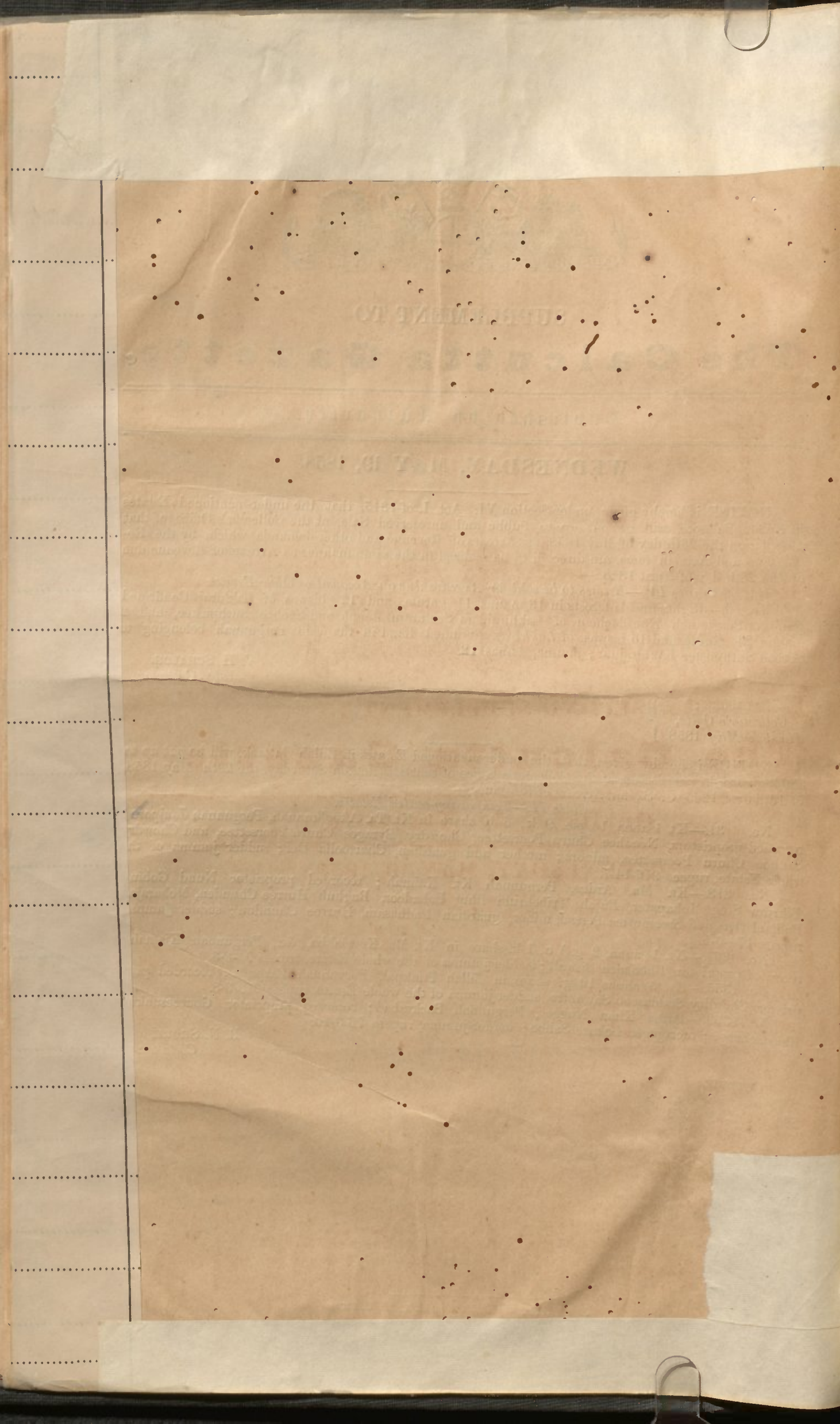

Legislative Council of India.

The 17th April 1858.

THE following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honourable the Governor General on the 4th April 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 17th April 1858), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT NO. XI OF 1858.

An Act to authorize the infliction of corporal punishment in certain cases.

WHEREAS, in consequence of the destruction of the Jails in many parts of India, and the want under existing circumstances of means for the confinement of convicts and for the due enforcement of prison-discipline, it is expedient to authorize, the substitution of corporal punishment for imprisonment in certain cases; It is enacted as follows:—

I. If any person shall be charged before a Magistrate with having committed any of the offences herein-after mentioned, it shall be lawful for such Magistrate, in lieu of committing the offender for trial, or sentencing him to any other punishment to which he may be liable, to sentence the offender upon conviction to corporal punishment not exceeding thirty stripes with a ratan. The offences are—robbery not attended with aggravating circumstances, burglary, theft, knowingly receiving stolen or plundered property, wilful destruction of or injury to property, and the attempt to commit any of the above-mentioned offences.

II. It shall also be competent to a Magistrate to impose a fine not exceeding five hundred Rupees on conviction for any offence under Section XXV Act XXVIII of 1857; and in such case, as

well as in any case in which a fine shall be imposed under the provisions of Section VIII Act XI of 1857, or of Section XVI, Section XXII, or Section XXVII Act XXVIII of 1857, or for assaults or affrays, it shall be lawful for the Magistrate to order that corporal punishment, not exceeding thirty stripes with a ratan, shall be inflicted on the offender in lieu of the fine, in case such fine be not paid. In any case in which the Magistrate shall make such order, he shall not sentence the offender to imprisonment in addition to the fine.

III. Nothing in this Act shall be deemed to authorize the infliction of corporal punishment upon any European or American or upon any female.

IV. The word "Magistrate" shall include any person lawfully exercising the full powers of a Magistrate, and also any Assistant to a Magistrate or Deputy Magistrate specially authorized by the Executive Government to exercise the powers vested in a Magistrate by this Act; and the word "European" shall include any person usually designated a European British subject.

V. This Act shall take effect only in the Districts or places to which the Governor General in Council or the Executive Government of any Presidency Government of any Presidency or place shall think it necessary to extend it.

VI. This Act shall continue in force for two years.

THE following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 4th April 1858, (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 17th April 1858), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT NO. XII OF 1858.

An Act for raising funds for making and repairing roads in the Suburbs of Calcutta and the Station of Howrah.

WHEREAS considerable sums are expended annually by Government for making and repairing roads in the suburbs of Calcutta and the station of Howrah; and whereas it is just and expedient that such expenses, or a reasonable proportion thereof, should be defrayed by the inhabitants of the said suburbs and station in the same manner as the expense of making and repairing roads in the Town of Calcutta is defrayed by the inhabitants of the said Town: and whereas a tax has been imposed upon carriages and horses kept within the said Town; and it is expedient that a similar tax should be imposed upon carriages and horses kept within the said suburbs and station: It is enacted as follows:—

I. The sums required for making and repairing roads within the limits of the said suburbs and station, except as hereinafter otherwise provided, shall be contributed by the inhabitants of the said suburbs and station and shall be recovered in the manner hereinafter provided.

II. A tax shall be imposed upon all carriages, horses, ponies, and mules kept within the limits of the said suburbs and station, as those limits are defined in Act XXI of 1857, at the rates specified in the annexed Schedule; and shall be payable quarterly by the owners or persons having charge of the same.

III. Provided that the carriages and animals hereinafter mentioned shall be exempt from the tax, namely,

Gun carriages, and ordnance carts and waggons. Cavalry horses, and horses of mounted Police. Horses belonging to Officers doing regimental duty at the Presidency or in the said suburbs or station, at the rate of one horse for each Officer.

Carriages and animals kept for sale and not used for any other purpose, if kept by *bona fide* dealers in such carriages or animals.

IV. The Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal may appoint such person as he shall deem fit to be Collector of the carriage and horse tax in the said suburbs, and in the said station.

V. Every person, who may have owned or had charge of any carriage or animal kept within the said suburbs or station for any number of days in any quarter, shall be liable to the whole tax for that quarter.

VI. If a carriage shall have been under repair at a carriage-maker's for the whole period contained in any quarter, no tax shall be leviable in respect of such carriage for that quarter.

VII. The Collector, at his discretion, may compound, for any period not exceeding one year, with livery stable-keepers and other persons keeping carriages and horses for hire, for a certain sum to be paid for the carriages and horses so kept by such persons, in lieu of the rates specified in the Schedule.

VIII. Carriages and horses let out for hire and kept for the time being in premises situated within the said suburbs or station, although owned by livery stable-keepers or others not residing within the limits of the said suburbs or station, shall be subject to the tax; and the sums to be charged for such carriages and horses shall be recoverable from the persons in whose premises they are for the time being kept.

IX. Every carriage of the description rated in the Schedule at one Rupee and eight annas, kept within the said suburbs or station and let out for hire, shall be registered in the Office of the Collector, and shall bear, in such manner as the Collector shall direct, the number of such registration. The registration shall be made and the number assigned annually upon such day in each year as the Collector shall appoint. Any person becoming possessed, within the year, of any such carriage which has not been registered, may obtain registration on application to the Collector at his Office, when any registered carriage is transferred within the year, it shall be registered anew in the name of the person to whom it has been transferred. A fee of four annas shall be paid for each registration.

X. Whoever keeps any such carriage, required to be registered by the provisions of the last preceding Section, without being so registered, shall, on conviction before a Magistrate, be liable to a fine not exceeding ten Rupees, and the Collector or any Officer duly authorized by him may seize or cause to be seized any such carriage (provided the same be not employed at the time of seizure in the conveyance of any passengers or goods) together with the horses or other animals drawing the same, and may deliver them over to the Police; and all Police Officers are hereby required, on the application of the Collector or his Officer as aforesaid, to seize and detain the same. If the carriage as aforesaid be not claimed or if the fine be not paid within ten days, such carriage, together with the animals seized with it, may be sold by auction by order of the Magistrate, and the proceeds applied to the payment of the fine and all costs and charges incurred on account of the detention and sale, and the surplus (if any), if not claimed by the owner within a further period of twenty days, shall be paid to the Collector.

XI. The Collector shall from time to time cause to be prepared and entered in distinct columns in a book to be kept at his Office and to be open to the inspection of any person

In order to enable the Collector to make such list, the Collector or any Officer authorized by him may send to all persons supposed to be liable to the payment of the tax, a Schedule to be filled up with such information respecting the carriages and animals kept by them as the Collector may judge necessary for the assessment of the tax. The Schedule shall be filled up in writing, and signed and dated, and returned to the Office of the Collector by every person to whom it is sent, whether or not liable to the payment of the tax; and whoever refuses, neglects, or omits duly to fill up and return such Schedule within one week from the receipt thereof or knowingly gives therein any incorrect or false return, shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to a penalty not exceeding two hundred Rupees.

XIII. The Magistrate on the report of the Collector may, if he thinks proper, summon any person supposed to be liable to the payment of the tax, or any servant of such person, to appear before the Collector: and the Collector may examine such person or his servant as to the number and description of the carriages and horses in respect of which such person is liable to be assessed. If the person summoned shall, without lawful excuse, fail to appear in pursuance of the summons or shall refuse to answer any lawful question of the Collector, or knowingly give an incorrect answer, he shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to a penalty not exceeding two hundred Rupees.

XIV. Any person who may dispute his liability for any assessment made under the foregoing provisions of this Act, or the amount of any such assessment, may appeal to the Magistrate. Provided that such appeal shall be commenced within ten days after the receipt by such person of a bill for the sum claimed from him in respect of such assessment.

XV. The decision of the Magistrate upon every such appeal shall be final and conclusive; and no person shall be entitled to contest any assessment made under the foregoing provisions of this Act, in any other manner than by appeal to the Magistrate as hereinbefore provided.

XVI. When any sum is due on account of the said tax, the Collector shall cause to be presented to the person liable to the payment thereof a bill for the amount, which shall also contain a statement of the period and a description of the carriages and animals for which the charge is made, together with a notice of the time within which an appeal may be preferred.

XVII. If the bill is not paid by the person liable to pay the same within five days from the presentation thereof, the Collector may cause to be served upon such person a notice of demand in the form (A) contained in the Schedule to this Act, or to the like effect; and if such person shall not, within five

days from the service of such notice of demand, pay the sum due or show sufficient cause for non-payment of the same to the satisfaction of the Collector, and if no appeal shall have been preferred, such sum with all costs may be levied by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the defaulter under a warrant in the form (B) in the Schedule, or to the like effect, to be issued for that purpose by the Collector.

XVIII. The Officer charged with the execution of the warrant of distress shall make an inventory of the goods and chattels seized under any such warrant, and shall at the same time give a notice in writing in the form (C) contained in the Schedule annexed to this Act, to the person in possession thereof at the time of the seizure, that the said goods and chattels will be sold as therein mentioned.

XIX. If the arrear is not paid with costs, or the warrant is not discharged or suspended by the Collector, the goods and chattels seized shall be sold under the orders of the Collector, who shall apply the proceeds or such part thereof as may be necessary in discharge of the said arrears and costs; and the surplus, if any, shall be returned on demand to the person in possession of the goods and chattels at the time of the seizure. The fees payable upon distraints under this Act shall be such as are set forth in the Table of Fees (D) in the said Schedule.

XX. Instead of proceeding by distress and sale, or in case of failure to realize by distress the whole or part of any sum due in respect of the tax, the Collector may sue the person liable for the same in any Court of competent jurisdiction.

XXI. Previously to the first day of May of each year, an estimate shall be prepared of the amount required during the year for the purpose of making and repairing roads in the said suburbs and in the said station respectively; and such estimate, when sanctioned by the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, shall be published in the Official Gazette for general information. The Governor General of India in Council, on the report of the Lieutenant-Governor, shall determine whether any and (if any) what proportion of the said estimate shall be paid out of the public Revenues. If, after deducting such proportion (if any), the said estimate shall exceed the sum which the carriage and horse-tax is estimated to produce, with the addition of such further sums as may be assigned by the Lieutenant-Governor for the said purpose out of the Ferry Fund, or any other public fund, such excess shall be added to the amount of the assessment or rate to be levied in the said suburbs and in the said station under Act XX of 1856, and such additional assessment or rate shall be made and recovered according to the provisions of that Act. Provided that the amount levied by an assessment or rate under this Section shall not in any case exceed a sum equal to one-half of the amount levied under the said Act XX of 1856 for the purposes of that Act.

XXII. The proceeds of any assessment or rate made as aforesaid shall be kept distinct from the proceeds of the assessment or rate made for the purposes of the said Act XX of 1856; and such proceeds, together with all sums received by the Collector of the carriage and horse-tax and all sums assigned by Government as above provided, and all fines and penalties levied under this Act, shall form a Fund which shall be called in the suburbs of Calcutta "The Suburban Roads Fund," and in the station of Howrah "The Station Roads Fund." All ex-

penditures incurred for the purpose of this Act shall be defrayed from the said Fund, and the residue shall be applied exclusively to making, repairing, and improving roads within the limits of the said suburbs and station. Provided that no payment shall be made from the said Fund for the repair of such roads or parts of roads as are herein after described, namely,

Proviso.

In the said Suburbs—

The Barrackpore road with the Lock-gate road.
The road from the Cossipore Gun-foundry to Dum-Dum.

The Belgatchya or Dum-Dum road.

The Behalea or Diamond Harbour road southward from the cross road to Allipore and Tollygunge.

The Budge-Budge road.

The Gurrahhath or Cuipee road from the end of O d Ballygunge road.

The Canal roads, and the roads leading from the Canals and Salt-water lake into the Town, namely, the Balliaghutta, Narcooldangah, Manicktollah, Ooltadunga, Gooreeparah, South Sealdah, Khooleah, Nimtollah, Jonmajoy Baboo's, Khodagunge, and Khodghatta roads, and the Soorah road between the Balliaghutta and Narcooldanga roads.

In the said Station—

The Hooghly road northward from the point where it is crossed by the Old Benares road.

The Old Benares road westward from the same point.

Or for making or maintaining any part of any other main road of communication between the Town of Calcutta and the interior of the country which may hereafter be constructed.

XXIII. The Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal shall cause statements to be prepared annually of all expenses incurred on account of making, repairing, and improving the roads of the said suburbs and of the said station, and of all sums credited to and disbursed from the Suburban Roads Fund and the Howrah Station Roads Fund; and the said statements shall be published in the Official Gazette for general information.

Legislative Council of India.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 4th April 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 17th April 1858), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT NO. XIII OF 1858.

An Act for the punishment of persons who unlawfully possess or conceal arms or other property belonging to Her Majesty or to the East India Company.

BEAS it is expedient to provide for the punishment of persons who shall knowingly and unlawfully

fully have in their possession or conceal arms, horses, or other property belonging to Her Majesty or to the East India Company; It is enacted as follows:—

I. In any District to which the provisions of this Act shall be extended by order of the Governor General in Council or the Executive Government of any Presidency or place, the Magistrate shall issue a proclamation calling upon all persons within his District, having in their possession any arms, ammunition, horse or other animal, or any Government Stamps, or other property belonging to Her Majesty or to the East India Company, to deliver up the same to the Magistrate or at the nearest Police Station within a time to be fixed by the proclamation; and whoever, after the expiration of the time so fixed, shall without lawful or reasonable excuse have in his possession any arms, ammunition, horse or other animal, or any Government Stamps, or other property, knowing the same to belong to Her Majesty or to the East India Company, shall on conviction be liable to the punishment of transportation for life or of imprisonment with hard labor for a term not exceeding fourteen years, either with or without fine, or to a fine alone, or to corporal punishment not exceeding thirty stripes with a ratan.

Punishment for unlawful possession of such property.

II. After any such proclamation shall have been issued, whoever having in his possession any such property as aforesaid, knowing it to belong to Her Majesty or to the East India Company, shall, without lawful or reasonable excuse, conceal or attempt to conceal the same, or neglect to deliver it up as required by the proclamation, shall be liable on conviction to the punishment provided by the preceding Section.

III. For offences under this Act, the offender may be tried and sentenced by a Sessions Judge or by a Special Commissioner appointed in the manner provided by Act XIV of 1857; and the sentence or judgment shall not be subject to appeal. Provided that a European British subject shall not be tried under the provisions of this Act.

IV. Nothing in this Act shall be deemed to exempt any person from any punishment to which he may be liable under Act XVI of 1857 (to make temporary provision for the trial and punishment of heinous offences in certain Districts.)

V. This Act shall continue in force for the period of two years from the time of the passing thereof.

THE following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 3rd April 1858, and referred to a Select Committee who are to report thereon after the 14th of June next:—

A Bill to make further provision for the settlement of land gained by alluvion in the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

WHEREAS, for the removal of doubts respecting the course proper to be followed in the settlement of land added by alluvial accession to estates paying Revenue to Government, it is expedient to lay down certain rules to be observed in the settlement of such land; It is enacted as follows:—

I. When land is added by alluvial accession to an estate paying Revenue to Government, if it be so agreed on between the Revenue authorities and the proprietor or proprietors, the Revenue assessed upon the alluvial land may be added to the jumma of the original estate; and in such case a new engagement shall be executed for the payment of the aggregate amount, and that amount shall be substituted in the Collector's roll for the former jumma of the original estate. If the proprietor or proprietors object to such an arrangement, or if the Revenue authorities are of opinion that a settlement of the alluvial land cannot properly be made for the same term as the existing settlement of the original estate, the alluvial land shall be assessed and settled as a separate estate with a separate jumma, subject to all the provisions respecting the rights of property therein which are contained in Section IV Regulation XI. 1825, and shall thenceforward be regarded and treated as in all respects separate from and independent of the original estate.

II. Every separate settlement of alluvial land heretofore made shall be as good and effectual for all the purposes above specified as the same would have been if made subsequently to the passing of this Act. Provided that nothing contained in this Act shall be held to affect the rights which any person may have acquired, under a judicial decision or otherwise, before the passing of this Act.

SIR,

THE Jounpore Field Force, of which I have had Command since early in December last, having recently been broken up, and incorporated with the Army under the personal Command of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief as the 4th Division, I consider it to be due to the British Officers attached to the Goorkha portion of the force, prominently to bring their names before the Right Hon'ble the Governor General.

2. I have at all times received the most hearty co-operation from Lieutenant-Colonel Wroughton, in Military charge. His tact and management of the Goorkhas have already gained for him the thanks of the Governor General in Council, and his spirited conduct at the head of the Force at the actions of Chanda, Ameerapore and Sultanpore have been cordially acknowledged by me in my Despatch regarding these battles. I beg strongly to recommend this Officer to the particular notice of Government.

3. Captain Steel, Staff Officer to the Force, is highly spoken of by Colonel Wroughton, and he has been mentioned favourably in my Despatch. Captain Steel has been present in nearly every engagement in which the Goorkhas have taken part.

4. The following Officers have been attached and have seen service with the different Goorkha Battalions, *viz.*, Captain Boileau, who was in Military charge of the Right Column, Captain Miles, the Left Column, and Lieutenant Smith, the Centre Column, and Lieutenants Clark, Gully, and Hay, attached to those Columns, also Lieutenant Hind, who has lately been appointed to the Force, and joined previous to the recent engagements.

Of every one of these Officers, Colonel Wroughton speaks in the highest terms as having afforded

him most efficient assistance, and I have much pleasure in bearing testimony to their worth.

5. Assistant Surgeons Paske, Wright, Garden, and Squire have, I have been informed by Colonel Wroughton, in every way upheld the good name of their profession by their attention to their duties.

6. In conclusion, I have to express my great obligations to the whole of these Officers, Military and Medical, for the great and cordial assistance they have always rendered on all occasions, and I beg that their services may be brought to the notice of Government.

P. S.—I here beg to add what I have omitted in the body of this Letter, that my acknowledgments are particularly due to Lieutenant Wemyss Smith, 58th Regiment N. I., attached to Goorkha Force, who, at the Battle of Sultanpore, acted as my Orderly Officer, and whose knowledge of the locality, resulting from his having been stationed there at the time of the mutiny, was of great assistance to me. Towards the close of the action, I detached him in charge of two Battalions of Goorkhas, who pursued a body of the retreating Enemy, and secured 3 Guns which they were endeavouring to withdraw.

SIR,
I HAVE the honor to report for the information of His Excellency Sir Colin Campbell, that agreeably to the orders received from Major-General Mansfield, Chief of the Staff, I marched at 12 o'clock on the night of the 22nd Instant with the Force, as per margin, in the direction of "Koorsee;" finding it however nearly impossible to proceed with the heavy Guns across the country roads in the dark, I

halted the Column a short distance from the Cantonments until morning, it was consequently nearly 4 P. M. on the 23rd before we arrived at "Koorsee." We found the Enemy in full retreat along the Fyzabad Road. Forming up the Cavalry and the Horse Artillery, I advanced, leaving the Infantry with the heavy Guns pointing towards the village. Two Guns of the advance guard under Lieutenant Hunter, had in the mean time come into action, against a party of Rebels who were making their way out of a small ghuree on our left front, for the purpose of joining the main body on the Fyzabad Road; these were soon dispersed, and as we were clear of the village I gave the order to change front to the right, by this movement our line completely covered the flank of the retreating Enemy; a few rounds from the Horse Artillery caused them to scatter, on seeing which the 1st and 2nd Punjaub Cavalry on the left of the line under the Command of Captain Samuel Brown charged most gallantly five or six times through the Rebels, cutting up about two hundred and capturing 14 Guns, besides several ammunition waggons, 2 elephants, some camels, bullocks, and quantities of baggage.

I directed Lieutenant Manderson with 2 Guns, Horse Artillery and a Squadron of the 2nd Dragoon Guards, the whole under Command of Captain Loftus, to proceed to the support of the Punjaub Cavalry, the success was complete, achieved however at the loss of two fine gallant Officers Lieutenant MacDonnell, 2nd Punjaub Cavalry, killed, and Captain Cosserrat, Commanding Detachment 1st Punjaub Cavalry, dangerously wounded.

I have to thank the following Officers for the assistance they afforded me:—

not claim the exemption or relief by reason of his whole income being less than 200 Rupees or 500 Rupees, hereinafter granted, may require, if he shall think fit, that all proceedings, in order to an assessment upon him, in respect of profits chargeable under the said schedules, or either of them, shall be had and taken, by and before the Collector and the Commissioners for special purposes of the district, (if any such shall have been appointed,) instead of by and before the Assessor, the Collector, and the Commissioners for general purposes, provided he shall deliver a notice of such request, together with the list, declaration, and statement of such profits and gains to the Collector of the district in which the same shall be chargeable, within the time to be limited by the general notice herein before directed to be given for delivery of all such lists and statements as aforesaid.

2. Thereupon the said Collector shall examine the said list and statement, and shall compute and assess the duties which, according to his judgment, shall be chargeable upon the party under the said Schedules I. or II. and shall make a certificate of such assessment, and deliver the same, together with the said list, declaration, and statement to the Commissioners for special purposes, who shall examine the same, and make, or sign,

5. The decision and assessment of the Commissioners for special purposes upon such appeal shall be final and conclusive in the matter, subject only to such surcharge as is in the 61st Section provided.

6. Any application to surcharge under that Section in such cases shall be made to, and shall be heard, and determined by the Commissioners for special purposes.

7. Every person desirous of compounding for the said duties under Schedules I. and II., or either of these schedules, as herein-after mentioned, in the first, second, or third years of this Act, in order to an assessment of the said duties being made under the provisions of the Act, shall, at any time after he shall have delivered the list and statement of his profits under the said schedules, or either of them, as required by the said Act, and before he shall have been assessed under the said schedules, or either of these, for such years, deliver to the Assessor of the district a notice signed by such person

When such assessment shall have been made by the Commissioners for general purposes, or by the Commissioners for special purposes, as the case may be, (any appeal allowed by this Act having been first determined,) it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, by whom the said assessment shall have been made, to contract and agree with such person for a composition for the said duties on the terms hereinafter mentioned, for a period of not exceeding five and not less than three years, limited for the continuance of this Act; provided such person shall enter into, and sign a contract of compositions within the space of one calendar month next after the making of such assessment shall have been notified to him, and his appeal against the same (if any) shall have been determined.

9. The terms of such composition shall be the payment in each and every year of the said term of the amount of the said assessment so made as aforesaid, together with an addition thereto at and after the rate of 1 Rupee for every 20 Rupees of the sum assessed as aforesaid, which addition shall be made by the said Commissioners to the said assessments so made for the first year of the said term.

10. In each subsequent year thereof, the assessment of the said duties under Schedule II., upon the person who shall have entered into such contract of composition, shall be made by the Commissioners in a sum equal to the aggregate amount of the said first year's assessment, with the said additional rate thereon; and it shall not be necessary for such person to deliver any further list, declaration, or statement of profits

9. Such portion of the said duties on offices or employments of profit, or on annuities, pensions, or stipends as are charged with any sum, money payable to any other person,

The several Commissioners authorized to act in the execution of this Act in relation to the duties on offices or employments of profit, and on pensions or stipends, as soon after their appointment respectively as conveniently can be done in their respective departments, shall meet and take the oaths hereby prescribed in that behalf, and shall have power to elect and appoint an Assessor, and if they shall deem it necessary, Assessors for each separate department with the cognizance of the said Commissioners.

wages, perquisites, and profits of the office exercised by him, which returns such officer or person shall be obliged to make under the penalties contained in this Act, for not making other returns hereby required, and papers in their respective offices.

23. The said Assessors shall, from the documents and papers in their respective offices, as well as from such lists and accounts as aforesaid, make their assessment upon the persons holding such offices, or entitled unto such pensions respectively, according to the annual value thereof, and shall, in like manner as is before directed with respect to Assessors for any district, bring in their said assessments to the respective Commissioners for their allowance.

24. The said Commissioners, if satisfied with the said assessment, shall allow and set their hands to the same, and if not satisfied therewith, shall correct and alter the same, and shall, to that end, possess and exercise all the powers and authorities herein conferred upon the said Commissioners for general purposes, so far as the same are applicable to an assessment of the said duties under Schedule IV, and shall finally allow and set their hands to the said assessments when so altered and corrected as aforesaid.

25. The said assessments, when so allowed and signed as aforesaid, shall be in force for one year, commencing and payable at the like periods as the assessments in districts are made payable.

26. The said respective Commissioners, for the duties on offices shall cause the like duplicates to be made of the said assessments and delivered to Collectors, with like warrants to collect

27. The said officers for collection and receipt of the said duties on offices, shall have the like authority to demand and levy the said duties as is herein given, to the collecting officer of any district.

Provided always, that in all cases where the duties on any salaries, fees, wages, perquisites, or profits of any office shall be detained and stopped out of the same, or out of any monies which shall be paid thereupon, the respective Commissioners shall cause the like duplicates to be delivered to the proper officers in the respective offices who shall keep true accounts of all monies stopped and detained under the authority of this Act, and account for, and pay away the same as directed in of this Act.

29. Where the duties hereby chargeable upon any office or employment of profit, cannot be detained and stopped according to the provisions of this rule, or the amount of such duties shall have been paid over to the person holding or exercising the said office or employment, and such person shall refuse or neglect to pay the sum of money charged upon him, the Commissioners for raising the duties on the said offices shall and may certify in writing such neglect or refusal, and the sum payable by virtue of this Act.

30. When the last mentioned Commissioners shall be distinct from the Commissioners for general purposes, such certificate shall be addressed to the Commissioners for general purposes, and upon the receipt of such certificate, or, in case the Commissioners for raising the duties on the

Appeals from Assessment.

XCIV. (1.) If any person charged with the said duties under any such assessment shall be dissatisfied therewith and shall, within days after the proclamation of the said assessment in the district, town, village, or tract in which he shall reside at the time of the said assessment, (or in case of his being prevented from appealing within the time by sickness or any other excuse that shall appear reasonable to the said Collector, within such further time as the said Collector shall allow for that purpose,) satisfy the said Collector that he ought to be allowed to appeal from the said assessment, (in which case the Collector shall certify that, to his judgment, the said person ought to be allowed to appeal as aforesaid,) he shall be at liberty, within the time aforesaid, to appeal from the said assessment.

Persons dissatisfied may appeal within days on satisfying Collector that they have *prima facie* ground of appeal.

Persons prevented from appealing by sickness or otherwise shall be allowed extended time to appeal.

XCV. 1. The proceedings upon any such appeal shall be conducted according to the provision of Part IV of this Act, so far as the same are applicable, according to any regulations that may be passed in that behalf under Section C. of this Act.

2. The persons so appealing shall return all such lists, statements, and declarations, and shall do all such acts and things, and shall be subject to the said several provisions in the said Part IV, provided in regard to persons appealing, except so far as the same may be modified or varied by any special provisions contained in any such regulations, in which case the provisions of such regulations shall be observed.

XCVI. XCVIII. 1. In any such case, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners to make a new distribution and apportionment, according to the best of their judgment, of the entire and aggregate sum assessed by the said punchayet or persons as aforesaid, among all the persons assessed by them, under the said order of Government, and to vary and increase the amount of assessment upon each of the said persons so assessed as aforesaid.

Commissioners to redistribute amount struck off from aggregate assessment among all the persons assessed, giving opportunity to persons re-assessed to be heard.

2. Before the said Commissioner shall finally increase the assessment upon any person who shall not have appealed to them, they shall cause notice to be given to such person to shew cause before them why his assessment shall not be increased; and such person shall be entitled to be heard before the said Commissioners, in support of the said assessment, in the same manner and subject to the same regulations as persons appealing from assessments are entitled to be heard.

Members of punchayets may attend before the Commissioners and support their assessment when appealed from.

C. 1. It shall be lawful for the local Government, with the consent of the Governor General in Council in that behalf, first had and obtained, from time to time, to make such regulations as it may deem necessary for the following purposes, that is:—

Local Government to make regulations for the execution of this part of the Act, with the sanction of the Governor General in Council.

1st.—For determining the mode of constituting the punchayet or other body of persons employed to make such assessments, and of appointing and removing the persons constituting the same, and of filling up vacancies among such persons.

2nd.—For regulating the proceedings of any punchayet, or of any persons who may be employed to make assessment under the tenth part of this Act, and of revising and correcting the same.

3rd.—For enabling the said punchayet or persons making such assessment as aforesaid, when, and if they shall make an aggregate assessment on the whole of the persons chargeable under such assessment, to duly apportion the aggregate sum

CII. Upon any assessment being made under Part XI of this Act, the several provisions of this Act relating to the recovery of the duties aforesaid, and the remedies in respect thereof, and the penalties and forfeiture for any refusal or

Sums assessed shall be paid under the general provisions of this Act, except where the manner of payment is varied or modified by the order of Government.

The general remedies and provisions of this Act shall apply to persons assessed under Part XI.

PART XII.

Exemptions and Deductions.

CIII. Any person who shall be charged or chargeable to any of the duties granted by this Act, either by assessment, or by way of deduction from any rent, annuity, interest, or other annual payment to which he may be entitled, or shall have paid the same, either by deduction or otherwise, and who shall prove before the Commissioners for general purposes, in the manner hereinafter mentioned, that the aggregate annual amount of his income, estimated according to the several rules and directions of this Act, is less than Rupees 200, shall be exempted from the said duties, and shall be entitled to be re-paid the amount of all deductions or payments on account thereof, in the manner hereinafter directed, except so much of such duties as the person claiming such exemption shall or may be entitled to charge against any other person, or to deduct or retain from, or out of any payment to which such claimant may be or become liable.

CIV. Any person who shall be charged or chargeable as aforesaid to any of the duties granted by this Act, or shall have paid the same either by deduction or otherwise, and who shall prove before the said Commissioners, in the manner hereinafter prescribed, that his total income from every source, although amounting to 200 Rupees or upwards, is less than 500 Rupees for the year of the assessment of his profits or gains, shall be exempted and relieved from the whole of the duty of 1

Exemption of persons whose income is less than 200 Rupees yearly.

Exemption of persons from the duty of 1 per cent. from excess above 2 per cent., or 3 per cent. duty, whose income is less than 500 Rupees annually.

CV. 1. The exemption and relief in the said Sections respectively mentioned shall be claimed and proved, and all proceedings thereupon shall be had (except in the case provided for in Section CXIV of this Act,) before the Collectors and Commissioners for general purposes in the district where the claimants shall reside (whether such claimant shall be personally charged in such district or not).

2. Such exemption shall be proved, and such proceedings shall thereupon be had pursuant to and under the powers and provisions by which the duties in Schedule II are herein directed to be ascertained and charged, and subject to the rules and directions hereinafter contained.

CVI. Every person claiming to be entitled to such exemption or relief as aforesaid shall, within the time to be limited, as herein before directed for delivering in the lists, declarations and statements required by this Act, or within such further time as the Collector or Commissioners respectively shall, for special cause assigned, allow, deliver, or cause to be delivered, to the Assessor of the district where such claimant shall reside, a notice of his claim for such exemption, together with a declaration and state-

Persons entitled to such exemptions shall deliver to the Assessor a statement, stating the source of income.

Joint tenants, &c. may severally claim abatements, exemptions.

As the object which the Government has in view in calling in the Treasury Bills which are now in circulation appears to be greatly misunderstood, and as an apprehension appears to exist that it is intended as an indirect mode of creating new loans, the Government deems it needful to issue the following explanation.

On the 20th of April 1859, under Notification, No. 28, a five-and-a-half per cent. loan was opened, limited to five crores, upon certain conditions: And it was understood that the Government would open no new loan before the first of May 1860, and which understanding has been strictly adhered to. That loan was closed in the ordinary way on the 14th of February last. But there still remained open the issue of Treasury Bills in the two forms under the Notification, No. 34, of the 30th of April 1859, of indefinite duration and amount; and which, as long as such an issue lasted, acted as a continual and unlimited means of borrowing on the part of the Government, and of absorbing money from the market. It was the desire of the Government, after the closing of the five-and-a-half per cent. loan, also to close all other means by which the Treasury could borrow money, and therefore by Notification, No. 33, dated the 27th ultimo, notice was given that money would cease to be received for the purchase of Treasury Bills, and that this means of creating debt would be closed.

But it became necessary to consider how to deal with the amount of bills in circulation, which thus constituted a portion of the public debt, and it was decided that the amount being very small, only about 23 lakhs in this Presidency, and 59 lakhs for all other parts of India, including all the different classes of Treasury Bills; *i. e.* 3 pie bills, and 2½ pie bills Nos. 1 and 2; the owners should have the choice of converting them into a permanent stock, or of receiving their money as the bills fell due. An option is given to them to take *four per cent.*, *five per cent.*, or *five-and-a-half per cent.* stock, subject to the same terms as regards the time and conditions of repayment, as applied to those several stocks, which have already been closed; but at such a price as the Government shall fix.

It must be plain that by this option given to the present holders of Treasury Bills, the Government does not add to its entire debt or abstract any money from the market: while, by the arrangement, the Government closes the Treasury against any further borrowing. All that is now done is to convert a debt, for payment of which the Government might be called upon, at short and uncertain times, into one of a more fixed and permanent character, as certainty is essential to the economical management of the public finances; such conversion, however, to take place entirely at the option of the holders, and provided they are willing to give such terms as the Government think fair to the public: otherwise they will be paid off in cash.

So far therefore from this operation being intended as a new mode of indirectly raising loans, it is adopted as a plan of effectually closing all the existing means open to the Treasury of borrowing money; which will be made more apparent when it is stated that the Government has no intention of coming upon the Indian Money Market for loans of any kind whatever, whether in the shape of Treasury Bills, or in any other form, during the current financial year ending the 30th of April 1861.

Resolution.—With reference to the Financial Resolution of the 7th April, regarding the new system of Estimate, Budget, Accounts and Audit, it is necessary to consider how the details of the several measures involved therein may be practically carried out, and how the principles prevailing in England may be adopted to the existing circumstances of Departments in India. A Committee will, therefore, be appointed, consisting of the following gentlemen, to consider the above points generally, viz:—

Mr. C. H. Lushington.

Hon'ble E. Drummond.

Mr. R. Temple.

In considering the main points, the Committee will enter into such details as they may find necessary. Among the matters for consideration, will be the manner in which the specific sums sanctioned in the budget should be placed at the credit of the various expending Departments; the mode in which such expenditure should be accounted for to the local Accountants; the mode in which the local Accountants

should account to the Audit Department in Calcutta; the manner in which the audit should be constituted, and the detailed rules by which it should be guided in the execution of its functions.

The consideration of the Committee will be primarily directed to all Departments and in all Presidencies save those immediately pertaining to the Military Service. But the Committee will observe whatever resolution may be passed relative to the Military Finance Department, the Committee's attention will be specially given to all Civil Departments, to the Postal, Telegraphs and Marine Departments, &c. And as there will be but one Audit for each Department, namely, that conducted by the Audit Department in Calcutta, it will be necessary that the future duties and designation of the Officer now called Civil Auditor under each local Government, be considered.

The Committee will proceed with their enquiries as soon as practicable, communicating their progress at short intervals to the Financial branch of the Supreme Government, and will, at the close, submit a report on the detailed proposals they may make.

POSTAGE ON LETTERS, NEWSPAPERS,, &c.

A letter once posted cannot be recalled by the sender, under any circumstances.

Postage is chargeable on letters and newspapers according to weight, and irrespective of distance.

Prepayment of postage by stamps (money is not received) on letters is optional; but on unpaid letters double postage is charged.

Letters insufficiently stamped will be charged with double the amount less paid by stamps.

REGISTERED LETTERS.

Letters, including register fee, must be prepaid by stamps.

Postage must be paid immediately on demand. If the party refuses to pay, his property is liable to be seized and sold, and his letter, &c., detained in the Post Office until he does pay.

Letters addressed to different parties cannot be enclosed in one cover, and parties collecting, conveying and delivering letters are liable to a heavy penalty.

Newspapers may be sent paid or bearing; no extra postage is charged on unpaid newspapers.

If more than one newspaper is enclosed under one cover, it is chargeable with letter postage.

Newspapers must not contain any writing except the name and address of the addressee and sender, otherwise they will be charged with letter postage. Prices Current must have the contents correctly specified on the cover, with the signature in full of the sender.

Pamphlets and other printed or engraved papers and proof-sheets are chargeable with the same rates of postage and subject to the same conditions as newspapers if sent by letter post. Prepayment optional.

Newspapers need not be sent through the Post Office.

When the letter and Bhangy Mails are conveyed in one carriage, it is unlawful, under Section XVI., to enclose even one letter or newspaper, under the same penalty.

Parcels conveyed by sea are liable to Ship postage of eight annas for every hundred tolas or fractions thereof, in addition to Inland postage.

No parcel is to exceed 600 tolas in weight, or three feet in length, or one foot in breadth, or one foot in depth, or two thousand five hundred and ninety-two cubic inches in bulk.

Every parcel must be securely packed in cloth, wax-cloth, or tin, with seals affixed, bearing some device, but not that of a current coin. The seals must be fixed along the line of sewing, at intervals not exceeding three inches.

Parcels once posted cannot be recalled by the senders.

Parcels cannot be posted on Sundays, and on week days must be posted between 10 A. M. and 4 P. M.

Boards on which these lists are pasted, have been hung up at the Post Office gate, the Fort, the Railway Station and the Hotels. They will be regularly changed once a week, and it is requested that any information that can be given, such as may assist in discovering the parties for whom the letters are meant may be written on the margin of the list.

The mails by it are made up several days later than those by the former, but the postage is heavier. The Southampton and Marseilles despatches join at Suez, and reach India together.

Letters and Newspapers can be forwarded by the Bombay Mails via Marseilles to any part of India, if addressed "via Bombay," and in nearly all cases this will be found the most expeditious route.

The Officiating Civil Auditor, North Western Provinces, has the honor to publish, for general information, the accompanying Resolutions of the Government of India, in the Financial Department, dated respectively the 26th August 1859, and 5th March 1860, regarding acting allowances to Uncovenanted Servants, in cases in which appointments are by classes.

2.—A scale is subjoined, shewing the average amount of salary of such appointments in the North Western Provinces, and the acting allowance to which an Officer will be entitled, under the orders quoted above, in addition to a moiety of his substantive pay, if in Government employ.

3.—It is hereby notified that the instructions of Government will be carried into effect from 1st May 1860.

Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India, in the Financial Department, dated 26th August 1859.

READ again the following papers :—

Financial Consultation, dated 25th March 1859, No. 19.

Read the undermentioned papers relative to the acting allowances of Patrols, Assistant Patrols, and Extra Assistants, in the territories subordinate to the Punjab :—

Foreign Extract, No. 4752, dated 4th August 1859, with 5 enclosures.

Do. No. 4785, dated 5th idem.

OBSERVATION.—Under orders of the 25th March last, the Uncovenanted Service Absentee Rules were applied to the case of Mr. Blewitt, of the Customs Department, Delhi, and he was allowed to draw half the salary of his substantive appointment as a Patrol, in addition to half the pay of the place in which he acted, viz., Collector of Customs, Delhi.

2. The Punjab Government now submits for consideration a question which has arisen in respect of the allowances to be passed to Mr. Roberts, an Assistant Patrol of the 2nd grade, who acted for Mr. Blewitt, who is a Patrol of the 1st grade.

3. The Commissioner of Customs claims for Mr. Roberts (with reference to the decision of this Government in Mr. Blewitt's case) half of his own actual salary and half of the actual salary of Mr. Blewitt. But the Civil Auditor would allow Mr. Roberts half of his own salary and half of the salary attached to the lowest grade of Patrols, on the ground that the appointments of Patrols and Assistant Patrols are by classes, the salaries drawn by the incumbents being personal and not assigned to appointments.

4. The Auditor, however, suggests that the rule which allows Covenanted Officers in the Civil Department, deputation allowance, calculated on the average rate of salary of the class of appointments officiated in, instead of on the salary of the lowest grade thereof, should be extended to the Customs Department in the Delhi Territory and also in the Punjab.

5. The Lieutenant Governor of the Punjab recommends the Auditor's proposal for sanction, with the condition that in no case is the extra salary which the Officiating Officer will draw under the proposed rule to exceed the salary of the lowest grade of Patrol in the Department concerned, whether it be the Customs Department of the Delhi Territory, or the Salt Department of the Punjab.

6. The Lieutenant Governor further recommends that the allowances of Officers acting for extra Assistants be regulated on the same principle; and that any person acting for an extra Assistant be allowed a salary of Rs. 208-5-4 per mensem, being half of the average salary of the class, or, if he be already in the employ of Government, that he be allowed half of his own salary and a deputation allowance of Rs. 208-5-4, provided that in no case is the entire salary of the acting Officer to exceed the full salary of the lowest grade of extra Assistant.

RESOLUTION.—Referring to these proposals, the Governor General in Council remarks, that in Sec. 5 of the Covenanted Civil Absentee Rules, it is provided that in the Punjab, Nagpore, and other places, where appointments are by classes, the amount of deputation allowance shall be calculated not upon the salary of the individual officer holding the substantive appointment, in which the officer deputed may be temporarily officiating, but on the average rate of salary attached to the particular class to which the appointment may belong.

2. The provisions of this rule, the Governor General in Council is pleased, on the suggestion of the Punjab Civil Auditor, to extend to Uncovenanted Servants in cases in which appointments are by classes, and he further directs that Mr. Roberts' allowances for the period during which he officiated for Mr. Blewitt, be regulated accordingly. His Excellency in Council does not consider it necessary to make the grant of the allowances subject to the condition proposed by the Lieutenant Governor.

ORDER.—Ordered that a copy of the foregoing Resolution be sent, with reference to the extracts before adverted to, to the Foreign Department, for communication to the Government of the Punjab, and that the original papers received from that Department, be returned.

Ordered further, that a transcript of the Resolution be sent to the Civil Auditors, Fort William, Madras, Bombay, North Western Provinces, and the Punjab, for information.

SIR,

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 82, dated 7th ultimo, pointing out a supposed inconsistency between paragraph 2 of the Resolution passed in this Department on the 26th August 1859, No. 7573, and the remark of the Civil Auditor, Fort William, in paragraph 4 of his letter noted in the margin—(a remark which was generally approved by this Government in the Financial Order, dated 23rd December 1859, No. 11039.)

Letter from Officiating Civil Auditor, Fort William, to the address of this Department, No. 3999, dated 29th November 1859.

2. You also apprehend that the waiving of the condition proposed by the Lieutenant Governor Punjab, would lead to the anomaly illustrated in the case of a Tehseeldar appointed to officiate as extra Assistant, and you are further doubtful about the propriety of admitting the full amount of officiating allowance, claimable under the Resolution of 26th August.

3. In reply, I am directed to intimate that you are mistaken in supposing that the remark of the Civil Auditor, Fort William, in the 4th paragraph of his report, which was approved by this Government, is at variance with the concluding part of the Financial Resolution of 26th August 1859.

4. That Resolution settled the principle which should regulate the allowances of an Uncovenanted servant, acting for another *Uncovenanted* servant, where the appointments were by classes; whereas the 4th paragraph of the Bengal Auditor's report explains the practice observed in his Office in respect to the allowances of an Uncovenanted servant officiating for a *Covenanted* Civilian under similar circumstances, and it was to the latter class of cases that the condition "that the aggregate of the acting incumbent's substantive pay and his deputation allowance shall not exceed the emoluments of the office he temporarily holds," is to be held applicable.

5. This condition, moreover, is not the same as that proposed by the Lieutenant Governor, who suggested that the aggregate should not exceed the salary of the *lowest grade* of the appointments concerned. The condition mentioned by the Auditor was that the aggregate should not exceed the salary of the *acting appointment* itself, of whatever grade it might happen to be.

6. Neither does the case cited by you appear to be so anomalous as stated in your letter. It does not follow that a Tehseeldar permanently appointed to an extra Assistantship, who would in the first instance draw a salary of no more than 250 Rupees (the salary of the last grade of extra Assistants,) ought on that account to have his allowances, when acting temporarily in a superior grade, restricted to that sum. He ought on the contrary rather to be allowed the amount to which he would be entitled under the ordinary bearing of the Uncovenanted Rules, viz., half the salary of his substantive appointment and half the average salary of the particular description of appointment in which he is acting. And as, under the operation of the Financial Resolution of the 26th August 1859, it is not likely that the State will, in the long run, be subjected to extra expense, (the loss in one case being compensated by the gain in another) I am directed to request that you will conform to the instructions of the 26th August 1859.

7. The President in Council further desires that you will refrain from referring imaginary cases for the decision of Government, and remarks that when cases actually occur, the decision of Government will be passed on the merits of each case.

2. A, an Extra Assistant of the 3rd grade, salary 250 Rs. per month, proceeds on sick leave forfeiting the half of his salary. B, a Tehseeldar drawing 200 Rs. monthly is appointed to act for him. By the above orders, B is entitled to his entire pay and to a deputation allowance of Rs. 83-5-4 per mensem, or to Rs. 33-5-4 more than he would draw if permanently appointed an extra Assistant. C, a person not in the employ of Government, is nominated the *locum tenens* of B. Is he under the spirit of Section XXV. to receive 100 Rs. being 50 per cent. of B's salary? By this arrangement the State save the half of A's salary Rs. 125, and pay to B and C Rs. 183-5-4, thus sustaining a loss of Rs. 58-5-4 monthly. If the absentee, however, were of the 1st or 2nd grade, the difference would be in favor of Government by Rs. 116-10-8 and 16-10-8, respectively.

3. In the event of a Serishtadar or Peshkar acting for B, and another on the Establishment put in the acting officer's place and so on; are all the officiating incumbents to draw their respective salaries in full, and deputation allowance computed according to Section XXV.? If so, how will they be paid? there being no Fund to meet the loss entailed upon Government.

4. A person holding no situation and nominated to officiate as an extra Assistant, will of course under the above orders draw Rs. 208-5-4 monthly.

Sir,

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of an original letter to your address from the Civil Auditor, Punjab, forwarded under your docket No. 9660, dated the 23rd instant, for my report on certain points on which the Punjab Civil Auditor is doubtful, about the operation of the Financial Ruling of 26th August last.

2. In reply, I beg to state for the information of the Hon'ble the President in Council, that the difficulty started by the Punjab Civil Auditor, about the adjustment of the deputation allowance of a Tehseeldar or any other ministerial officer officiating for an extra Assistant or Assistant Commissioner, with reference to the Financial Ruling above cited, would appear to be insuperable if this Rule were considered to have superseded the previous Rules of 29th April 1859, paragraph 3 of which prescribes that an Uncovenanted Officer acting for another of the same service, or a Military officer acting for another Military officer, shall be governed by the Rules of the respective services to which he belongs.

3. The Rules of 29th April, however, have been laid down experimentally for a year, and the year of experiment has not yet expired. Besides, the Rules of 26th August evidently carry out the principle involved in the above Ruling, directing, as they do, how this same principle would operate with reference to Clause 4, Section XXV. of the Civil Absentee Rules. It is plainly the intention of Government in extending the provisions of the above Clause to the Uncovenanted Service that the same should apply to a member of this service when officiating for a Covenanted Civilian who holds one of the class-appointments; but an Uncovenanted Officer acting for another of the same service will as usual draw the moities of the salary of the permanent and acting appointment whether one or other, or both of them be class-appointments or otherwise. There is therefore no apprehension of the operation of the Ruling of the 26th August last, resulting in loss to Government.

4. An Uncovenanted Officer acting for a Covenanted Civilian who holds a class-appointment is allowed under the combined operation of the Rules of 29th April and 26th August, a deputation allowance calculated at 20 per cent. on the mean salary attached to the particular class to which the appointment officiated in may belong, keeping in view the important fact that the aggregate of the acting incumbent's substantive pay and his deputation allowance does not exceed the emoluments of the office he temporarily holds.

5. An Uncovenanted acting for a Covenanted Assistant Commissioner or Deputy Commissioner, but holding no permanent situation, is not entitled, as is supposed by the Punjab Civil Auditor, to deputation allowance at 50 per cent; nor is it to be considered that the deputation allowance of an Uncovenanted servant under the Rules of 29th April 1859, should never fall short of 200 Rupees as in the case of Covenanted Civilians, for reasons more fully detailed in my communication to your address, dated 18th instant, paragraph 2.

6. The above is the construction put by this Office on the Rules of 29th April and 26th August last and all cases whether appertaining to Oude, Nagpore or the Lower Provinces, are alike disposed of in conformity with this reading of the Rules.

7. The original letter of the Civil Auditor, Punjab, is herewith returned.

SIR,

Finl. Dept. I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 832, dated 10th ultimo, soliciting, with reference to the Resolution passed in this Department on the 26th August last, further instructions with regard to the allowances to be drawn by parties who may be temporarily filling the posts of those appointed to act as extra Assistants.

2. In reply, I am desired to annex copy of a report from the Officiating Civil Auditor, Fort William, No. 3999, dated the 29th ultimo, and to state that the Hon'ble the President in Council agrees in the opinion therein expressed by the Auditor. His Honor remarks that it was intended by extending Clause 4 (or more properly Clause 6) of Section 25 of the Covenanted Civil Rules to the Uncovenanted Service, that where appointments are by classes, the deputation allowance should be calculated on the *average* rate of the salaries of the particular sort of appointments to which the appointment alluded to in your letter might belong; but it was never contemplated to alter the system under which deputation allowance to Uncovenanted servants is allotted.

3. For instance, in the case cited by you, B. the acting officer will not be entitled to the full salary of his permanent appointment *plus* deputation allowance at 20 per cent. on the salary of the place in which he acts, but to a moiety of his own salary in addition to the moiety (Rs. 208-5-4) of the *average* monthly salary of Extra Assistants, and so on in the cases of the other acting officers.

From C. E. CHAPMAN, Esq., Civil Auditor, Punjab, to C. H. LUSHINGTON, Esq., Financial Secretary to the Government of India, Fort William, No. 82, dated Lahore, 7th February 1860.

SIR,

I have the honor to acknowledge your letter No. 11039 of the 23rd December, on the subject of the construction of paragraph 2 of the Government Resolution of the 26th August 1859, the purport of which I had misapprehended.

2. In paragraph 4 of his letter to your address, the Officiating Civil Auditor, Fort William says—“Keeping in view the important fact that the aggregate of the acting incumbent's substantive pay and his deputation allowance does not exceed the emoluments of the office he temporarily holds.” This, if applicable to the case I referred, would seem to be at variance with part of paragraph 2 of the Resolution of the 26th August, *viz.*,—“His Excellency in Council does not consider it necessary to make the grant of the allowance subject to the condition proposed by the Lieutenant Governor;” that condition having been, that in no case is the extra salary which the officiating officer draws, to exceed that of the lowest grade.

3. The waiving of this condition leads to an anomaly which I think it right to point out before passing the full salary which an officiating incumbent can claim under the Resolution of the 26th August. For example, under it a Tehseeldar appointed to officiate for an extra Assistant draws 100 (half his substantive salary) *plus* 208-5-4 (the moiety of the average pay of the 3 classes of extra Assistants) total 308-5-4, whereas if permanently appointed an extra Assistant, he would only draw 250-0-0, the salary of the lowest grade.

4. I may be mistaken in assuming that the principle asserted by the Officiating Civil Auditor, Fort William, in paragraph 4, is applied by him in cases of this nature; but as the Hon'ble the President in Council has agreed generally in the opinion expressed by the Auditor in his letter, and as the principle has hitherto been invariably acted on in my office, I feel doubtful about the propriety of admitting the full amount of officiating allowance claimable under the Resolution of the 26th August, and therefore request you will inform me whether it will be right to do so.

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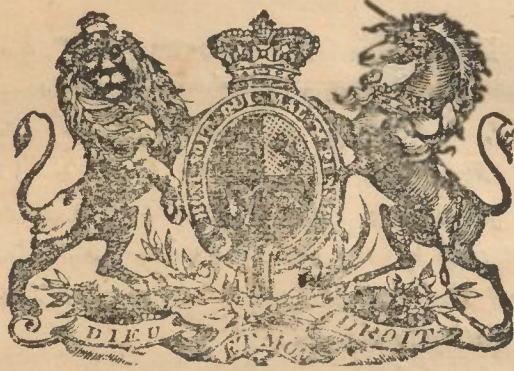

ACT No. XIII. OF 1860.

I. Section 8 of Regulation II. 1803 of the Bengal Code, (*enacting a rule for the guidance of the Zillah Court of Furruckabad, with reference to complaints preferred against any of the dependants of the Nawab of Furruckabad,*) and Act XII. of 1836, (*relating to the execution by the said Court of certain decrees passed by the Nawab under the provisions of the said Regulation*) are hereby repealed.

ACT No. XIV. OF 1860.

An Act to provide for the execution of process within the premises occupied by His Majesty the king of Oude.

Whereas it is expedient to make provision for the execution of process within the premises occupied by His Majesty the king of Oude; It is enacted as follows:—

I When any process, issued by any Civil Court, Collector, or other Revenue Officer, in Her Majesty's East Indian territories, is required to be served or executed within the premises occupied by the king of Oude, such process shall be transmitted to the officer, appointed to be Agent with His Majesty on the part

II. When any process issued by any Execution of criminal process. Criminal Court, Justice of the Peace, Magistrate, or Officer, exercising the powers or any of the powers of a Magistrate in Her Majesty's East Indian territories, is required to be served or executed within the premises occupied by the king of Oude, such process may, at the discretion of the Court or officer issuing the same, be transmitted to the officer, who shall have been appointed Agent with His Majesty on the part of the British Government, and in such case such officer shall cause such process to be served or executed according to the exigency thereof, and shall return the same with a certificate of what shall have been done thereon.

III. Every certificate returned by Proof of execution. the Agent with his Majesty under this Act, shall in all cases be admitted as *prima facie* proof of the truth of the matter stated therein.

IV. It shall be lawful for the Governor General in Council to define, for the purposes of this Act, by notification in the *Calcutta Gazette*, the limits of the premises occupied by the king of Oude, and from time to time, in like manner, to alter such limits.

ACT No. XVII. of 1860.

An Act to repeal Act V. of 1858, (for the punishment of certain offenders who have escaped from jail, and of persons who shall knowingly harbour such offenders), and to make certain provisions in lieu thereof.

Whereas it is expedient to repeal Act V. of 1858, (for the punishment of certain offenders who have escaped from jail, and of persons who shall knowingly harbour such offenders), and to make certain provisions in lieu thereof; It is enacted as follows:—

I. Act of 1858 is repealed except as to any sentences passed under that Act.

II. It shall be competent to the Executive Government of any Presidency or place to declare, by an order, as regards any or all of the districts under such Government, the time within which the persons, who, within such district or districts, shall between the 1st of May 1857 and the time so declared, have escaped from jail or other lawful custody, whilst detained under sentence of imprisonment for any of the crimes hereinafter mentioned, could and ought to have surrendered themselves to a Magistrate or Police Officer; and no such person who shall have so surrendered himself within the period fixed as aforesaid, shall be liable to be prosecuted under this Act.

III. Every person who, whilst detained as aforesaid, shall have escaped from jail or other lawful custody, during the period mentioned in the last preceding Section, and who shall not have surrendered himself within the time declared by the Executive Government as aforesaid, may be sentenced to transportation for life, or for any shorter period not being less than five years or

Act V. of 1858, shall, before the passing of this Act, have been remanded to jail under the order of a Magistrate to undergo the portion of his sentence remaining unexpired at the date of his escape from jail or other lawful custody, such person shall not be liable to be prosecuted under this Act.

VI. The following are the crimes referred to in Section II., namely, rebellion, mutiny, desertion, murder, attempts to murder, thuggee, dacoity, robbery, belonging or having belonged to a gang of thugs, or to a gang of dacoits, or to a wandering gang, associated for the purposes of theft or robbery.

VII. Whoever shall knowingly harbour or conceal, or assist in harbouring or concealing, any

CXVI. No person shall be chargeable to the said duties in respect of any property, real or personal, or vested in, or held in, trust for the Government, or the Secretary of State for India in Council, for public purposes—and all such property shall be wholly exempted from the said duties.

CXVII. All Non-Commissioned officers and Privates of Her Majesty's forces, or of Her Majesty's Indian Military forces, (or of any Police force,) and all petty officers not being warrant officers, and private sailors of Her Majesty's Navy, or of Her Majesty's Indian Naval forces, or in the employment of the Government of India, in the Marine Department, shall be wholly exempted from the said duties in respect of any pay or allowance that they may receive from Her Majesty, or from the Government, or from any public revenue.

CXVIII. It shall be lawful for the local Governments of any Presidency, Lieutenant Governorship, or Province, (subject

to the approval of the Governor General of India in Council,) upon the representation of the Chief Civil officer or the chief revenue officer in any division or district in such Presidency, Lieutenant Governorship, or Province, that any property, moveable or immovable, in such division or district, solely employed for or dedicated to charitable purposes or public religious purposes, or that any person or class of persons in respect of any such property ought to be wholly or partially exempted from the said duties, to order that such property, or such person, or such class of persons in respect of such property, shall be wholly or partially exempted from the said duties; and to make such orders as

may be necessary for securing and carrying into effect such exemption, and thereupon the property mentioned in the said order, and the person or class of persons mentioned in the said order, in respect of such property, shall be exempted and relieved from the said duties, wholly or in part, to the extent, and according to the operation of such order.

CXIX. 1. Any person who shall have made insurance on his life, or on the life of his wife, or shall have contracted for any deferred annuity on his own life, or

on the life of his wife, in or with any Insurance Company, duly registered under any Act of the Imperial Parliament, or under any Act of the Governor General of India in Council, or authorized by law to carry on business without registration, and any person who shall be liable to the payment of an annual sum, or to have an annual sum deducted from his salary or stipend, in order to secure a deferred annuity to himself or to his widow, or a provision to his children after his death, shall be entitled to deduct the amount of the annual premium paid by him for such insurance or contract, or the annual sum paid by him, or deducted from his salary or stipend as aforesaid, from any income or profits, in respect of which he shall be liable to be assessed under any of the schedules of this Act, excepting Schedule III; or to have any assessment which may be made upon him under any of the said schedules, except Schedule III, reduced or abated by the deduction of the amount of the said annual premium or sum from the amount of the profits or income on which such assessment has been made.

2. Or if such person shall be assessed to duties under any of the schedules contained in this Act, and shall have paid such assessment, or shall have paid or been charged with any of the said duties

All Government property exempted.

Non-Commissioned officers, Privates of Army, Navy, and Marine exempted.

Persons who have made insurance or contracted for a deferred annuity on the lives of themselves or wives, to be allowed an abatement of duty in respect of the annual premiums or sums paid.

Power to exempt property used for charitable purposes or public religious purposes.

by deduction or otherwise, such person, on claim made to the Commissioners for special purposes of the district, or, when no such Commissioners shall have been appointed, to the Commissioners for general purposes, and on production to them of the receipt for such annual payment or sums, and on proof of the facts to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners, shall be entitled to have repaid to him such portion of the said duties paid by such person as the amount of the said annual premium or sum bears to the whole amount of his profits and gains on which he shall be chargeable under all or any of the schedules of this Act.

3. Provided always, that no such abatement, allowances, or re-payment as aforesaid, shall be made in respect of any such annual premium or sum beyond one-sixth part of the whole amount of the profits and income of such person so chargeable as aforesaid, nor shall any such deduction or abatement entitle any such person to claim exemption or relief from duty, on the ground of his profits or income being thereby reduced below 200 Rupees, or 500 Rupees, as the case may be.

Relief from double Assessments.

CXX. 1. Whenever any person shall have been assessed to any of the duties granted by this Act, whether charged on him on his own account, or in any of the characters hereinafter described on the behalf of any other person, and shall, by any error or mistake, be again assessed for the same cause and on the same account, and for the same year, it shall be lawful for him to apply to the Commissioners for general purposes, acting for the division or place for which he shall have been so assessed, for the purpose of being relieved from such double assessment, and the said Commissioners, on due proof thereof to their satisfaction, shall cause such

Commissioners to grant relief from double assessments.

assessment or such part thereof as shall be a double charge as aforesaid to be vacated.

Such proof may be either by a certificate of the assessment made on the party, under the hands of the Commissioners by whom he shall have been rightly assessed according to the directions of this Act for the matter or cause in question, certifying that such matter or cause is included in an assessment made by them on the same party on the same account and for the same year, or by other lawful evidence given of those facts on the oath of any credible witnesses.

CXXI. Whenever it shall be found to the satisfaction of the chief revenue authority aforesaid, that any such double assessment as aforesaid has been made and has not been vacated, and that payment has been made of both assessments, it shall be lawful for the said chief revenue authority to order and direct the Collector, or any officer for receipt, to repay to the party the sum so erroneously and doubly assessed upon him and paid as aforesaid.

CXXII. 1. If within or at the end of the year current, at the time of making any assessment under this Act, or at the end of any year when such assessment ought to have been made, any person charged to the duties contained in either of the Schedule I or II shall find and shall prove to the satisfaction of the Commissioners by whom the assessment was made and allowed, that his profits during such year for which the computation was made fell short of the sum so computed in respect of the same source of profits on which the computation was made, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners to cause the assessment made for such current year to be amended in respect of

Abatement on account of diminution of income how to be allowed.

such source of profit, as the case shall require, and in case the sum assessed shall have been paid, to certify under their hands, to the Commissioner of the division, or in any of the said Presidency, towns or stations to the chief revenue authority of the towns or stations, the amount of the sum overpaid upon such first assessment

2. Thereupon the said Commissioner of revenue, or chief revenue authority aforesaid, shall issue an order for the repayment of such sum as shall have been so overpaid, which order shall be directed to such officer of revenue as the said Commissioner of revenue, or the chief revenue authority aforesaid, shall appoint in that behalf, and shall authorize and require the repayment of the said sum so overpaid as aforesaid.

3. Such sum shall accordingly be paid by such officer on production and delivery to him of such order, taking the receipt of the party entitled to the same by endorsement on such order.

CXXIII. 1. In case any person charged to the said duties

Abatement to be allowed when persons shall cease to exercise any trade, or shall die before the end of the year.

under Schedule II shall cease to exercise the profession or

to carry on the trade in respect whereof such assessment was made, or shall die, or become bankrupt or insolvent before the end of the year for making such assessment, or shall, from any other specific cause, be deprived of, or lose the profits on which the computation of duty charged in such assessment was made, it shall be lawful for such person or his representative to make application to the Commissioners for general purposes of the district, within three calendar months, after the end of such year, and on due proof thereof to their satisfaction, the said Commissioners shall cause the assessment to be amended as the case may require, and give such relief to the party charged, or his representatives, as shall be just.

2. In cases requiring the same, the said Commissioners shall certify in the manner provided in the Section of this Act; and upon such certificate, the Commissioner of revenue, or the chief revenue authority aforesaid, shall, in the manner provided in that Section, order re-payment to be made of such sum as shall have been overpaid on the assessment amended or vacated, which repayment shall be made in the manner provided in the said Section.

3. Provided always, that where any person shall have succeeded to the trade of the party charged, no such amendment shall be made, unless it shall be proved to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners that the profits of such trade have fallen short from some specific cause, to be alleged to them and proved, since such change or succession took place, or by reason thereof; but such person so succeeding to the same shall be liable to the payment of the full duties thereon, without any new assessment.

CXXIV. 1. If any difference shall arise between any persons to whom any interest, rent, rent charges, annuity,

Commissioners to settle differences respecting deductions to be made on account of duties.

quit rent, or other rent, or annual payment shall be payable, touching the same, to be deducted thereof on account of the duties hereby charged having been paid, or between the owner or person in receipt of rent for the time being, and any former owner or person in receipt of rents of any lands, or his representative or assigns, touching the proportion of duty to be paid or allowed by either party, the Commissioners for general purposes, in their several districts, shall have authority to settle the proportions of such payments and deductions, as shall be according to the directions of this Act; and, in default of payment, to levy the same respectively under the like powers as they might have levied the same, if the assessment had been made in the same

proportions, and to pay over the same to the Collector or party, as the case may require.

2. In such cases the judgment and determination of such Commissioners shall be final.

CXXV. In the computation of duty to be made under this Act for any purpose whatsoever, it shall not be lawful

What deductions shall not be allowed in computing the duties to be charged under this Act.

to make any other deduction than such as are expressly allowed by this Act, nor to make any deduction on account of any annual interest, annuity, or other annual payment to be paid to any person out of any profits or gains chargeable by this Act, in regard that a proportionate part of the duty so to be charged is allowed to be deducted on making such payment, nor to make any deduction from the profits arising from any property chargeable with duty under Schedules I and III of this Act, or either of them, or from any office or employment of profit, chargeable under Schedule IV of this Act, on account of diminution of capital employed, or of loss sustained in any trade, manufacture, adventure, or concern, or in any profession.

PART XIII.

Mode of payment and collection of the Duties.

CXXVI. The duties assessed under this Act, except where the same shall be detained and stopped at the respective offices, shall be payable in each year by four quarterly instalments at the times following, that is to say, on or before the 1st day of August for the first quarterly instalment, on or before the 1st day of November for the second quarterly instalment, on or before the 1st day of February for the third quarterly instalment, and on or before the 1st day of May for the last quarterly instalment in each year.

Duties to be payable by four quarterly instalments.

CXXVII. 1. The respective Commissioners executing this Act, in relation to any of the duties hereby imposed, shall

Commissioners to deliver duplicate assessment to Collector, which shall be sufficient authority to him to levy.

as soon as possible, after all appeals made to them as aforesaid shall have been determined, issue out and deliver to the respective Collectors duplicates of the assessments of the aforesaid duties charged at the respective rates mentioned in the respective schedules of this Act, distinguishing the amounts charged under each of the said schedules.

2. Such duplicates shall, except in the cases provided for in Sections CXXXII. and CXXXIII. of this Act, contain the names and descriptions of the persons assessed and charged.

3. Such duplicates, when received by the Collector, shall be a sufficient warrant (and authority) to him for the levying and collecting of the said duties assessed under this Act, and specified in the said duplicates as the same shall become payable by such instalments as aforesaid, in the manner hereinafter directed.

CXXVIII. Wherever a Treasury or office for the receipt

When a Treasury has been established within 5 miles, the person assessed shall pay into such Treasury.

of the duties under this Act shall have been established by the Government within 5 miles from the place where any person assessed under this Act shall reside, such person shall pay the instalments of duties with which he shall have been charged as aforesaid, at such Treasury or office to the officer in charge thereof for the time being, within seven days after the said instalments shall have become payable.

CXXIX. 1. Where no such Treasury or office for the receipt of duties shall

Otherwise Collector to deliver memorandum to a Collecting officer.

have been established within miles from the place where

any person assessed under this Act shall reside, the Collector of the district shall deliver a memorandum, signed by such Collector, of the amount of the instalments payable by any such person so residing more than miles from any such Treasury or office as aforesaid, and of the name and place of abode of such person, to a collecting officer or person to be appointed in that behalf by the Collector.

2. Such collecting officer or person shall, within

Who shall demand payment from persons assessed. days after such memorandum shall have been delivered to him as aforesaid, make demand of the person named in such memorandum, or at the place of abode mentioned in such memorandum, of the amount of the instalment therein mentioned.

CXXX. Whenever any payment shall

On payment, receipt to be given. be made, either at such Treasury or office, or to any collecting officer or person as aforesaid, to whom any such memorandum as aforesaid shall have been delivered by the Collector, of any instalment of duties assessed under this Act, the officer or person receiving the same shall give a receipt under his hand, unto the person who shall pay the same, and such receipt shall be a full and complete discharge to every person who shall pay the same for the sum so paid as aforesaid.

CXXXI. The Collector of each district shall cause general notice to be given in his district by proclamation in the manner usual in the said district, and also by affixing such notice at the office of the said Collector, of the Treasuries or offices established by the Government within the said district for the receipt of the said duties, or of the officers or persons to whom the said duties at different places within the said districts, may be paid.

Collector to give general notice of establishment of Treasuries, and of officer to whom duties are to be paid.

Mode of payment of duties under Schedule II, when parties desire to pay according to numbers or letters.

CXXXII. 1. All assessments upon

Assessments under Schedule II. to be entered, a certificate of the amount delivered by a number or letter without the names of parties when they intend to pay the officer for receipt. profits under Schedule II, made by the Commissioners for general purposes, or by the Commissioners for special purposes, shall be entered in books, with the names and descriptions of the persons to be charged therewith, and their respective places of abode set opposite thereto, which entries shall respectively be numbered progressively, or lettered or distinguished by numbers or letters, as the said Commissioners shall think proper.

2. When, and as soon as the said Commissioners shall have caused to be made any such entry in such book, in case the person charged by such assessment shall have declared his intention to pay the duty at the proper Treasury or to the proper officer for receipt within the time limited by this Act for payment thereof, and in case the said Commissioners shall be satisfied with such declaration, they shall deliver to such person, or to such other person, as shall be there attending on his behalf, a certificate under the hands of two or more of such Commissioners, specifying the amount of the sums to be paid within one year upon such assessment.

3. Every such certificate shall be numbered or lettered with the same number or letter as the entry in the book of the said Commissioners, to which such certificate shall relate, without naming or otherwise describing the person charged.

4. Such certificate shall, on production thereof, be a sufficient authority to the said officer for receipt, from time to time, to receive from any person bearing and producing such certificate, the amount of the sums therein contained in such proportions thereof as by this Act are

made payable by instalments, and at the times by this Act appointed for payment thereof.

5. On the payment of the sums contained in any such certificate, or any proportion thereof, the said officer for receipt shall give certificates for the same, acknowledging the receipt of the sums paid on account of the certificate of the said respective Commissioners, by the number or letter marked therein, as before directed.

CXXXIII. It shall be lawful for the respective Commissioners, whether for general or special purposes, to issue

Duplicates to be delivered to Collectors, and when assessments are made under a number or letter, a warrant for receiving the duties to be delivered.

out and deliver to

the respective Collectors duplicates of the assessments made by them, containing the sums assessed on every person to whom a certificate hath been delivered by letter or number, together with the number or letter set opposite thereto in their respective books before mentioned, without naming such persons, and all such sums shall be paid to the respective officers for receipts: and such part thereof as shall not be so paid to them, may be levied and collected as herein is mentioned.

CXXXIV. 1. The duties payable on such last mentioned assessments under Schedule II at the proper Treasury, or

Persons charged to pay the duties to the proper officers for receipts; and in default, the duties may be levied in the ordinary way.

shall be paid to the proper officer for receipt, by such instalments as by this Act is directed, on or before the respective days appointed for such payments.

2. The certificates hereby required to be given on such payments shall be delivered to the respective Commissioners, or to their clerk at their office, before the time when the same are hereby made payable, taking his or their receipt for the same, which receipt shall be a sufficient discharge for the money so paid, in

satisfaction of so much of the assessment as shall be mentioned in such certificate to be so paid.

3. If any person shall neglect to pay such duties at the time and in the manner hereby directed for payment thereof, or having paid the same, shall neglect to deliver the certificate, required to be given on such payment as hereinbefore directed, it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, by whom the assessment shall have been made, and they are hereby required to deliver a duplicate of all sums assessed on any person who shall have made default in paying or accounting for the payment of the same, with his name and description, to the Collector, in order that he may levy the sum in arrear and unpaid, and such sums shall therefore be levied according to the provisions hereinafter contained.

CXXXV. In all cases where the

When parties are not assessed by a number or letter, Commissioners to deliver duplicate to Collector for collection.

Commissioners shall not have received a declaration of the intended payment to

the officer for receipt, as aforesaid, of the duty to be charged under Schedule II, or shall not be satisfied with such declaration, they shall deliver a duplicate of the assessments to the Collector, with the names and descriptions of the parties charged therewith, as provided in Section CXXVII. of this Act.

CXXXVI. If after the receipt of any

If after declaration of intention to pay under number or letter default is made, Commissioners to deliver duplicate to Collector.

such declaration, the duties shall not be duly satisfied and paid accordingly, the said Commissioners

shall cause the name of the defaulters, and the amount of duty assessed on each, to be inserted, from time to time, in the duplicate assessment of the Collector; and such duplicate shall be of the like force and effect for collecting the sums, and such sums shall be levied, as if such names and sums had

been inserted therein at the time of issuing such duplicate.

CXXXVII. Whenever the amount of

In default of payment, Collector may proceed to recover arrears by distress or attachment and sale of moveable and immoveable property.

any instalment of the said duties shall not be paid in manner aforesaid, by the

person liable to pay the same within seven days after the day appointed by this Act aforesaid, for the payment of such instalment, the Collector shall proceed for the recovery of such instalment, by a distress and sale of the moveable property or attachment and sale of the immoveable property of the person so making default.

CXXXVIII. In the seizure and sale

Seizure and sale of moveable property to be made according to following rules.

of moveable property for arrears of assessment, the following rules shall be observed:—

1st.—The Collector shall employ a person

CXXXIX. When a defaulter, on receiving notice, shall

a defaulter shall have absconded, or be otherwise not forthcoming, so that the notice cannot be served upon him, the distraining officer shall, in either case, transmit an inventory of the property distrained to the Collector.

shall be as nearly as possible proportionate to the amount of the arrear.

CXLII. The distress shall be made

after sunrise and before sunset, and

CXLIII. The distraining officer shall

have power to force open any stable, cow-

house, golah, granary, godown, out-house, or other building, as also to enter any dwelling house, the outer door of which may be open, (excepting the apartments in such dwelling house, appropriated for the zenanah or residence of women, which, by the usage of the country, are considered private), and to

break open the door of any room in such dwelling house for the purpose of attaching property belonging to a defaulter and lodged therein.

CXLIV. 1. Where a distraining officer shall have reason to suppose that the property of a defaulter is lodged within a dwelling house, the outer door of which may be shut, or within any apartments appropriated to women, which by the usage of the country are considered private, such officer shall represent the same to the head officer of the Police, (within whose jurisdiction the house may be situated,) and on such representation the head officer of the Police shall send a Police officer not under the degree of a

Powers of distrainer to force open doors in the presence of a Police Officer.

to the spot, in the presence of whom the distraining officer may force open the outer door of such dwelling house.

2. The distraining officer may also, in the presence of the Police officer, after due notice given for the removal of women within a zenanah, and after furnishing means for their removal in a suitable manner, (if they be women of rank who, according to the custom of the country, cannot appear in public,) enter the zenanah apartments for the purpose of distraining the defaulter's property therein; but such property, if found, shall be immediately removed from such apartments, after which they shall be left free to the former occupants.

CXLV. Immediately on the occurrence of an arrear, or at any subsequent period, the Collector shall have authority to attach at his discretion the whole or such portion of a defaulter's immoveable property as he may deem sufficient to answer the amount in arrear; but the previous sanction of the chief revenue authority of the division shall, in all cases, be necessary for the sale of immoveable property.

Real property may be attached but previous sanction of the chief revenue authority of the division necessary for the sale of immoveable property.

CXLVI. When a defaulter shall not have any moveable property, of which distraint can be made, or when, after the moveable pro-

When Collector may sell the immoveable property in addition to the moveable property of the defaulter.

perty of such defaulters shall have been distrained and sold, the arrear due, with interest, and all expenses of the distress and sale is not liquidated by the proceeds of such sale, the Collector may, with such sanction as aforesaid, proceed to sell the immoveable property of the defaulter.

CXLVII. The person or officer employed by the Collector to sale moveable property dis-

Proclamation to be made of the time of sale and of the property to be sold.

trained, or immoveable property attached under this Act, shall cause to be affixed to the outer door of the defaulter's house a list of the property to be sold, with a notice specifying the place where, and the day and hour at which the property will be sold, and shall cause proclamation of the intended sale to be made in the manner usual in the district in such place or places as the Collector may consider necessary to give due publicity to the sale.

CXLVIII. No sale of immoveable property shall take place until after the expiration of a period

No sale of such property to take place till after fifteen days.

of fifteen days from the date on which the notice may be so affixed.

CXLIX. 1. At the appointed time, the property, moveable or immoveable,

Sale how to be conducted.

shall be put up for sale under the order of the Collector in one or more lots, as the Collector or the officer employed by him in that behalf shall direct, and shall be sold to the highest bidder.

2. When the property shall be sold for more than the amount of the arrear, the overplus, after deducting expenses of process and interest, shall be paid to the defaulter.

CL. When the immoveable property of a defaulter is first attached and sold, if the arrears due, with expenses of attachment and sale, and

When Collectors may sell the moveable property after the immoveable property of the defaulter has been distained.

all other just charges, be not fully liquidated by the sale, the Collector may cause the moveable property of the defaulter to be distrained and sold for the recovery of the balance thereof, with interest, and all expenses of the distress and sale.

CLL. 1. If any person assessed to the said duties shall remove out of the district in which he

Arrears to be levied by distress in the district where the party resides.

shall have been assessed, without first paying or discharging all the duties charged upon him which shall be due and payable, and without leaving in such district sufficient property whence the whole of the said duties may be raised and levied; or if any person shall reside in any other district than that in which the assessment or charge shall be made on him in pursuance of this Act, and the same shall be in arrear and unsatisfied in the whole or in part, it shall be lawful for the Collector of the district in which such assessment or charge shall have been made, to certify to the Collector of the district within which such person shall reside, the amount of the assessment or charge made upon such person, and remaining in arrear, and unpaid as aforesaid.

2. Such last mentioned Collector shall thereupon cause the whole of the duty so remaining in arrear and unpaid as aforesaid to be raised and levied, together with the costs and charges attending, in the same manner, as if the said person had been assessed in the district of the said last mentioned Collector.

CLLII. The fees payable upon distraints or attachments under this Act, shall be such as are set forth in the table of fees in the schedule hereto annexed, and marked VII.

The fees upon distraints should be according to table of fees in Schedule VII.

CLLIII. Instead of proceeding by distress and sale, or by attachment and sale,

Instead of proceeding by distress, Collector may file a certificate of non-payment in a Court of competent jurisdiction of the district.

or in case of failure to realize thereby the whole or any

part of the duty assessed and payable under this Act, the Collector of the district may, if he shall think fit, and if any instalment shall remain unpaid for more than fourteen days, after the day appointed for the payment thereof file in any Court of competent jurisdiction within the district in which the person liable shall reside, whether established by Royal Charter or not, a certificate that such person has been duly assessed under this Act, specifying the yearly sum in which and the period for which he shall have been so assessed: stating that, an instalment of the said duties so assessed remains unpaid, stating the amount of such instalment, and the time at which it became payable.

CLLIV. Such certificate shall have the

Such certificate shall have the effect of a final decree.

same effect in regard to the person and property, moveable

or immoveable, of the said defaulter, as if a final decree or judgment had been obtained by the said Collector on behalf of the Secretary of State in Council against such person for the payment of the said arrears of duty in a regular suit in the said Court, and it shall be lawful for the Collector to take the same proceedings by execution and process of the said Court as he would have been entitled to take such final decree or judgment.

CLLV. All such duties as shall be duly assessed or charged

Duties shall also be recoverable as a debt, and in the name of Secretary of State for India in Council.

under any of the provisions of this Act, if not paid, levied,

or collected according to the direction herein mentioned, shall also be recoverable as a debt to, and in the name of the Secretary of State for, India in Council, with full costs of suit, and all charges and expenses attending the same.

CLVI. The claim of the Government for all sums payable for the said duties shall have priority over all other claims upon any immovable property attached, or upon any moveable property distrained under this Act.

Such claim shall have priority over all other claims.

CLVII. 1. No goods or chattels belonging to any person at the time any of the duties to be assessed under this Act shall become in arrear, shall be liable to be taken by virtue of any execution or other process, warrant or authority, or by virtue of any assignment, or on any account or pretence whatever, (except at the suit of the landlord for rent,) unless the person at whose suit the execution or seizure shall be made, or to whom such assignment shall be made, shall, before the sale or removal of such goods and chattels, pay, or cause to be paid to the proper officer all arrears of the said duties which shall be due at the time of seizing such goods or chattels, or which shall be payable for the year in which such seizure shall be made, provided that the said duties shall not be claimed under this Section for more than one year.

Goods of defaulters are not to be removed under any execution or assignment, until all duties are paid.

Exception in favor of landlord's claim to arrear rent.

2. The exception herein before contained as to the landlord's claim to rent shall not extend beyond six months' arrears of any rent due to the said landlord.

Landlord's claim shall not extend beyond six months.

CLVIII. When any person chargeable with the duties hereby made payable as aforesaid shall be under the age of twenty-one years, or when any person so chargeable shall die, in every such case the parents or guardians of such infant, upon default of payment by him, and the representative of the person so dying, shall be, and are

Parents and guardians liable for infants, and executors for person dying.

hereby made liable to and charged with the payments which the said infant ought to have made, or the person so dying was chargeable with, and if such parents or guardians, or such representatives shall neglect or refuse to pay as aforesaid, it shall be lawful to proceed against them in like manner as against any other person making default of payment of the said duties; and the parent or guardian making payments as aforesaid shall be allowed every sum paid for such infant in his accounts, and all representatives shall be allowed to deduct all such payments out of the assets of the person so dying.

CLIX. If this Act shall not be executed in any district previous to the time appointed for the payment of the first or any subsequent instalment of the said duties, or within the year of assessment, it shall be lawful for the Commissioners executing this Act, who shall have made or allowed any assessment after the period appointed for any such payment, (which they are hereby declared to be competent to do,) from time to time, when and as the same shall be necessary, to settle and adjust at what time any instalment of which the time for payment shall then have elapsed, shall be paid, in such manner as to them shall appear just and reasonable.

When the Act shall not be executed before the time for payment of any instalments shall fall due, Commissioners to adjust such times of payment.

PART XIV.

Application of the Duties.

CLX. All monies arising from the duties hereby imposed (the necessary charges of raising and accounting for the same excepted,) shall be paid into such of the Treasuries of Her Majesty's Government in India as the local Government shall from time to time direct to an account to be headed income tax account.

All the duties to be paid in the first instance into the Government Treasury to an account to be headed income tax account.

CLXI. 1. Separate accounts shall be kept at the said Treasuries of all sums paid in on account of the said 3 per cent. duty, and of those paid on account of the said 1 per cent. duty.

2. Separate accounts shall also be kept at the said Treasuries.

Separate account also to be kept in respect of 1 per cent. duty.

1st.—Of sums paid in Presidency towns and Straits' Settlements.

2nd.—Of sums paid in towns in which Act XXI. of 1850 is in force.

3rd.—Of all other sums paid in each district.

1st.—Of such sums paid in on account of the said 1 per cent. duty, as shall have been assessed upon

persons residing in, or carrying on business in, or upon any house or land in, any of the Presidency towns or stations.

2ndly.—Of such sums paid in on account of the said 1 per cent. duty as shall have been assessed upon any person residing in, or carrying on business in, or upon any house or land in, any town or suburb not within the Presidency towns or stations aforesaid, wherein Act XXVI. of 1850, shall be in force, and Commissioners shall have been appointed under that Act, and

3rdly.—Of all sums paid in or on account of the said 1 per cent. duty, as shall have been assessed upon any other person, or any other houses or lands in each district.

CLXII. The said sums paid into the said Treasuries, on account of the said 3 per cent. duty shall be transferred,

All sums paid on account of 3 per cent. duty to be applied for service of Government of India under directions of Government.

THE following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 4th April 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 17th April 1858), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XI of 1858.

An Act to authorize the infliction of corporal punishment in certain cases.

WHEREAS, in consequence of the destruction of the Jails in many parts of India, and the want under existing circumstances of means for the confinement of Convicts and for the due enforcement of prison-discipline, it is expedient to authorize the substitution of corporal punishment for imprisonment in certain cases; It is enacted as follows:—

I. If any person shall be charged before a Magistrate with having committed any of the offences hereinafter mentioned, it shall be lawful for such Magistrate, in lieu of committing the offender for trial, or sentencing him to any other punishment to which he may be liable, to sentence the offender upon conviction to corporal punishment not exceeding thirty stripes with a ratan. The offences are—robbery not attended with aggravating circumstances, burglary, theft, knowingly receiving stolen or plundered property, wilful destruction of or injury to property, and the attempt to commit any of the above-mentioned offences.

II. It shall also be competent to a Magistrate to impose a fine not exceeding five hundred Rupees on conviction for any offence under Section XXV Act XXVIII of 1857; and in such case, as

well as in any case in which a fine shall be imposed under the provisions of Section VIII Act XI of 1857, or of Section XVI, Section XXII, or Section XXVII Act XXVIII of 1857, or for assaults or affrays, it shall be lawful for the Magistrate to order that corporal punishment, not exceeding thirty stripes with a ratan, shall be inflicted on the offender in lieu of the fine, in case such fine be not paid. In any case in which the Magistrate shall make such order, he shall not sentence the offender to imprisonment in addition to the fine.

III. Nothing in this Act shall be deemed to authorize the infliction of corporal punishment upon any European or American or upon any female.

IV. The word "Magistrate" shall include any person lawfully exercising the full powers of a Magistrate, and also any Assistant to a Magistrate or Deputy Magistrate specially authorized by the Executive Government to exercise the powers vested in a Magistrate by this Act; and the word "European" shall include any person usually designated a European British subject.

V. This Act shall take effect only in the Districts or places to which the Governor General in Council or the Executive Government of any Presidency or place shall think it necessary to extend it.

VI. This Act shall continue in force for two years.

ACT No. XII OF 1858.

An Act for raising funds for making and repairing roads in the Suburbs of Calcutta and the Station of Howrah.

WHEREAS considerable sums are expended annually by Government for making and repairing roads in the suburbs of Calcutta and the station of Howrah; and whereas it is just and expedient that such expenses, or a reasonable proportion thereof, should be defrayed by the inhabitants of the said suburbs and station in the same manner as the expense of making and repairing roads in the Town of Calcutta is defrayed by the inhabitants of the said Town: and whereas a tax has been imposed upon carriages and horses kept within the said Town; and it is expedient that a similar tax should be imposed upon carriages and horses kept within the said suburbs and station: It is enacted as follows :—

I. The sums required for making and repairing roads within the limits of the said suburbs and station, except as hereinafter otherwise provided, shall be contributed by the inhabitants of the said suburbs and station and shall be recovered in the manner hereinafter provided.

II. A tax shall be imposed upon all carriages, horses, ponies, and mules kept within the limits of the said suburbs and station, as those limits are defined in Act XXI of 1857, at the rates specified in the annexed Schedule; and shall be payable quarterly by the owners or persons having charge of the same.

III. Provided that the carriages and animals hereinafter mentioned shall be exempt from the tax, namely,

Gun carriages, and ordnance carts and waggons. Cavalry horses, and horses of mounted Police. Horses belonging to Officers doing regimental duty at the Presidency or in the said suburbs or station, at the rate of one horse for each Officer.

Carriages and animals kept for sale and not used for any other purpose, if kept by *bonâ fide* dealers in such carriages or animals.

IV. The Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal may appoint such person as he shall deem fit to be Collector of the carriage and horse tax in the said suburbs, and in the said station.

V. Every person, who may have owned or had charge of any carriage or animal kept within the said suburbs or station for any number of days in any quarter, shall be liable to the whole tax for that quarter.

VI. If a carriage shall have been under repair at a carriage-maker's for the whole period contained in any quarter, no tax shall be leviable in respect of such carriage for that quarter.

VII. The Collector, at his discretion, may compound, for any period not exceeding one year, with livery stable-keepers and other persons keeping carriages and horses for hire, for a certain sum to be paid for the carriages and horses so kept by such persons, in lieu of the rates specified in the Schedule.

VIII. Carriages and horses let out for hire in premises situated within the said suburbs or station, although owned by livery stable-keepers or others not residing within the limits of the said suburbs or station, shall be subject to the tax; and the sums to be charged for such carriages and horses shall be recoverable from the persons in whose premises they are for the time being kept.

IX. Every carriage of the description rated in the Schedule at one Rupee and eight annas, kept within the said suburbs or station and let out for hire, shall be registered in the Office of the Collector, and shall bear, in such manner as the Collector shall direct, the number of such registration. The registration shall be made and the number assigned annually upon such day in each year as the Collector shall appoint. Any person becoming possessed, within the year, of any such carriage which has not been registered, may obtain registration on application to the Collector at his Office. When any registered carriage is transferred within the year, it shall be registered anew in the name of the person to whom it has been transferred. A fee of four annas shall be paid for each registration.

X. Whoever keeps any such carriage, required to be registered by the provisions of the last preceding Section, without being so registered, shall, on conviction before a Magistrate, be liable to a fine not exceeding ten Rupees, and the Collector or any Officer duly authorized by him may seize or cause to be seized any such carriage (provided the same be not employed at the time of seizure in the conveyance of any passengers or goods) together with the horses or other animals drawing the same, and may deliver them over to the Police; and all Police Officers are hereby required, on the application of the Collector or his Officer as aforesaid, to seize and detain the same. If the carriage as aforesaid be not claimed or if the fine be not paid within ten days, such carriage, together with the animals seized with it, may be sold by auction by order of the Magistrate, and the proceeds applied to the payment of the fine and all costs and charges incurred on account of the detention and sale, and the surplus (if any), if not claimed by the owner within a further period of twenty days, shall be paid to the Collector.

XI. The Collector shall from time to time cause to be prepared and entered in distinct columns in a book to be kept at his Office, and to be open to the inspection of any person

interested therein, a list of the persons liable to the payment of the tax, a description of the carriages and animals in respect of which they are liable, and the amount of the tax assessed thereon.

XII. In order to enable the Collector to make such list, the Collector or any Officer authorized by him may send to all persons supposed to be liable to the payment of the tax, a Schedule to be filled up with such information respecting the carriages and animals kept by them as the Collector may judge necessary for the assessment of the tax. The Schedule shall be filled up in writing, and signed and dated, and returned to the Office of the Collector by every person to whom it is sent, whether or not liable to the payment of the tax; and whoever refuses, neglects, or omits duly to fill up and return such Schedule within one week from the receipt thereof or knowingly gives therein any incorrect or false return, shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to a penalty not exceeding two hundred Rupees.

XIII. The Magistrate on the report of the Collector may, if he thinks proper, summon any person supposed to be liable to the payment of the tax, or any servant of such person, to appear before the Collector: and the Collector may examine such person or his servant as to the number and description of the carriages and horses in respect of which such person is liable to be assessed. If the person summoned shall, without lawful excuse, fail to appear in pursuance of the summons or shall refuse to answer any lawful question of the Collector, or knowingly give an incorrect answer, he shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to a penalty not exceeding two hundred Rupees.

XIV. Any person who may dispute his liability for any assessment made under the foregoing provisions of this Act, or the amount of any such assessment, may appeal to the Magistrate. Provided that such appeal shall be commenced within ten days after the receipt by such person of a bill for the sum claimed from him in respect of such assessment.

The decision of the Magistrate upon every such appeal shall be final and conclusive; and no person shall be entitled to contest any assessment made under the foregoing provisions of this Act, in any other manner than by appeal to the Magistrate as hereinbefore provided.

XV. When any sum is due on account of the said tax, the Collector shall cause to be presented to the person liable to the payment thereof a bill for the amount, which shall also contain a statement of the period and a description of the carriages and animals for which the charge is made, together with a notice of the time within which an appeal may be preferred.

XVI. If the bill is not paid by the person liable to pay the same within five days from the presentation thereof, the Collector may cause to be served upon such person a notice of demand in the form (A) contained in the Schedule to this Act, or to the like effect, and if such person shall not, within five

days from the service of such notice of demand, pay the sum due or show sufficient cause for non-payment of the same to the satisfaction of the Collector, and if no appeal shall have been preferred, such sum with all costs may be levied by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the defaulter under a warrant in the form (B) in the Schedule, or to the like effect, to be issued for that purpose by the Collector.

XVII. The Officer charged with the execution of the warrant of distress shall make an inventory of the goods and chattels seized under any such warrant, and shall at the same time give a notice in writing in the form (C) contained in the Schedule annexed to this Act, to the person in possession thereof at the time of the seizure, that the said goods and chattels will be sold as therein mentioned.

XVIII. If the arrear is not paid with costs, or the warrant is not discharged or suspended by the Collector, the goods and chattels seized shall be sold under the orders of the Collector, who shall apply the proceeds or such part thereof as may be necessary in discharge of the said arrears and costs; and the surplus, if any, shall be returned on demand to the person in possession of the goods and chattels at the time of the seizure. The fees payable upon distraints under this Act shall be such as are set forth in the Table of Fees (D) in the said Schedule.

XIX. Instead of proceeding by distress and sale, or in case of failure to realize by distress the whole or part of any sum due in respect of the tax, the Collector may sue the person liable for the same in any Court of competent jurisdiction.

XX. Previously to the first day of May of each year, an estimate shall be prepared of the amount required during the year for the purpose of making and repairing roads in the said suburbs and in the said station respectively; and such estimate, when sanctioned by the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, shall be published in the Official Gazette for general information. The Governor General of India in Council, on the report of the Lieutenant-Governor, shall determine whether any and (if any) what proportion of the said estimate shall be paid out of the public Revenues. If, after deducting such proportion (if any), the said estimate shall exceed the sum which the carriage and horse-tax is estimated to produce, with the addition of such further sums as may be assigned by the Lieutenant-Governor for the said purpose out of the Ferry Fund, or any other public fund, such excess shall be added to the amount of the assessment or rate to be levied in the said suburbs and in the said station under Act XX of 1856, and such additional assessment or rate shall be made and recovered according to the provisions of that Act. Provided that the amount levied by an assessment or rate under this Section shall not in any case exceed a sum equal to one-half of the amount levied under the said Act XX of 1856 for the purposes of that Act.

XXI. Estimate of probable expense of making and repairing roads, to be prepared annually, and published.

If estimate of expense exceed estimated produce of carriage and horse-tax, excess how to be made and recovered.

XXII. The proceeds of any assessment or rate made as aforesaid shall be kept distinct from the proceeds of the assessment or rate made for the purposes of the said Act XX of 1856; and such proceeds, together with all sums received by the Collector of the carriage and horse-tax and all sums assigned by Government as above provided, and all fines and penalties levied under this Act, shall form a Fund which shall be called in the suburbs of Calcutta "The Suburban Roads Fund," and in the station of Howrah "The Station Roads Fund." All ex-

penditures incurred for the purpose of this Act shall be defrayed from the said Fund, and the residue shall be applied exclusively to making, repairing, and improving roads within the limits of the said suburbs and station. Provided that no payment shall be made from the said Fund for the repair of such roads or parts of

roads as are herein after described, namely,
 In the said Suburbs—

- The Barrackpore road with the Lock-gate road.
- The road from the Cossipore Gun-foundry to Dum-Dum.
- The Belgatchya or Dum-Dum road.
- The Behalea or Diamond Harbour road southward from the cross road to Allipore and Tollygunge.
- The Budge-Budge road.
- The Gurreahhath or Culpee road from the end of O.d Ballygunge road.
- The Canal roads, and the roads leading from the Canals and Salt-water lake into the Town, namely, the Balliaghutta, Narcooldangah, Manicktollah, Ooltadunga, Gooreeparah, South Sealdah, Khooleah, Nimtollah, Jommajoy Baboo's, Khodagunge, and Khodghatta roads, and the Soorah road between the Balliaghatta and Narcooldanga roads.
- In the said Station—
- The Hooghly road northward from the point where it is crossed by the Old Benares road.
- The Old Benares road westward from the same point.
- Or for making or maintaining any part of any other main road of communication between the Town of Calcutta and the interior of the country which may hereafter be constructed.

XXIII. The Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal shall cause statements to be prepared annually of all expenses incurred on account of making, repairing, and improving the roads of the said suburbs and of the said station, and of all sums credited to and disbursed from the Suburban Roads Fund and the Howrah Station Roads Fund; and the said statements shall be published in the Official Gazette for general information.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the punishment of persons who shall knowingly and unlawfully have in their possession or conceal arms, horses, or other property belonging to Her Majesty or to the East India Company; It is enacted as follows:—

I. In any District to which the provisions of this Act shall be extended by order of the Governor General in Council or the Executive Government of any Presidency or place, the Magistrate shall issue a proclamation calling upon persons within his District, having in their possession any arms, ammunition, horse or other animal, or any Government Stamps, or other property belonging to Her Majesty or to the East India Company, to deliver up the same to the Magistrate or at the nearest Police Station within a time to be fixed by the proclamation; and whoever, after the expiration of the time so fixed, shall without lawful or reasonable excuse have in his possession any arms, ammunition, horse or other animal, or any Government Stamps, or other property, knowing the same to belong to Her Majesty or to the East India Company, shall on conviction be liable to the punishment of transportation for life or of imprisonment with hard labor for a term not exceeding fourteen years, either with or without fine, or to a fine alone, or to corporal punishment not exceeding thirty stripes with a ratan.

ACT No. XIV OF 1858.

An Act to extend the provisions of Act XXI of 1855 in the Presidency of Fort Saint George to Minors not subject to the superintendence of the Court of Wards.

WHEREAS, by Section XX Regulation V. 1804 and Section III Regulation X. 1831 of the Madras Code, the

Preamble.

Zillah Courts, subject to the confirmation of the Sudder Adawlut, are authorized and required to appoint guardians to the Minor heirs of property of every description not subject to the jurisdiction of the Court of Wards, and by Clause 9 Section XXI of the former Regulation the guardians are required to provide for the education of their Wards in a manner suitable to their rank and condition; and whereas, by Act XXI of 1855, better provision has been made for the education of Minors subject to the superintendence of the Court of Wards, and it is expedient that the same powers which are thereby given to the Collectors and Court of Wards in respect of the Minors under their superintendence should be exercised by the Zillah Courts, subject to the control of the Sudder Adawlut, in respect of the Minors for whom they are required to appoint guardians; It is enacted as follows:—

I. The general superintendence and control of the education of every male Minor, for whom a guardian has been or shall be appointed by the Zillah Court, is hereby vested in the Judge of the Zillah Court of the District within whose jurisdiction such Minor's estate is situate; or, if such Minor is possessed of immoveable property within the jurisdiction of more than one Zillah Court, in the Judge of such Court as the Sudder Adawlut shall direct.

II. The Judge of the Zillah Court, subject to the control of the Sudder Adawlut, is hereby authorized to exercise in respect of such Minor and the guardian of such Minor all the powers and authorities which, by Sections II, III, IV, and V, Act XXI of 1855, the Collector of Revenue or the Court of Wards is authorized to exercise in respect of Minors and guardians of Minors whose property is under the management of the Court of Wards.

III. The right to the custody of the person of every male Minor, for whom a guardian is appointed by the Judge of the Zillah Court, is hereby vested in the person appointed by the Judge of the Zillah Court, with the confirmation of the Court of Sudder Adawlut, either originally or upon the removal of a former guardian, to be the guardian of such Minor.

IV. All orders and proceedings of a Judge of a Zillah Court under the provisions of this Act shall be subject to the revision of the Court of Sudder Adawlut, and every person aggrieved by any such order or proceeding may prefer an appeal therefrom to the Court of Sudder Adawlut.

ACT No. XV OF 1858.

Act for the levy of Port-dues in the Port of Aden.

WHEREAS it is necessary to fix the amount of the Port-dues to be hereafter levied and taken in the Port of Aden in accordance with the provisions of Act XXII of 1855; It is enacted as follows:—

Preamble.

I. A Port-due, at a rate not exceeding the rate of one anna for every ton of burden, shall be chargeable in respect of every sea-going vessel of the burden of ten tons and upwards (except fishing-boats) which shall enter the said Port.

Port-due on sea-going vessels of ten tons and upwards entering Port.

II. Provided that no such due shall be chargeable in respect of any vessel which, having left the Port, is compelled to re-enter it by stress of weather, or in consequence of having sustained

No Port-due on vessels compelled by stress of weather to re-enter Port.

any damage.

III. The Port due chargeable under this Act shall not be chargeable oftener than once in the same calendar month in respect of the same vessel.

No vessel to pay Port-due oftener than once a month.

IV. Vessels entering the Port, and leaving the same within seven days without discharging or taking in any cargo or passenger therein, shall be charged with one-half only of the Port-due which would otherwise be chargeable.

Port-due on vessels leaving Port within seven days without breaking bulk.

V. Vessels entering the Port in ballast shall be charged with three-fourths of the Port-due which would otherwise be chargeable.

Vessels entering the Port in ballast.

VI. This Act shall commence and have effect on the first day of May 1858; and the local Government shall on or before that date, pursuant to Section XLII Act XXII of 1855, declare, by notification to be published in the *Bombay Gazette*, the rates at which Port-dues shall be levied in the said Port subject to the provisions of and within the limits prescribed by this Act; and from and after the said date, no Port-due or fee shall be levied at the said Port, except under the authority of Act XXI of 1855 and of this Act.

I. When the Governor in Council of Fort Saint George shall establish at Ootacamund on the Neilgherry Hills a Subordinate Criminal Court constituted according to Regulation II. 1827 of the Code of Fort Saint George, the provisions of Sections I and II of Act XXV of 1855 shall apply to commitments made by such Court; and it shall be lawful for the Judge of such Court to exercise, by appointment of the Government of Fort Saint George, all the powers of a Joint Magistrate.

A Bill for bringing the Fort of Tanjore and the adjacent territory under the Laws of the Presidency of Fort St. George.

WHEREAS it is necessary to make provision for the future administration of Civil and Criminal justice within the Fort of Tanjore and the territory adjacent thereto which have lapsed to the East India Company in consequence of the death of the Rajah of Tanjore, and also to bring the said Fort and adjacent territory under the Laws of the Presidency of Fort St. George; It is enacted as follows:—

I. From and after the day when this Act shall come into operation, the Fort of Tanjore and adjacent territory shall be subject to the general Laws and Regulations which are or shall be in force within the territories subject to the Presidency of Fort St. George.

II. No Court shall try or determine any case, Civil or Criminal, with respect to which a final decision may have been pronounced before this Act shall come into operation by any of the Courts established by the said Rajah exercising jurisdiction within the said Fort of Tanjore and adjacent territory at the time of the passing of this Act.

Decisions of such Courts in original Civil suits to be considered final, if no appeal is made within thirty days after passing thereof.

III. A decision passed by any such Court in an original Civil suit shall be considered as final, if no appeal shall have been made against it within thirty days after the decision was passed.

IV. All original suits and appeals (other than special appeals) and all proceedings which shall be pending in any of the Courts mentioned in Section II at the time at which this Act shall come into operation, shall be transferred to the Courts and Officers to be established or appointed for the administration of Civil and Criminal justice within the said Fort and adjacent territory, according to their respective jurisdictions.

V. Appeals not pending at the time at which this Act shall come into operation but presented to the Zillah Court within thirty days after the passing of the decision appealed against, shall be received by such Court, and disposed of in the same manner as pending appeals.

VI. The general Laws and Regulations in force within the territories subject to the Presidency of Fort St. George may be applied and administered by the said Courts and Officers in the trial and determination of such suits, appeals, and proceedings. Provided that, if in any Civil case it shall appear that the application of the said Laws and Regulations would operate unjustly if applied to the trial and determination thereof, it shall be lawful for the said Courts to try and determine the same according to equity and good conscience. Provided also that no act committed within the said Fort and adjacent territory, before this Act comes into operation, shall be deemed an offence punishable under the provisions hereof, if at the time of the commission of such act the same was not contrary to the Laws then in force within the said Fort and adjacent territory.

VII. It shall be competent to the Civil Judge of the District to which the said Fort and adjacent territory may be annexed, to hear and finally determine any special appeals pending in any of the Courts mentioned in Section II of this Act, and any special appeals that may be preferred to the Civil Judge in cases in which special appeals would have been admissible by any of the said Courts, provided that such special appeal shall be preferred within sixty days from the passing of the decision appealed against.

VIII. Decrees passed by any of the Courts mentioned in Section II of this Act may be executed according to the Law in force for the execution of decrees within the territories subject to the Presidency of Fort St. George, or as near thereto as may be.

IX. This Act shall come into operation from such day as shall be fixed by the Governor of Fort St. George in Council, by notice to be published in the *Government Gazette*.

A Bill for granting exclusive privileges to Inventors.

WHEREAS Act VI of 1856, entitled "An Act for granting exclusive privileges to Inventors," was passed by the Legislative Council of India without the sanction of Her Majesty to the passing thereof having been previously obtained and signified in pursuance of the Statute passed in the seventeenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, entitled "An Act to provide for the Government of India:" and whereas Her Majesty's Law Officers having given it as their opinion that the Legislative Council of India was not competent to pass Act VI of 1856 without previously obtaining the sanction of the Crown, and the Court of Directors of the East India Company having in pursuance of the power vested in them by law disallowed Act VI of 1856 and having signified to the Governor General of India in Council their disallowance thereof, the said Act was repealed by Act IX of 1857: and whereas it is expedient, for the encouragement of Inventors of new manufactures, that certain exclusive privileges in their inventions

should be granted to them in India, and that exclusive privileges obtained under the said Act should be protected: It is enacted as follows (the sanction of Her Majesty to the passing of this Act having been previously obtained and signified in pursuance of the said Statute):—

I. The Inventor of any new manufacture may petition the Governor General of India in Council for leave to file a specification thereof. Every such petition shall be in writing in the form or to the effect mentioned in the Schedule hereunto annexed, and shall be signed by the petitioner or (in case the petitioner shall be absent from India) by an authorized agent, and shall state the name, addition, and place of residence of the petitioner, and the nature of the invention.

II. Upon such petition, the Governor General of India in Council may make an order authorizing the petitioner to file a specification of the invention.

III. Before making such order, the Governor General of India in Council may refer the petition to any person or persons for enquiry and report, and such person or persons shall be entitled to a reasonable fee for such enquiry and report to be paid by the petitioner: the amount of such fee, in case of dispute, to be settled by a Judge of one of Her Majesty's Courts of Judicature in a summary manner.

IV. If, within the space of six calendar months from the date of such order, the petitioner cause a specification of his invention to be filed in manner hereinafter mentioned, the petitioner, his executors, administrators, or assigns, shall be entitled to the sole and exclusive privilege of making, selling, and using the said invention in India, and of authorizing others so to do, for the term of fourteen years from the time of filing such specification, and such further term (if any) not exceeding fourteen years from the expiration of the first fourteen years as the Governor General of India in Council may think fit to direct, upon petition to be presented by such inventor, at any period not more than one year, and not less than six calendar months, before the expiration of the exclusive privilege hereby granted.

V. An order authorizing the filing of a specification, or for extending the term of such exclusive privilege as aforesaid, may be made subject to any such conditions and restrictions as the Governor General of India in Council may think expedient.

VI. Every specification of an invention filed under this Act, shall be in writing, and shall be signed by the petitioner, and shall particularly describe and ascertain the nature of the said invention and in what manner the same is to be performed.

VII. Every petition for leave to file a specification and every specification filed under this Act shall be left with the Secretary to the Government of India in the Home Department, and every petition and specification shall be accompanied by a declaration in writing signed by the petitioner in the form or to the effect mentioned in the Schedule hereunto annexed, marked A and B respectively; and if the inventor be absent from India, the petition and specification shall also be accompanied by a declaration signed by the agent who shall present or file the same, to the effect that he verily believes that the declaration purporting to be the declaration of the inventor was signed by him, and that the contents thereof are true, which declaration shall be in the form hereunto annexed, marked C. The date of the delivery of every such petition and specification shall be endorsed on the same respectively, and shall also be recorded at the Office of the said Secretary.

VIII. If any person who shall make a declaration under this Act shall wilfully and corruptly make any false statement therein, he shall be deemed guilty of perjury, and shall be proceeded against, and upon conviction punished accordingly.

IX. No specification shall be filed until the petitioner shall have paid all fees payable under this Act, including the fees (if any) of the person or persons to whom the petition shall have been referred for enquiry and report.

X. At the time of delivering the specification for the purpose of being filed, the petitioner shall cause to be delivered to the said Secretary five copies thereof, of which

One shall be sent to and filed by one of the Secretaries to the Government of Bengal;

One shall be sent to and filed by one of the Secretaries to the Government of Fort St. George;

One shall be sent to and filed by one of the Secretaries to the Government of Bombay; and

One shall be sent to and filed by one of the Secretaries to the Government of the North-Western Provinces.

A copy of such specification shall be open at all reasonable times at the Office of each of the said Secretaries to public inspection upon payment of a fee of one Rupee.

A book shall be kept in the Office of the said Secretary to the Government of India wherein shall be entered and recorded every such petition and specification and every order made upon such petition or relating to the invention therein mentioned. Every specification shall be numbered according to the order in which it is entered in such book; and a reference shall be made in such book, in the margin of the entry of each specification, to every order relating to the invention.

XI. Such book, or a copy thereof, shall be open at all convenient times for the inspection of any person upon payment of a fee of one Rupee; and the said Secretary shall cause a copy of any entry therein, certified under his hand, to be given to any person requiring the same on payment of the expense of copying.

XII. Every such certified copy shall be *prima facie* evidence of the document of which it purports to be a copy.

XIII. No person shall be entitled to any exclusive privilege under the provisions of this Act—

If the invention is of no utility, or

If the invention, at the time of presenting the petition for leave to file the specification, was not a new invention within the meaning of this Act, or

If the petitioner is not the inventor thereof, or

If the specification filed does not particularly describe and ascertain the nature of the invention and in what manner the same is to be performed.

XIV. Every exclusive privilege under this Act shall cease if the Governor General of India in Council shall declare that the same, or the mode in which it is exercised, is mischievous to the State, or generally

or if Government, upon breach of condition proved, declare that it shall cease.

XV. The importer into India of a new invention shall not be deemed an inventor within the meaning of this Act, unless he be the actual inventor, not to be deemed inventor.

XVI. A foreigner, whether resident abroad or not, may petition for leave to file a specification under this Act.

XVII. An invention shall be deemed a new invention within the meaning of this Act, if it shall not, before the time of applying for leave to file the specification, have been publicly used in India or in any part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or been made publicly known in any part of India or of the

United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or been made publicly known in any part of India or of the

United Kingdom by means of a publication, either printed or written or partly printed and partly written. That that part of the invention, and the manner in which it is to be performed, is not sufficiently described and ascertained in the specification, and that such defect or insufficiency is injurious to the public.

XXV. It shall be lawful for the Advocate General of the East India Company at any of the Presidencies of Fort William in Bengal, Fort St. George, and Bombay, or any other person,

Application by Advocate General on breach of special condition.

by order of the Governor General in Council, to apply to any of the said Courts of Judicature for a rule calling upon the petitioner, his executors, administrators, or assigns, to show cause why the question of the breach of any special condition upon which the leave to file a specification has been granted, or any other question of fact on which the revocation of the exclusive privilege by the Governor General in Council under the power herein before reserved may, in the judgment of the said Governor General in Council, depend, should not be tried in the form of an issue directed by the said Court; and if the rule be made absolute, the Court, unless the breach or other matter of fact be admitted, may thereupon direct such issue to be tried, and certify the result of such trial to the Governor General in Council. The costs of such trial, and also the costs of any proceedings in any of the said Courts of Judicature under the provisions of this Act, shall be in the discretion of the Court.

XXVI. Notice of any rule obtained or proceeding taken under either of the last three preceding Sections shall be served on all persons appearing to be proprietors or to have shares or interests in the exclusive privilege under the provisions of Section XXXIV of this Act, and it shall not be necessary to serve such notice on any other persons.

Service of proceedings on all persons interested.

XXVII. Any of the said Courts of Judicature, if it think fit, may direct an issue for the trial, before the same Court or any other Court of Her Majesty or any principal Court of original jurisdiction in Civil cases of the East India Company, of any question of fact arising upon an application under Sections XXIII, XXIV, or XXV of this Act, and such issue shall be tried accordingly in a summary manner, and if the issue be directed to another Court, the finding shall be certified by the Court before which the same was tried, to the Court directing the issue. If the issue be directed to any of Her Majesty's Courts of Judicature, the Court by which the issue is tried may, before the finding is certified, direct a new trial of such issue according to the usual course and practice of such Court. If the issue be directed to a Court of the East India Company, the finding shall not be subject to appeal to any other Court of the said Company, but the evidence taken upon the trial shall be recorded, and a copy thereof, certified by the Judge, shall be transmitted, together with any remarks he may think fit to make thereon, to the Court by which the issue was directed; and such Court may either act upon the decision of the Court which tried the issue, or direct a new trial if it shall appear necessary.

Supreme Court may direct issue for trial to other Courts.

New trial.

XXVIII. If it shall appear to any of the said Courts of Judicature at the hearing of any application under the provisions of Sections XXIII or XXIV of this Act that, by reason of any of the objections therein mentioned, the said exclusive privilege in the invention or in any part thereof has not been acquired, the Court shall give judgment accordingly, and shall make such order as to the costs of and consequent upon the application as it may think just; and thereupon the petitioner, his executors, administrators, and assigns shall, so long as the judgment continues in force, cease to be entitled to such exclusive privilege.

Judgment.

Costs.

XXIX. If the Court at the hearing of any such application as last aforesaid, shall think that the petitioner has, in the description of his invention in the petition or specification, included something which at the date of the petition was not new or whereof he was not the inventor, or that the specification is in any particular defective or insufficient, but that the error, defect, or insufficiency was not fraudulently intended, the Court may adjudge the said exclusive privilege to have been acquired and to be valid, save as to the part thereof affected by such error, defect, or insufficiency, or if the Court shall think that the error, defect, or insufficiency can be amended without injury to the public, they may adjudge the exclusive privilege in the whole of the invention to be valid, and may, upon such terms as

Amendment of specification.

shall appear reasonable, order the specification to be amended in any of the said particulars; and thereupon the petitioner, his executors, administrators, or assigns shall, within the time limited by the said Court for the purpose, file a specification amended according to such order. Provided that no amended specification shall have the effect of extending or enlarging the exclusive privilege before acquired.

Proviso.

XXX. An exclusive privilege shall not be defeated upon the ground that there is any misdescription of the invention in the petition, unless such misdescription was fraudulent.

Misdescription in the petition, if not fraudulent, not to defeat the privilege.

XXXI. Whenever it shall be adjudged by any of the said Courts of Judicature that an exclusive privilege as to the whole or any part of an invention has not been acquired, the said Secretary to the Government of India shall, upon the production of the judgment or order, cause an entry thereof to be made in the said book hereinbefore directed to be kept, and shall cause a reference to such entry to be made in the margin of the entry of the specification contained in such book.

Entry in registry book of judgment &c. declaring privilege not to have been acquired.

XXXII. If, upon proceedings instituted within two years from the date of a petition to file a specification, the actual inventor shall prove to the satisfaction of any of Her Majesty's Courts of Judicature or of the principal Court of the East India Company having jurisdiction in Civil cases within the local limits of whose jurisdiction the defendant shall reside as a fixed inhabitant, that the petitioner was not the actual inventor, and that at the time of the petition he knew or had good reason to believe that the knowledge of the invention was obtained by himself or by some other person surreptitiously or in fraud of the actual inventor, or by means of a communication made in confidence by the actual inventor to him or to any person through whom he derived such knowledge, the Court may compel the petitioner to assign to the actual inventor any exclusive privilege obtained under this Act and to account for and pay over the profits thereof.

In what case actual inventor entitled to assignment of an exclusive privilege fraudulently obtained.

XXXIII. In any action for the infringement of such exclusive privilege the plaintiff shall deliver with his complaint particulars of the breaches complained of in the said action; and the defendant, in pleading thereto, shall deliver with his pleas particulars of the grounds (if any) upon which he means to contend that the plaintiff is not entitled to an exclusive privilege in the invention. In like manner, upon any application to any of the said Courts of Judicature under Sections XXIII, XXIV, or XXV of this Act, the applicant shall deliver particulars of the objections on which he means to rely. At the trial of any such action or issue, no evidence shall be allowed to be given in support of any alleged infringement or of any objection impeaching the validity of such exclusive privilege which shall not be contained in the particulars delivered as aforesaid. If it be alleged that the invention was publicly

known or used prior to date of the petition for leave to file such specification, the places where and the manner in which the invention was so publicly known or used shall be stated in such particulars. Provided, always, that it shall be lawful for any Court in which the action or proceeding is pending or in which the issue is tried, to allow the plaintiff or defendant respectively to amend the particulars delivered as aforesaid upon such terms as shall seem fit.

XXXIV. A book shall be kept in the Office of the Secretary to the Government of India in the Home Department (such book to be open to inspection without fee) wherein every person filing a specification under this Act shall cause to be stated, under a number corresponding with the number of the specification, some place in India where service of any rule or proceedings for the purpose of cancelling or revoking his exclusive privilege may be made. All persons, partnerships, or Companies from time to time being proprietors of, or having shares or interests in, such exclusive privilege, shall cause to be entered in such book, under such number as aforesaid, their names, together with the name of some place for the service of such proceedings as aforesaid. All such rules and proceedings as aforesaid shall be deemed sufficiently served on any such person, partnership, or Company, if a copy thereof be left at the place entered in such book or (if any other place be substituted for the same by entry in the said book) at the place last substituted, by delivering the same to any person resident at, or in charge of, such place: or, if there be no person resident at, or in charge of, such place, or if such place be not within the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Court, by causing such rule or proceeding to be sent by post, by a registered letter, directed to such person, partnership, or Company at such place; and if any such person, partnership, or Company shall neglect to make or cause to be made such entry, then service of such rule or proceeding may be effected by affixing a copy thereof to some conspicuous part of the Court-House or in such other manner as the Court may direct.

Service of proceedings.

XXXV. Act VI of 1856 shall be of the same force and effect in respect to every petition and specification filed under the provisions thereof before the Act was repealed, and in regard to all proceedings consequent thereon or in relation thereto, and for the purpose of every thing done under that Act while it continued in force as if previously to the passing of the said Act the sanction of Her Majesty to the passing thereof had been obtained and signified in pursuance of the Statute passed in the seventeenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, entitled "An Act to provide for the Government of India," and as if the said Act had not been repealed; save only that the term of fourteen years in Section IV of the Act first mentioned shall be computed from the time of the passing of this Act instead of from the time of filing the specification, and that no exclusive privilege shall cease to have effect by virtue of the provisions of Section XVI, if the invention be put in practice in India within the period of two years from the time of the passing of this Act.

Saving of Act VI of 1856 in respect of specifications filed &c. prior to its repeal.

XXXV. Act VI of 1856 shall be of the same force and effect in respect to every petition and specification filed under the provisions thereof before the Act was repealed, and in regard to all proceedings consequent thereon or in relation thereto, and for the purpose of every thing done under that Act while it continued in force as if previously to the passing of the said Act the sanction of Her Majesty to the passing thereof had been obtained and signified in pursuance of the Statute passed in the seventeenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, entitled "An Act to provide for the Government of India," and as if the said Act had not been repealed; save only that the term of fourteen years in Section IV of the Act first mentioned shall be computed from the time of the passing of this Act instead of from the time of filing the specification, and that no exclusive privilege shall cease to have effect by virtue of the provisions of Section XVI, if the invention be put in practice in India within the period of two years from the time of the passing of this Act.

XXXVI. Every petition for leave to file a specification under the provisions of this Act, or for the extension of the term of an exclusive privilege, shall be written or printed on stamped paper of the value of one hundred Rupees.

XXXVII. In the construction of this Act, the following words and expressions shall have the meanings hereby assigned to them, unless there be something in the subject or context repugnant to such construction.

Words importing the singular number shall include the plural number, and words importing the plural number shall include the singular number.

Words importing the masculine gender shall include females.

The word "invention" shall include an improvement.

The word "manufacture" shall be deemed to include any art, process, or manner of producing, preparing, or making an article, and also any article prepared or produced by manufacture.

The word "printed" shall include "lithographed."

The words "inventor" and "actual inventor" shall include the executors, administrators, or assigns of an inventor or actual inventor as the case may be.

The word "assigns" shall include grantees of the sole use or benefit in India of an invention, or of the sole use of an exclusive privilege for a limited time.

The word "India" shall mean the territories for the time being in the possession and under the Government of the East India Company.

The words "Governor General in Council" shall include the "President in Council."

The words "Secretary to the Government of India" shall include any Under-Secretary to the said Government.

Legislative Council of India.

THE following Bill, read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 3rd April 1858 and referred to a Select Committee, will be reported on (under a suspension of the Standing Orders) at the first Meeting of the Council after the 1st of June next:—

A Bill to provide for the administration of the Estate and for the payment of the debts of the late Nabob of the Carnatic.

WHEREAS by Act I of 1844 it is enacted that no writ or process shall at any time be sued forth or prosecuted against the person, goods, or property of His Highness the Nabob of the Carnatic, or of such other person as therein mentioned, unless such writ or process shall be so sued forth with the consent of the Governor in Council of Madras first had and obtained as therein mentioned; and that any writ or process which shall at any time be sued out or prosecuted against the person or goods or property of His Highness or of any such person without such consent, shall be utterly null and void: and whereas the Nabob died leaving debts and liabilities to a large amount unsatisfied, some of which were contracted by himself (and some by Ajeem Jah Bahadoor as Nabob Regent or Naib-i-Mooktar during the infancy of the late Nabob): and whereas it is doubtful whether the creditors of the Nabob have, without the consent of the Governor in Council of Madras, any remedy for enforcing their claims against the goods or property which belonged to the said Nabob at the time of his death; and especially whether any part of the property left by the said late Nabob, which was of the nature of State or Public property, can be made available for payment of such claims: and whereas the East India Company is willing to give up any right which it has to any part of such property which is in the nature of State or Public property, and to allow the whole property, real and personal, of whatever kind, left by the late Nabob after appropriating to the payment of his debts such portion thereof as is liable to the payment thereof, to be applied towards making provision for the family and dependents of the late Nabob: and whereas the said East India Company is also willing to pay in full, to such of the creditors as shall be willing to accept the same, in the manner herein mentioned, all such debts as shall be proved to have been fairly and justly contracted by the said Nabob or on his behalf during his infancy by the said Ajeem Jah as Nabob Regent, such debts to be estimated in respect of moneys at the amounts which may be proved to have been actually advanced to or paid for the use of the Nabob, and in respect of goods supplied or other matters at the amount which shall be proved to have been the fair and actual value thereof at the time when such debts were incurred, together with interest on such debts at a rate not exceeding six per centum per annum, the property of the said Nabob being applied in the first instance for that purpose, but any deficiency therein being made good by the said East India Company: and whereas the said Nabob is alleged to have mortgaged and created divers liens and securities upon cer-

tain portions of his property, of which or some of which the validity and extent of operation, especially as against the creditors of the said Nabob, is doubtful, and it may also be doubtful whether the same can be enforced in any of the ordinary Courts of Justice; and it is expedient that provision should be made for giving effect to the said mortgages, liens, and securities so far as the same shall have been created *bono fide* and for valuable consideration, and for affording a simple mode of ascertaining the rights of the parties claiming under such mortgages, liens, and securities: and whereas it is also alleged that various conveyances, deeds, and instruments have been executed by the late Nabob without valuable consideration in favor of persons who have under color thereof executed or created mortgages or assignments of, or securities or liens on the property comprised therein: and whereas it is expedient that provision should be made for investigating all such claims, and for protecting the *bono fide* creditors of the said Nabob from the effect of any conveyances executed by the Nabob under such circumstances as rendered them void as against such creditors, and for affording a simple mode of ascertaining the rights of the parties claiming in respect thereof as well as of parties claiming to be creditors of the Nabob: It is enacted as follows:—

- I. The Governor in Council of Madras shall immediately after the passing of this Act, appoint such person as he may think fit to act under the orders of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras in the administration of the property of whatever nature left by the said late Nabob. The person so appointed shall be designated "The Receiver of the Carnatic property," and shall have power to collect and take possession of all such property, and shall hold the same according to the provisions of this Act.
- II. The said Receiver shall be entitled to receive such a commission, not exceeding five per centum upon the amount or value of the property collected by and distributed under the provisions of this Act, as the said Governor in Council shall appoint, which commission shall be charged to the estate.
- III. The Governor in Council of Madras shall have full power to suspend or remove any person appointed such Receiver as aforesaid, and also from time to time to fill up any vacancy in such office which may be occasioned by death, retirement, suspension, or removal.
- IV. Such Receiver shall represent the estate of the said late Nabob in all proceedings relating thereto under this Act or otherwise, and shall do and perform all acts in performance of his duties or office in his official designation, and in all proceedings whether at law or in equity he shall be so designated; and no proceedings in which Receiver may be a party shall abate by reason of the death, retirement, suspension, or removal from office of any such Receiver, but the same shall be continued and carried on as if no such death, resignation, suspension, or removal had accrued.

Appointment of person, designated "Receiver of Carnatic property," to administer the estate.

Remuneration of Receiver.

Suspension, removal, &c. of Receiver.

Receiver to represent the estate in all proceedings.

V. The Receiver shall have full power to collect, take possession of, and get in all property, moveable or immoveable, belonging to the said late Nabob at the time of his death, and if necessary to sue for and recover the same in his own name as representing the said estate of the said Nabob under this Act, and to realize by sale or otherwise the value of the said property; and he shall proceed to collect, take possession of, and realize the same with all convenient speed immediately after the passing of this Act

VI. Upon a suit being instituted as herein-after mentioned, the said Receiver shall be deemed subject to the orders and general practice of the said Court in the same manner as any other Receiver specially appointed by the said Court, except that he shall not be called upon by the said Court to give security.

VII. It shall be lawful for any creditor or person interested in the proper administration of the estate and effects of the said Nabob, to apply for and obtain in a summary way, in the manner provided by Act VI of 1854, upon a summons to be served upon the person appointed Receiver, an order for the administration of the estate and effects of the said Nabob; and such order, in addition to the ordinary directions contained in the usual order for the administration of the moveable and immoveable estate of a deceased Mahomedan, shall direct that all creditors who may hold any mortgage or security upon any part of the estate or effects of the said Nabob shall come in and prove their claims and establish their securities and the consideration for the same, or in default thereof that they shall be barred and excluded from all benefit of their said securities; and the said Court shall also by the said order give such directions as to the notices to be issued to such creditors and otherwise, and shall direct such enquiries as to the Court shall seem fit.

VIII. Upon such order being made, the Court shall take an account of all debts and liabilities which were due from the said Nabob at the time of his death, and also of all the estate and effects of the said Nabob liable and available for the payment of such debts and liabilities; and shall also determine whether any and which of the said creditors had any and what mortgage or security upon any and what portion of the property of the said Nabob and for any and what consideration or amount, and whether such mortgage or security constituted a valid charge upon the whole or any and what portion of the property included therein.

IX. Every creditor of the said Nabob, who shall not come in and establish his claim under and according to the said order, shall be barred from all benefit of the said claim; and all persons who may hold or claim under any mortgage or security executed by the said Nabob or on his behalf, or upon any property whatsoever which belonged to the said Nabob in his lifetime, who shall fail

to come in and establish the same or the consideration for the same under and according to such order, shall be barred from all benefit of such mortgage or security: and the said Court may order the property affected thereby to be delivered up to the said Receiver.

X. In case it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Court that there is good reason to believe that any conveyance or other instrument executed by the said late Nabob in his lifetime was executed under circumstances which rendered the same void as against creditors, the said Court may, at any time pending the suit, order the person or persons claiming under such conveyance or instrument to come in and establish his claim under the same; and in default of compliance with the said order, the said Court may declare the said conveyance or instrument to be void as against the creditors of the said Nabob, and may order the property thereby conveyed to be delivered up to the said Receiver.

XI. No action or suit shall be commenced or prosecuted by any creditor of the said Nabob against any person as the representative of the said Nabob, otherwise than in accordance with the provision of this Act; and all actions and suits, which at the time of the commencement of this suit shall be pending at the suit of any such creditor against any person as representative of the said Nabob, shall abate; the costs of such suit, if the said Court shall consider it reasonable, to be paid out of the assets of the said late Nabob.

XII. Any person claiming to be a creditor of the said late Nabob, who within the period of three months from the passing of this Act shall file in the Office of the Master of the said Supreme Court a written declaration stating that he is willing to receive in full discharge of his debt such amount as shall be ascertained by the said Supreme Court to have been justly and fairly due to him from the said late Nabob at the time of his death and to remain unpaid (such amount to be estimated in respect of moneys at the amount which shall be proved to have been actually advanced to or paid for the use of the said Nabob, and in respect of goods supplied or other matters at the amount which shall be proved to have been the fair and actual value thereof at the time when such debts were incurred) together with such interest (if any) not exceeding the rate of six per centum per annum as shall be awarded by the said Court; and that he is willing to give up any mortgage or security which he may hold upon any part of the property of the said late Nabob—shall be entitled, upon giving up such mortgage or security to the said Receiver, to have the amount of his claim ascertained by the said Court in manner hereinafter mentioned.

XIII. The said Court, upon the application of such creditor, shall appoint a day for ascertaining the amount of his debt, and reasonable notice of the day so appointed shall be given to the Chief Secretary to the Government of Madras.

Court, upon application, to fix a day for the investigation, and to give notice thereof to the Chief Secretary to Government of Madras.

Receiver to collect, sue for, and realize the property.

Upon a suit being instituted under this Act, Receiver to be subject to the orders of the Court.

Suit for administration of estate.

Special directions to be given as to creditors holding mortgages or other securities.

Accounts to be taken.

Creditors or mortgages not coming in to prove claim, to be barred.

Court may order a person claiming under a conveyance executed by the Nabob under circumstances rendering the same void as against creditors, to come in and establish his claim.

Actions or suits against any representative of the Nabob.

Special application by creditor for immediate investigation of his claim by the Court.

XIV. Upon every investigation under Section XV of this Act, the East India Company may appear and be heard by Counsel.

XV. Upon the day so fixed or upon any other day to which the Court may think fit to postpone the investigation, the Court shall proceed to ascertain and determine in a summary way what sum was due from the said Nabob at the time of his death to the claimant. Provided that, in fixing the amount of any debt or claim under the provisions of this Section, the said Court shall not allow to any person claiming to be a creditor, in respect of money lent or advanced, any larger sum than the amount proved to have been actually advanced, together with simple interest thereon not exceeding the rate of six per centum per annum, notwithstanding any higher rate of interest may have been agreed to be paid; and that the said Court shall not allow to any person claiming to be a creditor, in respect of goods supplied or of any other matters, any larger sum than the amount which shall be proved to have been the fair and actual value thereof at the time when such debt was incurred, without reference to the price or sum which may have been agreed to be paid for or in respect thereof, together with simple interest thereon not exceeding the rate aforesaid, if the Court shall consider that the claimant is entitled to recover interest. If it shall appear to the said Court that the said debt remains due, the said Court shall issue an order for the payment of the amount so ascertained to be due, together with such interest thereon (if any) not exceeding six per centum per annum as the said Court shall consider that such creditor is fairly and justly entitled to recover. The Court may also, if it consider it reasonable so to do, order the costs of proving such debt to be paid out of the estate of the said late Nabob.

XVI. The amount ascertained by the Court to be due to the claimant upon the investigation under the last preceding Section, together with such interest and costs (if any) as shall be awarded by the Court, shall be paid to the claimant by the said Receiver within ten days after a copy of the order of the said Court shall have been served upon him. In case no sufficient assets belonging to the estate of the said late Nabob shall be in the hands of the Receiver to enable him to pay such amount, the same shall be forthwith paid out of the public Treasury of the East India Company. The amount so found due to such creditor as aforesaid for principal and interest shall be treated as a debt due to such creditor in taking an account of the debts and liabilities and of the estate and effects of the said Nabob in such administration suit as aforesaid.

XVII. If, after the decree of the Court in such administration suit as aforesaid, it shall appear that the amount paid to any such creditor out of the assets of the said Nabob exceeds the amount which under such decree would have been payable to such creditor if payment

had not been made to him under the last preceding Section, the difference between the amount so paid and the amount which would have been payable shall be made good by the East India Company and shall be paid to the Receiver to enable him to carry out the decree in respect of the creditors remaining unpaid.

XVIII. No action or suit shall be brought against the East India Company or any person for any thing done under the provisions of this Act, or for or by reason of any act, reasonable or proper, for the protection of the estate of the said Nabob or for realizing the assets thereof, which may have been done before the passing of this Act by any person under the orders or with the sanction of the Government of Madras.

XIX. 2. A report having gained credence in Camp, and reached the Enemy, that no forward movement would be made before the 20th February, the Nazim Mehundee Hussun had issued his orders for his Force, hitherto divided at Waree and Chanda, to be concentrated at the latter place, by the evening of the 19th February.

3. At 6 A. M., however, of that day, the Force under my Command marched from Singramow, in the following order:—the Advance Guard composed of the whole of our small party of Cavalry, of 240 selected Marksmen, of the three British Regiments and four Horsed Guns, under Lieutenant-Colonel Longden, 10th Regiment, was followed by the British Brigade, under Brigadier Eveleigh, C. B., and by the six Battalions of Goorkha Infantry, under Colonel Pulwan Singh, in column of route. The rear and baggage guards, consisting of five Companies of the 10th, 20th and 97th Regiments, and of three Companies of Goorkhas, with two Horsed Guns, under Major Radcliffe, 20th Regiment, closed the rear.

4. On reaching Koereepore, I learnt through spies, that the Enemy in possession of "Chanda," under the Chuckledar Bunda Hoosain, numbered 8,000 men; of whom 2,500 were Sepoys of the 20th, 28th, 48th and 71st Regiments N. I., and that the Nazim Mehundee Hussun was still at Waree, eight miles distant in a Southerly direction with 10,000 Men and 11 Guns. The junction of his Forces was therefore still incomplete and I determined to attack him before it could be effected.

5. Halting the force out of fire, I reconnoitred the Enemy's position.

"Chanda" is a large village, at the South-eastern angle of which are a considerable mud Fort and a Serai, both of great height, and loopholed for musketry. Round the village, Fort and Serai, a breastwork had been thrown up, and a ditch excavated, and six pieces of Artillery were placed in position in it and on its left. The principal strength of the position consisted in the close and high cultivation surrounding it on three sides, and rendering approach most difficult.

6. My reconnoissance being complete, at 11 A. M., I attacked in the following order:—The Marksmen were extended in skirmishing order out of range of the Enemy's Artillery; then advancing to 700 yards, they opened fire, which was immediately replied to by the Guns opposed to us.

Having thus drawn the Enemy's fire, and ascertained the position of his Artillery, 8 of our light Guns were brought up at a gallop, supported as quickly as possible by the two 18-Pounders.

Meantime, the main body followed in contiguous quarter distance columns, at deploying distance; the British Brigade in the centre, three Regiments of Goorkhas on the right, and three on the left; the Cavalry divided and covering the flanks; Captain Thring's four 9-Pounder Bullock Guns accompanied the Infantry in the centre. As they advanced into the Plain, these columns deployed into line.

7. The skirmishers and light Guns now gradually moved forward, the Enemy retiring before them, the Goorkhas threatening the flanks, and the British Brigade advancing in support in the centre.

In this manner the Force soon drove the Enemy before it, carried the position and captured 6 Guns, following the Rebels through and past the village.

When the exhausted skirmishers could no longer reach the Enemy, two of Major Cotter's Guns, and the Cavalry* galloping to the front, acted with great effect; the Cavalry charging and cutting up a number of the Rebels, and the Guns following them with a

destructive fire, till the dense thickets which bordered the plain forbid further pursuit.

8. The Force was then halted on the right of the road three miles beyond "Chanda."

9. Suspecting the Nazim to be now on the move from Waree on the left, I detached the Cavalry under Lieutenant C. N. Tucker, 8th Bengal Light Cavalry, and 2 Guns of Captain Middleton's Battery to watch that flank: while the Troops, fatigued by great heat and rapid movement, gained time to rest and refresh themselves, and liquor and cooked provisions were issued to them. The captured Artillery was also meanwhile collected.

10. When this had been accomplished, we took ground to the left across the road to the village of Amereepore, the better to cover the march of our baggage, and to meet the Enemy should he advance.

Later in the day, near sunset, when all hopes of his approach seemed at an end, and while the ground for encampment was being taken up, the Enemy appeared on our left front.

11. The Force immediately changed front, and attacked in the same order as in the morning.

12. The Nazim having suffered severely on his right, which was exposed in the open plain to our Artillery and Rifle fire, sought shelter in some thick mangoe groves to his left: thus endeavouring to work round my right, and bringing an 18-Pounder into action at a distance. But this attempt was speedily checked by the three Battalions of Goorkhas on that flank, who, under Colonel Pulwan Sing advanced, fired, and charged driving the Enemy before them.

13. The complete state of preparation in which the Nazim found us, when he had anticipated coming unexpectedly on our left rear, took him by surprise. The heavy fire with which he was received completed his discomfiture, and caused his almost immediate retreat in disorder towards Waree; his Guns having never been closely engaged, with the exception of the 18-Pounder before-mentioned. The lateness of the hour and his rapid flight alone, saved his Artillery from capture.

14. Thus terminated the action at an hour after dark: and the Force bivouacked on the ground it occupied at the close of the day. I estimate the Enemy's loss in these two actions to have been upwards of 800 killed and wounded.

15. On the 20th I remained halted; as the baggage, delayed by difficult ground, only arrived late on that day.

During this time the Enemy remained at Waree; my flank movement and his defeat at Amereepore, having thrown him off his direct line of retreat to Lucknow.

Report, however, tended to show that he contemplated making a wide circuit by our left, and occupying the strong jungle pass, position, and Fort of Budhuyan nine miles in our front: which if stoutly defended, would have considerably delayed my progress.

* A detachment of 25 mounted Soldiers of H. M.'s 10th Foot, and a few of the Benares Horse under Ressaldar Nuxbund Khan.

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But as he was kept in a state of uncertainty as to whether I might not attack him in front at Waree, or in flank if he should march towards Budhayan, to which place I was nearer than he, he deferred this movement till mine should be more distinctly defined, keeping his Troops constantly under arms watching mine.

16. At day break on the 21st, drawing up my Force in order of battle as if to march on Waree, I allowed the whole of my baggage to file away past my right rear towards Lumbooh,— the village of Roostum Suhia, a friendly Zemindar, who had shown that he was well affected towards the Government by the collection of supplies, and by safely escorting the bridge-of-boats from Singramow.

17. It having been given out that the Force would halt at Lumbooh, the Nazim, whose spies closely watched every movement, thought that he would still be in time to anticipate me at Budhayan.

But I pushed the baggage rapidly through the village of Lumbooh, and when this had been effected my advance guard under Lieutenant-Colonel Longden, withdrawing unperceived from Amereepore, overtook and headed the baggage, followed gradually by the whole Force which, by a rapid movement, seized Budhayan and occupied its Fort.

18. The Nazim thus missed his opportunity. He had been deceived as to my intentions sufficiently long to allow of the safe progress of my encumbrances though the defile of Budhayan, and had finally been forestalled in the possession of that strong position.

19. Five Companies of Goorkhas were thrown into the Fort, and six British Companies and two Guns posted on the Nullah which runs under it, assured the main Force encamped two miles in advances against attack on left flank or rear.

20. During the 22nd, I remained halted to allow the expected re-inforcements of Lahore Light Horse and Pathans to overtake me. In the course of this day the Nazim with the remnants of his Force, reached Badshahgunje two miles beyond Sultanpore, where he took up a position in the old Cavalry and Police Lines, and was joined by the fugitives from Chanda, by the whole of the mutinied Sepoys and Oude Irregulars of this District, and by the remains of the 7th Light and 12th and 15th Irregular Cavalry, the latter under Shaboodeen Khan, late a Ressaldar in the last named Regiment, and who had Command in the mutiny at Sultanpore. The Infantry was Commanded by the Rajah Hussen Ali Khan, of Hussunpore, assisted by his son and by Rhowani Sing, late Subadar of Infantry. The whole Force was under Mirza Guffoor Beg, a General of Artillery under the old King of Oude, re-instated in his rank by the present Rebel Government, and sent from Lucknow specially to take this Command.

21. The Rebel Force, numbering 25,000 Men, of whom 5,000 were Sepoys and 1,100 Cavalry, with 25 Guns, occupied a position, a sketch of which accompanies this Report, and which was drawn by Lieutenant Innes, Assistant Field Engineer, from information furnished by Lieutenant Smith, 58th N. I., attached to the Goorkhas, and by Lieutenant Tucker, 8th Bengal Cavalry, who were stationed at Sultanpore at the time of the mutiny. On this plan, drawn up before the ac-

tion, my operations were based. The position may be described as follows:—

22. A deep and winding ravine runs into the Goomtee, behind which the Enemy's line was posted in a plain, his left resting on the Sultanpore Bazar, the centre placed behind the ruined lines of the Police Battalion, and the right covered by a range of low hillocks in advance of the village and strong masonry Serai of Badshahgunje. This position is about a mile and a half in length. The direct road from Sultanpore to Lucknow intersects it at right angles, and on this, at the point where it crosses the Nullah, the Enemy's principal Battery was directed.

His other Guns were distributed along the position, three being posted in the village near the Bazar and Temple on his extreme left, and six in the Serai and village of Badshahgunje and to its right.

23. Marching at 6 A. M. from my ground in front of Budhayan, in the same order as in the 3rd paragraph of this Report, on arriving within a mile of the village of Loramow, my Cavalry caught sight of the Enemy's outposts: on which I formed my Force in order of battle, the front being covered by the 240 selected Marksmen of the British Brigade, and eight Horsed Guns under Lieutenant-Colonel Longden, 10th Foot, the Guns being 100 paces in rear of the skirmishers. The two 18-Pounders advanced in the centre along the high roads which runs through the Enemy's position. The British Brigade was formed in contiguous quarter distance columns at 25 paces interval, supported in second line by the 6 Battalions of Goorkhas, in quarter distance columns at deploying distance.

24. Moving through the village in this order, till fully in sight of the Enemy's picquets, who thus concluded that our advance would be, as they wished directly down the high road, I advanced with the Benares Horse under Captain Matheson, and the Detachment of 25 mounted Men of Her Majesty's 10th Regiment, under Lieutenant Tucker, and drove in the Enemy's outposts beyond the Nullah, and through a thick belt of trees which concealed their Force from ours.

Having done this, leaving the Benares Horse to prevent their outpost from again reconnoitering us, I moved with the Mounted Detachment to the left to examine the head of the Nullah which I felt convinced disappeared in the plain: and this proved to be the case, for my search found a point where the road from Allahabad crosses it, where the Troops and heavy Guns could pass the ravine out of reach of the Enemy's fire. Some rising ground here gave me a good view of the Rebel position, and ascertaining that it might be turned by its right, I ordered the whole Force to take ground obliquely to its left.

25. My Baggage and Rear Guards under Lieutenant-Colonel Turner, C. B., 97th Regiment, were halted in rear of the village of Loramow, where the road to the station of Sultanpore branches off from the road to Lucknow.

The movement of the Force, unperceived for a long time by the Enemy, brought it round his right completely out of fire; the shot from his heaviest Guns, when he at length caught sight of our flank march, falling for short of our columns.

26. The skirmishers, who had been moving in file to flank, covering this movement, now turned to the front, and, with the light Guns, closed on the

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Enemy's position, the whole Force advancing in two lines in their rear, on the right flank of the Enemy, who, disconcerted by being thus turned was compelled to change the position of his heavy Guns, most of which it rendered useless. The left of my Force now came on the high road to Lucknow, dividing the Enemy's line, a part of which at once retreated along that road, taking with them the 4 Guns which had been on their extreme right.

My right now rested on the Nullah, and the left beyond the village of Badshahgunje.

27. The left, circling gradually forward, drove the Enemy from the different points of his position placing him with his back to the deep Nullah before described, (which here made a bend round his rear) and entirely cutting him off from his line of retreat. Finally, his central Battery of 5 heavy Guns was captured after an obstinate resistance, the Gunners standing by their pieces and serving them to the last.

The body of Hussun Ali's son was here found amidst slain, and the State palanquin of the Nazim lay in its neighbourhood.

28. After these Guns fell into our hands, the Enemy fled in all directions, escaping across the deep ravine in his rear. Three Guns and a considerable body, still retaining some formation, retired towards the station of Sultanpore, near which, taking post about a temple and in a thick grove, they continued to fire till finally driven from their Guns by two Regiments of Goorkhas.

29. The action was now at an end: the plan beyond the ravines was every where covered with fugitives, whom my want of Cavalry precluded my pursuing, and the ravines prevented the further advance of the Guns. Two Guns of Captain Middleton's Battery, and the small detachment of British Horse, however, continued the pursuit for nearly two miles along a comparatively open strip of land, and overtook and captured in a ravine 2 Guns which the Enemy had succeeded in withdrawing so far.

30. Halting the main body of the Force to cover the collection of the captured Ordnance, I pursued that portion of the Enemy, which had retired by the Lucknow road, for four miles with the 20th and 97th Regiments, and four Battalions of Goorkhas; and the mounted Soldiers of the 10th, under Lieutenant Tucker, followed these Guns for nine miles; but so precipitate had been the Enemy's flight that they were unable to come up with them; but some ammunition waggons and much baggage fell into our possession.

31. Thus ended the battle of Sultanpore, in which, with only 11 Casualties on our side, an Army of about 25,000 Men was driven from a position of great strength, and scattered to the winds, with the loss of 1,800 men killed and wounded, and leaving 21 Guns, 9 of them of seige calibre in our hands.

32. I am full of gratitude for the achievement of these great results with so trifling a loss of life.

The effect has been to open the road to Lucknow for the unopposed march of this Force, as well as for that of the Maharajah Jung Bahadoor,

who has taken this route, instead of that of Fyzabad, as he originally intended.

33. The Force halted after the action at Badshahgunje; where it was joined the same evening by the Lahore Light Horse, and Pathan Horse under Captain Balmain. Next day was employed in the destruction of the whole of the captured Artillery, for which I had no means of transport and of the stores of ammunition and material for gun-carriages, which were found in the town of Badshahgunje, where the Nazim's gun-carriage manufactory appears to have been situated. On the evening of the 24th, the 3rd Seikh Horse, the remaining portion of the Cavalry, detached by His Excellency, reached me.

34. On the 25th, in compliance with the telegram from the Chief of the Staff received the previous night, the Force resumed its march, reaching the same day Moosafirkhana, 20 miles, and on the 26th Jugdespore, 16 miles, where it was found absolutely necessary to halt on the 27th, to give the cattle rest.

35. By the 28th February, I reached Hydrurgurh, 16 miles, and on the 1st March halted at Selimpore, 18 miles from Lucknow: thus arriving as directed by His Excellency, within one march of that City on that date.

36. In this day's march occurred one of the most dashing Cavalry combats I have ever heard of.

Captain Aikman, Commanding the 3rd Seikh Cavalry, on the advanced picquet with 100 of his Men, having obtained information just as the Force marched on the morning of the 1st, of the proximity, three miles off the high road, of a body of 500 Rebel Infantry, and 200 Horse, with 2 Guns, under Moosahib Ali Chuchledar, attacked and utterly routed them, cutting up more than 100 Men, capturing the Guns, and driving the survivors into and over the Goomtee.

This feat was performed under every disadvantage of broken ground, and partially under the flanking fire of an adjoining Fort.

I regret to add, that Lieutenant Aikman received a severe sabre cut in the face: which will not, I trust, long deprive me of the services of an enterprising an Officer.

37. On the evening of the 1st, the Force having made a march of eighteen miles, encamped in the Nullah of Selimpore; with the Goomtee half a mile on its right. The town of the same name was abandoned by the Enemy at the first sight of our Cavalry, though the strong earth-works surrounding it, which must have been for weeks in course of construction, might have been expected to encourage them to withstand our advance.

38. Immediately on my arrival at Selimpore at 7 P. M. on the 1st March, I reported the circumstance by Cossid for his Excellency's information, and solicited further instructions. A duplicate of this Report was despatched by a second runner in the forenoon of the 2nd.

On the evening of the 3rd a messenger from Captain Bruce, Deputy Quarter Master General of the Army, brought me an order to advance on Lucknow.

39. Accordingly, on the 4th at 6 A. M., I marched from Selimpore, and reached without opposition a mosque a mile beyond the town of Ameythee, eight miles from Lucknow.

40. Here intelligence was brought that a large body of Rebels with 2 Guns were posted in and round the Fort at Dhowrara, two miles to the right of the road, and situated in very difficult ground amongst ravines which run into the Goomtee.

I had hitherto passed such Forts when situated at a distance from the road without taking any notice of their Garrisons, who almost universally evacuated them when left in rear of our Force.

But being apprehensive that this party, if left unmolested, might annoy my long train of baggage, I resolved to drive them out.

41. The main column under Brigadier Evelegh, C. B. moved on a mile further on the road to Goorsaheegunje, where it halted; while with the two Horse Artillery Guns of Lieutenant-Colonel D'Aguilar's Troop under Lieutenant Arbuthnot, a Squadron of 9th Lancers and some Seikh and Pathan Horse, the whole under Captain Coles, 9th Lancers, I examined the Fort. About 500 Rebels originally occupied it, while nearly 3,000 were collected in its vicinity, most of whom fled down the ravines and escaped over the river when they saw our Cavalry circling round their flanks: 200 however fell back and prepared to defend it.

42. The Enemy having opened fire on our approach from 2 small Guns, the two Horse Artillery Guns were brought into action at 600 yards, the Native Cavalry threatening the Enemy's flanks and the 9th Lancers being held in reserve well out of fire. The Guns were subsequently moved up successively to 400, 300 and 200 yards, but though they silenced the Enemy's Artillery fire, they failed in putting down that of the matchlockmen securely posted behind the parapet.

43. I therefore ordered up a Company of Marksmen from each British Regiment under Lieutenant-Colonel Longden, 10th Foot, and two 24-Pounder Howitzers of Major Cotter's Madras Battery; after a few rounds from which the outer enclosure of the Fort and the Guns mounted there were abandoned. But a sharp matchlock fire was

still kept up from the loopholes which every where pierced the keep into which the greater part of the defenders had retired. The Company of the 10th Foot was now extended in a meadow on the river side of the Fort, and closed on it in that direction, while the Companies of 20th and 97th attacked it from the South-east. A few of the assailed, seeing themselves on the point of being surrounded, rushed out of the Fort, and attempted to escape up one of the ravines, but after a desperate resistance they were despatched by the Native Cavalry posted watching every outlet.

44. The Companies of the 20th and 97th now effected an entrance, gallantly headed by Captain Middleton, 29th Regiment, and Ensign Elton, 37th Native Infantry, attached to 10th Foot, and bayoneted about 120 of the occupants.

45. But a report was now brought from Brigadier Evelegh, that considerable bodies of the Enemy were hovering on his right front, and that he had disposed the Force to meet them.

46. Repeated attempts having failed to break down the door of a house in which the survivors had barricaded themselves, the shot from one of their own Guns which we turned against it, making no impression on the massive gate, a fire kindled against it having no effect, and my only Engineer Officer, Lieutenant Innes, having been severely wounded, while trying to burst open the entrance, I determined to withdraw from the place. The Guns having fallen into our hands, I considered it unnecessary to risk a further loss of life, and of time, especially as it was now represented that my presence was required with the Force. I accordingly drew off the Infantry; carrying with us the 2 captured Guns, whose removal was accomplished under the heavy matchlock fire which the Enemy continued to pour from the loopholes, principally by the personal labour and exertions of Lieutenant-Colonel Maberly, R. A., and his Quarter-Master Lieutenant Strange, R. A., of Captain Middleton, H. M.'s 29th Regiment, Provost Marshall to the Force, of Major Chichester, and Lieutenants Morgan and Gould, 97th Regiment, and Lieutenant Bradford, Madras Artillery.

47. I regret to add that Lieutenant Percy Smyth, 97th Regiment, a most brave and promising young Officer, here received a musket ball through the abdomen, from the effects of which he died the same night.

48. Galloping to the main body, I found that the alarm of attack had been caused by the appearance of a body of Horse, who had however fallen back towards the City.

The Force resuming its march, reached his Excellency's Camp without further interruption, the same evening.

49. It now becomes my pleasing duty to enumerate the Officers to whom I am indebted for their cordial support during the operations above described. Brigadier Evelegh, C. B., Commanding the British Brigade, and Lieutenant-Colonel

Wroughton, in Military charge of the Goorkhas, deserve my warmest acknowledgments of the prompt and able manner in which they have seconded me in the three actions of Chanda, Amereepore, and Sultanpore. The Officers on their respective Staff, viz., Captain A. B. Johnson, 5th Regiment N. I., Brigade Major, British Brigade, Ensign Burne, 20th Regiment, Brigade Quarter-Master, and Captain Bennett, 20th Foot, Orderly Officer to Brigadier Eveleigh, and Captain Steel, 17th N. I., Staff Officer to the Goorkha Force, are mentioned by the Officers under whom they serve as having rendered them every support in their several positions.

50. Lieutenant-Colonel E. Maberly, R. A., Commanding the Artillery of the Force, by his unwearied exertions and able performance of the arduous duties of organizing and superintending the Ordnance Park under circumstance of great difficulty, has earned my best thanks; and he has set a brilliant example to the Officers of his Arm in the Field in the different actions in which he has been present. Lieutenant-Colonel Maberly speaks in high terms of the Staff Officers attached to him; Lieutenants Smart and Strange of the Royal Artillery.

51. To Lieutenant-Colonels Fenwick, Lys and Ingram, Commanding respectively the 10th, 20th and 97th Regiments, I have to record my thanks for the skilful and spirited manner in which they invariably led their Regiments.

Lieutenant-Colonel Longden, 10th Foot, is an Officer second to few in Her Majesty's Service in attainments and experience; and I specially selected him on all occasions to Command my advanced Guard of Marksmen and light Guns, a duty invariably performed by him with an intelligence and gallantry not to be surpassed.

52. To Colonel Pulwan Singh, Commanding the Goorkha Force, I am under great obligations for his hearty co-operations; and he has been well supported by his Lieutenant-Colonels Shumshere Sing and Indra Sing, and by the Senior Major Chumpa Sing. The steadiness and intelligence of the Nepaulese Troops under these excellent leaders have been the subject of general admiration, and I have had occasion specially to allude to the conduct of the right Brigade in the action of Amereepore.

53. Major Cotter, Commanding a Battery of Madras Artillery; Captain Middleton, Commanding his own Battery of Royal Artillery; Captain Thring, Commanding a Battery of 9-Pounders, and Captain Waller, R. A., in charge of two 18-Pounders, rendered most efficient service by the masterly way in which they handled their Guns. Lieutenant Simeon, Bengal Artillery, Commanding two Bullock Guns, and Lieutenant Percivall, Bengal Artillery, Deputy Commissary of Ordnance, have merited my approbation.

54. Lieutenant T. T. McLeod Innes, Assistant Field Engineer, has been of the greatest assistance to me with his professional aid. I have already

mentioned his distinguished conduct at the attack on the Fort of Dhowrara. It is now his due to relate that at the action of Sultanpore, far in advance of the leading skirmisher, he was the first to secure a Gun which the Enemy were abandoning. Retiring from this, they rallied round another Gun farther back, from which the shot would in another instant have ploughed through our advancing columns, when Lieutenant Innes rode up unsupported, shot the Gunner about to apply the match, and remaining undaunted at his post, the mark for a hundred matchlockmen, sheltered in some adjoining huts, kept the Artillery Men at bay, until assistance reached him. For this act of gallantry, surpassed by none within my experience, it is my intention to recommend him for the honorable distinction of the Victoria Cross.

55. The Cavalry was Commanded at Chanda by Lieutenant Tucker, 8th Light Cavalry, at Sultanpore, by Captain Matheson, late 13th Irregular Cavalry, and the excellent services of these Officers are duly appreciated by me. The 1st named Officer made a most dashing charge at Sultanpore with the 25 mounted Men of H. M.'s 10th Regiment, and killed numbers of the Enemy.

56. Lieutenant Cary, 37th Regiment Native Infantry, in charge of the Treasure Chest, and Captain Middleton, H. M.'s 29th Regiment, Provost Marshal, invariably accompanied me in the Field, and were most useful in carrying orders. The latter Officer has already been mentioned as actively instrumental in withdrawing the captured Guns at Dhowrara, and throughout the time he has been with the Force he has displayed in no small degree activity, intelligence, and daring.

57. The Medical arrangements of the Force under Surgeon C. A. Gordon, M. D., 10th Foot, have met with my entire approval, and the Commissariat Officers, Lieutenant Chalmers, 53rd Native Infantry, Lieutenant H. R. Wroughton, 40th Native Infantry, and Lieutenant Bolton, 50th Native Infantry, have been most assiduous and successful in the discharge of very arduous duties, as has Lieutenant Rawlins, 17th Madras Native Infantry, Baggage Master. Messieurs Lind, Jenkinson and Venables, Civil Service, accompanied the Force in the action at Chanda and Amereepore. In the former action Mr. Venables, charging the flying Enemy with the Cavalry, with whom he did good service, received a severe spear wound through the thigh.

58. Mr. P. Carnegie, Special Commissioner with the Force, and head of the Intelligence Department, has rendered me most valuable aid. His information regarding the Enemy has proved so correct, that on it alone the whole of my operations might have been planned: he has always accompanied me in the Field and assisted in conveying orders under the heaviest fire. To his knowledge of the locality and skilful guidance is to be principally attributed the capture of the 2 Guns which I have mentioned in the 29th paragraph of

this report as having been overtaken by Captain Middleton, R. A.

59. To the Officers of my personal Staff my best thanks are due.

Captain Havelock, 18th Royal Irish, late 10th Foot, Deputy Assistant Adjutant General, merits my special acknowledgments. On my appointment to this Command in December last he hastened to join me, though still suffering from severe wounds received at Lucknow.

Since then his great intelligence, unwearied energy, and devotion to his duties, have won him the admiration of every one in this Force.

60. Lieutenant J. Wall, 87th R. I. Fusiliers, Deputy Assistant Quarter Master General, and my Aide-de-Camp Lieutenant H. Henderson, 10th Foot, have afforded me the most zealous and efficient support in their respective positions, and I beg to commend them to the favorable consideration of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief.

61. I should be committing an injustice were I to omit to mention the Officers who Commanded the Rear and Baggage Guards of my Force; Lieutenant-Colonels Turner, C. B., Legh, and Burton, of the 97th, Majors Radcliffe and Butler, of the 20th, Chichester, of the 97th Regiment, and Pennyquick, R. A. To the strict performance of most unattractive duties by these Officers, not less than the patient endurance of exposure by day and night of fatigue and hunger by the Men under their Command do I owe the fact, that not one single article of Baggage nor one animal has fallen into the hands of the Enemy.

To estimate correctly the value of these services it must be recollected that a train of upwards of 2,000 carts, drawn in many instances by very inferior cattle, has been safely conducted, most of the

time, without any aid from Cavalry, over roads often unbridged and nearly impassable, and through a country swarming with a hostile population. Amongst these Officers, Lieutenant-Colonel Turner, C. B., 97th Regiment, claims my special commendation for his masterly disposition of his Rear and Baggage Guards at the village of Loramow during the battle of Sultanpore.

On the splendid discipline, firm constancy and dashing courage displayed by this Force, both Officers, and Men, it is needless for me to dilate; the results they have gained will speak, for themselves. Suffice it to say that it has marched 130 miles, has beaten an immensely superior Enemy in

four actions, and has captured* (34) thirty-four pieces of Ordnance with the loss in all of only 37 Officers and Men killed and wounded.

I beg to record here, before too late, my thanks to the Officers who invariably Commanded the three Companies of selected marksmen (who formed my advanced guards and were always the first to encounter the Enemy); Captain Norman, 10th Foot, Captain Lyons, 20th, and Major Chichester, 97th Regiment.

Report, dated the 6th Instant, from Major-General Sir J. E. W. Inglis, K. C. B., Commanding Cawnpore Division, of his recent expedition to Hurra, in which the portion of the 8th Irregular Cavalry, engaged under the Command of Captain A. M. Mackenzie, behaved with marked gallantry.

SIR,

AGREEABLY to instructions received from His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief through the Chief of the Staff, I assembled the Force, noted in the accompanying Return, at Oonao, on the evening of the 4th, and marched for Hurra at 3 A. M. on the 5th. On approaching that place, which is surrounded on three sides by an immense mangoe tope, some Sowars of the Enemy were observed by our advanced Cavalry to retire rapidly; as we neared the village two or three shots were fired, and information received that the Enemy, not more than 200 or 300 in number, were escaping to our left front. I immediately directed Captain Mackenzie, Commanding 8th Irregular Cavalry, to follow and ascertain their movements, and I have the honor to enclose the Report of that Officer, by which it will be perceived that he followed the fugitives, and cut to pieces the Rebel leader and 25 of his Men. I then entered the village of Hurra which is naturally an exceeding strong position, and having ascertained from Captain Evans, the Deputy Commissioner, that he considered it would tend more to the quieting of the District to establish Thannah there than to destroy the Fort, I placed 20 Matchlockmen and Burkundazes in the post, which I have no doubt they will hold against any Force that be brought against them.

In conclusion, I beg to be permitted to bring to the favorable notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, the excellent services rendered by Captain Mackenzie, who, with the faithful remnant of his corps, most gallantly charged and destroyed a troublesome Enemy (Lultah Sing) and his body guard, all of whom rallied around their leader and fought desperately. The conduct of the Native Officers Non-Commissioned Officers and Men was admirable as also was that of Assistant Surgeon Currie, who accompanied Captain Mackenzie, and whose care of the wounded afterwards was unremitting.

Captain Evans was with me the whole time, and I am much indebted to him for the valuable information his local knowledge enabled him to afford.

I reached Oonao on my return at 5-15 P. M. yesterday, and the Force marched into Cawnpore morning.

Camp Chandairee, 17th March 1858.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of the Major-General Commanding Central India Field Force, that the Fort of Chandairee was carried by assault at 5 A. M., this day, by the Troops of this Brigade. The breach was reported practicable last evening and proved a fair one; the impetuous rush of the stormers of the 86th and 25th Regiments, carried everything before it. Captain Keatinge, Political Assistant, was, I regret to say, severely wounded whilst forward in the storming party. I beg to enclose a List of Casualties on our side. The loss of the Enemy is unknown at present; but, in and about the Fort, there are from forty to fifty bodies. Their flight was most precipitate, and they scattered over the surrounding jungle in every direction, with the exception of about two hundred, who, somewhat in a body, fled northwards. All the Guns in the Fort, eight of iron and two of brass, are in our possession. Major Robertson is in charge of the Fort, but I propose to make it over to the Sir Soobah of Seindiah, after having entirely demolished the bastion we breached. The town of Chandairee is now entirely freed from Rebels, and the inhabitants are resuming their occupations. The Sir Soobah has now charge of the gates of it, which, up to this morning, have been strongly held by the Rebels, who cut off all communication with it from my Brigade.

2. Lieutenant Dowker arrived here at half past 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, giving me information of the approach of Captain Abbott, with a considerable body of Irregular Cavalry, from the northwards. I instantly despatched a letter by a Native Officer's party of the 3rd Regiment C. H. C. to Captain Abbott, informing him of my intended attack on Chandairee this morning, and desiring him to invest the North side of the Fort.

* Till this day at noon at this place. This letter most unfortunately never* reached Captain Abbott, and to its mis-carriage must be attributed the escape of some of the Enemy.

3. I shall forward a Despatch giving all particulars of the Siege of Chandairee, for the information of the Major-General, as soon as possible.

Legislative Council of India.

The 7th August 1858.

THE following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 7th August 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee who are to report thereon after the 11th of November next :—

A Bill for conferring Civil jurisdiction in certain cases upon Cantonment Joint Magistrates, and for constituting those Officers Registers of Deeds within the limits of their respective jurisdictions.

WHEREAS it is expedient that Cantonment Joint Magistrates should be invested

Preamble. with Civil Jurisdiction in certain cases within the local limits of their Criminal jurisdiction, and that they should also be appointed Registers of Deeds within the same limits ; It is enacted as follows :—

I. It shall be competent to the Governor General in Council and to the Executive Government of any Presidency or place to invest the Joint Magistrate of any Military Cantonment, Bazar, or Station, within the limits of their respective Governments, with Civil jurisdiction, to hear and determine actions of debt and other personal actions against all persons of the description mentioned in Section 157 Act XIX of 1847, and against all other persons not amenable to the Articles of War for the Queen's and Company's European Troops serving in India, who are residing or carrying on any trade or business within the limits of such Military Cantonment, Bazar, or Station, provided that the value in question shall not exceed the sum of two hundred Rupees, and that the defendant was a person of the above description when the cause of action arose and when the suit was instituted, and provided also that no suit shall be brought before the Court of any such Joint Magistrate to determine any dispute of caste or concerning any right to real property.

II. Whenever the Joint Magistrate of any Military, Cantonment, Bazar, or Station shall be invested with Civil jurisdiction under the provisions of the preceding Section, and so long as he shall remain so invested, so much of Act XI of 1841 as authorizes the Commanding Officers of Stations or Cantonments to convene Military Courts of Requests for the trial of actions of debt and other personal actions as aforesaid, shall be suspended within the limits of such Cantonment, Bazar, or Station.

III. Whenever in either of the Presidencies of Madras or Bombay an Officer shall be invested with Civil jurisdiction as aforesaid, and so long as he shall remain so invested, the Rules for the trial of small suits in Military Bazzars at Cantonments and Stations occupied by the Troops of those Presidencies respectively, shall cease to have effect within the jurisdiction of such Officer.

Also the Rules in force in the Madras and Bombay Presidencies for the trial of small suits in Military Bazzars.

Bazzars at Cantonments and Stations occupied by the Troops of those Presidencies respectively, shall cease to have effect within the jurisdiction of such Officer.

disturbed state of the country whereby access to such Court was rendered dangerous or difficult, provided that the plaintiff or appellant, according as the case may be, shall present his petition of plaint or appeal, or, if the suit or appeal shall have been previously instituted but shall have abated for want of prosecution, shall make an application for the re-admission of the same within three months from the passing of this Act or from the time when the cause above stated shall cease to exist.

III. If the application be for the admission of a special appeal, the appellant may present his application either in the Sudder Court, or in the Court from whose decision the appeal is made for transmission to the Sudder Court.

IV. The petition of plaint or appeal in any original suit or regular or special appeal falling within the provisions of this Act, which may be instituted, for the first time, under Section I or Section II, shall be written on stamp paper of the value prescribed for regular suits and appeals ; but an application for the re-admission of an original suit or appeal, which shall have been previously instituted but shall have abated for want of prosecution, may be written on plain paper.

V. No original suit or appeal, which may have been instituted or re-admitted in any Civil Court in the North-Western Provinces subsequently to the said 10th May 1857, shall be liable to be dismissed, nor shall any decision passed in any such suit or appeal be reversed on the ground that at the date of its institution the period allowed by law for the admission of the suit or appeal had expired, or that the suit or appeal had abated for want of prosecution (according as the case may be) ; if, at the time the period allowed by law for instituting or prosecuting such suit or appeal expired, the sittings in the Court by which it was cognizable, or in which it was pending were suspended, or access to such Court was rendered dangerous or difficult by reason of the disturbed state of the country.

VI. For the purposes of this Act, the certificate of the Zillah Judge that the sittings in any Court within his jurisdiction were suspended, or that access to any such Court was rendered dangerous or difficult, owing to the disturbed state of the country during any particular period, shall be deemed conclusive evidence of the fact.

VII. This Act may be extended by the Governor General in Council, or by the Executive Government, to any District within the limits of their respective jurisdictions.

Extension of Act.

IV. Whenever the Joint Magistrate of any Military Cantonment, Bazar, or Station shall be invested with Civil jurisdiction under the provisions of this Act, no person amenable to the Articles of War for the Native Troops of the East India Company, who may be liable to be sued before such Joint Magistrate for any cause of action cognizable by him, shall be sued elsewhere.

V. Provided that nothing in the preceding Sections shall be held to alter or affect the Rules in force in the Madras Presidency for the trial by punchayet of suits against Military persons belonging to that Presidency.

VI. In cases instituted under the provisions of this Act, the Plaintiff shall prefer his claim in writing to the Court of the Joint Magistrate having jurisdiction over the same; and if the Defendant be a Native Officer or Soldier or a Mustered Camp Follower, the summons to appear and answer to the claim shall be transmitted, for the purpose of being served on the Defendant, to the Commanding Officer of the Corps or Detachment to which such Defendant may belong; and the Commanding Officer shall return the summons to the Joint Magistrate, with the acknowledgment of the Defendant endorsed thereon; or if the summons cannot be served, the reason of the non-service shall be stated. In other respects the rules of procedure and all other rules contained in Act XI of 1841 shall be applicable to such cases, and to the execution of the decrees passed therein so far as the same are applicable, provided that the decisions of the Joint Magistrate in cases cognizable by him under this Act, shall not be open to revision or appeal, and provided further that it shall not be necessary to publish in Station Orders the decrees passed in such cases before they are carried into execution, and the Joint Magistrate passing the decree shall determine whether the execution shall be general or special, and shall proceed of his own authority with the execution.

VII. It shall further be lawful for the Governor General in Council or for the Executive Government of any Presidency or place to appoint the Joint Magistrate of any Military Cantonment, Bazar, or Station, subject to their respective Governments, Register of Deeds within the limits of such Cantonment, Bazar, or Station; and when such appointment is made, and so long as it shall continue in force, the powers of the Register of Deeds of the Zillah or District in which such Cantonment, Bazar, or Station is situated, shall be suspended within the limits thereof.

VIII. Whenever the Joint Magistrate of any Military Cantonment, Bazar, or Station shall be appointed Register of Deeds under this Act, all Rules for the time being in force applicable to Registers of Deeds shall be applicable to such Joint Magistrate and to the deeds registered by him, or brought to him for registry.

IX. Every Joint Magistrate who shall be invested with Civil Jurisdiction, or who shall be appointed Register of Deeds under the provisions of this Act, shall, previously to entering upon the performance of his duties, make and subscribe before the Chief Civil Officer, or, where there may be no Civil Officer, before the Chief Military Officer of the District or Zillah in which such Cantonment, Bazar, or Station is situated, a declaration to the like effect as is required to be made and subscribed by Civil Judges and Registers of Deeds by the Laws in force in the several Presidencies of Bengal, Madras, and Bombay.

No Contract allowances will be drawn for the repair of Guns, Carriages, Carts, Harness and Saddlery.

The equipments of the Royal Artillery in India and materials of all kinds for keeping them serviceable, will be supplied from Magazines.

Each Troop or Battery will indent annually on the 1st January, on the nearest Magazine, for the

supplies necessary to complete its authorized detail of Ordnance equipment, appointments, stores, tools, and implements, and materials for repairs. These indents should be prepared in the Form laid down in Bengal Military Regulation Section XL., Page 288, and, after being duly countersigned, forwarded to the Inspector General of Ordnance at each Presidency. Additional supplies, when emergently required at other intervals, will also be issued from Magazines or Depôts under the rules laid down for emergent indents in Bengal Military Regulations Section XL., Paras. 10 to 14, Commanding Officers being further allowed a discretionary power to purchase materials on the spot when they cannot be got from the Public stores in sufficient time. In such cases, Contingent bills supported by a copy of the order authorizing the purchase, will be forwarded to the Military Auditor General, Ordnance Department, for audit.

The annual and the occasional supplies will be issued on indents from the Troop or Battery, countersigned by the Officer Commanding the Artillery Division, and by the Major General Commanding the Royal Artillery in India, or the Senior Officer Commanding the Royal Artillery at the other Presidencies.

In the case of emergent indents, the countersignature of the Brigadier Commanding the Station will be a sufficient voucher for the supply, such indents being prepared in duplicate, and dealt with as laid down in Military Regulation Section XL., above quoted.

Officers Commanding Troops and Batteries are to account in the usual form for the equipments, stores and materials received or purchased, expended, and remaining in use or in store, to the Ordnance Audit Departments of their respective Presidencies. In Bengal, the account will be rendered in a Half-yearly Return transmitted on the 1st May and 1st November, the Form of which has been already furnished. The expenditure of the stores, &c., for the repairs during the half year will be detailed in a paper annexed to the Return, and to be vouched at foot by a Certificate from the Officer Commanding the Artillery Division, that in his opinion the expenditure was reasonable and proper.

The sums expended in repairs, for fuel, or other contingencies not already provided for, will be charged in Monthly Contingent Bills, duly attested on honor, which, after being counter signed by the Officer Commanding the Artillery Division, will be forwarded for Audit, to the Military Auditor General, Ordnance Branch, who will pass them on for payment to the Pay-Master Queen's Troops.

Officers Commanding Troops and Batteries will draw the usual monthly Contract allowance for shoeing and stable equipments.

“ Where Bungalows have been rented, the absolute amount of rent shall be charged among the Officers occupying the Bungalow, provided that the charge to any one Officer does not exceed the amount of his tentage.

“ Where Bungalows have been repaired by the Executive Engineer at the expense of Government; or where vacant public buildings have been assigned for quarters, a fair rent shall be fixed by the Executive Engineer and similarly charged.

“ Where, in the absence of all other quarters, Officers have been obliged to occupy vacant Regimental Barracks, on which no public money has been expended to fit them for Officers' Barracks no charge shall be made.

“ The charge shall be made by the Pay-Master, who will retrench on certificates of value of quarters, or amount of rent furnished by the Barrack-Master, according to the foregoing Rules.”

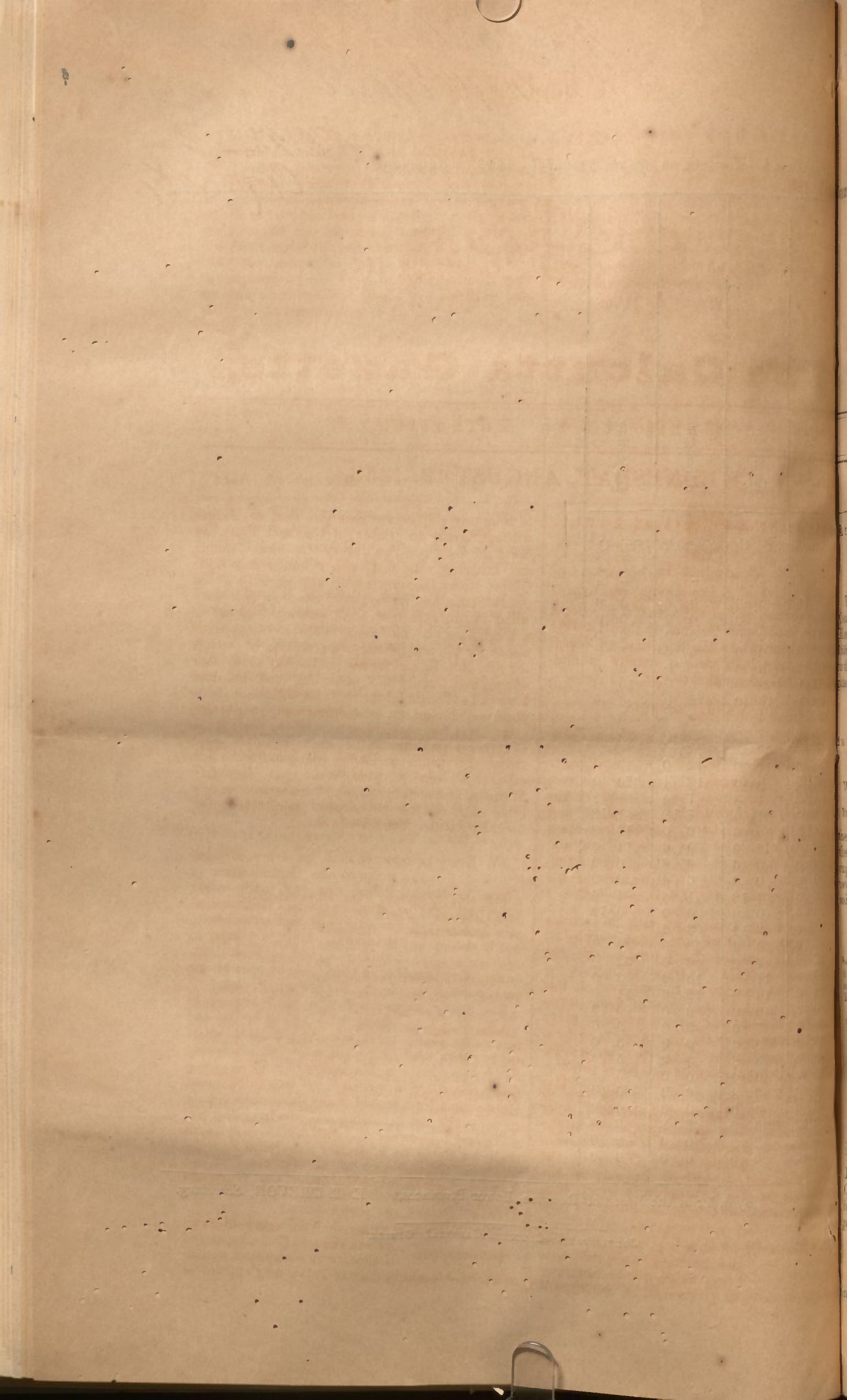

Legislative Council of India.

The 7th August 1858.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honourable the Governor General on the 31st July (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 7th August 1858), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXVIII OF 1858.

Act for the maintenance of a Police Force for the Port of Madras.

HEREAS it is expedient to make further provision for the security of the traffic between the shore and shipping in the Port of Madras, by increasing the Police Force; and whereas it is just and expedient that the said traffic should contribute towards the expenses and maintenance of the Force; It is enacted as follows:—

To meet the expense of such an increase to the Police Force, established under the provisions of Act XIII of 1856, as may be necessary for the purposes of this Act, the sum of three annas shall be charged and taken by the owner of every boat employed to convey cargo or goods to or from any ship or vessel in the Port of Madras, in addition to the hire payable under Act IV of 1842.

I. No cargo or goods of any description shall be conveyed in any boat to or from any ship or vessel in the Port of Madras unless accompanied by an Officer of the Police Force, and it shall be the duty of the Commissioner of Police to provide every such boat with an Officer of the Police Force for this purpose.

III. The owner of any boat and the tindal and boatmen for the time being employed in any boat in which any cargo or goods shall be conveyed to

or from any ship or vessel in the Port of Madras without having an Officer of the said Force on board of such boat, and every boat-owner, tindal, and boatman who shall either hinder any such Officer from accompanying any such boat or shall obstruct him in the performance of his duty when in any such boat, shall, on conviction before a Magistrate, be liable as follows: every boat-owner for the first offence to a penalty not exceeding fifty Rupees, and for a second or any subsequent offence to a penalty not exceeding one hundred Rupees; every tindal for the first offence to corporal punishment not exceeding twenty stripes of a rattan, and for a second or any subsequent offence to corporal punishment not exceeding twenty-five stripes of a rattan; and every boatman for the first offence to corporal punishment not exceeding fifteen stripes of a rattan, and for a second or any subsequent offence to corporal punishment not exceeding twenty stripes of a rattan.

IV. Every boat-owner shall on every Monday make to the Commissioner of Police, or to such other person as the said Commissioner of Police shall appoint to receive the same, a return in writing, signed by such boat-owner, of the number of trips made by each of his boats on each day during the preceding week.

V. Every boat-owner who shall neglect to make such return as in the next preceding Section specified, shall, on conviction before a Magistrate, be liable for a first offence to a penalty not exceeding fifty Rupees, and for a second or any subsequent offence to a penalty not exceeding one hundred Rupees; and every boat-owner who shall make a false return shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding three hundred Rupees, and to the forfeiture of all licenses which he may hold under the provisions of Act IV of 1842.

VI. Every boat-owner shall on every Monday pay to the said Commissioner of Police, or to such other person as the said Commissioner of Police may appoint to

receive the same, the said sum of three annas for every trip made by any boat belonging to him, employed in conveying cargo or goods, according to the weekly return to be made by him as heretofore directed; and in default of such payment, one or more of the boats of any boat-owner making such default may be seized and sold by virtue of a warrant under the hand and seal of a Magistrate until the amount so due by such boat-owner and the expenses of sale shall be realized; and such amount, when realized, shall be forthwith paid to the said Commissioner of Police.

VII. All monies paid to or received by the said Commissioner of Police under this Act shall be paid by him, at least once a month, into the General Treasury of Fort Saint George.

VIII. No conviction, order, or judgment of any Magistrate under this Act shall be quashed for error of form or procedure, but only on the merits; and it shall not be necessary to state on the face of the conviction, order, or judgment, the evidence on which it proceeds; but the depositions taken, or a copy of them, shall be returned with the conviction, order, or judgment in obedience to any writ of *certiorari*; and if no jurisdiction appears on the face of the conviction, order, or judgment, but the depositions taken supply that defect, the conviction, order, or judgment shall be aided by what so appears in such depositions.

IX. None of the foregoing provisions of this Act shall be taken or deemed to extend or apply to any boat which shall convey only, mails or passengers with their baggage to or from any ship or vessel in the Madras Roads.

X. From and after the passing of this Act it shall be lawful for the Commissioner of Police and the members of the Police Force at Madras to exercise, within the limits of the Port of Madras as defined under the provisions of Act XXII of 1855, all powers given to them respectively by Act XIII of 1856, or which may be lawfully exercised by Constables within the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court; and all provisions of the last-mentioned Act, applicable to the said Commissioner and Police Force at Madras, shall apply to them respectively in the execution of the powers hereby given.

XI. This Act shall take effect from and after such day as shall be notified in the Official Gazette by the Governor in Council of Fort Saint George.

THE following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Honorable the Governor General on the 31st August 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 7th August 1858), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXIX OF 1858.

An Act for the relief of persons who, in consequence of the recent disturbances, have been prevented from instituting or prosecuting suits or appeals in the Civil Courts of the North-Western Provinces within the time allowed by law.

WHEREAS, during the recent disturbances in the North-Western Provinces, many of the Civil Courts were compelled to suspend their sittings for considerable periods; and whereas, during the interval, the time allowed by law for instituting and prosecuting original suits and appeals in many cases expired, and it is proper to provide relief for the plaintiffs and appellants in such cases; It is enacted as follows:—

1. Whenever, subsequently to the 10th May 1857, the sittings in any Civil Court in the North-Western Provinces may have been suspended in consequence of the disturbed state of the country, it shall be competent to such Court to receive and try, or re-admit any original suit or appeal within its jurisdiction, in which the period allowed by law for instituting or prosecuting the same may have expired during the time that the sittings of such Court were so suspended, provided that the plaintiff or appellant, according to the case may be, shall present his petition for such suit or appeal, or, if the suit or appeal shall have been previously instituted but shall have been discontinued for want of prosecution, shall make an application for the re-admission of the same within the period of three months from the date on which the principal Civil Court of original jurisdiction in the District shall issue a proclamation, copies of which shall be affixed in some conspicuous place in the several Courts and in the Office of the District Collector and Magistrate of the District, notifying that the Courts of the District, or such of them as it is intended to re-establish, have resumed their sittings.

2. In like manner any Civil Court in the North-Western Provinces may receive and try, or re-admit any original suit or appeal in which the period allowed by law for instituting or prosecuting the same may have expired subsequently to the said 10th May 1857, if it shall appear to the satisfaction of such Court that the plaintiff or appellant in such suit or appeal was precluded from instituting or prosecuting it within the limited period, owing to the

disturbed state of the country whereby access to such Court was rendered dangerous or difficult, provided that the plaintiff or appellant, according as the case may be, shall present his petition of plaint or appeal, or, if the suit or appeal shall have been previously instituted but shall have abated for want of prosecution, shall make an application for the re-admission of the same within three months from the passing of this Act or from the time when the cause above stated shall cease to exist.

III. If the application be for the admission of a special appeal, the appellant may present his application either in the Sudder Court, or in the Court from whose decision the appeal is made for transmission to the Sudder Court.

Application for admission of special appeals to whom to be presented.

IV. The petition of plaint or appeal in any original suit or regular or special appeal falling within the provisions of this Act, which may be instituted, for the first time, under Section I or Section II, shall be written on stamp paper, of the value prescribed for regular suits and appeals; but an application for the re-admission of an original suit or appeal, which shall have been previously instituted but shall have abated for want of prosecution, may be written on plain paper.

Stamps in what cases necessary.

V. No original suit or appeal, which may have been instituted or re-admitted in any Civil Court in the North-Western Provinces subsequently to the said 10th May 1857, shall be liable to be dismissed; nor shall any decision passed in any such suit or appeal be reversed on the ground that at the date of its institution the period allowed by law for the admission of the suit or appeal had expired, or that the suit or appeal had abated for want of prosecution (according as the case may be); if, at the time the period allowed by law for instituting or prosecuting such suit or appeal expired the sittings in the Court by which it was cognizable, or in which it was pending were suspended, or access to such Court was rendered dangerous or difficult by reason of the disturbed state of the country.

Saving of certain proceedings had after 10th May 1857.

VI. For the purposes of this Act, the certificate of the Zillah Judge that the sittings in any Court within his jurisdiction were suspended, or that access to any such Court was rendered dangerous or difficult, owing to the disturbed state of the country during any particular period, shall be deemed conclusive evidence of the fact.

Certificate of Zillah Judge to be conclusive evidence of the suspension of the sittings of the Court, &c.

VII. This Act may be extended by the Governor General in Council, or by the Executive Government of any Presidency or place, to any District within the limits of their respective jurisdictions.

THE following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 7th August 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee who are to report thereon after the 11th of November next :—

A Bill for conferring Civil jurisdiction in certain cases upon Cantonment Joint Magistrates, and for constituting those Officers Registers of Deeds within the limits of their respective jurisdictions.

WHEREAS it is expedient that Cantonment Joint Magistrates should be invested with Civil Jurisdiction in certain cases within the local limits of their Criminal jurisdiction, and that they should also be appointed Registers of Deeds within the same limits; It is enacted as follows :—

Preamble.

I. It shall be competent to the Governor General in Council and to the Executive Government of any Presidency or place to invest the Joint Magistrate of any Military Cantonment, Bazar, or Station, within the limits of their respective Governments, with Civil jurisdiction, to hear and determine actions of debt and other personal actions against all persons of the description mentioned in Section 157 Act XIX of 1847, and against all other persons not amenable to the Articles of War for the Queen's and Company's European Troops serving in India, who are residing or carrying on any trade or business within the limits of such Military Cantonment, Bazar, or Station, provided that the value in question shall not exceed the sum of two hundred Rupees, and that the defendant was a person of the above description when the cause of action arose and when the suit was instituted, and provided also that no suit shall be brought before the Court of any such Joint Magistrate to determine any dispute of caste or concerning any right to real property.

Executive Government may invest Cantonment Joint Magistrates with Civil jurisdiction in certain cases.

II. Whenever the Joint Magistrate of any Military Cantonment, Bazar, or Station shall be invested with Civil jurisdiction under the provisions of the preceding Section, and so long as he shall remain so invested, so much of Act XI of 1841 as authorizes the Commanding Officers of Stations or Cantonments to convene Military Courts of Requests for the trial of actions of debt and other personal actions as aforesaid, shall be suspended within the limits of such Cantonment, Bazar, or Station.

Part of Act XI of 1841 suspended in Cantonments where Joint Magistrates are so invested with Civil jurisdiction.

III. Whenever in either of the Presidencies of Madras or Bombay an Officer shall be invested with Civil jurisdiction as aforesaid, and so long as he shall remain so invested, the Rules for the trial of small suits in Military Bazars at Cantonments and Stations occupied by the Troops of those Presidencies respectively, shall cease to have effect within the jurisdiction of such Officer.

Also the Rules in force in the Madras and Bombay Presidencies for the trial of small suits in Military Bazars.

IV. SIR,

I have the honor to inform you, that having proceeded yesterday to the Suspension Bridge over the river Doorghootee, as I informed you in my letter of yesterday was my intention, with Force as per margin, I then gained information

that the Rebels (whose numbers were variously stated,) had burnt the Mail and looted a village some two miles distant, and were at that time, 3½ o'Clock P. M., cooking their dinners in a garden by the side of the river Doorghootee.

I therefore proceeded towards the village named Derkillee, and previous to arriving, I saw traces of the Rebels, in smouldering timber and ashes along the road side, which apparently have been hickerjes or carts. On arrival at the village of Derkillee, I found the place had been looted and the Dak horses taken, and obtained information from an old man who had been slightly maltreated, that the Rebels were cooking in a garden beside the river, about a mile from the road. I therefore advanced, and after seeing many running away before I came within shot, I detached a party under Captain Godfrey, to the front, diverging slightly towards the left flank, myself with the main body proceeding direct through the village, in which we found no one, but saw large bodies of armed men and a few horsemen fleeing on the other side of the river.

Captain Godfrey had commenced firing on the left, where the Rebels were posted in a tope of trees, and drove them across the river into a village the other side. I therefore crossed the river with the main body to intercept their retreat, and drove them out of a garden, (where we saw their dinners cooking,) and through the village, but their flight was so expeditious, that I could not get near enough them to do much damage.

Captain Godfrey reports that there were at least 200 men armed with firelocks, in the part of the village on his side of the river, and at first they seemed inclined to stand firing at his men from the houses, but on hearing the firing on their flank, and receiving some sharp volleys from his men, they fled, pursued by him through the village, and by my party on emerging from the cover; but I regret to say, from my having to skirt a bend in the river, the distance was too great to permit me to do much execution.

It being now sundown, and the Rebels in full retreat in a south-west direction from the main Trunk Road, I ceased the pursuit, and returned to my waggons, which I had left at the village of Derkillee, now some four miles distant, and reached them at about 8½ o'Clock P. M. when I started again for this place, and reached it at about 12 o'Clock at night. I am happy to say there were no casualties on my side: the loss on the side of the Rebels was 10 killed, and there were probably more slain in the villages. It is impossible to

determine the numbers accurately, but I should say there must have been some 150 or 200 men armed with firelocks and 300 budmashes. The Sikhs captured some six horses, which I believe to be Dak horses.

On the road home, some of the men picked up torn shreds of letters and envelopes, which I have in possession.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report to you, for the information of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General, that several contradictory reports were brought in by spies, on the morning of the 25th Instant, regarding the Enemy at Belwa. One was that two Guns, one of them a Horse Field Battery Gun, had been sent, with about 200 Sepoys and some Irregulars, by the Rajah Dabee Bux, to Gonda, the afternoon before, and that he himself and the rest of the Force, with the other Field Battery Gun and three or four other Guns, were to follow the same evening or next morning. Another report came in that there was a large body of the Enemy, with several Sowars, out in front of our left, not far from Camp. Shortly after it was reported that the Enemy were advancing on us

Columns, but no Guns. The Enemy had
 ed the spies, for in the evening, after dark
 the Guns and men
 sent to Gonda returned
 to Belwa. I ordered
 out the Force* imme-
 diately, being always
 ready to stand to
 our arms, and moved
 out a little in front
 of Amorah and our

to meet and attack the Enemy. Other
 s soon came in that the Rebels were coming
 in force, in three separate Columns, consider-
 ably separated, on our right, centre and left. This
 led me to divide my already small Force
 into three Columns. The left Column I detached
 Major Cox, Her Majesty's 13th Light In-
 fantry, and Captain Sotheby, R. N., Command-
 er of the Cavalry Brigade, with two Guns, 12-Pounder
 and one small Mountain Train Gun, taking
 her two with me. We moved, separating
 right and left. The left Column first came
 in contact with the Enemy. The Sowars and
 of Rebels on our right soon gave way as I
 proceeded with the right Column, and I ordered
 a couple of 24 Pounder Rockets, under the super-
 vision of Lieutenant Grant, R. N., to be
 fired into a large body of the Enemy, in a wood
 near the village, creating great confusion among them,
 using them rapidly to retire. My move to the
 left, no doubt, also shook, and tended to the rear
 of our left Column, of the centre of the
 column with their two Field Battery Guns, a
 12-Pounder Howitzer and a 9-Pounder, firing our
 Government shot, shell and shrapnel. I pressed
 forward completely to drive the Enemy back, and
 the left Column moved to their left, after a large
 part of the Enemy with Guns. Receiving reports
 from Major Cox, by Orderly Troopers and Dr.
 Cox, Her Majesty's 13th Light Infantry,
 the Enemy were in force on his left, I re-
 ceived my move, and proceeded to form a junction
 with the left Column across country for about
 three miles, and over very bad ground for Guns.
 Reaching the left Column, I formed up in line
 on their right, immediately sending forward
 skirmishers from the 13th Light Infantry and
 the Cavalry Column. This reinforcement and move-
 ment, and Captain Sotheby advancing with
 two Guns, and the left Column moving for-
 ward at the same time, shook the Enemy into
 confusion; but this was hardly done, when I received
 an urgent report from a Villager, that the Enemy
 were again advancing on our right by the Belwa

road. Bringing them into our then rear, and di-
 viding our Camp, I prepared immediately to
 move back again to the right with the right
 Column, sending out a Patrol of Cavalry for in-
 formation, and sending word of this to Major Cox
 and Captain Sotheby, and that I must leave them
 to deal with the Enemy on the left. I was obliged
 to return with the loss of a part of the 13th Light
 Infantry, and my portion of the Naval Column,
 which had got considerably in advance skirmishing,
 at Captain Sotheby's request I left him the
 Cavalry. Lieutenant Burlton, with his party of
 Seikhs, left by Major Cox, in his rear, as a
 support on the Belwa road, till I should join him,
 detached to my Column. While moving back
 across country, the Cavalry Patrol came back, con-
 firming the report of the villager. As soon as

I crossed the Belwa road, I formed up in order
 our small thin line, with the two Guns in the cen-
 tre, and had just sufficient time for these gallant
 Troops to rest, and refresh a little on the ground,
 and to get water after the great heat and fatigue,
 when the Enemy moved into and occupied a wood
 and a village to their left in our front, and very
 shortly opened fire on our line from their two Horse
 Battery Guns. The 9-Pounder shot and shell at
 first fell short of our line, the former rolling by or
 through it. I ordered a few Skirmishers of the
 13th Light Infantry immediately to occupy a
 wood to our right front, and the right Squadron,
 under Captain Jenkins, the portion of the Bengal
 Yeomanry Cavalry then with me, to move from
 our left by the rear, rapidly round to the right by
 the wood, and advance and threaten the Enemy
 on their left flank, and to press them as close as
 possible, and to charge whenever it was prac-
 ticable. The line was immediately advanced,
 with the Marines and a few more of the
 13th Light Infantry and the Seikhs as Skirmishers
 in front, to get the two small Howitzers within
 range. After throwing a few shells, and the rifles
 of the Skirmishers beginning to tell on the Enemy,
 and Captain Jenkins, with the right Squadron of
 the Bengal Yeomanry Cavalry, making a bold,
 steady and rapid movement, within a few hun-
 dred yards of the Enemy, they retired, but again
 halted in position and continued their fire. The
 Enemy opened fire repeatedly on the Cavalry, and
 three horses were wounded by a shrapnel shell;
 but they had no opportunity for an effective
 charge. Our advance was continued until we got
 into the wood and position the Enemy had oc-
 cupied. Before the Enemy retired, Captain
 Sotheby had ordered two or three Rockets from
 the left to be thrown in the direction of the
 Enemy at about 2,000 yards, one of them setting
 fire to the village on the Enemy's right. On
 advancing to attack, I felt anxious to be reinforced
 on account of the weakness of my Column, and
 not knowing what numbers the Enemy might
 bring up from their rear, and feeling certain the
 Enemy must have completely retired from the
 left Column, as there had been little or no firing
 since I left it. I availed myself of the Commis-
 sioner, Mr. Wingfield's services, who was well
 mounted, to carry orders to Major Cox and
 Captain Sotheby to join me without delay, send-
 ing forward the left Squadron Bengal Yeomanry
 Cavalry quickly in advance, both my Orderly
 Troopers' horses being too fatigued to move rap-
 idly. In consequence of a Nullah with deep
 water and mud between us, the left Column had
 to move a considerable distance round by the
 rear to join me, and by the time they came up,
 the Enemy had completely retired towards Belwa.
 After the Troops had rested a little and obtained
 water, and there being no Enemy in sight, we
 returned to Camp, reaching it about 7 P. M.

I am happy to say we had no casualties, but the
 Troops had to encounter great fatigue and great
 heat during operations, taking up nearly the en-
 tire day, and most zealously and cheerfully did
 the Officers and Men of all arms go through it,
 though not without adding, I regret to say, to
 our sick list. The Enemy were reported to be
 about 4,000 Sepoys and Irregulars, 150 Sowars
 and 4 Guns. One tumbril, with some ammunition,
 was captured, and brought in the next morning
 by a Detachment of the Bengal Yeomanry Cavalry.

The Enemy are reported to have lost, killed and wounded, about 60 or 80. The Rebels are very quick and expert in carrying off their killed and wounded, especially the latter, from their great dread of falling prisoners.

My best thanks are due to Major Cox, Her Majesty's 13th Light Infantry; Captain Sotheby, R. N., of H. M. S. "Pearl;" to Major Richardson, Commanding Yeomanry Cavalry; to Captain Barclay, 68th Native Infantry, in Military charge of the Gorucknath Regiment; and to my Major of Brigade, Captain Morgan, 22nd N. I., who has so often and constantly attended me in the Field, for their zealous services, and to Lieutenant and Adjutant Rowley, Her Majesty's 13th Light Infantry, who was most active and intelligent as my Orderly Officer during the chief part of the day. The zealous, active services of my acting A. D. C., the Hon'ble V. A. Montague, I am sorry I lost on this day, from his being on the sick list. My best thanks are also due to Colonel Byroop Singh Kooer, and to Major-Captain Sewukram Thappa, of the Gorucknath Regiment, for their zealous exertions with their men, and to all the Officers and Men of all arms engaged in action during these operations, for their unwearied and cheerful exertions. I was very glad to avail myself of the services of Captain Brooks, 1st Cavalry, though on the sick list, to take charge of our Camp, and the few details of Troops I could allow for its protection. To Mr. Wingfield, the Commissioner, my best thanks are due, for his kind readiness to afford me every assistance in the Field, and also to Deputy Magistrate Shekh Kairoodeen, present in the Field, and ready and active in giving every assistance. I beg to bring all to the most favorable notice of the Governor General, the Right Hon'ble Viscount Canning.

I beg to annex Reports from Major Cox, Her Majesty's 13th Light Infantry, and from Captain Sotheby, R. N., having reference to the action and operations of this day, for the further information of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General.

SIR,

I BEG to acquaint you, after leaving you yesterday, in charge with Major Cox, of the Left Wing, and two small Howitzers, we soon found the Enemy, about 1,000, in position on the road, with two Guns, and in the topes and villages on either side. A sharp fire was kept up by both parties; but as we advanced, they retired, and dashing forward the Skirmishers, they eventually

retreated along the road, firing their Guns occasionally; in doing so, having pursued them two miles and the heat being intense, we soon retired about the same distance, when information was received that another body, with three Guns, were firing on a small body of Cavalry thrown out to watch our left flank. We immediately moved towards them, and found, at about two miles off the road, a considerable Force was the Rajah of Gonda, in some topes and villages. After waiting about twenty minutes to keep communication with you, I advanced with two Howitzers, and after a few shots from the Enemy they retired, several shells with good effect. Four dead bodies being discovered in their position, we rapidly advanced on them, when Captain Chapman, with a Troop of Bengal Yeomanry Cavalry, moved quickly to the right to threaten their return to Belwa, when they precipitately retreated to the Gogra, and I understand they crossed.

As it was useless pursuing any farther, we halted the men being much fatigued and many struck down by *coup-de-soleil*. We then retired, in order to join your party, when we observed you being in hot action with another body of the Enemy, and had an opportunity of throwing a few Rockets right into the tope where the Enemy was, and which appeared to hasten their retreat.

All the Men and Officers with the Left Wing behaved admirably, and though the Enemy made very good practice with their Guns, I am happy to say, we met with no casualties; the fatigue from the intense heat was most harassing.

I beg to inform you of the Officers on the Field and strength of the Naval Brigade

Four small 12-Pounder Howitzers, two of the Mountain Train.

HAVING, during the engagement which place yesterday, been entrusted by you with the Command of a Column as per margin, I have the honor to report as follows as to its proceedings.

Seeing that the Enemy were posted in force on the Belwa road, I at once advanced in that direction, covered by Skirmishers of the 13th Light Infantry, and Bengal

Battalion, with the Seamen and Guns of Caval Brigade, supported by the Goorkhas the Squadron of Cavalry on the left flank soon came within range of the Enemy's Guns, and were for a short time exposed to a fire from them, but continued steadily to advance, Captain Sotheby taking every opportunity of bringing his Howitzers into action. We moved in this manner for nearly 3 miles, and drove the enemy clear away from our front.

When halted for about half an hour, when informed by the Cavalry Patrol, which I sent out on our left, that the Enemy were moving up in that direction with three Companies of Men, I immediately started off, and took up a position opposite them, keeping them occupied by our Guns and Skirmishers until your arrival, a simultaneous advance was made, however, immediately afterwards you found it necessary to check the Enemy in another direction, continued to advance with the Column under my command until the Enemy were completely driven from the Field, and a number of them were compelled to retreat in the direction of Belwa, excepted by Captain Chapman's Squadron, compelled to cross the Gogra.

This operation having been completed, I received orders to rejoin you, which I did with as little delay as possible, considering the very extended state of most of the men.

Both advances were made with the utmost steadiness and precision by all the Troops under the respective Commanders; but I would be especially obliged to express my obligations to Captain Sotheby, R. N., for his cordial and zealous cooperation with me; it is mainly to be attributed to his skill and promptitude with which the two advances were worked under his immediate direction, we were enabled, without any casualty on our part, to cause a considerable loss to the Enemy, as the number of dead bodies we saw on the Field, must have had 50 or 60 killed and wounded in the second advance; they were also obliged to take a tumbrel on the Field, which fell into

our hands. Lieutenant Leet, 13th Light Infantry, acted as my Orderly Officer during the day, and was conspicuous for the steadiness and zeal with which he carried and explained my orders to the Skirmishers, on several occasions under a heavy fire.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, that in obedience to the orders received by me on the 27th Ultimo, directing me to proceed up the Ganges with Mr. Thompson, Magistrate and Collector of Allahabad, for the purpose of seizing and destroying any boats that might be in the possession of the Rebels on the North Side of the River opposite this District, I embarked on the 28th Ultimo,

on board the Hon'ble Company's Steamer *Berhampootee*, in Command of the Force detailed in the margin.

In accordance with the wishes of Mr. Thompson, Magistrate of Allahabad, we steamed up the River to observe the positions of the boats on the Oude side, of which we had already pretty accurate information, and on the morning of the 30th arrived below Manickpore, where we found that the Rebels, under Madho Sing, a brother of Benee Madho, of Shunkerpore, were assembled to the number of 800 or 1,000 men, and had erected a Battery to oppose the further progress of the Steamer.

As their arrangements appeared to be made principally with a view to the defence of the front, or River face of their position, I determined to land and attack them in rear, while the Guns from the Steamer shelled them in front.

I landed a little below Manickpore with Lieutenant and Adjutant Shaw, and 90 men of the Allahabad Military Police, and Captain Golab Sing, Attariwallah, and 40 men of his Sikh Police Corps. As we advanced, we found the Rebels strongly posted in and below the Fort of Manickpore, and in the villages of Manickpore, Meergurwah and Shahabad, from whence they opened upon us and upon the Steamer with round shot and musketry.

We drove them from each of these positions in succession, killing several, as they endeavoured to make a stand at each place, and took possession of their Fort, which we had no means of destroying; as it is an old Gurree strongly built of pucca bricks.

They had, however, got their Guns away before we got into this place, and on our perceiving a large body of men, many of whom were apparently old Sepoys, formed up with two Guns in a tope of trees on a rising ground about $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile to the North-west, I again advanced to attack them, and thanks to the steadiness and gallantry of the Officers and Men who were with me, notwithstanding that their Guns opened upon us at 200 yards, we again drove them out of this position,

and followed their Guns up to within 200 yds of Kalleekunker; but my men were then too exhausted to run any distance, and we could not overtake them, although we got close to them several times; they were drawn by horses, and were pressed on with all speed.

During all this time, nothing could be done but the practice from the 2 12-Pounder Howitzers which had remained on board the *Berhampootee* with Mr. Thompson; they were served by Sergeant J. Carroll and four Gunners of the 3rd Company, 5th Battalion Bengal Artillery, and continued throwing shell and shrapnell, mostly at a distance of 500 and 600 yards, among the Rebels in front, as Captain Dixon, the Commander of the Steamer, brought his vessel steadily up the River by the Battery on the bank, until within 500 yds of the Fort of Kalleekunker; and now having accomplished the object for which we landed, finding that a large Force was coming down the direction of Kalleekunker, I returned to board, and we proceeded down the River to Kurra.

I cannot give an accurate estimate of the loss which the Enemy may have sustained in killed and wounded, as although I personally can only speak with certainty to twenty men on their side having been killed, I should say that their loss, from our fire and that of the Steamer, was very much greater. Native spies who have been at Manickpore, report 150 killed and 100 wounded.

We had altogether seven men wounded, of whom two were very severely.

Captain Golab Sing was in the front the whole time with his men, and behaved with gallantry and courage; many of his men are old Soldiers. But I would wish particularly to bring to your notice, the conduct of the men of the new Sikh Levies of his Division, who were during the first advance kept in the rear as a reserve, until reaching the second village we attacked, (Meergurwah) rather obstinately defended, I ordered them up to the front; they were led by Lieutenant Sher, under the fire from this village for more than 80 yards before they were allowed to advance, nor did they show any disposition to waver, although two of their number were shot down. They delivered their fire by word of Command, and steadily as if on parade, and took the village with a rush.

On our return downwards towards Allahabad we landed and destroyed, or took away, boats in the following places:—

At Gutnee we destroyed one boat and took away two more.

At Karaytee, we took away three boats.

At Sumejpoore, we expected to be opposed, but the boats at that place were close under the Gun which is held by Chutterpal Sing, with about 20 men and 3 small Guns. On our landing, however, he evacuated the Fort and retired, allowing us to burn without opposition the seven boats we found there.

At Jehanabad, we burnt eight boats, and about two miles below Jehanabad, another boat was destroyed, making altogether 22 boats taken away and destroyed during the expedition.

We returned to Allahabad this morning, the 1st August 1858.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General, that the expedition sent under my charge, for the seizure of the boats on the Oude side of the River Ganges, returned yesterday morning, having taken and burnt the boats noted in the margin.

The expedition met with no opposition till its arrival at Manickpore, four miles on the East or this side of Kalleekunker. Here we found 2 Guns with some 800 men posted in the villages surrounding the Fort ready to oppose us. Captain Dennehy, in Command of the Police Battalion, will give you an account of the dislodgement of Rebels from the various posts, and of the successful issue of the fight.

I was enabled, while Captain Dennehy was occupying the Rebels on shore, to examine the River, but could find no boats. Two had been reported to me as being near the Fort, but these must have been removed up to Kalleekunker, or sunk in deep water, as no trace could be found of them.

The Fort of Manickpore is situated on a mound some 300 feet high and rising abruptly from the River, and is surrounded by houses, with broken ground on the North or land side. The work, therefore, to be performed by Captain Dennehy's small Force was no light one. The Rebels, with 600 Matchlockmen, 200 regular Sepoys and two Guns, disputed every inch of ground, and it was not till they found their Guns were on the point of being captured, that they eventually retreated across the open country. The fight had, however, lasted for two hours and a half, and Captain Dennehy's small Force was too much fatigued (even if it had been advisable) to follow up the fugitives.

I have mentioned these few facts of the nature of the engagement, in hopes that you will prominently bring forward to the notice of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General, the cool and steady conduct of this newly raised Corps.

In conclusion, I beg to testify to the willingness and alacrity with which Captain Dixon, in Command of the Steamer, and the rest of his Crew assisted us on every occasion.

from Brigadier Douglas, C. B., Commanding the disturbed Districts of Behar and Ghazee-pore, reporting his operations against the Rebels in the Ghazee-pore District, from the 16th to the 19th July 1858:—

FROM
BRIGADIER JOHN DOUGLAS,

ALLAHABAD.
Steamer Patna, 20th July 1858.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to state, for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, that hearing at Dinapore on the 13th Instant, that the Post at Beyriah of 100 Sikh Infantry, and 20 Sikh Cavalry, was besieged by a force of about 1,000 men, 250 of whom were supposed to be Sepoys, I proceeded there on the morning of the 14th, with 200 men, Her Majesty's 10th Foot, and accompanied by Major Sir H. Havelock, and Captain Stevenson; the Force had no tents, no baggage of any description. On arriving at Sheopore Ghaut, 6 miles from Beyriah, I was met by Lieutenant Jennings, 3rd Sikh Cavalry, Commanding the Post, and Mr. Probyn, Joint Magistrate of Ghazee-pore, who informed me that the Enemy, after attacking them for two days, had retired to Bulliah, having lost about 20 Sepoys. Not wishing to give the men an unnecessary march I left them at Sheopore, and went up to Beyriah with my Staff to inspect it. The house chosen for the Troops stands in a large enclosure, with a deep tank on one side, a high wall on another side, a nullah on a third side, and on the fourth small houses. I cannot give too much credit to Lieutenant Jennings and Mr. Probyn, who received great assistance from Mr. Dunné, an Indigo Planter, for the excellent dispositions for defence made, all the walls loop-holed, breast-works and barricades thrown up, and flanking fire obtained; they had also stored plenty of provisions. At 5 p. m., I marched for Bulliah, and arrived there on the morning of the 16th, the Enemy had retired, and were in a tank a few miles off. On being attacked, Captain McMullin, Sikh Police Battalion, Commanding the Post, had sent express off for reinforcements, and the number of Cavalry and Infantry sent, principally from Buxar, was unnecessarily large. This part consists of 200 Sikh Infantry and 30 Sikh Cavalry; the men are at present in a building in an enclosure which has been loop-holed; regular barracks for 300 men will be ready in about a month. Finding so large a number of Troops, I at once sent off a Force, under Command of Major Rolleston, 84th Regiment, consisting of 24 men, 84th, on elephants, 72 men Madras Cavalry, and 3rd Sikh Cavalry under Lieutenant Baker, Police Battalion, and 392 men of the Police Battalion under Captain McMullin. In about four hours they came up with the Enemy and exchanged some shots, but night coming on they lost the track. On the morning of the 17th, I proceeded with 20 men, 84th, on elephants, 60 men, 3rd Sikh Cavalry, and 30 men, Military Train, in the same direction as the other Force. We came up with Major Rolleston's party about 10 o'clock, (they not having been able to discover the Enemy's track,) and all proceeded together. The villagers baffled us in

every way as to information, and it was not till the afternoon that Sir Henry Havelock discovered their true track. I sent him on with the Native Cavalry to endeavour to come up with the Enemy, and intercept them if possible, till the infantry could arrive. Sir Henry Havelock came up with them about 6 P. M.; they were marching in regular order in Column of Companies, about 200 strong, the Villagers having all left them. He kept as close to their flanks as he could, but lost them in the dark. I followed with the Military Train and the Infantry, and Elephants came on as well as they could, but were totally unable to keep up. The day had been extremely hot, and the march could not have been less than 40 miles. It was 8 P. M. when I halted at Munhar on the Gogra. On the morning of the 18th, Sir Henry Havelock again picked up the track, but so fast had the Sepoys marched, that he was 10 miles behind them, and his horses were completely beat. On reaching the village of Phursata in the Azinghur District, he sent back to me for orders, and on my telling him that I could give him no assistance whatever with Infantry, he gave up the pursuit. The Enemy were at this time making the best of their way through the Azinghur District into Sudh. On the 19th, the Force returned to Bulliah, and proceeded to their different Stations. I consider great credit is due to Sir Henry Havelock for the untiring zeal and ability he displayed in this pursuit, and none but one so conversant with the language could possibly have tracked out the Enemy as he did. I beg to forward Captain McMullin's report from Bulliah. Lieutenant Jennings's report from Beyriah has been sent to Arrah, and will be forwarded.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, that yesterday, the Rebels came down in force, and advanced to within a quarter of a mile of my Post, and surrounded it at half-past 6 A. M. On this, I ordered out the Cavalry, 30 in number, and 80 men of the Detachment under Lieutenant Costley, who advanced very steadily, the Enemy doing the same, and when within range, the Lieutenant fired a volley into them. On this the firing became general, and the Enemy during this time, gradually closing round their right into a village close to an entrenchment I had thrown up the previous day. Seeing this, I ordered the village to be fired, and the Enemy not finding it tenable, the whole gradually retired at half-past 8 A. M., and took up a strong position on a tank about a mile from my Post, where they remained all day; the firing was kept up the whole day; between the advanced Picquets I had thrown out and the Enemy.

I am happy to say that all ranks behaved remarkably well, and only one Sepoy was wounded; it is im-

possible for me to say, what number of the Enemy were killed and wounded, but several were seen to drop on the right and centre.

Numbers of the Enemy, as far as I could ascertain, 400 Sepoys and about 500 Men, armed with matchlocks and swords.

The Enemy hearing of a Force advancing to my relief retired during the night.

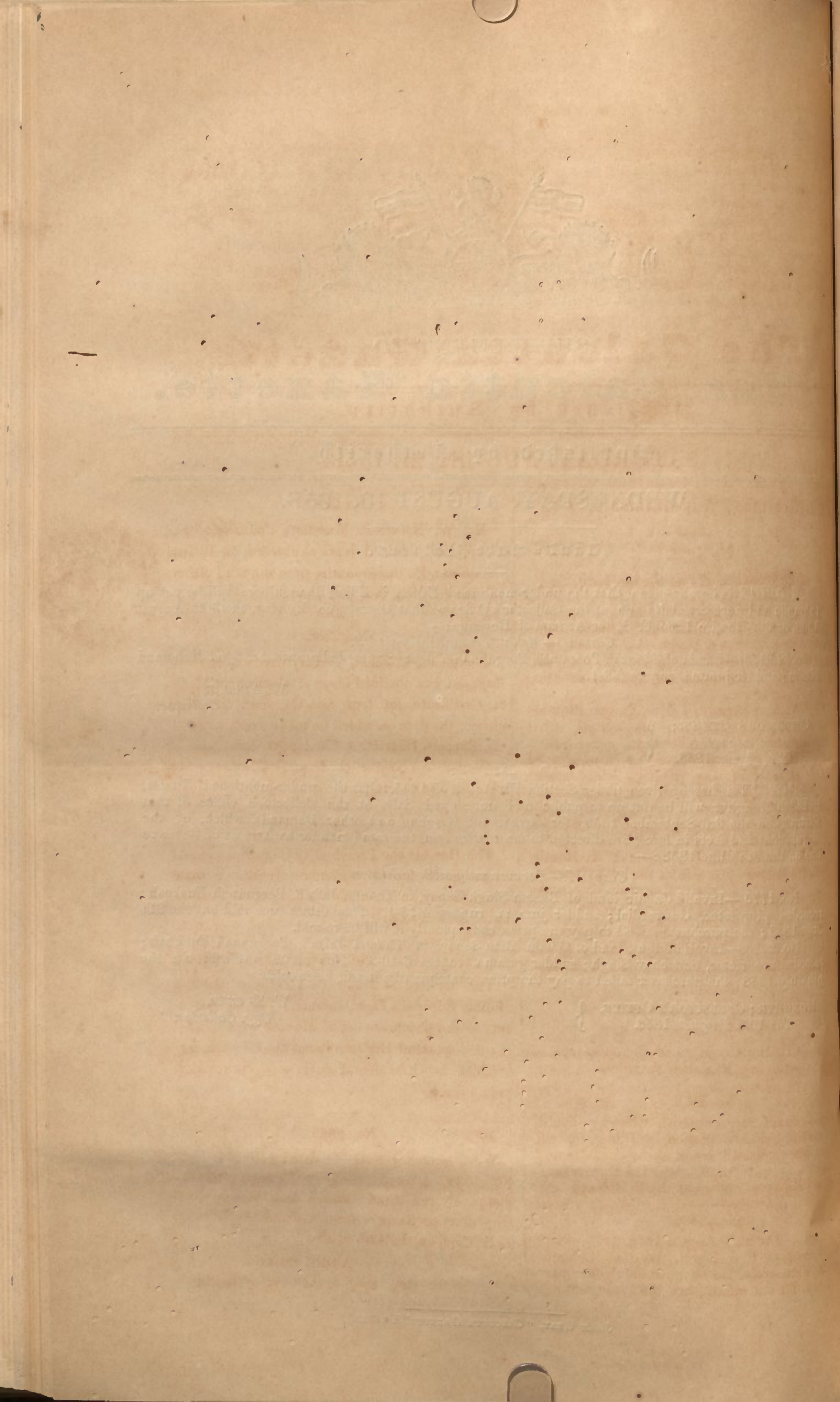

Legislative Council of India.

THE 21ST AUGUST 1858.

THE following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 21st August 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee who are to report thereon after the 25th of November next:—

A Bill for the better recovery of Arrears of Revenue under Ryotwar Settlements in the Madras Presidency.

WHEREAS difficulties occur in applying the rules of Regulation XXVIII 1802 of the Madras Code, for Khas

collections of the Government Revenue according to Act XXIII of 1856, and it is expedient to modify those rules; and whereas it is necessary to provide that the Collector shall at his discretion, proceed to realize arrears of such Revenue by the sale of either the real or personal property of defaulters; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

I. Whenever rent or Revenue may be withheld beyond the day on which they fall due according to the Kistbundy or other engagement, or in cases where no particular day is fixed, then rent or Revenue became payable agreeably to local usage, the Collector shall have authority to proceed for the recovery of such arrears by the distress and the sale of the personal property or the sale of the real property of the defaulter wherever found.

II. In the seizure and sale of personal property for arrears of rent or Revenue, the following rules shall be observed:—

First.—The distrainer shall furnish to the persons employed to attach the property of a defaulter, a demand in writing and signed with his name specifying the amount of the arrear for which the attachment may be issued, and the date on which the arrear fell due. The persons so deputed shall produce the writing as authority for making the attachment, and on the day on which the property may be attached shall deliver a copy of such writing to the defaulter, endorsing thereon a list or inventory of the property attached and the name of the place where it may be lodged or kept.

Second.—The writing shall further set forth the intention of the distrainer to bring the attached property to immediate public sale, unless the amount and expense of the attachment be previously discharged.

Third.—When a defaulter may be absent, a copy of the writing, with the endorsement, shall be fixed or left at his usual place of residence before the expiration of the third day, calculating from the day of the attachment.

III. Where a defaulter on receiving notice may neglect to pay the amount due or to give satisfactory security for early payment, or where a defaulter may have absconded or may be otherwise not forthcoming so that the notice cannot be served upon him, the attaching Officer shall in either case transmit an inventory of the property attached to the nearest public Officer empowered to sell distrained property, in order that it may be publicly sold for the discharge of the arrear due.

IV. Where a defaulter may tender payment of the arrear demanded in the presence of two credible witnesses, after his property may have been attached and prior to the day fixed for sale, together with payment of the necessary expenses attending the attachment, the distrainer shall receive the amount of such arrear and expenses immediately upon the same being tendered, and shall forthwith release the property.

V. The distrainer attaching the crops or un-gathered products of the lands belonging to a defaulter may cause them to be sold in due course without reaping or gathering them, or at his option may cause them to be reaped or gathered in due season and stored in proper places until sold. In the latter case the expense of reaping or gathering and storing such crops or produce shall be defrayed by the owner upon his redeeming the property, or from the proceeds of the sale in the event of its being sold.

VI. The distrainer shall not work the bullocks, or cattle or make use of the goods or effects distrained; he shall provide the necessary

IX. Attachments shall be
 Time for attachment. made after sunrise and before
 sunset, and not otherwise.

X. Where a defaulter may make a fraudulent
 Penalty for fraudulent conveyance of property, to prevent the attachment of it
 conveyance of property for arrears, the Zillah Court,
 to prevent attachment. upon proof thereof, shall
 summarily cause the property to be delivered up to
 the distrainer, and compel the person to whom
 such transfer or conveyance may have been made
 to pay to the distrainer damages equal to the
 value of one-half the property, with costs of suit.

XI. Where a person, not being a defaulter or
 Claims to property responsible for a defaulter,
 distrained and sold. may claim a right to the
 property distrained, and the
 distrainer may, notwithstanding, cause the same
 to be sold, the claimants, on proof of such right
 in the Zillah Court and in the event of the
 distrainer being unable to prove the responsibility
 for the arrear of rent or Revenue, on account of
 which the property may have been sold, shall
 recover from the distrainer the full value of such
 property with costs and damages, according to
 the circumstances of the case. But claims to
 crops upon the ground, or to gather products of
 the ground attached, in the possession of the
 defaulter, whether founded upon a previous sale,
 mortgage, or otherwise, shall not bar the prior
 claim of rent or Revenue due from the ground upon
 which such crop or product may have been grown.

XII. Where a person may be convicted of
 Penalty for forcibly or clandestinely taking away
 or clandestinely taking away distrained pro- property.
 perty. perty. upon proof thereof, shall
 cause such person to be imprisoned until he restore
 the property or make good the value of it to the
 distrainer, and moreover, to pay to him, as damages,
 a sum of money equal to the value of such prop-
 erty, with costs of suit.

XIII. The distrainer shall have power to force
 What places distrain- open any stable, cow-house,
 er may force open. golah, granary, godown, out-
 house, or other building, as
 also to enter any dwelling-house, the outer door
 of which may be open (excepting the apartments
 in such dwelling-house appropriated for the Zenana
 or residence of women), and to break open the
 door of any room in such dwelling-house for the
 purpose of attaching property belonging to a de-
 faulter and lodged therein.

XIV. Where a distrainer may have reason to
 suppose that the property of
 a defaulter is lodged within a
 dwelling-house the outer door
 of which may be shut, or with-
 in any apartments appropriat-
 ed to women which by the usage of the country
 are considered private, such distrainer shall
 represent the same to the Police (within whose
 jurisdiction the house may be situated), and on
 such representation, the Police shall send a
 Police Officer to the spot, in the presence of
 whom the distrainer may force open the outer
 door of such dwelling-house in like manner as
 they may break open the door of any room
 within the house, except the Zenana; the dis-
 trainer may also, in the presence of the Police
 Officers, after due notice given for the removal
 of women within a Zenana, and after furnishing
 means for their removal in a suitable manner (if
 they be women of rank who according to the cus-
 toms of the country cannot appear in public)
 enter the Zenana apartments for the purpose of
 attaching the defaulter's property deposited there-
 in; but such property, if found, shall be imme-
 diately removed from such apartments, after which
 they shall be left free to the former occupants;
 and nothing in this Act shall be understood to
 authorize a distrainer or his agent to force open
 the door of a dwelling-house, or to enter the apart-
 ments of women which by the usage of the coun-
 try are considered private, in any other mode than
 is herein prescribed.

XV. Persons entering the apartments of
 women, or forcing open the
 outer door of dwelling-houses,
 contrary to the provisions of
 this Act, shall be imprisoned for six months.

XVI. Between the tenth and thirtieth day
 following the day on which
 the attachment was made,
 the Public Officer empowered
 to sell distrained property shall
 cause to be affixed to the outer door of the defaul-
 ter's house a list of the property to be sold with a
 notice specifying the place where and the day and
 hour at which the distrained property will be sold,
 and shall cause proclamation of the intended sale
 to be made by beat of drum in the village to
 which the lands on which the arrear has accrued
 may belong.

XVII. At the appointed time the property
 shall be put up in one or more
 lots as the distrainer may con-
 sider advisable, and shall be
 disposed of to the highest bidder. Where the prop-
 erty may sell for more than the amount of the
 arrear, the overplus, after deducting expenses of
 process and interest, shall be paid to the defaulter.

XVIII. The property shall not be sold
 for other than ready money
 and the purchaser shall not be
 permitted to carry away any
 part of the property until paid
 for. Where the purchaser may fail in the pay-
 ment of the whole or part of the purchase money
 within five days, exclusive of the day of the
 sale, the whole of the property, or the part
 of it which may be unpaid for, shall be resold
 by the distrainer, on such day as he may fix, for
 the best price offered for it: the defaulting pur-
 chaser shall make good to the distrainer any loss

arising as well as the expenses incurred on the re-sale. If any profit accrue on the re-sale, it shall be accounted for to the defaulter.

XIX. When a defaulter shall not have any personal property on which the Collector can distrain, or when he may elect not to distrain on any personal property, or when the personal property of such defaulter shall be first distrained and sold, if the arrear due with interest and all expenses of distraint and sale be not liquidated by the proceeds of such sale, the Collector shall have authority to proceed against and sell the real property of the defaulter for the amount due with interest and all expenses attending such sale.

XX. When the landed or other real property of a defaulter is first attached and sold, if the arrear due with interest, expenses of attachment and sale, management, and all other just charges, be not fully liquidated by the sale, the Collector may of his own authority distrain and sell the personal property of the defaulter for the recovery of the balance thereof with interest and all expenses of distraint and sale.

XXI. Immediately on the occurrence of an arrear, or at any subsequent period, the Collector shall have authority to attach at his discretion the whole or such portion of a defaulter's landed property as he may deem sufficient to answer the amount in arrear, but the previous sanction of the Board of Revenue shall be necessary for the sale of landed and other real property.

XXII. The provisions of Sections XI, XII, XIII, XV, XVI, and XVII, Regulation XXVI. 1802 shall be applicable to sales of landed property under this Act, but a Persian translation of the sale advertisement shall not be necessary.

XXIII. When arrears of rent or Revenue with interest and other charges as aforesaid may not be liquidated by the sale of the personal and real property of the defaulter, the Collector shall have authority to cause the arrest of the defaulter in the manner prescribed in Section XIII of Regulation XXVII. 1802.

XXIV. Persons considering themselves to have been aggrieved by the Collector's acts under the preceding Section shall have liberty to appeal to the Judge, who, on receiving such appeal, shall proceed according to Section XII of Regulation XXVII. 1802, and no other proceeding in any Court of the Zillah shall be had or taken against the Collector.

XXV. Interest at one per centum per mensem shall be charged on all arrears of rent or Revenue under this Act from and after thirty days after the arrear has accrued.

XXVI. Regulation V. 1822 shall not be applicable to sales of property under this Act.

Regulation V. 1822 not to apply to sales under this Act.

XXVII. This Act shall not apply to Zemindars, Mootahdars, or others holding lands on permanent tenures, or to their sub-tenants.

XXVIII. Arrears of Revenue due to Government other than land Revenue and hitherto recoverable under Regulation I. 1826 and V. 1832, as well as sums leviable under Sections VI and X Regulation IX. 1822, and Acts XII of 1850 and XX of 1855, shall hereafter be recoverable solely under the provisions of this Act.

XXIX. Regulation XXVIII. 1802 and Act XXIII of 1856 shall be inoperative as respects arrears of Revenue due to Government on lands not permanently settled.

XXX. Nothing contained in this Act shall be held to prevent parties considering themselves to have been aggrieved by the acts of a distrainer or of those employed by him, from applying to the Courts of Adawlut for redress; and if the Courts of Adawlut shall be of opinion that the party complaining has suffered wrong, they shall give such damages as the case may appear to call for, and shall also grant to the complaining party his costs of suit.

THE 28TH AUGUST 1858.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 24th August 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 28th idem), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXX OF 1858.

An Act to provide for the administration of the Estate and for the payment of the Debts of the late Nabob of the Carnatic.

WHEREAS by Act I of 1844 it is enacted that no writ or process shall at any time be sued forth or prosecuted against the person, goods, or property of His Highness the Nabob of the Carnatic, or of such other person as therein mentioned, unless such writ or process shall be so sued forth with the consent of the Governor in Council of Fort St. George first had and obtained as therein mentioned; and that any writ or process which shall at any time be sued out or prosecuted against the person or goods or property of His Highness or of

any such person without such consent, shall be utterly null and void: and whereas the Nabob died leaving debts and liabilities to a large amount unsatisfied, some of which were contracted by himself and some by Azeem Jah Bahadoor as Nabob Regent or Naib-i-Mooktar during the infancy of the late Nabob: and whereas it is doubtful whether the creditors of the Nabob have, without the consent of the Governor in Council of Fort St. George, any remedy for enforcing their claims against the goods or property which belonged to the said Nabob at the time of his death; and especially whether any part of the property left by the said late Nabob, which was of the nature of State or Public property, is liable for the payment of such claims: and whereas the East India Company is willing to give up any right which it has to any part of such property which is in the nature of State or Public property, and to allow the whole property, moveable and immoveable of whatever kind, left by the late Nabob, after appropriating to the payment of his debts such portion thereof as is liable to the payment thereof, to be applied towards making provision for the family and dependents of the late Nabob: and whereas the said East India Company is also willing to pay in full, to such of the creditors as shall be willing to accept the same, in the manner herein mentioned, all such debts as shall be proved to have been fairly and justly contracted by the said Nabob or on his behalf during his infancy by the said Azeem Jah as Nabob Regent, such debts to be estimated in respect of moneys at the amounts which may be proved to have been actually advanced or paid by such creditors respectively, and in respect of goods supplied or other matters at the amount which shall be proved to have been the fair and actual value thereof at the time when such debts were incurred, together with interest on such debts at a rate not exceeding six per centum per annum, the property of the said Nabob being applied in the first instance for that purpose, but any deficiency therein being made good by the said East India Company: and whereas the said Nabob is alleged to have mortgaged and created divers liens and securities upon certain portions of his property, of which or some of which the validity and extent of operation, especially as against the creditors of the said Nabob, is doubtful, and it may also be doubtful whether the same can be enforced in any of the ordinary Courts of Justice; and it is expedient that provision should be made for giving effect to the said mortgages, liens, and securities so far as the same shall have been created *bonâ fide* and for valuable consideration, and for affording a simple mode of ascertaining the rights of the parties claiming under such mortgages, liens, and securities: and whereas it is also alleged that various conveyances, deeds, and instruments have been executed by the late Nabob without valuable consideration in favor of persons who have under color thereof executed or created mortgages or assignments of, or securities or liens on the property comprised therein: and whereas it is expedient that provision should be made for investigating all such claims, and for protecting the *bonâ fide* creditors of the said Nabob from the effect of any conveyances executed by the Nabob under such circumstances as rendered them void as against such creditors, and for affording a simple mode of ascertaining the rights of the parties claiming in respect thereof as well as

of parties claiming to be creditors of the Nabob: It is enacted as follows:—

I. The Governor in Council of Fort St. George shall, immediately after the passing of this Act, appoint such person as he may think fit to act under the orders of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras in the administration of the property of whatever nature left by the said late Nabob. The person so appointed shall be designated "The Receiver of the Carnatic Property," and shall have power to collect and take possession of all such property, and shall hold the same according to the provisions of this Act, and shall give such security (if any) as the said Governor in Council may require.

II. The said Receiver shall be entitled to receive such commission, not exceeding five per centum upon the amount or value of the property collected by and distributed under the provisions of this Act, as the said Governor in Council shall appoint, which commission shall be charged to the estate.

III. The Governor in Council shall have full power to suspend or remove any person appointed such Receiver as aforesaid, and also from time to time to fill up any vacancy in such office which may be occasioned by death, retirement, suspension, or removal.

IV. Such Receiver shall represent the estate of the said late Nabob in all proceedings relating thereto under this Act or otherwise, and shall do and perform all acts in performance of his duties or office under his official designation, and in all proceedings whether at law or in equity he shall be so styled and designated; and no proceedings in which the Receiver may be a party shall abate by reason of the death, retirement, suspension, or removal from office of any such Receiver, but the same shall be continued and carried on by his successor as if no such death, resignation, suspension, or removal had occurred.

V. The Receiver shall have full power to collect, take possession of, and get in all property, moveable or immoveable and whether of the nature of State or Public property or not, to which the said late Nabob at the time of his death was entitled either at law or in equity, or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said Nabob; and, if necessary, to sue for and recover the same as representing the said estate of the said Nabob under this Act, and to realize by sale or otherwise the value of the said property: and he shall proceed to collect and take possession of the same with all convenient speed immediately after the passing of this Act.

VI. Whenever the Receiver, by the order or with the sanction of the Court, shall sell any immoveable property to which the Nabob was entitled either at law or in equity at the time of his death, or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said late

Nabob, he shall execute a conveyance thereof to the purchaser; and such conveyance shall be valid and effectual and give a good title against the heirs of the said Nabob and all persons claiming under them, and also as against all persons claiming under the said Nabob by virtue of any conveyance or instrument declared by the said Court to be void as against the creditors of the said Nabob, or by virtue of any mortgage or security the benefit of which has been barred under the provisions of this Act.

VII. Upon a suit being instituted as herein-after mentioned, the said Receiver shall be deemed subject to the orders of the said Court, and so far as such orders shall not extend to the general practice of the said Court, in the same manner as any other Receiver specially appointed by the said Court, except that he shall not be called upon by the said Court to give security.

VIII. It shall be lawful for any creditor or person interested in the proper administration of the estate and effects of the said Nabob, to apply for and obtain in a summary way, in the manner provided by Act VI of 1854, upon a summons to be served upon the said Receiver, an order for the administration of the estate and effects of the said Nabob; and such order, in addition to the ordinary directions contained in the usual order for the administration of the moveable and immoveable estate of a deceased Mahomedan, shall direct that all creditors who may hold any mortgage or security upon any part of the property mentioned in Section V of this Act shall come in and prove their claims and establish their securities and the consideration for the same, or in default thereof that they shall be barred and excluded from all benefit of their said securities; and the said Court shall also by the said order give such directions as to the notices to be issued to such creditors and otherwise, and shall direct such enquiries, as to the Court shall seem fit.

IX. Upon such order being made, the Court shall take an account of all debts and liabilities which were due from the said Nabob at the time of his death, and also whether of the nature of State or Public property or not, to which the said late Nabob at the time of his death was entitled either at law or in equity, or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said Nabob; and shall also determine whether any and which of the said creditors had any and what mortgage or security upon any and what portion of the property of the said Nabob and for any and what consideration or amount, and whether such mortgage or security constituted a valid charge upon the whole or any and what portion of the property included therein.

X. Every creditor of the said Nabob, who shall not come in and establish his claim under and according to the said order, shall be barred from all benefit of the said claim; and all persons who may hold or claim under an

mortgage or security as aforesaid, who shall fail to come in and establish the same and (if required by the Court so to do) to prove the consideration for the same under and according to such order, shall be barred from all benefit of such mortgage or security: and the said Court may order the property affected thereby to be delivered up to the said Receiver.

XI. In case it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Court that there is good reason to believe that any conveyance or other instrument executed by the said late Nabob in his lifetime was executed under circumstances which rendered the same void as against creditors, the said Court may, at any time pending the suit, order the person or persons claiming under such conveyance or instrument to come in and establish his claim under the same; and in default of compliance with the said order, the said Court may declare the said conveyance or instrument to be void as against the creditors of the said Nabob, and may order the property thereby conveyed to be delivered up to the said Receiver.

XII. In case it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Court that there is good reason to believe that any property was conveyed by the said Nabob in his lifetime to any person or persons in order that he or they might raise money thereon for the use of the said Nabob, the said Court may declare that, subject to any mortgages or securities which may have been *bona fide* created thereon, the said property is part of the estate of the said Nabob and shall be administered accordingly, and may also order all persons who may hold or claim under any mortgage or security executed by the person or persons to whom the said property was so conveyed by the said Nabob to come in and prove their claims and establish their securities, and the consideration for the same, or in default thereof that they shall be barred and excluded from all benefit of their said securities; and the said Court shall also by the said order give such directions as to the notices to be issued to such creditors and otherwise, and shall direct such enquiries as to the Court shall seem fit; and all persons who may hold or claim under any mortgage or security executed by or on behalf of the person or persons to whom such property was conveyed as aforesaid, who shall fail to come in and establish the same and (if required by the Court so to do) to prove the consideration for the same under and according to such order, shall be barred from all benefit of such mortgage or security; and the said Court may order the property affected thereby to be delivered up to the said Receiver.

XIII. No action or suit shall be commenced or prosecuted by any creditor of the said Nabob against any person as the representative of the said Nabob, otherwise than in accordance with the provisions of this Act; and all ac-

When any sum of money shall have been paid by the said Nabob in his lifetime in specific discharge of interest at a higher rate than six per centum per annum, such payment shall not be reopened or questioned; but interest at the reduced rate of six per centum per annum (as by this Act provided) shall be calculated from the period up to which interest shall have been specifically discharged by any such payment by the said Nabob.

XVI. No person claiming to be a creditor of the said late Nabob or in respect of any property whatsoever to which the said late Nabob was entitled either at law or in equity or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said Nabob, shall be entitled to avail himself of the provisions of Section XIV in respect of a part only of his claims upon the said late Nabob or upon any such property as aforesaid.

XVII. No assignment of any such claim as aforesaid upon the said late Nabob or upon any property whatsoever to which the said late Nabob was entitled either

XIX. The said Court, upon the application of such creditor, shall appoint a day for ascertaining the amount of his debt, and notice of the day so appointed shall forthwith be given by the applicant to the Solicitor at Madras. The day so appointed shall not be less than twenty-one days from the time of the application.

XX. At the time of giving such notice, the Particulars of claim creditor shall also furnish to be furnished to the said Solicitor full particulars of his claim. If the particulars so furnished are insufficient, the said Court or a Judge thereof may make an order for further particulars. In case any such order be made, the Court shall not proceed to investigate the claim until fourteen days from the time when sufficient particulars have been furnished, and if necessary shall appoint a further day for the hearing.

XXI. XXVIII. No property shall be taken by the said Receiver out of the possession of any person mentioned in the list last published in the *Government Gazette* at Madras of persons entitled to privileges under the provisions of Act I of 1844, without the previous order of the said Governor in Council.

Legislative Council of India.

THE 28TH AUGUST 1858.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 24th August 1858, and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXX OF 1858.

An Act to provide for the administration of the Estate and for the payment of the Debts of the late Nabob of the Carnatic.

WHEREAS by Act I of 1844 it is enacted that no writ or process shall at any time be sued forth or prosecuted against the person, goods, or property of His Highness the Nabob of the Carnatic, or of such other person as therein mentioned, unless such writ or process shall be so sued forth with the consent of the Governor in Council of Fort St. George first had and obtained as therein mentioned; and that any writ or process which shall at any time be sued out or prosecuted against the person or goods or property of His Highness or of any such person without such consent, shall be utterly null and void: and whereas the Nabob died leaving debts and liabilities to a large amount unsatisfied, some of which were contracted by himself and some by Azeem Jah Bahadoor as Nabob Regent or Nabbi-Mooktar during the infancy of the late Nabob: and whereas it is doubtful whether the creditors of the Nabob have, without the consent of the Governor in Council of Fort St. George, any remedy for enforcing their claims against the goods or property which belonged to the said Nabob at the time of his death; and especially whether any part of the property left by the said late Nabob, which was of the nature of State or Public property, is liable for the payment of such claims: and whereas the East India Company is willing to give up any right which it has to any part of such property which is in the nature of State or Public property, and to allow the whole property, moveable and immoveable of whatever kind, left by the late Nabob, after appropriating to the payment of his debts such portion thereof as is liable to the

payment thereof, to be applied towards making provision for the family and dependents of the late Nabob: and whereas the said East India Company is also willing to pay in full, to such of the creditors as shall be willing to accept the same, in the manner herein mentioned, all such debts as shall be proved to have been fairly and justly contracted by the said Nabob or on his behalf during his infancy by the said Azeem Jah as Nabob Regent, such debts to be estimated in respect of moneys at the amounts which may be proved to have been actually advanced or paid by such creditors respectively, and in respect of goods supplied or other matters at the amount which shall be proved to have been the fair and actual value thereof at the time when such debts were incurred, together with interest on such debts at a rate not exceeding six per centum per annum, the property of the said Nabob being applied in the first instance for that purpose, but any deficiency therein being made good by the said East India Company: and whereas the said Nabob is alleged to have mortgaged and created divers liens and securities upon certain portions of his property, of which or some of which the validity and extent of operation, especially as against the creditors of the said Nabob, is doubtful, and it may also be doubtful whether the same can be enforced in any of the ordinary Courts of Justice; and it is expedient that provision should be made for giving effect to the said mortgages, liens, and securities so far as the same shall have been created *bond fide* and for valuable consideration, and for affording a simple mode of ascertaining the rights of the parties claiming under such mortgages, liens, and securities: and whereas it is also alleged that various conveyances, deeds, and instruments have been executed by the late Nabob without valuable consideration in favor of persons who have under color thereof executed or created mortgages or assignments of, or securities or liens on the property comprised therein: and whereas it is expedient that provision should be made for investigating all such claims, and for protecting the *bond fide* creditors of the said Nabob from the effect of any conveyances executed by the Nabob under such circumstances as rendered them void as against such creditors, and for affording a simple mode of ascertaining the rights of the parties claiming in respect thereof as well as of parties claiming to be creditors of the Nabob: It is enacted as follows:—

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I. The Governor in Council of Fort St. George shall, immediately after the passing of this Act, appoint such person as he may think fit to act under the orders of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras in the administration of the property of whatever nature left by the said late Nabob. The person so appointed shall be designated "The Receiver of the Carnatic Property," and shall have power to collect and take possession of all such property, and shall hold the same according to the provisions of this Act, and shall give such security (if any) as the said Governor in Council may require.

Appointment of person, designated Receiver of Carnatic Property, to administer the estate.

II. The said Receiver shall be entitled to receive such commission, not exceeding five per centum upon the amount or value of the property collected by and distributed under the provisions of this Act, as the said Governor in Council shall appoint, which commission shall be charged to the estate.

Remuneration of Receiver.

III. The Governor in Council shall have full power to suspend or remove any person appointed such Receiver as aforesaid, and also from time to time to fill up any vacancy in such office which may be occasioned by death, retirement, suspension, or removal.

Suspension, removal, &c., of Receiver.

IV. Such Receiver shall represent the estate of the said late Nabob in all proceedings relating thereto under this Act or otherwise, and shall do and perform all acts in performance of his duties or office under his official designation, and in all proceedings whether at law or in equity he shall be so styled and designated; and no proceedings in which the Receiver may be a party shall abate by reason of the death, retirement, suspension, or removal from office of any such Receiver, but the same shall be continued and carried on by his successor as if no such death, resignation, suspension, or removal had occurred.

Receiver to represent the estate in all proceedings.

V. The Receiver shall have full power to collect, take possession of, and get in all property, moveable or immoveable and whether of the nature of State or Public property or the said late Nabob at the time of his death was entitled either at law or in equity, or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said Nabob; and, if necessary, to sue for and recover the same as representing the said estate of the said Nabob under this Act, and to realize by sale or otherwise the value of the said property: and he shall proceed to collect and take possession of the same with all convenient speed immediately after the passing of this Act.

Receiver to collect, sue for, and take possession of the property.

VI. Whenever the Receiver, by the order of the Court, shall sell any immoveable property to which the Nabob was entitled either at law or in equity at the time of his death, or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said late Nabob, he shall execute a conveyance thereof to the purchaser.

Receiver selling immoveable property with the sanction of the Court, may execute conveyance thereof to purchaser.

Nabob, he shall execute a conveyance thereof to the purchaser; and such conveyance shall be valid and effectual and give a good title as against the heirs of the said Nabob and all persons claiming under them, and also as against all persons claiming under the said Nabob by virtue of any conveyance or instrument declared by the said Court to be void as against the creditors of the said Nabob, or by virtue of any mortgage or security the benefit of which has been barred under the provisions of this Act.

Effect of such conveyance.

VII. Upon a suit being instituted as herein after mentioned, the said Receiver shall be deemed subject to the orders of the said Court, and so far as such orders shall not extend to the general practice of the said Court, in the same manner as any other Receiver specially appointed by the said Court, except that he shall not be called upon by the said Court to give security.

VIII. It shall be lawful for any creditor or person interested in the proper administration of the estate and effects of the said Nabob, to apply for and obtain in a summary way, in the manner provided by Act VI of 1854, upon a summons to be served upon the said Receiver, an order for the administration of the estate and effects of the said Nabob; and such order, in addition to the ordinary directions contained in the usual order for the administration of the moveable and immoveable estate of a deceased Mahomedan, shall direct that all creditors who may hold any mortgage or security upon any part of the property mentioned in Section V of this Act shall come in and prove their claims and establish their securities and the consideration for the same, or in default thereof that they shall be barred and excluded from all benefit of their said securities; and the said Court shall also by the said order give such directions as to the notices to be issued to such creditors and otherwise, and shall direct such enquiries, as to the Court shall seem fit.

Suit for administration of estate.

Special directions to be given as to creditors holding mortgages or other securities.

IX. Upon such order being made, the Court shall take an account of all debts and liabilities which were due from the said Nabob at the time of his death, and also moveable or immoveable and whether of the nature of State or Public property or not, to which the said late Nabob at the time of his death was entitled either at law or in equity, or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said Nabob; and shall also determine whether any and which of the said creditors had any and what mortgage or security upon any and what portion of the property of the said Nabob and for any and what consideration or amount, and whether such mortgage or security constituted a valid charge upon the whole or any and what portion of the property included therein.

Accounts to be taken by the Court of the debts,

of all property, property,

X. Every creditor of the said Nabob, who shall not come in and establish his claim under and according to the said order, shall be barred from all benefit of the said claim; and all persons who may hold or claim under any

Creditor or mortgagee not coming in to establish claim or mortgage, to be barred from all benefit thereof.

mortgage or security as aforesaid, who shall fail to come in and establish the same and (if required by the Court so to do) to prove the consideration for the same under and according to such order, shall be barred from all benefit of such mortgage or security; and the said Court may order the property affected thereby to be delivered up to the said Receiver.

XI. In case it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Court that there is good reason to believe that any conveyance or other instrument executed by the said late Nabob in his lifetime was executed under circumstances which rendered the same void as against creditors, the said Court may, at any time pending the suit, order the person or persons claiming under such conveyance or instrument to come in and establish his claim under the same; and in default of compliance with the said order, the said Court may declare the said conveyance or instrument to be void as against the creditors of the said Nabob, and may order the property thereby conveyed to be delivered up to the said Receiver.

XII. In case it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Court that there is good reason to believe that any property was conveyed by the said Nabob in his lifetime to any person or persons in order that he or they might raise money thereon for the use of the said Nabob, the said Court may declare that, subject to any mortgages or securities which may have been *bona fide* created thereon, the said property is part of the estate of the said Nabob and shall be administered accordingly, and may also order all persons who may hold or claim under any mortgage or security executed by the person or persons to whom the said property was so conveyed by the said Nabob to their claims and establish their securities and the consideration for the same, or in default thereof that they shall be barred and excluded from all benefit of their said securities; and the said Court shall also by the said order give such directions as to the notices to be issued to such creditors and otherwise, and shall direct such enquiries as to the Court shall seem fit; and all persons who may hold or claim under any mortgage or security executed by or on behalf of the person or persons to whom such property was conveyed as aforesaid, who shall fail to come in and establish their claims, shall be barred from all benefit thereof.

XIII. No action or suit shall be commenced or prosecuted by any creditor of the said Nabob against any person as the representative of the said Nabob, otherwise than in accordance with the provisions of this Act; and all ac-

tions and suits, which at the time of the commencement of this suit shall be pending at the suit of any such creditor against any person as representative of the said Nabob, shall abate; the costs of such suit, if the said Court shall consider it reasonable, to be paid out of the assets of the said late Nabob.

XIV. Any person claiming to be a creditor of the said late Nabob, who within the period of three months from the passing of this Act shall file in the Office of the Registrar of the said Supreme Court a written declaration stating that he is willing to receive in full discharge of all his claims against the said late Nabob or any property to which the said late Nabob at the time of his death was entitled either at law or in equity, or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said Nabob, such amount as shall be ascertained by the said Supreme Court to have been justly and fairly due to him from the said late Nabob at the time of his death or to be a charge upon such property and to remain unpaid (the amount to be estimated in respect of moneys at the amount which shall be proved to have been actually advanced to or paid for the use of the said Nabob, and in respect of goods supplied or other matters at the amount which shall be proved to have been the fair and actual value thereof at the time when such debts were incurred) together with such interest (if any) not exceeding the rate of six per centum per annum as shall be awarded by the said Court; and that he is willing to give up any mortgage or security which he may hold upon any part of such property as aforesaid, or which shall have been charged with the said debt—shall be entitled, upon giving up such mortgage or security to the said Receiver, to have the amount of his claim ascertained by the said Court in manner hereinafter mentioned.

XV. When any sum of money shall have been paid by the said Nabob in his lifetime in specific discharge of interest at a higher rate than six per centum per annum, such payment shall not be reopened or questioned; but interest at the reduced rate of six per centum per annum (as by this Act provided) shall be calculated from the period up to which interest shall have been specifically discharged by any such payment by the said Nabob.

XVI. No person claiming to be a creditor of the said late Nabob or in respect of any property whatsoever to which the said late Nabob was entitled either at law or in equity or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said Nabob, shall be entitled to avail himself of the provisions of Section XIV in respect of a part only of his claims upon the said late Nabob or upon any such property as aforesaid.

XVII. No assignment of any such claim as aforesaid upon the said late Nabob or upon any property whatsoever to which the said late Nabob was entitled either

Pending suits to abate.

at law or in equity, or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said Nabob, shall be or be deemed to be valid or effectual if made or executed subsequently to the date of the passing of this Act, or if made or executed since the death of the said late Nabob unless proved to have been made *bonâ fide* and for a valuable consideration, the proof whereof shall lie upon the person claiming under such assignment.

XVIII. Every person claiming to be a creditor of the said late Nabob in respect of any security commonly called and known as an Istufa Cutcherry Bond issued by order of the said late Nabob in discharge of or connected with the debts of Moomtauzool Mook Bahadour otherwise called Ghoolam Moortaza Khan Bahadour, shall be deemed a creditor of the Nabob within the meaning of Section XIV of this Act.

XIX. The said Court, upon the application of such creditor, shall appoint a day for ascertaining the amount of his debt, and notice of the day so appointed shall forthwith be given by the applicant to the Solicitor of the East India Company at Madras. The day so appointed shall not be less than twenty-days from the time of the application.

XX. At the time of giving such notice, the Particulars of claim to be furnished to the Solicitor. The creditor shall also furnish to the said Solicitor full particulars of his claim. If the particulars so furnished are insufficient, the said Court or a Judge thereof may make an order for further particulars. In case any such order be made, the Court shall not proceed to investigate the claim until fourteen days from the time when sufficient particulars have been furnished, and if necessary shall appoint a further day for the hearing.

XXI. At any time not less than seven days before the hearing, the Government may give notice to the claimant that it is willing to consent to an order for the payment of an amount to be specified in the notice in full discharge of what is justly and fairly due.

XXII. Upon the day so fixed or upon any other day to which the Court may think fit to postpone the investigation, the Court, after proof of the service of the notice required by Section XIX of this Act, shall proceed to ascertain and determine in a summary way what amount is justly and fairly due from the estate of the said Nabob at the time of his death to the claimant, whether the debt be payable by instalments or not, and whether or not the day or days fixed for the payment thereof shall have arrived. In ascertaining such amount, the said Court shall not allow to any person claiming to be a creditor, in respect of money lent or advanced, any larger sum than the amount which shall be proved to have been actually advanced to or for the said late Nabob, or, in the case of such Istufa Cutcherry Bonds as aforesaid to or for the said Ghoolam Moortaza Khan Bahadour, together with simple interest

In respect of goods supplied, &c. goods supplied or of any other matters, any larger sum than the amount which shall be proved to have been the fair and actual value thereof at the time when such debt was incurred by or on behalf of the said late Nabob, or in the case of such Istufa Cutcherry Bonds as aforesaid by or on behalf of the said Ghoolam Moortaza Khan Bahadour, without reference to the price or sum which may have been agreed to be paid for or in respect thereof, together with simple interest thereon not exceeding the rate aforesaid, the Court shall consider that the claimant is entitled to recover interest. The said Court shall issue an order for the payment of the amount so ascertained to be due together with the costs of proving the debt if it shall think fit to award costs. Provided that, if the amount so ascertained to be due shall not exceed the amount specified in the notice (if any given under Section XXI, the Court shall not award costs to the claimant.

XXIII. For the issue of subpoenas or other process, for preparing orders for payment, or for any other business connected with the ascertaining the amount of any debt or claim under the last preceding Section, the Officers of the said Court shall be entitled to charge the like fees as would be chargeable in an ordinary suit in the said Court for such debt or claim for business of a like nature, or such other fees as the Court with the sanction of the Governor in Council shall appoint in that behalf.

XXIV. Upon every investigation under Section XXII of this Act, the East India Company may appear and be heard by Counsel and the claimant may appear in person or by Counsel or, the Court shall think fit to allow the same, by Attorney or any other Agent.

XXV. The amount ascertained by the Court to be due to the claimant upon the investigation under Section XXII, together with such interest and costs (if any) as shall be awarded by the Court, shall be paid to the claimant by the said Receiver within ten days after a copy of the order of the said Court shall have been served upon him. In case no sufficient assets belonging to the estate of the said late Nabob shall be in the hands of the Receiver to enable him to pay such amount the same shall be forthwith paid out of the Public Treasury of the East India Company, and the said Company shall be entitled to be repaid by the Receiver out of any assets which may afterwards come to his hands. XXVI. If it shall appear that the amount paid out of the assets of the said Nabob to any such creditor or to the East India Company under the provisions of the last preceding Section, exceeds the amount which such creditor, independently of the provisions of this Act, would have been entitled to receive out of the assets of the estate, the difference between the amount so paid and the amount which would have been so receivable shall be made good by the East India Company, and shall be paid to the Receiver for the benefit of the persons interested in the estate.

XXVII. No action or suit shall be brought against the East India Company or any person for any thing done under the provisions of this Act, or for or by reason of any act, reasonable or proper, for the protection of any property, moveable or immoveable and whether of the nature of State or Public property or not, to which the said late Nabob at the time of his death was entitled either at law or in equity, or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said Nabob, or for realizing the assets thereof, which may have been done before the passing of this Act by any person under the orders or with the sanction of the said Governor in Council.

XXVIII. No property shall be taken by the said Receiver out of the possession of any person mentioned in the list last published in the *Government Gazette* at Madras of persons entitled to privileges under the provisions of Act I of 1844, without the previous order of the said Governor in Council.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of the Brigadier Commanding at Lucknow, that yesterday morning at 5 o'clock, I received a letter from Mr. Carnegie, Deputy Commissioner at Mohan, stating that enemy in force had attacked the Police Battalion stationed there on the previous evening, (7th instant), crossed the bridge, and driven in the Police picquets, and as he expected to be again attacked the following morning, he requested me to come to his aid.

I accordingly started from Nawabgunge with the Troops named in the margin, at 6 A. M. yesterday morning, the 8th instant, and on my arriving at a village three miles this side of Mohan, I turned to the left towards the village Hussengunj, as I conceived that should the enemy in the topos about Mohan obtain intelligence of my approach, he would in all probability retire in the direction of that village, which is on the direct road to Rusoolabad, and where he has generally a force of from six to seven hundred men.

On crossing the open maidan towards Hussengunj, and when about a mile from it, I perceived the enemy's Sowars and Infantry rapidly retreating from the village apparently towards Rusoolabad.

I immediately pursued at a gallop for about a mile and a half, but finding that the guns could not approach near enough to open fire, I halted them, and sent on two Squadrons of the Irregular Cavalry under Lieutenant Godby, who followed the enemy in pursuit for about five miles.

The result was most satisfactory, for between 40 and 45 men of the enemy were killed, his only gun, a brass 3-pounder, captured, together with one Elephant and two Camels.

After a short rest, I proceeded through Hussengunj to Mohan, about three miles off, and met the Deputy Commissioner coming out with the Police Force.

I remained at Mohan, under a tope for some hours, to refresh the Troops, and finally arrived at Camp at 5-30 P. M.

The enemy's forces did not appear to be more than about 150 Sowars and 200 Infantry, but I am inclined to think, from information afterwards received at Mohan, that numbers were lurking about in the neighbouring topos, which are thick and numerous.

The brass gun I left at Mohan, and it was placed in an excellent position to command the Bridge.

I beg to express my thanks to Lieutenant Godby, for the able manner in which he handled his Irregular Cavalry.

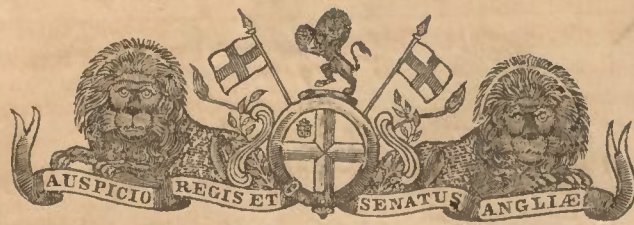

Legislative Council of India.

THE 4TH SEPTEMBER 1858.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honourable the Governor General on the 24th August 1858, (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 4th September) and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXX of 1858.

Act to provide for the administration of the Estate and for the payment of the Debts of the late Nabob of the Carnatic.

WHEREAS by Act I of 1844 it is enacted that no writ or process shall at any time be sued forth or prosecuted against the person, goods, or property of His Highness the Nabob of the Carnatic, or of any other person as therein mentioned, unless such writ or process shall be so sued forth with the consent of the Governor in Council of Fort St. George first had and obtained as therein mentioned; and that any writ or process which shall at any time be sued out or prosecuted against the person or goods or property of His Highness or of any such person without such consent, shall be utterly null and void: and whereas the Nabob died leaving debts and liabilities to a large amount unsatisfied, some of which were contracted by himself and some by Azeem Jah Bahadoor as Nabob Regent or Nair-i-Mooktar during the infancy of the late Nabob: and whereas it is doubtful whether the creditors of the Nabob have, without the consent of the Governor in Council of Fort St. George, any remedy for enforcing their claims against the goods or property which belonged to the said Nabob at the time of his death; and especially whether any part of the property left by the said late Nabob, which was of the nature of State or Public property, is liable for the payment of such claims: and whereas the East India Company is willing to give up any right which it has to any part of such property which is in the nature of State or Public property, and to allow the whole property, moveable and immoveable of whatever kind, left by the late Nabob, after appropriating to the payment of his debts such portion thereof as is liable to the

payment thereof, to be applied towards making provision for the family and dependents of the late Nabob: and whereas the said East India Company is also willing to pay in full, to such of the creditors as shall be willing to accept the same, in the manner herein mentioned, all such debts as shall be proved to have been fairly and justly contracted by the said Nabob or on his behalf during his infancy by the said Azeem Jah as Nabob Regent, such debts to be estimated in respect of moneys at the amounts which may be proved to have been actually advanced or paid by such creditors respectively, and in respect of goods supplied or other matters at the amount which shall be proved to have been the fair and actual value thereof at the time when such debts were incurred, together with interest on such debts at a rate not exceeding six per centum per annum, the property of the said Nabob being applied in the first instance for that purpose, but any deficiency therein being made good by the said East India Company: and whereas the said Nabob is alleged to have mortgaged and created divers liens and securities upon certain portions of his property, of which or some of which the validity and extent of operation, especially as against the creditors of the said Nabob, is doubtful, and it may also be doubtful whether the same can be enforced in any of the ordinary Courts of Justice; and it is expedient that provision should be made for giving effect to the said mortgages, liens, and securities so far as the same shall have been created *bond fide* and for valuable consideration, and for affording a simple mode of ascertaining the rights of the parties claiming under such mortgages, liens, and securities: and whereas it is also alleged that various conveyances, deeds, and instruments have been executed by the late Nabob without valuable consideration in favor of persons who have under color thereof executed or created mortgages or assignments of, or securities or liens on the property comprised therein: and whereas it is expedient that provision should be made for investigating all such claims, and for protecting the *bond fide* creditors of the said Nabob from the effect of any conveyances executed by the Nabob under such circumstances as rendered them void as against such creditors, and for affording a simple mode of ascertaining the rights of the parties claiming in respect thereof as well as of parties claiming to be creditors of the Nabob

It is enacted as follows:—

I. The Governor in Council of Fort St. George shall, immediately after the passing of this Act, appoint such person as he may think fit to act under the orders of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras in the administration of the property of whatever nature left by the said late Nabob. The person so appointed shall be designated "The Receiver of the Carnatic Property," and shall have power to collect and take possession of all such property, and shall hold the same according to the provisions of this Act, and shall give such security (if any) as the said Governor in Council may require.

II. The said Receiver shall be entitled to receive such commission, not exceeding five per centum upon the amount or value of the property collected by and distributed under the provisions of this Act, as the said Governor in Council shall appoint, which commission shall be charged to the estate.

III. The Governor in Council shall have full power to suspend or remove any person appointed such Receiver as aforesaid, and also from time to time to fill up any vacancy in such office which may be occasioned by death, retirement, suspension, or removal.

IV. Such Receiver shall represent the estate of the said late Nabob in all proceedings relating thereto under this Act or otherwise, and shall do and perform all acts in performance of his duties or office under his official designation, and in all proceedings whether at law or in equity he shall be so styled and designated; and no proceedings in which the Receiver may be a party shall abate by reason of the death, retirement, suspension, or removal from office of any such Receiver, but the same shall be continued and carried on by his successor as if no such death, resignation, suspension, or removal had occurred.

V. The Receiver shall have full power to collect, take possession of, and get in all property, moveable or immoveable and whether of the nature of State or Public property or not, to which the said late Nabob at the time of his death was entitled either at law or in equity, or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said Nabob; and, if necessary, to sue for and recover the same as representing the said estate of the said Nabob under this Act, and to realize by sale or otherwise the value of the said property; and he shall proceed to collect and take possession of the same with all convenient speed immediately after the passing of this Act.

VI. Whenever the Receiver, by the order or with the sanction of the Court, shall sell any immoveable property to which the Nabob was entitled either at law or in equity at the time of his death, or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said late

Nabob, he shall execute a conveyance thereof to the purchaser; and such conveyance shall be valid and effectual and give a good title as against the heirs of the said Nabob and persons claiming under them, and also as against all persons claiming under the said Nabob by virtue of any conveyance or instrument declared by the said Court to be void as against the credit of the said Nabob, or by virtue of any mortgage or security the benefit of which has been barred under the provisions of this Act.

VII. Upon a suit being instituted as hereafter mentioned, the said Receiver shall be deemed subject to the orders of the said Court, and so far as such orders shall not extend to the general practice of the said Court, in the same manner as another Receiver specially appointed by the said Court, except that he shall not be called upon to give security.

VIII. It shall be lawful for any creditor person interested in the administration of the estate and effects of the said Nabob to apply for and obtain in a summary way, in manner provided by Act VI of 1854, upon summons to be served upon the said Receiver, order for the administration of the estate and effects of the said Nabob; such order, in addition to ordinary directions contained in the usual order for the administration of the moveable and immoveable estate of a deceased Mahomedan, shall direct that all creditors who may hold a mortgage or security upon any part of the property mentioned in Section V of this Act shall come in and prove their claims and establish the securities and the consideration for the same, in default thereof that they shall be barred and excluded from all benefit of their said securities and the said Court shall also by the said order give such directions as to the notices to be issued to such creditors and otherwise, and shall direct such enquiries, as to the Court shall seem fit.

IX. Upon such order being made, the Court shall take an account of debts and liabilities which were due from the said Nabob at the time of his death, and a list of all property, moveable or immoveable and whether of the nature of State or Public property or not, which the said late Nabob at the time of his death was entitled either at law or in equity, or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said Nabob; and shall also determine whether any and which of the said creditors had any mortgage or security upon any and what portion of the property of the said Nabob and any and what consideration or amount, and whether such mortgage or security constituted a valid charge upon the whole or any and what portion of the property included therein.

X. Every creditor of the said Nabob, who shall not come in and establish his claim under and according to the said order, shall be barred from all benefit of the said claim; and all persons who may hold or claim under a

tions and suits, which at the time of the commencement of this suit shall be pending at the suit of any such creditor against any person as representative of the said Nabob, shall abate; the costs of such suit, if the said Court shall consider it reasonable, to be paid out of the assets of the said late Nabob.

XIV. Any person claiming to be a creditor of the said late Nabob, who within the period of three months from the passing of this Act shall file in the Office of the Registrar of the said Supreme Court a written

Special application by creditor for immediate investigation of his claim by the Court. declaration stating that he is willing to receive in full discharge of all his claims against the said late Nabob or any property to which the said late Nabob at the time of his death was entitled either at law or in equity, or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said Nabob, such amount as shall be ascertained by the said Supreme Court to have been justly and fairly due to him from the said late Nabob at the time of his death or to be a charge upon such property and to remain unpaid (the amount to be estimated in respect of moneys at the amount which shall be proved to have been actually advanced to or paid for the use of the said Nabob, and in respect of goods supplied or other matters at the amount which shall be proved to have been the fair and actual value thereof at the time when such debts were incurred) together with such interest (if any) not exceeding the rate of six per centum per annum as shall be awarded by the said Court; and that he is willing to give up any mortgage or security which he may hold upon any part of such property as aforesaid, or which shall have been charged with the said debt—shall be entitled, upon giving up such mortgage or security to the said Receiver, to have the amount of his claim ascertained by the said Court in manner hereinafter mentioned.

XV. When any sum of money shall have been paid by the said Nabob in his lifetime in specific discharge of interest at a higher rate than six per centum per annum, such payment shall not be reopened or questioned; but interest at the reduced rate of six per centum per annum (as by this Act provided) shall be calculated from the period up to which interest shall have been specifically discharged by any such payment by the said Nabob.

XVI. No person claiming to be a creditor of the said late Nabob or in respect of any property whatsoever to which the said late Nabob was entitled either at law or in equity or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said Nabob, shall be entitled to avail himself of the provisions of Section XIV in respect of a part only of his claims upon the said late Nabob or upon any such property as aforesaid.

XVII. No assignment of any such claim as aforesaid upon the said late Nabob or upon any property whatsoever to which the said late Nabob was entitled either

mortgage or security as aforesaid, who shall fail to come in and establish the same and (if required by the Court so to do) to prove the consideration for the same under and according to such order, shall be barred from all benefit of such mortgage or security: and the said Court may order the property affected thereby to be delivered up to the said Receiver.

XI. In case it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Court that there is good reason to believe that any conveyance or other instrument executed by the said late Nabob in his lifetime was executed under circumstances which rendered the same void as against creditors, the said Court may, at any time pending the suit, order the person or persons claiming under such conveyance or instrument to come in and establish his claim under the same; and in default of compliance with the said order, the said Court may declare the said conveyance or instrument to be void as against the creditors of the said Nabob, and may order the property thereby conveyed to be delivered up to the said Receiver.

XII. In case it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Court that there is good reason to believe that any property was conveyed by the said Nabob in his lifetime to any person or persons in order that he or they might raise money thereon for the use of the said Nabob, the said

Property conveyed by the Nabob for the purpose of raising money for his use, may be declared part of his estate subject to *bona fide* mortgages created thereon. Court may declare that, subject to any mortgages or securities which may have been *bona fide* created thereon, the said property is part of the estate of the said Nabob and shall be administered accordingly, and may also order all persons who may hold or claim under any mortgage or security executed by the person or persons to whom the said property was so conveyed by the said Nabob to

Persons holding under such mortgages, who fail to come in and establish their claims, shall be barred from all benefit thereof. by or on behalf of the person or persons to whom such property was conveyed as aforesaid, who shall fail to come in and establish the same and (if required by the Court so to do) to prove the consideration for the same under and according to such order, shall be barred from all benefit of such mortgage or security; and the said Court may order the property affected thereby to be delivered up to the said Receiver.

XIII. No action or suit shall be commenced or prosecuted by any creditor of the said Nabob against any person as the representative of the said Nabob, otherwise than in accordance with the provisions of this Act; and all ac-

XVIII. Every person claiming to be a creditor of the said late Nabob in respect of any security commonly called and known as an Istufa Cutcherry Bond issued by order of the said late Nabob in discharge of or connected with the debts of Moomtauzool Moolk Bahadour otherwise called Ghoolam Moortaza Khan Bahadour, shall be deemed a creditor of the Nabob within the meaning of Section XIV of this Act.

XIX. The said Court, upon the application of such creditor, shall appoint a day for ascertaining the amount of his debt, and notice of the day so appointed shall forthwith be given by the applicant to the Solicitor of the East India Company at Madras.

The day so appointed shall not be less than twenty-one days from the time of the application.

XX. At the time of giving such notice, the creditor shall also furnish to the said Solicitor full particulars of his claim. If the particulars so furnished are insufficient, the said Court or a Judge thereof may make an order for further particulars. In case any such order be made, the Court shall not proceed to investigate the claim until fourteen days from the time when sufficient particulars have been furnished, and if necessary shall appoint a further day for the hearing.

XXI. At any time not less than seven days before the hearing, the Government may give notice to the claimant that it is willing to consent to an order for the payment of an amount to be specified in the notice in full discharge of what is justly and fairly due.

XXII. Upon the day so fixed or upon any other day to which the Court may think fit to postpone the investigation, the Court, after proof of the service of the notice required by Section XIX of this Act, shall proceed to ascertain and determine in a summary way what amount is justly and fairly due from the estate of the said Nabob at the time of his death to the claimant, whether the debt be payable by instalments or not, and whether or not the day or days fixed for the payment thereof shall have arrived. In ascertaining such amount, the said Court shall not allow to any person claiming to be a creditor, in respect of money lent or advanced, any larger sum than the amount which shall be proved to have been actually advanced to or for the said late Nabob, or, in the case of such Istufa Cutcherry Bonds as aforesaid to or for the said Ghoolam Moortaza Khan Bahadour, together with simple interest

Provided that, if the amount so ascertained to be due shall not exceed the amount specified in the notice (if any) given under Section XXI, the Court shall not award costs to the claimant.

XXIII. For the issue of subpoenas or other process, for preparing orders of payment, or for any other business connected with the ascertaining the amount of any debt or claim under the last preceding Section, the Officers of the said Court shall be entitled to charge the like fees as would be chargeable in an ordinary suit in the said Court for such debt or claim for business of a like nature, or such other fees as the Court with the sanction of the Governor in Council shall appoint in that behalf.

XXIV. Upon every investigation under Section XXII of this Act, the East India Company may appear and be heard by Counsel; and the claimant may appear in person or by Counsel or, if the Court shall think fit to allow the same, by Attorney or any other Agent.

XXV. The amount ascertained by the Court to be due to the claimant upon the investigation under Section XXII, together with such interest and costs (if any) as shall be awarded by the Court, shall be paid to the claimant by the said Receiver within ten days after a copy of the order of the said Court shall have been served upon him. In case no sufficient assets belonging to the estate of the said late Nabob shall be in the hands of the Receiver to enable him to pay such amount, the same shall be forthwith paid out of the Public Treasury of the East India Company, and the said Receiver shall be repaid by the Company out of any assets which may afterwards come to his hands. The judgment of the Court as to the amount due to such creditor as aforesaid for principal and interest shall, in taking an account of the debts and liabilities and of the estate and effects of the said Nabob in such administration suit as aforesaid, be

Adjudication of amount to be *prima facie* evidence of the debt in the administration suit.

as to the amount due to such creditor as aforesaid for principal and interest shall, in taking an account of the debts and liabilities and of the estate and effects of the said Nabob in such administration suit as aforesaid, be

treated as *prima facie* evidence that a debt to that amount was due to such creditor.

XXVI. If it shall appear that the amount paid out of the assets of the said Nabob to any such creditor or to the East India Company under the provisions of the last preceding Section, exceeds the amount which such creditor, independently of the provisions of this Act, would have been entitled to receive out of the assets of the estate, the difference between the amount so paid and the amount which would have been so receivable shall be made good by the East India Company, and shall be paid to the Receiver for the benefit of the persons interested in the estate.

XXVII. No action or suit shall be brought against the East India Company or any person for any thing done under the provisions of this Act, or for or by reason of any act, reasonable or proper, for the protection of any property, moveable or immovable and whether of the nature of State or Public property or not, to which the said late Nabob at the time of his death was entitled either at law or in equity, or which is liable either at law or in equity to satisfy the debts of the said Nabob, or for realizing the assets thereof, which may have been done before the passing of this Act by any person under the orders or with the sanction of the said Governor in Council.

XXVIII. No property shall be taken by the said Receiver out of the possession of any person mentioned in the list last published in the *Government Gazette* at Madras of persons entitled to privileges under the provisions of Act I of 1844, without the previous order of the said Governor in Council.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 24th August 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 4th September), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXXI OF 1858.

An Act to make further provision for the settlement of Land gained by Alluvion in the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

WHEREAS, for the removal of doubts respecting the course proper to be followed in the settlement of land added by alluvial accession to estates paying Revenue to Government, it is expedient to lay down certain

rules to be observed in the settlement of such land; It is enacted as follows:—

I. When land added by alluvial accession to an estate paying Revenue to Government becomes liable to assessment, if it be so agreed on between the Revenue authorities and the proprietor or proprietors, the Revenue assessed upon the alluvial land may be added to the jumma of the original estate.

In what case the Revenue assessed upon alluvial land may be added to the jumma of the original estate.

assessed upon the alluvial land may be added to the jumma of the original estate; and in such case a new engagement shall be executed for the payment of the aggregate amount, and that amount shall be substituted in the Collector's rent-roll for the former jumma of the original estate. If the proprietor or proprietors object to such an arrangement, or if the Revenue authorities are of opinion that a settlement of the alluvial land cannot properly be made for the same term as the existing settlement of the original estate, the alluvial land shall be assessed and settled as a separate estate with a separate jumma, and shall thenceforward be regarded and treated as in all respects separate from and independent of the original estate, whether the separate settlement be made with the proprietor or proprietors, or the land be let in farm in consequence of the refusal of the proprietor or proprietors to accept the terms of settlement. The separate settlement may be permanent if the settlement of the original estate is permanent.

In what cases there shall be a separate settlement.

shall affect the rights of any under-tenant in any alluvial land under the provisions of Clause 1 Section IV Regulation XI. 1825. It shall be the duty of all Officers making settlements of such land, whether the land be settled separately or incorporated with the original estate, to ascertain and record all such rights according to the rules prescribed in Regulation VII. 1822; and to determine whether any and what additional rent shall be payable in respect of the alluvial land by the person or persons entitled to any under-tenure in the original estate. The provisions of the said Regulation, so far as the same may be applicable, are hereby declared to extend to all settlements made under this Act.

II. Nothing contained in the preceding Section shall affect the rights of any under-tenant in any alluvial land under the provisions of Clause 1 Section IV Regulation XI. 1825. It shall be the duty of all Officers making settlements of such land, whether the land be settled separately or incorporated with the original estate, to ascertain and record all such rights according to the rules prescribed in Regulation VII. 1822; and to determine whether any and what additional rent shall be payable in respect of the alluvial land by the person or persons entitled to any under-tenure in the original estate. The provisions of the said Regulation, so far as the same may be applicable, are hereby declared to extend to all settlements made under this Act.

III. Every separate settlement of alluvial land heretofore made shall be as good and effectual for the purposes specified in Section I as the same would have been if made subsequently to the passing of this Act. Provided that nothing contained in this Act shall be held to affect the rights which any person may have acquired, under a judicial decision or otherwise, before the passing of this Act.

The following Act passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor-General on the 24th August 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council

on the 4th September), and is hereby promulgated for general information :—

ACT No. XXXII. OF 1858.

An Act for bringing the Fort of Tanjore and the adjacent Territory under the Laws of the Presidency of Fort St. George.

WHEREAS it is expedient to bring the Fort of Tanjore and the adjacent territory, which have lapsed to the East India Company in consequence of the death of the Rajah of Tanjore, under the general Laws of the Presidency of Fort St. George, and to make provision for the trial and determination of suits, appeals, and proceedings pending in any of the Courts established by the said Rajah; It is enacted as follows :—

I. From and after the day when this Act shall come into operation, the Fort of Tanjore and adjacent territory shall be subject to the general Laws which are or shall be in force within the territories subject to the Presidency of Fort St. George.

II. No Court shall try or determine any case, Civil or Criminal, with respect to which a final decision may have been pronounced before this Act shall come into operation by any of the Courts established by the said Rajah exercising jurisdiction within the said Fort of Tanjore and adjacent territory at the time of the passing of this Act.

III. A decision passed by any such Court in an original Civil suit shall be considered as final, if no appeal have been or shall be made against it within thirty days after the decision was passed.

IV. All original suits and appeals and all proceedings which shall be pending in any of the Courts mentioned in Section II at the time when this Act shall come into operation, shall be transferred to the Courts and Officers to be established and appointed for the administration of Civil and Criminal justice within the said Fort and adjacent territory, according to their respective jurisdictions.

V. Appeals from decrees in original suits, and second appeals from decrees passed in appeal, not pending at the time when this Act shall come into operation, but presented to the Zillah Court within thirty days after the decision appealed against, to be treated, as pending appeals, shall be received by such Court, and disposed of in the same manner as pending appeals.

VI. The general Laws in force within the territories subject to the Presidency of Fort St. George shall be applied and administered by the said Courts and Officers in the trial and determination of

such suits, appeals, and proceedings. Provided that, if in any Civil case it shall appear that the application of the said Laws would operate unjustly if applied to the trial and determination thereof, it shall be lawful for the said Courts to try and determine the same according to equity and good conscience. Provided also that no act committed within the said Fort and adjacent territory before this Act comes into operation, shall be deemed an offence punishable under the provisions hereof, if at the time of the commission of such act the same was not contrary to the Laws then in force within the said Fort and adjacent territory.

VII. Decrees passed by any of the Courts mentioned in Section II of this Act may be executed according to the Law in force for the execution of decrees within the territories subject to the Presidency of Fort St. George or as near thereto as may be.

VIII. This Act shall come into operation from such day as shall be fixed by the Governor of Fort St. George in Council, by notice to be published in the Government Gazette.

The following Bill, as settled in Committee of the whole Council on the 28th August 1858, was ordered to be published for general information and to be re-considered after a month :—

A Bill to amend Regulation X. 1829 of the Bengal Code for the collection of Stamp Duties.

WHEREAS, by the General Rule laid down at the end of Schedule A annexed to Regulation X. 1829 of the Bengal Code, it is declared that, if any Deed, Instrument, or Document specified in that Schedule shall not be contained in one sheet or piece of paper or other material, it shall suffice that one sheet shall bear the stamp, provided that the seals or signatures of the parties and witnesses be thereupon: and whereas the said Rule has been productive of inconvenience, and there is reason to believe that many Deeds, Instruments, and Documents have been executed since the said Regulation came into effect in respect of which the said Rule has not been complied with; and it is expedient to repeal the said Rule, and to provide for the reception in evidence of such Deeds as aforesaid; It is declared and enacted as follows :—

Part of Schedule A. Regulation X. 1829 repealed. I. The above Rule is hereby repealed.

II. Every Deed, Instrument, or Document specified in the said Schedule, which is or shall be contained in more than one sheet or piece of paper or other material, shall be deemed to be sufficiently stamped if any one or more of such sheets or pieces of paper or other material shall bear the requisite stamp or stamps equal in value to the requisite stamp whether the signatures or seals of the parties and witnesses shall or shall not be upon such sheet or sheets. The above provision shall

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apply to Deeds, Instruments, and Documents executed before this Act, as well as to Deeds, Instruments, and Documents which shall hereafter be executed. Provided, as regards Deeds, Instruments, and Documents which shall be executed after the 1st day of January 1859, that every sheet or piece of paper or other material which shall contain any part of such Deed, Instrument, or Document shall be stamped with a Government Stamp of the value of at least one anna.

III. In any case in which a Deed, Instrument, or Document has been rejected by any Court upon the ground that the same was not stamped within the meaning of the above mentioned Rule, any party injured by the decision may, if a plaintiff, re-institute the suit, or, if a defendant, may obtain a review of judgment, provided the suit be re-instituted, or the application for a review of judgment be made, within six months from the passing of this Act; and no suit so re-instituted shall be barred by lapse of time, unless the period allowed by law for the institution of the suit had elapsed at the time of the commencement of the previous suit.

IV. Nothing in the last preceding Section shall extend to any case in which a final decision was given more than six years before the passing of this Act.

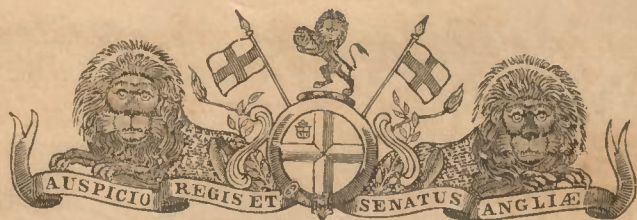

Legislative Council of India.

THE 4TH SEPTEMBER 1858.

THE following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 24th August 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 4th September), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXXI. OF 1858.

An Act to make further provision for the settlement of Land gained by Alluvion in the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

WHEREAS, for the removal of doubts respecting the course proper to be followed in the settlement of land added by alluvial accession to estates paying Revenue to Government, it is expedient to lay down certain rules to be observed in the settlement of such land; It is enacted as follows:—

I. When land added by alluvial accession to an estate paying Revenue to Government becomes liable to assessment, if it be so agreed on between the Revenue authorities and the proprietor or proprietors, the Revenue assessed upon the alluvial land may be added to the jumma of the original estate; and in such case a engagement shall be executed for the payment of the aggregate amount, and that amount shall be substituted in the Collector's rent-roll for the former jumma of the original estate. If the proprietor or proprietors object to such an arrangement, or if the Revenue authorities are of opinion that a settlement of the

alluvial land cannot properly be made for the same term as the existing settlement of the original estate, the alluvial land shall be assessed and settled as a separate estate with a separate jumma, and shall thenceforward be regarded and treated as in all respects separate from and independent of the original estate, whether the separate settlement be made with the proprietor or proprietors, or the land be let in farm in consequence of the refusal of the proprietor or proprietors to accept the terms of settlement. The separate settlement may be permanent if the settlement of the original estate is permanent.

II. Nothing contained in the preceding Section shall affect the rights of any under-tenant in any alluvial land under the provisions of Clause 1 Section IV Regulation XI. 1825. It shall be the duty of all Officers making settlements of such land, whether the land be settled separately or incorporated with the original estate, to ascertain and record all such rights according to the rules prescribed in Regulation VII. 1822; and to determine whether any and what additional rent shall be payable in respect of the alluvial land by the person or persons entitled to any under-tenure in the original estate. The provisions of the said Regulation, so far as the same may be applicable, are hereby declared to extend to all settlements made under this Act.

III. Every separate settlement of alluvial land heretofore made shall be as good and effectual for the purposes specified in Section I as the same would have been if made subsequently to the passing of this Act. Provided that nothing contained in this Act shall be held to affect the rights which any person may have acquired, under a judicial decision or otherwise, before the passing of this Act.

THE following Act passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor-General on the 24th August 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 4th September), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXXII. OF 1858.

An Act for bringing the Fort of Tanjore and the adjacent Territory under the Laws of the Presidency of Fort St. George.

WHEREAS it is expedient to bring the Fort of Tanjore and the adjacent territory, which have lapsed to the East India Company in consequence of the death

of the Rajah of Tanjore, under the general Laws of the Presidency of Fort St. George, and to make provision for the trial and determination of suits, appeals, and proceedings pending in any of the Courts established by the said Rajah; It is enacted as follows:—

I. From and after the day when this Act shall come into operation, the Fort of Tanjore and adjacent territory shall be subject to the general Laws which are or shall be in force within the territories subject to the Presidency of Fort St. George.

II. No Court shall try or determine any case, Civil or Criminal, with respect to which a final decision may have been pronounced before this Act shall come into operation by any of the Courts established by the said Rajah exercising jurisdiction within the said Fort of Tanjore and adjacent territory at the time of the passing of this Act.

III. A decision passed by any such Court in an original Civil suit shall be considered as final, if no appeal have been or shall be made against it within thirty days after the decision was passed.

IV. All original suits and appeals and all proceedings which shall be pending in any of the Courts mentioned in Section II at the time when this Act shall come into operation, shall be transferred to the Courts and Officers to be established and appointed for the administration of Civil and Criminal justice within the said Fort and adjacent territory, according to their respective jurisdictions.

V. Appeals from decrees in original suits, and second appeals from decrees passed in appeal, not pending at the time when this Act shall come into operation, but presented to the Zillah Court within thirty days after the passing of the decision appealed against, shall be received by such Court, and disposed of in the same manner as pending appeals.

VI. The general Laws in force within the territories subject to the Presidency of Fort St. George shall be applied and administered by the said Courts and Officers in the trial and determination of such suits, appeals, and proceedings. Provided that, if in any Civil case it shall appear that the application of the said Laws would operate unjustly if applied to the trial and determination thereof, it shall be lawful for the said Courts to try and determine the same according to equity and good conscience. Provided also that no act committed within the said Fort and adjacent territory before this Act comes into operation, shall be deemed an offence punishable under the provisions hereof, if at the time of the commission of

such act the same was not contrary to the Law then in force within the said Fort and adjacent territory.

VII. Decrees passed by any of the Courts mentioned in Section II of this Act may be executed according to the Law in force for the execution of decrees within the territories subject to the Presidency of Fort St. George or as near thereto as may be.

VIII. This Act shall come into operation from such day as shall be fixed by the Governor of Fort St. George in Council, by notice to be published in the Government Gazette.

THE following Bill, as settled in Committee the whole Council on the 28th August 1858, was ordered to be published for general information and to be re-considered after a month:—

A Bill to amend Regulation X. 1829 of the Bengal Code, for the collection of Stamp Duties.

WHEREAS, by the General Rule laid down at the end of Schedule A annexed to Regulation X. 1829 of the Bengal Code, it is declared

that, if any Deed, Instrument, or Document specified in that Schedule shall not be contained in a sheet or piece of paper or other material, it shall suffice that one sheet shall bear the stamp, provided that the seals or signatures of the parties and witnesses be thereupon: and whereas the said Rule has been productive of inconvenience, and there is reason to believe that many Deeds, Instruments and Documents have been executed since the said Regulation came into effect in respect of which the said Rule has not been complied with; and it is expedient to repeal the said Rule, and to provide for the reception in evidence of such Deeds aforesaid; It is declared and enacted as follows:

Part of Schedule A. I. The above Rule is hereby repealed.

II. Every Deed, Instrument, or Document specified in the said Schedule which is or shall be contained in more than one sheet or piece of paper or other material, shall be deemed to be sufficient

stamped if any one or more of such sheets or pieces of paper or other material shall bear the requisite stamp or stamps equal in value to the requisite stamp whether the signatures or seals of the parties and witnesses shall or shall not be upon such sheet or sheets. The above provision shall apply to Deeds, Instruments, and Documents executed before this Act, as well as to Deeds, Instruments, and Documents which shall hereafter be executed. Provided, as regards Deeds, Instruments, and Documents which shall be executed after the day of January 1859, that every sheet or piece of paper or other material which shall contain any part

Proviso as regards Deeds &c., to be hereafter executed.

such Deed, Instrument, or Document shall be stamped with a Government Stamp of the value of at least one anna.

III. In any case in which a Deed, Instrument, or Document has been rejected by any Court upon the ground that the same was not stamped within the meaning of the above mentioned Rule, any party injured by the decision may, if a plaintiff, re-institute the suit, or, if a defendant, may obtain a review of judgment, provided the suit be re-instituted, or the application for a review of judgment be made, within six months from the passing of this Act; and no suit so re-instituted shall be barred by lapse of time, unless the period allowed by law for the institution of the suit had elapsed at the time of the commencement of the previous suit.

IV. Nothing in the last preceding Section shall extend to any case in which a final decision was given more than six years before the passing of this Act.

Section III not to extend to cases finally decided more than six years ago.

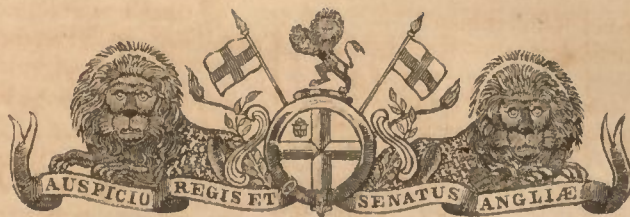

SIR,

The papers received with your letter No. 49, dated 19th ultimo, connected with entry No. 352-53, in the Abstract of Proceedings of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, ending 31st October last, regarding the grant of house-rent to, and the provision of a bungalow for, the Overseer in charge of the new Barracks at Cawnpore, having been laid before the Right Hon'ble the Governor General in Council, I am directed to make the following observations on the subject:—

2.—It appears from these papers, that no Government building in the neighbourhood of his work being available for the occupation of the Overseer, he rented a house for his own use, at Rupees twenty-five per mensem. On this, the Chief Engineer remarked, that the rent of a house suitable for such a person might fairly be calculated at twenty Rupees a month. Further, that if the Overseer had been provided with Government quarters, he would have had to pay six Rupees a month only; consequently that he had a fair claim to compensation for the difference between twenty Rupees and six Rupees, that is to say, fourteen Rupees a month, and this sum has been passed to him by His Honor the Lieutenant Governor.

3.—On this point, I am to remark, that when the rule was made that the deduction for public quarters should be six Rupees a month, the pay of an Assistant Overseer contained a distinct element of house-rent at Rupees twenty a month. It was specially ordered by the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, that the deduction for Government quarters should not be to the full extent of the house-rent allowed. In fixing six Rupees as the proportion to be taken, it was evidently only intended as an act of liberality, or to show that a private house was more convenient than public quarters. The mere fact of the special grant of house-rent is a distinct negation on the part of Government to all claims of its servants to be supplied with quarters at their expense, and it is only when such quarters are available that the Government can

have any direct concern with the rent of houses for persons in the position of the Overseer. His Honor will therefore perceive that the fourteen Rupees a month, which the Chief Engineer calls a "Refund," and which has been allowed as such is, in truth, an extra allowance to which the Overseer has no claim whatever; and it is indeed admitted, that the established house-rent would be a fair sum for him to pay.

4.—It further appears that the Chief Engineer proposes to build a bungalow expressly for this Overseer. It is not shown whether the estimate has been sent in or sanctioned by the Lieutenant Governor, but the intention is expressed, and is not objected to by His Honor.

5.—The Governor General in Council, however, is clearly of opinion that no such bungalow should be built. The Government give the subordinates in the Department of Public Works, salaries calculated to provide them with proper houses and do not admit their liability to build for them. Where houses are provided for Government servants at the public expense, the circumstances are always exceptional; and in the present instance, there seems no reason whatever to break through the established rule.

2.—The Officiating Chief Engineer should be instructed to act on the 2nd Para. of the Adjutant General's letter, by making requisition on Commanding Officers for the services of men, such as are described therein. The men should be subjected to examination, but it will not be practicable, it is believed, to insist on the full amount of qualification laid down in the rules of the Department. Preference should

be given to men who have been brought up to some trade of construction, and a character for sobriety must be indispensable.

3.—Such men should not at first be detached, but kept under the eye of the Executive Officers till they are fit to go alone.

4.—A further communication will be made when the rells alluded to in the 5th paragraph of Colonel Mayhew's letter shall be received.

With reference to your letter No. 411, of the 21st ultimo, forwarding an Office Memorandum from the Public Works Department, with the Governor General, No. 432, dated the 12th idem, forwarding copies of documents regarding the want of Overseers in the Department of Public Works, and the necessity for the adoption of some special measures to remedy the deficiency, I am directed by the Commander in Chief to beg you will have the goodness to inform the Right Hon'ble the Governor General that His Excellency's best attention has been given to the proposals of Captain H. Yule.

2.—The first measure suggested, viz., to permit a small number of sober and intelligent men from the ranks of Her Majesty's Regiments in Pegu and Bengal, to be attached to the Department as Probationary Assistant Overseers, will be duly carried out in the Department of the Adjutant General of Her Majesty's Forces, who will be requested to instruct Commanding Officers to comply with the requisitions of Officers of the Department of Public Works in their neighbourhood, for a few men of the kind indicated.

3.—The number of Europeans now with the Corps of Company's Sappers is so limited, and their presence so necessary with the Natives at present, both on field service, and to assist in the instruction of the men, who are for the most part untrained, that Sir Colin Campbell would be very unwilling to withdraw any of them from their present duties, as proposed in Captain Yule's memorandum.

4.—Third proposition, viz., that men of Her Majesty's Regiments should be admitted to the benefit of regular training at the Thomason College, His Excellency will endeavour to arrange for complying with.

5.—Meanwhile, to meet pressing wants, the Officers Commanding the 4th and 23rd Companies Royal Engineers have been directed to send in the rolls of ten men each, for temporary employment in the Public Works; and when these rolls are received, they will be forwarded to you, in view to the men being made use of as thought best. Both these Companies have been many months in India, and the men have had opportunities of gaining experience, which ought to render them of use in the Department.

READ a letter from the Officiating Secretary to the Government of India, with the Governor General, in the Public Works Department, No. 480, dated the 22nd ultimo.

RESOLUTION.—A question having arisen regarding the occupation of the Vestry rooms of a Church, as a place of residence by the Chaplain, the President in Council

concur in opinion with the Right Hon'ble the Governor General, that it is very undesirable to permit such a use of rooms which are a component part of the Church building, and is pleased accordingly to determine, that the Vestry rooms of a Church shall not be occupied as a residence by a Chaplain even as a temporary arrangement, except under very special circumstances, and with the express permission of the Local Government previously obtained, on a representation of such special circumstances through the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, or, in his absence, through the Archdeacon, who will be expected in forwarding such representations, to favor the Government in each case with his opinion as to the propriety or otherwise of complying with the application, and as to the period for which the indulgence should be granted.

Ordered, that a copy of the foregoing Resolution be communicated to the several Local Governments,* to the Foreign and Military Departments, and to the Public Works Department at the Presidency, and with the Governor General, and to the Venerable the Archdeacon.

Legislative Council of India.

THE 4TH SEPTEMBER 1858.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honourable the Governor General on the 24th August 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 4th September), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXXI. OF 1858.

An Act to make further provision for the settlement of Land gained by Alluvion in the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

WHEREAS, for the removal of doubts respecting the course proper to be followed in the settlement of land added by alluvial accession to estates paying Revenue to Government, it is expedient to lay down certain rules to be observed in the settlement of such land; It is enacted as follows:—

I. When land added by alluvial accession to an estate paying Revenue to Government becomes liable to assessment, if it be so agreed on between the Revenue authorities and the proprietor or proprietors, the Revenue assessed upon the alluvial land may be added to the jumma of the original estate; and in such case a new engagement shall be executed for the payment of the aggregate amount, and that amount shall be substituted in the Collector's rent-roll for the former jumma of the original estate. If the proprietor or proprietors object to such an arrangement, or if the Revenue authorities are of opinion that a settlement of the alluvial land cannot properly be made for the same term as the existing settlement of the original estate, the alluvial land shall be assessed and settled as a separate estate with a separate jumma, and shall thenceforward be regarded and treated as in all respects separate from and independent of the original estate, whether the separate settlement be made with the proprietor or proprietors, or the land be let in farm in consequence of the refusal of the proprietor or proprietors to accept the terms of settlement. The separate settlement may be permanent if the settlement of the original estate is permanent.

In what cases there shall be a separate settlement.

II. Nothing contained in the preceding Section shall affect the rights of any under-tenant in any alluvial land under the provisions of Clause 1 Section IV Regulation XI. 1825. It shall be the duty of all Officers making settlements of such land, whether the land be settled separately or incorporated with the original estate, to ascertain and record all such rights according to the rules prescribed in Regulation VII. 1822; and to determine whether any and what additional rent shall be payable in respect of the alluvial land by the person or persons entitled to any under-tenure in the original estate. The provisions of the said Regulation, so far as the same may be applicable, are hereby declared to extend to all settlements made under this Act.

III. Every separate settlement of alluvial land heretofore made shall be as good and effectual for the purposes specified in Section I as the same would have been if made subsequently to the passing of this Act. Provided that nothing contained in this Act shall be held to affect the rights which any person may have acquired, under a judicial decision or otherwise, before the passing of this Act.

The following Act passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honourable the Governor-General on the 24th August 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 4th September), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXXII. OF 1858.

An Act for bringing the Fort of Tanjore and the adjacent Territory under the Laws of the Presidency of Fort St. George.

WHEREAS it is expedient to bring the Fort of Tanjore and the adjacent territory, which have lapsed to the East India Company in consequence of the death

of the Rajah of Tanjore, under the general Laws of the Presidency of Fort St. George, and to make provision for the trial and determination of suits, appeals, and proceedings pending in any of the Courts established by the said Rajah; It is enacted as follows:—

I. From and after the day when this Act shall come into operation, the Fort of Tanjore and adjacent territory shall be subject to the general Laws which are or shall be in force within the territories subject to the Presidency of Fort St. George.

II. No Court shall try or determine any case, Civil or Criminal, with respect to which a final decision may have been pronounced before this Act shall come into operation by any of the Courts established by the said Rajah exercising jurisdiction within the said Fort of Tanjore and adjacent territory at the time of the passing of this Act.

III. A decision passed by any such Court in an original Civil suit shall be considered as final, if no appeal have been or shall be made against it within thirty days after the decision was passed.

IV. All original suits and appeals and all proceedings which shall be pending in any of the Courts mentioned in Section II at the time when this Act shall come into operation, shall be transferred to the Courts and Officers to be established and appointed for the administration of Civil and Criminal justice within the said Fort and adjacent territory, according to their respective jurisdictions.

V. Appeals from decrees in original suits, and second appeals from decrees passed in appeal, not pending at the time when this Act shall come into operation, but presented to the Zillah Court within thirty days after the passing of the decision appealed against, shall be received by such Court, and disposed of in the same manner as pending appeals.

VI. The general Laws in force within the territories subject to the Presidency of Fort St. George shall be applied and administered by the said Courts and Officers in the trial and determination of such suits, appeals, and proceedings. Provided that, if in any Civil case it shall appear that the application of the said Laws would operate unjustly if applied to the trial and determination thereof, it shall be lawful for the said Courts to try and determine the same according to equity and good conscience. Provided also that no act committed within the said Fort and adjacent territory before this Act comes into operation, shall be deemed an offence punishable under the provisions hereof, if at the time of the commission of

such act the same was not contrary to the Law then in force within the said Fort and adjacent territory.

VII. Decrees passed by any of the Courts mentioned in Section II of this Act may be executed according to the Law in force for the execution of decrees within the territories subject to the Presidency of Fort St. George or as near thereto as may be.

VIII. This Act shall come into operation from such day as shall be fixed by the Governor of Fort George in Council, by notice to be published in the Government Gazette.

The following Bill, as settled in Committee the whole Council on the 28th August 1858, is ordered to be published for general information and to be re-considered after a month:—

A Bill to amend Regulation X. 1829 of the Bengal Code, for the collection of Stamp Duties.

WHEREAS, by the General Rule laid down at the end of Schedule A annexed to Regulation X. 1829 of the Bengal Code, it is declared

that, if any Deed, Instrument, or Document specified in that Schedule shall not be contained in one sheet or piece of paper or other material, it shall suffice that one sheet shall bear the stamp, provided that the seals or signatures of the parties and witnesses be thereupon: and whereas the said Regulation has been productive of inconvenience, and there is reason to believe that many Deeds, Instruments and Documents have been executed since the said Regulation came into effect in respect of which the said Rule has not been complied with; and it is expedient to repeal the said Rule, and to provide for the reception in evidence of such Deeds and Documents as aforesaid; It is declared and enacted as follows:—

Part of Schedule A. Regulation X. 1829 repealed. I. The above Rule is hereby repealed.

II. Every Deed, Instrument, or Document specified in the said Schedule which is or shall be contained in more than one sheet or piece of paper or other material, shall be deemed to be sufficient

stamped if any one or more of such sheets or pieces of paper or other material shall bear the requisite stamp or stamps equal in value to the requisite stamp whether the signatures or seals of the parties and witnesses shall or shall not be upon such sheet or sheets. The above provision shall apply to Deeds, Instruments, and Documents executed before this Act, as well as to Deeds, Instruments, and Documents which shall hereafter be executed. Provided, as regards Deeds, Instruments, and Documents which shall be executed after the day of January 1859, that every sheet or piece of paper or other material which shall contain any part

Proviso as regards Deeds &c. to be hereafter executed.

such Deed, Instrument, or Document shall be stamped with a Government Stamp of the value of at least one anna.

III. In any case in which a Deed, Instrument,

or Document has been rejected by any Court upon the ground that the same was not stamped within the meaning of the above mentioned Rule, any party injured by the decision may, if a plaintiff, re-institute the suit, or, if a defendant, may obtain a review of judgment, provided the suit be re-instituted, or the application for a review of judgment be made, within six months from the passing of this Act; and no suit so re-instituted shall be barred by lapse of time, unless the period allowed by law for the institution of the suit had elapsed at the time of the commencement of the previous suit.

IV. Nothing in the last preceding Section shall extend to any case in which a final decision was given more than six years before the passing of this Act.

Section III not to extend to cases finally decided more than six years ago.

The Governor General highly commends the gallantry evinced by Captain Dennehy, his Officers and Men of the Allahabad Military Police, in this successful affair:—

Camp Ghadamow, 28th August 1858.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, that on the night of the 26th instant, I marched with the force detailed in the margin, from Bara to Ghadamow, a village in the Pergunnah of Bara, about nine miles to the South-West, to which the rebel force under Punjaub Sing, which had been plundering a number of villages all round the tehseel of Bara, had retreated on my arrival at that place.

On coming close to Ghadamow, shortly after day-light on the 27th, I found that the rebels to the number of 1000 or 1200 matchlockmen, a few old Sepoys, and 90 or 100 Cavalry, had taken up their position in the village itself, and in some topes of trees in its immediate neighbourhood.

I directed Lieutenant and Adjutant Shaw to advance straight on the village with the Infantry, throwing out one-half his men as skirmishers, and keeping the remainder as a support, while I kept with the Cavalry towards the more open country to the left, where a large body of the rebels were posted in some thinly planted topes of trees. Lieutenant Shaw was to dislodge the enemy from the village, and if possible, drive them towards the open country. And this he did with great gallantry; advancing at the double as the rebels opened fire upon him, he succeeded in driving them before him through the village, and a large tope behind, killing seven and wounding several more.

In the mean time, the rebels in my front had, as I advanced, retreated from the trees which had hitherto sheltered them; and now having the whole of them fairly in the open, I gave the Cavalry orders to charge.

We cut our way completely through the rebels, and dispersed them in every direction, following them up for more than four miles; and on our return we saw lying about in the fields more than one hundred dead bodies, among which that of Sirdar Punjaub Sing, the leader of the rebels, is said to be recognised. Altogether their loss must have been very considerable. The whole of the baggage, and the baggage camels which they had with them, fell into our hands, as also a large number of cattle, most probably plundered from the villagers of this Pergunnah, many of whom are coming in to recognise their property.

The loss on our side was one Trooper killed ; two Native Officers of Cavalry, five Troopers, and fourteen Horses wounded.

I would earnestly beg you to bring particularly to the notice of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General, the conduct and gallantry of the Native Officers and Men of the 9th, 17th, and Sikh Troops of the Allahabad Military Police, who were with me on this occasion, the first on which they have been engaged with the enemy in the field.

I have the honor to forward the depositions of some of the men, who swear to recognising the body of Punjaub Sing, as also a number of papers found in his baggage.

3. As any departure from the plan of proceeding above notified will cause delay and inconvenience, Indenting Officers are particularly requested to see that it is strictly adhered to.

4. Indenting Officers are informed that all Paper required for the printing of Public Work will be supplied by the Stationery Office.

5. The Alipore Jail Press is at present prepared to execute all Form Work, and such Returns, Reports, Circular Orders, and other public documents as do not need fine work.

PROCEEDINGS OF LIEUT. R. STEWART, *Offy. Suppl.*

DURING a seven years' residence on this Frontier it has frequently struck me that although Cachar and the surrounding Districts and States are most fertile in themselves, and productive of many of

the articles of trade such as are conducive to the necessities and conveniences of life, yet that no regular system exists whereby this produce can be made generally available to the western and more civilized portion of the Empire.

It is likewise apparent that although the inhabitants of this Frontier are by no means poor, yet they have not been introduced to the full advantages to be derived from extensive importations of foreign manufactures.

The causes of this stagnation of traffic appear to me to be the want of roads and consequently of wheeled conveyances and the continued inclemency of the seasons for the greater portion of the year which makes all communication both by land and water extremely difficult.

As great natural as well as financial difficulties exist debarring for the present, all thoughts of the construction of good roads, and as the river navigation will be always affected by the seasons until a trade has been created sufficiently remunerative for the occupation of steamers and vessels, proof against the storms and strong currents which prevail during the rains, it remains to provide a channel for traffic as little affected as possible by the difficulties with which it is at certain times surrounded.

From the month of November to that of February, the weather is cold and bracing, fair and calm. The plains are hard and traversable, the hills, valleys, marshes and jungles are free from miasmatic influences. The river is low enough to be deprived of strong currents and deep enough to admit of navigation by boats of moderate tonnage. This appears to be the season when the traders of the different Districts and States should assemble at some central position and reciprocate produce. It is necessary, I think, only to appoint a date and a place of rendezvous in order to secure the establishment of a periodical trade which will connect Burma with Dacca, and Assam with the Hills of Tipperah.

For this purpose, in consultation with Mr. Allen, Member of the Board of Revenue, on deputation at Cherrapoonjee, it has been determined that an annual Fair or Mela be held at Silchar, the Sudder Station of Cachar, and that the inhabitants of the neighbouring Districts to the West as well as those of Assam to the North be invited to attend, bringing for sale and barter the produce of their respective countries, and that to meet these it be intimated to the inhabitants of Cachar, North, South and proper to those of Muni-poor and Kubboo to the inhabitants of the Kutchangamienagah, and Lhooshaie countries through the proper authorities, that a Mart has been opened where they may not only dispose of their native produce, but receive in return that and the manufactures of Foreign countries.

The date of the Mela which will last for five days is fixed from the 30th December to the 3rd January 1858-59 inclusive, corresponding with 16th to 20th Pows 1265 B. S.

Ordered, that copies of this Proceeding, together with the accompanying advertisement relating to it and recounting the articles most likely to be proffered and demanded at the Mela, be sent in English and Vernaculars to the authorities of the Province of Assam, and the Zillah of Dacca, Furreedpoor, Mymensing, Tipperah and Sylhet, likewise to Major McCulloch, Political Agent in Muni-poor, for communication to the Governments of Muni-

poor and Kubboo, and that these gentlemen be solicited to give the widest circulation and publicity in their power to the advertisement.

Ordered, that the above Proceeding be communicated through emmissaries to the different tribes of Nagahs, Kookies, Cassyahs, Meekirs, Cacharies, Angamies, Kacha Nagahs and Looshais in and about Cachar.

No. 52 of 1858:

FOR GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA IN COUNCIL.

A volume entitled "General Report on the Instruction in the Lower Provinces of the Bengal Presidency for 1855-56" has been sent to you with other books and printed Selections from the Proceedings of your Government, but without a letter from you on the subject.

It does not appear that any proceedings have been held by you, or orders passed, on the receipt of the above Report from the Bengal Government.

3. Our attention has been drawn to the following passages in the reports of Mr. Chapman, Inspector of Education in Behar, which formed part of the volume referred to. The statements contained in these extracts appear to us of so much importance that we have deemed it expedient to address you at once on the subject of them, without awaiting the resolutions of your Government on the General Report with which we expect to be furnished in due time.

"In addition to such obstacles as are peculiar to no special period, I must here remind you, that in judging of the results of our first quarter's operations, due weight should be given to the special accidents which have militated against us during that period. The principal of these was the design of depriving the jail prisoners of their lotahs. This is still universally believed to be the opening act of a general scheme, of which the Educational system is supposed to be a part, for the forcible conversion of the natives to Christianity. The fact is, the pre-sentiment is strong, and by no means transitory, that Government will not only attempt to make its subjects Christians, but will succeed in doing so. The conviction is shared in alike by all classes and all sects, and I do not think it is in the power of Government to remove it. This uneasy feeling is ready to display itself on the most trivial occasions, and the circulation lately of a controversial appeal to the influential Mahomedans throughout the country, by some person in Calcutta, was at once attributed to Government, and has excited universal alarm among both Hindus and Mahomedans, adding materially to the difficulties which beset our plans." And,

"The reception of my subordinates by the people generally continues tolerably satisfactory, though they report to me that it is often impossible to persuade the people that the sole object of Government is not a proselytising one. I have already said, that I believe it to be out of our power altogether to get rid of this feeling." Also,—

"I am now able to confirm, by my own experience the existence of the strongest prejudices against the educational measures on the part of the people, prejudices that are only strengthened by any attempt to reason against them. 'How are we to believe,' said one set of villagers to me, 'that Government will not interfere with our

“ religion, when we see the Missionaries who are
 “ paid by them?” and from this ground I could not
 “ drive them.” And afterwards,—

“ While, therefore, keeping up the theory of
 “ eliciting voluntary effort, I find it to be the most
 “ effectual and satisfactory course, in practice, to
 “ take for my starting point, and to allow my
 “ subordinate to do the same, that it is the *order*
 “ of Government that people should now educate
 “ their children, and that the people ought to be
 “ satisfied that Government would not command
 “ that which is not good for them. Having laid
 “ down this principle, we then proceed to prove
 “ by every argument at our command, that in so do-
 “ ing the Government has no intention whatever
 “ to interfere with the religion of its subjects.”

“ I have been strengthened in my belief, that
 “ the mode of proceeding described in the preced-
 “ ing paragraph is that which promises the most
 “ speedy success, by the fact that Mr. H. S. Reid
 “ arrived at the same conclusion in the
 “ North-Western Provinces, after a much more
 “ lengthened and full experience than I have had.
 “ If we can induce attention to education by any
 “ means, experience will soon enable the people to
 “ appreciate our present motives.”

4. We desire that you will express to Mr. Chapman the serious displeasure with which we have viewed his conduct, in thus inducing the natives to believe, that it was the *order* of the Government that their children should attend the schools under his inspection.

5. It is our intention that it shall be entirely optional with the natives whether they will avail themselves of the facilities of education which we afford to them or not.

6. It is the duty of all Public Servants to carry out with good faith the declared intentions of the Government under which they act. There is no safety for a State if overzealous individuals be permitted, in the execution of the duties entrusted to them, to substitute their own policy for that of the Government.

7. A Government must not be supposed to say one thing and mean another.

8. We have no reason, in reference to the reports which have been before us from the North-Western Provinces, to think that the statement that Mr. H. S. Reid has there adopted the same mode of proceeding is correct, but if there should be any official information in your possession to satisfy you that it is so, or if on inquiry from Mr. H. S. Reid you shall find that the same objectionable course has been pursued in the North-Western Provinces as that which is reported to have been taken in Behar, you will intimate to that Officer also our serious displeasure.

9. In the above passages, and in many other parts of Mr. Chapman's Reports, there are statements of the most important character, with respect to the apprehensions entertained by the natives of interference with their religion on the part of the Government in their educational proceedings.

10. The Government will adhere, with good faith, to its ancient policy of perfect neutrality in matters affecting the religion of the people of India, and we most earnestly caution all those in authori-

ty under it, not to afford by their conduct the least color to the suspicion that that policy has undergone, or will undergo, any change.

11. It is perilous for men in authority to do, individuals, that which they officially condemn. The real intention of the Government will be inferred from their acts, and they may unwittingly expose it to the greatest of all dangers, that of being regarded with general distrust by the people.

12. We rely upon the honorable feelings which have ever distinguished our Service, for the maintenance of the views which we express. While the Government of India makes a promise to the people, there must not be afforded to them ground for a doubt as to its fidelity to its word.

13. You will take such measures as you may think fit for giving the fullest publicity to this letter.

PROCEEDINGS OF LIEUT. R. STEWART, *Offg. Secy.*

DURING a seven years' residence on this Frontier it has frequently struck me that although Cachar and the surrounding Districts and States are fertile in themselves, and productive of many articles of trade such as are conducive to the necessities and conveniences of life, yet that regular system exists whereby this produce is made generally available to the western and civilized portion of the Empire.

It is likewise apparent that although the inhabitants of this Frontier are by no means poor they have not been introduced to the full advantages to be derived from extensive importation of foreign manufactures.

The causes of this stagnation of traffic appear to me to be the want of roads and consequent wheeled conveyances and the continued inclemency of the seasons for the greater portion of the year which makes all communication both by land and water extremely difficult.

As great natural as well as financial difficulties exist, debarring for the present all thoughts of construction of good roads, and as the river navigation will be always affected by the seasons, a trade has been created sufficiently remunerative for the occupation of steamers and vessels, against the storms and strong currents which prevail during the rains, it remains to provide a channel for traffic as little affected as possible by the difficulties with which it is at certain times surrounded.

From the month of November to that of February, the weather is cold and bracing, fair and calm. The plains are hard and traversable, the valleys, marshes and jungles are free from malarial influences. The river is low enough to be deprived of strong currents and deep enough to admit of navigation by boats of moderate tonnage. This appears to be the season when the trade between the different Districts and States should assemble at some central position and reciprocate produce. It is necessary, I think, only to appoint a date and place of rendezvous in order to secure the establishment of a periodical trade which will connect Burma with Dacca, and Assam with the Hills Tipperah.

For this purpose, in consultation with Mr. All Member of the Board of Revenue, on deputation Cherrapoonjee, it has been determined that an annual Fair or Mela be held at Silchar, the Sud Station of Cachar, and that the inhabitants of the neighbouring Districts to the West as well as those of Assam to the North be invited to attend, bringing for sale and barter the produce of their respective countries, and that to meet these it be invited to the inhabitants of Cachar, North, South and Proper, to those of Manipoor and Kubbah, the inhabitants of the Kutchha Angamienagah, and the Lhoosha countries through the proper authorities that a Mart has been opened where they may not only dispose of their native produce, but receive for return that and the manufactures of Foreign countries.

The date of the Mela which will last for five days is fixed from the 30th December to the 31st January 1858-59 inclusive, corresponding with 16th to 20th Pows 1265 B. S.

Ordered, that copies of this Proceeding, together with the accompanying advertisement relating to it and recounting the articles most likely to be proffered and demanded at the Mela, be sent in English and Vernaculars to the authorities of the Province of Assam, and the Zillah of Dacca, Furreedpoor, Mymensing, Tipperah and Sylhet, likewise to Major McCulloch, Political Agent in Munipoor, for communication to the Governments of Munipoor and Kubboo, and that these gentlemen be solicited to give the widest circulation and publicity in their power to the advertisement.

Ordered, that the above Proceeding be communicated through emissaries to the different tribes of Nagahs, Kookies, Cassyahs, Meekirs, Cacharies, Angamies, Kacha Nagahs and Looshais in and about Cachar.

The chief approaches to Silchar from the West are the rivers Surma or Burrack and the Koosiarah; these are navigable throughout the season to boats of 500 maunds; there is a road through the hills to Assam on the North, and one to Munipore on the East.

No taxes or Bazar dues will be levied on any articles sold at the Mela, and sheds will be erected for the convenience of the Shop-keepers.

The Mela will last for five days, and during its continuance, prizes will be offered by Public Subscription to the winners in Boat, Elephant, Horse and Foot Races as well as for other Athletic games and exercises among which may be mentioned the Muniporee, Kangjai or Hockey upon horse back.

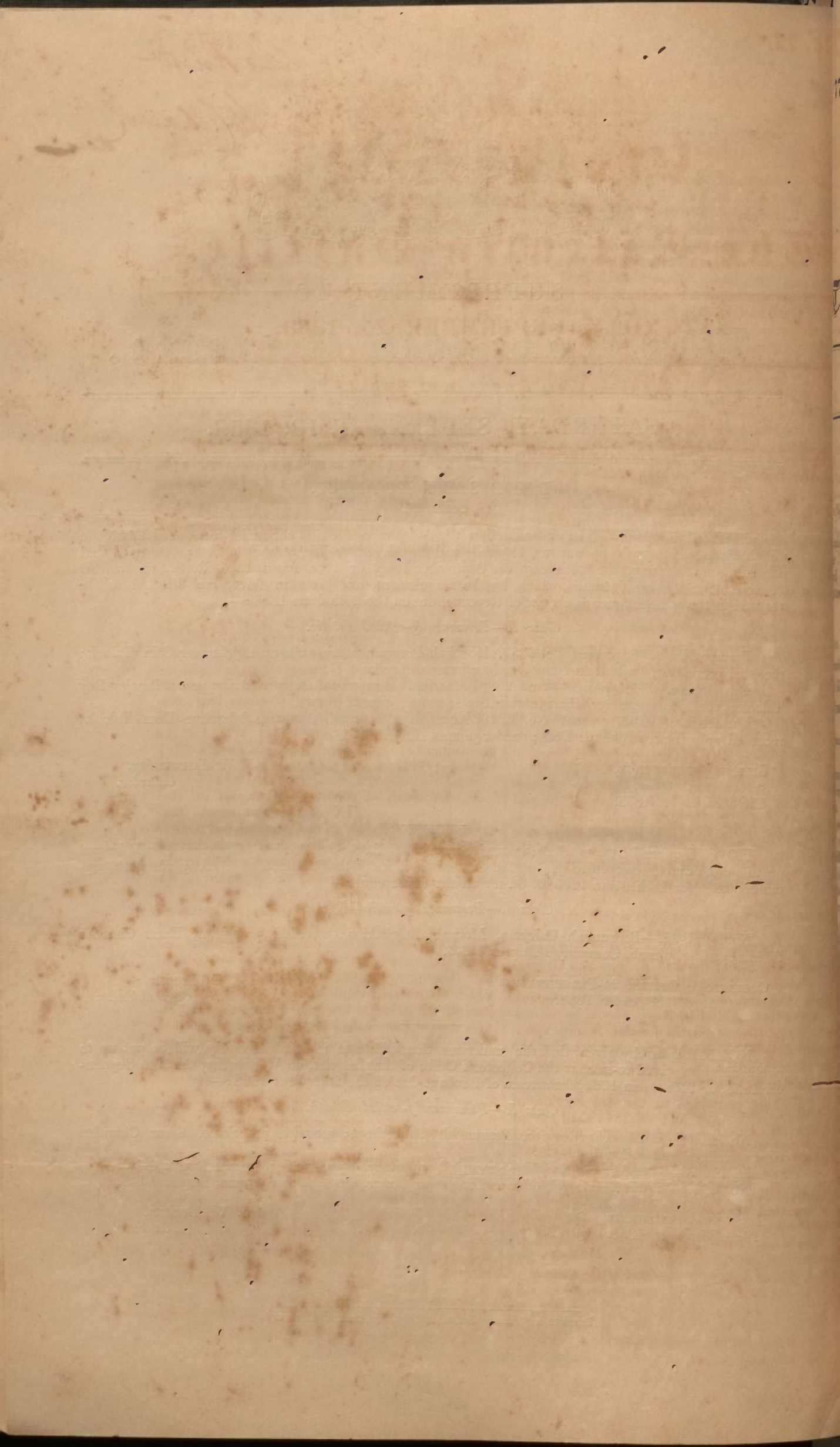

Legislative Council of India.

THE 18TH SEPTEMBER 1858.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honourable the Governor General on the 11th September 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 18th idem), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXXIII of 1858.

An Act to amend Act XII. of 1844 for better securing the observance of an exact Discipline in the Indian Navy.

WHEREAS, by Section III Act XII of 1844, it was provided that nothing in that Act contained should extend or be construed to extend

Preamble. to empower any Court Martial, to be constituted by virtue of that Act, to proceed to the punishment or trial of any of the offences specified in the several Articles contained in that Act, or of any offence whatsoever, (other than the offences specified in the 5th, 34th, and 35th of the said Articles and Orders), which should not be committed upon the main sea or in great rivers only beneath the bridges of the said rivers nigh to the sea, or any haven, river, or creek within the jurisdiction of the Admiralty, and which should not be committed by such person as, at the time of the offence committed, should be in actual service and full pay in the Indian Navy, such persons only excepted and for such offences only as were described in the 5th of the said Articles and Orders: and whereas it is expedient that every superior Officer, Captain or Commander, or Lieutenant, belonging to the Indian Navy, should be amenable to Naval Courts Martial for the offences specified in Article 33 of the said Act, whether the same be committed on the main sea or on shore: It is enacted as follows:—

I. Nothing contained in the 3rd Section of Act XII of 1844 shall extend to any of the offences specified in Article 33 of the said Act, which, after the passing of this Act, shall be committed by any superior Officer, Captain or Commander, or Lieutenant, belonging to the Indian Navy.

Section III Act XII of 1844 not to prevent the trial of Naval Officers by Courts Martial for certain offences whether committed at sea or on shore.

THE 18TH SEPTEMBER 1858.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 18th September 1858; and was referred to a Select Committee who are to report thereon (under a suspension of the Standing Orders) within six weeks:—

A Bill to amend Act XIX of 1847 (Articles of War for the government of the Native Officers and Soldiers in the Military Service of the East India Company).

WHEREAS it is expedient to increase the powers of Officers Commanding Native Regiments and to amend the Articles of War for the government of the Native Troops in certain other respects; It is enacted as follows:—

I. So much of Article 2 contained in Act XIX of 1847, as enacts that no Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier shall be discharged as a punishment except by the sentence of a Court Martial or by order of the Commander-in-Chief at the Presidency to which he may belong; so much of Article 110 contained in the said Act as enacts that no Non-Commissioned Officer shall be reduced to the ranks but by the sentence of a Court Martial, or by order of the Commander-in-Chief of the Presidency to which the offender shall belong; and so much of Article 112 as limits to a period not exceeding fifteen days the extra drill or restriction to Barrack limits which a Commanding Officer may without the intervention of a Court Martial award in cases of light offences—are repealed.

II. The Commanding Officer of every Regiment subject to the said Articles of War shall have power to discharge any Native Soldier below the rank of a Non-Commissioned Officer, and to dismiss or to reduce to the ranks any Native Non-Commissioned Officer belonging to such Regiments; and every such dismissal shall include forfeiture of pension.

Commanding Officer empowered to discharge Soldiers, and to dismiss or reduce to the ranks Non-Commissioned Officers.

III. Every Commanding Officer of a Regiment or Detachment subject to the said Articles of War may in cases of light offences, without the intervention of a Court Martial, award such extra drill or the performance of such other extra Military duty as he may think fit, provided that he do not thereby contravene any order of the Commander-in-Chief of the Forces in India, or of the Commander-in-Chief of the Presidency to which the offender may belong.

IV. Whenever any Court Martial or Special Commissioner shall sentence an offender subject to the said Articles of War for an offence for which such Court Martial or Special Commissioner has now by law power to award either transportation for life or imprisonment for a term of years according to the discretion of the Court or Special Commissioner, it shall be lawful for such Court or Special Commissioner to sentence the offender either to transportation for life or to transportation for any term not less than three years.

V. In every case in which an offender subject to the said Articles of War has been sentenced either by a Court Martial or by a Special Commissioner to transportation for any term less than for the term of his life for an offence punishable under the said Articles of War with transportation for life, such sentence, to the extent of the punishment awarded thereby, shall be deemed as valid and effectual for all purposes as if the offender had been sentenced to transportation for life.

VI. Whenever any Court Martial or Special Commissioner shall sentence an offender subject to the said Articles of War to imprisonment for any offence for which such Court Martial or Special Commissioner now has power by law to sentence the offender either to simple imprisonment or to corporal punishment at the discretion of such Court or Commissioner, it shall be lawful for the Court to sentence the offender to imprisonment with hard labor for any term for which such Court Martial or Special Commissioner is now authorized to sentence him to simple imprisonment.

VII. In every case in which an offender subject to the said Articles of War has been sentenced by any Court Martial or by a Special Commissioner to imprisonment with hard labor for an offence for which by the said Articles of War he might have been lawfully punished with simple imprisonment, such sentence shall be deemed valid for all purposes notwithstanding the Court by which the sentence was passed may have exceeded its jurisdiction, and all persons are hereby indemnified for any thing done in pursuance of such sentence.

VIII. If any Officer or Soldier subject to the said Articles of War shall have been illegally absent from his duty for the space of two months, a Regimental Court of Enquiry, composed of three Commissioned Officers, of whom all may be European or all Native or one or more may be European and one or more

Native, shall forthwith assemble and, having received proof of the fact on oath or solemn affirmation, shall declare such absence and the period thereof; and the Officer Commanding the Corps shall enter a record of such absence, and of the declaration of such Court of Enquiry thereon, in the Regimental books; and if such Officer or Soldier shall not afterwards surrender or be apprehended, such record shall have the legal effect of a conviction for desertion; and if such Officer or

Soldier shall surrender or be apprehended after such record shall have been so entered, such record, or a copy thereof reporting to bear the signature of the Officer having the custody of the Regimental books, shall, on the trial of such Officer or Soldier on a charge for desertion, be admissible in evidence of the facts therein recorded, and on proof of the identity of the prisoner with the Officer or Soldier therein mentioned, he may be found guilty of desertion.

IX. If, upon the trial of any Officer or Soldier subject to the said Articles of War for desertion, it shall be proved that such Officer or Soldier has been illegally absent without leave or has overstayed his leave for the space of two months, such proof shall be deemed sufficient presumptive evidence of the desertion of such Officer or Soldier, and shall be sufficient to convict him of the offence of desertion, unless he shall prove that such unauthorized absence was not wilful

on his part, or shall otherwise rebut the presumption of desertion arising from proof of his absence without leave.

X. Whenever any such Officer or Soldier, upon his trial for desertion or absence without leave, shall state in his defence that his unauthorized absence was not wilful or that he was detained in his village from sickness, or advance any other sufficient excuse for his absence or any matter sufficient to rebut any presumptive evidence of desertion, and shall refer to any European Civil or Military Officer of Government in support of his statement, or if it shall appear to the Court that the truth or falsehood of such statement may be ascertained by reference to any such Civil or Military Officer of Government, it shall be the duty of the Court to address such Civil or Military Officer on the subject, and to adjourn their proceedings for the purpose; and the statement in reply,

if favorable to the prisoner, shall be admissible in evidence and held to have the same effect as if the statement had been made before the Court by such Civil or Mili.

Reply of such Officer to be admissible in evidence.

Commanding Officer may in cases of light offences award extra drill, &c.

Proviso.

Courts Martial, &c. may award transportation for life or for any term not less than 3 years for offences now punishable with transportation or with imprisonment for years.

Sentences of transportation for a term of years passed for offences punishable with transportation for life, rendered valid.

Offenders punishable with simple imprisonment or corporal punishment, may be sentenced to imprisonment with hard labor.

Sentences of imprisonment with hard labor, passed for offences punishable with simple imprisonment or corporal punishment, rendered valid.

Record in the Regimental books of absence without leave and of the declaration of a Court of Enquiry thereon, to have same effect as a conviction for desertion.

Unless Soldier afterwards surrenders and is tried for desertion.

In which case the record shall be admissible in evidence.

Unless such presumption be rebutted by proof that absence was not wilful, &c.

RULE I.—Every Boat entering the Canals shall be furnished with a Ticket on payment of the prescribed Toll. The Manjee's name shall be entered in this Ticket to identify the Boat on which Toll has been paid.

RULE II.—This Ticket may be demanded and inspected by any Canal Officer, and must be kept on board and at hand for that purpose.

RULE III.—Every Boat not having a Ticket on board and producible on demand shall be immediately seized, together with its Cargo, under Section 8, Act XXII of 1836. Tickets subsequently produced and alleged to be those supplied on entry at the Chokees, will not be received.

RULE IV.—The Manjees, Owners, or Agents of Boats, seized for non-production of Tickets, may take out fresh Tickets, which will be charged at the penal rate of one Rupee per 100 maunds, and be antedated one month. If fresh Tickets be not taken out, the Boats and their Cargoes, or such portion of the latter as may be necessary, shall

be sold on the 10th day following the seizure, for the realization of the Toll and Rent so calculated.

RULE V.—When a Boat seized for non-production of the Ticket has been sold, the purchaser will have the option of taking it out of the Canal on the same day, or of buying a fresh Ticket at the rate of 8 Annas per 100 maunds, which will entitle him to keep the Boat in the Canal, subject to the Rules under which Boats entering the Canal are allowed to remain.

RULE VI.—Boats on which the penalty under Rule 4 has once been levied, if found again without a Ticket producible on demand, shall not be allowed to remain any longer in the Canal, but shall be ejected therefrom.

RULE VII.—Duplicates of lost Tickets, of which the numbers are remembered, will be given as heretofore, in conformity with the 3rd paragraph of the Government Notification, dated the 20th November 1839, on application at the Office of the Collector.

6. The earliest possible arrangements will be made for the execution of fine Book Work. The moment they are completed, and the Press can undertake them without incurring the risk of delay or disappointment, the same will be duly notified.

PROCEEDINGS OF LIEUT. R. STEWART, *Offg. Supdt.*

DURING a seven years' residence on this Frontier it has frequently struck me that although Cachar and the surrounding Districts and States are most fertile in themselves, and productive of many of the articles of trade such as are conducive to the necessities and conveniences of life, yet that no regular system exists whereby this produce can be made generally available to the western and more civilized portion of the Empire.

It is likewise apparent that although the inhabitants of this Frontier are by no means poor, yet they have not been introduced to the full advantages to be derived from extensive importations of foreign manufactures.

The causes of this stagnation of traffic appear to me to be the want of roads and consequently of wheeled conveyances and the continued inclemency of the seasons for the greater portion of the year which makes all communication both by land and water extremely difficult.

As great natural as well as financial difficulties exist, debarring for the present all thoughts of the construction of good roads, and as the river navigation will be always affected by the seasons until a trade has been created sufficiently remunerative for the occupation of steamers and vessels, proof against the storms and strong currents which prevail during the rains, it remains to provide a channel for traffic as little affected as possible by the difficulties with which it is at certain times surrounded.

From the month of November to that of February, the weather is cold and bracing, fair and calm. The plains are hard and traversable, the hills, valleys, marshes and jungles are free from miasmatic influences. The river is low enough to be deprived of strong currents and deep enough to admit of navigation by boats of moderate tonnage. This appears to be the season when the traders of the different Districts and States should assemble

at some central position and reciprocate produce. It is necessary, I think, only to appoint a date and a place of rendezvous in order to secure the establishment of a periodical trade which will connect Burma with Dacca, and Assam with the Hills of Tipperah.

For this purpose, in consultation with Mr. Allen Member of the Board of Revenue, on deputation at Cherrapoonjee, it has been determined that an annual Fair or Mela be held at Silchar, the Sudder Station of Cachar, and that the inhabitants of the neighbouring Districts to the West as well as those of Assam to the North be invited to attend, bringing for sale and barter the produce of their respective countries, and that to meet these it be intimated to the inhabitants of Cachar, North, South and Proper, to those of Munipoor and Kubboo, to the inhabitants of the Kutchangamienagah, and Lhooshai countries through the proper authorities, that a Mart has been opened where they may not only dispose of their native produce, but receive in return that and the manufactures of Foreign countries.

The date of the Mela which will last for five days is fixed from the 30th December to the 3rd January 1858-59 inclusive, corresponding with 16th to 20th Pows 1265 B. S.

Ordered, that copies of this Proceeding, together with the accompanying advertisement relating to it and recounting the articles most likely to be proffered and demanded at the Mela, be sent in English and Vernaculars to the authorities of the Province of Assam, and the Zillah of Dacca, Furreedpoor, Mymensing, Tipperah and Sylhet, likewise to Major McCulloch, Political Agent in Munipoor for communication to the Governments of Munipoor and Kubboo, and that these gentlemen be solicited to give the widest circulation and publicity in their power to the advertisement.

Ordered, that the above Proceeding be communicated through emissaries to the different tribes of Nagahs, Kookies, Cassyahs, Meekirs, Cacharies, Angamies, Kacha Nagahs and Looshais in and about Cachar.

Legislative Council of India.

THE 18TH SEPTEMBER 1858.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honourable the Governor General on the 11th September 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 18th idem), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXXIII of 1858.

An Act to amend Act XII. of 1844 for better securing the observance of an exact Discipline in the Indian Navy.

WHEREAS, by Section III Act XII of 1844, it was provided that nothing in that Act contained should extend or be construed to extend or be construed to empower any Court Martial, to be constituted by virtue of that Act, to proceed to the punishment or trial of any of the offences specified in the several Articles contained in that Act, or of any offence whatsoever, (other than the offences specified in the 5th, 34th, and 35th of the said Articles and Orders), which should not be committed upon the main sea or in great rivers only beneath the bridges of the said rivers nigh to the sea, or any haven, river, or creek within the jurisdiction of the Admiralty, and which should not be committed by such person as, at the time of the offence committed, should be in actual service and full pay in the Indian Navy, such persons only excepted and for such offences only as were described in the 5th of the said Articles and Orders: and whereas it is expedient that every superior Officer, Captain or Commander, or Lieutenant, belonging to the Indian Navy, should be amenable to Naval Courts Martial for the offences specified in Article 33 of the said Act, whether the same be committed on the main sea or on shore: It is enacted as follows:—

I. Nothing contained in the 3rd Section of Act XII of 1844 shall extend to any of the offences specified in Article 33 of the said Act, which, after the passing of this Act, shall be committed by any superior Officer, Captain or Commander, or Lieutenant, belonging to the Indian Navy.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honourable the Governor General on the 14th September 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 25th idem), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXXIV of 1858.

An Act to regulate proceedings in Lunacy in the Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter.

WHEREAS the several Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charters within the British territories in India, are authorized and empowered by their respective Charters to appoint guardians and keepers of the persons and estates of Lunatics, and to enquire into, hear, and determine questions of alleged Lunacy by inspection of the person or by such other ways and means by which the truth may best be discovered and known; and whereas, according to the practice of the said Courts, questions of alleged Lunacy are determined by inquisition taken before a jury, and it is expedient to lessen the cost and to alter the mode of enquiry into such questions, and also to empower the said Courts to make provision for the due management of the estates of Lunatics; It is enacted as follows:—

I. It shall be lawful for any of the said Courts of Judicature, on such application as is hereinafter mentioned, to make an order directing an enquiry whether any person (subject to the jurisdiction of the Court), who is alleged to be Lunatic, is or is not of unsound mind and incapable of managing himself and his affairs. The order may also contain directions for other enquiries concerning the nature of the property belonging to the alleged Lunatic, the persons who are his relatives or next of kin, the time during which he has been of unsound mind, or such other matters as to the Court shall seem proper.

Court may order enquiry as to persons alleged to be insane.

Order for enquiry what to contain.

II. Application for such enquiry may be made by any persons related by blood or marriage to the alleged Lunatic, or by the Advocate General.

III. The order made by the Court upon such application shall direct the enquiry to be by the Court itself. It shall nevertheless be lawful for the Court, if it see sufficient cause for so doing, to direct the enquiry to be executed in Chambers before a single Judge of the Court. Reasonable notice of the time and place appointed for the enquiry shall be given to the alleged Lunatic. If it shall appear that the alleged Lunatic is in such a state that personal service on him would be ineffectual, the Court may direct such substituted service of the notice as it shall think proper. The Court may also, if it think fit, direct a copy of such notice to be served upon any person related by blood or marriage to the alleged Lunatic. If the enquiry be directed to be executed before a single Judge, it shall be lawful for the alleged Lunatic, at any time before the day fixed for the enquiry, to demand an enquiry before the full Court. In such case the enquiry shall be by the Court, and a further day shall be appointed for making such enquiry; and in such case the Court may direct such further notices (if any) to be given, as it may think requisite.

IV. The Court may, at any time after the application, require the alleged Lunatic to attend at such convenient time and place, within twenty miles of the place of residence of the said Lunatic, as it may appoint for the purpose of being personally examined by the Court or by any person from whom the Court may desire to have a report of the mental capacity and condition of such alleged Lunatic.

V. The Court may likewise, at any time after the application for such enquiry, make an order authorizing any person or persons, to be therein named, to have access to the alleged Lunatic for the purpose of a personal examination.

VI. The attendance and examination of the alleged Lunatic under the provisions of the two last preceding Sections, shall, if the alleged Lunatic be a woman who, according to the custom and manners of the Country, ought not to be compelled to appear in public, be regulated by the rules in force for the examination of such persons in other cases.

VII. If the enquiry is made by a Judge of the Court, the Judge executing the enquiry shall, while so employed, have power (subject to the provisions of the last preceding Section) personally to examine the alleged Lunatic and take such evidence, on oath or otherwise, and call for such information as he may think fit or the said Court may direct in order to ascertain

whether the alleged Lunatic is or is not of sound mind, and shall have the like powers of authority as are or may be vested by law in a Judge or Master of the said Court for the investigation of matters referred to them by the Court. The Judge shall report to the Court the result of the enquiry.

VIII. If the alleged Lunatic be not within the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Court, and the enquiry cannot conveniently be made either of the modes hereinbefore provided, the Court may direct the enquiry to be made before any principal Court of original jurisdiction in Civil cases within whose local jurisdiction the alleged Lunatic may be, and such Court may in certain cases direct the enquiry to be made before any principal Civil Court of original jurisdiction in Civil cases within whose local jurisdiction the alleged Lunatic may be, and such Court shall accordingly proceed to make such enquiry in the same manner as if the alleged Lunatic were subject to the jurisdiction, and shall certify its finding upon the matters of enquiry to the Court directing the enquiry. The evidence taken upon the enquiry shall be recorded by the Court in the English language in the form of a narrative; and a copy thereof, certified by the Court, shall be transmitted, together with any remarks the Court may think fit to make thereon, to the Court by which the enquiry was directed.

IX. If the report of the Judge or the finding of a Court under the last preceding Section appear to be defective or insufficient in form, it shall be lawful for such last mentioned Court either to amend the same or to refer it back to the Judge or the Court which made the enquiry to be amended.

X. It shall be lawful for the Court, on application of the person whose instance the order directing an enquiry was made or of any of his relatives authorized by the Court to make the application, to direct a new trial of the matter of enquiry according to the usual course and practice of the Court in directing new trials in Civil cases. If such application be granted in a case tried by a single Judge, the order granting the same shall direct the enquiry to be made by the full Court. If the application be granted in a case tried under Section VIII, the Court directing the new trial may give such directions regarding the same as it shall see fit.

XI. The Court shall make such order as may appear just respecting the costs of any enquiry under this Act, and may include therein such remuneration to Physicians and Surgeons as the Court, having regard to the nature of the enquiry, shall deem reasonable.

XII. If no new trial be directed, the finding of the Court to which the application for enquiry was made, if the enquiry have been made by such Court, or the report of the Judge or the finding of the Court to which the enquiry may have been referred under the provisions of Section VIII, as the case may be,

Application by whom to be made.

shall be of the same force and effect, and be proceeded on in the same manner in regard to the appointment of Committees of the person and estate of the Lunatic, as the inquisition now according to practice taken upon the oath of a jury.

XIII. It shall be lawful for the Court, on the appointment of Committees of the person and estate of a Lunatic, to direct by the order of appointment, or by any subsequent order, that the person to whom the charge of the estate is committed, shall have such powers for the management thereof as to the Court shall seem necessary and proper, reference being had to the nature of the property, whether moveable or immoveable, of which the estate may consist. But such powers shall not extend to the sale or charge by way of mortgage of the estate, or any part thereof, or to the letting of any immoveable property unless for a term not exceeding three years.

XIV. The Master of the Court shall be at liberty, without an order of reference, to receive any proposal and conduct any enquiry respecting the management of the estate of a Lunatic, if such proposal relate to any matter which the Committee of the estate has not been empowered by an order under the last preceding Section to dispose of. The Master may likewise, without reference, receive and enquire into any proposal relating to the sale or charge by way of mortgage of the estate or of any part thereof, or to the letting of any immoveable property for a term exceeding three years.

XV. The Master shall report to the Court on the proposal; and the Court shall, subject to the provisions of this Act, make such order upon the report and respecting the costs, as shall, under the circumstances, seem just.

XVI. The Court or the Master shall once in the matter of each Lunacy, and may afterwards from time to time, determine whether any one or more and (if any) how many and which of the relatives or next of kin shall attend before the Master, at the cost of the estate, in any proceeding connected with the management thereof; and, if any such relative or next of kin is an infant, may from time to time appoint a fit person to be his guardian for the purposes of the Lunacy.

XVII. The Court may, on application made to it by petition concerning any matter whatsoever connected with the Lunacy, make such order, subject to the provisions of this Act, respecting the application and the costs thereof, and of the consequent proceedings, as shall, under the circumstances, seem just.

XVIII. The Court may, if it appears to be just, or for the Lunatic's benefit, order that any property, moveable or immoveable, of the Lunatic, and whether in possession, reversion, remainder, contingency, or expectancy, be sold or charged by way of mortgage

or otherwise disposed of, as may seem most expedient for the purpose of raising money to be applied for any of the following purposes:—

1. The payment of the Lunatic's debts, including any debt incurred for his maintenance or otherwise for his benefit.
2. The discharge of any incumbrance on his estate.
3. The payment of or provision for the expenses of his future maintenance and the maintenance of his family, including the expenses of his removal to Europe, when he shall be so removed, and all expenses incidental thereto.
4. The payment of the costs of any enquiry under this Act, and of any costs incurred by order or under the authority of the Court.

XIX. The Committee of the Lunatic's estate shall, in the name and on behalf of the Lunatic, execute all such conveyances and instruments of transfer relative to any sale, mortgage, or other disposition of his estate as the Court shall order. In like manner such Committee shall, under the order of the Court, exercise all powers whatsoever vested in a Lunatic, whether the same are vested in him for his own benefit or in the character of trustee or guardian.

XX. Where a person, having contracted to sell or otherwise dispose of his estate or any part thereof, afterwards becomes Lunatic, the Court may, if the contract is such as the Court thinks ought to be performed, direct the Committee of the estate to execute such conveyances and to do such other acts in fulfilment of the contract as it shall think proper.

XXI. If a member of a partnership firm be found Lunatic, the Court may, on the application of the other partners, or of any person who appears to the Court to be entitled to require the same, dissolve the partnership; and thereupon or upon a dissolution by decree of Court or otherwise by due course of law, the Committee of the estate may, in the name and on behalf of the Lunatic, join with the other partners in disposing of the partnership property upon such terms, and shall do all such acts for carrying into effect the dissolution of the partnership, as the Court shall think proper.

XXII. Where a Lunatic has been engaged in business, the Court may, if it appear to be for the Lunatic's benefit that the business premises should be disposed of, order the Committee of the estate to sell and dispose of the same; and the monies arising from such sale shall be applied in such manner as the Court shall direct.

XXIII. Where a Lunatic is entitled to a lease or under-lease, and it appears to be for the benefit of his estate that it should be disposed of, the Committee of the estate may, by order of the Court, surrender, assign, or otherwise dispose of the same to such person for such valuable or nominal consideration, and upon such terms as the Court shall think fit.

XXIV. If a Lunatic is possessed of any landed property situate beyond the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Court, which, by the law in force in the Presidency wherein such land is situated, subjects the proprietor, if disqualified, to the superintendence of the Court of Wards, the said Court of Wards may assume the charge of such landed property and manage the same according to the rules for the time being in force for such management.

Provided that in such case no further proceedings in respect of the Lunacy shall be taken under any such law, nor shall it be competent to the Court of Wards or to any Collector to appoint a guardian of the person of the said Lunatic or a manager of the estate, except of the landed property which so subjects the proprietor as aforesaid. Provided also

as the Supreme Court shall direct, and not otherwise. Provided further that nothing contained in this Section shall affect the powers given to the Supreme Court by Sections XVIII, XIX, and XX of this Act or (except so far as relates to the management of the said landed property which so subjects the proprietor as aforesaid) the powers given by any other Section of this Act.

XXV. Where any Stock or Government Securities or any Share in a Company (transferable within the said territories or the dividends of which are payable there) is standing in the name of, or is vested in a Lunatic beneficially entitled thereto, or in a Committee of the estate of a Lunatic, or in a trustee for him, and the Committee dies intestate, or himself becomes Lunatic, or is out of the jurisdiction of the Court, or it is uncertain whether the Committee be living or dead, or he neglects or refuses to transfer the Stock, Securities, or Shares, or to receive and pay the dividends to a new Committee, or as he directs, within fourteen days after being required by him to do so, then the Court may order some fit person to make such transfer, or to transfer the same, and to receive and pay over the dividends in such manner as the Court may direct; and such transfer or payment shall be valid and effectual for all purposes.

XXVI. Where any such Stock or Government Securities or Share in a Company is standing in the name of, or vested in any person residing out of the said Territories, and not in any part of the United Kingdom, the Court, upon being satisfied that such person has been declared of unsound mind, and that his personal estate has been vested in a curator or manager, according to the laws of the place where he is residing, may order some fit person to make such transfer of the Stock, Securities, or Shares, or of any part thereof, to such curator or manager or

otherwise, and also to receive and pay over the dividends and proceeds, as the Court may think fit; and any act done in pursuance of such order shall be valid and effectual for all purposes.

XXVII. If it appears to the Court, having regard to the situation and condition in life of the Lunatic and his family and the other circumstances of the case, to be expedient that his property should be made available for his or their maintenance in a direct and inexpensive manner, it may, instead of appointing a Committee of the estate, order that the property (if money,) or (if of any other description) the produce thereof, when realized, be paid to such person as the Court may think fit, to be applied for the purpose aforesaid; and all payments so made shall be a good discharge to the person making the same.

XXVIII. If it appears to the Court that the unsoundness of mind of a Lunatic is in its nature temporary, and that it is expedient to make temporary provision for his maintenance or for the maintenance of his family, the Court may, in like manner as under the last preceding Section, direct his property or a sufficient part of it to be applied for the purpose aforesaid.

XXIX. When any person has been found of unsound mind, and it shall be shown to the Court, either on the application of such person or of any other person acting on his behalf, or on the information of any other person, that there is reason to believe that such unsoundness of mind has ceased, the Court may make an order for enquiry whether such person is or is not still of unsound mind and incapable of managing himself and his affairs. The enquiry shall be conducted in the same manner and subject to the same rules as are hereinbefore prescribed for an enquiry into the unsoundness of mind of an alleged Lunatic; and if it be found that the unsoundness of mind has ceased, the Court shall order all proceedings in the matter of the Lunacy to cease or to be set aside on such terms and conditions as under the circumstances of the case shall appear proper.

XXX. The Court may, from time to time, make such orders, not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, as shall seem meet for carrying into effect the purposes of this Act, and for regulating the mode of proceeding before the Court or before a Judge of the Court, or the Master in matters of Lunacy.

XXXI. Every power given by this Act to the Master of any of the said Courts may also be exercised by a Judge of any of the said Courts, and shall in the Court of Judicature of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca be exercised by the Recorder of the said Court or of any division thereof.

XXXII. Unless the contrary appears from the context, the word "Lunatic," as used in this Act, shall mean any person found by due course of law to be of unsound mind.

THE following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 14th September 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 25th idem), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXXV OF 1858.

An Act to make better provision for the care of the estates of Lunatics not subject to the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts of Judicature.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make better provision for the care of the estates of Lunatics not subject to the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts of

Judicature: and to prescribe general rules by which the state of mind of persons not subject to such jurisdiction, who are alleged to be Lunatic, may be enquired into and ascertained; It is enacted as follows:—

I. So much of Section V Regulation X. 1793, of Section IX Regulation LII. 1803, of Regulation I. 1800, and of Section XXIX Regulation VIII. 1805 (extended to Benares by Section II Regulation VI. 1822), of the Bengal Code; and so much of Sections VI and VII Regulation V. 1804, and of Sections XX and XXII of the said Regulation (as modified by Section III Regulation X. 1831), of the Madras Code, as relate to Lunatics or idiots—are hereby repealed.

II. Whenever any person not subject to the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts, who is possessed of property, is alleged to be a Lunatic, the Civil Court, within whose jurisdiction such person is residing, may, upon such application as is hereinafter mentioned, institute an enquiry for the purpose of ascertaining whether such person is or is not of unsound mind and incapable of managing his affairs.

III. Application for such enquiry may be made by any relative of the alleged Lunatic or by any Public Curator appointed under Act XIX of 1841, or by the Government Pleader, or, if the property of the alleged Lunatic consist in whole or in part of land or any interest in land, by the Collector of the District in which it is situate. If the property or any part thereof be of such a description as by the law in force in any Presidency where such property is situate would subject the proprietor, if disqualified, to the superintendence of the Court of Wards, the application may be made by the Collector on behalf of the Court of Wards

IV. When the Civil Court is about to institute any such enquiry as aforesaid, it shall cause notice to be given to the alleged Lunatic of the time and place at which it is proposed to hold the enquiry. If it shall appear that the alleged Lunatic is in such a state that personal service on him would be ineffectual, the Court may direct such substituted service of the notice as it shall think proper. The Court may also direct a copy of such notice to be served upon any relative of the alleged Lunatic.

V. The Civil Court may require the alleged Lunatic to attend at such convenient time and place as it may appoint for the purpose of being personally examined by the Court or by any person from whom the Court may desire to have a report of the mental capacity and condition of such alleged Lunatic. The Court may likewise make an order authorizing any person or persons therein named to have access to the alleged Lunatic for the purpose of a personal examination.

VI. The attendance and examination of the alleged Lunatic under the provisions of the last preceding Section shall, if the alleged Lunatic be a woman who according to the manners and customs of the Country ought not to be compelled to appear in public, be regulated by the rules in force for the examination of such persons in other cases.

VII. The Civil Court, if it think fit, may appoint two or more persons to act as Assessors to the Court in the said enquiry. Upon the completion of the enquiry, the Court shall determine whether the alleged Lunatic is or is not of unsound mind, and may make such order as to the payment of the costs of the enquiry by the person upon whose application it was made, or out of the estate of the alleged Lunatic if he be adjudged to be of unsound mind, or otherwise, as it may think proper.

VIII. If the alleged Lunatic reside at a distance of more than fifty miles from the place where the Civil Court to which the application shall have been made is held, the said Court may issue a Commission to any subordinate Court to make the enquiry, and thereupon the said subordinate Court shall conduct the enquiry in the manner hereinbefore provided. On the completion of the enquiry, the subordinate Court shall report its proceedings with the opinions of the Assessors if Assessors have been appointed and its own opinion on the case; and thereupon the Civil Court shall make such order in the case as it may think proper.

IX. When a person has been adjudged to be of unsound mind and incapable of managing his affairs, if the estate of such person or any part thereof consist of property which by the law in force in

any Presidency subjects the proprietor, if disqualified, to the superintendence of the Court of Wards, the Court of Wards shall be authorized to take

In all other cases. charge of the same. In all other cases, except as otherwise hereinafter provided, the Civil Court shall appoint a Manager of the estate. Any near relative of the Lunatic or the Public Curator, or, if there be no Public Curator, any other suitable person, may be appointed Manager.

X. Whenever a Manager of the estate of a Lunatic is appointed by the Civil Court, the Court shall appoint a fit person to be Guardian of the person of the Lunatic. The Manager, unless he be the Public Curator, may be appointed Guardian. Provided always that the legal heir of the Lunatic shall not in any case be appointed Guardian of his person.

XI. If the estate consist in whole or in part of land or any interest in land not subject to the jurisdiction of the Court of Wards, the Civil Court, instead of appointing a Manager, may direct the Collector to take charge of the estate, and thereupon the Collector shall appoint a Manager of the property and a Guardian of the person of the Lunatic. All the proceedings of the Collector or in the charge of estates under this Act shall be subject to the control of the superior Revenue Authorities.

XII. If the person appointed to be Manager of the estate of a Lunatic, or the person appointed to be Guardian of a Lunatic's person, shall be unwilling to discharge the trust gratuitously, the Court or the Collector, as the case may be, may fix such allowance or allowances to be paid out of the estate of the Lunatic as, under the circumstances of the case, may be thought suitable.

XIII. The person appointed to be Guardian of a Lunatic's person shall have the care of his person and maintenance. When a distinct Guardian is appointed, the Manager shall pay to the Guardian such allowance as shall be fixed by the Court or the Collector, as the case may be, for the maintenance of the Lunatic and of his family.

XIV. Every Manager of the estate of a Lunatic appointed as aforesaid may exercise the same powers in the management of the estate as might have been exercised by the proprietor if not a Lunatic: and may collect and pay all just claims, debts, and liabilities due to or by the estate of the Lunatic. But no such Manager shall have power to sell or mortgage the estate or any part thereof, or to grant a lease of any immovable property for any period exceeding five years, without an order of the Civil Court previously obtained.

XV. Every person appointed by the Civil Court or by the Collector to be Manager of the estate of a Lunatic shall, within six months from the date of his appoint-

ment, deliver in Court or to the Collector, as the case may be, an inventory of the landed property belonging to the Lunatic and of all such sums of money, goods, and effects, as he shall receive on account of the estate, together with a statement of all debts due by or to the same. And every such Manager shall furnish to the Court or to the Collector annually, within three months of the close of the year of the era current in the District, an account of the property in his charge, exhibiting the sums received and disbursed on account of the estate and the balance remaining in his hands. If any relative of the Lunatic, or any public Officer, by petition to the Court, shall impugn the accuracy of the said inventory and statement, or of any annual account, the Court may summon the Manager and enquire summarily into the matter and make such order thereon as it shall think proper; or the Court, at its discretion, may refer any such petition to any subordinate Court or to the Collector if the Manager was appointed by the Collector.

XVI. All sums received by a Manager on account of any estate in excess of what may be required for the current expenses of the Lunatic or of the estate, shall be paid into the public Treasury on account of the estate and may be invested from time to time in the public Securities.

XVII. It shall be lawful for any relative of a Lunatic to sue for an account from any Manager appointed under this Act, or from any such person after his removal from office or trust, or from his personal representative in case of his death, in respect of any estate then or formerly under his care or management or of any sums of money or other property received by him on account of such estate.

XVIII. The Civil Court, for any sufficient cause, may remove any Manager appointed by the Court, not being a Public Curator, and may appoint such Curator or any other fit person in his room, and may compel the person so removed to make over the property in his hands to his successor, and to account to such successor for all monies received or disbursed by him. The Court may also, for any sufficient cause, remove any Guardian appointed by the Court. In like manner the Collector for any sufficient cause may remove any Manager or Guardian appointed by the Collector, and the Court on the application of the Collector shall compel any Manager so removed to deliver his accounts and the property in his hands.

XIX. The Civil Court may impose a fine not exceeding five hundred Rupees on any Manager of the estate of a Lunatic who wilfully neglects or refuses to deliver his accounts or any property in his hands within the prescribed time or a time fixed by the Court, and may realize such fine by attachment and sale of his property under the rules in force for the execution of decrees of Court, and may also commit the recusant to close custody until he shall deliver such accounts or property.

XIX. The Civil Court may impose a fine not exceeding five hundred Rupees on any Manager of the estate of a Lunatic who wilfully neglects or refuses to deliver his accounts or any property in his hands within the prescribed time or a time fixed by the Court, and may realize such fine by attachment and sale of his property under the rules in force for the execution of decrees of Court, and may also commit the recusant to close custody until he shall deliver such accounts or property.

XX. If it appears to the Civil Court, having regard to the situation and condition in life of the Lunatic and his family, and the amount and description of his property, to be unnecessary to appoint a Manager of the estate as hereinafore provided, the Court may, instead of appointing such Manager, order that the property (if money) or (if of any other description) the produce thereof, when realized, be paid to such person as the Court may think fit, to be applied for the maintenance of the Lunatic and his family.

XXI. When any person has been adjudged to be of unsound mind and incapable of managing his affairs, if such person or any other person acting on his behalf, or having or claiming any interest in respect of his estate, shall represent by petition to the Civil Court, or if the Court shall be informed in any other manner, that the unsoundness of mind of such person has ceased, the Court may institute an enquiry for the purpose of ascertaining whether such person is or is not still of unsound mind and incapable of managing his affairs. The enquiry shall be conducted in the manner provided in Section IV and the four following Sections of this Act; and if it be adjudged that such person has ceased to be of unsound mind and incapable of managing his affairs, the Court shall make an order for his estate to be delivered over to him, and such order shall be final.

XXII. Except as otherwise herein provided, all orders made by a Civil Court or by any subordinate Court under this Act, shall be open to appeal under the rules in force for appeals in miscellaneous cases.

XXIII. The word "Lunatic," as used in this Act, unless the contrary appears from the context, shall mean every person found by due course of law to be of unsound mind and incapable of managing his affairs. The expression "Civil Court" shall mean the principal Court of original jurisdiction in the District. Words importing the masculine gender shall include females.

THE following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 14th September 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 25th idem), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXXVI OF 1858.

An Act relating to Lunatic Asylums.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the reception and detention of Lunatics in Asylums established for that purpose; It is enacted as follows:—

I. The Executive Government of any Presidency or place, with the sanction of the Governor General of India in Council, may establish Asylums for the reception and detention of Lunatics at such places within the limits of the said Government as may be deemed proper. Any such Executive Government may also, if it think fit, grant licenses to any private persons for the establishment of such Asylums within the said limits, and may withdraw such licenses.

II. The management of every Lunatic Asylum and the care and custody of its inmates shall be regulated according to such rules as shall from time to time be sanctioned by the Executive Government. The Executive Government shall appoint for every Asylum not less than three visitors, one of whom at least shall be a Medical Officer. The Inspector of Jails (where such office exists) shall be a visitor ex-officio of all the Asylums within the circle of his inspection.

III. Two or more of the visitors, one of whom shall be a Medical Officer, shall, once at the least in every month, together inspect every part of the Asylum or Asylums of which they are visitors, and see and examine, as far as circumstances will permit, every Lunatic therein, and the order and certificate for the admission of every Lunatic admitted since the last visitation of the visitors; and shall enter in a book to be kept for that purpose any remarks which they may deem proper in regard to the management and condition of the Asylum and the Lunatics therein.

IV. It shall be the duty of every Darogah or District Police Officer to apprehend and send to the Magistrate all persons found wandering at large within his District who are deemed to be persons believed to be dangerous by reason of Lunacy. Whenever any such person as aforesaid is brought before a Magistrate, the Magistrate, with the assistance of a Medical Officer, shall examine such person, and if the Medical Officer shall sign a certificate in the Form A. in the Schedule to this Act, and the Magistrate shall be satisfied on personal examination or other proof that such person is a Lunatic and a proper person to be detained under care and treatment, he shall make an order for such Lunatic to be received into the Asylum established for the Division in which the Magistrate's jurisdiction is situate, or, if such Lunatic is not a native of the country and the circumstances of the case so require, into a Lunatic Asylum at the Presidency; and shall send the Lunatic in suitable custody to the Asylum mentioned in such order. Provided that, if any friend or relative of any Lunatic who is believed to be dangerous shall undertake in writing to the satisfaction of the Magistrate that such Lunatic shall be properly taken care of, and shall be prevented from doing injury to himself or others, the Magistrate, instead of sending him to an Asylum, may make

In certain cases, a Lunatic may be committed to the care of his friends or relatives.

him over to the care of such friend or relative. Provided also that, if any such friend or relative shall desire that the Lunatic may be sent to a licensed Asylum instead of the public Asylum of the Division and shall engage in writing to the satisfaction of the Magistrate to pay the expenses which may be incurred for the lodging, maintenance, medicine, clothing, and care of the Lunatic in such Asylum, the Magistrate may send the Lunatic to the licensed Asylum mentioned in the engagement.

V. If it shall appear to the Magistrate, on the report of a Police Officer or the information of any other person, that any person within the limits of his jurisdiction deemed to be a Lunatic is not under proper care and control, or is cruelly treated or neglected by any relative or other person having the charge of him, the Magistrate may send for the supposed Lunatic, and summon such relative or other person as has or ought to have the charge of him; and if such relative or other person be legally bound to maintain the supposed Lunatic, the Magistrate may make an order for such Lunatic being properly cared for and treated, and, if such relative or other person shall wilfully neglect to comply with the said order, may commit him to jail for a period not exceeding one month. If there be no person legally bound to maintain the supposed Lunatic, or if the Magistrate think fit so to do, he may proceed as prescribed in the last preceding Section, and upon being satisfied in manner aforesaid that the person deemed to be a Lunatic is a Lunatic and a proper person to be detained under care and treatment, may make an order for his reception into such Asylum as aforesaid. It shall be the duty of every Darogah or District Police Officer to report to the Magistrate every such case of neglect or cruel treatment as aforesaid which may come to his knowledge.

VI. All acts which the Magistrate is authorized or required to do by the two last preceding Sections, may be done in the Presidency Towns and the Stations of the Straits Settlement by the Commissioner of Police; and all duties, which a Darogah or District Police Officer is authorized or required to perform, may be performed in any of the said Towns and Stations by an Officer of the Police Force not below the rank of Inspector.

VII. Except as otherwise hereinbefore provided, no person shall be received into a Lunatic Asylum in any Presidency Town or in any Station of the Straits Settlement without an order under the hand of some person in the Form B in the Schedule to this Act together with such statement of particulars as is contained in the said Form B, nor unless such person has been found Lunatic by inquisition or under an enquiry directed by an order of one of the Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter, without the medical certificate containing the particulars in Form A in the Schedule to this Act, of two persons each of whom shall be a Physician

or Surgeon, and one of whom shall be a Presidency Surgeon or a Surgeon in the employment of the Government. When such order is presented, the visitors or manager of the Asylum, before admitting the Lunatic into the Asylum, may require the friends of the said Lunatic to engage to pay the expenses which may be incurred for the lodging, maintenance, clothing, medicine, and care of the Lunatic, unless it shall appear to the said visitors that they have not sufficient means of doing so.

VIII. *Clause 1.*—In places other than those specified in the last preceding Section, no person shall be received into a Lunatic Asylum, except as otherwise hereinbefore provided, without an order of the Civil Court.

Clause 2.—When any person has been adjudged to be a Lunatic, and a guardian for such Lunatic has been appointed by the Court of Wards or the Collector or by the Civil Court, if such guardian shall desire that the Lunatic be admitted into a Lunatic Asylum, he shall make application to the Civil Court, and the Judge with the assistance of a Medical Officer shall examine such Lunatic, and if the Medical Officer shall sign a certificate in the Form A in the Schedule to this Act, and the Judge shall be satisfied that the Lunatic is a proper person to be detained under care and treatment in a Lunatic Asylum, he shall make an order for such person to be received into the Asylum established for the Division in which his jurisdiction is situate, or, if he think fit, into any licensed Asylum mentioned in the application.

Clause 3.—If any relative or friend of any person for whom a guardian has not been appointed by the Court of Wards or the Collector or by the Civil Court, desires that such person may be admitted into a Lunatic Asylum, he may make application to the Civil Court, and the Judge, if he see sufficient reason for so doing, shall enquire into the fact of Lunacy in the same manner as if an application had been made to the Civil Court under the provisions of Section III of Act XXXV of 1858 entitled "An Act to make better provision for the care of the estates of Lunatics not subject to the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts of Judicature"; and if the Lunacy be established, the Judge may then proceed in the manner prescribed in the second Clause of this Section.

Clause 4.—Whenever the Judge shall make an order for the reception of any person into a Lunatic Asylum, he shall, at the same time, make an order for the payment of the expenses to be incurred for the lodging, maintenance, clothing, medicine, and care of such person, and such expenses shall be recovered by the Judge on the application of the visitors or manager of such Asylum. Provided however that, if it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Judge that the Lunatic has not sufficient property and that no person legally bound to maintain the said Lunatic has sufficient means for the payment of such expenses, he shall certify the same in the order for the reception of the Lunatic into the Asylum, instead of making such order for the payment of expenses as aforesaid.

Clause 5.—Whenever the Judge shall make an order for the reception of any person into a Lunatic Asylum, he shall, at the same time, make an order for the payment of the expenses to be incurred for the lodging, maintenance, clothing, medicine, and care of such person, and such expenses shall be recovered by the Judge on the application of the visitors or manager of such Asylum. Provided however that, if it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Judge that the Lunatic has not sufficient property and that no person legally bound to maintain the said Lunatic has sufficient means for the payment of such expenses, he shall certify the same in the order for the reception of the Lunatic into the Asylum, instead of making such order for the payment of expenses as aforesaid.

IX. It shall be lawful for three of the visitors of any Asylum, of whom one shall be a Medical Officer, by writing under their hands, to order the discharge of any person detained in such Asylum. When such order is given, if the person is detained under the order of any public Officer, notice of the order of discharge shall be immediately communicated to such Officer.

X. When any relative or friend of a Lunatic detained in any Asylum under the provisions of Section IV Section V, or Section VI of this Act, is desirous that such Lunatic should be delivered over to his care and custody, he shall make application to the Magistrate or Commissioner of Police under whose order the Lunatic is detained, and the Magistrate or Commissioner of Police, if he think fit, after communication with the visitors or with one of them being a Medical Officer, and upon the undertaking in writing of such relative or friend to the satisfaction of the said Magistrate or Commissioner that such Lunatic shall be properly taken care of and shall be prevented from doing injury to himself or others, shall make an order for the discharge of such Lunatic, and such Lunatic shall thereupon be discharged.

XI. The Inspector of Jails may direct the removal of any Lunatic from any public Asylum to any other public Asylum within the circle of his inspection, and such order shall be sufficient authority for the removal of such Lunatic, and also for his reception into the Asylum to which he is ordered to be removed.

XII. If, after the reception of any Lunatic into any Asylum, it appear that the order or the medical certificate or certificates upon which he was received is or are defective or incorrect, the same may at any time afterwards be amended by the person or persons signing the same with the sanction of two or more of the visitors of the said Asylum, one of whom shall be a Medical Officer.

XIII. Every person received into a Lunatic Asylum under any such order as is required by this Act, accompanied by the requisite medical certificate, may be detained therein until he be removed or discharged as authorized by this Act, and in case of escape may, by virtue of such order, be re-taken by the manager of such Asylum, or any Officer or servant belonging thereto, or any other person authorized in that behalf by the said manager, or any Police Officer, and conveyed to and received and detained in such Asylum.

XIV. When any Lunatic is sent to a licensed Asylum by order of a Magistrate or Commissioner of Police under Section IV, Section V, or Section VI of this Act, and when a Lunatic is admitted into such Asylum under Section VII or an order for the reception of a Lunatic is made under Section VIII and no engagement has been taken from the friends of the Lunatic or order made by the Judge for the payment of expenses under the said Section VII or Section VIII respectively, the expense of the

lodging, maintenance, clothing, medicine, and care of such Lunatic shall be paid by the Government to the manager of such Asylum.

XV. The Magistrate or Commissioner of Police by whom any Lunatic has been sent to a Lunatic Asylum, if it appear to such Magistrate or Commissioner that such Lunatic has an estate applicable to his maintenance and more than sufficient to maintain his family, or that any person is legally bound to maintain and has the means of maintaining such Lunatic, may apply to the chief Civil Court of original jurisdiction within the local jurisdiction of which the estate of the Lunatic may be situate or the person legally bound to maintain him may reside, and such Court shall enquire into the matter in a summary way, and on being satisfied that such Lunatic has an estate applicable to his maintenance, or that any person is legally bound to maintain and has the means of maintaining such Lunatic, shall make an order for the recovery of the charges of the lodging, maintenance, clothing, medicine, and care of such Lunatic out of such estate or from such person. Such order shall be enforced in the same manner and shall be of the same force and effect and subject to the same appeal as any judgment or order made by the said Court in a regular suit in respect of the property or person therein mentioned. Any personal property which may be in the possession of a Lunatic found wandering at large may be sold by the Magistrate and the proceeds thereof (or such part of the same as may be necessary) applied towards the payment of the charges of the lodging and maintenance of the Lunatic, and of any other expenses incurred on his behalf.

XVI. The liability of any relative or person to maintain any Lunatic shall not be taken away or affected by any provision contained in this Act.

XVII. Nothing contained in this Act shall be taken to interfere with the power of any of the Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter over any person found to be Lunatic by inquisition

or under the provisions of Act XXXIV of 1858 entitled "An Act to regulate proceedings in Lunacy in Her Majesty's Courts of Judicature," or with the rights of any Committee of the person or estate of such Lunatic; or to affect the provisions of Act IV of 1849 entitled "An Act for the safe custody of Criminal Lunatics."

XVIII. The word "Lunatic," as used in this Act, shall mean and include every person of unsound mind, and every person being an idiot. The word "Magistrate" shall include a person exercising the powers of a Magistrate.

THE 18TH SEPTEMBER 1858.

THE following Bill was read a second time in the
Legislative Council of India on the 18th Septem-
ber 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee
who are to report thereon (under a suspension
of the Standing Orders) within six weeks:—

A Bill to amend Act XIX of 1847 (Articles of War
for the government of the Native Officers and Sol-
diers in the Military Service of the East India
Company).

WHEREAS it is expedient to increase the powers
of Officers Commanding Na-
tive Regiments and to amend
the Articles of War for the
government of the Native Troops in certain other
respects; It is enacted as follows:—

I. So much of Article 2 contained in Act
XIX of 1847, as enacts that
no Non-Commissioned Officer
or Soldier shall be discharged
as a punishment except by the
sentence of a Court Martial or by order of the
Commander-in-Chief at the Presidency to which
he may belong; so much of Article 110 contained
in the said Act as enacts that no Non-Commis-
sioned Officer shall be reduced to the ranks but
by the sentence of a Court Martial, or by order of
the Commander-in-Chief of the Presidency to
which the offender shall belong; and so much of
Article 112 as limits to a period not exceeding fif-
teen days the extra drill or restriction to Barrack
limits which a Commanding Officer may without
the intervention of a Court Martial award in cases
of light offences—are repealed.

II. The Commanding Officer of every Regi-
ment subject to the said Arti-
cles of War shall have power
to discharge any Native Sol-
dier below the rank of a Non-
Commissioned Officer, and to
dismiss or to reduce to the
ranks any Native Non-Com-
missioned Officer belonging to such Regiments;
and every such dismissal shall include forfeiture of
pension.

III. Every Commanding Officer of a Regiment
or Detachment subject to the
said Articles of War may in
cases of light offences, without
the intervention of a Court
Martial, award such extra drill
or the performance of such other extra Military
duty as he may think fit, provided that he do not
thereby contravene any order
of the Commander-in-Chief of
the Forces in India, or of the
Commander-in-Chief of the Presidency to which
the offender may belong.

IV. Whenever any Court Martial or Special Commissioner shall sentence an offender subject to the said Articles of War for an offence for which such Court Martial or Special Commissioner has now by law power to award either transportation for life or imprisonment for a term of years according to the discretion of the Court or Special Commissioner, it shall be lawful for

Courts Martial, &c. may award transportation for life or for any term not less than 3 years for offences now punishable with transportation or with imprisonment for years.

such Court or Special Commissioner to sentence the offender either to transportation for life or to transportation for any term not less than three years.

V. In every case in which an offender subject to the said Articles of War has been sentenced either by a Court Martial or by a Special Commissioner to transportation for any term less than for the term of his life for an offence punishable under the said Articles of War with transportation for life, such sentence, to the extent of the punishment awarded thereby, shall be deemed as valid and effectual for all purposes as if the offender had been sentenced to transportation for life.

Sentences of transportation for a term of years passed for offences punishable with transportation for life, rendered valid.

VI. Whenever any Court Martial or Special Commissioner shall sentence an offender subject to the said Articles of War to imprisonment for any offence for which such Court Martial or Special Commissioner now has power by law to sentence the offender either to simple imprisonment or to

corporal punishment at the discretion of such Court or Commissioner, it shall be lawful for the Court to sentence the offender to imprisonment with hard labor for any term for which such Court Martial or Special Commissioner is now authorized to sentence him to simple imprisonment.

VII. In every case in which an offender subject to the said Articles of War has been sentenced by any Court Martial or by a Special Commissioner to imprisonment with hard labor for an offence for which by the said Articles of War he might have been lawfully punished with simple

imprisonment, such sentence shall be deemed valid for all purposes notwithstanding the Court by which the sentence was passed may have exceeded its jurisdiction, and all persons are hereby indemnified for any thing done in pursuance of such sentence.

VIII. If any Officer or Soldier subject to the said Articles of War shall have been illegally absent from his duty for the space of two months, a Regimental Court of Enquiry, composed of three Commissioned Officers, of whom all may be European or all Native or one or more may be European and one or more

months, such proof shall be deemed sufficient presumptive evidence of the desertion of such Officer or Soldier, and shall be sufficient to convict him of the offence of desertion, unless he shall prove that such unauthorized absence was not wilful on his part, or shall otherwise rebut the presumption of desertion arising from proof of his absence without leave.

Unless such presumption be rebutted by proof that absence was not wilful, &c.

X. Whenever any such Officer or Soldier, upon his trial for desertion or absence without leave, shall state in his defence that his unauthorized absence was not wilful or that he was detained in his village from sickness, or advance any other sufficient excuse for his absence or any matter sufficient to rebut any presumptive evidence of desertion, and shall refer to any European Civil or Military Officer of Government in support of his statement, or if it shall appear to the Court that the truth or falsehood of such statement may be ascertained by reference to any such Civil or Military Officer of Government, it shall be the duty of the Court to address such Civil or Military Officer on the subject, and to adjourn their proceedings for the purpose; and the statement in reply, if favorable to the prisoner, shall be admissible in evidence and held to have the same effect as if the statement had been made before the Court by such Civil or Military Officer in person on oath or solemn affirmation. Should any Court before which a prisoner is being tried be dissolved prior to the receipt of the reply to any communication made under the above instructions to any public functionary, a fresh Court may be ordered and the trial shall be commenced again before such Court.

THE 25TH SEPTEMBER 1858.

THE following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 25th September 1858, and was referred to Select Committee who are to report thereon after the 29th of November next :—

A Bill to provide for the punishment of breaches of contract by Artificers, Workmen, and Laborers in certain cases.

WHEREAS much loss and inconvenience are sustained by manufacturers, tradesmen, and others in the several Presidency Towns of Calcutta Madras, and Bombay, from fraudulent breach of contract on the part of Artificers, Workmen, and Laborers who have received money in advance, on account of work which they have contracted to perform; and whereas the remedy by suit in the Civil Courts for the recovery of damages is wholly insufficient, and it is just and proper that persons guilty of such fraudulent breach of contract should be subject to punishment; It is enacted as follows :—

I. When any Artificer, Workman, or Laborer shall have received from any Master or Employer resident or carrying on business in any Presidency Town, an advance of money on account of any work which he shall have contracted to perform, or to get performed by any other Artificers, Workmen, or Laborers, if such Artificer, Workman, or Laborer shall wilfully and without lawful or reasonable excuse neglect or refuse to perform or get performed such work according to the terms of his contract, such Master or Employer may complain to a Magistrate of Police, and the Magistrate shall thereupon issue a summons or a warrant, as he shall think proper, for bringing before him such Artificer, Workman, or Laborer, and shall hear and determine the case.

II. If it shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Magistrate that such Artificer, Workman, or Laborer has received money in advance from the complainant on account of any work, and has wilfully and without lawful or reasonable excuse neglected or refused to perform or get performed the same according to the terms of his contract, the Magistrate shall, at the option of the complainant, either order such Artificer, Workman, or Laborer to repay the money advanced, or such part thereof as may seem to the Magistrate just and proper, or order him to perform or get performed such work according to the terms of his contract; and if such Artificer, Workman, or Laborer shall fail to comply with the said order, the Magistrate may sentence him to be imprisoned with hard labor for a term not exceeding three months, or, if the order be for the repayment of a sum of money, for a term not exceeding three months, or, until such sum of money shall be sooner repaid; provided that no such order for the repayment of any money shall, while the same remains unsatisfied, deprive the complainant of any Civil remedy by action or otherwise which he might have had but for this Act.

Penalty if workman fail to comply with the order.

Magistrate may order repayment of advance or performance of contract.

III. When the Magistrate shall order any Artificer, Workman, or Laborer to perform or get performed any work according to the terms of his contract, he may also at the request of the complainant, require such Artificer, Workman, or Laborer to enter into a recognizance with sufficient security for the due performance of the order; and in default of his entering into such recognizance or furnishing such security to the satisfaction of the Magistrate, may sentence him to be imprisoned with hard labor for a period not exceeding three months.

IV. The word "contract," as used in this Act, shall extend to all contracts and agreements whether by deed, or written or verbal, and whether such contract be for a term certain, or for specified work, or otherwise.

THE following Bill, as settled in Committee of the whole Council on the 25th September 1858, is hereby published for general information :—

A Bill for making better provision for the care of the persons and property of Minors in the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make better provision for the care of the persons and property of Minors, not brought under the superintendence of the Court of Wards; It is enacted as follows :—

I. Regulation I. 1800, Clause 8 and the six following Clauses of Section XXIX Regulation VIII. 1805, Section V Regulation XVII. 1805, and so much of Sections II and III Regulation V. 1799, and of Clauses 2 and 3 Section XVI Regulation III. 1803, as restrict the interference of the Civil Courts in cases of inheritance by Minors, are repealed.

II. Except in the case of proprietors of estates paying Revenue to Government, who have been or shall be taken under the protection of the Court of Wards, the care of the persons of all Minors, not being European British subjects, and the charge of their property, shall be subject to the jurisdiction of the Civil Court.

III. Every person who shall claim a right to have charge of property in trust for a Minor under a Will or other Deed, or by reason of nearness of kin, or otherwise, may apply to the Civil Court for a Certificate of administration; and no person shall be competent to institute or defend any suit connected with the estate of which he claims the charge, or to give any legal discharge to the debtors of such estate, until he shall have obtained such Certificate.

What persons claiming to have charge of property in trust for a minor may apply for Certificate of administration.

No person competent to institute or defend a suit without such Certificate.

Persons and property of Minors not under the protection of the Court of Wards shall be subject to jurisdiction of Civil Court.

IV. Any relative or friend of a Minor in respect of whose property such certificate has not been granted, or, if the property consist in whole or in part of land or any interest in land, the Collector of the District may apply to the Civil Court to appoint a fit person to take charge of the property and person of such Minor.

Who may apply to Court to appoint a person to take charge of the property &c. of a Minor.

V. If the property be situate in more than one District, any such application as aforesaid shall be made to the Civil Court of the District in which the Minor has his residence.

VI. When application shall have been made to the Civil Court either by a person claiming a right to have charge of the property of a Minor, or by any relative or friend of a Minor, or by the Collector, the Court shall issue notice of the application and fix a day for hearing the same. On the day so fixed, or as soon after as may be convenient, the Court shall enquire summarily into the circumstances and pass orders in the case.

Enquiry to be made by Court on application.

shall issue notice of the application and fix a day for hearing the same. On the day so fixed, or as soon after as may be convenient, the Court shall enquire summarily into the circumstances and pass orders in the case.

VII. If it shall appear that any person claiming a right to have charge of the property of a Minor is entitled to such right by virtue of a Will or Deed, and is willing to undertake the trust, the Court shall grant a Certificate of administration to such person. If there is no person so entitled, or if such person is unwilling to undertake the trust, and there is any near relative of the Minor who is willing and fit to be entrusted with the charge of his property, the Court may grant a Certificate to such relative.

Certificate of administration to whom to be granted.

to undertake the trust, the Court shall grant a Certificate of administration to such person. If there is no person so entitled, or if such person is unwilling to undertake the trust, and there is any near relative of the Minor who is willing and fit to be entrusted with the charge of his property, the Court may grant a Certificate to such relative.

fit, (unless a Guardian have been appointed by the father), appoint such person as aforesaid or such relative or any other relative or friend of the Minor, to be Guardian of the person of the Minor.

VIII. The Court may call upon the Collector or Magistrate for a report on the character and qualification of any relative or friend of the Minor who may be desirous or willing to be entrusted with the charge of his property or person.

IX. If no title to a Certificate be established to the satisfaction of the Court by a person claiming under a Will or Deed, and if there be no near relative willing and fit to be entrusted with the charge of the property of the Minor, and the Court shall think it to be necessary for the interest of the Minor that provision should be made by the Court for the charge of his property and person, the Court may proceed to make such provision in the manner hereinafter provided.

X. If the estate of the Minor consist of moveable property or of houses, gardens, or the like, the Court may grant a Certificate to the Public Curator appointed under Section XIX Act XIX of 1841, or if there be no Public Curator, to any fit person whom the Court may appoint for the purpose.

If estate consist only of moveable property, &c., Court may grant Certificate to Public Curator or other person.

XI. Whenever the Court shall grant a Certificate of administration to the estate of a Minor to the Public Curator or other person as aforesaid, it shall at the same time appoint a Guardian to take charge of the person and maintenance of the Minor. The person to whom a Certificate of administration has been granted, unless he be the Public Curator, may be appointed Guardian. If the person appointed to be Guardian be unwilling to discharge the trust gratuitously, the Court may assign him such allowance, to be paid out of the estate of the Minor, as under the circumstances of the case it may think suitable.

Appointment of Guardian. Certificate of administration to the estate of a Minor to the Public Curator or other person as aforesaid, it shall at the same time appoint a Guardian to take charge of the person and maintenance of the Minor. The person to whom a Certificate of administration has been granted, unless he be the Public Curator, may be appointed Guardian. If the person appointed to be Guardian be unwilling to discharge the trust gratuitously, the Court may assign him such allowance, to be paid out of the estate of the Minor, as under the circumstances of the case it may think suitable.

XII. If the estate of the Minor consist, in whole or in part, of land or any interest in land, the Court may direct the Collector to take charge of the estate, and thereupon the Collector shall appoint a Manager of the property of the Minor and a Guardian of his person, in the same manner and subject to the same rules in respect of such appointments and of the duties to be performed by the manager and the Guardian respectively, so far as the same may be applicable, as if the property and person of the Minor were subject to the jurisdiction of the Court of Wards.

When the estate consists of land, Court may direct Collector to take charge of estate. whole or in part, of land or any interest in land, the Court may direct the Collector to take charge of the estate, and thereupon the Collector shall appoint a Manager of the property of the Minor and a Guardian of his person, in the same manner and subject to the same rules in respect of such appointments and of the duties to be performed by the manager and the Guardian respectively, so far as the same may be applicable, as if the property and person of the Minor were subject to the jurisdiction of the Court of Wards.

XIII. In all enquiries held by the Civil Court under this Act, the Court may make such order as to the payment of costs by the person on whose application the enquiry was made, or out of the estate of the Minor, or otherwise as it may think proper.

XIV. Whenever one or more of the proprietors of an estate, which has come under the jurisdiction of the Court of Wards on account of the disqualification of all the proprietors, ceases to be disqualified, and the estate, in consequence, ceases to be subject to the jurisdiction of the Court of Wards, notwithstanding the continued disqualification of one or more of the co-proprietors, the Collector of the District in which the estate is situate, may represent the fact to the Civil Court; and the Court, unless it see sufficient reason to the contrary, shall direct the Collector to retain charge of the persons, and of the shares of the property of the still disqualified proprietors, during the continuance of their disqualification, or until such time as it shall be otherwise ordered by the Court. The Collector shall in such case appoint a Guardian for the care of the persons, and a manager for the charge of the property of the disqualified proprietors, in the manner prescribed in Section XII. If the property be situate in more than one District, the representation shall be made by the Collector who had the general management of the property under the Court of Wards, to the Civil Court of his own District, and the orders of the Court of that District shall have effect also in other Districts, in which portions of the property may be situate.

When an estate, some of the co-proprietors of which are still Minors, ceases to be subject to the Court of Wards, Civil Court may direct Collector to retain charge of shares and persons of Minors. of an estate, which has come under the jurisdiction of the Court of Wards on account of the disqualification of all the proprietors, ceases to be disqualified, and the estate, in consequence, ceases to be subject to the jurisdiction of the Court of Wards, notwithstanding the continued disqualification of one or more of the co-proprietors, the Collector of the District in which the estate is situate, may represent the fact to the Civil Court; and the Court, unless it see sufficient reason to the contrary, shall direct the Collector to retain charge of the persons, and of the shares of the property of the still disqualified proprietors, during the continuance of their disqualification, or until such time as it shall be otherwise ordered by the Court. The Collector shall in such case appoint a Guardian for the care of the persons, and a manager for the charge of the property of the disqualified proprietors, in the manner prescribed in Section XII. If the property be situate in more than one District, the representation shall be made by the Collector who had the general management of the property under the Court of Wards, to the Civil Court of his own District, and the orders of the Court of that District shall have effect also in other Districts, in which portions of the property may be situate.

XV. The proceedings of the Collector in the charge of estates under this Act shall be subject to the control of the superior Revenue Authorities.

XVI. The Public Curator and every other Administrator to whom a Certificate shall have been granted under Section X shall, within six months from the date of the Certificate, deliver in Court an inventory of any immoveable property belonging to the Minor, and of all such sums of money, goods, effects, and things as he shall have received on account of the estate, together with a statement of all debts due, by or to the same. And the Public Curator and every such other Administrator shall furnish annually, within three months from the close of the year of the era current in the District, an account of the property in his charge, exhibiting the amounts received and disbursed on account of the estate, and the balance in hand. If any relative or friend of a Minor or any Public Officer, by petition to the Court, shall impugn the accuracy of the said inventory and statement or of any annual account, the Court may summon the Curator or Administrator and enquire summarily into the matter, and make such order thereon as it shall think proper, or the Court at its discretion may refer such petition to any subordinate Court.

XVII. All sums received by the Public Curator or such other Administrator on account of any estate, in excess of what may be required for the current expenses of the Minor or of the estate, shall be paid into the public Treasury on account of the estate, and may be invested from time to time in the public Securities.

Public Curator &c. to pay proceeds of estates into Treasury. Surplus funds to be invested in public Securities.

XVIII. It shall be lawful for any relative or friend of a Minor, at any time during the continuance of the minority, to sue for an account from any Manager appointed under this Act, or from any person to whom a Certificate shall have been granted under the provisions of this Act, or from any such Manager or person after his removal from office or trust, or from his personal representative in case of his death, in respect of any estate then or formerly under his care or management, or of any sums of money or other property received by him on account of such estate.

Relative or friend may sue for an account.

XIX. If the disqualification of a person, for whose benefit a suit shall have been instituted under this Act, cease before the final decision thereof, it shall be lawful for such person to continue the prosecution of the suit on his own behalf.

Continuance of suit instituted under this Act after disqualification shall have ceased.

XX. The Civil Court for any sufficient cause may recall any Certificate granted under this Act, and may direct the Collector to take charge of the estate, or may grant a Certificate to the Public Curator or any other person as the case may be; and may compel the person whose Certificate has been recalled to make over the property in his hands to his successor, and to account to such successor for all monies received and disbursed by him. The Court may also for any sufficient cause remove any Guardian appointed by the Court.

Revocation of Certificate.

Removal of Guardian.

XXI. The Civil Court may impose a fine not exceeding five hundred Rupee on any person who may wilfully neglect or refuse to deliver his accounts, or any property in his hands, within the prescribed time, or a time fixed by the Court, and may realize such fine by attachment and sale of his property under the rules in force for the execution of decrees of Court, and may also commit the recusant to close custody until he shall consent to deliver such accounts or property.

Penalty for neglect or refusal to deliver accounts or property.

XXII. The Civil Court may permit any person to whom a certificate shall have been granted under this Act not being the Public Curator, and any Guardian appointed by the Court, to resign his trust, and may give him a discharge therefrom on his accounting to his successor, duly appointed, for all monies received and disbursed by him, and making over the property in his hands.

Civil Court may permit resignation of trust, &c.

XXIII. The Public Curator and every other Administrator to whom a Certificate shall have been granted under Section X, shall be entitled to receive such commission not exceeding five per centum on the sums received and disbursed by him, or such other allowance, to be paid out of the Minor's estate, as the Civil Court shall think fit.

Remuneration of Public Curator, &c.

XXIV. Every Guardian appointed by the Civil Court, or by the Collector or under this Act, who shall have charge of any male Minor shall be bound to provide for his education in a suitable manner. The general superintendence and control of the education of all such Minors shall be vested in the Civil Court or in the Collector, as the case may be; and the provisions of Act XXVI of 1854 (for making better provision for the education of Male Minors subject to the superintendence of the Court of Wards) shall, so far as is consistent with the provisions herein contained, be applicable to the Civil Court, or to the Collector, as the case may be, in respect to such Minors, and to every such Guardian.

Guardians of Minors to provide for their education. Act XXVI of 1854 declared applicable.

XXV. For the purposes of this Act, every person shall be held to be a Minor, who has not attained the age of eighteen years.

Persons under the age of 18 years to be held Minors for the purposes of this Act.

XXVI. Nothing in this Act shall authorize the appointment of a Guardian of the person of a female whose husband is not a Minor, or the appointment of a Guardian of the person of any Minor whose father is living and is not a Minor; and nothing in this Act shall authorize the appointment of any person other than a female as the Guardian of the person of a female. If a Guardian of the person of a Minor be appointed during the minority of the father or husband of the Minor, the Guardianship shall cease as soon as the father or husband (as the case may be) shall attain the age of majority.

Act not to authorize the appointment of Guardians of certain married women and other persons.

Guardianship during the minority of the father or husband of a Minor when to cease.

XXVII. All orders passed by the Civil Court or by any Subordinate Court under this Act, shall be open to appeal under the rules in force for appeals, in miscellaneous cases, from the orders of such Court and the Subordinate Courts.

XXVIII. The expression "Civil Court" as used in this Act shall be held to mean the principal Court of original jurisdiction in the District, and shall not include the Supreme Court; and nothing contained in this Act shall be held to affect the powers of the Supreme Court over the person or property of any Minor subject to its jurisdiction. Unless the contrary appears from the context, words importing the singular number shall include the plural number, and words importing the plural number shall include the singular number, and words importing the masculine gender shall include females.

PROCEEDINGS OF LIEUT. R. STEWART, *Offy. Supdt.*

DURING a seven years' residence on this Frontier has frequently struck me that although Cachar and the surrounding Districts and States are most fertile in themselves, and productive of many of the articles of trade such as are conducive to the necessities and conveniences of life, yet that no regular system exists whereby this produce can be made generally available to the western and more civilized portion of the Empire.

It is likewise apparent that although the inhabitants of this Frontier are by no means poor, yet they have not been introduced to the full advantages to be derived from extensive importations of foreign manufactures.

The causes of this stagnation of traffic appear to me to be the want of roads and consequently of wheeled conveyances and the continued inclemency of the seasons for the greater portion of the year which makes all communication both by land and water extremely difficult.

As great natural as well as financial difficulties exist, debarring for the present all thoughts of the construction of good roads, and as the river navigation will be always affected by the seasons until a trade has been created sufficiently remunerative for the occupation of steamers and vessels, proof against the storms and strong currents which prevail during the rains, it remains to provide a channel for traffic as little affected as possible by the difficulties with which it is at certain times surrounded.

From the month of November to that of February, the weather is cold and bracing, fair and calm. The plains are hard and traversable, the hills, valleys, marshes and jungles are free from miasmatic influences. The river is low enough to be deprived of strong currents and deep enough to admit of navigation by boats of moderate tonnage. This appears to be the season when the traders of the different Districts and States should assemble at some central position and reciprocate produce. It is necessary, I think, only to appoint a date and a place of rendezvous in order to secure the establishment of a periodical trade which will connect Burma with Dacca, and Assam with the Hills of Tipperah.

For this purpose, in consultation with Mr. Allen, Member of the Board of Revenue, on deputation at Cherrapoonjee, it has been determined that an annual Fair or Mela be held at Silchar, the Sudder Station of Cachar, and that the inhabitants of the neighbouring Districts to the West as well as those of Assam to the North be invited to attend, bringing for sale and barter the produce of their respective countries, and that to meet these it be intimated to the inhabitants of Cachar, North, South and Proper, to those of Munipoor and Kubboo, to the inhabitants of the Kutchangamienagah, and Lhooshai countries through the proper authorities, that a Mart has been opened where they may not only dispose of their native produce, but receive in return that and the manufactures of Foreign countries.

The date of the Mela which will last for five days is fixed from the 30th December to the 3rd January 1858-59 inclusive, corresponding with 16th to 20th Pows 1265 B. S.

Ordered, that copies of this Proceeding, together with the accompanying advertisement relating to it and recounting the articles most likely to be proffered and demanded at the Mela, be sent in English and Vernaculars to the authorities of the Province of Assam, and the Zillah of Dacca, Furreedpoor, Mymensing, Tipperah and Sylhet, likewise to Major McCulloch, Political Agent in Munipoor, for communication to the Governments of Munipoor and Kubboo, and that these gentlemen be solicited to give the widest circulation and publicity in their power to the advertisement.

Ordered, that the above Proceeding be communicated through emissaries to the different tribes of Nagahs, Kookies, Cassyahs, Meekirs, Cacharies, Angamies, Kacha Nagahs and Looshais in and about Cachar.

Ordered, that copies of the above Proceeding and advertisement be sent to all known and respectable Individuals, Merchants, Traders, Landholders and Planters on the Frontier, with the request that they will give publicity to, and aid the undertaking.

No taxes or Bazar dues will be levied on any articles sold at the Mela, and sheds will be erected for the convenience of the Shop-keepers.

The Mela will last for five days, and during its continuance, prizes will be offered by Public Subscription to the winners in Boat, Elephant, Horse and Foot Races as well as for other Athletic games and exercises among which may be mentioned the Muniporee, Kangjai or Hockey upon horse back.

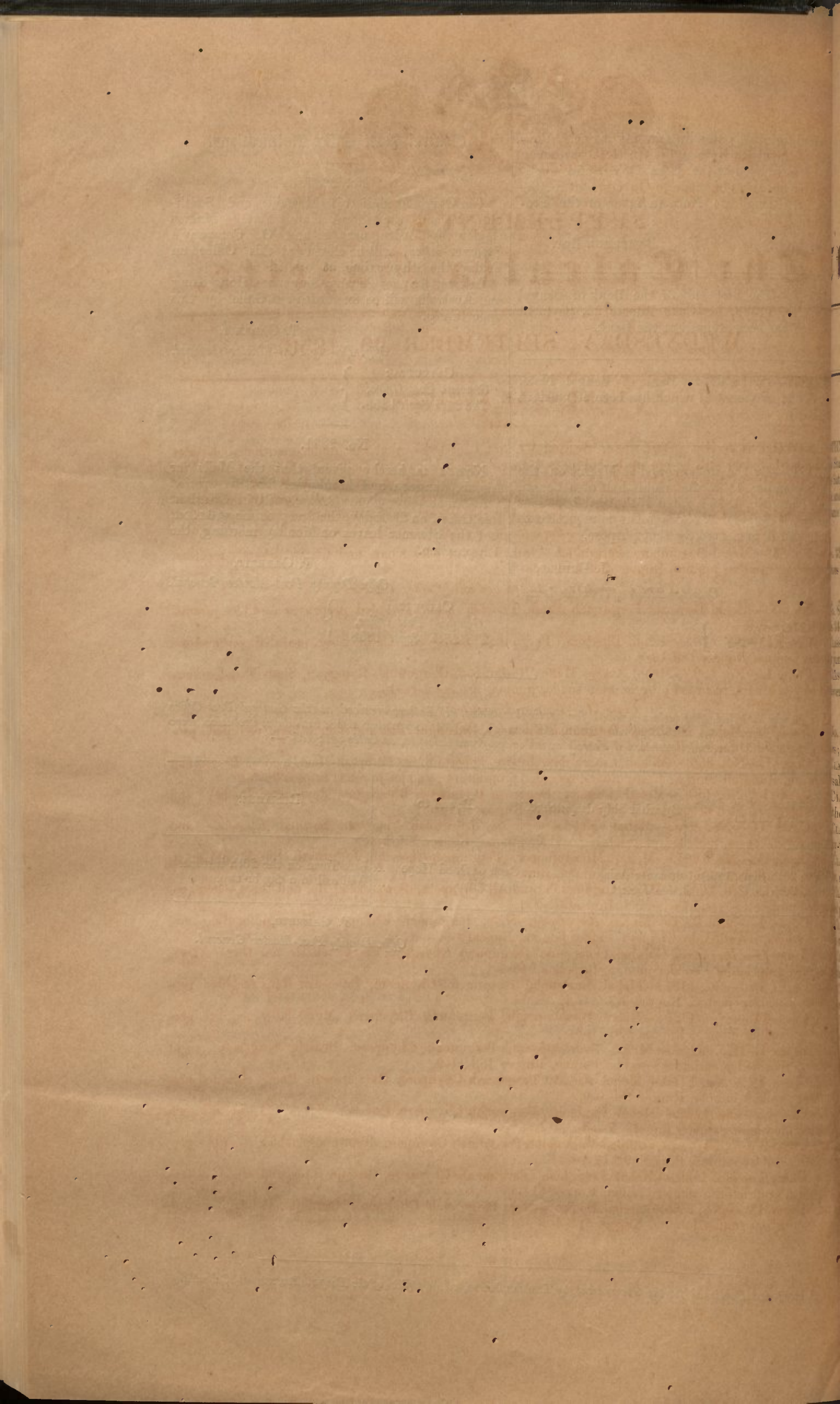

Legislative Council of India.

THE 25TH SEPTEMBER 1858.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honourable the Governor General on the 14th September 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 25th idem), and is hereby promulgated for general information :—

ACT No. XXXIV, OF 1858.

An Act to regulate proceedings in Lunacy in the Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter.

WHEREAS the several Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charters within the British territories in India, are authorized and empowered by their respective Charters to appoint guardians and keepers of the persons and estates of Lunatics, and to enquire into, hear, and determine questions of alleged Lunacy by inspection of the person or by such other ways and means by which the truth may best be discovered and known; and whereas, according to the practice of the said Courts, questions of alleged Lunacy are determined by inquisition taken before a jury, and it is expedient to lessen the cost and to alter the mode of enquiry into such questions, and also to empower the said Courts to make provision for the due management of the estates of Lunatics; It is enacted as follows :—

I. It shall be lawful for any of the said Courts of Judicature, on such application as is hereinafter mentioned, to make an order directing an enquiry whether any person (subject to the jurisdiction of the Court), who is alleged to be Lunatic, is or is not of unsound mind and incapable of managing himself and his affairs. The order may also contain directions for other enquiries concerning the nature of the property belonging to the alleged Lunatic, the persons who are his relatives or next of kin, the time during which he has been of unsound mind, or such other matters as to the Court shall seem proper.

II. Application for such enquiry may be made by any persons related by blood or marriage to the alleged Lunatic, or by the Advocate General.

III. The order made by the Court upon such application shall direct the enquiry to be by the Court itself.

It shall nevertheless be lawful for the Court, if it see sufficient cause for so doing, to direct the enquiry to be executed in Chambers before a single Judge of the Court. Reasonable notice of the time and place appointed for the enquiry shall be given to the alleged Lunatic. If it shall appear that the alleged Lunatic is in such a state that personal service on him would be ineffectual, the Court may direct such substituted service of the notice as it shall think proper. The Court may also, if it think fit, direct a copy of such notice to be served upon any person related by blood or marriage to the alleged Lunatic. If the enquiry be directed to be executed before a single Judge, it shall be lawful for the alleged Lunatic, at any time before the day fixed for the enquiry, to demand an enquiry before the full Court. In such case the enquiry shall be by the Court, and a further day shall be appointed for making such enquiry; and in such case the Court may direct such further notices (if any) to be given, as it may think requisite.

IV. The Court may, at any time after the application, require the alleged Lunatic to attend at such convenient time and place, within twenty miles of the place of residence of the said Lunatic, as it may appoint for the purpose of being personally examined by the Court or by any person from whom the Court may desire to have a report of the mental capacity and condition of such alleged Lunatic.

V. The Court may likewise, at any time after the application for such enquiry, make an order authorizing any person or persons, to be therein named, to have access to the alleged Lunatic for the purpose of a personal examination.

VI. And may authorize persons to have access to the Lunatic for the purpose of examination.

VI. The attendance and examination of the alleged Lunatic under the provisions of the two last preceding Sections, shall, if the alleged Lunatic be a woman who, according to the custom and manners of the Country, ought not to be compelled to appear in public, be regulated by the rules in force for the examination of such persons in other cases.

VII. If the enquiry is made by a Judge of the Court, the Judge executing the enquiry shall, while so employed, have power (subject to the provisions of the last preceding Section) personally to examine the alleged Lunatic and take such evidence, on oath or otherwise, and call for such information as he may think fit or the said Court may direct in order to ascertain whether the alleged Lunatic is or is not, of unsound mind, and shall have the like powers and authority as are or may be vested by law in a Judge or Master of the said Court for the investigation of matters referred to them by the Court. The Judge shall report to the Court the result of the enquiry.

VIII. If the alleged Lunatic be not within the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Court, and the enquiry cannot conveniently be made in either of the modes hereinbefore provided, the Court may direct the enquiry to be made before any principal Court of original jurisdiction in Civil cases within whose local jurisdiction the alleged Lunatic may be.

the alleged Lunatic may be, and such last mentioned Court shall accordingly proceed to make such enquiry in the same manner as if the alleged Lunatic were subject to its jurisdiction, and shall certify its finding upon the matters of enquiry to the Court directing the enquiry. The evidence taken upon the enquiry shall be recorded by the Court in the English language in the form of a narrative; and a copy thereof, certified by the Court, shall be transmitted, together with any remarks the Court may think fit to make thereon, to the Court by which the enquiry was directed.

IX. If the report of the Judge or the finding of a Court under the last preceding Section appear to the Court directing the enquiry to be defective or insufficient in point of form, it shall be lawful for such last mentioned Court either to amend the same or to refer it back to the Judge or the Court which made the enquiry to be amended.

X. It shall be lawful for the Court, on the application of the person at whose instance the order directing an inquiry was made or on the application of the alleged Lunatic or of any of his relatives authorized by the Court to make the application, to direct a new trial of the matters of enquiry according to the usual course and practice of the Court in directing new trials in Civil cases. If such application be granted in a case tried by a single Judge, the order granting the same shall direct the enquiry to be made by the full Court. If the application be granted in a case tried under Section VIII, the Court directing the

new trial may give such directions regarding the same as it shall see fit.

XI. The Court shall make such order as may appear just respecting the cost of any enquiry under this Act and may include therein such remuneration to Physicians and Surgeons as the Court, having regard to the nature of the enquiry, shall deem reasonable.

XII. If no new trial be directed, the finding of the Court to which the application for enquiry was made if the enquiry have been made by such Court, or the report of the Judge or the finding of the Court to which the enquiry may have been referred under

the provisions of Section VIII, as the case may be shall be of the same force and effect, and be proceeded on in the same manner in regard to the appointment of Committees of the person and estate of the Lunatic, as the inquisition now according to practice taken upon the oath of a jury.

XIII. It shall be lawful for the Court, on the appointment of Committees of the person and estate of a Lunatic, to direct by the order of appointment, or by any subsequent order, that the person to whom the charge of the estate is committed, shall have such powers for the management thereof as to the Court shall seem necessary and proper, reference being had to the nature of the property, whether moveable or immoveable, of which the estate may consist. But such powers shall not extend to the sale or charge by way of mortgage of the estate or any part thereof, or to the letting of any immoveable property unless for a term not exceeding three years.

XIV. The Master of the Court shall be at liberty, without an order of reference, to receive any proposal and conduct any enquiry respecting the management of the estate of a Lunatic, if such proposal relate to any matter which the Committee of the estate has not been empowered by an order under the last preceding Section to dispose of. The Master may likewise, without reference, receive and charge into any proposal relating to the sale or charge by way of mortgage of the estate or of any part thereof, or to the letting of any immoveable property for a term exceeding three years.

XV. The Master shall report to the Court on the proposal; and the Court shall, subject to the provisions of this Act, make such order upon the report and respecting the costs, as shall, under the circumstances, seem just.

XVI. The Court or the Master shall once in the matter of each Lunacy, and may afterwards from time to time, determine whether any one or more and (if any) how many and which of the relatives or next of kin shall attend before the Master, at the cost of the estate, in any proceeding connected with the management thereof; and, if any such relative or next of kin is an infant, may from time to time appoint a fit person to be his guardian for the purposes of the Lunacy.

XVII. The Court or the Master shall once in the matter of each Lunacy, and may afterwards from time to time, determine whether any one or more and (if any) how many and which of the relatives or next of kin shall attend before the Master, at the cost of the estate, in any proceeding connected with the management thereof; and, if any such relative or next of kin is an infant, may from time to time appoint a fit person to be his guardian for the purposes of the Lunacy.

XVIII. The Court or the Master shall once in the matter of each Lunacy, and may afterwards from time to time, determine whether any one or more and (if any) how many and which of the relatives or next of kin shall attend before the Master, at the cost of the estate, in any proceeding connected with the management thereof; and, if any such relative or next of kin is an infant, may from time to time appoint a fit person to be his guardian for the purposes of the Lunacy.

XVII. The Court may, on application made to it by petition concerning any matter whatsoever connected with the Lunacy, make such order, subject to the provisions of this Act, respecting the application and the costs thereof, and of the consequent proceedings, as shall, under the circumstances, seem just.

XVIII. The Court may, if it appears to be just, or for the Lunatic's benefit, order that any property, moveable or immoveable, of the Lunatic, and whether in possession, reversion, remainder, contingency, or expectancy, be sold or charged by way of mortgage or otherwise disposed of, as may seem most expedient for the purpose of raising money to be applied for any of the following purposes:—

1. The payment of the Lunatic's debts, including any debt incurred for his maintenance or otherwise for his benefit.
2. The discharge of any incumbrance on his estate.
3. The payment of or provision for the expenses of his future maintenance and the maintenance of his family, including the expenses of his removal to Europe, when he shall be so removed, and all expenses incidental thereto.
4. The payment of the costs of any enquiry under this Act, and of any costs incurred by order or under the authority of the Court.

XIX. The Committee of the Lunatic's estate shall, in the name and on behalf of the Lunatic, execute all such conveyances and instruments of transfer relative to any sale, mortgage, or other disposition of his estate as the Court shall order. In like manner such Committee shall, under the order of the Court, exercise all powers whatsoever vested in a Lunatic, whether the same are vested in him for his own benefit or in the character of trustee or guardian.

XX. Where a person, having contracted to sell or otherwise dispose of his estate or any part thereof, afterwards becomes Lunatic, the Court may, if the contract is such as the Court thinks ought to be performed, direct the Committee of the estate to execute such conveyances and to do such other acts in fulfilment of the contract as it shall think proper.

XXI. If a member of a partnership firm be found Lunatic, the Court may, on the application of the other partners, or of any person who appears to the Court to be entitled to require the same, dissolve the partnership; and thereupon or upon a dissolution by decree of Court or otherwise by due course of law, the Committee of the estate may, in the name and on behalf of the Lunatic, join with the other partners in disposing of the partnership property upon such terms, and shall do all such acts for carrying into effect the dissolution of the partnership, as the Court shall think proper.

XXII. Where a Lunatic has been engaged in business, the Court may, if it appear to be for the Lunatic's benefit that the business premises should be disposed of, order the Committee of the estate to sell and dispose of the same; and the monies arising from such sale shall be applied in such manner as the Court shall direct.

XXIII. Where a Lunatic is entitled to a lease or under-lease, and it appears to be for the benefit of his estate that it should be disposed of, the Committee of the estate may, by order of the Court, surrender, assign, or otherwise dispose of the same to such person for such valuable or nominal consideration, and upon such terms as the Court shall think fit.

XXIV. If a Lunatic is possessed of any landed property situate beyond the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Court, which, by the law in force in the Presidency wherein such land is situated, subjects the proprietor, if disqualified, to the superintendence of the Court of Wards, the said Court of Wards may assume the charge of such landed property and manage the same according to the rules for the time being in force for such management.

Provided that in such case no further proceedings in respect of the Lunacy shall be taken under any such law, nor shall it be competent to the Court of Wards or to any Collector to appoint a guardian of the person of the said Lunatic or a manager of the estate, except of the landed property which so subjects the proprietor as aforesaid. Provided also that the surplus of the income of such landed property after providing for the discharge of the Government Revenue and expenses of management, shall be disposed of from time to time in such manner as the Supreme Court shall direct, and not otherwise.

Provided further that nothing contained in this Section shall affect the powers given to the Supreme Court by Sections XVIII, XIX, and XX of this Act or (except so far as relates to the management of the said landed property which so subjects the proprietor as aforesaid) the powers given by any other Section of this Act.

XXV. Where any Stock or Government Securities or any Share in a Company (transferable within the said territories or the dividends of which are payable there) is standing in the name of, or is vested in a Lunatic beneficially entitled thereto, or in a Committee of the estate of a Lunatic, or in a trustee for him, and the Committee dies intestate, or himself becomes Lunatic, or is out of the jurisdiction of the Court, or it is uncertain whether the Committee be living or dead, or he neglects or refuses to transfer the Stock, Securities, or Shares, or to receive and pay the dividends to a new Committee, or as he directs, within fourteen days after being required by him to do so, then the Court may order some fit person to make such transfer, or to transfer the same, and to receive and pay over the dividends in such manner as the Court may

direct; and such transfer or payment shall be valid and effectual for all purposes.

XXVI. Where any such Stock or Government Securities or Share in a Company is standing in the name of, or vested in any person residing out of the said Territories, and not in any part of the United Kingdom, the Court, upon being satisfied that such person has been declared of unsound mind, and that his personal estate has been vested in a curator or manager, according to the laws of the place where he is residing, may order some fit person to make such transfer of the Stock, Securities, or Shares, or of any part thereof, to such curator or manager or otherwise, and also to receive and pay over the dividends and proceeds, as the Court may think fit; and any act done in pursuance of such order shall be valid and effectual for all purposes.

XXVII. If it appears to the Court, having regard to the situation and condition in life of the Lunatic and his family and the other circumstances of the case, to be expedient that his property should be made available for his or their maintenance in a direct and inexpensive manner, it may, instead of appointing a Committee of the estate, order that the property (if money,) or (if of any other description) the produce thereof, when realized, be paid to such person as the Court may think fit, to be applied for the purpose aforesaid; and all payments so made shall be a good discharge to the person making the same.

XXVIII. If it appears to the Court that the unsoundness of mind of a Lunatic is in its nature temporary, and that it is expedient to make temporary provision for his maintenance or for the maintenance of his family, the Court may, in like manner as under the last preceding Section, direct his property or a sufficient part of it to be applied for the purpose aforesaid.

XXIX. When any person has been found of unsound mind, and it shall be shown to the Court, either on the application of such person or of any other person acting on his behalf, or on the information of any other person, that there is reason to believe that such unsoundness of mind has ceased, the Court may make an order for enquiry whether such person is or is not still of unsound mind and incapable of managing himself and his affairs. The enquiry shall be conducted in the same manner and subject to the same rules as are hereinbefore prescribed for an enquiry into the unsoundness of mind of an alleged Lunatic; and if it be found that the unsoundness of mind has ceased, the Court shall order all proceedings in the matter of the Lunacy to cease or to be set aside on such terms and conditions as under the circumstances of the case shall appear proper.

XXX. The Court may, from time to time, make such orders, not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, as shall seem meet for carrying into effect the purposes of this Act, and for regulating the mode of proceeding before the Court or before a Judge of the Court, or the Master in matters of Lunacy.

XXXI. Every power given by this Act to the Master of any of the said Courts may also be exercised by a Judge of any of the said Courts, and shall in the Court of Judicature of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca be exercised by the Recorder of the said Court or of any division thereof.

XXXII. Unless the contrary appears from the context, the word "Lunatic," as used in this Act, shall mean any person found by due course of law to be of unsound mind and incapable of managing his affairs. Words importing the singular number shall include the plural number, and words importing the plural number shall include the singular number. Words importing the masculine gender shall include females.

THE following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 14th September 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 25th idem), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXXV OF 1858.

An Act to make better provision for the care of the estates of Lunatics not subject to the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts of Judicature.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make better provision for the care of the estates of Lunatics not subject to the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts of Judicature: and to prescribe general rules by which the state of mind of persons not subject to such jurisdiction, who are alleged to be Lunatic, may be enquired into and ascertained; It is enacted as follows:—

I. So much of Section V Regulation X. 1793, of Section IX Regulation III. 1803, of Regulation I. 1800, and of Section XXIX Regulation VIII. 1805 (extended to Benares by Section II Regulation VI. 1822), of the Bengal Code; and so much of Sections VI and VII Regulation V. 1804, and of Sections XX and XXII of the said Regulation (as modified by Section III Regulation X. 1831), of the Madras Code, as relate to Lunatics or idiots—are hereby repealed.

II. Whenever any person not subject to the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts, who is possessed of property, is alleged to be a Lunatic, the Civil Court, within whose jurisdiction such person is residing, may, upon such application as is hereinafter mentioned, institute an enquiry for the purpose of ascertaining whether such person is or is not of unsound mind and incapable of managing his affairs.

III. Application for such enquiry may be made by any relative of the alleged Lunatic or by any Public Curator appointed under Act XIX of 1841, or by the Government Pleader, or, if the property of the alleged Lunatic consist in whole or in part of land or any interest in land, by the Collector of the District in which it is situate. If the property or any part thereof be of such a description as by the law in force in any Presidency where such property is situate would subject the proprietor, if disqualified, to the superintendence of the Court of Wards, the application may be made by the Collector on behalf of the Court of Wards

IV. When the Civil Court is about to institute any such enquiry as aforesaid, it shall cause notice to be given to the alleged Lunatic of the time and place at which it is proposed to hold the enquiry. If it shall appear that the alleged Lunatic is in such a state that personal service on him would be ineffectual, the Court may direct such substituted service of the notice as it shall think proper. The Court may also direct a copy of such notice to be served upon any relative of the alleged Lunatic.

V. The Civil Court may require the alleged Lunatic to attend at such convenient time and place as it may appoint for the purpose of being personally examined by the Court or by any person from whom the Court may desire to have a report of the mental capacity and condition of such alleged Lunatic. The Court may likewise make an order authorizing any person or persons therein named to have access to the alleged Lunatic for the purpose of a personal examination.

VI. The attendance and examination of the alleged Lunatic under the provisions of the last preceding Section shall, if the alleged Lunatic be a woman who according to the manners and customs of the Country ought not to be compelled to appear in public, be regulated by the rules made for the examination of such persons in other cases.

VII. The Civil Court, if it think fit, may appoint two or more persons to act as Assessors to the Court in the said enquiry. Upon the completion of the enquiry, the Court shall determine whether the alleged Lunatic is or is not of unsound mind, and may make such order as to the payment of the costs of the enquiry by the person upon whose application it was made, or out of the estate of the alleged Lunatic if he be adjudged to be of unsound mind, or otherwise, as it may think proper.

VIII. If the alleged Lunatic reside at a distance of more than fifty miles from the place where the Civil Court to which the application shall have been made is held, the said Court may issue a Commission to any subordinate Court to make the enquiry, and thereupon the said subordinate Court shall con-

duct the enquiry in the manner hereinbefore provided. On the completion of the enquiry, the subordinate Court shall report its proceedings with the opinions of the Assessors if Assessors have been appointed and its own opinion on the case; and thereupon the Civil Court shall make such order in the case as it may think proper.

IX. When a person has been adjudged to be of unsound mind and incapable of managing his affairs, if the estate of such person or any part thereof consist of property which by the law in force in any Presidency subjects the proprietor, if disqualified, to the superintendence of the Court of Wards, the Court of Wards shall be authorized to take charge of the same. In all other cases, except as otherwise hereinafter provided, the Civil Court shall appoint a Manager of the estate. Any near relative of the Lunatic or the Public Curator, or, if there be no Public Curator, any other suitable person, may be appointed Manager.

X. Whenever a Manager of the estate of a Lunatic is appointed by the Civil Court, the Court shall appoint a fit person to be Guardian of the person of the Lunatic. The Manager, unless he be the Public Curator, may be appointed Guardian. Provided always that the legal heir of the Lunatic shall not in any case be appointed Guardian of his person.

XI. If the estate consist in whole or in part of land or any interest in land not subject to the jurisdiction of the Court of Wards, the Civil Court, instead of appointing a Manager, may direct the Collector to take charge of the estate, and thereupon the Collector shall appoint a Manager of the property and a Guardian of the person of the Lunatic. All the proceedings of the Collector or in the charge of estates under this Act shall be subject to the control of the superior Revenue Authorities.

XII. If the person appointed to be Manager of the estate of a Lunatic, or the person appointed to be Guardian of a Lunatic's person, shall be unwilling to discharge the trust gratuitously, the Court or the Collector, as the case may be, may fix such allowance or allowances to be paid out of the estate of the Lunatic as, under the circumstances of the case, may be thought suitable.

XIII. The person appointed to be Guardian of a Lunatic's person shall have the care of his person and maintenance. When a distinct Guardian is appointed, the Manager shall pay to the Guardian such allowance as shall be fixed by the Court or the Collector, as the case may be, for the maintenance of the Lunatic and of his family.

XIV. Every Manager of the estate of a Lunatic appointed as aforesaid may exercise the same powers in the management of the estate as might have been exercised by the proprietor if

not a Lunatic : and may collect and pay all just claims, debts, and liabilities due to or by the estate of the Lunatic. But no such Manager shall have power to sell or mortgage the estate or any part thereof, or to grant a lease of any immoveable property for any period exceeding five years, without an order of the Civil Court previously obtained.

XV. Every person appointed by the Civil Court or by the Collector to be Manager of the estate of a Lunatic shall, within six months from the date of his appointment, deliver in Court or to the Collector, as the case may be, an inventory of the landed property belonging to the Lunatic and of all such sums of money, goods, and effects, as he shall receive on account of the estate, together with a statement of all debts due by or to the same. And every such Manager shall furnish to the Court or to the Collector annually, within three months of the close of the year of the era current in the District, an account of the property in his charge, exhibiting the sums received and disbursed on account of the estate and the balance remaining in his hands. If any relative of the Lunatic, or any public Officer, by petition to the Court, shall impugn the accuracy of the said inventory and statement, or of any annual account, the Court may summon the Manager and enquire summarily into the matter and make such order thereon as it shall think proper; or the Court, at its discretion, may refer any such petition to any subordinate Court or to the Collector if the Manager was appointed by the Collector.

XVI. All sums received by a Manager on account of any estate in excess of what may be required for the current expenses of the Lunatic or of the estate, shall be paid into the public Treasury on account of the estate and may be invested from time to time in the public Securities.

XVII. It shall be lawful for any relative of a Lunatic to sue for an account from any Manager appointed under this Act, or from any such person after his removal from office or trust, or from his personal representative in case of his death, in respect of any estate then or formerly under his care or management or of any sums of money or other property received by him on account of such estate.

XVIII. The Civil Court, for any sufficient cause, may remove any Manager appointed by the Court, not being a Public Curator, and may appoint such Curator or any other fit person in his room, and may compel the person so removed to make over the property in his hands to his successor, and to account to such successor for all monies received or disbursed by him. The Court may also, for any sufficient cause, remove any Guardian appointed by the Court. In like manner the Collector for any sufficient cause may remove any Manager or Guardian appointed by the Collector, and the Court on the application of the Collector shall compel any Manager so removed to deliver his accounts and the property in his hands.

XIX. The Civil Court may impose a fine not exceeding five hundred Rupees on any Manager of the estate of a Lunatic who wilfully neglects or refuses to deliver his accounts or any property in his hands within the prescribed time or a time fixed by the Court, and may realize such fine by attachment and sale of his property under the rules in force for the execution of decrees of Court, and may also commit the recusant to close custody until he shall deliver such accounts or property.

XX. If it appears to the Civil Court, having regard to the situation and condition in life of the Lunatic and his family, and the amount and description of his property, to be unnecessary to appoint a Manager of the estate as hereinbefore provided; the Court may, instead of appointing such Manager, order that the property (if money) or (if of any other description) the produce thereof, when realized, be paid to such person as the Court may think fit, to be applied for the maintenance of the Lunatic and his family.

XXI. When any person has been adjudged to be of unsound mind and incapable of managing his affairs, if such person or any other person acting on his behalf, or having or claiming any interest in respect of his estate, shall represent by petition to the Civil Court, or if the Court shall be informed in any other manner, that the unsoundness of mind of such person has ceased, the Court may institute an enquiry for the purpose of ascertaining whether such person is or is not still of unsound mind and incapable of managing his affairs. The enquiry shall be conducted in the manner provided in Section IV and the four following Sections of this Act; and if it be adjudged that such person has ceased to be of unsound mind and incapable of managing his affairs, the Court shall make an order for his estate to be delivered over to him, and such order shall be final.

XXII. Except as otherwise herein provided, all orders made by a Civil Court or by any subordinate Court under this Act, shall be open to appeal under the rules in force for appeals in miscellaneous cases.

XXIII. The word "Lunatic," as used in this Act, unless the contrary appears from the context, shall mean every person found by due course of law to be of unsound mind and incapable of managing his affairs. The expression "Civil Court" shall mean the principal Court of original jurisdiction in the District. Words importing the masculine gender shall include females.

THE following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 14th September 1858 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 25th idem), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXXVI OF 1858.

An Act relating to Lunatic Asylums.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the reception and detention of Lunatics in Asylums established for that purpose; It is enacted as follows:—

I. The Executive Government of any Presidency or place, with the sanction of the Governor General of India in Council, may establish Asylums for the reception and detention of Lunatics at such places within the limits of the said Government as may be deemed proper. Any such Executive Government may also, if it think fit, grant licenses to any private persons for the establishment of such Asylums within the said limits, and may withdraw such licenses.

II. The management of every Lunatic Asylum and the care and custody of its inmates shall be regulated according to such rules as shall from time to time be sanctioned by the Executive Government. The Executive Government shall appoint for every Asylum not less than three visitors, one of whom at least shall be a Medical Officer. The Inspector of Jails (where such office exists) shall be a visitor ex-officio of all the Asylums within the circle of his inspection.

III. Two or more of the visitors, one of whom shall be a Medical Officer, shall, once at the least in every month, together inspect every part of the Asylum or Asylums of which they are visitors, and see and examine, as far as circumstances will permit, every Lunatic therein, and the order and certificate for the admission of every Lunatic admitted since the last visitation of the visitors; and shall enter in a book to be kept for that purpose any remarks which they may deem proper in regard to the management and condition of the Asylum and the Lunatics therein.

IV. It shall be the duty of every Darogah or District Police Officer to apprehend and send to the Magistrate all persons found wandering at large within his District who are deemed to be persons believed to be dangerous by reason of Lunacy. Whenever any such person as aforesaid is brought before a Magistrate, the Magistrate, with the assistance of a Medical Officer, shall examine such person, and if the Medical Officer shall sign a certificate in the Form A. in the Schedule to this Act, and the Magistrate shall be satisfied on personal

examination or other proof that such person is a Lunatic and a proper person to be detained under care and treatment, he shall make an order for such Lunatic to be received into the Asylum established for the Division in which the Magistrate's jurisdiction is situate, or, if such Lunatic is not a native of the country and the circumstances of the case so require, into a Lunatic Asylum at the Presidency; and shall send the Lunatic in suitable custody to the Asylum mentioned in such order. Provided that, if any friend or relative of any Lunatic who is believed

to be dangerous shall undertake in writing to the satisfaction of the Magistrate that such Lunatic shall be properly taken care of, and shall be prevented from doing injury to himself or others, the Magistrate, instead of sending him to an Asylum, may make him over to the care of such friend or relative.

Provided also that, if any such friend or relative shall desire that the Lunatic may be sent to a licensed Asylum instead of the public Asylum of the Division and shall engage in writing to the satisfaction of the Magistrate to pay the expenses which may be incurred for the lodging, maintenance, medicine, clothing, and care of the Lunatic in such Asylum, the Magistrate may send the Lunatic to the licensed Asylum mentioned in the engagement.

V. If it shall appear to the Magistrate, on the report of a Police Officer or the information of any other person, that any person within the limits of his jurisdiction deemed to be a Lunatic is not under proper care and control, or is cruelly treated or neglected by any relative or other person having the charge of him, the Magistrate may send for the supposed Lunatic, and summon such relative or other person as has or ought to have the charge of him; and if such relative or other person be legally bound to maintain the supposed Lunatic, the Magistrate may make an order for such Lunatic being properly cared for and treated, and, if such relative or other person shall wilfully neglect to comply with the said order, may commit him to jail for a period not exceeding one month. If there be no person legally bound to maintain the supposed Lunatic, or if the Magistrate think fit so to do, he may proceed as prescribed in the last preceding Section, and upon being satisfied in manner aforesaid that the person deemed to be a Lunatic is a Lunatic and a proper person to be detained under care and treatment, may make an order for his reception into such Asylum as aforesaid. It shall be the duty of every Darogah or District Police Officer to report every such case of neglect or cruel treatment as aforesaid which may come to his knowledge.

VI. All acts which the Magistrate is authorized or required to do by the two last preceding Sections, may be done in the Presidency Towns and the Stations of the Straits Settlement by the Commissioner of Police; and all duties which a Darogah or District Police Officer is authorized or required to perform, may be performed in any of

Commissioner of Police, &c. to act in the Presidency Towns and Straits Settlement.

Commissioner of Police; and all duties which a Darogah or District Police Officer is authorized or required to perform, may be performed in any of

the said Towns and Stations by an Officer of the Police Force not below the rank of Inspector.

VII. Except as otherwise hereinbefore provided, no person shall be received into a Lunatic Asylum in any Presidency Town or in any Station of the Straits Settlement without an order under the hand of some person in the Form B in the Schedule to this Act together with such statement of particulars as is contained in the said Form B, nor unless such person has been found Lunatic by inquisition or under an enquiry directed by an order of one of the Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter, without the medical certificate containing the particulars in Form A in the Schedule to this Act, of two persons each of whom shall be a Physician or Surgeon, and one of whom shall be a Presidency Surgeon or a Surgeon in the employment of the Government. When such order is presented, the visitors or manager of the Asylum, before admitting the Lunatic into the Asylum, may require the friends of the said Lunatic to engage to pay the expenses which may be incurred for the lodging, maintenance, clothing, medicine, and care of the Lunatic, unless it shall appear to the said visitors that they have not sufficient means of doing so.

VIII. *Clause 1.*—In places other than those specified in the last preceding Section, no person shall be received into a Lunatic Asylum, except as otherwise hereinbefore provided, without an order of the Civil Court.

Clause 2.—When any person has been adjudged to be a Lunatic, and a guardian for such Lunatic has been appointed by the Court of Wards or the Collector or by the Civil Court, if such guardian shall desire that the Lunatic be admitted into a Lunatic Asylum, he shall make application to the Civil Court, and the Judge with the assistance of a Medical Officer shall examine such Lunatic, and if the Medical Officer shall sign a certificate in the Form A in the Schedule to this Act, and the Judge shall be satisfied that the Lunatic is a proper person to be detained under care and treatment in a Lunatic Asylum, he shall make an order for such person to be received into the Asylum established for the Division in which his jurisdiction is situate, or, if he think fit, into any licensed Asylum mentioned in the application.

Clause 3.—If any relative or friend of any person for whom a guardian has not been appointed by the Court of Wards or the Collector or by the Civil Court, desires that such person may be admitted into a Lunatic Asylum, he may make application to the Civil Court, and the Judge, if he see sufficient reason for so doing, shall enquire into the fact of Lunacy in the same manner as if an application had been made to the Civil Court under the provisions of Section III of Act XXXV of 1858 entitled "An Act to make better provision for the care of the estates of Lunatics not subject to the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts of Judicature"; and if the Lunacy be established, the Judge may then proceed in the manner prescribed in the second Clause of this Section.

Clause 4.—Whenever the Judge shall make an order for the reception of any person into a Lunatic Asylum, he shall, at the same time, make an order for the payment of expenses.

Whenever the Judge shall make an order for the reception of any person into a Lunatic Asylum, he shall, at the same time, make an order for the payment of the expenses to be incurred for the lodging, maintenance, clothing, medicine, and care of such person, and such expenses shall be recovered by the Judge on the application of the visitors or manager of such Asylum. Provided however that, if it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Judge that the Lunatic has not sufficient property and that no person legally bound to maintain the said Lunatic has sufficient means for the payment of such expenses, he shall certify the same in the order for the reception of the Lunatic into the Asylum, instead of making such order for the payment of expenses as aforesaid.

IX. It shall be lawful for three of the visitors of any Asylum, of whom one shall be a Medical Officer, by writing under their hands, to order the discharge of any person detained in such Asylum. When such order is given, if the person is detained under the order of any public Officer, notice of the order of discharge shall be immediately communicated to such Officer.

X. When any relative or friend of a Lunatic detained in any Asylum under the provisions of Section IV Section V, or Section VI of this Act, is desirous that such Lunatic should be delivered over to his care and custody, he shall make application to the Magistrate or Commissioner of Police under whose order the Lunatic is detained, and the Magistrate or Commissioner of Police, if he think fit after communication with the visitors or with one of them being a Medical Officer, and upon the undertaking in writing of such relative or friend to the satisfaction of the said Magistrate or Commissioner that such Lunatic shall be properly taken care of and shall be prevented from doing injury to himself or others, shall make an order for the discharge of such Lunatic, and such Lunatic shall thereupon be discharged.

XI. The Inspector of Jails may direct the removal of any Lunatic from any public Asylum to any other public Asylum within the limits of his inspection, and such order shall be sufficient authority for the removal of such Lunatic, and also for his reception into the Asylum to which he is ordered to be removed.

XII. If, after the reception of any Lunatic into any Asylum, it appear that the order or the medical certificate or certificates upon which he was received is or are defective or incorrect, the same may at any time afterwards be amended by the person or persons signing the same with the sanction of two or more of the visitors of the said Asylum, one of whom shall be a Medical Officer.

XIII. Every person received into a Lunatic Asylum under any such order as is required by this Act accompanied by the requisite medical certificate, may be detained therein until he be removed or discharged as authorized by this Act, and in case of escape

may, by virtue of such order, be re-taken by the manager of such Asylum, or any Officer or servant belonging thereto, or any other person authorized in that behalf by the said manager, or any Police Officer, and conveyed to and received and detained in such Asylum.

XIV. When any Lunatic is sent to a licensed Asylum by order of a Magistrate or Commissioner of Police under Section IV, Section V, or Section VI of this Act, and when a Lunatic is admitted into such Asylum under Section VII or an order for the reception of a Lunatic is made under Section VIII and no engagement has been taken from the friends of the Lunatic or order made by the Judge for the payment of expenses under the said Section VII or Section VIII respectively, the expense of the lodging, maintenance, clothing, medicine, and care of such Lunatic shall be paid by the Government to the manager of such Asylum.

XV. The Magistrate or Commissioner of Police by whom any Lunatic has been sent to a Lunatic Asylum, if it appear to such Magistrate or Commissioner that such Lunatic has an estate applicable to his maintenance and more than sufficient to maintain his family, or that any person is legally bound to maintain and has the means of maintaining such Lunatic, may apply to the chief Civil Court of original jurisdiction within the local jurisdiction of which the estate of the Lunatic may be situate or the person legally bound to maintain him may reside, and such Court shall enquire into the matter in a summary way, and on being satisfied that such Lunatic has an estate applicable to his maintenance, or that any person is legally bound to maintain and has the means of maintaining such Lunatic, shall make an order for the recovery of the charges of the lodging, maintenance, clothing, medicine, and care of such Lunatic out of such estate, or from such person. Such order shall be enforced in the same manner and shall be of the same force and effect and subject to the same appeal as any judgment or order made by the said Court in a regular suit in respect of the property or person therein mentioned. Any personal property which may be in the possession of a Lunatic found wandering at large may be sold by the Magistrate and the proceeds thereof (or such part of the same as may be necessary) applied towards the payment of the charges of the lodging and maintenance of the Lunatic, and of any other expenses incurred on his behalf.

XVI. The liability of any relative or person to maintain any Lunatic shall not be taken away or affected by any provision contained in this Act.

XVII. Nothing contained in this Act shall be taken to interfere with the power of any of the Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter over any person found to be Lunatic by inquisition or under the provisions of Act XXXIV of 1858 entitled "An Act to regulate proceedings in Lunacy in the Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter," or with the rights of any Com-

mittee of the person or estate of such Lunatic; or to affect the provisions of Act IV of 1849 entitled "An Act for the safe custody of Criminal Lunatics."

XVIII. The word "Lunatic," as used in this Act, shall mean and include every person of unsound mind, and every person being an idiot. The word "Magistrate" shall include a person exercising the powers of a Magistrate.

THE 25TH SEPTEMBER 1858.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 25th September 1858, and was referred to Select Committee who are to report thereon after the 29th of November next :—

A Bill to provide for the punishment of breaches of contract by Artificers, Workmen, and Laborers in certain cases.

WHEREAS much loss and inconvenience are sustained by manufacturers, tradesmen, and others in the several Presidency Towns of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay, from fraudulent breach of contract on the part of Artificers, Workmen, and Laborers who have received money in advance, on account of work which they have contracted to perform; and whereas the remedy by suit in the Civil Courts for the recovery of damages is wholly insufficient, and it is just and proper that persons guilty of such fraudulent breach of contract should be subject to punishment; It is enacted as follows :—

I. When any Artificer, Workman, or Laborer shall have received from any Master or Employer resident or carrying on business in any Presidency Town, an advance of money on account of any work which he shall have contracted to perform, or to get performed by any other Artificers, Workmen, or Laborers, if such Artificer, Workman, or Laborer shall wilfully and without lawful or reasonable excuse neglect or refuse to perform or get performed such work according to the terms of his contract, such Master or Employer may complain to a Magistrate of Police, and the Magistrate shall thereupon issue a summons or a warrant, as he shall think proper, for bringing before him such Artificer, Workman, or Laborer, and shall hear and determine the case.

II. If it shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Magistrate that such Artificer, Workman, or Laborer has received money in advance from the complainant on account of any work, and has wilfully and without lawful or

Magistrate may order repayment of advance or performance of contract.

without lawful or

refused to perform or get performed the same according to the terms of his contract, the Magistrate shall, at the option of the complainant, either order such Artificer, Workman, or Laborer to repay the money advanced, or such part thereof as may seem to the Magistrate just and proper, or order him to perform or get performed such work according to the terms of his contract; and if such

Artificer, Workman, or Laborer shall fail to comply with the said order, the Magistrate may sentence him to be imprisoned with hard labor for a term not exceeding three months, or, if the order be for the repayment of a sum of money, for a term not exceeding three months, or, until such sum of money shall be sooner repaid; provided that no such order for the repayment of any money shall, while the same remains unsatisfied, deprive the complainant of any Civil remedy by action or otherwise which he might have had but for this Act.

III. When the Magistrate shall order any Artificer, Workman, or Laborer to perform or get performed any work according to the terms of his contract, he may also at the request of the complainant, require such Artificer, Workman, or Laborer to enter into a recognizance with sufficient security for the due performance of the order; and in default of his entering into such recognizance or furnishing such security to the satisfaction of the Magistrate, may sentence him to be imprisoned with hard labor for a period not exceeding three months.

IV. The word "contract," as used in this Act, shall extend to all contracts and agreements whether by deed, or written or verbal, and whether such contract be for a term certain, or for specified work, or otherwise.

THE 25TH SEPTEMBER 1858.

The following Bill, as settled in Committee of the whole Council on the 25th September 1858, is hereby published for general information :—

A Bill for making better provision for the care of the persons and property of Minors in the Presidency of Port William in Bengal.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make better provision for the care of the persons and property of Minors, not brought under the superintendence of the Court of Wards; It is enacted as follows :—

I. Regulation I. 1800, Clause 8 and the six following Clauses of Section XXIX Regulation VIII. 1805, Section V Regulation XVII. 1805, and so much of Sections II and III Regulation V. 1799, and of Clauses 2 and 3 Section XVI Regulation III. 1803, as restrict the interference of the Civil Courts in cases of inheritance by Minors, are repealed.

Regulations repealed.

II. Except in the case of proprietors of estates paying Revenue to Government, who have been or shall be taken under the protection of the Court of Wards, the care of the persons of all Minors, not being European British subjects, and the charge of their property, shall be subject to the jurisdiction of the Civil Court.

III. Every person who shall claim a right to have charge of property in trust for a Minor under a Will or other Deed, or by reason of nearness of kin, or otherwise, may apply to the Civil Court for a Certificate of administration; and no person shall be competent to institute or defend any suit connected with the estate of which he claims the charge, or to give any legal discharge to the debtors of such estate, until he shall have obtained such Certificate.

IV. Any relative or friend of a Minor in respect of whose property such certificate has not been granted, or, if the property consist in whole or in part of land or any interest in land, the Collector of the District may apply to the Civil Court to appoint a fit person to take charge of the property and person of such Minor.

V. If the property be situate in more than one District, any such application as aforesaid shall be made to the Civil Court of the District in which the Minor has his residence.

VI. When application shall have been made to the Civil Court either by a person claiming a right to have charge of the property of a Minor, or by any relative or friend of a Minor, or by the Collector, the Court shall issue notice of the application and fix a day for hearing the same. On the day so fixed, or as soon after as may be convenient, the Court shall enquire summarily into the circumstances and pass orders in the case.

VII. If it shall appear that any person claiming a right to have charge of the property of a Minor is entitled to such right by virtue of a Will or Deed, and is willing to undertake the trust, the Court shall grant a Certificate of administration to such person. If there is no person so entitled, or if such person is unwilling to undertake the trust, and there is any near relative of the Minor who is willing and fit to be entrusted with the charge of his property, the Court may grant a Certificate to such relative. The Court may also if it think fit, (unless a Guardian have been appointed by the father), appoint such person as aforesaid or such relative or any other relative or friend of the Minor, to be Guardian of the person of the Minor.

VIII. The Court may call upon the Collector or Magistrate for a report on the character and qualification of relative or friend. Court may call upon Collector or Magistrate for a report on the character and qualification of relative or friend.

IX. If no title to a Certificate be established to the satisfaction of the Court by a person claiming under a Will or Deed, and if there be no relative near relative willing and fit to be entrusted with the charge of the property of the Minor, and the Court shall think it to be necessary for the interest of the Minor that provision should be made by the Court for the charge of his property and person, the Court may proceed to make such provision in the manner hereinafter provided.

X. If the estate of the Minor consist of moveable property or of houses, gardens, or the like, the Court may grant a Certificate to the Public Curator appointed under Section XIX Act XIX of 1841, or if there be no Public Curator, to any fit person whom the Court may appoint for the purpose.

XI. Whenever the Court shall grant a Certificate of administration to the estate of a Minor to the Public Curator or other person as aforesaid, it shall at the same time appoint a Guardian to take charge of the person and maintenance of the Minor. The person to whom a Certificate of administration has been granted, unless he be the Public Curator, may be appointed Guardian. If the person appointed to be Guardian be unwilling to discharge the trust gratuitously, the Court may assign him such allowance, to be paid out of the estate of the Minor, as under the circumstances of the case it may think suitable.

XII. If the estate of the Minor consist, in whole or in part, of land or any interest in land, the Court may direct the Collector to take charge of the estate, and thereupon the Collector shall appoint a Manager of the property of the Minor and a Guardian of his person, in the same manner and subject to the same rules in respect of such appointments and of the duties to be performed by the manager and the Guardian respectively, so far as the same may be applicable, as if the property and person of the Minor were subject to the jurisdiction of the Court of Wards.

XIII. In all enquiries held by the Civil Court under this Act, the Court may make such order as to the payment of costs by the person on whose application the enquiry was made, or out of the estate of the Minor or otherwise as it may think proper.

XIV. Whenever one or more of the proprietors of an estate, which has come under the jurisdiction of the Court of Wards on account of the disqualification of all the proprietors, ceases to be disqualified, and the estate, in consequence, ceases to be subject to the jurisdiction of the Court of Wards, notwithstanding the continued disqualification of one or more of the co-proprietors, the Collector of the District in which the estate is situate, may represent the fact to the Civil Court; and the Court, unless it see sufficient reason to the contrary, shall direct the Collector to retain charge of the persons, and

Persons and property of Minors not under the protection of the Court of Wards shall be subject to jurisdiction of Civil Court.

What persons claiming to have charge of property in trust for a minor may apply for Certificate of administration.

No person competent to institute or defend a suit without such Certificate.

Who may apply to Court to appoint a person to take charge of the property &c. of a Minor.

If the property be situate in more than one District, the representation shall be made by the Collector who had the general management of the property under the Court of Wards, to the Civil Court of his own District, and the orders of the Court of that District shall have effect also in other Districts, in which portions of the property may be situate.

XV. The proceedings of the Collector in the charge of estates under this Act shall be subject to the control of the superior Revenue Authorities.

XVI. The Public Curator and every other Administrator to whom a Certificate shall have been granted under Section X shall, within six months from the date of the Certificate, deliver in Court an inventory of any immoveable property belonging to the Minor, and of all such sums of money, goods, effects, and things as he shall have received on account of the estate, together with a statement of all debts due by or to the same. And the Public Curator and every such other Administrator shall furnish annually, within three months from the close of the year of the era current in the District, an account of the property in his charge, exhibiting the amounts received and disbursed on account of the estate, and the balance in hand. If any relative or friend of a Minor or any Public Officer, by petition of the Court, shall impugn the accuracy of the said inventory and statement or of any annual account, the Court may summon the Curator or Administrator and enquire summarily into the matter, and make such order thereon as it shall think proper, or the Court at its discretion may refer such petition to any subordinate Court.

XVII. All sums received by the Public Curator or such other Administrator on account of any estate, in excess of what may be required for the current expenses of the Minor or of the estate, shall be paid into the public Treasury on account of the estate, and may be invested from time to time in the public Securities.

XVIII. It shall be lawful for any relative or friend of a Minor, at any time during the continuance of the minority, to sue for an account from any Manager appointed under this Act, or from any person to whom a Certificate shall have been granted under the provisions of this Act, or from any such Manager or person after his removal from office or trust, or from his personal representative in case of his death, in respect of any estate then or formerly under his care or management, or of any sums of money or

Relative or friend may sue for an account.

XIX. If the disqualification of a person, for whose benefit a suit shall have been instituted under this Act, cease before the final decision thereof, it shall be lawful for such person to continue the prosecution of the suit on his own behalf.

XX. The Civil Court for any sufficient cause may recall any Certificate granted under this Act, and may direct the Collector to take charge of the estate, or may grant a Certificate to the Public Curator or any other person as the case may be; and may compel the person whose Certificate has been recalled to make over the property in his hands to his successor, and to account to such successor for all monies received and disbursed by him. The Court may also for any sufficient cause remove any Guardian appointed by the Court.

The Civil Court may impose a fine not exceeding five hundred Rupees on any person who may wilfully neglect or refuse to deliver his accounts, or any property in his hands, within the prescribed time, or a time fixed by the Court, and may realize such fine by attachment and sale of his property under the rules in force for the execution of decrees of Court, and may also commit the recusant to close custody until he shall consent to deliver such accounts or property.

XXII. The Civil Court may permit any person to whom a certificate shall have been granted under this Act not being the Public Curator, and any Guardian appointed by the Court, to resign his trust, and may give him a discharge therefrom on his accounting to his successor, duly appointed, for all monies received and disbursed by him, and making over the property in his hands.

XXIII. The Public Curator and every other Administrator to whom a Certificate shall have been granted under Section X, shall be entitled to receive such commission not exceeding five per centum on the sums received and disbursed by him, or such other allowance, to be paid out of the Minor's estate, as the Civil Court shall think fit.

Remuneration of Public Curator, &c.

XXIV. Every Guardian appointed by the Civil Court, or by the Collector or under this Act, who shall have charge of any male Minor, shall be bound to provide for his education in a suitable manner. The general superintendence and control of the education of all such Minors shall be vested in the Civil Court or in the Collector, as the case may be; and the provisions of Act XXVI of 1854 (for making better provision for the education of Male Minors subject to the superintendence of the Court of Wards) shall, so far as is consistent with the provisions herein contained, be applicable to the Civil Court, or to the Collector, as the case may be, in respect to such Minors, and to every such Guardian.

Guardians of Minors to provide for their education. Act XXVI of 1854 declared applicable.

XXV. For the purposes of this Act, every person shall be held to be a Minor, who has not attained the age of eighteen

XXVI. Nothing in this Act shall authorize the appointment of a Guardian of the person of a female whose husband is not a Minor, or the appointment of a Guardian of the person of any Minor whose husband is living and is not a Minor; and nothing in this Act shall authorize the appointment of any person other than a female as the Guardian of the person of a female. If a Guardian of the person of a Minor be appointed during the minority of the father or husband of the Minor, the Guardianship shall cease as soon as the father or husband (as the case may be) shall attain the age of majority.

XXVII. All orders passed by the Civil Court or by any Subordinate Court under this Act, shall be open to appeal under the rules in force for appeals, in miscellaneous cases, from the orders of such Court and the Subordinate Courts.

XXVIII. The expression "Civil Court" as used in this Act shall be held to mean the principal Court of original jurisdiction in the District, and shall not include the Supreme Court; and nothing contained in this Act shall be held to affect the powers of the Supreme Court over the person or property of any Minor subject to its jurisdiction. Unless the contrary appears from the context, words importing the singular number shall include the plural number, and words importing the plural number shall include the singular number, and words importing the masculine gender shall include females.

SIR,

I have the honor to report, for the information of Major General Whitlock, Commanding Saugor Field Division, as follows. Having received reliable information that the Rebels who have lately been plundering this District up to the neighbourhood of even Calpie, were under different rebel leaders, to the number of 500 mutineer Sepoys, and about three thousand matchlock-men, strongly posted in village "Sahao," four miles north

of Jaloun, I moved with the force as per margin to attack them. On nearing the village of Sahao, the Rebels, sound-

ing the "Assem- bly," appeared in great strength on a rising ground crowned by the ruins of an old Fort.

Their right was protected by houses and walled gardens; their left by the village of Sahao itself. From the centre of their position, they opened their guns at a distance of 500 yards, and appeared determined to dispute fiercely the ground they held.

My little force was immediately formed up, the guns in the centre under Captain Ommaney, Royal Artillery; Her Majesty's 43rd Light Infantry on the right of the guns, under Lieutenant-Colonel Primrose; a party of Metges' Sikh Horse under

Lieutenant Dick took ground well to the right, to act as opportunity offered; the remainder of Metges' Seikh Horse under Major Davis took ground to the extreme left with orders to sweep round the right of the enemy and cut off their retreat; a party of 8th Irregular Cavalry under Rissaldar Min Hossain Ali, remained in support of the guns.

The enemy's fire from their centre was immediately answered by our four guns, the fire from which was excellent, and soon made the enemy abandon, with the loss of a gun, the strong ground he had so well chosen.

The rebel sepoys of the right wing retired with remarkable steadiness and in close order; but the left wing retired in great disorder, and in that state were charged in flank by Lieutenant Dick, who, under my own eyes, cut up a great number; here this excellent young Officer was severely wounded by a sabre cut, but notwithstanding he again charged the mutineers repeatedly, sustaining I regret to say two more severe wounds.

I beg leave to bring the dashing soldier-like conduct of this Officer to the favorable notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief.

My whole line then advanced, the Cavalry charging the Rebels repeatedly on both flanks, the guns being well to the front supported by Her Majesty's 43rd.

The Rebels now closely pressed took up a second position on a ridge, but upon our guns again opening with great precision, they again retreated, taking advantage of any cover the ground offered, and defending themselves stoutly in buildings, gardens, &c., on the outskirts of the different villages.

Major Davis continued the pursuit for about six miles; that Officer's report is attached.

Some mutineers having taken post in village "Rajpoorah," Lieut.-Colonel Primrose entered the village with his gallant Corps, and destroyed the whole of the Rebels concealed there.

The country, from three days' incessant heavy rain, had become nearly impassable for Artillery, and that arm deserve great credit for the rapidity with which it advanced; also the Infantry which had to march through ploughed fields the day before entirely under water.

From the number of bodies seen on the field, I should estimate the loss of the enemy at between two and three hundred, and 21 Rebels captured. Our loss, I am happy to say, was comparatively small. The defeat of this rebel body was most complete, and will have, I am sure, excellent effect in this part of the country.

I beg in conclusion to express my obligations to the following Officers, and to request that you will be pleased to recommend them to the favorable notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief.

Lieutenant-Colonel Primrose, Commanding Her Majesty's 43rd Light Infantry, who gave me every aid and assistance in his power.

Captain Dovehill, my Brigade Major, with whose zeal and attention to the duty of his department I am fully satisfied, more especially in carrying my orders in the field.

Captain Ommaney, Royal Artillery, for the rapid manner in which he brought his battery to the front, and the steadiness with which the guns were served.

Doctor Barclay, Senior Surgeon, in charge of the Troops, whose attention to the wounded and sick deserves much praise.

Major Davis, Commanding the Cavalry of the Field Force, for the able manner in which he conducted the pursuit of the enemy.

Captain Ternan, Deputy Commissioner, who kindly placed his services at my disposal, and acted as my Aide-de-Camp on the occasion, and who has given me much valuable assistance in procuring information relative to the positions occupied by the Rebels.

Min Hossain Ali, an old and faithful soldier, maintained the high character he already enjoys.

I beg to enclose Returns of Casualties and captured Ordnance.

SIR,

UNDER instructions received, I have the honor to report, for the information of Brigadier MacDuff, Commanding the Field Force, the operations of the Cavalry placed under my Command; strength as per margin.

On arrival at the enemy's position this morning, at the village of "Sahao," on the action commencing, agreeably to orders, I took post on the left of the line, with half of the Seikh Horse, to cut off the enemy's retreat, Lieutenant Dick, with the remaining portion, taking post on the extreme right.

On the enemy retiring from their position, I sent Lieutenant McInroy, 19th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, doing duty with the Seikh Horse, to the left, with the Civil and Military Mounted Police, to turn the Rebels back to the centre of our line; this duty was well performed, some of the enemy being cut up; it enabled me to charge them with great effect.

I was well supported by Metges' Seikhs, who suffered severely in the hand-to-hand encounter which ensued.

Of Lieutenant Dick's operations on the right, it is unnecessary for me to speak, the Brigadier having personally witnessed his dauntless and glorious charge into a body of some 3 or 400 sepoys. I have only to regret his being severely wounded in four places by sword cuts, not however before he had cut down some five men with his own hand.

I beg to mention the support and assistance received from Lieutenant Sawers, Commandant of the Humeerpore District Police; on Lieutenant

Dick being wounded, he assumed Command, and charged several bodies of the Rebels with great success. His horse was shot and bayoneted under him.

On the advance of the Cavalry, he and Lieutenant McInroy accompanied me in the pursuit, which was carried far beyond "Gohun," and throughout we cut up the Rebels in the most satisfactory manner. The old sepoys were easily distinguished by their keeping well, and doggedly together, and of course were marked out accordingly. Our pursuit was brought to a close by our horses being fairly fagged out, and the Rebels getting into entrenched gardens and topes, whence Cavalry could not have dislodged them.

I believe at least 200 Rebels have been killed on the field.

On our way back we visited "Gohun," a strong post held an hour before by the Rebels, but we found it deserted.

At the request of Lieutenant Dick, I have much pleasure in bringing to notice the gallant conduct of Native Doctor Hurree Kishun, attached to the Seikh Cavalry, who received four severe wounds in the discharge of his duty attending on Lieutenant Dick.

Also of Rissaldars Mena Sing and Rajah Pirthee Sing, of Kangra, and Naib Duffadar Dawa Sing, all of the Seikh Horse.

The annexed Return of Casualties will speak to the nature of the service rendered.

TO THE CHIEF OF THE STAFF,

Head Quarters, Allahabad,
Camp Powrie, 30th August 1858.

SIR,

My telegrams of the 21st and 22nd, and my demi-official letter of the 20th will have put you in possession of the principal occurrences here, which I will now report more fully.

Brigadier Smith, Commanding the Brigade at Sepree, received intimation that the Fort of Powrie, 20 miles north-west of Sepree, had been seized on

the 4th instant, by Maun Sing, the Ex-Raja of Nurwar, who corrupted the garrison, most of whom joined him after letting him into the place. His force was reported to be 4,000 men, of whom 700 were rebel sepóys, well armed with flint and percussion muskets.

Very urgent applications for protection were made by the Local Authorities to Brigadier Smith, as Maun Sing was on the point of seizing other valuable towns, and alarming the well-disposed inhabitants of the district. The Brigadier, therefore, moved at once to Powrie on the 6th, but found it too strong to be attempted with field guns, and encamping at a distance of 3 miles, applied to me for "2 18-pounders, 2 8-inch mortars, and reinforcements." The requisition reached me at Gwalior on the 9th.

On the 11th, the Siege Train left Gwalior, and arrived at Powrie on the 20th, where I encamped with Brigadier Smith's force, total strength as per margin, just out of range of the enemy's guns.

fantry, with 200 Infantry, and 2 guns in support, under command of Major Vials, immediately seized a temple 400 yards from the main gate, the enemy's picket retiring into the place, from which a smart fire of round shot and musketry was opened, and replied to by our rifles. I then proceeded with Brigadier Smith; Captain Turnbull, Chief Engineer; Colonel Blake, Commanding Artillery; and my Staff to reconnoitre the north-east side, whilst Colonel Robertson, 25th Bombay Native Infantry, accompanied by Major Chetwode, with a strong escort of Cavalry and guns, reconnoitred the west side.

Having determined on the necessary arrangements, 4 8-inch mortars were sent down to the temple at sunset, and continued to play without intermission during the night.

A breaching battery for 2 18-pounders was commenced at 300 yards from a bastion on the east side, and nearly completed by morning.

A battery for the howitzer to give an oblique fire, on the defences of the east side, and cross-fire on the breach, was also commenced at 400 yards, but being interrupted by a party of the enemy in the thick jungle, the bildars ran away, and could not be reassembled. The mortars continued to play all day of the 21st, and had a sensible effect on the enemy's fire, which had been maintained with much briskness on the temple, and on all approaches. During the night of the 21st, both batteries were completed, armed, and on the point of opening, when I received a message from the fort, to say that Maun Sing with his followers had escaped in the night, and praying that the mortars might cease.

I regret that it was out of my power with my force to invest the place properly. It is a mile and a half in circuit. One side rests on an impracticable precipice flanked by large ravines and jungle, and backed by a deep torrent, and a forest extending for many miles. In front of the other side is open ground with tanks and marshes. The main gate-way is very strong, having three gates, and numerous lofty bastions to flank them.

The Dhang, or jungle gate-way, has two gates, and opens on ravines and jungle; a wicket leads down by the one side of the precipice, and there is also a path sufficient for escape of men in single file down the other.

The walls though ancient, and in some places dilapidated are generally 10 feet thick of massive stone, and from 25 to 50 feet high, and are well protected by the precipice above mentioned, by deep tanks, and a wet ditch, except at two or three points.

I found on the walls 17 guns, all of which have been burst, except 4 of the smallest, which have been disabled.

No one at Gwalior, with intelligence enough to describe Powrie, could give me a correct idea of its size and strength; but a native plan, procured through the Political Agent at Gwalior, gave me correct information in some details which were valuable.

I received every assistance from Brigadier Smith, Commanding Rajpootana Brigade, and his Brigade Major, Lieutenant Goldsworthy; from Colonel Blake, Commanding Artillery; from Captain Todd, 14th Dragoons, Assistant Adjutant General; and Captain Field, Royal Artillery, in charge of the Siege Train.

Major Vials, of H. M.'s 95th, at his own request, retained command of the advanced party at the temple.

Captain Turnbull, Chief Engineer; Lieutenant Festing, Royal Engineers; and Lieutenant Mac-lachlan, Bombay Horse Artillery, Deputy Judge Advocate General, worked without intermission at the batteries, aided by Lieutenants Budger, Pearson and Anderson, 95th Regiment, Assistant Field Engineers.

Captain Turnbull and Lieutenant Mac-lachlan, supported by a party of 12 Volunteers from the 95th and 10th Regiments, under Lieutenant Crealock, 95th, examined the ground up to the foot of the proposed breach, both to see that there were no obstacles to the assault, and to find the best way.

This was a service of some danger, as the enemy were on the alert, and outside the walls. It is entirely owing to the exertions of these Officers, and the efficient practice of the mortars under Captain Field and Lieutenants Harris and Strutt, Commanding Detachments, and their Officers, that we recovered a place of such strength as Powrie in 48 hours. The escape of Maun Sing is to be regretted, but it could not have been prevented without a larger force, and it would have been equally inexpedient to draw away troops from any other quarter, or to let the enemy remain in possession of a place in front of our force a day longer than could be avoided.

The troops have borne exposure and fatigue with the utmost cheerfulness and very little sickness.

On the 23rd, Brigadier Smith came on the track of Maun Sing's party, near the Koonoo River, and recovered two guns, which they had carried away from Powrie; and Colonel Robertson, with a Light Column, is now following them closely.

A Return of Casualties is annexed, in which I have to regret Lieutenant Fisher, severely wounded. The enemy lost ten killed and thirty wounded.

I HAVE the honor to forward herewith, for submission to His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, a Report from Lieutenant-Colonel Walter, 35th Regiment, Commanding at Arrah, of a successful encounter which the Troops under his command had on the 30th ultimo, with the Rebels near the village of "Korisauth," in which they sustained a loss of from 50 to 60 men, without any casualties on our side.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of Brigadier Douglas, C. B., that with the detail named in the margin, I left this Station at 2 A. M. yesterday, for Judgerajunge, 10 miles west of Arrah, on the Buxar road, the Bridge over the Bewar at Beebigunge had been destroyed by the Rebels. I had a temporary one thrown over during the night, which I crossed.

2. On arriving at Judgerajgunge, I found the enemy who were reported to be in force had left some hours; the country was too heavy from the rains for me to follow them up with any hope of success, either with Cavalry or Artillery.

3. I then moved on the village of Korisauth, a Rebel stronghold, which I destroyed and bivouacked in a tope close to it.

4. The Rebels approached me in force at 11 A.M.; they were computed at 80 Cavalry and 800 Infantry. I attacked them with Cavalry, and clouds of skirmishers drove them through topes and belts of jungles. I then ordered the Artillery to the front; they opened on them; the Cavalry now turned the enemy's left flank, observing which, and that they were moving to the right, I changed line to the left, prolonging my skirmishers in that direction.

5. The heat was now intense, the Troops much exhausted, several men had fallen from sun-strokes. I therefore gave up the pursuit, and got the men under cover.

6. The loss of the enemy from killed and wounded was between 50 and 60; 27 dead were left on the field. The enemy were seen carrying off their wounded.

7. All ranks vied in doing their duty. I beg to name Captain Medhurst, 10th Regiment; Captain Elkington, 35th Regiment; Captain Warren, 60th Royal Rifles; Lieutenant Gibb, Artillery, and Lieutenant Mackeson, Bengal Police Battalion, Commanding Detachments of Corps.

8. Lieutenant Beadon, Commanding Detachment 3rd Sikh Irregular Cavalry, has upon this as upon all occasions when on Patrol duty, rendered me the greatest service; he is unwearied in his exertions, and is a most excellent Officer.

9. Captain Baring, Staff Officer, afforded every assistance.

10. To Assistant Surgeon L. O. Patterson, Her Majesty's 35th Regiment, I am much indebted; after making his Medical arrangements, he joined me at my request. I cannot speak too highly of his zeal and efficiency as an Officer.

11. Mr. Brodhurst, the Magistrate, accompanied me on this as on every other occasion I have been out always in the front. The fact of the force falling in with, and engaging the enemy on so many occasions, speaks for itself as to the value and correctness of the information I have received from him, which is difficult to obtain in the present state of the District.

12. I am happy to say, there were no Casualties, and the cases of sun-stroke have all recovered.

PROCEEDINGS OF LIEUT. R. STEWART, *Offg. Supdt.*

DURING a seven years' residence on this Frontier I have frequently struck me that although Cachar and the surrounding Districts and States are most fertile in themselves, and productive of many of the articles of trade such as are conducive to the necessities and conveniences of life, yet that no regular system exists whereby this produce can be made generally available to the western and more civilized portion of the Empire.

It is likewise apparent that although the inhabitants of this Frontier are by no means poor, yet they have not been introduced to the full advantages to be derived from extensive importations of foreign manufactures.

The causes of this stagnation of traffic appear to me to be the want of roads and consequently of wheeled conveyances and the continued inclemency of the seasons for the greater portion of the year which makes all communication both by land and water extremely difficult.

As great natural as well as financial difficulties exist, debarring for the present all thoughts of the construction of good roads, and as the river navigation will be always affected by the seasons until a trade has been created sufficiently remunerative for the occupation of steamers and vessels, proof against the storms and strong currents which prevail during the rains, it remains to provide a channel for traffic as little affected as possible by the difficulties with which it is at certain times surrounded.

From the month of November to that of February, the weather is cold and bracing, fair and calm. The plains are hard and traversable, the hills, valleys, marshes and jungles are free from miasmatic influences. The river is low enough to be deprived of strong currents and deep enough to admit of navigation by boats of moderate tonnage. This appears to be the season when the traders of the different Districts and States should assemble at some central position and reciprocate produce. It is necessary, I think, only to appoint a date and a place of rendezvous in order to secure the establishment of a periodical trade which will connect Burma with Dacca, and Assam with the Hills of Tipperah.

For this purpose, in consultation with Mr. Allen, Member of the Board of Revenue, on deputation at Cherrapoonjee, it has been determined that an annual Fair or Mela be held at Silchar, the Sudder Station of Cachar, and that the inhabitants of the neighbouring Districts to the West as well as those of Assam to the North be invited to attend, bringing for sale and barter the produce of their respec-

tive countries, and that to meet these it be intimated to the inhabitants of Cachar, North, South and Proper, to those of Munipoor and Kubboo, to the inhabitants of the Kutchha Angamienagah, and Lhooshaï countries through the proper authorities, that a Mart has been opened where they may not only dispose of their native produce, but receive in return that and the manufactures of Foreign countries.

The date of the Mela which will last for five days is fixed from the 30th December to the 3rd January 1858-59 inclusive, corresponding with 16th to 20th Pows 1265 B. S.

Ordered, that copies of this Proceeding, together with the accompanying advertisement relating to it and recounting the articles most likely to be proffered and demanded at the Mela, be sent in English and Vernaculars to the authorities of the Province of Assam, and the Zillah of Dacca, Furreedpoor, Mymensing, Tipperah and Sylhet, likewise to Major McCulloch, Political Agent in Munipoor, for communication to the Governments of Munipoor and Kubboo, and that these gentlemen be solicited to give the widest circulation and publicity in their power to the advertisement.

Ordered, that the above Proceeding be communicated through emissaries to the different tribes of Nagahs, Kookies, Cassyahs, Meekirs, Cacharies, Angamies, Kacha Nagahs and Looshais in and about Cachar.

Ordered, that the above Proceeding and advertisement be sent to the *Calcutta Gazette* for publication.

Ordered, that copies of the above Proceeding and advertisement be sent to all known and respectable Individuals, Merchants, Traders, Landholders and Planters on the Frontier, with the request that they will give publicity to, and aid the undertaking.

No taxes or Bazar dues will be levied on any articles sold at the Mela, and sheds will be erected for the convenience of the Shop-keepers.

The Mela will last for five days, and during its continuance, prizes will be offered by Public Subscription to the winners in Boat, Elephant, Horse and Foot Races as well as for other Athletic games and exercises among which may be mentioned the Muni- poree, Kangjai or Hockey upon horse back.

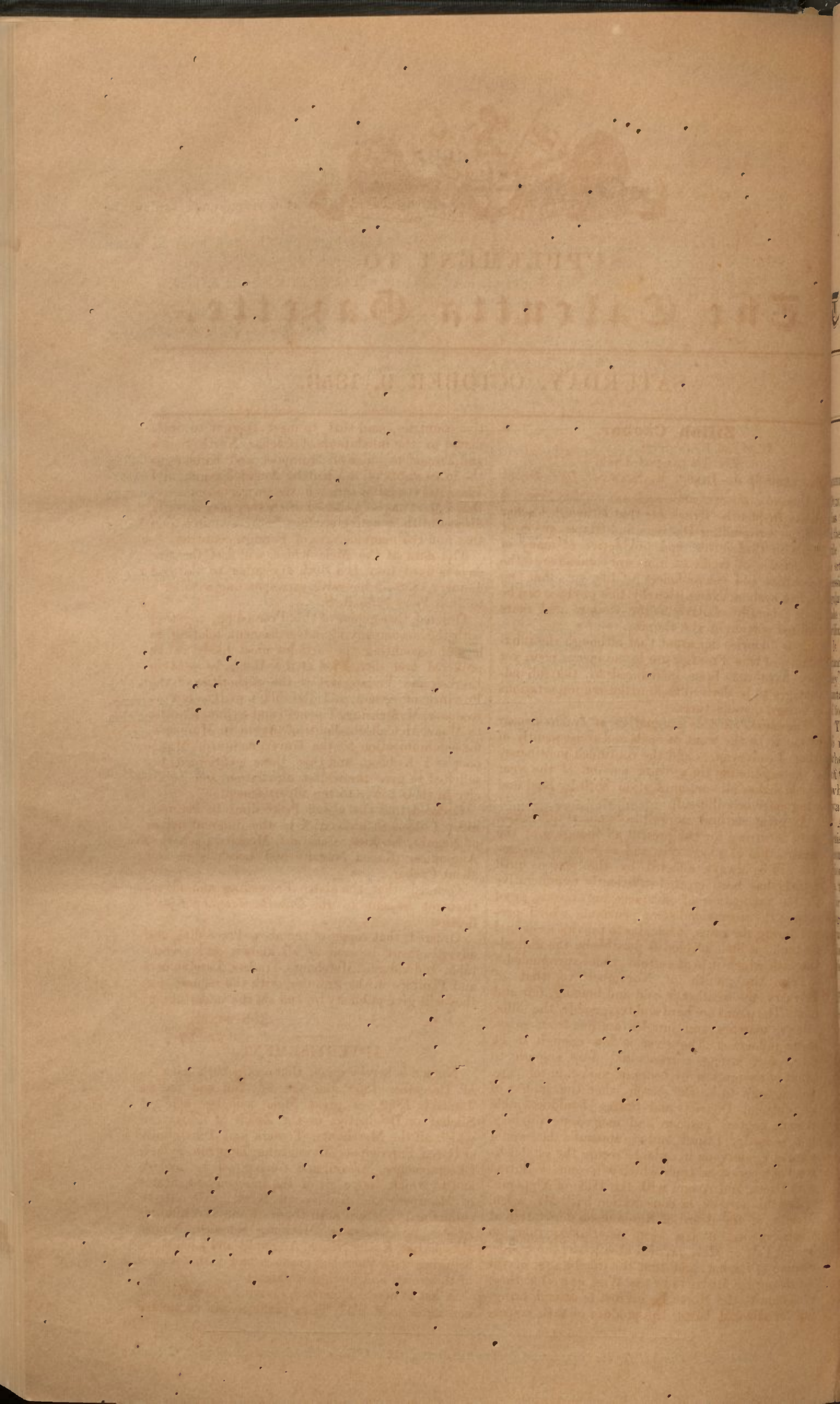

PROCEEDINGS OF LIEUT. R. STEWART, *Offg. Supdt.*

DURING a seven years' residence on this Frontier it has frequently struck me that although Cachar and the surrounding Districts and States are most fertile in themselves, and productive of many of the articles of trade such as are conducive to the necessities and conveniences of life, yet that no regular system exists whereby this produce can be made generally available to the western and more civilized portion of the Empire.

It is likewise apparent that although the inhabitants of this Frontier are by no means poor, yet they have not been introduced to the full advantages to be derived from extensive importations of foreign manufactures.

The causes of this stagnation of traffic appear to me to be the want of roads and consequently of wheeled conveyances and the continued inclemency of the seasons for the greater portion of the year which makes all communication both by land and water extremely difficult.

As great natural as well as financial difficulties exist, debarring for the present all thoughts of the construction of good roads, and as the river navigation will be always affected by the seasons until a trade has been created sufficiently remunerative for the occupation of steamers and vessels, proof against the storms and strong currents which prevail during the rains, it remains to provide a channel for traffic as little affected as possible by the difficulties with which it is at certain times surrounded.

From the month of November to that of February, the weather is cold and bracing, fair and calm. The plains are hard and traversable, the hills, valleys, marshes and jungles are free from miasmatic influences. The river is low enough to be deprived of strong currents and deep enough to admit of navigation by boats of moderate tonnage. This appears to be the season when the traders of the different Districts and States should assemble at some central position and reciprocate produce. It is necessary, I think, only to appoint a date and a place of rendezvous in order to secure the establishment of a periodical trade which will connect Burma with Dacca, and Assam with the Hills of Tipperah.

For this purpose, in consultation with Mr. Allen, Member of the Board of Revenue, on deputation at Cherrapoonjee, it has been determined that an annual Fair or Mela be held at Silchar, the Sudder Station of Cachar, and that the inhabitants of the neighbouring Districts to the West as well as those of Assam to the North be invited to attend, bringing for sale and barter the produce of their respec-

tive countries, and that to meet these it be intimated to the inhabitants of Cachar, North, South and Proper, to those of Munipoor and Kubboo, to the inhabitants of the Kutchha Angamienagah, and Lhooshai countries through the proper authorities, that a Mart has been opened where they may not only dispose of their native produce, but receive in return that and the manufactures of Foreign countries.

The date of the Mela which will last for five days is fixed from the 30th December to the 3rd January 1858-59 inclusive, corresponding with 16th to 20th Pows 1265 B. S.

Ordered, that copies of this Proceeding, together with the accompanying advertisement relating to it and recounting the articles most likely to be proffered and demanded at the Mela, be sent in English and Vernaculars to the authorities of the Province of Assam, and the Zillah of Dacca, Furreedpoor, Mymensing, Tipperah and Sylhet, likewise to Major McCulloch, Political Agent in Munipoor, for communication to the Governments of Munipoor and Kubboo, and that these gentlemen be solicited to give the widest circulation and publicity in their power to the advertisement.

Legislative Council of India.

THE 9TH OCTOBER 1858.

THE following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 9th October 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee who are to report thereon after the 13th of January next :—

A Bill to empower the Governor in Council of Bombay to appoint a Magistrate for certain Districts within the Zillah Ahmedabad.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide specially for the Magisterial and Police Administration of such portions of the Zillah Ahmedabad as are

mentioned in the Schedule to this Act ; It is enacted as follows :—

I. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council of Bombay to appoint a Magistrate for the Districts mentioned in the Schedule to this Act ; and such Magistrate, when so appointed, shall exercise within the said Districts all the powers of a Magistrate as defined in the general Regulations of the Bombay Code and the Acts of the Legislative Council. Upon the appointment of a Magistrate under this Act, the said Districts shall, be exempt from the jurisdiction of the Magistrate of Ahmedabad. It shall also be lawful for the said Governor in Council to appoint so many Assistants to the said Magistrate as may be required.

Governor in Council empowered to appoint a Magistrate for the Districts mentioned in Schedule.

Powers of Magistrate.

Exemption of Districts from jurisdiction of the Magistrate of Ahmedabad.

Governor in Council may appoint Assistants to the Magistrate.

Nothing contained in the preceding Section shall be held to remove the said Districts from the jurisdiction of the Session Judge of Ahmedabad or of the Sudder Fonzdaree Adawlut.

Act not to be held to remove the said Districts from the jurisdiction of the Session Judge of Ahmedabad or of the Sudder Court.

THE ADJUTANT GENERAL OF THE ARMY,

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to forward herewith, for submission to His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, a Report from Major Carr, Madras Rifles, Commanding at Buxar, of a successful operation undertaken by him on the 13th instant, which resulted in the complete defeat and dispersion, with heavy loss, of a very greatly superior body of Rebels who had threatened, and were about to attack, his advanced post at Doomraon.

I beg to call His Excellency's special attention to the very skilful manner in which the small force under Major Carr was handled; to the cheer-

ful alacrity which all ranks are reported to have displayed in encountering the enemy; and to the spirit and determination which animated the Cavalry, (both of the Military Train and 3rd Sikh Irregular Regiment,) when after severe exertion over heavy ground, by which their horses were completely exhausted, and when far away from a support, under their gallant leader Captain Nason they unhesitatingly threw themselves on two large bodies of the hostile Infantry, whom they dispersed with a severe loss in killed and wounded.

3. Captain Nason's Report of this brilliant charge is forwarded in original, as also a Nomin Return of the Casualties on our side, of which I am happy to say, the list is extremely light and insignificant when compared with the complete success obtained.

TO THE DEPUTY ASST. ADJUTANT GENERAL,

WITH BRIGADIER DOUGLAS.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of Brigadier Douglas, that on the 11th having been called on by Captain Broomé, Commanding Doomraon, for assistance, as a large body of the Rebels were moving in his post, I immediately sent off a Troop and half of the Military Train in all 50 Sabres and 120 Sikh Cavalry, and Lieutenant Ryall, the whole commanded by Captain Nason, Military Train; I proceeded myself during the night with two Companies 84th, on Elephant and 50 Madras Rifles.

On the 12th, the enemy said to be from 1,500 to 2,000, eight hundred of whom were Sepoys, were reported to me to be posted in and round the village of Chowgain, about six miles off. I went out of Doomraon a short way in their direction but finding the country so difficult for Cavalry, for it was all enclosed, and having in all only about 150 Infantry, of whom 100 only were Europeans, I returned, and sent into Buxar for the two Nava Brigade Guns, which with one other Company of the 84th, arrived at 12 at night; this they were enabled to do, by the fortuitous presence here of some bullocks and drivers of the Bengal Artillery, which have been detained here by the closing of the communications.

Thus reinforced, on the morning of the 13th, as soon as I could get certain information of the Rebels, I marched out in the direction of the enemy on the Chowgain Road, when about 4 miles out, the Rebels were reported in front, advancing in three large bodies; on reaching the end of the enclosures, I saw one large body posted in a tope behind a rising ground about 400 yards on my left front. I had a Company of the 84th extended on that flank, and then advanced the guns which Captain Batt skilfully brought up. On the skirmishers advancing, the enemy began to retire; they were five or six hundred. Captain Batt then fired three shells at them, the last of which, set for 1,200

yards, fell amongst a number of them, killing two and wounding two others; this sent them all flying.

Just as I began to advance on this body, word was brought to me, that a body of about 700 Sepoys, with 150 Sowars, were passing my right flank to get round in my rear; I sent Captain Nason with his men to stop them, which he did effectually, as he did every thing entrusted to him. As soon as I saw the Rebels in front clear off, I retired along the road with two Companies 84th, between me and the enemy when I had got parallel with them; at Captain Nason's request I sent a gun, one Company 84th, and half the Madras Rifles, to dislodge the Rebels from a village which they had seized. On the approach of the gun, &c., they all fled, throwing away their clothes and shoes; knowing that a third body was working round on my left flank, I could not venture yet to let the Cavalry pursue; indeed I was told that the body on the left were getting round to Doomraon; I had sent a Troop of Seikh Cavalry to stop them sometime before, and they were reported to me as having halted, and I afterwards learned, that on the report of the first gun, they went off towards Arrah, plundering Jewningunge on the way.

Having beaten off the bodies in front and right, and not being satisfied about that to the left, I determined to retire; and here Captain Nason prompted by the spirit which carried him victorious through his subsequent operations, requested my permission to pursue the enemy with the Cavalry; at first I demurred on account of the fearful odds against him, and of my own position; but on his second appeal, seeing his determination, I yielded to him, and to his dashing gallantry, ably supported by his brave men, and the party of Seiks under Lieutenant Ryall, the success, which by God's blessing was achieved, is entirely due. His Despatch will give the detail of his pursuit and punishment of the Rebels, but the admiration which his leading and dash elicited from all who took part in his attack, I have to record.

My force consisted of about 45 Sabres Military Train, 100 Seikh Cavalry, 2 Guns Naval Brigade, with 40 Sailors under Captain Batt, four Companies 84th, about 120 men under Major Rolleston, and one Company Madras Rifles under Captain Broome, in all about 350 men. I did not think of the smallness of my force opposed to three separate bodies, each doubling it, when I remembered that it was the 84th I had with me.

The skirmishers of the 84th, on the left, got a few shots at the enemy, which were in front at first, but to pursue them even if advisable, was utterly hopeless; they can go two miles to our one when running away.

I have great pleasure in mentioning not only the readiness of all to obey orders, but also the desire evinced by all to assist me in every way.

The Rajah of Doomraon was again in the field.

Mr. Garstin, the Magistrate, was also out.

Two men Military Train, and 1 Seikh Sowar were wounded slightly, and 1 Seikh Horse severely.

Captain Nason had his left shoulder strap cut by a bullet.

SIR,

AGREEABLY to instructions received, I yesterday proceeded with the Military Train, 48 Sabres. force as per margin, in pursuit of the retreating enemy, after a sharp gallop of 3 miles through kheets interspersed with nullas. I came up with him and observed he was moving on the village of Kuseca in compact order, in two Divisions of about 400 each, flanked by Cavalry, the distance between each Division being about 400 yards. On seeing my party approach, he immediately drew up his forces in battle array, with very marshy ground in his front, and the village in his rear; I moved steadily on between the two masses, my object being if possible to prevent his concentrating his force; this he at once noticed, and moved the Division nearest the village up in double time, but was too late; when within 300 yards, I directed the Military Train to charge, supported by the Seikh Cavalry, which they did in a most gallant manner under a heavy fire, and cut up in the space of half an hour between 40 and 50 of the enemy, all Sepoys, with the exception of one man, who was found to be a Seikh. These men were well supplied with ammunition, the greater portion of which was; "Minnie:" finding it rather hot work, the enemy retired in a very confused and hurried manner on the village. Our Horses, from the heavy ground we were working upon, were completely exhausted; after resting them for a short time, I marched back to Camp.

I am happy to say, my Casualties were few, notwithstanding the enemy fought with desperation; the Military Train had 2 men wounded (slightly,) and the 3rd Seikh Cavalry, 1 Private (slightly,) and 1 Horse (slightly.) I beg before closing this Despatch to bring to your notice, the under-mentioned Officers:—

Lieutenant Ryall, Commanding 3rd Seikh Cavalry, who steadily brought up his men in support of the Train.

To Doctor Corbyn, of the same Corps, I am much indebted for his attendance on the wounded under a heavy fire; but more particularly to Lieutenant Bodkin and Adjutant Thompson, Military Train, for the gallant manner in which they led their Troops to the charge.

Nothing could surpass the gallantry and soldier-like conduct of the Non-Commissioned Officers and Men of both Regiments, who appeared to vie with each other in their anxiety to close with the enemy.

I have to offer my thanks to Mr. Garstin, Magistrate of Buxar, who, from his thorough knowledge of the country, rendered me much assistance.

receiving information from Major Carnegie, the Deputy Commissioner, Durriabad, on the 30th ultimo, that the Rebels intended attacking Rudowlie, I directed Lieutenant Chamier to march the following morning with the Kuppooortulla Contingent to that place, distance 16 miles from this, which, he accordingly did, with the intention of remaining there the day, and returning the next morning to this post.

After arrival at Rudowlie, Lieutenant Chamier being apprised that some Sepoys of the late 17th Native Infantry, with other followers, were plundering a village six miles from thence, he decided upon moving immediately to disperse them, which he did after sharp firing on both sides, killing from 150 to 200 of the Rebels, and with a loss on his side of 2 killed and 7 wounded.

I have the pleasure to forward the Report from Lieutenant Chamier, for submission to the Major-General, and trust the successful exertions of Lieutenant Chamier will meet his approval.

The list of killed and wounded is also forwarded.

SIR,

IN obedience to orders received from Major Hume, 1st Bengal Fusiliers, Commanding at Durriabad, I proceeded yesterday with a portion of the Kuppooortulla Contingent, (strength as per margin,) to punish refractory Zemindars close to our Tehseel at Rudowlie; and I am happy to be able to report, for the information of Major General Sir Hope Grant, K. C. B., a decisive success obtained over the enemy at the village of Gohemiya, distant 6 miles South-East of Rudowlie.

2. We reached Rudowlie at 9 A. M. About 1 P. M. a Zemindar came and reported that some Sepoys of the late 17th N. I., with numerous followers, had plundered the village of Gohemiya, and were still there.

3. I directed Ensign Woodgate to gallop up to the village with some Cavalry, to prevent their escape by surrounding it. Ensign Roddy always willing to volunteer, I permitted him to proceed

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report for the information of Major General Sir J. H. Grant, K. C. B., Commanding, that in consequence of my

with 50 more Sabres; the two Officers succeeded in drawing a cordon round the village, till I arrived with 2 guns, Infantry following.

4. Our Artillery fire kept the enemy occupied. At the very commencement, Ensign Roddy received a slight wound in his hand while laying a gun, the bullet lodging in the arm of a Jemadar, who stood behind him. On the Infantry coming up, four Companies of the 1st Regiment dashed into the village, headed by Ensign Roddy (whose Artillery fire was now no longer required;) and Serjeant Sheridan, H. M.'s 53rd Foot. Finding there was more opposition than was anticipated, I sent in a Company of the 2nd Regiment under Serjeant Dynan, H. M.'s 53rd Foot. An hour afterwards, Ensign Roddy applied for a gun to breach a house, from which there was yet a heavy fire. Colonel Williamson, (of H. H. the Raja's Service) with a Company, was sent in support of this gun.

5. The result of these arrangements was that after a three hours' contest for every inch of ground, the village was in our possession, and not a man had escaped. At one time, the enemy rushed out, but Ensign Woodgate, eager to participate in the fight, charged a little too soon, and sent them back into the village, to be there shot down.

6. The Contingent came into action after a march of 22 miles, and for the first time in their lives became hotly engaged. They were nobly led by Ensign Roddy, and the two Serjeants of H. M.'s 53rd Regiment, and to the united fearless bearing, and bull-dog courage of their leaders, this success is mainly to be attributed. Colonel

Williamson also gallantly led his Company into the thick of the fire. To Colonel Mahtab Khan, Commanding 1st Regiment, and especially to Nubbee Buksh, the spirited Commandant of the Artillery, I must record my thanks for their services, and for those of the men under their Command.

7. His Highness the Raja, his brother, and his General, accompanied the force, and by their presence in action, instilled confidence, and stimulated the Troops to cheerfully face the heavy fire.

8. The Cavalry under Ensign Woodgate, encouraged by the coolness of their Commandant, well preserved their formation, and would doubtless have struck deep, had an opportunity been afforded. Ensign Roddy is one of those, who are ever ready to show the way, at the time of the greatest danger.

9. Many rushed out of the village during the engagement, asserting they were ryots: as their appearance confirmed their statements, they were not harmed.

10. The loss of the enemy was between 150 and 200 killed. I rejoice to add ours was only 2 killed and 7 wounded, of which a Return is appended.

11. We returned to Durriabad this morning.

Sir,

I HAVE the honor to forward herewith, to be laid before His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, the report in original of a very successful affair with the Rebels in the neighbourhood of Buxar, on the 8th instant.

2. Major Carr, Madras Rifles, Commanding at that place, having received intimation, that the enemy purposed attacking the out-post of Doomraon, 12 miles further East, moved out from Buxar, and combining with the garrison of the Doomraon post, met the Rebels near Bhoj-pore, anticipating and entirely repulsing them with considerable loss, while that of our Troops was merely nominal.

3. I cannot refrain from bringing prominently to His Excellency's notice, my obligations to Major Carr, who so ably planned and executed this surprise, and to the Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men, (especially those mentioned by him by name) by whom he was so worthily supported.

4. No Nominal List of the single Casualty has yet been received, but it will be forwarded as soon as it arrives.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of Brigadier Douglas, that having received information from Captain Broome, Commanding Doomraon at 8 P. M. on the 7th, that a body of Rebels amounting to about 900, four hundred of whom

were Sepoys, were said to be advancing on Bhoj-pore and Doomraon. I proceeded the next morning to look for them with the force as per margin.

The Seikh Cavalry were at Bhoj-pore shortly after daylight. I got to Bhoj-pore with the Troop Military Train, and the two Companies of the 84th (the latter mounted on elephants)

about $\frac{1}{2}$ past nine. Sent the Madras Rifles into Doomraon to assist in protecting that place, as I called on Captain Broome, to bring two-thirds of his force, Europeans especially, to my assistance which he did with part of his own Company of Madras.

We heard on the road, that the Rebels were about a coss beyond new Bhoj-pore.

We passed that village about one and a half miles, when the Patrols of the Seikhs brought in word, that the Rebels were in a grove, about half a mile a head, and were beginning to move towards the right.

Up to this time, I think the Rebels had not the slightest idea of our being near them. But here they saw my party, and commenced to retreat. Seeing they were retreating, I sent on all the Cavalry with orders to attack, if the Rebels were moving, but if they stood, to wait till I came up. The Cavalry found them on the move, and taking advantage of a good opportunity, they went at them, and the result was that about 80 Rebels were killed, and the others dispersed. Captain Inglefield tells me, that he saw himself fully 60 dead bodies.

A party of 40 of the Seikh Cavalry sent out from Doomraon to co-operate with us, state that before joining the other Seikhs, they fell in with a body

of flying Rebels, and that they killed a number of them. But I have not been able to ascertain whether these men were included amongst those actually seen dead.

I followed the route of the Cavalry with the 84th, some distance, but finding there was no chance of coming up with the enemy, I gave it up. The greater proportion by far of those killed were Sepoys; and 30 percussion muskets were taken, besides a great number of swords.

They seemed badly off for caps. Amongst the killed were some mutineer Seikhs.

The Rajah of Doomraon himself came into the field.

Captain Inglefield and his fine Troop, and Lieutenant Ryall, with the Officers and Men of the 3rd Sikh Cavalry, took full advantage of the opportunity given them, and acquitted themselves in the most gallant manner. Mr. Garstin, the Magistrate, accompanied the party in the pursuit and punishment of the Rebels.

I HAVE the honor to forward, for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, the accompanying report and enclosures from Captain Larkins, 17th Punjab Infantry, Commanding the post at Phillibheet, of a very successful affair against a portion of the rebel force at Seerpoorah, (on the edge of the jungle), in which the enemy were defeated with the loss of four guns, their camp, and three (3) elephants.

The troops engaged on this occasion were commanded by Captain Browne, 2nd Punjab Cavalry, and behaved remarkably well. Captain Browne, I regret to say, was very severely wounded, and has lost an arm. The attack upon the rebel position appears to have been conducted by this Officer with great judgment and gallantry.

I beg to bring to His Excellency's notice Ensign Chalmers, 24th Punjab Pioneers, who led the Infantry on this occasion, and whose conduct is highly spoken of. I am glad to have this opportunity of testifying to the indefatigable zeal and intelligence displayed by this Officer upon all occasions when his services are required: especially by the assistance he has afforded in constructing temporary Barracks for the English Troops at Bareilly, in consequence of which they have been quickly and remarkably well housed.

SIR,

FOR the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, I have the honor to report a most successful attack made on the enemy's position at Seerpoorah, about 14 miles from Phillibheet, under

the Command of Captain Browne, Commanding 2nd Punjab Cavalry, in which 4 guns were captured from the enemy, along with the whole of his ammunition, baggage, cattle, 3 elephants, &c, and in which the enemy lost about 300 killed, amongst them one of the rebel leaders Allee Khan, Maiwattee, and Nizam Allee Khan was wounded, but escaped.

2. At the request of Mr. Low, Joint Magistrate of Phillibheet, and thinking it very advisable not to allow the Rebels to get possession of Nooreah, a large village 10 miles from this, on Saturday night the 28th ultimo, I sent Ensign Chalmers with 100 of the 24th Punjab Infantry, of which he is Commandant, and 100 Sabres 2nd Punjab Cavalry, the whole under Command of Lieutenant Craigie, to Nooreah, to fortify the village, as Mr. Low was anxious to re-establish a Police Chowkee there, which he had been obliged to withdraw on the 22nd.

3. On the following morning, Ensign Chalmers commenced; but shortly afterwards, the Rebels came down with Cavalry, Infantry, and Artillery to attack him, and hearing heavy firing in that direction, I concluded that such had been the case. I therefore immediately ordered out a force as per margin, under Command of Captain Browne, 2nd Punjab Cavalry, to march to Nooreah to their assistance. They

marched at $\frac{1}{4}$ to 12 o'clock A. M., arriving at Nooreah about $\frac{1}{2}$ past 3 o'clock P. M., and found that the enemy had been obliged to retreat to their position at Seerpoorah; Captain Browne, therefore, halted his Detachment at Nooreah, and after reconnoitring the enemy's position, and from information he got from some villagers, he bivouacked at Nooreah for the night, intending to attack the enemy's position in the morning, with what result will be seen from the official reports of Lieutenant Craigie, as to the operations of the 29th, and that of Lieutenant Cumhrie, (who assumed Command of the Detachment after Captain Browne was wounded) of the attack on the enemy's position, on the morning of the 30th.

4. I have further the honor to forward a sketch of the enemy's position, and the plan of attack, which was so ably and successfully carried out by Captain Browne; but in which, I regret to say, he was himself dangerously wounded, not however before he had the satisfaction of seeing the enemy's position carried, their guns, ammunition, camp equipage, &c., captured, and themselves totally routed.

5. Captain Browne speaks highly of the conduct of all engaged, and of the steady advance of all, under the fire of the enemy's guns; but most especially of the steady advance of the skirmishers of the 24th Punjab Infantry, led by Ensign Chalmers.

6. I would here beg to bring Ensign Chalmers, Officiating Commandant, 24th Punjab Infantry, prominently to the notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, for his indefatigable zeal and energy at all times, and under all circumstances. Since he arrived at Phillibheet, he has placed the city in a thorough state of defence, and his thorough knowledge of Field Engineering in all its branches has been of the greatest service here. As soon as he arrived, he threw up a bridge-head for the protection of the bridge-of-boats, to enable us, in the event of wanting assistance from Bareilly, to keep our communication open with that Station, and although the river rose so high, and almost destroyed it, as soon as the water subsided, he set to work, and in less than three days had another bridge-head completed. Besides this, between Sunday and Monday morning last, he had completed the entrenching of Nooreah, (though part of the day under fire.) and there is now a Police force there of 300 men, and the Police Chowkee re-established. Much praise, I consider, is due to Ensign Chalmers for all that he has done since he has been here, which is my reason for bringing him thus prominently to the notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief.

7. I have further the honor to forward returns of ordnance, and ordnance stores captured, as also a general casualty return of the Detachment engaged.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, for your information, that agreeably to Detachment Orders of yesterday's date, I proceeded with the force as per margin to Nooreah, for the purpose of fortifying the Tehseel, to enable the Police to repel any attacks that might be made upon them by the Rebels, who were encamped at Seerpoorah, about three miles off, on the edge of the jungle.

On arriving at Nooreah, I posted a picket of (1) one Duffadar, and (4) four Sowars, to watch the enemy's picket, which was posted about a mile from Nooreah. About half past nine, the Duffadar of the picket sent in to say, that the enemy were advancing in force, with Infantry and Cavalry, but that they could not see any guns. I allowed them to advance within three quarters of a mile of Nooreah, when I divided my Cavalry into two parties, sending one towards their left, under Ressaïdar Hukdad Khan, where they had some Cavalry drawn up; and myself taking the remainder of the Cavalry, and the whole of the Infantry, under Ensign Chalmers, (with the exception of a small guard left in Nooreah,) also a few Footmen and Police Sowars, who accompanied Mr. Low, I advanced towards their right, the ground in their front being rice fields, knee deep in water. The enemy were drawn up on a road running parallel to my front. There must have been about (300) three hundred Infantry, (100) one hundred Cavalry, and (3) two elephants.

Immediately I got within range, they opened upon me with round shot, from (3) three guns, posted along the road above mentioned, which being rather lower than the fields, were not visible from where I was. I moved off to the left, keeping as well as I could out of range of their shot, and got between them and their camp, where I left the Infantry, a portion of the Cavalry, and the Detachment of Police, under Ensign Chalmers, in a mangoe tope full of thick jungle, with orders to watch the guns, keep out of range, if possible, and endeavour to keep the enemy in play until reinforcements should arrive from Phillibheet; and taking the remainder of the Cavalry with me, I went back by the way I had come, to see how Ressaïdar Hukdad Khan was getting on.

Ressaïdar Hukdad Khan reported that he had come across a body of the enemy's Cavalry, about (19) nineteen in number, (14) fourteen of whom had charged him in the most determined manner, that the (14) fourteen were all killed, and (5) five horses captured, with a loss on our side of (2) two Sowars killed, (1) one Duffadar, and (1) one Sowar wounded, and (1) one horse missing; the Ressaïdar himself also was wounded. I cannot speak too highly of the coolness and judgment of Ressaïdar Hukdad Khan, on this occasion. I remained on the enemy's left watching their movements, and seeing that they were moving their guns towards where I had left Ensign Chalmers, I proceeded down the road they had been posted on at a trot, but had not gone above quarter of a mile, when I heard a volley of musketry, and on getting off my horse, and looking with my telescope, I saw the enemy making off helter-skelter towards their own camp. On joining Ensign Chalmers, he reported that for about an hour and a half, the enemy had kept up a fire at intervals from their guns, at the end of which time, they edged towards their standing camp, and got between it and the tope he held; at the same time he received a note from me, directing him, in the event of the enemy passing him, to return direct to "Nooreah," which he proceeded to do; on his getting clear of the tope, he found that the enemy had received reinforcements of Cavalry, and was drawn up in such a position as to command the road for his return, and that he estimated their numbers at (250) two hundred and fifty Infantry, (150) one hundred and fifty Cavalry, and (3) three guns, and that as soon as he was clear of the tope, they fired (3) three round shot at him, but without effect, after which their Cavalry immediately charged. He faced his men about, and when they were within (120) one hundred and twenty yards, gave them a volley that emptied (5) five saddles; they halted, and hesitated; his Infantry and Cavalry shouted, and made an attempt to charge but he restrained them, the joint effect of the volley, and attempt to charge was however such, that the Sowars turned and retired, or rather ran away towards their guns, which were immediately limbered up, and taken back to their standing camp, without giving him any more annoyance. I returned to Nooreah at 1 o'clock.

Great praise is due to Ensign Chalmers, and the Detachments of the 24th Punjab Infantry and 2nd Punjab Cavalry under his Command, as also to Mr. Low, and the few Police who were with him, for their steadiness under fire.

SIR,

In consequence of the incapability of Captain Browne to report the occurrences of yesterday himself, I have the honor to report, that agreeably to your orders, the force as per margin, under his command started for Nooreah at 1 P. M., to assist Lieutenant Craigie, and arrived there about 4 P. M. Captain Browne, on his arrival, finding, that the enemy had retired, before Lieutenant Craigie, ("whose report of the proceedings in the earlier part of the day I enclose,") to their standing camp at Seerpoorah, determined to postpone any attack that might be made until the following morning.

The position of the enemy, "the whole of whose force was reported to consist of 500 Infantry and 300 Cavalry, with two or three guns," was a strong one. They occupied a rising ground, the site of a ruined village called Seerpoorah, about 3 miles from Nooreah in rear of a wide and deep jheel, approachable from the front only by a straight and narrow road entirely destitute of cover of any kind, and knee deep in water and mud. Advance from this side being out of the question, and a reliable native having been found by Mr. Low, C. S., Joint Magistrate of Phillibheet, ("who accompanied the force,") who said, he could point out a circuitous road through the jungle, which led to the enemy's rear, it

was determined, that the attack should take place at daybreak on the following morning. The whole force accordingly, strength as per margin, was conducted by the guide through the jungle to within sight of the enemy's camp.

The march having been conducted with the strictest silence up to this time, the enemy were apparently unaware of our approach; the ground between us and their camp, a distance of about half a mile, being open, the line of attack was immediately formed in the following order:—The 17th P. N. I., and Kumaon Levies in line covered by the 24th Punjab N. I., "half in skirmishing order, and half as support," a Squadron of the 2nd P. Cavalry on either flank, and a troop in reserve in the rear. The order having been given to move on, the whole force proceeded at a steady pace to the attack, the enemy being now drawn up to receive us. On arriving at a distance of about 400 yards, two guns commenced playing with round shot and grape upon the advancing line. The skirmishers led by En-

sign Chalmers advanced unflinching, at a steady pace, and without firing a shot up to within 30 yards of the guns, when they poured in a rapid fire and charged up the ascent. Being then in Command of the Infantry, and noticing that at this time, a portion of the enemy had already commenced to retire, I rapidly brought up the whole line of reserve, and swept through the enemy's position, the greatest resistance being offered by the rebel Artillerymen, who fought most desperately, apparently trying to single out the European Officers.

During this time, Captain Browne, who was with the skirmishers, seeing that the Squadron on the right, under the Command of Lieutenant Craigie, was suffering from the fire of the guns, ordered it to charge in flank, but a swamp intervening, the Squadron was obliged to make a detour, which brought it to the enemy's left rear, where a gun hitherto concealed, opened on it; this however was speedily captured, its supporters either killed, or put to flight.

By this time, the flight became general, the fugitives making their way towards the jungle, which stretched away to the left; they were vigorously pursued by the Cavalry up to its edge, which point however few of them ever reached.

This force was under the personal Command of Nizam Alee Khan, who however made himself scarce at a very early stage of the proceedings. A noted chief however, named Allee Khan, was killed and three elephants were captured in the pursuit. On returning from the pursuit, it was with sincere regret that I learnt that Captain Browne was so severely wounded, that it was necessary for me to assume Command being the next Senior Officer. Having formed up again, I returned with the force to Nooreah, bringing in the captured guns, &c., being compelled, however, to halt there that day, on account of the wounded, and I marched back to the Station this morning.

By all accounts, the enemy must have lost fully 300 men, besides all their guns, ammunition, camp equipage, &c. and so thoroughly dispersed, that many more have since been killed by the Zemindars of the surrounding villages.

At the special request of Captain Browne, I beg to bring to your notice the extremely steady way in which the whole of the Infantry advanced under fire of the guns, strictly obeying their orders not to fire a shot till they reached them; the advance of the skirmishers under Ensign Chalmers was the admiration of all concerned.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, that on the morning of the 2nd instant, having received intimation of two hundred Rebels being collected in the town of "Sosra," with the intention of plundering it, should the inhabitants not pay a ransom, I immediately ordered out a party, strength as per margin.

100 Sabres 3rd Lt. Cavalry.
50 Bayonets 3rd Europeans.

The Cavalry under Lieutenant Dick I sent on in advance with orders to surround the town, my spies having informed me, that it was situated in the plain, I myself remaining to bring up the Infantry as speedily as possible.

On arriving near the village of Naroul, lying in our route, and about a mile and a half beyond which "Sosra" is situated, I sent on an Officer with a slight escort, to see if Lieutenant Dick had arrived and surrounded the town as directed; and further ordering him to inform me, if there were any Rebels in the town, as the Infantry were somewhat fatigued with the march, the roads being heavy, and in some places under water. I thought the news of the Rebels being near would inspire them.

This party having been fired on by some Rebels in Naroul was obliged to retire, and await my arrival with the Infantry, when throwing out skirmishers, I advanced on the town, the Rebels retiring through the ravines in rear, and to the left of the town, which were of great size and depth; through these we followed them, and coming within good range at a nullah, which operated as a slight obstacle to their retreat, being much swollen, the Infantry succeeded in disposing of a few of the Rebels; crossing the stream, which was running rapidly at the time, we continued to drive the Rebels through the ravines until we arrived at "Sosra," at which point they re-crossed the stream, and made towards "Mow Mohoni."

The Rebels here had evacuated the town previous to my arrival, and probably formed some of the party whom we had driven across the river at this point.

On arriving at "Sosra," I entered it and found it deserted by the inhabitants, the greater portion of whom, as well as the leading men, are I understand in league with the Rebels. The Cavalry rejoined me after we entered "Sosra," having watched the further side of the town, the only one not intersected by the ravines in which horsemen could not possibly act.

As it rained heavily on our setting out on the expedition, and also at intervals during the day, the troops were all thoroughly wetted; and I therefore thought it advisable to return to camp that night, which I did, arriving about 7 o'clock P. M.

marched from Duboh, strength as per margin, with the intention of attacking the force of Rebels, who have for some time past been assembled in force of from 2 to 4,000, at the villages of Mow and Mohoni, situated on either banks of the river Pohooj under the following lead-

ers, *viz.* :—

Thakoos Burjoor Sing Bundelah, Thakoors Jowahir Sing and Davie Sing Kenawalas, and Thakoos Maidmee Mull.

Continuous and heavy rain, since the 31st ultimo prevented my attacking them on the 1st instant, in this position, which they had selected on account of its great natural strength, and being intersected by deep ravines.

On arriving at Mohoni, we found the enemy in possession of the nullahs, from which they opened fire at our advanced guard. We threw out skirmishers, with the usual supports, and having found a good position for the guns, opened upon the enemy with shrapnel, which soon drove them from their position, and allowed of our advance close up to the town of Mohoni, into which, as my force of Infantry is but small and inadequate to the usual loss incurred in street fighting, I directed two or three shells to be thrown, which was done, and had the effect of clearing it thoroughly. We then advanced to the opposite side of the town, facing the Fort of Mow, where the enemy were observed to be assembled, and had brought a gun to bear upon our approach by the road, and which they opened upon our skirmishers and advance; this gun was soon silenced by ours, and seeing, that the enemy had withdrawn it, and fearing it might be carried away, I ordered an advance of the whole line, at the same time directing a party of the 3rd Light Cavalry as per margin to mount.

These men, up to this time had been dismounted as a support to our guns, to enable me to bring all my Infantry into play.

No European Cavalry Officer being at that moment available, I requested Mr. Veterinary Surgeon Lamb, to accompany and lead it in pursuit of the guns which he most willingly undertook to do, but

Lieutenant and Adjutant Moore, coming up shortly afterwards, I despatched him also with them.

This party soon overtook the enemy, captured their two guns which were at once turned on their former owners, and cut up about 30 of them, Mr. Lamb being slightly wounded in the pursuit.

Owing to the difficult nature of the ground which gave secure cover to the enemy, their loss in killed and wounded was not so severe as I could have wished, but I estimate it in all at from 80 to a 100; their route and dispersal was however complete, and the only two guns which they had are now in our possession, with all their ammunition, &c.

I beg to bring prominently to your notice, the names of Mr. Veterinary Surgeon Lamb, Lieutenant and Adjutant Moore, and Subadar Soojat Khan, 3rd Light Cavalry, for their gallantry in the capture of the enemy's guns in most difficult ground, and trust that Government may deem their services worthy of recognition.

I must not omit to bring to your notice, the zeal and energy of Serjeant Murphy, of the Bhopal Contingent Artillery, who worked his guns most successfully until knocked down by a sun-stroke.

I am happy to say, that we had no casualties from the enemy's fire; a few of the Europeans were knocked down by the sun, but are now doing well.

Enclosed is a list of our casualties, as also of the Artillery and Stores captured from the enemy.

B., reporting the occupation of Sultanpore by the troops under Brigadier A. H. Horsford, C. B., and the passage of the Goomtee, under the personal directions of the Major General.

2. I am directed by His Excellency to beg you will draw the attention of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General to the admirable manner in which Sir

J. Hope Grant has conducted the operations of the last six weeks; and more particularly those for the passage of the Goomtee, with most imperfect means.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, that under instructions received from the Chief of the Staff, I despatched from Fyzabad the force as per margin, under the Command of Brigadier Horsford, C. B., on the 9th instant, towards Sultanpore, to follow up the Rebel forces which had been besieging Maun Sing at Shahgung.

2. Heavy rain had fallen for some days before this force left Fyzabad, which rendered the track, (there is no road,) to Sultanpore very heavy and deep in places, for the guns and the packeries carrying the Commissariat supplies. There are two considerable muddees on this route, but by the exertions of Captain Reid, Deputy Commissioner, they were bridged.

3. Brigadier Horsford's Despatch, detailing his operations on the 15th instant, when he drove the enemy to the right bank, and occupied Sultanpore, I have already had the honor to forward.

4. It was intended that Brigadier Horsford should cross the Goomtee, and occupy the Cantonments on the right bank, but the enemy having taken away or destroyed every boat, no bridge could be thrown across the river, and Brigadier Horsford's instructions were not to cross without one. The right bank being in the possession of the enemy for about fifteen miles up and down the river, it was found impracticable to bring boats from a distance.

5. In consequence of the large increase of the Rebel force, amounting to about 20,000 men with 15

arms, opposing the passage of the river, I received further instructions from the Chief of the Staff to reinforce Brigadier Horsford; and for this purpose I despatched the 2nd Battalion of the Rifle Brigade, and two 9-pounder guns from Fyzabad, on the 16th instant. By order of the Commander-in-Chief this enabled the following movements of the Oudh force, viz.—(1st)—The 53rd Regiment from Durriabad to Fyzabad, to replace the Rifles. (2nd)—The 1st Bengal Fusiliers from Nawabgunge to Durriabad; and (3rd)—A Wing of the 88th Regiment from Lucknow to Nawabgunge, Bara Banke.

6. In consequence of the increasing numbers of the enemy, the determined opposition shewn to the passage of the river, and the importance attached to occupying the right bank, I determined without waiting for His Excellency's instructions, to still further reinforce the Sultanpore Column, and I accordingly marched from Fyzabad on the 19th instant, with the detail mentioned in the margin.

7. In many places along the route, the track led across cultivation and through marshes, where the gun wheels sunk to the axle. The Infantry too were obliged to wade through sloughs frequently.

8. I arrived at Sultanpore on the 22nd instant. Brigadier Horsford had taken up a good position and secured an excellent point for the passage of the river. But no boats could be procured. Three small dinghies were found, and of these Lieutenant Raynsford had constructed a very good raft; he also had platforms for a bridge in a forward state. Three dinghies which were lying at the Biswee Nuddee, 9 miles distant, I had conveyed to the ghat, and three others were found sunk in the river; of these two more rafts were constructed.

9. All the preparations necessary for crossing the river on the rafts, with the exception of the heavy guns and park, were completed on the night of the 24th instant.

10. It being evident that there was no possibility of procuring boats for a bridge, until the enemy was driven from the opposite bank, I decided upon crossing without one.

11. The force of the enemy occupied several positions. The main position was at Hassenpore, about 4 miles from Cantonments. In the Cantonment there was another large body and 8 guns; and two villages in front of the point at which I intended crossing, were also occupied. Besides the above, there were picquets along the bank of the river, and several batteries, and a Regiment watched the Dhera Ghat, where it was said there were some boats.

12. On the 22nd instant, I received intelligence that Bene Madho had arrived at the rebel camp, bringing a strong reinforcement, but the numbers were variously reported.

13. The heavy guns being in position to cover the operation, and keep down the fire of the enemy, the force commenced passing over on the morning of the 25th.

By 4 P. M. the Madras Fusiliers, the 5th Punjab Rifles, two 9-pounder guns, and a Detachment of Hodson's Horse had crossed, and I ordered this force to advance under the Command of Lieutenant Colonel Galway, and take and occupy the two villages in my front. On the approach of the Column, the enemy fled; the villages were occupied; and I thus secured an excellent position; the river, which here forms a loop, protecting the flanks of the advanced line.

14. There was much difficulty in swimming the horses across the river, and all the force had not got over till late on the 27th.

15. On the 28th, I had my arrangements made for attacking the Rebels at the Cantonments on the following morning at day-break. On that afternoon, the enemy came out in strong force and attacked my position. They were easily repulsed, and driven back; but as it was late when this was accomplished, I did not think it advisable then to follow them up. The following morning I advanced at 4 o'clock, but found that the Cantonment was deserted.

16. The enemy retreated towards the south-west, but it is not ascertained yet what position they intend taking up.

17. This district is now clear of Rebels, and the right bank of the river being free, boats for a bridge will be up in a couple of days.

18. I beg to bring to the notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief the efficient co-operation and support I received from Brigadier Horsford, C. B., Commanding the Infantry Brigade; Lieutenant Colonel Sir W. Russell, Bart., who commanded the Cavalry and Superintended the out-post duty; and Major Yates, R. H. A., who commanded the Artillery. Officers Commanding Regiments, Troops and Detachments:—Lieutenant Colonel Hill, 2nd Battalion Rifle Brigade; Lieutenant Colonel Galway, 1st Madras Fusiliers; Lieutenant Colonel Payn, H. M.'s 53rd Regiment; Major Horne, 7th Hussars; Major Vaughan, 5th Punjab Rifles; Major Daly, C. B., Irregular Cavalry; Lieutenant Strange, R. A.; Lieutenant Lyon, R. H. A., were most attentive in superintending the crossing of their men and horses.

The two heavy guns under charge of Lieutenant Warren rendered good service.

Brigadier Horsford speaks most favorably of his Staff. Major Mollan, Major of Brigade; Surgeon Fraser, 2nd Battalion Rifle Brigade, Senior Surgeon; Lieutenant Ramsbottom, 2nd Battalion Rifle Brigade, Orderly Officer, and Captain Graeme, Deputy Assistant Commissary General, who was very efficient in keeping the troops supplied.

I have great satisfaction in bringing to the notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief the zeal and unceasing exertions of Lieutenant Scott, Field Engineer, and Lieutenant Raynsford, Commanding the Madras Sappers, in preparing the rafts, and crossing over the troops. Everything had to be made upon the spot, and the material to be collected from houses in the town. These two Officers and the Detachment of Madras Sappers, (who worked as I never saw native soldiers work before) were employed day and night, with very few hours' interval during the operation.

From the Civil Officers attached to this Column, St. G. Tucker, Esquire, Captain Reid and W. Forbes, Esquire, I have received every assistance; and Captain Reid used every exertion to procure boats for a bridge, but for the reasons above stated, he was unsuccessful.

All Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men of this Column have performed their various duties cheerfully and well, and deserve my full approval. I have particularly to notice the great assistance rendered by the Punjab Rifles and Major Daly's Corps in swimming across the Artillery and 7th Hussars' horses.

I beg also to mention my Divisional and Personal Staff Major Hamilton, Deputy Assistant Adjutant General; Captain the Hon'ble A. Anson, A. D. C.; also Major Wolseley, who, as Deputy Assistant Quarter Master General, had the superintendence of the arrangements for crossing the river, and who performed them to my perfect satisfaction.

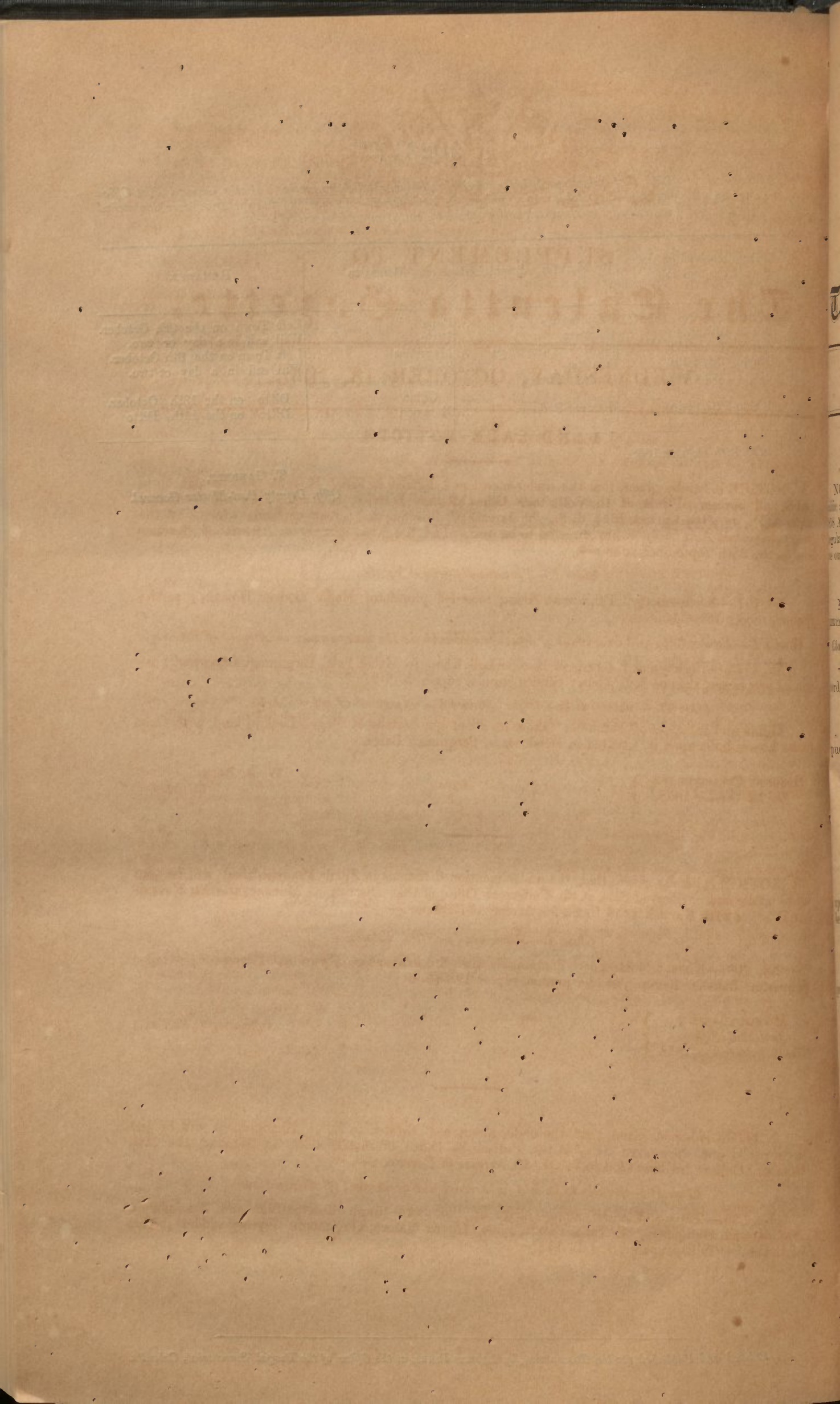

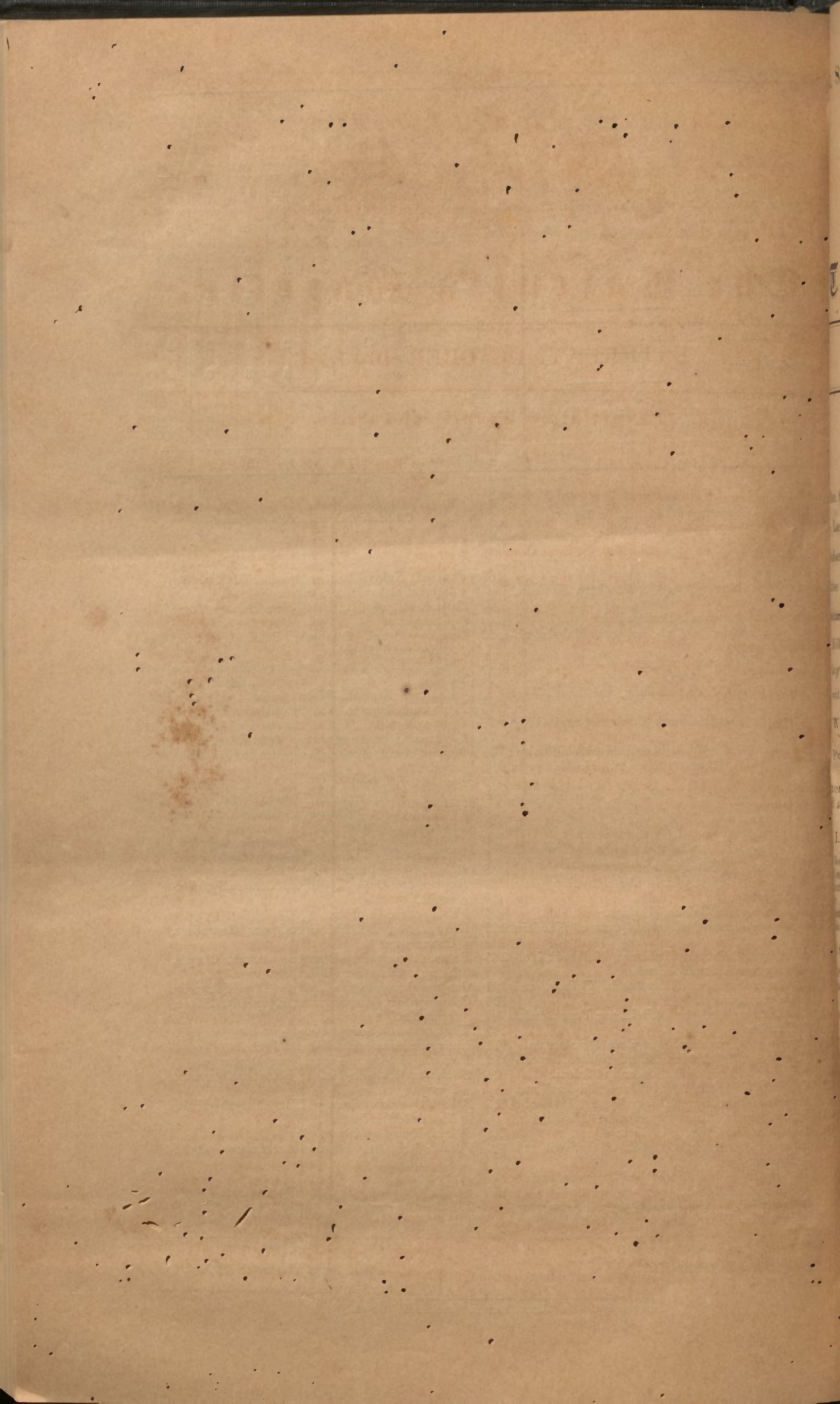

Legislative Council of India.

THE 9TH OCTOBER 1858.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 9th October 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee who are to report thereon after the 13th of January next :—

A Bill to empower the Governor in Council of Bombay to appoint a Magistrate for certain Districts within the Zillah Ahmedabad.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide specially for the Magisterial and Police Administration of such portions of the Zillah Ahmedabad as are mentioned in the Schedule to this Act ; It is enacted as follows :—

I. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council of Bombay to appoint a Magistrate for the Districts mentioned in the Schedule to this Act ; and such Magistrate, when so appointed, shall exercise within the said Districts all the powers of a Magistrate as defined in the general Regulations of the Bombay Code and the Acts of the Legislative Council. Upon the appointment of a Magistrate under this Act, the said Districts shall be exempt from the jurisdiction of the Magistrate of Ahmedabad. It shall also be lawful for the said Governor in Council to appoint so many Assistants to the said Magistrate as may be required.

Governor in Council empowered to appoint a Magistrate for the Districts mentioned in Schedule.

Powers of Magistrate.

Exemption of Districts from jurisdiction of the Magistrate of Ahmedabad.

Governor in Council may appoint Assistants to the Magistrate.

Nothing contained in the preceding Section shall be held to remove the said Districts from the jurisdiction of the Session Judge of Ahmedabad or of the Sudder Fouzdaree Adawlut.

Act not to be held to remove the said Districts from the jurisdiction of the Session Judge of Ahmedabad or of the Sudder Court.

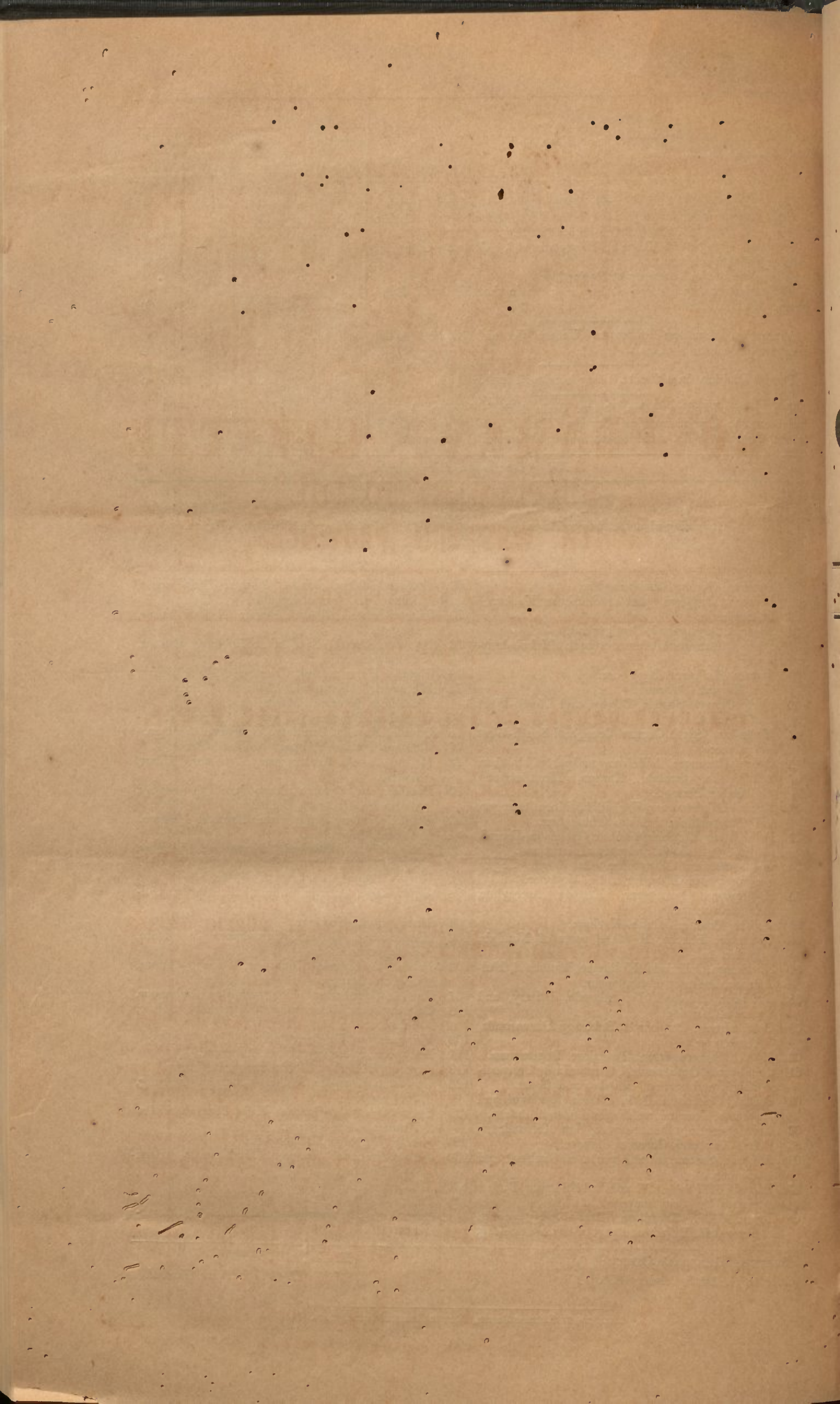
