ECLIPSES IN THE YEAR 1853.

There will be two Eclipses of the Sun, and one Eclipse of the Moon, this year.

I. There will be an Eclipse of the Sun on Monday, June 6th, at the time of New Moon in the afternoon, invisible in all the northern portion of the United States. It will be visible on the Sun's southern limb at Tuscaloosa, Milledgeville, Jackson, Natchez, Mobile, Austin, and New Orleans.

The Eclipse will be central and annular on the meridian in longitude $119^{\circ} 54'$ west from Greenwich, and latitude $0^{\circ} 38'$ north.

II. There will be an Eclipse on the Moon's northern limb on the 20th and 21st of June; visible. Duration, 1 h. 36 m. Magnitude, 2.45 digits.

III. There will be an Eclipse of the Sun on the 30th of November, at the time of New Moon; invisible in North America. It will be central and total on the meridian in longitude $110^{\circ} 18'$ west from Greenwich, and latitude $11^{\circ} 20'$ south.

CHRONOLOGICAL CYCLES, &c.

Dominical Letter, B; Golden Number, or Lunar Cycle, 11; Epact, 20; Solar Cycle, 14; Roman Indiction, 11; Julian Period, 6566.

When it is noon at London, it is 6h. 52 m. in the morning at Washington; and when it is noon at Washington, it is 5 h. 8 m. in the evening at London.

The Sun is in *Perigee* December 30, 1852: in *Apogee*, July 3, 1853; in *Perigee* January 1, 1854.

Venus will be Morning Star until May 13, then evening Star until February 28, 1854.

Recipes for House-Keepers.

APPLE JAM.—The apples, which should be ripe and of the best eating sort, being pared and quartered, as for making apple jelly, are put into a pan with water enough to cover them, and boiled until they can be reduced to a mush. Then for each pound of pared apples, a pound of sifted sugar is added, being sprinkled over the boiling mixture. Agitate it well until reduced to a jam, then put it into pots.

The above is the most simple way of making it; but to have it of the best possible clearness, make a thick syrup with three pounds of sugar to each pint of water, and clarify it with an egg. Then add one pint of this syrup for every three pounds of apples, and boil the jam to a proper thickness.

PUMPKIN SAUCE.—Cut the pumpkin as you would a citrou melon for preserving. Boil in plenty of water until tender. Take out the pumpkin. For 12 lbs. pumpkin, add to the liquor 6 lbs. sugar, and 1 of sliced lemons. Put back the pumpkin and stew slowly until thoroughly done.

PUMPKIN APPLE PIE.—Select a pumpkin, one of deep yellow color, hard to cut, and of sweet rich taste. Stew and mash fine. To one quart of pumpkin, add two large spoonfuls of apple molasses, and two tea-spoonfuls of sugar, spice to the taste, and bake in crust as dried apples.

If preferred richer, increase the quantity of sugar, and in place of apple molasses, maple molasses with a little vinegar may be used.

EGG PONE.—Three eggs, a quart of corn flour, a large tea-spoonful of fresh butter, a small tea-spoonful of salt, a half pint, or more of milk. Beat the eggs very light, and mix them with the milk. Then stir in gradually the corn flour, adding the salt and butter. It must not be a batter, but soft dough, just thick enough to be stirred well with a spoon. If too thin, add more corn flour, if too stiff, thin it with a little more milk. Beat or stir it long and hard. Butter a tin or iron pan; put the mixture into it; and set the pan immediately into an oven, which must be moderately hot at first, and the heat increased afterwards. A Dutch oven is best for this purpose. It should bake an hour and a half or two hours, in proportion to its thickness. Send it to the table hot; and cut it into slices. Eat it with butter or molasses.

SWEET APPLE PUDDING.—Take one pint of scalding milk, half a pint of Indian meal, a tea-spoonful of salt, and six sweet apples, and bake not less than three hours; the apples will afford an excellent rich jelly. This is truly one of the most luxurious yet simple Yankee puddings made.

MUSHROOM KETCHUP.—1. Sprinkle Mushroom flaps, gathered in the Fall, with common salt, stir them occasionally for two or three days, then lightly squeeze out the juice, and add to each gallon bruised cloves and mustard seed, of each $\frac{1}{4}$ oz., bruised allspice, black pepper, and ginger, of each 1 oz., gently heat to a boiling point in a covered vessel, macerate for 14 days, and strain; should it exhibit any indications of change, in a few weeks bring it again to the boiling point, with a little more spice. 2. Mushroom juice 2 gallons; pimento 2 oz., cloves, black pepper, mustard seed and ginger, of each bruised, 1 oz., salt 1 lb. or to taste, eschalots 3 oz.; gently simmer for 1 hour in a covered vessel, cool, strain, and bottle. A glazed earthenware or un-tinned copper pan should not be used for heating this or any other ketchup in, as the salt and juice rapidly corrode the copper, and render the ketchup poisonous.

Recipes for House-Keepers.

CUCUMBER KETCHUP.—From ripe cucumbers, in the same way as mushroom ketchup. Mixed with cream, or melted butter, it forms an excellent *white sauce* for fowls, &c.

TOMATO KETCHUP.—Prepared like mushroom ketchup, except that a little Chili vinegar is commonly added.

TO PRESERVE FRUIT.—Take any kind of fruit, such as plums, peaches, gooseberries, &c. picked while rather green, put them into bottles, filling them full, then fill the bottles to the top with water and set them in a kettle of cold water over a fire, and allow them to remain till the water in the kettle boils, then take the bottles out, cork them tightly and set them in the cellar. It is said that various kinds of fruit may be kept in this manner for years.

RICE BLANCMANGE.—This forms an excellent accompaniment to preserves of any kind, or to baked apples. It is made as follows:—Put one teacupful of whole rice into half a pint of cold water; when the rice cracks, or begins to look white, add one pint of milk, and a quarter of a pound of loaf sugar. Boil it until the rice has absorbed the whole of the milk, stirring it frequently the whole time. Put it into a mould, and it will turn out when quite cold. If preferred hot, it may be again made warm by being placed in the oven for a short time. It may be flavored with lemon, cinnamon, &c. but is most wholesome without, and forms both an elegant and very economical dish at any time.

POTATO JELLY.—Peel the potatoes, and grate them to a fine pulp; throw this into a jug of water and stir it well, then into a fine sieve, and collect that which passes through into a basin; let it stand, and in a few minutes the starchy matter will be deposited, from which the water may be poured off. Now stir up the starch from the bottom of the basin, and add boiling water (be certain that it quite boils), and it will pass into a beautiful jelly, which has only to be flavored with sugar, nutmeg, and wine, to fit it for the table.

TO BAKE APPLES.—Sweet apples properly baked and eaten with milk are excellent. The best method of baking tart apples is to take the fairest and largest in size, wipe them clean if thin-skinned, and pare them if the skin is thick and tough; cut the largest portion of the core from one end, and place the fruit on well glazed earthen dishes or pans with the end, which has been cored upward, and fill the cavity with refined powdered sugar. Then place them in the oven, or other apparatus for baking, until sufficiently cooked. Take them out, and when cold they are perfectly delicious.

BREAD PUDDING.—Cut bread and butter in thin slices, lay them in your dish. Boil as much milk as your dish will hold, with three eggs to each quart, with a little cinnamon. Pour it over your bread, cover it close till well soaked, sweeten to your taste, and bake half an hour.

SHORT BREAD.—Rub one pound of butter and 12 ounces of finely powdered loaf sugar, into two pounds of flour, with the hand; make it into a stiff paste with four eggs, roll out to double the thickness of a penny piece, cut it into round or square cakes, pinch the edges, stick slices of candied peel and some caraway comfits on the top, and bake them on iron plates in a warm oven.

Recipes for House-keepers.

INDIAN LOAF.—To three pints of milk, add as much Indian meal as will make a thin batter, three eggs, two table spoonfuls of butter, a tea spoonful of saleratus, and salt to suit the taste. If not to be had, the loaf is good without the eggs.

To MAKE CORN OYSTERS.—Take three dozen ears of large young Indian corn, six eggs, lard and butter in equal portions for frying. The corn must be young and soft. Grate it from the cob as fine as possible, and dredge it with wheat flour. Beat very light the six eggs, and mix them gradually with the corn. Then let the whole be well incorporated by hard beating; add a spoonful of salt.

Have ready in a frying pan, a sufficient quantity of lard and fresh butter mixed together. Set it over the fire, till it is boiling hot, and then put in portions of the corn mixture, so as to form oval cakes about three inches long, and nearly an inch thick. Fry them brown, and send them to table hot. In taste they will be found to have a singular resemblance to fried oysters, and universally liked if properly done. They make nice side dishes at dinner, and are very good at breakfast.

To MAKE YEAST.—To two middling-sized boiled potatoes, add a pint of boiling water and two table spoonfuls of brown sugar. One pint of boiling water should be applied to every half pint of the compound. Hot water is better in warm weather. This yeast, being made without flour, will keep longer, and is said to be much better than any previously in use.

CREAM CAKE.—Four cups of flour, three cups of sugar, two cups of butter, one cup of sour cream, one tea spoonful of saleratus dissolved in milk, and four eggs; add a tea spoonful of essence of lemon and half a nutmeg grated. Beat it well, and bake it in a quick oven.

RICH PASTE CAKES.—Rub three ounces of butter into half a pound of rice flour, moisten it with water, work it well, and roll it out thin; then cut it in small cakes, and bake it in a quick oven.

To PRESERVE HAMS THROUGH SUMMER.—Make a number of cotton bags a little larger than your hams; after the hams are well smoked, place them in the bags; then get the very best sweet made hay, cut it with a cutting box or knife, with your hands press it well around the hams in the bags, tie your bags with good strings, put on a card of the year to show their age, and hang them up in your garret, or some dry place, and my word for it, if you let them hang for five years, they will be better than on the day you put them up. I have kept them for seven years. This method costs but little, as the bag will last for years. The only loss is the hay, and that the cattle will eat if given to them in the winter. The sweating of the hams will be taken up by the hay, and it will also impart a fine flavor to the meat.

To keep a Stove as bright as a coach body, by two applications a year.—Make a weak alum water, and mix your "British Lustre" with it; put two spoonfuls to a gill of alum water; let the stove be cold, brush with the mixture, then take a dry brush and dry lustre, and rub the stove until it is perfectly dry. Should any part, before polishing, become so dry as to look grey, moisten it with a wet brush, and proceed as above.

Recipes for House-keepers.

HOW TO KEEP WORMS OUT OF DRIED FRUIT.—Have a pot full of scalding water over the fire, then put the fruit into sacks of a suitable size, and dip them into the boiling water, which will kill the worm, or what causes it. After scalding spread the fruit out to dry—the scalding does the fruit no injury. Whatever it is that causes the worm, is deposited on the fruit during the process of drying.

VIRGINIA EGG BREAD.—Dissolve one table spoonful of butter in three and a half pints of milk; add one quart of Indian meal, half a pint of wheat flour, a little salt, and two eggs well beaten; mix all well together, and bake in a buttered tin.

MINUTE PUDDING.—Put a pint and a half of milk on the fire; mix five large spoonfuls of flour with half a pint of milk, a little salt, and nutmeg. When the milk boils, stir in the mixed flour and milk. Let the whole boil for one minute, stirring it constantly. Take it from the fire; let it set till lukewarm; then add three beaten eggs. Let it bake on the fire and stir it constantly until it thickens. Take it from the fire as soon as it boils. To be eaten with nice sauce.

TO BOIL POTATOES MEALY.—When the water nearly boils pour it out and put in cold salted water; it makes them mealy without cracking them.

APPLE BREAD.—Take two parts of flour to one part of apples, stewed; stir them quite warm into the flour; put in a little yeast, knead it without water, the fruit being quite sufficient. Let it remain in the pan to rise for twelve hours; then put it into small pans and bake it. It makes very light and palatable bread.

To have Green Beans, Peas, and Green Corn in Winter.—A gentleman says he saw in January green peas as succulent, to all appearance, as they were when plucked from the vine some five or six months before. The mode of preparing them is to pick, when of the proper size for eating, shell, and carefully dry on cloths in the shade. All the care necessary is to prevent them from moulding; this done, they will be fine and sweet the following spring. Beans may be preserved in the same way and with perfect success.

Green corn may be preserved in the following manner: pluck the ears of corn when fit for boiling, strip off the husks, and throw the ears into a kettle of boiling water; leave them in until the water boils over them, when they must be taken out; shell off the corn by running the prong of a fork along the base of the grain, holding the ear with one end against the breast; this is more expeditious and saves all the grain, including the heart or germ, which is the sweetest part.

After being thus prepared, it must be spread out thin on cloths in a shady, airy place to dry; it should be stirred every day until dried thoroughly. When cooked, it should be put in cold water and boiled an hour or more, the water to be pretty well boiled off. When the water is nearly off, a little milk added to it will improve the taste.

Beans, peas, and green corn will retain their original flavor more perfectly by being preserved as above directed, than by being preserved in hermetically sealed cans.

CRUSHING GRAIN FOR WORK-HORSES.—Owners of work-horses are too regardless of the advantages of grinding or crushing the grain fed to them. They do not consider that the expenditure of muscular

strength by the animal in grinding grain with its jaws, is as great a waste of its energies as an equal outlay of strength in any other way, and that besides this, there is much waste of grain from its being imperfectly digested. When the animal is fatigued, he masticates his grain imperfectly, and it often passes through the intestines with so little change that it germinates and grows well. By crushing the grain, this loss would be saved. Another advantage would be, that different kinds of grain, as Indian corn and oats, when ground, could be mixed together and incorporated with cut straw or hay—experience having shown that this is the most economical way of feed. Where power mills are not within convenient distance, mills which can be worked by horse-power or by hand may be used.

Subsoil Ploughing.—The condition of the ground as to moisture greatly affects the results of this operation. If the subsoil is tenacious, it should be in so dry a state when the implement passes through it, that it will be pulverized and left in a loose state; if it is worked when wet, the effect is only to pack the earth more closely together. The various opinions in regard to the utility of subsoil ploughing, have arisen in a great measure from these circumstances. It should be remembered, moreover, that on tenacious soils thorough drainage is essential to the development of the advantages of subsoiling.

Useful Information.

ASHES.—Take especial care of the ashes made on your place; don't permit them to be exposed to the weather, but keep them under cover. Five bushels of ashes, mixed with two double horse cart-loads of marsh or river mud, muck, or peat, will convert the whole into good manure; a hogshead or two of soap-suds would do the same thing; therefore, among your savings, save and utilize them.

POULTRY MANURE.—Have this regularly swept up every Saturday, packed away in barrels and sprinkled over with plaster. Dana, with force and truth says: "The strongest of all manures is found in the droppings of the poultry." Next year each barrel of it will manure half an acre of land; save it then, and add to the productive energies of your soil. Don't look upon it as too trifling a matter for your attention; but recollect, that the globe itself is an aggregate of small matters, and that it took the great Architect six days to form it.

HINTS TO FARMERS.—A bare pasture enriches not the soil, nor fattens the animal, nor increases the wealth of the owner.

One animal well fed is of more value than two poorly kept.

The better animals can be fed, and the more comfortable they can be kept, the more profitable they are—and all farmers work for profit.

Ground once well ploughed is better than thrice poorly.

Bountiful crops are more profitable than poor ones. Make the soil rich, pulverize it well, and keep it clean, and it will generally be productive.

Weeds that grow unmolested around the fences, stumps, and stones, scatter their seed over the farm, and are very likely to grow.

Cows well fed in winter give more milk in summer. An ox that is in good condition in the spring will perform more labor and stand the heat of summer much better than one that is poor.

When you see the fence down put it up—if it remains until to-morrow the cattle may get over.

What ought to be done to-day do it, for to-morrow it may rain.

A strong horse will work all day without food, but keep him at it, and he will not last long.

A rich soil will produce good crops without manure, but it will soon tire.

SALT AND ASHES FOR STOCK.—At all seasons of the year, cattle should have salt and ashes given to them. Especially is this necessary during those periods when they are confined to green and fermentable food, which induces flatulency. The action of this mixture is highly salutary, at all times, if given in small quantities.

It is also said that if horses are liberally supplied with salt and clean wood ashes they will neither be troubled with botts nor colic.

HOUSING MANURE.—It is miserable economy to throw manure out into the open air, and leave it exposed to all the variations of the weather till it is wanted for use. Some build sheds over their hovel

SYMPTOMS OF WORMS.

There are several kinds of worms which infest the intestinal canal of man, but the chief are *ascarides*, or small, white, thread worms, mostly found in the rectum, or last gut; *tumbrici*, or long, round worms, usually found in the small intestines; and the *tenia*, or tape worm, which occupies the upper part of the intestinal tube, and is occasionally found in every part of it.

Worms can hardly exist in so sensitive and highly organized a part as the intestines, without producing some degree of irritation there; and we are certain that irritation cannot take place in that canal without producing, sooner or later, and in a greater or less degree, disagreeable effects in various parts of the system, and especially in the stomach and head. Hence these animals frequently occasion a variable appetite, which is sometimes deficient, and at other times voracious; pains in the stomach, fetid breath, nausea, headache, vertigo, and giddiness, cough, irritation about the nose and anus, disturbed sleep, and a disordered state of the bowels. In children, hardness and fulness of the belly also frequently occur, with frequent slimy stools, and sometimes convulsive fits. In adults, as well as in children, worms not unfrequently give rise to severe epileptic fits, and sometimes occasion great emaciation.

Worms most frequently occur in persons of a relaxed habit, especially in those whose digestive organs are disordered. An excessive use of vegetable food, of fruits of sugar, or any other saccharine substance, very strongly favors their generation.
