




## ECLIPSES, 1891.

There will be four eclipses this year, two of the Sun (☉) and two of the Moon (☾) and a Transit of Mercury (☿) as follows:—

I.—A Transit of Mercury over the Sun's disk, May 9, visible from Montreal to Victoria, B.C. Montreal Ingress, 7h. 01m. (Sun sets 7h. 16m.); Egress, invisible, 11h. 58m., midnight. Winnipeg, Ingress, 5h. 27m.; Egress (invisible), 10h. 24m., evening. Victoria, Ingress, 3h. 44m.; Egress, 8h. 41m. Local mean time is given in each case.

II.—A total eclipse of the Moon, May 23, invisible over Canada. Visible over Australia, Asia and part of Europe.

III.—An annular eclipse of the Sun, June 6. Visible over part of Canada, from North-Western Ontario to British Columbia. Begins on the Earth at 9h. 09m., morn; ends, 1h. 33m. aft. Montreal mean time.

IV.—A total eclipse of the Moon, November 15, visible over Canada. Begins at 5h. 41m., eve.; ends at 10h. 20m., eve. Montreal mean time.

V.—A partial eclipse of the Sun, December 1, invisible over Canada. Visible in Buenos Ayres and Patagonia.


