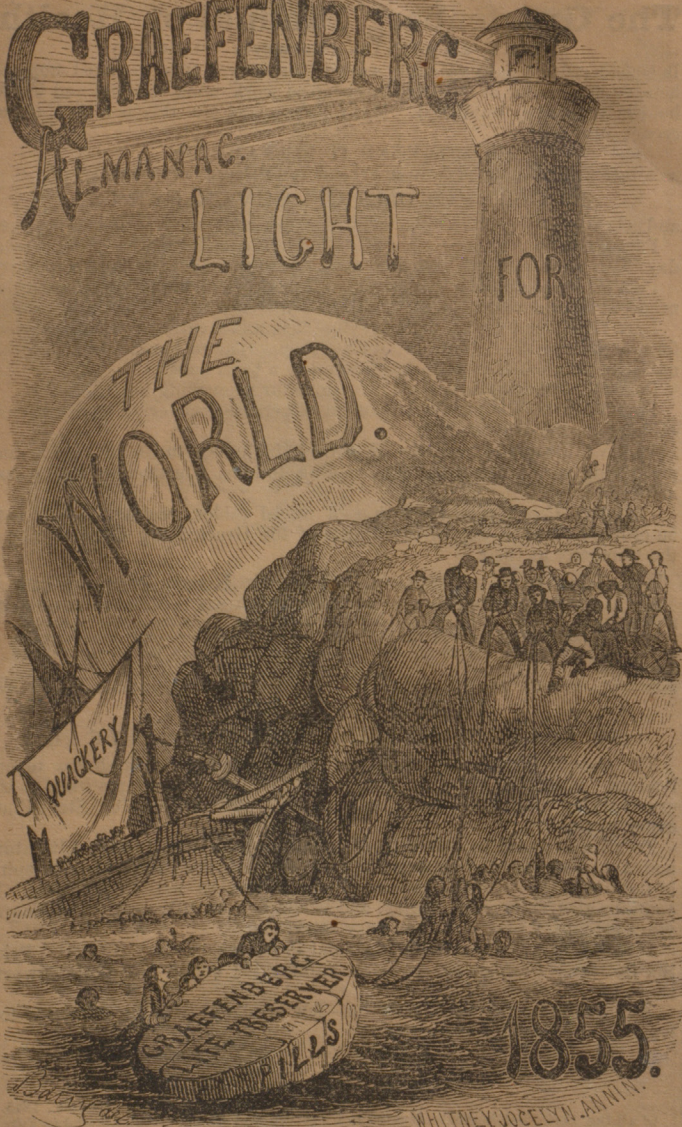

Some seeds will mature this month, and, to insure their goodness, be very careful to spread them out in some airy place that they may dry gradually. If they are laid thick they will ferment and be valueless. Bud fruit trees and see that defective fruit is gathered from the ground before insects have an opportunity of getting into the ground ready for another season. Always water plants in the evening.

Plant apple and other fruit trees. Sow seeds in your nursery. Lay heavy ground in ridges that the frost may mellow it. Manure should be put on the ground intended for early crops. If there is no other work, this is a good time to cut poles and sticks to be used next season. Lay light litter of some kind over the roots of the most tender trees and shrubs to preserve them from the frost.

Cuts.

The edges of the wound should be brought together with sticking plaster, and kept firm by a bandage. TO DESTROY LICE ON CATTLE.—Use camphor dissolved in spirits. It is an effectual agent, and may be used at all times, even in very cold weather, without the least injury to the cattle.

TO MAKE GOOD BROWN BREAD.—Take one part of rye meal and two parts of Indian meal; mix them well, and a little salt, and thoroughly wet the whole with boiling milk; stir it frequently until cold, and add cold milk, till it is thin enough to pour in pans; then bake it in a brick oven five or six hours.

Take six quarts of water, one teacupful of salt, one pint of lard or other clean grease, one pint of yeast, the whole to be quite warm—then stir in meal enough to make a stiff batter, let it stand till it rises, then mix up and put it in pans to bake. The quantities can of course be reduced proportionately as desired.

BLACKBERRY PIE.—Ripe blackberries will not bear washing; pick them over nicely, dredge them with flour, mix with them (for one pie) four or five large table-spoonfuls of fine white sugar, (four if you use white sugar, five if you use brown,) turn them into a deep dish (a soup plate) lined with paste, wet and pinch together the edge of the pastes, cut a slit in the top crust, through which the steam can escape, and bake forty-five minutes.

TO CORRECT RANCIDITY IN BUTTER. Very rancid butter may be corrected by melting it in hot water, removing the scum as it rises, and working it in a churn with milk, perfectly new and sweet, and adding a little salt and pulverized sugar.

TO PROTECT HAM FROM FLIES AND BUGS.—Grind some black pepper fine, and put in a box, and as soon as the hams are thoroughly smoked, take them down and sprinkle the pepper over the raw part, and hang them again in the smoke house. No fly or bug will touch them.

Fainting.

SALTING STOCK.—All stock should receive, each thrice a week, an ounce of salt, or an ounce of the following mixture—equal parts of ashes, salt, and lime. Hogs should also be salted, and have salt, charcoal and ashes given them three times a week. For stock of all kinds we prefer oyster shell lime, for the simple reason that every well conducted analysis has found bone earth in it, and that is necessary to carry on the wear and tear and elaborations of the bone.

PREVENTION OF SMUT IN WHEAT.—A simple, and perhaps the most effectual mode of preventing smut in wheat, is to mix with the seed grain a solution of blue vitriol—sulphate of Copper—an ounce of vitriol to a bushel of wheat, or in that ratio. Turn the wheat on a floor, and pour on the solution of vitriol boiling hot—using a gallon of water to a bushel of wheat. Mix it by turning with a shovel several times. Let it be in a heap over night, and if too damp to sow readily next morning, mix in enough air-slacked lime or plaster to dry it.

TO KILL COCKROACHES.—Mix equal quantities of red lead, Indian meal, and molasses into the consistency of paste. This mixture is known to be a certain exterminator of roaches; for by its use a friend whose house was infested with thousands of them destroyed them in a very few nights.

TO MAKE CANDLES.—Take twelve pounds of alum for every ten pounds of tallow, dissolve it in water before the tallow is put in, and then melt the tallow in the alum water, with frequent stirring, and it will clarify and harden the tallow so as to make a most beautiful article, for either winter or summer use, almost as good as sperm.

If the wick be dipped in spirits of turpentine, the candles will reflect a much more brilliant light.

TOMATO CATSUP.—Use one pint of good salt to one peck of sound, ripe tomatoes. Bruise them and let them stand two days; then strain them dry, and boil the liquor until the scum stops rising, with two ounces of black pepper, one ounce cayenne, the same quantity of allspice, one ounce of ginger, one of cloves, and an ounce of mace. Strain through a sieve, bottle and cork tight.

LIST OF DISEASES AND GUIDE TO HEALTH.

Acidity of the Stomach.

Known by risings after any meal, generally worse after breakfast and dinner, sour taste in the mouth, with sometimes, slight degree of heartburn. *Remedy.*—One dose of three Graefenberg Vegetable Pills at night, followed by one pill every other morning before breakfast for two weeks, or until the sensations are completely removed.

Ague and Fever, (Intermittent Fever.)

The symptoms of this fever are well known. Languor and chilliness are succeeded by severe cold; the patient shivers and his teeth chatter. Then the last stage comes on; the skin is now hot and dry, the pulse full and rapid, the countenance is flushed, and there is often delirium. *Treatment.*—Use the Graefenberg Fever and Ague Remedy according to directions accompanying the box. Soak the feet in hot water and keep in a warm room so as to induce perspiration. Diarrhoea.

See Bowel and Summer Complaints.

Dyspepsia.

The diet should be nutritious, but all highly spiced food, fat meat, oily gravies, pastry, puddings, sauces and stimulating drinks must be avoided. Eruptions.

In all eruptions of the skin use the Graefenberg Green Mountain Ointment. The blood will generally need purification by the use of the Graefenberg Sarsaparilla Compound. If the eruptions are attended with fever, an occasional dose of the Graefenberg Vegetable Pills will be advisable, and, when the patient has been under other medical treatment which leaves the system debilitated, the Graefenberg Health Bitters should be used to restore strength and elasticity to the vital organization.

Erysipelas, (Malignant.)

It commences with cold shiverings, followed by drowsiness, confusion and often delirium. An emetic should be given, followed by a course of the Graefenberg Vegetable Pills, (one dose of three at night, followed by one every other morning for two weeks.) The Graefenberg Green Mountain Ointment should be applied to the inflamed parts, and perspiration induced by drinking warm teas and using hot foot baths. In any disorder of the Eyes use the Graefenberg Eye Lotion. Any foreign substance entering the eye should be removed. When the pain is caused by a cold, take a dose of the Graefenberg Vegetable Pills in addition to the Eye Lotion.

Fever.

It is utterly impossible within the space of this work, to enter into a description of fevers with their symptoms and remedies. A full notice of various fevers, with the appropriate treatment, will be found in the Graefenberg Manual of Health, page 119, which should be consulted immediately, and, in the mean time take a smart dose of the Graefenberg Vegetable Pills; lie down and keep warmly covered, let the room be well aired and the food of the lightest possible kind. This treatment will frequently break up an incipient fever and ward it off, and it will always be the only safe plan to adopt while waiting for the Manual of Health or competent advice.

Flatulency, (Wind in the Stomach and Bowels.)

If caused by eating any unsuitable food it will generally pass off in the course of twenty-four hours. If attended with griping, or pain in the stomach, take a dose of the Graefenberg Vegetable Pills.

Headache.

When it is severe, with throbbing pains in the forehead, a burning sensation in the head, bloated face and inflamed eyes, or accompanied with nausea, take a dose

Itch.

Measles.

Give a mild purging dose of Graefenberg Children's Panacea every other day, and let the patient drink freely of Saffron Tea. Ordinarily this will be all that is necessary. For remarks concerning the cause, appearance and treatment of this disease, see *The Manual of Health*, page 135.

Mumps.

This disease consists of a swelling in the glands of the throat and neck, frequently so severe as to cause difficulty in breathing and swallowing. *Treatment.*—Keep the bowels open by a moderate use of the Graefenberg Vegetable Pills, and apply the Graefenberg Green Mountain Ointment to the seat of the disease, renewing the plaster twice a day.

Night Mare.

This is caused by general derangements in the system, and most commonly by weak digestion. Use the Graefenberg Vegetable Pills as ordered in cases of Dyspepsia.

Poisoning.

In all cases of poisoning see the Graefenberg Manual of Health, as the effects and antidotes of all poisons are fully explained in its pages, and the treatment of such cases is too lengthy for insertion here.

Rheumatism.

A persevering use of the Graefenberg Sarsaparilla Compound and Green Mountain Ointment will remove every taint of Rheumatism. When the case is of long standing, or obstinate, the bowels must be kept moderately loose by the Graefenberg Vegetable Pills, and the Graefenberg Health Bitters must be used to give an appetite and restore vigor to the system.

Scarlet Fever.

In mild cases, nothing more is necessary than to observe a low diet, avoiding cold air and cold drinks. Drink Barley Water or Lemonade. Give a dose of Graefenberg Vegetable Pills and bathe the body with warm water and Castile soap. In severe cases, competent advice must be called.

Small Pox.

Competent advice must be had in this disease, or refer to the Graefenberg Manual of Health, page 137.

Sore Throat.

Rub the throat well with brandy, alcohol, or spirits of camphor, and keep a flannel around it. A damp towel passed round the neck at night and then covered with a dry flannel will frequently remove the most violent pain. Gargle the throat with a solution of alum, sugar, and sage in warm water. If these simple remedies fail to remove it, obtain good medical advice.

Sprains, Strains, and Contusions.

Foment the part with cold water, and then apply a plaster of Graefenberg Green Mountain Ointment.

Swollen Face.

Apply the Graefenberg Green Mountain Ointment. If that should not have the desired effect and there are symptoms of fever, obtain competent advice. If it arises from a decayed tooth or from a splinter, the removal of the existing cause will usually produce relief.

Summer Complaint.

Frequent stools which are thin and watery, sometimes attended with heat in the head and abdomen. *Treatment.*—Give Graefenberg Dysentery Syrup according to directions on the bottle. Nothing else will be necessary.

Swollen Glands.

Ulcers.

An Ulcer may result from a wound, bruise, burn, abscess, or from internal inflammation. *Treatment.*—Wash it with warm water once or twice a day, and put on a plaster of Graefenberg Green Mountain Ointment.

Vomiting.

Nausea and vomiting usually result from disordered digestion. One full dose of Graefenberg Vegetable Pills at night, followed by one pill every morning before breakfast for a week, will generally remove all symptoms of the disease. Water Brash.
