received it beginning with Cockerell in 1848. Darling knew well how to relate the insides and outsides of buildings, but above all he understood the importance of scale whether in the design of a house or of some Augustan work. His notion of unit planning was a contribution to modern Canadian design.

Individually, Nobbs's essays are nicely composed and a pleasure to read. As a group, they tell of Nobbs's own development, account for events as he saw them, and provide insights on his contemporaries.

LES ÉCRITS DE PERCY ERSKINE NOBBS

Les essais que Nobbs écrit au moment où il arrive à McGill témoignent de son intérêt pour l'esthétique et de sa conviction qu'en dehors du vécu, seul le dessin permet de décoder l'oeuvre architecturale et de la décrire. Les premiers essais semblent anticiper sa théorie selon laquelle tout comme le mouvement Arts and Crafts, et ce qu'il implique, est issu du chambardement néo-gothique, n'importe quelle oeuvre architecturale peut être le fait d'une compréhension ingénieuse des matériaux et des métiers du bâtiment, des traditions partagées, des leçons tirées d'oeuvres existantes et du désir de créer quelque chose d'attrayant. Le premier cours qu'il donne à McGill est intitulé "Building Trades" pour éviter toute ambiguité avec l'idée d'amateurisme qui se rattache au terme "crafts", alors que c'est vraiment de ce dernier concept qu'il veut parler. Il précise que dans la conception d'une cuillère ou d'un hôtel de ville, alors que la connaissance de l'usage auquel on destine l'objet est essentielle, il importe avant tout de savoir quels matériaux utiliser dans sa fabrication, et de s'interroger sur ce qui s'est fait dans le passé et comment obtenir le meilleur résultat.\frac{1}{2}

En 1903, Nobbs soumet au Canadian Architect and Builder (CAB) trois courts articles qu'il a écrits en guise d'introduction à l'étude de l'architecture. Ces articles sont respectivement consacrés au dessin comme moyen de décrire une oeuvre architecturale; à la distinction qu'il faut faire entre styles et style, entre les diverses modes architecturales à différentes époques et en différents lieux et entre le style ou la technique des architectes, et enfin à la nature des matériaux et à la meilleure façon d'en user.² En 1904, le CAB publie deux articles illustrés que Nobbs a préparés dans le cadre de ses cours: le premier est consacré au design des plâtres d'ornementation, le second aux dessins architecturaux.³ Ce dernier a été présenté à l'assemblée annuelle de l'Ontario Association of Architects l'année précédente. En 1905, la même revue publie un article présenté au Club d'esquisse de l'Association des architectes de la province de Québec qui enjoigne aux architectes de respecter l'architecture vernaculaire et de s'inspirer d'anciens exemples d'oeuvres architecturales sans prétention.⁴

"Art in its Lowest Terms" est le titre de la conférence que Nobbs donne à l'université en 1906.5 L'événement est pour lui si marquant qu'il indique sur la couverture de son manuscrit que le principal de McGill, l'humaniste William Peterson, lui est favorable, ce qui n'est pas le cas du département de Cette conférence n'est pas publiée, mais en 1906, 1907 et 1910, philosophie. Nobbs présente plusieurs communications aux assemblées annuelles de l'Ontario Association of Architects qui sont publiées et illustrent le cheminement de sa philosophie. La première a trait à l'architecture officielle européenne dont il retrace les origines, l'évolution, les qualités et les défauts et notamment l'académisme.6 En guise de conclusion, il fait brièvement allusion à la situation particulière de la Grande-Bretagne en la matière, même si par manque de temps, il ne peut développer ce thème. L'année suivante, il a l'occasion de développer sa pensée et d'expliquer comment la redécouverte de l'importance des matériaux dans le néo-gothique a stimulé tous les genres de l'architecture britannique, notamment le genre classique, et l'a située résolument à l'écart de la tradition académique européenne.7 Cette prise de position originale apparaît dans un discours qu'il prononce devant l'American Institute of Architects à Chicago en 1907, où il établit un parallèle entre la raréfaction des oeuvres architecturales classiques qui dominent alors l'Amérique et les oeuvres de Smirke, Tite et Elms en Angleterre juste avant la vague du néo-gothique, lequel à son déclin, laisse un style classique libre et rajeuni qui a la spontanéité et l'élasticité du gothique. Même si cela semble paradoxal, il soutient qu'un style imitant le gothique en Amérique conduirait à une vision plus large de l'architecture classique, et même à l'affranchissement des architectes. Malgré tout, il espère que le jour n'est plus loin où il n'y aura plus ni gothique ni

classique, mais seulement des oeuvres architecturales modernes alliant la finesse de l'architecture grecque à la vigueur de l'architecture romaine à la verve de la renaissance. Et il souligne le besoin de puiser l'esprit plutôt que le motif dans les grandes périodes de l'architecture.8

Sa position peu académique doit en avoir choqué plus d'un qui ont l'impression qu'il fait peu de cas des règles abstraites de l'exécution d'une oeuvre, et qu'il ne voit pas de rôle pour l'État. Nobbs n'ignore pas le besoin d'une aide de l'État visant à la création de bourses d'études et à l'établissement de musées d'enseignement dans le but de développer une architecture fondée sur certaines traditions propres à chaque pays.9 Et dès qu'il a l'occasion de prendre à nouveau la parole devant l'Ontario Association of Architects, il expose son propre programme d'enseignement des principes de l'architecture (le programme de McGill) en soulignant qu'il est parfaitement compatible avec sa position originale. 10 La même année, soit en 1910, il fait de l'architecture canadienne le thème du discours qu'il prononce devant l'Institut royal d'architecture du Canada où il présente l'idée de l'art comme une simple activité naturelle de l'homme et non comme un mystère inexplicable et quintessencié.11 Nobbs est d'avis que dans les choix ordinaires qu'opèrent les architectes, ils expriment inévitablement ce qu'ils ressentent devant une oeuvre en chantier, adressant ainsi des messages à autrui pendant toute l'existence d'un édifice. À tout le moins, ces messages doivent être agréables et appropriés, mais il n'y a pas de limite au sentiment et à la capacité des architectes de s'exprimer.

Après la guerre de 1914-18, les écrits de Nobbs obéissent à six thèmes qui relèvent pratiquement tous de l'expérience canadienne: l'architecture au Canada, les aménagements et logements collectifs, le design et les métiers, le perfectionement professionnel, ses propres oeuvres, et les marques d'admiration pour certains de ses contemporains.

À l'occasion de l'Exposition de l'Empire britannique qui a lieu à Londres en 1924, Nobbs présente un exposé sur l'architecture canadienne devant le Royal Institute of British Architects qui retient vivement l'attention des revues architecturales. Let exposé est suivi d'un autre qui porte spécifiquement sur la tradition anglaise au Canada et qui est destiné au prestigieux Architectural Review. Le thème est repris dans le Journal of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada (JRAIC) en 1930 et dans le Studio en 1932. Quatre années plus tard, il fait un nouvel exposé sur l'architecture au Canada et son dernier essai sur ce sujet paraît en 1956. 15

L'intérêt de Nobbs pour les aménagements et les logements collectifs à Montréal s'explique par le grand cas qu'il fait du choix de l'emplacement des édifices et par l'irritation que suscite en lui le tracé des rues qui ne tient aucun compte de l'orientation ou de la vue, encore moins de la déclivité du terrain où elles sont construites. Il s'élève également contre le fait qu'on ne se soucie nullement de réserver des espaces pour les édifices municipaux qui, s'ils étaient intelligemment situés sur des emplacements en vue, pourraient ponctuer le tissu urbain et égayer un paysage par ailleurs plutôt morne. C'est ainsi que ses premiers essais sur ce thème font état des besoins minimum de lumière naturelle, des avantages d'un aménagement collectif et des normes d'agencement des terrains résidentiels. 16 Deux de ses essais sont en fait des comptes rendus des activités d'aménagement à Montréal en 1926.17 L'année suivante, il est corédacteur d'un numéro spécial de La Revue Municipale, qui contient ses essais intitulés "The Syndication of Land" et "A Provincial Town Planning and Zoning Enabling Act."18 En 1928, année où il assure la présidence du Town Planning Institute of Canada, il rédige un rapport sur les objectifs de l'aménagement urbain de Montréal pour le McGill News et écrit un article sur le besoin de contrôler la hauteur et l'usage des édifices pour le Journal of the Town Planning Institute of Canada, où il souligne que pour ce qui est du contrôle de

l'architecture, moins il y en a, mieux cela vaut. Pour Nobbs, l'architecture a trait à l'impression créée par un édifice et il ne peut donc concevoir que cela soit soumis à des règlements municipaux. Au début des années 1930, Nobbs est coprésident du comité conjoint de la City Improvement League et du Montreal Board of Trade, créé dans le but d'étudier les problèmes de logement et d'élimination des quartiers insalubres. Ce comité procède au premier examen complet des quartiers insalubres à Montréal et prépare un programme d'intervention de l'État à trois niveaux. En 1934, il écrit un rapport très pénétrant intitulé "A Metropolitan System of Waterside Parks for Montreal", sans doute pour la City Improvement League, lequel demeure lettre morte et n'est même pas publié. En 1936, il publie dans une revue du bâtiment un article explicatif traçant les grandes lignes d'un programme de construction de logements visant à répondre aux besoins du Canada, et il semble que cet article ait davantage porté fruit que ses appels lancés aux instances municipales; en effet, des années plus tard, les programmes de construction de logements deviendront un moyen de créer des emplois dans l'industrie du bâtiment. 22

Quatre articles intéressants sur l'architecture et le design paraissent dans des revues architecturales américaines en 1923, année où dix ravissantes photographies des oeuvres de Nobbs et Hyde sont publiées dans The American Architect - The Architectural Review.²³ En 1935, il semble que Nobbs ait été invité à écrire un article sur l'économique architecturale pour le JRAIC. Ce faisant, il établit sa distinction bien connue entre le design et l'architecture. Le design, écrit-il, qui cherche à solutionner les problèmes et à découvrir la forme en fonction du but pratique, de la matière et de la technique d'un objet est entièrement lié à l'Iconomique; tandis que l'architecture intéresse avant tout les impressions. Dans bien des cas, la forme découverte est l'objet de commentaires artistiques, mais dans l'architecture monumentale dont le but n'est pas forcément pratique, le contenu spirituel peut ne pas avoir grand chose à voir avec la solution d'un problème et n'a qu'un rapport très mince avec l'économique.²⁴ Pour Nobbs, architecture n'est pas synonyme de construction. C'est un concept qui décrit le génie artistique des hommes qui font de leur mieux pour assurer l'expressivité d'un édifice. L'architecture est le terme qu'il utilise pour décrire ce concept, et il s'élève contre le fait qu'on associe l'architecture à l'art de ceux qui se prennent pour des architectes. En 1940, Nobbs écrit un article sur le sujet d'un drapeau canadien où il donne un aperçu assez exact du motif qui sera adopté vingt-cinq ans plus tard.²⁵ L'art héraldique le fascine, sans doute parce qu'il représente un microcosme de ses idées sur le design et l'architecture. Les règles de l'art héraldique mettant en jeu le design, les matériaux, la tradition, et tous les détails d'une oeuvre, elles fixent des limites positives tout en laissant libre cours à l'esprit et à l'expression de l'architecte. Le dernier essai de Nobbs sur le design et les matériaux traitait du fer forgé ornemental dans l'art duquel il semble être

L'intérêt de Nobbs pour le développement de la profession d'architecte au Canada transparaît dans bon nombre de ses écrits, notamment dans un essai qui a traite plus particulièrement des rapports entre les architectes et leurs clients et qui paraît dans le Journal of the American Institute of Architects en 1921. Une nouvelle analyse du rôle de l'enseignement universitaire dans l'architecture pour répondre aux besoins de l'époque paraît en 1925. En 1927, il écrit un récit en trois parties sur le Royal Institute of British Architects pour expliquer à ses confrères canadiens son organisation et son contrôle, ses activités pédagogiques, sa bibliothèque et sa revue. La nécessité de remanier les règlements des concours architecturaux le passionne, et il publie un article constructif sur ce sujet en 1935. Il prépare une importante communication sur la rémunération des architectes à l'occasion du 15e Congrès International des Architectes qui devait avoir lieu à Washington au mois de septembre 1939, mais qui fut annulé en raison de la déclaration de la guerre en Europe. De bons extraits de cet article paraîtront plus tard dans le JRAIC, la première fois

sous son titre original, la deuxième sous le titre "The Sliding Scale of Remuneration.32"

Nobbs décrit ses propre oeuvres dans six essais. Le premier traite de son oeuvre à McGill en 1920.³³ "The Canadian Battlefields Memorial Competition" décrit les oeuvres qu'il a réalisées pour la Commission Impériale des Monuments aux Morts dont il est membre.³⁴ Les oeuvres qu'il exécute à l'université d'Alberta font l'objet de deux communications, la première en 1921 -- l'agencement initial du pavillon des arts, la deuxième en 1925 -- projet plus complet incluant le pavillon de médecine.³⁵ Les articles intitulés "Bibliotheca Osleriana" en 1930 et "McGill Decorations for the Royal Visit in 1939" décrivent deux projets que Nobbs a réalisés pour McGill et où il aspire à l'excellence grâce à son souci de l'expressivité d'une oeuvre.³⁶

Enfin, cinq de ses essais sont des marques d'estime pour des hommes avec qui il a travaillé et auxquels il voue une profonde admiration: Sir William Macdonald, l'un des grands bienfaiteurs de McGill; son professeur Sir Robert Lorimer; l'urbaniste Noulan Cauchon; Ramsay Traquair, son successeur à la chaire Macdonald d'architecture à McGill; et Frank Darling, doyen des architectes canadiens.37 Après avoir créé deux édifices pour Macdonald, Nobbs sait bien que c'est un homme sage et tendre et il regrette qu'avec le temps, ses qualités spirituelles soient à ce point cachées par les récits qui courent sur sa richesse. Lorimer, l'artiste et l'artisan, suivant une génération de barbares archéologiques, a découvert l'esprit de vieux édifices écossais jusque là laissés pour compte. Il est le dernier des grands romantiques dont on peut placer le nom à côté d'architectes comme Philip Webb et Richard Norman Shaw. Cauchon, de l'avis de Nobbs, incarne la patience, la vigueur et le courage de ses ancêtres français, irlandais et écossais. Il se fait le défenseur passionné et infatigable de la cause désespérée du logement et de l'urbanisme au Canada. Les connaissances encyclopédiques de Traquair en sciences et en arts et la fascination qu'exerce sur lui la façon dont les choses s'assemblent en font un professeur d'architecture éminemment doué que tout le monde admire. Traquair lui aussi a appris grâce à Lorimer à apprécier le charme des vieux édifices et c'est ainsi qu'il commença sa célebre étude documentée de l'architecture ancienne du Québec. Il est impossible de ne pas remarquer l'importance de celui-ci s'est vu décerner la médaille d'or du Royal Institute of Darling: British Architects en 1915, ce qui le place sur un pied d'égalité avec Cockerell et des autres qui l'ont obtenue à partir de 1848. Darling sait fort bien comment établir le rapport entre l'intérieur et l'extérieur d'un édifice, mais avant tout, il saisit parfaitement l'importance de l'échelle, que ce soit dans la conception d'une maison ou d'une oeuvre néo-classique. Sa notion d'aménagement individuel est une importante contribution au design canadien moderne.

Sur le plan individuel, les essais de Nobbs sont judicieusement composés et sont un véritable plaisir à lire. Pris collectivement, ils relatent la propre évolution de Nobbs et les événements tels qu'ils les a vécus et permettent de mieux comprendre ses contemporains.

GEORGE TAYLOR HYDE: BIOGRAPHY / BIOGRAPHIE

George Taylor Hyde was born in Montreal, 25 August 1879, the son of George Hyde and Alison Taylor. After attending the Montreal High School he entered McGill University and obtained the B.Sc. (Arch. Eng.) in 1899. In 1901 he obtained an S.B.(Arch.) from Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Hyde worked briefly with Taylor and Gordon in Montreal before practicing in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania (1902-7). In 1907 he moved back to Canada to work independently in Montreal before merging his practice with that of Percy Nobbs in 1910. This partnership endured until Hyde's death. Hyde became a member of the Province of Quebec Association of Architects in 1907, served as President in 1928, and was elected a Fellow of the Royal Institute of British Architects in 1929. He was also an Associate of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada. He died 23 June 1944.

George Taylor Hyde, fils de George Hyde et Alison Taylor, naît à Montréal le 25 août 1879. Après des études secondaires à la Montreal High School, il entre à l'université McGill et obtient son baccalauréat ès sciences (génie architectural en 1899. En 1901, il reçoit le grade de S.B. Arch.) du Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Hyde travaille brièvement avec Taylor et Gordon à Montréal avant d'aller exercer à Pittsburgh en Pennsylvanie 1902-07). En 1907, il revient au Canada où il entame une carrière indépendante à Montréal avant de fusionner son agence avec celle de Percy Nobbs en 1910. Cette association durera jusqu'au décès de Hyde. Hyde devient membre de l'Association des architectes de la Province de Québec en 1907, il en assume la présidence en 1928, puis il devient membre du Royal Institute of British Architects en 1929. Il est également membre associé de l'Institut royal d'architecture du Canada. Il meurt le 23 juin 1944.

HUGH ALLEN INGLIS VALENTINE: BIOGRAPHY / BIOGRAPHIE

Hugh Allen Inglis Valentine was born in Dundee, Scotland, 1 May 1904. After attending Rosemount School and Montreal High School he entered McGill University in 1923. While at school and university he worked for Ross and Macdonald (1920-27). After graduating with a B. Arch. in 1928, he worked for David R. Brown (1928-31) and William E. Martin of Wilmington, Delaware (1929-30). From 1935 to 1945 he served in the architectural office of the Bell Telephone Company. In 1945 he became a partner of Percy Nobbs until 1950 when he rejoined the Bell Telephone Company as chief architect. Valentine became a member of the Province of Quebec Association of Architects in 1934, served as President in 1957, and was elected a Fellow of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada. He taught as a sessional lecturer at the McGill School of Architecture from 1959 to 1967. Valentine retired in 1970 and died in 1978.


Hugh Allen Inglis Valentine naît à Dundee en Écosse le 1er mai 1904. Après des études à la Rosemount School et à la Montreal High School, il entre à l'université McGill en 1923. Pendant ses études, il travaille pour l'agence Ross et Macdonald 1920-27. Après avoir obtenu un bac. arch. en 1928, il travaille pour le compte de David R. Brown (1928-31) et de William E. Martin de Wilmington au Delaware (1929-30). De 1935 à 1945, il travaille à l'agence d'architecture de la compagnie Bell Téléphone du Canada. En 1945, il s'associe à Percy Nobbs jusqu'à 1950, année où il réintègre la société Bell Téléphone en qualité d'architecte en chef. Valentine devient membre de l'Association des architectes de la Province de Québec en 1934, en assume la présidence en 1957 et est élu membre de l'Institut royal d'architecture du Canada. Il enseigne des cours saisonniers à l'École d'architecture de McGill de 1959 à 1967. Valentine prend sa retraite en 1970 et meurt en 1978.

FRANCIS JOHN NOBBS: BIOGRAPHY / BIOGRAPHIE

Francis John Nobbs was born in Montreal, 2 November 1912, the son of Percy Erskine Nobbs and Mary Cecilia Shepherd. He attended Selwyn House School and Trinity College School before studying architecture at McGill, receiving a B. Arch in 1936. He worked for a time for Montreal architects H.L. Fetherstonhaugh and J. Cecil McDougall and subsequently spent two years in the office of Nobbs and Hyde prior to serving in the Second World War. In 1945 he rejoined his father's practice as a partner until 1960, since which time he has practiced under his own name. He became a member of the Province of Quebec Association of Architects in 1938, served as its president in 1963 and 1965, and was elected a Fellow of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada in 1960.

Francis John Nobbs, fils de Percy Erskine Nobbs et de Mary Cecilia Shepherd, naît à Montréal le 2 novembre 1912. Il fréquente la Selwyn House School et la Trinity College School avant d'entrer à l'université McGill où il étudie l'architecture et reçoit un bac. arch. en 1936. Pendant un temps, il travaille pour les architectes montréalais H.L. Fetherstonhaugh et J. Cecil McDougall avant d'entrer au service de Nobbs et Hyde où il passe deux ans juste avant de partir pour la Deuxième guerre mondiale. En 1945, il entre dans l'agence de son père dont il devient l'associé jusqu'à 1960, année à partir de laquelle il exercera sous son propre nom. Il devient membre de l'Association des architectes de la Province de Québec en 1938, en assume la présidence en 1963 et 1965 et est élu membre de l'Institut royal d'architecture du Canada en 1960.

METHODOLOGY AND GUIDE TO THE USE OF THE INVENTORY

A. General arrangement of the inventory.

The purpose of this inventory is to provide a comprehensive listing of the drawings by Percy Nobbs and his associates, which form part of the Canadian Architecture Collection (CAC). Arranged chronologically, the inventory reflects in Sections 1 and 2 respectively the development of Nobbs's and Hyde's early careers as individual architects. Sections 3, 4 and 5 respectively trace the development of the partnerships Nobbs and Hyde (1910-44), Nobbs and Valentine (1945-50) and Nobbs and Nobbs (1950-60). Hugh A.I. Valentine worked only briefly with Nobbs, spending the bulk of his career with the Bell Telephone Company of Canada. His commissioned drawings and student notebooks cannot be directly related to his work with Nobbs and are thus listed separately in Section 8. Sections 6 and 7 describe Percy Nobbs's personal papers and three-dimensional objects designed by him which are in the CAC.

B. Project descriptions.

All information noted on the project and drawing description sheets designed for the purposes of the inventory has been compiled from the drawings and from office records. The terms used to define project types were derived from the Time Saver Standards of Building Types (1973).

The components of a standard entry in the inventory are:

- 1.Record number: the unique reference number which identifies each project and operation.
- 2.Architect's name: unless specified by the section heading, the name is supplied on the first line of the description.
- 3.Project title: based as closely as possible on the drawings and office records, but edited and standardized for clarity and consistency (e.g. where Nobbs and Hyde used both "house" and "residence", "house" is used in the inventory). Major editorial additions or changes to titles are indicated by square brackets. In certain instances, related drawings have been grouped together and assigned a common title (e.g. Student Prize and Competition Drawings of P.E. Nobbs). The term 'proposal' indicates projects which are known to have been unexecuted.
- 4.Place: the city, street and address are shown for all operations, as is the province or state (except for Quebec where the majority of operations were carried out). For projects outside of North America, the country is also given. Where the location was not specified by the architects, it has been added if known. Building names, parks and campuses have also been considered to be addresses. Street numbers have been given as found, as it is beyond the scope of this inventory to verify them. Square brackets indicate modern street names.
- 5.Client: as supplied by the drawings or office records.
- 6.Operation number: beginning in 1907, Hyde gave a sequential operation number to each of his commissions. This sequence was continued in his partnership with Nobbs, and later in Nobbs's partnerships with Valentine and Francis Nobbs. Any operation by Nobbs that was not included in the above sequence (primarily, but not exclusively, Nobbs's projects before his partnership with Hyde) has been listed in chronological order with undated operations placed at the end. An operation number whose first digit is a zero (0) has then been assigned. These numbers, found in Section 1, are not singly sequential as intervals of five have been left in case other operations need to be added to the existing

chronological sequence. If an operation involved several stages, a letter in square brackets has been added to the operation number, according to the precedent set by Nobbs who used a combined alpha-numeric system in such instances.

- 7. Date: months and years during which the major part of the operation was carried out as indicated by the drawings.
- 8. Building type: a general designation indicating the nature of a project, including details of size, materials and structure.
- 9. Drawing description: the number of drawings, and their medium and support.
- 10. Drawing inventory: listed in hierarchical order according to the sequence in which drawings are produced in standard architectural practise, i.e. survey, measured, sketch, presentation, development, working, detail, shop, consultant and record.
- 11. Photographic material: photographs of drawings, models, works in progress, completed operations and related subjects kept by the office.
- 12.Related papers: correspondence, notes, specifications, contracts, financial records and clippings.
- 13. Comments: include important supplementary information, which adds to the understanding of a project.

C. Indexes.

Four separate indexes were created to facilitate access to the inventory: the Project Title Index, Client Index, Topographical Index and Typological Index. They were generated using dBase III software, which has permitted the establishment of a permanent database for all projects and operations. This database will be available for online searching upon request. All data for the indexes was taken from the project description sheets, except where projects could not be classified under existing categories (e.g. coins, stamps, letterheads). In many instances, certain titles have been inverted in order to be sorted alphabetically (e.g. 'Smith, Lionel - Garage' not 'Addition of Garage for Lionel Smith'). Corporate and building names remain unaltered. It should be noted that the numbers given in the indexes refer to the records, not the operation numbers.

MÉTHODOLOGIE ET GUIDE D'UTILISATION DE L'INVENTAIRE

A. Organisation générale de l'inventaire.

Le but de cet inventaire est de fournir une liste complète des dessins de Percy Nobbs et de ses associés, qui font partie de la Collection d'architecture canadienne (CAC). Organisé par ordre chronologique, l'inventaire reflète dans les sections 1 et 2 respectivement l'évolution des carrières de Nobbs et Hyde en tant qu'architectes individuels. Les sections 3, 4 et 5 retracent respectivement l'évolution des associations entre Nobbs et Hyde (1910-44), Nobbs et Valentine (1945-50) et Nobbs et Nobbs (1950-60). Hugh A.I. Valentine n'a travaillé que brièvement avec Nobbs, passant le gros de sa carrière au sein de la compagnie Bell Telephone du Canada. Les dessins qui lui ont été commandés et ses carnets d'étudiant ne peuvent être directement rapprochés de sa collaboration avec Nobbs et ils figurent donc séparément à la section 8. Les sections 6 et 7 décrivent les écrits personnels de Percy Nobbs et les objets tridimensionnels conçus par lui qui se trouvent dans la CAC.

B. Description des projets.

Toutes les données qui figurent sur les feuilles de description des projets et dessins conçus pour les besoins de l'inventaire ont été recueillies à partir des dessins et des archives de bureau. Les termes utilisés pour définir les types de projet sont tirés du Time Saver Standards of Building Types (1973).

Voici les différents éléments qui composent un paramètre standard de l'inventaire:

l. Numéro de dossier: le numéro de référence qui identifie chaque projet.

- 2.Nom de l'architecte: sauf s'il est précisé dans l'en-tête de la section, le nom est indiqué à la première ligne de la description.
- 3. Titre du projet: s'inspire de très près des dessins et archives de bureau, mais est édité et normalisé par souci de clarté et d'homogénéité (par exemple lorsque Nobbs et Hyde emploient les termes "maison" et "résidence", c'est le terme "maison" qui est utilisé dans l'inventaire). Les ajouts ou changements éditoriaux importants apportés aux titres sont indiqués entre crochets. Dans certains cas, les dessins apparentés ont été regroupés et ont reçu un titre commun (par exemple Prix étudiants et dessins de concours de P.E. Nobbs). Le terme "proposal" dénote un projet dont on sait qu'il n'a pas été exécuté.
- 4.Lieu: la ville, la rue et l'adresse figurent pour toutes les projets tout comme la province ou l'état (à l'exception du Québec où ont été réalisés la majorité des projets). Pour ceux qui ont été réalisés en dehors de l'Amérique du Nord, le nom du pays est également indiqué. Lorsque le lieu n'a pas été précisé par les architectes, il a été ajouté lorsqu'il était connu. On a également jugé que les noms des édifices, des parcs et campus constituaient des adresses. Les numéros de rue ont été indiqués tels que trouvés, car leur vérification dépasse le champ d'action de cet inventaire. Les crochets dénotent des noms de rue modernes.
- 5.Client: tel qu'il apparaît sur les dessins ou les archives de bureau.
- 6.Numéro de classement de l'architecte: à compter de 1907, Hyde donne un numéro séquentiel à chacune de ses commandes. Cet ordre se poursuit dans ses associations avec Nobbs, et plus tard dans les associations de Nobbs avec Valentine et Francis Nobbs. Tout projet de Nobbs qui n'est pas compris dans l'ordre ci-dessus (avant tout mais pas exclusivement les projets de Nobbs avant son association avec Hyde) est indiqué par ordre chronologique, les projets non

datés étant placés à la fin. Un numéro de classement dont le premier chiffre est un zéro (0) a ensuite été attribué. Ces numéros que l'on trouve dans la section l ne sont pas uniquement séquentiels, des intervalles de cinq ayant été laissés au cas où il faudrait ajouter d'autres projets à l'ordre chronologique existant. Si un projet comporte plusieurs étapes, une lettre entre crochets a été ajouté au numéro de classement suivant le précédent établi par Nobbs qui se servait dans ces cas d'un système alpha-numérique combiné.

- 7. Date: mois et années durant lesquels la majeure partie du projet a été réalisée, comme cela est indiqué dans les dessins.
- 8. Type d'édifice: désignation générale indiquant la nature d'un projet, notamment précisions sur sa taille, les matériaux qui le composent et sa structure.
- 9. Description des dessins: le nombre de dessins, la technique et le support.
- 10. Inventaire des dessins: énuméré par ordre hiérarchique selon l'ordre où les dessins sont produits dans une agence d'architectes normale, c'est-à-dire dessin d'arpentage, relevé, esquisse, dessin de présentation, étude, dessin d'exécution, détail, dessin d'atelier, dessin de consultant et dessin à publier.
- 11. Matériel photographique: photographies des dessins, modèles, oeuvres en chantier, des projets achevés et des sujets connexes conservés par le bureau.
- 12. Écrits connexes: correspondance, notes, cahiers des charges, contrats, dossiers financiers et coupures de presse.
- 13. Observations: contiennent d'importants renseignements complémentaires qui ajoutent à la compréhension d'un projet.

C. Indexes.

Quatre indexes séparés ont été créés pour faciliter l'accès à l'inventaire; l'index des titres de projets, l'index des clients, l'index topographique, l'index typologique. Ces indexes ont été produits grâce au logiciel dBase III, qui a permis l'établissement d'une base de données permanente pour tous les projets. Cette base de données sera disponible pour les opérations de recherche en "direct" sur demande. Toutes les données des indexes sont tirées des feuilles de description des projets, sauf dans les cas oû les projets ne pouvaient être classifiés dans les catégories existantes (par exemple pièces, timbres, en-têtes de lettre). Dans bien des cas, certains titres ont été inversés afin d'être triés par ordre alphabétique (par exemple "Smith, Lionel Garage" et non "Addition of Garage for Lionel Smith"). Les noms de sociétés et d'édifices demeurent inchangés. L'on remarquera que les numéros donnés dans les indexes renvoient aux numéros de dossier et non aux numéros de classement de l'architecte.





PERCY ERSKINE NOBBS PROFESSIONAL AND PERSONAL CORRESPONDENCE AND OTHER PAPERS

The Percy Erskine Nobbs papers in the Canadian Architecture Collection constitute only a portion of the architect's professional and personal records, as neither Nobbs and his associates' office files nor Nobbs's private correspondence are represented in their entirety. Existing office files are noted under the appropriate operation numbers in the body of the inventory as are photographs from the office records. An inventory of Nobbs and Hyde drawings by operation number (1907-45) also survives. The papers listed here do, however, have considerable interest for the researcher, since they span much of Nobbs's adult life (c1895-1960) and illustrate the tremendous range of his activities.

In order to arrange these fragmentary records, an artificial system was devised based on their function. The six categories into which the papers were sorted are: a) personal projects; b) McGill University; c) addresses, reports and papers; d) city planning activities; e) professional associations; and f) personal correspondence.

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


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
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
