

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Our author, Stanley Mann, was born in Toronto in 1928. There he attended Alexander Muir Public School and Bloor Collegiate High School, where he took an active interest in dramatics. In 1945 Stanley moved to Montreal. He entered West Hill High School and graduated the next year. While at West Hill, his interest in school dramatics continued, and he took part in several productions there.

At Dawson College last year, Stanley was instrumental in forming the Dawson Players' Club, and appeared in a leading role in that club's production of "You Can't Take It With You". Now a member of the Canadian Art Theatre, Stanley may be remembered for his stirring portrayal of "Sam" in their presentation of Elmer's Rice's "Street Scene" last fall.

At present an English Honours student at McGill, Stanley Mann has written several short stories and poems which have appeared in various periodicals. He is actively associated with the McGill Daily and the campus Radio Workshop.

After completing "Through the Pale Door", which is his first full-length play, despite the fact that rehearsals, his many other extra-curricular activities and studies seem to take up all his spare time, he has managed to get started on a new play, which he hopes to have ready by next summer.

Choreography - an Art

Elizabeth Leese commenced her education as a dancer at the age of ten years and has had wide experience both in ballet and modern dancing at various schools in England and continental Europe.

Miss Leese was a member of the Mattrey Hungarian Ballet and later of the Viennese Ballet. She is the only former member living in Canada of the Trudi Schoop Swiss Ballet, with which she travelled in Europe and toured the United States in 1936.

After spending some time in England at the Joos School of Modern Dancing and at the Kate Rorke School of Drama, Miss Leese came to Canada shortly before the outbreak of war.

Miss Leese studied with the Shollar-Vilzak School in New York and has numbered among her teached Humphrey Weideman and Martha Graham. In 1943, during residence in Toronto, she became associated with the Canadian Ballet directed by Boris Volkoff and was also enlisted by the Recreational Association to present modern and comic ballet.

At the present time Miss Leese is anxious to form a professional Canadian ballet group. In Montreal she has appeared with "Les Compagnons" as well as directing the choreography for the "Bleu et Or" revue at the University of Montreal.

Of the Players

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WILLIAM BOSWELL, while at Bishop's College School, became interested in dramatics, and played the title role in their production of "Henry IV". Last term, young, mild-nannered Bill appeared as "Malcolm" in the Players' Club's production of "George and Margaret".

RANDY PHILLIPS, the voluble publisher, Mr. Whittier, will be remembered for his performances with the McGill Radio Workshop's "Campus Capers". In addition to his contribution before the footlights, Randy was one of the "men behind the scenes" of last year's Red and White Revue.

PAUL HORTON, has appeared in several of Filmore Sadler's productions as well as with the Shakespeare Society in "King Lear" and "Romeo and Juliet". He will be remembered for his successful portrayal of the irrepressible young "Dudley" of the Players' Club's production of "George and Margaret" last term.

PATRICIA ORANGE, comes from Welland, Ontario, where she was connected with the Welland Little Theatre. Among the roles she has played with this group are "Grazia" in "Death Takes a Holiday" and "Mrs. de Winter" in "Rebecca".

DENNIS FRASER, cast as Jerry, is a third year pre-Medicine student. A native of Toronto, Dennis gained theatrical experience in school productions, and was also affiliated with the Toronto Theatrical Group.

VIVIENNE SLAVOUSKI, is a third year Science student at McGill. She appeared in several plays while attending Montreal High School and as a member of the Canadian Art Theatre took part in their recent productions of "The Wizard of Oz" and "Alice Through the Looking Glass".

Joan O'Connell, a newcomer to McGill this year, makes her debut on the stage in the role of Marion. Joan previously attended West Hill High School, and commenced her studies in literature at the Junior College of Connecticut.

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
