DIRECTIONS FOR PLAYING.
Two or more Ladies or Gentlemen having agreed to make an elegant and instructive TOUR of the WORLD, are represented by Pillars, and play the Game according to the following Rules. Take the Totum and mark it on the sides from 1 to 8. Every Traveller is to have one Pillar, and four Counters of the same colour.
Each Person is to spin the Totum once, observing who has the highest number, as that determines who is to play first.
Begin to play by spinning the Totum; if it turns up 3, place your Pillar on that number, Senegal; when it is your turn to spin again, if it comes up 4, then add 4 to 3 and travel on to 7, St. Helena.
Read the description of each place you arrive at, and follow the directions there given.
When you are directed to stay one or more turns, lay down so many Counters, as memorandums thereof, taking up one of them again every time you omit spinning, till they are all got back, and then spin again in your turn.
When you arrive at a station occupied by another, you are to go forward to the next vacant one.
As often as you exceed 76 you must go back to 56 (New York) and spin again in your turn, till some one is fortunate as to arrive at London (the GAMM) and consequently become entitled to the applause of the company and honor of being esteemed the best instructed and speediest traveller in the WORLD.

1. THE AZORES, or Western Islands, belong to Portugal.
2. CANARY ISLANDS, subject to Spain, lent wine, Canary birds; and the Peak of Teneriffe in the known world, except Mount Olympus.
3. SENEGAL, capital of Senegambia, famous for its trade in Gums, Gold dust, and Negroes.
4. THE EQUATOR, or Equinoctial Line, must stay one turn, to be crossed by Neptune, performed the first time of leaving the Line.
5. ASCENSION, an uninhabited island, about 100 miles from the Cape of Good Hope.
6. ELMINA, belonging to the Dutch, a European Factory on the Gold Coast.
7. ST. HELENA, belonging to the English, furnishes their shipping with water and fresh provisions.
8. ST. SALVADOR, capital of Congo in Africa; here you turn to see a magnificent palace of the King.
9. CAPE OF GOOD HOPE; stay 3 turns to see the Dutch settlements, extending 300 miles up the country of the Caffers.
10. MADAGASCAR, the largest Island in the world, Borneo and New Holland excepted, being 1000 miles long.
11. ISLE OF BOURBON, chief Magazine, naval and military force in the East Indies.
12. MELINDA, a fortified town on the coast of Malabar, belonging to the Portuguese.
13. ZOCOTRA, a populous Island in the Arabian Gulf.

14. MECCA, a city in Arabia, to which the followers of Mahomet are to make a pilgrimage once in their lives; but should a more enlightened traveller follow their example, he shall return to whence he left, as an atonement for his folly.
15. SENNAAR, a populous city and capital of the Kingdom of Funj in Nubia; subject to the Turks.
16. CAIRO, or Grand Cairo, capital of Egypt; the traveller cannot employ his time better than by staying three turns to view the numerous curiosities in and about this ancient city.
17. ISPAHAN, (the ancient Persepolis) capital of Persia.
18. GOA, the only British settlement on the coast of Persia.
19. DELHI, capital of the Mogul Empire, where Kouli Kan murdered 70,000 Indians in one night.
20. GOA, capital of the Portuguese dominions in India, residence of the governor, and famous for fine Arrack.
21. MADRAS, British settlement on the Coromandel coast.
22. CALCUTTA, capital of Bengal; here stay one turn to see the richest country in the world, but take care to avoid the Black Hole; where 123 of the East India Company's servants were suffocated by the Nabob in 1757.
23. BENCOLEN in Sumatra, principal British settlement in the East India Islands, and great market for Pepper.
24. BORNEO, the largest Island in Asia, and even of the whole world, New Holland excepted.
25. LYON'S LAND, in New Holland, discovered in 1622.
26. DIMENS LAND, Southernmost part of New Holland.

27. NEW ZEALAND, two supposed to have been part of a continent.
28. BOTANY BAY, first British settlement in New South Wales, established by the first European colony in New South Wales, to prevent any idea of a revolt, he had only spun 4 turns to observe the manners of our new acquaintance, and then proceed, here the Antelope Packet was kindly treated by the Inhabitants, the Philippine Islands; here it is three turns to find out, if possible, paid to the English, who took this place from the Spaniards in 1763.

38. NOVA ZEMBLA, where the Dutch watered in 1569; if you do not want water, you need not stop here, but proceed to Hudson's Bay, where the climate is more temperate.
39. ARCHANGEL, a Sea-port of Russia, & place of great trade.
40. LAPLAND, the most northern province on the continent of Europe; stay one turn to see the inhabitants drawn in sledges by Rein-Deer over the snow, with inconceivable fatigue.
41. SPITZBERGEN, the northernmost land yet discovered.
42. BAFFIN'S BAY, discovered by an Englishman in quest of a North West Passage; but failing, the traveller is requested to renew the search, and stay three turns for that purpose.
43. HUDSON'S BAY, from whence great quantities of Skins and Furs are brought to Europe.
44. NOOTKA, or KING GEORGE'S SOUND; here drop Anchor and stay one turn to assert the Rights of the British Crown.
45. BEHRING'S STRAITS, the nearest passage between Africa and America; stay one turn to land upon Long Island, from which you may see both continents.
46. O-WHY-HEE, where Captain Cook was killed by the natives; do not stop here lest you share the same fate; but return to Baffin's Bay, and be thankful for your escape.
47. TAHITI, discovered in 1767; stay one turn, and pay your court to the amiable Queen of this remote Island.
48. MEXICO, capital of Mexico, or New Spain.
49. LIMA, capital of Peru, and all Spanish America.
50. PATAGONIA, a barren and inhospitable country, said

51. BUENOS AIRES, capital of the government of Brazil.
52. FERNAMBOUCO, capital of the Dutch in S. America.
53. SURNAM, principal of the British West India Islands; here stay two turns to lay in a good stock of Rum and Sugar, for so remarkable.
54. JAMAICA, here stay two turns to lay in a good stock of Rum and Sugar, for so remarkable.
55. BERMUDDA, or SOMER'S ISLANDS, healthy and pleasant; stay one turn to get a faithful pilot.
56. NEW YORK, capital of the 13 United States of America, and Seat of the Congress.
57. HALIFAX, capital of the government of Nova Scotia.
58. NEWFOUNDLAND, famous for its Cod Fishery.
59. QUEBEC, capital of Canada, taken from the French in 1759; stay one turn, and drop a tear in memory of the gallant and brave fall of this glorious Achievement.
60. GREENLAND, noted for its Whale Fisheries.
61. ICELAND, the very name of this frigid spot, will appall the traveller's staying one turn to see and feel the comfortable effects of a burning mountain, Mount Heckla.
62. MALDEN, a most perilous Whirlpool; here you chance of the game, for keeping so bad a look out, and getting into so much danger.
63. STOCKHOLM, capital of the kingdom of Sweden.

64. ST. PETERSBURGH, capital of the Russian Empire.
65. ASTRAKAN, a Sea-port of Russia, on the Caspian Sea.
66. CONSTANTINOPLE, capital of the Turkish Empire, well worth notice; yet on account of the Plague, the traveller, who once touches at this place, must not stop but return to Newfoundland, and there fly one turn to perform quarantine.
67. WARSAWA, capital of the republican Kingdom of Poland.
68. VIENNA, capital of the German Empire.
69. ROME, though now only capital of the Pope's dominions, was once mistress of the world; stay 2 turns to view its antiquities.
70. TUNIS, the most polished of all the Barbary States.
71. MOROCCO, capital of the Empire of that name, and residence of the Emperor.
72. GIBRALTAR, the precious Rock of Old England, renowned for a Defence incredible, under a General invincible, the brave Eliot, Lord Heathfield, of immortal memory.
73. LISBON, capital of Portugal, famous for its Wine, and exquisite Fruit; worth flying one turn to taste of.
74. MADRID, capital of Spain; beware of the Inquisition.
75. PARIS, capital of France; stay one turn to rejoice at the establishment of Liberty, the fall of Despotism, and destruction of the Bastille, at the memorable Revolution in 1789.
76. LONDON, the Game capital of Great Britain and greatest Commercial City in the World.

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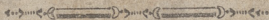
