# REPORT OF THE MONTREAL SOLDIERS' WIVES' LEAGUE

for year ending Dec. 31st. 1916.

#### MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING

THE Annual Meeting of The Montreal Soldiers' Wives' League was held on Friday, March 9th, 1917, in the League Rooms, Guarantee Company of North America Building, at 3.30 p.m.

There was present the Honorary President, Mrs. E. W. Wilson, the 2nd Vice-President, Mrs. E. M. Renouf, the Honorary Treasurer, Madame J. T. Ostell, the Honorary Asst. Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. T. G. Hodge, the Honorary Recording Secretary, Mrs. Edward J. Woodburn, Lt-Colonel F. M. McRobie, Mr. A. R. Doble, President of the Khaki League, the Rev. Frank L. Orchard and a very large number of members and friends.

The President Mrs. E. B. Busteed presided. The meeting was opened with our prayer for the War and the National Anthem. A letter was read from Her Excellency the Duchess of Devonshire expressing her interest in the work of the League and her willingness to become its Patroness.

The minutes of the previous Annual Meeting were read and confirmed.

The President in a few remarks welcomed the members and friends present and expressed her regret at the continued absence of the Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. F. Minden Cole, through illness. The Recording Secretary presented the Annual Report, followed by the Treasurer's Statement; after which the Assistant Corresponding Secretary gave a complete record of the work of the office.

Reports were read from the various Branches and Regimental Committees as follows: Delormier Branch, French Military Hospital Work, Grenadier Guards, 97th Siege Battery, 107th Siege Battery, Field Artillery, Canadian Army Service Corps, 24th Battalion, 60th Battalion, 242nd Forestry Battalion, 244th Battalion, Kitcheners' Own, 5th Canadian Pioneers, The Military Benefit.

In an inspiring and patriotic address Lt-Colonel McRobie moved the adoption of the reports, seconded by Mr. A. R. Doble who spoke in terms of praise and sympathy of the work accomplished by our League. Carried unanimously.

Mrs. Walter Sadler read the report of the Nominating Committee and moved that the officers therein named be duly elected. Seconded by Mrs. H. L. Pavey. Carried.

The Rev. Mr. Orchard closed the meeting with prayer and the benediction, after which tea was served in the adjoining room,

presided over by Mrs. J. J. Creelman and Miss Costigan. Much regret was expressed at the absence of Mrs. G. R. Starke who was to have presided in the Tea Room, but was unavoidably absent through illness. Her very able assistants, however, provided a successful and delightful social half hour to the satisfaction of all those who remained.

#### PRESIDENT'S REMARKS

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

It would be out of place to take up the time of this meeting with any lengthy remarks, when we have so many interesting reports to be read. It is however, my privilege and pleasure to say a few words specially to the members of our League before we close the book on the work of 1916.

In looking back, we do so with gratitude and thankfulness, hoping and trusting that our efforts have been acceptable to those for

whom they have been put forth.

While the wish in the heart of every one of us is that this brutal war may cease, because of the continued anxiety we have to endure for our men at the Front, because of the hard work to be done by those who are left behind, because our Allies are fighting for their very existence and because we know we are fighting for that which is right. For these reasons we are constrained to go on and go forward without one thought of weariness but rather rejoicing as the boys do in the trenches, if we are able to do anything that will help them to feel more contented about their wives, mothers and little ones whom they have left behind. Glad too if we are able to do anything that will make their life at the Front just a little bit more comfortable, (if that were possible).

In this connection, may I state, that in the hope of doing more efficient work for the women and children of our men at the Front, we expect in the near future to move into our long wished-for Home. Perhaps for the time being I might call it, "The Osborne House,," generously given us for two years, free of rent by the Kinghorn Estate through Mrs. George McDougall. It has long been our desire to have a place where we could accommodate a soldier's wife while passing through the city, when such necessity arises or to provide a temporary home for any soldier's child or children who may be in need of such protection. We hope too, with the increased accommodation for the office, to carry on all the work of the League

more efficiently. While we have much in the way of office furniture, we will need much more and we hope as one member has given so generously, other members and friends will help us out in this new endeavour

which we have before us.

This work has done much for us. We have learned to love each other in a way that would have been impossible under ordinary circumstances. We have learned to know each other and to value each other's abilities, as we never could have done under former conditions. With all my heart I thank you for your assistance, your courtesy, your kindness and your never-failing support throughout the year.

The Officers of the League, I could never thank sufficiently for all they have done. Untiring in their efforts and devoted to the work undertaken by them, they have enabled us to complete another

vear's work successfully.

To the Conveners of Regimental and Emergency Committees, those of you who come in contact with the soldiers' wives in your weekly meetings, when you gather to converse with each other, to knit, to distribute wool and become better acquainted and to those who visit in the homes, I would say, you are doing the best work, the work for which the Soldiers' Wives' League was organized namely to bring the wives, mother, sisters and friends of all soldiers, be they officers, non commissioned officers, or men, into closer touch with one another, so that they may mutually aid and assist one another in times of difficulty, trouble and distress. You have a power and a privilege that the officers of the League do not have. Never forget, that no good effort put forth, no kindly word spoken, or loving deed done is ever lost, it must bear fruit, sometime, somewhere, and of which you may never know.

So I say to you all, go on, go forward, let us be more determined than ever to do our share, and not think of resting till the Conquest

is won.

#### RECORDING SECRETARY'S REPORT

During the year 1916 the Montreal Soldiers' Wives' League has continued it's work as formerly.

Weekly meetings have been held every Wednesday morning, with the exception of the Christmas holidays and July and August.

The Executive Committee has met on the first Monday of each

month.

Through the great kindness and generosity of Mr. Rawlings, we have occupied these rooms in the Guarantee Building, with service, light and heat free of charge, and every day, morning and afternoon, meetings of the women connected with the various regiments are held under the direction of the Regimental Committees.

Mrs. George Starke, the Convener of our House Committee, very kindly supervised our moving into this building. We all know what the moving of a house means, but we found ourselves here almost without knowing that any move had taken place. We are most grateful to the House Committee for all that it has done for us.

As the days of the year have gone by, the work of the League has increased, as the following report of our various committees

will show.

We have representatives on the Patriotic Fund Committee, the Khaki League, and the Italian Red Cross.

As the primary work of the League is that of looking arter our soldiers' wives and children, our Emergency Visiting Committee may be looked upon as the most important Committee, formed solely to look after the families of our men enlisted for Home Service and of the returned soldier. The Convener, Mrs. D. Lorn Crawford, with her committee of 15 members, has accomplished a splendid work. To these ladies our thanks and deep appreciation are due for their untiring loyalty and devoted service so cheerfully rendered. It mattered not, however severe the weather or how great the distance, all cases were investigated within 24 hours. During the year, 127 cases have been investigated by this Committee, sent by the Patriotic Fund, Khaki League, Charity Organization, Salvation Army, Dr. Byers, of Ste. Agathe, private individuals, and through application at our office.

This does not include the cases investigated by the members of our Regimental Committees. Clothing was sent to 22 families, coal sent to 20, 26 Christmas hampers, weekly allowances of money for 17 families, water rates paid for 4, partial rent for 5, grocery bills for 2, babies' trousseaux given to 7 mothers, baby carriages for 5, cod liver oil, medicine, etc. for 3 children, weekly supplies of groceries for 23 families, doctors' bills for 2, an invalid chair provided for a soldier's wife, free transportation secured for a returned soldier, also for 2 families and for a widow with 2 children, the last mentioned being from Montreal to Edmonton, and we paid fare to Murray Bay and return for a sick woman, and assisted a woman and her children to return to England. Money has been loaned to returned soldiers to aid them in re-furnishing their homes, and to pay pressing debts, also to women returning from England on their way to the North West. Mourning has been provided for 6 war widows.

This Committee has expended \$375.00 for immediate help.

In addition to this special report of the Emergency Committee, insurance premiums have been paid for 2 soldiers, and funeral expenses for one woman and her child. Money was advanced to assist a soldier to bring his wife and family here from Letroit. Through the kindness of the Rev. Dr. Johnston and the ladies of the American Presbyterian Church, a summer holiday in the country was secured for 11 children.

We have to thank Mrs. Robb, who has given us from time to time money for special cases out of the fund she is dispensing for a deceased friend.

Supplementing the work of the Emergency Committee the members in charge of the Clothing Bureau have had all the work that they could manage in endeavoring to supply the never-ending requests for clothing of every description. While we never have enough clothing at our disposal, we are most grateful to all the friends who have sent us garments new and partially worn, with

boots and shoes, for the many needy applicants who come to our rooms on the first and third Monday of every month, presenting a card of identification. During the year 2,335 garments, 413 new pairs of boots, shoes and rubbers, and a number of second-hand boots, 3 infants' layettes, 2 blankets, as well as bedding, gas fixtures, 2 gas stoves, baby carriages, and a child's sleigh have been given out by the Clothing Committee. \$150.00 was appropriated to this committee, beside gifts from generous members and friends. The Sewing Committee has been of great assistance in supplying children's garments, also a circle of ladies at Joliette, the Queen Mary Needlework Guild, the Municipal Chapter I.O.D.E. The Welcome Club of the Y.W.C.A., the Pung-U Circle and others. It has been a great satisfaction for us to have received from time to time a generous donation of clothing from Mrs. Ascah and the good women of Gaspe Peninsula, who in their long winter afternoons found much pleasure in doing their share of War Work by making us garments for our women and children.

We offer our warm appreciation to Miss Carter, Mrs. Peacock Mrs. Reay and Miss Richardson for their faithful services to this

department of our work.

The Sewing Committee, under the convenership of Miss M. C. Barwick, has met regularly once a week throughout the year. The following articles have been made and distributed:—To No. 2 Khaki Convalescent Home. 59 sheets, 34 pillow cases, 75 towels, 229 garments, and 10 infants' trousseaux to the Clothing Committee. During the months of August and September, this committee met twice a week to make hospital supplies for the Soldiers' Comforts' Booth at the recent Military Benefit. This work was a most acceptable donation to the Benefit as it was the only booth where hospital supplies could be obtained. The Sewing Committee was greatly pleased to receive, towards the end of the year, another sewing machine from one of our members.

We now come to the report of our Christmas work. This season, which is always looked forward to with so much pleasure and anticipation, not only on the part of children, but by the mothers and the older members of families, brings with it a great deal of responsibility to the committee who undertakes this work.

It has been our aim, if possible, that no deserving case shall be neglected, or omitted from our lists. Nevertheless, it does sometimes happen that someone is forgotten or unavoidably left out, but, on hearing of these 'cases, parcels were sent long after Christmas. Gifts were sent to every child, under fourteen years of age, of the Composite Battalion, and a large number of the families of returned soldiers; 100 gifts and 50 pounds of candy to the soldiers' children in the Heryey Institute; 50 gifts to the Engineers' Christmas tree at Point St. Charles; 15 to the 242nd Forestry Battalion; 25 to the 24th Battalion; 130 to the Army Service Corps; 40 to the 5th Pioneers; \$25.00 for the Christmas tree of "Kitchener's Own"; gifts for 25 families on our Emergency list; a parcel of comforts to

an aged couple; 6 large parcels were sent by express to Huntingdon, Compton, Hull, Magog and St. Agathe, and all articles remaining were sent to the Childrens' ward of the General Hospital.

This Committee also provided a tea for 110 mothers and 273 children of the Composite Battalion, at the Victoria Rifles' Armoury on the 27th of December, and plum puddings for the Christmas dinner of the men on Picket Duty at the Grand Trunk Stock Yards.

To provide for all this, we are most grateful to the members who stood by our comforts' boxes and solicited gifts in the various departmental stores on the two Saturdays previous to Christmas to the children of the High School Kindergarten, through Miss Mary Campbell, for a large donation of toys and garments; to Mrs. R. J. Mercur and the members of the Dorval Women's Club, for a very generous donation of dolls, toys, puddings, cakes and clothing, to Mrs. E. A. Robert for a most acceptable parcel of blankets and new clothing, to the Montreal Women's Club, to the Pung-U-Circle, to Messrs. E. B. Eddy, to the Commercial Twine Co., to Messrs. McIntyre & Co., Limited, to Messrs. W. R. Brock Co., Limited, to Mr. N. Fortier, through whose kindness we secured wrapping paper and twine for all our parcels, to Lt.-Col. McRobie for having all our parcels delivered free of charge, and to all who contributed various donations. Too much praise cannot be given Mrs. D. E. Galloway, Convener, Mrs. C. Virtue, Mrs. H. Palmer, Mdme. des Trois Maisons, Mrs. J. M. Wooding, and Miss F. Fortier for their devotion and earnestness, in giving of their time all through the week prior to Christmas to this labor of love for the families of the men who are fighting for us without any thought of the Christmas Season and its festivities.

The Soldiers' Comforts' Committee, through its Convener, Mrs. E. C. Eaton, has had charge of the boxes placed in our departmental stores and has been gratified with the many varied articles deposited therein. On investigation, 240 pairs socks, gum, cigarettes, tobacco, tooth brushes, soaps, books, mufflers and wristlets, with \$52.60 in cash have been contributed anonymously. We have found that this means of collecting comforts for our men has been well worth while. We wish our friends to understand that everything contributed through these boxes is sent overseas through our Regimental Committees, and we thank all who have helped us in this way. Through the kindness of members and friends, we have been able to send to the soldiers at Ste. Agathe rugs, blankets, mufflers and caps, with a generous donation of dressing gowns made by the members of the Victoria Rifles' Chapter, and we gave a large donation of socks, bed socks, mittens and comfort bags to Miss Winter for the soldiers in Ramsgate Hospital.

The work of the Wool Committee, in the hands of Mrs. Alfred Cole, has been most successful. Including a small balance from last year, 1,898 pounds of wool have been purchased. Of this amount 745 pounds were sold at a slight profit to our different branches, and 666 pounds have been knit by members. We have 487 pounds on

hand. The comforts knit by our members and friends were—1,010 pairs socks, 82 mufflers, 39 pairs wristlets, and 25 caps distributed

to our Regimental Committees.

The Entertainment and Social Committees has not been called upon as often during the past year as in the early period of the war, possibly because it has not been necessary to have so many social gatherings, for the Khaki League and other organizations have done so much in providing entertainment for our soldiers. Then, too, our time during the past year was so fully occupied with our Military Benefit, of which a separate report will be given. I would, however, like to remind you of Mr. Racey's very instructive and enjoyable lecture, "The War in Cartoon," through which we benefitted to the extent of \$503.00. 200 copies of the "Royal Montreal Regiment Growler" presented by Mr. Dobbin, were sold on that occasion. The members in charge of this entertainment, under the convenership of Mrs. John Molson Crawford, with Mrs. McNicoll and Mrs. Dodwell, worked energetically, and were gratified by the results attained.

The League provided cake for a very successful Valentine Party given by Mrs. W. H. Winter and a committee of ladies in No. 2

Khaki Convalescent Home.

200 pounds of home-made candy was provided by our members for the Boy Scouts' Benefit in His Majesty's Theatre in the month of June.

A large amount of home-made candy was contributed for the benefit of the Montreal School for the Blind in the Princess Theatre.

Invitations were extended to the wounded soldiers in No. 1 Khaki Convalescent Home, McTavish Street Home, and the Grey Nunnery for the Moving Picture entertainment of the Military

Benefit in the Windsor Theatre.

Hospital Committee:—Mrs. George Hanson, who from the very beginning of the war has looked after not only our sick women, but also our sick soldiers, still continues her faithful and loving service in visiting regularly at the Montreal General Hospital. With her assistants, she distributes flowers, fruit, delicacies, books, cards and stationery, and is at all times a welcome visitor. The members of this committee visited the Hospital on Christmas morning with a Christmas parcel for every soldier. During the summer months, men at Valcartier were regularly advised as to the condition of their sick wives, and in turn, sent grateful letters of thanks.

As formerly, letters of sympathy and congratulation have been

written by our Courtesy Convener, Mrs. Gibsone.

We have had the pleasure of listening to inspiring addresses from:—Lt.-Col. Creelman, on "The Life of Our Men in the Trenches," Miss Manby, on "French Hospitals and the Work Done in them by the British Sisters." Madame Bieler, on the "Social Upheaval in France caused by the War and some Present Conditions there." Lt.-Col. Finley, on "No. 1 Canadian General Hospital" and "How the Wounded Soldiers Are Conveyed from the Front to the Stationary

Hospitals." Mrs. Macgillivray on "The Work Canadian Women are doing in England." The Rev. Dr. Symonds, on "The Self Sacrifice of all the Empire in the Present War." Miss Winter, on "Ramsgate and No. 1 General Hospitals," and Captain the Rev. Canon A. P. Shatford, a most helpful and encouraging address, relating his experiences at the front.

On the Sunday evening prior to our Military Benefit, Major the Rev. C. A. Williams very kindly arranged for a service in St. James Methodist Church, to which all relatives of soldiers, and members of the League, were invited, and for whom seats were reserved. At this service the President gave a short address on the

work of the League.

While I leave the report of our finances entirely in the hands of our Treasurer, I may be permitted to state that, in response to a request from Mrs. Hodge, who was then in England, we forwarded £5 to be spent on gifts for soldiers in hospital.

£10 was sent to the Canadian Women's War Workers' Associa-

tion at Folkestone.

On receipt of a request from the Executive of the Hervey Institute, advising that a wing was being added, to the building, for the purpose of accommodating soldiers' children, we were able to forward \$125.00 which would provide for 6 beds, 5 of which were

very generously contributed by members.

And \$8.00 was donated to help to purchase a sewing machine for the Service Committee of the Khaki League. Our funds have been largely augmented through the proceeds of a sale by the "Welcome Club" of the Y.W.C.A. Part of the receipts of Moving War Pictures, donated by the "Star" Publishing Co., Limited. Part of the receipts of a match between H.M.S. "Carnaryon" and Rosemount. Proceeds from raffling a beautiful crochet quilt (an heirloom) generously given by a devoted member, a tablecloth and a kimona. Part of the returns from a dance and bridge given by the Ladies' Committee of the 24th Battalion. Collections taken at the Military Services on Easter Sunday in the Arena, and St. James Roman Catholic Cathedral. Donation from C. P. R. Angus Amateur Athletic Association. Receipts from competitions organized by the Outremont, Westmount and Valleyfield Bowling Clubs. Sale of copies of poems by Mrs. Byers. \$50.00 donation from the Provincial Association of Protestant Women Teachers. Collection taken at a Military service in St. Paul's Church and the Church of St. James the Apostle. And the President was greatly pleased to receive for our Home, \$21.00 from a group of little girls, called "The Little Pioneer Helpers," whose fathers are all overseas, this amount being realized by making a monogram quilt.

It was a matter of great satisfaction for our League to have a share in the collection made by the Khaki League on Christmas Eve. 34 members assisted in distributing the Red Heart cards. on the 17th of December, and again on the 24th collected the money.

The district covered being from Sherbrooke to Dorchester and Bishop Streets to Atwater Avenue.

Mrs. Renouf, our 2nd Vice-President, represented the League on the Delegation to Quebec of the W. C. T. U., for the suppression of

the liquor traffic during the period of the War.

We regret the loss of three of our members, Mrs. G. O. Gravel, Mrs. G. W. Bridges, and Mrs. G. A. Finlayson. We also regret the continued absence of our Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. F. Minden Cole, through illness and the absence of many members who are in England, and we sympathize keenly with those who have been bereaved.

In conclusion, we wish to offer our sincere thanks and appreciation to Major-General Wilson for his never failing kindness and assistance and for the many favours received from him, and to all our good friends at Militia Heanquarters; to Mr. Rawlings for his generosity in providing rooms for the use of the League; to Messrs. E. A. Whitehead Co., Limited, for another year's insurance on the furniture, etc., to the Bell Telephone Co. for a telephone; to Messrs. Willis & Co. for a piano; to the Williams Mfg. Co. for having lent and kept in repair two sewing machines; to Mr. Hall of the Smith Premier Typewriter Co. for a typewriter; to the United Typewriter Co. for a typewriter; to the Press for their continued sympathy and support; and to all kind friends who have assisted us in any way to complete this year's work.

# REPORT OF HON. ASSISTANT CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

for Year Ending Dec. 31st, 1916.

THE work of the League for the past year has been so varied that your Corresponding Secretary finds it rather difficult to classify the different matters concerning which one finds it necessary to write.

197 letters have been written pertaining to the regular working

or executive part of the League.

556 letters have been written adjusting separation allowances, assigned pay and pensions. This branch of the work has been most gratifying. Might I mention one or two of the more interesting of these cases. "A Sgt. Major was reported a deserter, hence his wife's entire revenue ceased. Our office secretary ascertained from a returned officer that this man had been transferred; the necessary

information was forwarded to Ottawa and a re-adjustment cheque for \$104.00 was sent to his wife." "One family received an adjustment cheque for \$150.00, one for \$60.00, another for \$56.00 and one for \$75.00, besides very many of lesser amounts." The letters which we have received from the men at the front in this connection fully compensate for any effort that may have been exerted. One soldier writes: "I want to thank you all very much for all your kindness to my dear wife for which we are both very grateful." Another writes: "It is such kindness as this which makes us feel that we cannot do enough for our King and Country." And yet another soldier writes: "We can go away with a good heart because we know that our wives and children are being well cared for."

27 telegrams and many letters have been sent at the request of wives and mothers to the Record Office at Ottawa in regard to casualties. I would like to place on record the appreciation of the League for the unfailing courtesy and promptness of Mr. Frank Beard, the officer in charge of records, Ottawa. Much definite information has been obtained, which, to some extent has lightened the burden for those who are living in the shadow of uncertainty.

102 letters were written by your Secretary, and over 5,000 circulars were sent from the office in connection with the recent Military Benefit; many letters have been received congratulating the League on that event. Lieut-General Sir Sam Hughes wrote: "It was a great pleasure for me to have the privilege of attending." Major-General Wilson wrote: "Congratulate the ladies one and all on the splendid results obtained." Most gratifying letters were also received from Col. McLean, Col. Strange and many others. Several hundreds of printed letters of thanks for donations to the Benefit were also sent out from this office. 200 invitations were sent to soldiers' wives to attend a service at St. James Methodist Church and at various times notices have been sent to 58 different churches.

A rather embarrassing task which your office secretary performs most religiously is that of writing letters to a soldier for his wife who is unable to read or write; his letters are brought to the office, read by the Secretary to his wife and answered regularly.

There is no work which the League undertakes more cheerfully than that of investigating cases at the request of the various commanding officers and furnishing them with any information which we are able to obtain. Last summer several men at Valcartier asked for leave on account of illness at home. The League visited the family for the officer and reported to him. We have also had requests from commanding officers in France to visit a family and reassure the soldier at the front, who for some reason or other is worrying over affairs at home. We do all in our power to assist the officers of the Composite Regiment by visiting and helping financially the families of the men of that regiment.

As the primary aim and work of the League is to bring the wives and relatives of our soldiers together, these rooms are used every afternoon and nearly every morning for gatherings of this kind, in this way nearly one hundred persons are here every day, representing almost every battalion and unit recruited in the city. Outside of this large number 951 persons have appealed directly at the office for assistance. 69 were the dependents of returned soldiers and 61 were wives of men in the composite regiment. In each of these cases either letters have been written or financial assistance has been given. This of course does not include the many persons who come to the clothing department.

The particulars of each of these 951 cases are on file, while the name and address of the applicant, battalion number of the soldier, and all detail which is necessary. Your secretaries feel that the present system of recording these cases is most efficient.

You, of course, understand that each one of these cases is thoroughly investigated either by regimental or emergency visitor, and council is held as to what is necessary to be done—as no one person has the right to reject any application for help without bringing it before the officers of the League.

Might I here record my appreciation of the kindly and sympathetic manner in which all applicants are received by your office secretary, Miss Stanger. No word of complaint has ever come to any member of the League and many have been the expressions of thanks for the gentle—shall I say Christian spirit which permeates the office of the League.

In conclusion I would like to read extracts from different letters showing that although the work of the League seems so varied yet it is most effective. From a wounded soldier in hospital: "Thank you once again for your kindness and trouble in the past and would you please remember me and give my thanks to all the ladies of the League." From another wife and mother comes this cry for help: "Could any of the ladies see that my children are all right until I come out of hospital?" This little extract needs no explanation: "Just a little note to thank you all for your kind generosity in loaning me the invalid chair; I can assure you I appreciate it more than I can say." Nor does this one: "I beg to ask if you will brighten up my home and make us feel as happy as you did last Christmas. I have never been as happy as when the two kind ladies called on me." For paying for board of two soldiers' daughters at a tubercular hospital comes a word of appreciation. From Col. White and Col. Lordly thanks for gifts to the men going overseas. From many commanding officers in France letters of appreciation for Xmas gifts and socks.

Sometimes we feel in the office that we are very helpless indeed, when a soldier with four children comes in saying: "I want to leave my children with you." He can't understand that four all at once, different ages and different sexes, will require some planning to

place in suitable homes, however, we do the best we can and

so far have not been entirely baffled.

One soldier writes: "I cannot express in words the appreciation that I feel for the kindness which you have shown the children." Another: "You have my full authority to do anything you think advisable for the future welfare of my children, as I feel under your guidance they will be well cared for."

I am sure fellow-members of the League you will see that your labours are not in vain and after all you are each one doing your small part in the fight for righteousness and a lasting peace.

In conclusion, may I say how deeply I regret that your Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. F. Minden Cole, is not here to present this report, and although I have tried to give you the details you might wish to know, I feel it has fallen far short of what you have been accustomed to receive.

THE Clothing Committee begs to submit the following report on work done during the period of January 1st to September 30, 1916.

During that time we have given out 2,000 garments, over 350 pairs of new boots, rubbers, etc., as well as bedding, gas fixtures, two gas stoves, baby carriages and a number of second hand pairs of boots.

It was decided to adopt a new rule for those in need of assistance. Instead of coming to the League rooms every Monday morning, the day was changed to every first and third Monday.

Letters of thanks were sent in acknowledgment of all donations of clothing, etc., received.

To the Sewing Committee of the League our thanks are due for the liberal supply of childrens' garments and trousseaux. We regret to report that owing to the existing conditions we did not this year receive any donations from the clothing and shoe companies.

Two very kind friends gave us \$5 each and the League voted us \$100.00 toward the purchase of boots, shoes, and other necessary articles of clothing.

In conclusion I wish to express my most sincere thanks to Miss Richardson for her unselfish and whole-hearted assistance during the period of my office.

#### MRS. DUNNETT.

As Convener of the Emergency Committee, I have much pleasure in submitting a brief synopsis of our work from Dec. 31st, 1915 to Dec. 31st, 1916. During the year we have investigated 127 cases; to show how the work has increased this winter, 83 of these have been since Oct. 1st, 58 families of Home Service men, 30 families of men overseas, mostly mothers not on Patriotic Fund. 28 families of returned soldiers, all of which have been in the past six weeks.

Clothing provided for 22 families.

Coal for 20 families.

Christmas baskets for 26 families.

Weekly allowance for 17 families.

Temporary help, with money, 22 families.

Paid water bill for 4 families.

Paid rent for some months for 5 families.

Paid grocery bill for 2 families.

Baby trousseau given to 7 mothers.

Baby carriages 5.

Cod liver oil, medicine, etc., for 3 children.

Sent groceries weekly to 23 families.

Paid doctor bills for 2 families.

Got invalid chair for soldiers' wife, who was in the hospital for a year and cannot walk.

Got free transportation for one returned soldier and 2 families. Loaned returned soldier money to pay off furniture bill.

Loaned returned soldier money to pay off pressing debts till back pay could be secured.

Got furniture, beds, stoves, chairs, etc. for 5 families.

Met woman from England on way to Calgary, gave her money, etc.

Met widow and her two children coming from Ste. Agathe, with husband's body, paid for room and board, berth, meals on train, etc., and secured free transportation for her to Edmonton.

Visited six war widows, gave mourning to some.

Cases have been sent us from many sources, Patriotic Fund, Khaki League, Salvation Army, Charity Organization, Dr. Byers, at Ste-Agathe, private individuals and by people applying to office themselves.

Received during the year \$375 from the League for immediate help, all of which has been expended through the ladies of the

committee.

I wish to place on record my deep appreciation of the untiring loyalty and hard work of the ladies of my committee, who have always gone to investigate cases, no matter how severe the weather might be or how great the distances, within twenty-four hours.

#### REPORT OF HOSPITAL COMMITTEE

THE Hospital Committee has paid visits regularly during the year, and there have been several cases where we have been able to assist the soldiers and their relatives. Flowers, fruits and little delicacies for invalids have been given and received with gratitude by the recipients. One soldier at Valcartier during the summer was notified regularly as to his wife's progress in the Hospital, and at her death was assisted financially by the League for funeral expenses, our visitor being present at the funeral. Another woman and her husband, who was an old soldier and whose son is now at the Front were discovered in the Hospital ill, from the effects of being burned. Her husband died, and on the wife leaving the Hospital, had no clothes or home. After the League was notified, clothes, etc., were procured at once and the poor woman helped, after leaving the Hospital, until fully recovered.

## REPORT OF MILITARY BENEFIT.

AMONG the many things accomplished by the League during the past year, perhaps the most important was the Military Benefit held in the Arena from October 17th to 21st, under the distinguished patronage of their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Connaught.

The benefit was formally opened on the evening of Tuesday, October 17th, by the Minister of Justice, Colonel, the Honourable C. J. Doherty, followed by a spectacular grand march and tableau

representing the allied nations now at war, under the able direction of Mrs. E. L. Wren.

May we say before going further, that without the counsel and assistance of Major-General Wilson, O.C., Military District No. 4, the Military Benefit would have been hardly possible, as we were dependent upon the General for all the labour necessary to construct the fifty-one booths in the Arena for that event, and which were erected so efficiently by the men of the 5th Canadian Pioneers.

The Military Benefit was a final outcome of a meeting called by the President, in the Victoria Rifles Armoury, in March of 1916, to consider ways and means of raising money to establish a home in which to carry on the work of the League. At that meeting Mrs. L. E. Dodwell was appointed General Convener of the proposed Military Benefit. Later on in the month of April our Honourary President, Mrs. E. W. Wilson, entertained the ladies representing the heads of our city regiments at tea, in the Ritz-Carlton Hotel, to talk over the scheme and consider plans.

Subsequently the following committees were formed to complete the plans and carry on the work: a Ticket Committee, Entertainment Committee, Publicity Committee, Programme, and Finance Committee (5 in number).

The "One Day" Whirlwind Ticket Selling Campaign under the able Convenership of Mrs. Edmund Shepherd, assisted by Mrs. G. J. Cuthbertson, was a great success.

On Wednesday morning, the 11th of October, 500 workers took part in selling tickets on the streets and turned in at the close of the day \$5,927.49, a most gratifying result, due to the splendid organization of the Conveners and the faithful service of all the workers to whom we extend our grateful thanks. Tickets sold at the Arena during the Benefit amounted to \$2,042.90, making a total for entrance money of \$7,970.39.

The members of the Entertainment Committee were Mrs. Geoffrey Porteous, Mrs. Shepherd and Mrs. W. H. Winter. Each of these ladies provided a different kind of amusement and each in turn was amply repaid with the success that a unded her efforts.

The Publicity Committee of two, convened by Mrs. Thos. Hodge, assisted by Miss Isabel McCaw must be credited with a large share of praise for its part in the Benefit.

Few of us will ever realize the time spent and the work done by this Committee and the many willing workers who assisted them throughout the summer of 1916. Much thought and care was given to the Circular Letter and Leaflet Information printed, concerning the work of the League. 5,000 letters in English and 2,000 in French were sent broadcast through the city and other places. The large response in money and goods testified to their acceptance. The work of Miss McCaw was seen in the daily papers, and the generosity of the press was indeed gratifying.

The Programme Committee in the hands of Mrs. Frances Peacock and Mrs. Walter Sadler, not only provided us with a memento of our Benefit in the shape of a well-planned, clearly-printed and attractive programme, but handed to our Treasurer the sum of \$1,163.85, secured for advertisements. The work of soliciting advertisements for programmes is perhaps the least attractive of all charitable work, and these ladies are to be congratulated upon their grand success.

The Finance Committee of seven gentlemen with Lt-Colonel Ostell, as chairman, took charge of the money, collecting it every night, taking it to a place of safe-keeping, and for days after the Benefit was over, these gentlemen gave hours to counting the precious returns, for which we were all working. We owe these gentlemen a debt of gratitude for their kindness in helping us with a most

difficult task.

The General Convener, Mrs. L. E. Dodwell, with her Assistant Convener, Mrs. F. O. W. Loomis, undertook the task of transforming the Arena into the very beautiful and attractive place it proved to be during that week, supervising the erection of all the booths with special electric lighting, the platforms and entertainment halls and all the equipment necessary, and when you are told that the General Convener secured the very large amount of lumber required, from the various lumber firms of our city, free of any charge, also all the electric wiring necessary free of cost, you will readily see that these two ladies did herculean work which can hardly be estimated.

To them, with the various committees already mentioned, is due the credit and success which crowned their efforts. 26 Regimental Committees and 8 organizations doing war work were represented and took part in the Military Benefit. One third of the receipts of each representative booth was given to each organization.

The total receipts of the Benefit amounted to \$47,019.82.

The total expenditure amounted to \$1,653.38

After paying one-third to each booth and transferring \$1,000.00 to the general account for current expenses the Military Benefit account stands at \$36,642.54, which amount will be invested in Canadian Government War Loan Securities.

To Lady Bertram must be given the credit for the splendid financial result obtained by the staff booth (\$6,000), as she handed in

over \$3,000, largely collected by herself.

To the Junior League, the Pung-u Circle, the Army Service Corps Branch, Lady Williams Taylor, Mrs. W. H. Schneider, Convener of the Composite Regimental Booth and the various other booths, whose entire proceeds were given to the League, we are deeply grateful.

To the various Regimental Bands who furnished the music on each evening and the different regiments, who, at much cost and trouble to their C.O., furnished a guard of 200 men every evening,

thereby giving a distinctly military tone to the Benefit, we are

greatly indebted.

On the evening of Wednesday, the officers of H.M.S. Carnarvon were our guests and on Friday evening Major-General Sir Sam Hughes was present and spoke words of cheer and encouragement concerning our work, after which he inspected every department.

We are deeply grateful to Lt.-Colonel Strange, who had the entire management of each evening's proceedings and who so ably

controlled the throngs of people who crowded the Arena.

To the manufacturers of Montreal, who donated so freely of their goods, to the many who contributed in the form of workmanship, to the generous public who purchased the goods for sale, to the press and to every one who assisted at the Military Benefit, making the event such a success, financially and socially, the League would record its sincere appreciation.

## DELORIMIER SOLDIERS' WIVES' LEAGUE.

As Secretary of the Delorimier Branch, I have much pleasure in submitting to you my annual report for the year ending Dec., 1916. During the first part of the year our meetings were held in Fairmount Presbyterian Church, Masson Street, on Wednesday, afternoons. On November 15th, it was decided to hold them in the Y.M.C.A. Rooms, Papineau Ave., changing the day from Wednesday to Monday afternoon. Members enrolled during the year numbered 40, making a total of 106 on the roll. The members meet to knit socks and other comforts for the different Battalions connected with the League and to take home and make garments and hospital necessities for Miss Barwick and for the Clothing Committee of the Montreal Soldiers Wives' League. Thirteen spindles of wool were purchased and upwards of 200 pairs of socks were knitted and distributed, 20 pairs donated to the Artillery, 17 pairs to the Montreal Soldiers Wives' League for the 148th Battalion besides 8 pairs of mitts, 7 mufflers and 2 caps, 12 pairs to Miss Dick of the Fairmount Presbyterian Church towards making up parcels at Christmas for the boys at the Front connected with the church. 10 pairs to Miss Barwick, 60 pairs sold to members, 50 pairs donated to other members at Christmas. About 100 garments were made besides comfort bags and pneumonia jackets, 6 bed comforters were donated to the Khaki Convalescent Home and \$10 was sent to the Field Artillery to help provide cigarettes and wool to make socks in answer to a request received. The Courtesy Committee reported visiting a great number of sick cases, ten cases of distress being helped with money, clothing and groceries, fuel, etc. A Sinking Fund was orgnized to provide for a big reception to be given to the husbands and friends of members on their return from the Front

after the War. A Salvage Committee was also formed for the collection of waste papers, magazines, old rubbers, etc., the proceeds to augment our funds. This committee consisting of Mrs. Haslett as convener, with Mrs. McKay, Mrs. Jewett and Mrs. Pashley, assistants are all working energetically together to make it a success. October being the month decided upon for the Military Benefit, the members decided that our Branch should have a Grocery Booth during that week. Members were very successful in canvassing all the wholesale firms for supplies of groceries, etc. On October 25th, our annual election of officers took place, the following ladies being elected:—

# CANADIAN FIELD ARTILLERY. PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

The work of the Field Artillery Branch of the Soldiers Wives' League has more than doubled in the past year, as another battery and ammunition column have gone overseas as well as several drafts. Many new members have joined consequently and have worked with much enthusiasm.

We have been interested in several schemes to raise funds, as our

reserve is never very large, and the wool is used up quickly.

An Auction Sale was held in conjunction with the Grenadier Guards at Ogilvy's Store, May 12th and 13th, the management very kindly lending us a large room and their tea room, and Mr. Kearns generously gave us his services as auctioneer. In this way, nearly all the returns were clear profit, and were divided equally between the two circles. This, with what we had on hand, gave us enough to carry on the work through the summer.

The Circle disbanded in June, but the work of sending parcels overseas was kept up by faithful members who remained in town.

We resumed our weekly meetings in September, when preparations were started for the Military Benefit, our Branch undertaking the "High Tea".

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The work in connection with this entertainment was enormous, and I think that once again all those who helped should be thanked for the splendid way they contributed to make the undertaking a success.

The Soldiers' Wives' League held a tea and dance to wind up the Benefit. The Artillery Circle served afternoon tea, and Miss

Costigan was in charge of the supper during the evening.

We next turned our attention to sending off Christmas boxes to the Artillerymen. The result of a hurry call for socks was amazing. In two weeks sufficient were turned in to give a pair to every man on our overseas' list (1,800 in all.) We also sent \$406.13 worth of tobacco in individual boxes.

On January 6th an entertainment followed by tea was held in the Drill Hall for the wives, mothers and children of overseas men. This

was well attended and seemed to be much enjoyed.

In response to a letter from Mrs. Bates (one of our members in England) one hundred dollars was sent to be spent on comforts for Artillerymen in the Sick Detention Hut, at Whitley. We also gave Mrs. E. B. Savage, who went to England in January, \$125.00 to buy large cakes to be sent to our men at the front.

The Soldiers' Wives' League was asked by the Patriotic and Red Cross Funds to assist in collecting during their whirlwind campaign in February. As we are a branch of the League, we undertook to collect for four days at Bryson's Drug Store, the Castle Blend Tea

Rooms and Freeman's Hotel.

We decided in February, that, instead of having an entertainment, each member would try to give two dollars or more to the funds, raising the money anyway they wished. The result was very

satisfactory.

We wish to thank the following members who have contributed largely to our funds: Mrs. Dunstan Gray, Mrs. Routh, Miss Routh and Miss Desbarats gave successful Bridge parties; Mrs. Flintoft gave us a horse to raffle, and Miss Cochrane a linen bedspread. The winners were Miss Annie Hackett and Miss Hutchison. A large cheque was given by Miss Kennedy, the result of a punch board scheme and two curling matches held in connection with it by the St. Lawrence and the Outremont Curling Clubs.

All the families on our list have been visited once during the year and some assisted, and at our weekly meetings Red Cross work

has been done.

The only change in our officers since the previous year is that Mrs. Conrad Harrington has been elected temporary secretary, Mrs. Coghlin being unable to attend the meetings as she has been

nursing in No. 3 Khaki Home.

We are now entering on our third year's work and there is much to do ahead of us. We hope for the earnest support of all our members, without which it will be impossible to keep up the standard we have established.

## REPORT OF THE 97TH AND 165TH SIEGE BATTERY NOW THE 1ST AND 5TH.

THE 97th Siege Battery Branch of the S.W.L. was formed by Mrs. F. Minden Cole on the 29th January, 1916, as a social club for the purpose of mutual help and social intercourse among the wives of the men who had gone to the front. Later, the wives of the men making up the reinforcements, which were afterwards formed into the 165th Siege Battery, joined this Branch.

Social and business meetings were held on the afternoon of the last Saturday in each month, a small membership fee being paid

to defray the social expenses.

The total membership reached about 150 and it was decided from the first to interest all the wives in knitting for the benefit of the men. In this way a number of socks were sent forward. A little later the "Benefit" in the Arena coming on turned all thoughts in that direction.

The women worked heartily in this cause all summer with the result that by far the greater portion of material disposed of at our booth at the Military Benefit was the product of these women and produced the sum of \$472.15, of which amount \$167.09 came to

the 97th and 165th as their share of the proceeds.

At a meeting later it was decided to utilize this money in the buying of wool for socks, and a portion was also voted for Christmas boxes to be sent forward from here with a still further sum sent over in cash to provide Christmas dinners for the men, all of which has been duly acknowledged.

Since the 1st of January this year, a steady sending of socks has gone forward and the total sent to date numbers 122 pairs, the most of which also has been acknowledged at this time.

Owing to the illness of Mrs. Cole the meetings have been discontinued for some time, but the members of the Committee have kept in touch with the women, and if any are in want or in sorrow they are immediately visited. It is hoped that on Mrs. Cole's return to the city meetings will again be in progress.

### 3RD AND 9TH SIEGE BATTERY.

I WOULD like to take the opportunity of thanking the League, in behalf of Major Cape and myself for the courtesy you have shown to us from time to time in allowing us the use of the League rooms, where the meetings are held, the privilege of having a booth at the Military Benefit, and in other ways.

This unit has been in France since last June and during that time our Committee has sent the men \$45.00 worth of tobacco, 175 Christmas parcels, each containing field comforts, also 200 pairs of socks and 175 caps. Our Committee has put funds amount-

ing to \$500.00 at the disposal of Major Cape to buy any other

comforts which the men may need.

The Montreal Soldiers' Wives' League has sent 850 pairs of socks and at Christmas 175 cakes, 175 boxes of candies and to the soldiers' children a present each, all of which have been very much appreciated. I might say that this Battery is made up of 95% Canadian born, of which 50% are Westmount men.

Meetings have been held once a week for sewing and knitting and in case of emergency there has always been plenty of finished work on hand. Business meetings have been held once a month. In the Autumn of 1916 special attention was given to the Military Benefit, held in the Arena, in order to make the Pioneer booth as big a success as possible. During the summer, the auxiliary entertained the wives and children of the men of the battalion, and later gave

them a Christmas entertainment and treat.

At the time of the sudden departure of the Battalion for overseas, enough money was collected in three days, for a few special comforts and more than one thousand individual packages were done up and were delivered to the men in England during the Christmas season. For those men who had no one here to provide for them, each Company-Commander was given fifty pairs of socks, and the Auxiliary is most grateful to the League for their donation of apples and socks when the Battalion was leaving and also for their previous donation of socks, scarfs and caps. During the past few months added effort has been made to have one hundred pairs of socks on hand to send across each month. Up to date we have received 600 pairs of socks.

Latterly the meetings of the Auxiliary have been held in the League Rooms, Guarantee Building, and the work has been steadily progressing.

### CANADIAN ARMY SERVICE CORPS.

THE Committee of the Army Service Branch of the Soldiers Wives' League has held regular monthly meetings, at the residences of the various members, during the past year.

The work has gone on steadily, the wives and families have been visited, advice given and assistance rendered where necessary.

There has been considerable correspondence with various officials in Ottawa and England, with reference to matters coming up from time to time, and we have been very successful in adjusting differences and misunderstandings to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Two ladies of this Committee undertook the sale of programmes and copies of "The Growler," at the Racey Lecture, last spring, when \$130.00 was realized.

When it was decided that the Military Benefit should take place last autumn the A.S.C. Branch was allotted the charge of the Tobacco and Smokers' Supplies Stall. All the cigars, cigarettes and smokers' supplies were donated, so the sum of \$1,512.85 was reached. In addition to this the members sold \$465.00 worth of admission tickets on the day of the Ticket Campaign, and also solicited \$700.00 of advertising matter for the programmes sold at the Benefit.

At Christmas time \$125.00 was sent overseas to the various A.S.C. units from Montreal to augment a little the canteen funds and to be used in whatever way seemed best.

The ladies are knitting and sending boxes of socks, etc., from time to time.

The children at home received Christmas parcels containing toys, sweets and where possible also some useful woollen articles.

At the December meeting, Major Adams of the 1st Reserve Park, who was here on a short furlough, spoke in a most interesting manner on the work of his unit from the time of leaving Canada with the first contingent until the present. Then he said that the greatest comfort to the men at the front was to know that their wives and families were being visited and advised in their difficulties. It helped them to be much more efficient soldiers.

The members of the Committee have, up to the present, been visiting the families of the 1st Reserve Park, No. 6 A.S.C., Depot

Units of Supply, Remounts, and are now taking over the 2nd Reserve Park.

An entertainment for the wives and families of all these units is being arranged for to take place the end of March.

## 24th BATTALION V.R.C.

In the early fall we were busy making preparations for the Military Benefit, at which our booth was the "Country Store," in connection with which a Post Office was run and ice cream cones were sold. The Committee also sold tickets and took part in the big whirlwind campaign, being very successful in the down-town districts, which were alloted to us. At the close of the Military Benefit the 24th were able to give the Soldiers Wives' League a check for \$1,158.67.

During the summer, Mrs. A. Hardman and Mrs. Boyd sold ice cream on the McGill Campus, in which venture we were very

successful. Mrs. Reynolds held a concert in Victoria Hall, the proceeds from which she very kindly sent us a donation. The Maisonneuve Red Cross Group also helped very much by holding a Sock Shower.

At Xmas time the usual parcels were forwarded to our men. 700 packages containing chocolate, gum, bachelor buttons, candles, handkerchiefs, cigarettes, socks and a Xmas card. To those in hospital 300 comfort bags were sent. That both parcels and bags were greatly appreciated has since been shown by the letters of

thanks sent to members of the committee.

On December 29th, a Xmas treat was held for the families of the men in the 24th, invitations to which were issued by Miss Shepherd, who is in charge of our regimental lists. During the afternoon a very interesting programme was given, after which tea was served. On going home each child was given an apple, orange, bag of candy, and a toy. Mrs. Walsh very kindly took charge of a special table for the returned soldiers.

When the Khaki League made their house to house canvas the 24th took the upper level from Claremont to Mt. Pleasant Ave. This same ground was covered during the Patriotic campaign, at

which time we also took over the Queen's Hotel.

On St. Valentine's night the committee held a Bridge and Dance, at the Ritz-Carlton, which our Treasurer's report shows was most certainly a success. In this, we were joined by Mrs. Loomis and her committee.

In connection with the returned soldiers, who have been discharged, it was found necessary to form a committee to look after their families and see that their pensions were being attended to. Mrs. A. Shatford and Mrs. J. N. Greenshields were asked to be the conveners, with a large committee to work with them. In order that they could better understand what the men are entitled to, and thus be able to explain clearly to the men and their wives, Mrs. J. Williamson Ross was asked to give us an address on pensions, which she very kindly did making our last meeting a very interesting and instructive one.

As a large number of the 148th men have been draughted into the 24th, Mrs. Magee was asked to come to our meetings and to work in conjunction with our committee on these cases, and report to Mrs. Hardman, who is the convener of our casualty committee. As Mrs. Hardman has a very strong visiting committee we have heen able, as each casualty is reported to visit, where possible, or write to the

families, and, if necessary, to help them.

### WOOL COMMITTEE

BESIDE the cases of Xmas parcels, sent to the Battalion in France, we sent 150 comfort bags, containing magazines, stories, playing cards, chewing gum, pencil, paper and cigarettes sent to the 24th, wounded, in England. In December, the Wool Committee started shipping to France a case each week, from December 1st to March 1st, 13 cases have been shipped containing 1,610 pairs socks, 16 pairs wristlets, 16 mufflers, 13 wraps. Of these 103 pairs socks have been knit by the wives and mothers of our soldiers, the wristlets, mufflers, caps, and 328 pairs socks have been donations. There has been 650 lbs. of wool purchased, of which we have about 250 lbs. to be returned knit into socks. The Committee of the 148th Battalion have sent us 3 cases containing 125 pairs of socks each, which have been sent to France for 148th men drafted into 24th Battalion.

During December we sent to the Parcels Department Canadian Red Cross, London, England, 6 pine pillows of 100 magazine stories, to be forwarded to 24th Battalion wounded in England.

# THE 60th BATTALION For the Year 1916

It has been decided by the committee previous to January, 1916, that when the Battalion went to France we should send them one hundred and fifty pairs of socks each month, so wool was purchased and the wives and mothers of the men notified that it would be given out in the League rooms every Monday afternoon.

Up to the present we have taken in an average of 20 pairs per week. With these and five pairs per month from each member of the committee, 10 pairs from the Victoria Rifles Chapter I.O.D.E., and 10 pairs from the Grenadier Guards Committee, we were able to send forward from February to the end of May 660 pairs. In the latter part of June we sent three cases containing 180 pairs and extra comforts.

On the 23rd of May we gave a tea for the wives and mothers of the men, at which a letter was read from Major Evans telling of the

splendid way the men had done their duty.

As our efforts are now being put into collecting enough socks for the men to start the winter with, only one case of 150 pairs was sent in August. In September 975 pairs of socks and 150 pairs of wristlets were sent. Our Christmas boxes contained 1,000 stockings, containing each a handkerchief, a hand towel, pipe, \( \frac{1}{4} \) pound box of hard candy, a package of chocolate, and games, puzzle or mouth organ, sterno candles, paper, pencil and envelopes. These were sent the 1st October. Cakes and smokes were forwarded from England.

We assisted the Victoria Rifles in the Tea Room at the Military

Benefit.

After Christmas, a second tea was given, at which a number of

our returned soldiers were present.

Where there have been casualities, the families have been visited as far as possible and in a couple of cases of returned soldiers, we have assisted the families financially.

During the year, we have raised and spent one thousand dollars,

and have distributed 225 pounds of wool.

We wish to take this opportunity to express our sincere thanks to the Montreal Soldiers' Wives' League for the use of the rooms and to the Daughters of the Empire for forwarding our cases.

### CONSTITUTION OF SOLDIERS' WIVES' LEAGUE

(Adopted 30th March, 1900.)

#### I.—NAME

The name of the Association is the SOLDIERS' WIVES' LEAGUE.

### II.—Овјест

The object of this League is to bring the Wives of all Soldiers, whether of Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, of Men or the Staff, Permanent Corps and Active Militia of Canada, into closer touch and sympathy with one another, so that whether in sickness or in health, they may be able mutually to aid and assist one another and their families in times of difficulty, trouble or distress.

#### III.—PATRONESSES

There may be a Patroness and one or more Vice-Patronesses.

#### IV.—COUNCIL

The affairs of the League shall be managed by a Council which shall consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, District Presidents, a Secretary, and a Treasurer, and two Members.

The Council will meet annually at Ottawa on a date coinciding with the General Meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association, which is usually held in February of each year. The Council shall have the power to make or amend the Rules of the League, administer its affairs generally, receive and distribute funds contributed for general use, and conduct such business as may be brought before it. The Council will receive annually the Reports of the District Branches. The Council will elect annually the President, two Vice-Presidents, the General Secretary, the General Treasurer, and the two Members. Five will form a quorum.

#### . V.—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

There shall be an Executive Committee consisting of the President, the Vice-Presidents, the two Members, the General Secretary and the General Treasurer. The Members of the Executive Committee must be residents of Ottawa. To the charge of this Committee shall be entrusted all the business of the Council during the year, except that it shall not be able to alter the Rules or Constitution of the League.

This Committee shall assemble whenever it may be deemed necessary by the President, or Vice-President acting on behalf of the President. Three to form a quorum.

#### VI.-MINUTES

The Minutes of Council and Executive Committee shall be entered in a book for that purpose by the General Secretary.

#### VII.—FINANCE

Each District Branch will pay into the Council annually the sum of five dollars for the purpose of meeting necessary current expenses.

### VIII.-LEAGUE YEAR

The League Year will commence on the 1st January and terminate on the 31st of December.

#### DISTRICT BRANCHES

District Branches shall be formed in each Military District.

### THE MONTREAL BRANCH OF THE SOLDIERS' WIVES' LEAGUE


- MEMBERSHIP.—The Wives, Daughters, Mothers, Relatives and Friends of all Officers, N.C. Officers and Men of the Permanent and Militia Forces of Canada are eligible as Members.
- Subscription.—An annual subscription of one dollar shall be payable in January, Only members whose fees have been paid for three months are entitled to vote.
- Organization.—The Organization of the Montreal Branch shall be: A General Committee, an Executive Committee and a Sub-Committee. The General Committee consists of the full membership of the League. This Committee shall conduct the general business of the League at their regular meetings, 20 shall constitute a quorum.


The Executive Committee consists of the Hon. President, the Officers of the League and the Presidents of Branches. It shall consider business to be brought before the general committee. Six shall form a quorum.

The Sub-Executive Committee consists of the Hon. President, and the officers of the League, and shall transact special business and attend matters requiring immediate attention. Four shall form a quorum.

- OFFICERS.—The officers shall be an Hon. President, President, three Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Rec.-Secretary, and two Corresponding Secretaries. The President is ex-officio, a member of every Committee. The Corresponding Secretaries are ex-officio members of the Emergency Committee, and one should be present at all meetings. The Treasurer is ex-officio a member of all Committees which distribute the money of the League.
- Local Branches.—Branches should be formed in connection with every regiment and unit in the district. Other Branches may be formed at the discretion of the League. The Branches shall be called by the name of the regiment or unit with which they are associated followed by "Branch of the Montreal Soldiers' Wives' League." Other Branches may bear any preferred name, but followed by the same words. No Branch shall dissolve or separate from the League without notifying the Executive.
- MEETINGS.—The League closes its year on the 31st of December. Annual General Meeting shall be held later for the reception of reports and election of officers. The President shall appoint a nominating Committee of three from among the members of the Sub-Executive Committee. Other nominations may also be made from the floor.

These By-Laws may be changed only at a General Meeting of the League and notice of such change must be given in writing to the Executive, two months before, for consideration. A two-thirds vote of the members present will be necessary to carry.





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
