




ELIZABETH LEESE is internationally recognized not only as a dancer but also as a choreographer and teacher. Her broad knowledge of both the traditional classical ballet and of the modern dance form is unique among Canadian dancers. She has performed and studied widely in Europe and in the United States where she has been associated with such prominent exponents of the modern dance as Martha Graham, Hanya Holm, Charles Weidman, and Doris Humphrey. Since making Montreal her home, Miss Leese has been most successful in establishing one of our better studios for the study of dancing from which she hopes eventually to build up a trained group of dancers.



RUSTY DAVIS has long been a leader in Montreal's musical world. He is also one of its busiest. If he is not composing a popular ballad or writing the background music for a new Canadian movie, he may be selling a new radio package show, doing the musical orchestrations for it, or maybe even producing it. Returning to the Red and White Revue this year after a long absence, Rusty will no doubt be interested in comparing the 1950 show with those he wrote in 1925, '26, '27 while at McGill.



ROY WOLVIN, like his brother Don, is a three year man with the Revue, and once again has produced a show full of catchy tunes. The writer, producer, and director of several shows among them "Wakey-Wakey" while in the navy, he will more recently be remembered for such songs as "Caughnawaga Too", and "Up or Down" in last year's Red and White. Also for his "She Don't Like Doing Nothing No Place Twice" in the Junior League "Holiday Revue". While writing he has gained experience at such odd jobs as summer stock, publicity, and stage managing in New York.
