

In the year 1903 there will be four eclipses, two of the Sun and two of the Moon.

- I. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, March 28; invisible over Canada. Visible in the Philippine Islands, Eastern Asia, a great portion of the Northern Pacific Ocean and Alaska.
- II. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, April 11; partly visible over Canada. The beginning visible generally in Africa, Europe, the Western portions of Asia and the Eastern parts of South America; the ending visible generally in Africa, Europe, South America, and the Eastern portions of North America. Time of the Eclipse is as follows:—

Moon enters penumbra.....	11d.	4h.	32m.	p.m.
Moon enters shadow.....	11d.	5h.	40m.	p.m.
Middle of Eclipse.....	11d.	7h.	19m.	p.m.
Moon leaves shadow.....	11d.	8h.	58m.	p.m.
Moon leaves penumbra.....	11d.	10h.	6m.	p.m.
- III. A Total Eclipse of the Sun, Sept. 20; invisible over Canada. Visible to the extreme Southern part of Australia, and the greater portion of the Indian Ocean.
- IV. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, October 6; invisible over Canada. The beginning visible generally in Africa and the Pacific Ocean; the ending visible generally in Africa, the Eastern portions of Europe and the Pacific Ocean.

Figure out if you can, the number of cubic feet of air are inhaled and expelled from the lungs in a space of time. You cannot see the air, and, therefore, do not think. You get some idea of it on a frosty day, as the steam-like cloud escapes from your lungs into the open air and becomes condensed. If the year's work were caught into a balloon, how big a balloon would it be? or, if it were condensed into the most compact form, how much would it weigh? Only when these questions are answered can we comprehend the enormous work which the lungs are doing.

And this work is necessary to life—to all kinds of life. Even the leaves of trees are their lungs, and when the leaves die off the branches and trunks go to sleep for the winter until the snow flies, and the leaves come again and the birds sing on the shady branches.

The blood coursing through the lungs is acted upon by the pure air and rarefied and redeemed while the poisonous gas made through the contact is then expelled.

But if any portion of the lungs is affected by disease, the area of healthful action is curtailed and the blood is not vivified, and unless the damage is stopped, the disease works its way until the lungs become useless.

Now, to prevent this disease is much better than curing it.

"My son," said a father to his boy, who was accustomed to use unparliamentary language when he got into trouble, "every time you do that, drive one of these nails into the door." The boy did, and soon the door was pretty well covered with the brassy tokens of his infirmity. The result was shame and contrition. Then the father

And then he shut himself up alone, so that he would not be subjected to be caught in any expressed or ever thought wishes. But one after another would be made until the skin became a mere fragment, and on the last wish vanished into nothingness as the man's spirit fled.

How like the lungs this is.

They are at the centre of life, and when they cease to act life expires. But they are probably the earliest organ to be affected by disease, and the most difficult to cure.
