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A SHORT HISTORY

McGill's annual Red and White Revue is here again. It started back around 1899 when the students gave birth to a musical show written, directed and performed by themselves and financed with their own money. In its early days it was called McGill Theatre Night. By 1925 the name was changed to the Red and White Revue, incorporating the university's famous colours in the overall title, and it's still going strong. No longer a revue in the strict sense of the word it retains the name. for the sake of tradition. For many years now it's been a full fledged book-show and former graduates from the past 60 years can never recall their rah-rah college days without finding the Red and White cropping up among their varied and assorted memories. It was back in 1957 when the revue struck pay dirt with their production of My Fur Lady. The cast revived the show after a brief pause to write exams and toured it across Canada from coast-to-coast with great success and solved that year's summer job problem. In the middle 60's an edition entitled The Man In The Green Flannel Suit (a take-off on the Robin Hood myth) won the B.M.I. award as the year's best original musical written and performed by university students in North America. And look at some of the names who started their careers in the revue: Burt Bacharach, one of America's leading composers of popular music today; William Shatner, star of Broadway and TV's long running Star Trek; Brian MacDonald, now an internationally famed choreographer (Brian incidentally directed My Fur Lady); James Domville, business administrator of Canada's National Theatre School; Galt McDermott, one of the composer's of Hair and many others.

This year's show is called *Three's Company* and, as a change of pace, will consist of three one act mini-musicals. The first; *Low 'n'. Grim* is a spoof on daytime television's soap opera syndrome. The second; *II Fettucini* is a chamber opera take-off on Italian opera in general. The third: *3's Company* is a satirical situation comedy which involves a newly married couple, both somewhat square, who return from their honeymoon and discover they have to share their apartment with an embarrassingly hippy-type uncle. This year's director is Roy Higgins and the music and lyrics have been written by Bryan Bessner and Allan Guttman. If you enjoy trying to spot tomorrow's superstars, this is where you might find a couple.


ROY HIGGINS

Bryan Bessner, 20, and Allan Guttman, 21, both of Montreal, began their ill-fated partnership early in high school. There, they wrote three original musicals, including a draft of what was to become *Low 'N Grim* in this year's *Red and White*. They have also made substantial contributions to various mediocre summer camp shows, but will deny this when pressed.

Their association with the *Red and White Revue* began with 1969's *Odysseus, Won't You Please Come Home,* in which (in their words) they "stole the show" in minor roles. Last year they wrote book, music and lyrics for (again in their words) the "fantastically successful" *Three Magic Words,* and hope to score again with this year's *Three's Company* — although they will deny this when pressed.

Bryan claims to be currently working toward a Bachelor's degree in Music Composition, while Allan has foolish hopes of graduating this year with a B.A. in Drama.


