

**ECLIPSES, 1893.** — In the year 1893 there will be two eclipses, both of the Sun (☉).

I. A total eclipse of the Sun (☉), April 16. Visible to South America, the larger part of Africa, southern Europe, and intermediate Atlantic Ocean. Being total along a line drawn through South America and across into Sahara, Africa.

II. An annular eclipse of the Sun (☉), October 9. Visible to the western halves of North and South America, the West Indies, the extreme north-eastern tip of Asia, and eastern Pacific Ocean. The path of annulus being in the Pacific Ocean, and running through Lima, Peru.

*Mercury* (☿) will be evening star about March 14, July 11, and November 5; and morning star about April 28, August 25, and December 14.

*Venus* (♀) will be morning star till May 2; then evening star the rest of the year.

*Jupiter* (♃) will be evening star till April 27; then morning star till November 18; and then evening star again the rest of the year.

**Standard Time.** — The calculations of this Almanac are given in local time. In places where what is now called standard time has been substituted for local time, our values can be changed to standard time by applying a correction found as follows: For any place east of one of the standard meridians, and taking that meridian's time, four minutes is to be subtracted for every degree of difference of longitude; and for any place west of the meridian four minutes for every degree of difference is to be added.

**Note.** — In this Almanac the Sun's rising and setting are for the upper limb, corrected for parallax and refraction, in mean time; so are the Moon's.

**GENERAL DIRECTIONS.**

**Doses:**—To be taken three or four times a day.
