EDITORIAL

Last Thursday, Dr. H. G. Dion, Dean of the Faculty of Agriculture, called a meeting of all resident students in Brittain Hall. For the benefit of the rest of the student body and for those male students who found it possible to be absent, the object of the Dean's calling this meeting was to impress upon the students his genuine concern about the increasing number of failures or "Scrape-throughs", especially outstanding in last years spring results.

"Is it possible", asked the Dean, "that rules regarding study and quiet hours in the residence are not being properly observed?"

Most students undoubtedly feel that the responsibility for answering this question lies entirely with the house committee but it is this narrow-minded, selfish attitude, that is the cause for the failure, if any, in our system of student self-government. Whether or not a fine is imposed for some infraction of a rule, the rule has, nevertheless, been broken. The payment of a fine for creating a

disturbance does not compensate those students who may have been distracted from their studies, nor should your willingness to pay the fine lead you to believe that you are, so-to-speak, a licensed, authorised "noise-maker". Similarly "snackers" in the Coffee Shop who throw refuse on the floor, or leave dirty dishes on the tables hoping that their actions will not be noticed by a member of the Coffee Shop Committee are not achieving anything, but, in effect, are causing a failure in government.

Macdonald has been referred to, over and over again, as an individual community, but in this respect it differs from the usual:- every member here is striving towards the same goal, some more enthusiastically than others, but nevertheless, that goal remains common. Is it too much to expect then, that a little more than the usual amount of consideration be given by the students for the students?






