

ECLIPSES IN 1904.

In the Year 1904 there will be Two Eclipses, both of the Sun.

I.—An annual eclipse of the Sun, March 15th, invisible here; visible to Southern Asia, Eastern Africa, and a number of islands in the East Indies.

II.—A total eclipse of the Sun, September 9th, not visible here; visible to an immense portion of the Pacific Ocean on both sides of the equator.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS FOR 1904.

The planet Venus (♀) begins as morning star and continues as such until July 8th, after which date she will be evening star to end of the year.

The planet Mars (♂) will be evening star until May 30, and then morning star the rest of the year.

The planet Jupiter (♃) is evening Star until March 27th, then morning star until October 18th, and then evening star the balance of the year.

The planet Saturn (♄) will be evening star till February 1st, then morning star until August 10th, and then evening star the balance of the year.

The cry of hunger or intense thirst is incessant and unappeasable, except by satisfying the needs. The same cry, however, is characteristic of earache, and when water or food do not suppress it, the mother should have the ears carefully examined by a physician.



Babies in Hot Weather.

FOR every adult life destroyed by excessive hot weather there are destroyed at least ten childish lives. Babies die like wilted flowers. We want to impress on the mothers and fathers of children a few simple rules. First comes coolness. Keep your children cool, dress them lightly and don't put warm covers on them at night. If they are on a milk diet, dilute their food, giving them the same amount if they appear to crave it, but adding water sufficient to make digestion easier. Remember that it is important to give children pure drinking water when they are thirsty, but not during meals. The youngest child should be taught as early as possible to drink plain water. The child cries because it is thirsty, the mother gives it milk to drink and perhaps destroys its life by overloading its stomach when the heat makes even ordinary digestion difficult. Moderate diet—diluted food. No feeding between meals, no irregular feeding of any kind. Light clothing, with the thinnest possible flannel at night. Frequent drinking of water, pure and not very cold. A thorough bath in the morning, with good pure soap to keep the pores open. A sponge-off every evening in diluted alcohol or witch hazel.

Keep the bowels open. Any slight irregularity in this particular may lead to serious consequences. Purgatives containing mercury, as in pills or calomel, should only be given a babe in extreme cases, and then only by a regular physician. Mercury and opiates have broken more of these slender threads than they have mended.

Death's Ravages Among Children.

ONE of the most startling things of the early part of the Nineteenth Century was the fact that of every three children born only one lived beyond its fifth birthday. 
