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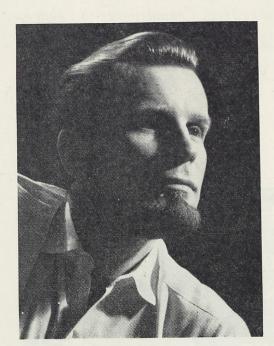

INSTRUCTIONS

- (2) Pry your seat number tag off. This is your counter.* Be careful to remove all the nails, or you may tear the board. (The nails in your counter, not in your fingers).
- (3) Cheating is punishable by death.
- (4) Players advance in the following manner. After spinning the wheel, each player draws (face down) three cards from a pack having all black face cards removed. The sum of the cards plus seven (7), (See Rule Three) is your move. If the total is more than 45 (forty-five), you have violated Rule Three (111). Report to the House Manager immediately. Do NOT pass "GO". Do not collect \$200.
- (5) Any player may 'Challenge' by beating his opponent over the head with an overshoe, (either foot). (The origin of this rule is somewhat obscure).
- (6) We give "Pinky Stamps".
- (7) The "Britannia" Rule. Britons shall not be slaves. (See Rule Three).
- (8) The first player to reach the Stage Door, or FINISH, shall be adjudged the weiner.

BIOGRAPHIES

DON'T MISS these programme notes which we were asked to write (twenty minutes ago) because we intend to tell you all about the organization of "Got It Made". It occurred to us that our audience might not be familiar with what all those impressive titles at the beginning of the programme mean: Director; Producer; Co-producer; Moyse Hall; McGill University; February 4, 1960, and all those other highly technical stage terms.

In order to enlighten you on these matters, we got out the old Ouija Board and found out ourselves, and now if you will place your hands lightly on the tabletop, we will pass this information along to you.

For BRIAN MACDONALD, who was director-choreographer-star of "My Fur Lady", McGill is an old stamping ground. "Got It Made" is his sixth Red and White Revue, his career in musical comedy having started with "Subway or Other" way back in the 40's! Brian was also an original member of the National Ballet, and since then has choreographed some three hundred TV shows, directed plays in French and English, as well as last summer's success, "Jubilee". He presently has two ballets, "The Darkling" and Les Whoops-de-doo" in the repertoire of the Royal Winnipeg Ballet. Last year Montreal audiences were delighted with his intimate revue, Uptempo '59, which played a year at the Café André.

IAN BINNIE, CARRYING ON the tradition of previous Red and White Revue producers, started work on the show early in the Summer and has been working on it ever since. (Summer of 1934). Ian, (named incidently for his uncle Roger Thornton), has many other extra-curricular duties: he is Foreign Secretary, Federation of East Ghana; President, Jack Benny Fan Club and a long-time subscriber to the Ladies Home Journal. He also plays the part of S.B. in the show, to add a touch of Hitchcock.

CO-PRODUCER JUDY TARLO, in other decades the assistant to Brian Macdonald, has been more often seen on the stage than behind it. She has been in the last three Revues, and has done professional acting here in "My Fur Lady."

THE CHORUS GIRLS were among the first matters given consideration by the producers. To save you looking through the programme for their names (you nasty man, you) they are found on page seven. The leads are Marilyn Lightstone, as Candy; Liane Marshall as Maisy; Shirley Harrison as Daisy; Linda Randal as Vicki; Aviva Slesin as Mrs. Siddons; and Angela De'Vreeze as Lazy. All these girls, in one way or another, attend McGill. Further, we think you'll agree, they are all female (very) and talented (ditto). Their experience is wide and varied. Marilyn, for instance, has produced a couple of records locally, and has done other professional work. Shirley Harrison has appeared on many other stages here in town. Aviva and Angela, by the way, make their first appearances in a Red and White Revue with "Got It Made." Liane has lots of professional experience around town, and to our knowledge is the only cast member to have appeared in Aklavik.

IN ACT TWO you should be starting to notice that there are men as well as beautiful, talented girls in the show. (If you want their names, they're on page seven too). The male leads are Bill Lyon, Allan Shiach, Ian Binnie, Pierre Perron, Dan Baran and Randy Davies. All intend making the stage their home. (We had to forcibly restrain Randy from slinging a hammock backstage. It wasn't really the hammock that bothered us, it was the smoke from his Coleman stove. Kindly note plug. We must keep up with modern trends). All are old pros by now, with many appearances behind them. Shiach, also one of the writers, appeared at the El Morocco for a spell last Fall with another McGill man, Chris Bryant. Bill Lyon, another "Gim" writer, has worked all over Quebec and in Toronto (for the Fuller Brush Company). Dan Baran and Randy Davies have done a lot of work with the McGill Players' Club and other local groups, notably the Steinberg's Groceteria Annual Revue and the P.S. 19 Grade three alumnae semi-annual class play.

WITH NO COSTUMES, props, sets or other equipment available from one year to the next, a large staff must be organized to make all these things. People like Heather MacLeod, with her Stratford Festival experience come in mighty handy. She designs and supervises the making of the costumes in a little padded room in RVC. Mark Graham designed the sets, using his experience gained through working in past revues here and in England, as well as the Up-Tempo Revue here in town. (WOW, another plug. We could give lessons to Van Doren). Isobel Joseph is prop girl. We are sorry to report that at the moment she is doing two to five in Bordeaux. She was caught collecting props for the payola scene in the Royal Bank.

THE STUDENT BODY seems to be full of capable people, because we had no difficulty in finding people to handle the business end of the show. Andy Billingsley, an old Red and White Revuer is Business Manager, and Bob Tate, advertising manager is really just a figment of Bob Carswell's imagination dreamed up as a publicity stunt (What an imagination). Al Golden, programme manager, also does not exist. We checked into this pretty closely, too. Judy Molyneux is Personnel Director not only for the Revue, but for a big South American concern, the name of which she will not divulge. This is lucky for us though, because she has been able, in her dual capacity, to offer many of the girls jobs in show business down south. (We told ya Julie, don't go).

LAVISHLY DISPLAYED stages and performers are all very well, but there are people who must run these things. In this end of things we have Ian Easterbrook and Stuart Marwick, Technical Director and Stage Manager respectively. Ian went insane when the writers told him they wanted act two to start with an ocean liner sinking on stage. He can now be reached care of Sunnyside Happy Farm, but all mail must be read to him. Stu does the reading.

IS THE HIGH POINT OF THE SHOW meant to come at the end of the first act, the second act or haltway through the interval? This is a question often asked themselves by Dave Mayerovitch, Ian Binnie, Allan Shiach and Bill Lyon. They are the writers, and Steve Coplan the composer. Dave is also known as The Incredible Shrinking Man and insists that we write "Dave has sold hamburgers in all the principal Eastern capitals" in the programme. Does this give you the clue? Steve, on the other hand, never worries what people say about him as long as they mention that he wrote the music for last year's "Reign or Shine" and this year's "Got It Made" which is the show you are now about to see. (If our luck holds).
