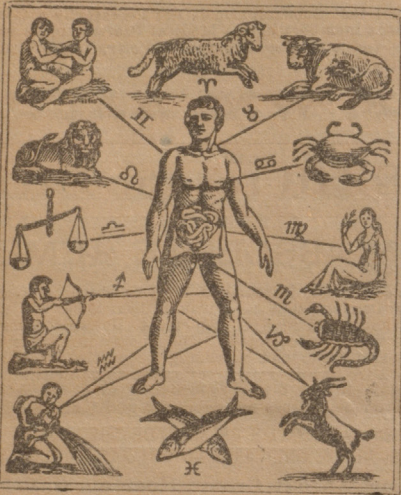
ECLIPSES.

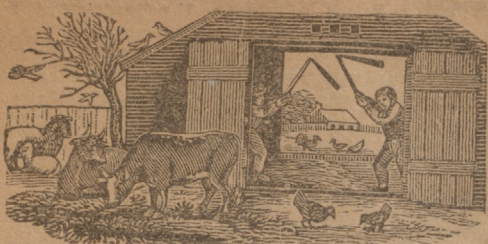

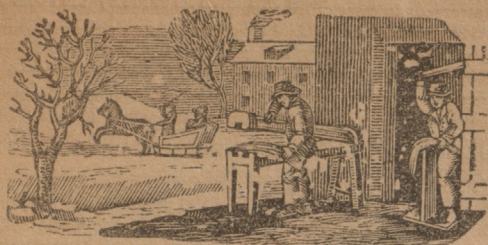
"I DON'T see any towel here," said a countryman, recently, after washing his face at one of the drinking fountains.

CARD TO THE PUBLIC.
