The evidence was, that the desendant came to the plaintiff, and desired him to supply one Dodson with goods, which the plaintiff resuled to do as he knew nothing of Dodson; but the plaintiff said, he would furnish them on the credit of the desendant; on this the desendant went away, and a sew days afterwards returned, when the plaintiff agreed to supply Dodson; Dodson on receiving the goods, put them into the hands of a broker for sale, who, learning the nature of the business, offered them to the plaintiff, but he refused to take them back, and brought this action; the plaintiff Dodson and the desendant were both made debtors. debtors.

Mr. Mingay for the defendant endeavoured to bring this within the rule of the statute of frauds, being an undertaking for the debt of a third person, and no

Mr. Justice Buller, who tried the cause, observed, it was settled as a rule of law, that where goods are fold to one upon the credit of a third person, if any credit is given to him to whom the goods are delivered. the promise of the third person is within the statute but where the credit is expressly given to such third person only, and not to him to whom the goods are delivered, then such third person is liable immediately, and the contract is not within the statute. has formerly been held, that even where the person to whom the goods were delivered was liable, the perfon undertaking for him was also liable, and that this was not a contract within the statute, and it would have been a very good thing if this rule had been adhered to; for certainly, when a tradefman receives the fecurity of a third person, he shews that he does not intend giving credit to the person who has goods. tradesman by putting any name down in his books, cannot make a person liable who was not so before.— In the present case the goods were put in the plaintiff's books without any name; there was a blank, and afterwards by defire of the defendant, Dodson's name is put in; that does not make him liable at all, it was not done with that view.
